After our last home game against Norwich, I think everyone was suffering a slight reaction from what had happened earlier in the week. Three games in six days is a lot to ask, especially when the first two are high-profile games against Premiership opposition. Of course, it was disappointing to lose at home after such a good run, and to go down to a last-minute goal was a bitter pill to swallow, but the lads have nothing to be ashamed of. They've been a credit to themselves and the club and although we weren't at our best against Norwich I didn't think we deserved to lose the game. Norwich battled very well, and in the end they had the legs on us in the last five minutes. We definitely ran out of steam in the second half, and couldn't find the vital spark - we were lacking a vard of sharpness. I felt that at half time, even though we were one up and had controlled the game, we were likely to need a second goal. The game was a scrappy affair overall, so I hope that we can end this century with a better performance this afternoon.

At this time of year it's usual for everyone to take a step back and see what has been achieved, and what the future holds - and of course this year with the Millennium, it's even more prevalent. I'd like to think that this club is going into the next century in as strong a position as it has ever been in. We have a board that have a solid plan for the future, and a firm grasp of the realities of running a football club. We have an exciting squad of players that give an ideal blend of youth and experience, and with the average age of the squad being in the early twenties, these are players that can and will grow in stature as the club progresses. We have a stadium that, compared with the old Prenton Park of just a few years ago, will last well into the next century, and when it's full, as in the recent home game with West Ham, can create an atmosphere that is better than that in many of the new stadiums across the country. Last but certainly not least, January sees several huge games coming up - a semi-final in one cup competition, and a home draw with one of the teams of the season in the other, both of which should provide the opportunity to show what we can do to the rest of the country, as well as being another huge financial boost for the club.

Of course, the old cliché says that the next match is always the most important, and I'd like to welcome another Irish striker who's turned his hand to management, Jimmy Quinn, his players and staff from Swindon to Prenton Park for this afternoon's game. For many of you, I'm sure this fixture will bring back memories of our clashes in the early nineties when both clubs were going hard for promotion - and personally, I still don't know why a goal I scored at the County Ground in our play-off clash was disallowed! Times change though, and at the moment Swindon find themselves at the wrong end of the table, but traditionally they have always provided tough opposition for us, so we'll have to be at our best to get the right result this afternoon.

On behalf of the players and the rest of the coaching staff, I'd like to wish you all a very happy new year (when it comes), and let's hope that we can make some history in the twenty-first century! Thanks for coming, enjoy the match, and get behind the lads - again!

WINS, DRAWS, LOSSES...

After we'd beaten Crewe at home this season, and got the double over them for a second successive year, it got me thinking - (makes a change, I know, but bear with me)... and I got around to wondering what was the longest sequence of wins we've had against any one side. Thanks to the database put together by Steve Wilson for his and Gilbert Upton's 'Tranmere Rovers - A Complete History 1921-1997', I have my answer - or answers, as Steve also included the record sequence of draws and losses.

The most consecutive (league) wins we've had against any team is seven. We beat Southport seven times on the trot between 1925-26 to 1928-29, and had the 'Indian sign' over Rochdale for the same number of games between 1963-64 and 1966-67. Rochdale seem to have been our favourite opposition, as we also beat them six times in a row between 1930-31 to 1932-33 (a feat we've also achieved against accrington Stanley, Barrow, Blackpool and Hartlepool United).

Seven is also the most consecutive draws Rovers have had against any one team - the opposition this time being Swansea City, between 1970-71 and 1975-76. Next come Barnsley (69/70 - 71/72), Blackburn Rovers (72/73 to 74/75), Doncaster Rovers (80/81 to 88/89) and Grimsby Town (91/92 to 93/94), all on five consecutive draws.

The Tykes also feature as one of four teams to have beaten us six times in a row - QPR, Scunthorpe United and Torquay United being the others - but one club stands head and shoulders above the rest, having inflicted NINE consecutive defeats on Tranmere between 1936-37 until 1948-49. Stand up and take a bow the club from Millmoor - Rotherham United.

