

At the start of the month I was at Anfield commentating on Liverpool's game with Bradford. Prior to kick-off I saw referee Jeff Winter whose first words to me were that I should be careful what I said about him because we'd got him in a few weeks time for the Tranmere match. Little did he know what an explosive game it would turn out to be.

Whether on TV as a commentator or as manager of Birmingham City, I always try to steer clear of commenting on referees, just as I do about opposing players and managers. Yet as I approached Tuesday night's post-match Press Conference I couldn't remember being so angered. The source of that feeling was the number and nature of the tackles we witnessed in the match, many of which seemed to carry intent. As a result, just as we thought we were starting to clear the decks after our horrendous run of injuries, we have suffered a massive blow.

While I've been manager of this Club, I've often felt that we don't get the rub of the green and 'lucky' is rarely a word you can associate with us. On Tuesday, it was as if someone was saying: "You're 3-0 up, it's all going too well!"

It is, of course, pleasing to win games, but this has to be balanced against what we're trying to achieve this season. We are now finding it increasingly difficult to compete without so many key players. On Tuesday we lost Jon McCarthy. He has been in outstanding form, producing his best football since he's been here. But he now has a broken leg and will be out for a long time. Stan Lazaridis and Marcelo both have ligament damage. They don't need operations which, at this club, represents good news!


Returning to Tuesday's match, Martin Grainger and Graham Hyde added their names to our growing list of goalscorers this season. We have had so many changes forced upon us which has led to a lack of continuity, but we shouldn't overlook the fact that these two players took our tally of scorers to SIXTEEN since August! For Graham it was his first strike for the club and I doubt he will score a better goal. Martin Grainger tucked away the penalty well in the absence of two regular takers, Martin O'Connor and Paul Furlong. It's always important to get off to a good start and the award of the penalty helped us on our way.

Penalties have had a bearing on the outcome of our last three games. Undoubtedly at Portsmouth it cost us two points. At Barnsley, who knows what might have been if a spot kick hadn't been awarded against us? But on Tuesday, it helped us to race into a 3-0 lead. With so many contentious issues in the last few games I'm sure you can see why it's not my policy to get involved in knee-jerk reactions to referee's decisions.

The comment of Jeff Winter at Anfield shows that while we see referees as different, they are human. They watch TV and hear the comments about them. It's difficult not to pass comment because after a game you're always faced with the media asking for your view on incidents. But I have found that to make comment ultimately serves no purpose.

Allan Johnston vs Bobby Howe

Many Sunderland fans were worried when Peter Reid sold Michael Bridges, and banished Allan Johnston and other contract rebels to the reserves.

Swindon benefited themselves, signing Paul Thirlwell on Ioan. Reid has dubbed him "the new Paul Bracewell", and he certainly made a good impression at the County Ground.

Thirdwell has since returned to the Stadium of Light but Birmingham have their own Sunderland player on their books in the form of Allan Johnston.

Bobby Howe has led Swindon's midfield this season and has shown both battling and creative qualities in the clubs fight at the foot of the table. He has scored once, Town's winner against Blackburn, but most of his efforts have flown wide.

Johnston has yet to get an effort on target for the Blues, but despite playing for just 371 minutes he has delivered 23 crosses, with a completion rate of 48 per cent.

This illustrates the danger that the Scottish international poses for the opposition, his searing pace and tricky footwork often bamboozling the keenest of defences.

Howe has been as productive as the Birmingham man though, swinging in 82 crosses this season, with 28 per cent of them reaching a red shirt.

And defensively he has been strong, winning over half of his 24 tackles. He has conceded only 15 fouls, an excellent record for a midfield battler.

Birmingham City may be hot favourites with the Bookies to win this game, and the League table rarely lies (except in this Division), but players such as Bobby Howe are hard to ignore and will endeavour to give Jimmy Quinn's side a three-point fillip.

Will it be a game which is won or lost in midfield though?

For Swindon Town, the Premier League is fast becoming a dim and distant memory. An astounding 4-3 Play-off win against Leicester City in 1993 took them to the promised land for just a single campaign. Since then, they have struggled to establish themselves in Division One.

Their drop from te Premier League was rapid. They passed through Division One, suffering successive relegations which took them down to Division Two a mere twelve months after they had been mixing it with the big boys.

Fortunately, though, the slide stopped there. At the first attempt they won the Division Two title and are now in their fourth campaign back with us.

Looking on the positive side, Swindon's League placings have been steadily improving. In 1997 they finished, nineteeth. A year later it was eighteenth and last season, seventeenth.