Thanks to Steve and Gilbert for setting the record straight. It's difficult to get this close to the end of the year without reflecting on the last twelve months and considering what the future might hold in store for Tranmere Rovers in the year 2000. We will certainly start the new year in a more promising and settled position than we began 1999.

In some respects our performance in recent months both on and off the pitch has perhaps been better than expected, but I am concerned to read reports which suggest that, due to our recent Cup success, the Club's financial worries are over. I Frequently refer to the Club's three year business plan because I don't want people involved with the Club to be under any illusions - in my view three years (of which we have had six months) is a realistic forecast of the time it will take to turn the financial situation around - so we still have another 2¹/₂ years to go.

I am totally confident that we will succeed but it will be a long hard slog. The Cup run has not - as yet - made a significant impact on our finances primarily because we haven't been involved in a draw that has produced what to us would be the equivalent of a lottery win i.e. our share of a 40,000 gate at an average cost of, say, £20 per person.

If you are not familiar with the economics of Cup competitions you might find the actual numbers for Tranmere of interest. Our share of the net gate revenue from the eight Cup ties we have been involved in so far this season amounts to less than £90,000 in total.

Once V.A.T., stewarding costs, police and other expenses have been deducted, 10 percent goes to the Cup "pool" and we take 45 percent of what is left. The players additional Cup bonuses (approximately £66,000 so far) are then deducted from this leaving just £86,000.

The real financial boost for Tranmere will come from live national television coverage and/or - dare I say it - a place in the Final. At the time of writing I understand that not one of our three Cup ties in January has been selected to be on live national television. We are told that our Worthington Cup semi-final with Bolton is of regional rather than national interest.

It emphasises to me the power of those who take such decisions at the BBC, ITV and Sky - and demonstrates how easily they could make or break a small club such as ours. We will of course continue to present our case to the appropriate people at the Football League and the television companies, but they have total discretion.

So, looking to next year I would prefer to say that the future is promising rather than comfortable or rosy. However, I will make two predictions for the year 2000. Firstly, I predict that the club will make provocative comments - such as the one about the name change - in order to remind the Wirral public and local media that we're here. Secondly, I predict that we will continue to offer excellent value for money - especially for children - possibly the best in the area.

On Loan... Today's column is by PETER BISHOP Millenium Moments that shaped our past and laid the foundations for the future....

* September 16th 1885. The day it was announced in the local paper, the Birkenhead News, that Belmont had changed their name to 'Tranmere Rovers'. "The Belmont has changed its name and will now be known to the world as Tranmere Rovers. It sounds more consequential than the old name, and will be altogether better". That brief note, discovered by historian, Gil Upton, over 100 years later finally proved how and when the current club came into being.

* March 9th 1912 .The current Prenton Park was opened by the Mayor of Birkenhead, Councillor George Proudman, before the match with Lancaster Town. Rovers won their first game at new ground 8-0. The pitch was 120 yards x75 yards and surrounded by an 8 feet wide cinder track. There were two stands, each holding 800 spectators. The original mainstand (on the same side as the current one) housed the Directors and Press boxes. The high bank behind the Bebington goal was instantly christened the Spion Kop with its capacity of between 10,000 and 15,000.

* August 27th 1921 After 36 years of dawdling around various local Leagues, Tranmere Rovers at last achieved Football League status following two seasons in the Central League. Our first ever League encounter, against Crewe Alexandra, on August 27th resulted in a 4-1 victory at Prenton Park. As a club we had finally arrived and fulfilled the dreams of its founding father, James Hannay McGaul.

* December 26th 1935. The day records tumbled and Tranmere Rovers went into the history books. Despite the passage of time no other game has ever produced more than the 17 goals that hit the back of the net that day as poor Oldham clearly couldn't, being thrashed 13-4 at Prenton Park. Robert 'Bunny'Bell took all the plaudits with new a individual scoring record of nine goals- it should have been ten but he missed a penalty-as nine man Oldham struggle to hold on. The 11,456 crowd were treated to further goals from Woodward (2), MacDonald and Urmson.