There is no doubt, though, that they want more. For much of their history they have hovered around the bottom two divisions, but that taste of the Premiership only makes clubs hungry for more. Swindon Town are no exception to this rule.

Swindon have played their home football at the County Ground for no less than 103 years

Cash is the Answer

The reason behind Swindon's fall from grace is that common ailment, lack of cash. There have been boardroom changes in the six years since the top flight beckoned, but they have been unable to compete with the big spenders.

When you look at it, teams which come up tend to struggle a bit unless they have the spending power of a Fulham or a Manchester City. Swindon don't and this has been reflected in their League position.

They are, at the time of writing, rooted to the bottom of the table. In terms of away form they have a single win at Palace and a couple of draws from ten games on the road. Both those one-pointers came in the West Midlands, however, at Walsall and Wolves. They may be low at the moment, but the Robins are quite



capable of causing an upset. Last season this fixture ended with the sharing of two goals, with the now departed George Ndah taking a staring role.

For Blues, the points would help in a promotion push. For Swindon, the win would be vital to kick start a move away from the drop zone.

Mighty Quinn

Former Town player and fans favourite **Jimmy Quinn** has gathered a wealth of experience over his career playing at the likes of Blackburn Rovers, Leicester City, West Ham, managing Reading and picking up 48 caps for Northern Ireland. During his time as a player at Swindon he scored over a goal a game and went on to score 94 for Reading. He took over the hot seat from Steve McMahon in October 1998 and is still playing occasionally.

Net Minders

Frank Talia was spotted playing for Australia's Under 21 team and after trials with several English clubs, eventually signed for Blackburn Rovers in August 1992. He was brought in on loan at Swindon before signing in November 1995. He was back-up to Fraser Digby until he broke through with some terrific displays to earn him a regular place, and the No. 1 shirt. Frank has an infectious character with plenty to say both on and off the field.

Jimmy Glass joined from Bournemouth on a Bosman. Started his career as a trainee at Crystal Palace and went on loan to Portsmouth before grabbing the chance of first team football


at Dean Court. He only started three games for Swindon last season, but his heroics for Carlisle on the final day made it a season to remember. Jimmy scored in the dying seconds to keep Carlisle in the Football League, making him a hero with the 'Blues' faithful and instigating a sell-out of Carlisle 'GLASS' goalie shirts.

Steve Mildenhall is one of Swindon's home grown talents. He's in his third year as a professional after coming through the Club's YTS system. Made two first team appearances in 1995/96, came off the bench to play as an outfield player in 1996/97 and made his full League debut between the posts for Swindon in October 1997. In this match he suffered a terrible groin injury but with no keeper on the bench, he bravely played on to earn the 'Man of the Match' award in front of the Sky cameras and put Swindon on top of the 1st Division for 24 hours.

Back Line

Gareth Hall signed from Sunderland under the Bosman ruling, Best known as a full-back, he's versatile enough to play anywhere across the back. Started his career at Chelsea where he flourished under ex-Swindon boss Glenn Hoddle. Moved to Sunderland in 1995 and was a regular in the Premiership for the Wearsiders. Capped nine times for Wales.

Alan Reeves quit Wimbledon's "Crazy Gang" in search of first team football with Swindon. Tall central defender, who cost the Dons £300,000 from




Rochdale five years ago when he was signed as a replacement for John Scales. Excellent header of the ball, 31-year-old Reeves can be an asset in attack on set pieces, scoring 2 goals in 24 appearances last season.

Mark Robinson started his career at West Bromwich Albion, joined Barnsley on a free in June 1986 and such was his form there that Newcastle snapped him up for £450,000 in March 1993. After losing his place in the first team through injury, Swindon paid a Club record £600,000 for his services in July 1994 and he has been a regular and consistent performer ever since. Mark can play at full-back, central defence and also as a sweeper.

Gareth Davies was signed on a free transfer in March 1999, He made the short trip down the M4 from Reading and despite being a firm favourite with the fans, he did not figure in Tommy Burns' plans. Gareth is well known for his commitment and aggressive style, but the Town fans only caught glimpses of him in action due to several injuries wrecking the end of his campaign.

Sol Davis is a left-sided full-back/wing back who was offered his first pro contract in the summer of 1998 after a series of impressive performances in the reserves. Made his league debut as a substitute at home to QPR, shortly after his 18th birthday. First start in a Swindon shirt came six months later in the derby clash at Oxford United. Last season he established himself as reliable first team player making 23 appearances.