* May 7th 1938. Though Rovers had won League titles in their non league days and the Welsh FA Cup, a major Championship trophy had eluded them until the night of May 7th when a 1-1 draw at Doncaster clinched the Third Division (North) championship. Led by the prodigal son of Prenton Park, Tom 'Pongo' Waring, the title went to the wire. Indeed had they lost at Doncaster the championship would have gone to the Belle Vue outfit. The all-important goal was scored by Ronnie Dellow, but much of the credit for assembling a such good team had to go to Secretary/manager Jim Knowles. Birkenhead celebrated like never before with Hamilton Square packed to see the team with the trophy on the balcony of the Town Hall.

* April 30th 1958. Another defining moment in Rovers history as the team clinched a place in the newly formed Third Division thanks to a 2-1 victory over Wrexham in front of the largest audience for a League match at Prenton Park, 19,615. Having pottered around the Third Division (North) following their immediate relegation from Division Two at the end of 1938-39 season, Tranmere's eleventh place finish was good enough to avoid being placed in the newly constituted Fourth Division. This success was to prove the highlight of Peter Farrell's tenure as Player/manager.

* February 21st 1968. One of the greatest nights in our long history. Even after being held to a 1-1 draw at Highfield Road, no doubt Coventry City still fancied their chances at Prenton Park in a 4th round F.A. Cup replay but magnificent Rovers had other ideas! Despite the loss of Johnny King through injury, George Hudson, a former Coventry player, scored along with his striking partner George Yardley in front of almost 21000 fans. Heralded in the national papers, victory ensured a money spinning 5th round tie at Everton- the first time Rovers had reached such giddy heights in the competition.

* October 2nd 1973. When the score came across the TV screen many Football fans will have assumed it was a misprint; little Tranmere Rovers couldn't possibly have beaten mighty Arsenal in their own back yard, could they? It was no mistake; beat Arsenal they did and the following morning images of celebrating Rovers players adorned all the front and back pages of every National newspaper. If ever one game put us in the spotlight it was this result. Still able to field the nucleus of their title winning side from two years earlier with the addition of Alan Ball, Arsenal were formidable opponents and yet a single goal from Eddie Loyden tamed them on the night. It was the greatest triumph of Ron Yeats' managerial career.

Head to Head Wayne Allison v Iffy Onuora

1999-2000 Nationwide Football League Statistics Only

First Division frontmen don't get much burlier than Wayne Allison and Iffy Onuora – and the brawny pair go head-to-head in today's all-important clash at Prenton Park.

Allison, whose stats here include the games he played for Huddersfield Town at the start of the season, has been an incredibly astute signing, scoring eight league goals already from his 29 efforts on or off target, producing a very healthy 28 per cent strike rate. And more than half of his efforts have hit tested the goalkeeper which represents a terrific effort.

It's been a bit more of a struggle for Glasgow-born Onuora – and indeed for Swindon as a whole, languishing at the foot of the table and knocked out of the FA Cup at Charlton earlier this month. He has had no lack of shots but just 13 per cent of them have hit the back of the net, indicative of Town's lack of forward thrust. Five league goals from home tell its own sorry story.

With both men being the target for plenty of long balls, it's hardly surprising that their pass competition rates are around the 50 per cent mark. There will be plenty of flick-ons which do not find a team-mate so a low pass competition percentage is only to be expected.

But they have both been composed figures when running with the ball. Allison completing four out of five dribbles and Onuora at 64 per cent. His tackling has also been excellent, with 73 per cent of his challenges retrieving possession for the Robins.

Allison has clearly benefited from having two strike partners in Ned Kelly and Andy Parkinson, while Onuora is currently having to make do with 40-year-old player-boss Jimmy Quinn with Guiliano Grazioli a long-term injury victim. But it would be foolish for Rovers fans to underestimate the threat of the big man.

* May 8th 1987. The revolution nearly failed before it had even got underway as Rovers, starved of funds and relying on handful of journeymen and non contract players, found themselves within one match of relegation to the Vauxhall Conference, six games into John



Kings return to the helm. It was a case of all or nothing as Rovers went into the final match against Exeter City at Prenton Park needing victory. Inspired by a then capacity crowd, a moment of brilliance from Ian Muir made the vital goal for fullback Gary Williams to head home with 13 minutes left. We've never looked back since...

* April 16th /17th 1988. The press may not have thought much of the Football Leagues' 100th birthday celebrations at Wembley, but even they had to admit without Rovers at the Twin Towers for the first time the whole event would have flopped. From the time we ousted Cup finalists Wimbledon 1-0 courtesy of Dave Martindales's goal in the opening game, to the moment Ian Muir saw his penalty saved during the semi-final shoot out with Nottingham Forest, Rovers and our band of ecstatic fans, were the life and soul of the party in the half empty stadium. In between, mighty Newcastle including a fledgling Gazza, was vanquished 2-0 with goals from John Morrissey and Ian Muir. Suddenly, players believed in their own ability; if they could beat the best at Wembley then they could beat anyone in their own division. For us the Mercantile Credit Festival was a watershed in our history.

November 10th 1982. After trying to secure the clubs' long term future by inviting Birkenhead born millionaire and American businessman Billy McAtteer to become President, Gerry Gould and the directors admitted defeat announcing the deal was off for legal reasons and the club would close in two weeks. Said Mr Gould, "We're flogging a dead horse!" Other than those close to the club, nobody had suspected Tranmere to be in such mortal danger. News of the club' potential demise spread like wildfire through the, town and the national news network. Within hours fans had formed a fighting fund to help pay wages and as donations poured in so some breathing space was bought with the bank. Horrified that a fellow club should face extinction, clubs such as Wolves, Manchester United, Liverpool and Everton offered money-spinning friendlies which helped save the day. From the ashes emerged a new, more democratically run club, with a supporters representative on the board and a £200,000 loan from the local Council. Had the fans failed the club at that time

there is no doubt Tranmere Rovers would have gone the way of Accrington Stanley into oblivion.

* March 21st 1987. A true defining moment in our history as Peter Johnson and his then friend Frank Corfe walked through the doors of Prenton Park to complete the take over from American Lawyer Bruce Osterman, courtesy of the Administrator appointed to stop the club trading insolvently. Persuaded to involved become by Secretary Norman Wilson, remaining local director George Higham, and supporter Dave Patterson, Peter Johnson revealed a thirty-year-old soft spot for the club and eventually decided to make a go of it providing Corfe joined him.

* May 20th 1990. Victory over third division champions Bristol Rovers in the final of the Leyland DAF Cup in front of 48,000 at Wembley brought Rovers first major trophy in 52 years. Goals from Ian Muir and Jim Steel cancelled out the Pirates response via Devon White to sent Birkenhead into raptures as the team toured the town on an open topped bus. The Football world was beginning to take

Rovers, and Peter Johnsons' involvement, seriously.

* June 1st 1991. A true Millennium moment. in Tranmere Rovers history. Beaten the previous week at Wembley attempting to defend their Leyland DAF Cup, the team returned to face Bolton Wanderers for the biggest prize of all- promotion to the then Second Division. The record books state Chris Malkin scored the all-important goal in extra time but that bare fact sells short the achievement and the effort from





every corner of the club to make it happen. As the fans chanted "we are going up, say we are going up" the realisation dawned that after decades



of failure we were finally back in the big time, with most of the credit going to two men, John King and Peter Johnson.

* February 27th 1994. An emotional rollercoaster of a day that few Tranmere fans will ever forget. Though you never know in this game, that was as close as we might ever get to real glory. Who knows where

.............

victory and an appearance in the Coca-Cola Cup final against Manchester United and maybe even European

football would have led? Had we



won at Villa I firmly believe we would have gone on to be promoted and PJ would never have left for Everton. As it was the disappointment was hardly bearable for both players and fans and I

believe neither party has ever fully recovered from that blow. If only Bosnich who many argue shouldn't have been on the park anyway- had failed to stop Liam O'Brien's spot kick our history, and future, would have been so different, which makes it THE defining **Tranmere Rovers moment** of the last millennium.