Andy Williams moved from Southampton in October 1999 in a £65,000 deal after an impressive loan spell at the County Ground. Andy is an extremely versatile player and has featured in both wing-back positions though Andy admits he usually plays on the left wing. A regular

Under21 international he made his debut coming on as substitute against Brazil in Sao Poalo's Maracana Stadium.

Centre Field

Ty Gooden was signed by John Gorman in 1993 having been released by Wycombe Wanderers. Made over 30 appearances in Swindon's Second Division Championship season but was hindered by injuries in 1996/97. He is now the Town's longest serving player entering

In their 1985/86 Fourth Division Championship year, Swindon amassed a record 104 points Swindon reached the FA Cup semifinals in 1910 and 1912 as a non-League club

his 6th season. A natural wingback who likes to get forward, he can deliver dangerous crosses.

Scott Leich, the former Dunfermline and Hearts midfielder, signed for Swindon in the summer of 1996 for a bargain price of £15,000. Enjoyed a successful loan spell at the County Ground during the Second Division Championship season and former manager Steve McMahon was quick to bring him in on a permanent basis. Scott was named 'Club Captain' by Jim Quinn in the close season after the retirement of Brian Borrows. He works hard in the Town's engine room, possesses a strong tackle and is capable of spreading the play.

Gifted young midfielder Robin Hulbert made his first team bow as a substitute against QPR in the Coca-Cola Cup tie at Loftus Road in September 1996. He gained Premiership experience on-loan with Newcastle Utd and showed much improvement last season. Six full starts last season gave him added experience and incentive. This season Robin will be looking to become a regular in Jimmy Quinn's side.

Lee Collins joined Swindon from Scottish Club Albion Rovers for £15,000 in November 1995. Lee was probably Swindon's most improved player in 1997-98. After being banned for seven games and told to clean up his act, he successfully channelled his aggression and energies into developing as a player and his tough tackling remained, but with control.

Gifted Frenchman Philippe
Cuervo impressed during a trial
period and was quickly signed on
a three-year contract from
Sochaux. He has not had the best
of luck with injuries and missed
all but two games of last season
due to a broken ankle. He has
been given the all-clear by the
specialist and will resume full
training in December 1999.

Stephen (Bobby) Howe is an attacking midfielder who signed for Swindon in January 1998 from Nottingham Forest, where his first team opportunities had dried up. He made 17 appearances for Forest and has had loan spells at Kettering and Ipswich Town.


In Attack

Chris Hay is a pacy young striker drafted in from Scottish giants Celtic for £330,000. He quickly made a good impression scoring 13 goals in 18 appearances before Christmas 1997. A number of niggling injuries hampered his last campaign but he is raring to go this season. He still managed to notch six goals in 18 starts last season.

Ifem Onuora is an ex-Huddersfield, Mansfield and Gillingham striker, who was signed in a £100,000 deal in March 1998. He made the perfect start for his new club, heading the winning goal on his debut versus QPR. He leads the line exceedingly well and his impressive tally of 20 goals last season was enough to make Iffy Swindon Town's top marksman.

Giuiliano Grazioli was signed by manager Jimmy Quinn in June 1999 on a free transfer from his former club Peterborough United. Giuliano's last visit to the County Ground was in 1997 with Stevenage Town in the FA Cup 3rd round. His winning goal dumped Swindon out and handed Stevenage a money making 4th round tie against Newcastle Utd. He scored 15 goals last season for Peterborough and Jimmy Quinn is certain that his former strike partner will continue his good form with Swindon. However, a broken foot sustained earlier this month will see him ruled out of action until next year.


Like manager Jimmy Quinn, Charlie Griffin started his career in non-league football. He was signed for £10,000 from Chippenham Town where he was top scorer in the Screwfix League with 30 goals. At nineteen years old he is a prospect for the future and the coaching staff believe that with a handful of reserve games under his belt he will be ready to step into first team football. His first start in the first team came in the final game of last season against Barnsley, where the dream start occured when he opened his account after only seven minutes.


Who are the alternatives? Well the press would have you believe that there are people

Marcelo Marches On

It took a while for Marcelo Cipriano to get here, but we eventually attained our bargain striker. He began repaying the fee immediately with a brace on his debut followed by a strike on Tuesday. With a better than one in two strike ratio for the Blades, this is one sharp shooter who knows where the net is.

You can't get much better than two goals on your debut. Well, alright, maybe a hat-trick beats it but let's not get greedy.

Marcelo though has another reason for not going overboard in his celebrations of that fantastic start to his Blues career:

"It was a good debut for me but the result wasn't so good for us. It was a difficult game. QPR are a good team especially at home.

"I felt I had a good game but can do much better. But to score two on your debut is good for a player and I look forward to scoring more goals for Birmingham City."

If he can keep up his rate at Sheffield United we will be more than happy. He averaged better than a goal every other game which is a rarity in the modern game.

He also scored on his Sheffield United debut, amazingly against QPR. That was his first introduction to the English game having previously played for Portugese Giants Benfica and the Spanish side Deportivo Alaves.

Now that he's used to our way

and it took him no time to
adjust - does Marcelo see his
long term future in England?

"I have signed a long contract at Birmingham City because I want to be here. What I have seen at the club over the last four months makes me think it was the right decision.

"I am happy with things here. The manager is very good and there is a good atmosphere amongst the group. I think we have a good chance of promotion but we need to put in better performances and start to win more games.

"That was why I wasn't happy about the result at QPR. Draws away from home are good, but by winning them you can give yourself a good chance of promotion."

It is that kind of determination which has characterised this Blues squad and offers evidence of how Marcelo will fit in.

"I have signed a long contract at Birmingham City because I want to be here. What I have seen at the club... makes me think it was the right decision."

Perfect Delivery

The real bonus for Blues this season has been the quality of our wide players. With Stan Lazaridis, Jon McCarthy, Gary Rowett and Martin Grainger all able to delivery excellent crosses into the danger area, Marcelo should thrive at St. Andrews:

"I prefer to receive the ball from wide positions. I like to have good crosses coming into me.

"At Sheffield United, about 85% of my goals came from crosses from out wide and that's what I need.

"It is true that the wingers are playing well here. I'm looking forward to benefitting from the service they provide."

Talking of Sheffield United, they are currently in a slump which has seen them slip perillously close to the relegation zone. But is there any great differences between the Blades and the Blues? One man should be able to tell us:

"When I left, Sheffield United were not doing as badly as they are now. They have had about four defeats one after another which has caused them to drop down the League table. The position is very bad for the club at the moment, but I hope they can climb back up.

"There are a lot of similarities between Sheffield United and Birmingham City. At United, there is a lot of expectation from the supporters."

"Here at Birmingham the pressure is for promotion and it's the same for Sheffield United supporters. Both clubs are big clubs and the expectations are there."

Competition

It's becoming tradition (and possibly a bit tired) nowadays to remark on the strong competition for places at the Blues. This is fast becoming the case for the forwards and Marcelo's move has put him into a very strong battle for selection:

"It's good for players to feel that their place is under pressure. It means that you don't rest; you keep working hard even when things are going well for you on the pitch.


"When there is someone else who can take your place, you strive to reach your maximum potential. You have to to keep your place in the team.

Which means that there will be a bit of nervousness on Tuesday when West Ham come to town. Marcelo played for Sheffield United in an earlier round of the Worthington Cup meaning, of course, that he is Cup-tied for the game here in three days time:

"It is a pity that I am cup-tied. It is great to play against Premiership teams. You look forward to the big games more than usual and it's good for the whole club. The players and the supporters like to play these teams.

"I won't be playing in that one but I'm still looking forward to hopefully playing against Swindon and to score more goals for Birmingham City."

Which is, after all, what he's good at. There's a very real danger that we are witnessing the birth of a real hero at St. Andrews. Everything so far points to a great career for Marcelo here. If that is what's to come, he won't be the only one looking forward to the future.

The West Country team had been promoted two seasons earlier with an exciting team that had also won the League Cup at Wembley, beating Arsenal 3-1. As with so many other teams though, they had found Cup form did not necessarily translate into League success following promotion. Most of the Wembley side were still in action for Swindon but the man who lifted the Cup, Stan Harland had been transferred to Blues earlier that season and was now facing his former teammates for the first time.

Following the FA Cup win over Port Vale Blues had gone to Vicarage Road and returned with their first away win of the season, Trevor Francis scoring the goal.

Rain over the previous few days left the pitch in a slippery condition leading to some doubts as to whether Blues would be suited to playing on it. In the event the weather had no effect on Blues steamrollering home form. Fielding the strongest side available with only the goalkeeping spot causing difficulties

Blues tore Swindon's rearguard apart in a devastating seventeen minute spell around half-time. There was little in the first half-hour to indicate what was to come as both teams battled desperately to come to terms with the slick surface but after 32 minutes Blues made the breakthrough. The goal started as so often with a Roger Hynd free kick on the halfway line. The free kick was met by Bob Latchford's head and flicked on inside the box. In one movement Francis pivoted and shot the ball into the net before Peter Downsborough could react. It was another brilliant goal in the Francis canon and his fifth in the last four games as he overcame a lean spell during November and December. Swindon's

tactics up to this point appeared to be purely defensive but the goal seemed to knock the fight from the team. Within nine minutes Blues had doubled the lead and this goal came from a collector's piece. During this period Blues scored hatfuls of goals from Latchford getting his head to crosses from Gordon Taylor, this goal came from exactly the opposite scenario. Latchford's cross was knocked on by Taylor at the near post, leaving Bob Hatton to finish off from close in.

On the stroke of half-time Blues extended the lead still further. Malcolm Page made a break on the right and his low cross picked out Latchford. The big striker's first effort

was blocked by Downs-

effort. In truth the scoreline flattered Blues but the forward line's ability to kill off opposition had again been shown. If fans thought that Blues might ease off in the second half with a Cup tie coming up the following week, they were quickly shown otherwise.

It took only another four minutes before the fourth goal went in. The source was a bit more usual this time as Latchford, finding space in the centre of the box slipped home a left foot effort from Taylor's cross. Although that was the end of Blues scoring for the game it was not for the want of trying. Francis seemed to have his sights set a bit wide as he bred to efforts into the side netting whilst Latchford, looking for his third hat-trick of the season, volleyed straight at Downsborough from point-blank range and then headed another effort wide. Swindon finally came back into the game in the final guarter of an hour and teenage keeper Paul Cooper showed what a fine prospect he was. Firstly he pulled off a brilliant flying save to turn a long range effort from Terry Hubbard around the post and then he blocked an effort Wembley hero Roger Smart.

With seven minutes left Swindon gained some slight reward for their efforts. A long ball saw Blues defence caught static appealing for offside. Arthur Horsfield, so often a thorn in Blues side, race through and lobbed Cooper as he advanced. The goal was a case of too little too late as Blues marched on to another win, extending the unbeaten home run to 28 games and taking the goals tally to 16 in the last four home games.

Although it was not the most impressive home performance of the season it was a further indication that Blues were getting things right for the promotion run in - Perhaps today's match will herald the start of another successful push with the same result?

The Blues youth team of the early seventies brought forth a host of fine players. The likes of Kenny Burns and Trevor Francis went on to great international careers but some of the lesser known players became Football League regulars in their own right. One of these was Gary Emmanuel, the Welsh midfielder. Gary came from a footballing family, his father Len being a full back for Swansea and Newport. Blues scouting system spotted Gary turning out for Swansea schoolboys and after a brief trial he was taken onto the club's books. He made his first appearance in the youth team in August 1970 and it is an indication of the strength of the club's scouting system of the time that 8 of the twelve players in the team that day went on to play League football.

After three years in the youths and reserves Gary was given his first team debut as a substitute in the Texaco Cup against Stoke. For thos who don't remember the Texaco it was very much the "Mickey Mouse" Cup of its day. It consisted of clubs from the top divisions in England and Scotland that had not qualified for Europe. In four years of the Texaco and its successor, the Anglo-Scottish Trophy, Blues only met one Scottish team, Ayr Utd. Blues played weak sides in the Stoke games and it was to be another year before Gary made his League debut. An injury to



Alan Campbell brought Gary into the side and in only his second game he scored his first goal, a somewhat fluky looping effort that dropped into the net out of the keeper's reach. For a player who rarely scored in the reserves it was a dream start. Gary was to remain a member of Blues first team squad for a further four years.

It was not really a great help to Gary that managers kept seeing him in roles that he was not really suited to. He was given one run in the team as a centre forward alongside Trevor Francis but his lack of pace was not in his favour. At the start of the 1978-79 season he was tried out at left back, again with no great success.

After playing the first thirteen games of that ill-starred season he was dropped for the Manchester Utd game which saw the team earn their first win. The team was left unchanged for a few games and Gary decided to move on.


The remainder of his long career was spent in the West Country or Wales. He had three year sat Eastville with Bristol Rovers without ever setting the world on fire before moving on to Swindon. The Wiltshire club were going through a bad spell at the time but Gary was one of the team's bright spots. During his three seasons at the County Ground he was a virtual ever present, back in his favourite midfield role. His departure from Swindon saw him go through a few transfers rapidly. A brief spell at Newport was followed by a month at Bristol C before he moved on to his home town club. He was to stay at the Vetch Field for a further three years before moving on into the Welsh League. He had spells at Barry T., Llanelli and Haverfordwest County before retiring only a few years ago.


Like so many other players in recent years, he has taken up employment with the Royal Mail. He lives in Swansea where he is employed as a postman.





But with three minutes remaining a rather strange penalty decision got Pompey back level and there was still time for Darren Purse to be harshly dismissed.