Finally, we could not let some of those wonderful moments that have made us laugh pass without mention. Remember old Charlie Lindsay and his walking stick thrashing of the Bournemouth keeper in 1979? Or what about Gerry Casey getting sent off on his debut at Torquay for knocking out John Bond (and who could blame him for that!), likewise Eddie Bishop on and off again at Bury inside a few minutes after thumping Ronnie Mauge. And who can forget Richie Tierney's choice of music (The Electric Light Orchestra) on the night Swindon returned to Prenton Park after the infamous failed lights debacle?

All moments that make this club special. Here's to the new Millennium!

Days of strife at the County Ground as Swindon



Introduction

This afternoon's visitors are crisis club Swindon Town who, with reported losses of £25,000 a week, are at serious risk of going out of business if they cannot attract new investment to the club. Crowds are now down to around the 6,000 mark which is increasing the financial pressure and the Chairman Cliff Purffett recently issued a plea in the local press for Swindon's lost supporters to return to the club in their hour of need, and also more notably questioned where the 30,000 supporters who celebrated promotion to the Premier League in 1993 had disappeared to.

Against this background boss Jimmy Quinn is struggling to keep the club in the First Division. The Robins have cashed in on George Ndah by selling him to Wolves for £1m to help placate the bank manager, and the wage bill has been further reduced by allowing Mark Walters to leave on a free transfer to Bristol Rovers. New recruits obviously have to come from the free transfer or loan market and Quinn has added Andy Williams (Southampton), and currently has midfielder Michael Carrick on loan from West Ham. Whether or not he plays today depends on Quinn getting an extension to his stay at the County Ground.

As well as the financial pressures he faces, Quinn is also under pressure from some of the Swindon Town support. Many believe that little has changed since he took over from Steve McMahon, and point to the fact that the club were sixth from bottom when he was appointed and are now propping up the division. Whether or not a new manager would be able pull rabbits from hats in Swindon's current plight is open to question.

Swindon arrive at Prenton Park this afternoon with one of the worst away records in the division. They have won only once, at Crystal Palace, and managed only five goals on their travels so far. However recent

draws at Wolves and Birmingham show what they are capable of and Rovers will have to be on their mettle to ensure a three point return.

Recent Form

With the result of the Boxing Day fixture at home to Portsmouth unknown as this article went to press, Swindon will arrive here this afternoon having either just ended a run of nine games without a win OR still searching for their first win since the end of October, when they beat Port Vale 2-1 at the County Ground. Following that victory they failed to score in their next three outings losing away at Bolton (0-2) and Huddersfield (0-4) before a 0-0 draw at home to Norwich. The goal drought was broken at Molineux when Iffy Onoura scored in a 1-1 draw, but they could not build on this result and three days later lost 2-1 at home to Charlton. A trip to Birmingham brought another point, Onoura on target again in the 1-1 draw but the following week two further home points were dropped against Walsall in another 1-1 stalemate. The FA Cup did not provide any respite, Charlton knocking the Robins out at The Valley in Round Three with another 2-1 victory. In their last outing before the holiday programme they visited Maine

Road and were on the end of 3-0 defeat, although reports suggested the scoreline flattered City.

The Squad

It is difficult to predict which of Swindon's three senior keepers will be selected for this afternoons match. Aussie Frank Talia was recalled for the recent trip to Maine Road but made two errors which gave City goals and his position could be under threat. Talia who joined the club in 1992 from Blackburn had replaced home grown youngster Steve Mildenhall who had played in the previous two matches. Earlier in the season Jimmy Glass, Carlisle's last day saviour last term, was given a run but an error in the defeat at Bolton saw him dropped to the bench for the next game and he has since submitted a transfer request.

When selecting his defence the Swindon boss can call on some experienced campaigners. Alan Reeves has seen top flight action with Wimbledon while Gareth Hall, a Welsh international, has played in the Premier League for both Chelsea and Sunderland. Mark Robinson was the club's record signing at £600,000 when he joined from Newcastle in 1994 and has been a consistent performer ever since. Gareth Davies has struggled with injuries since arriving last season from Reading but returned to the side for the Man City game after a spell out. Left sided defender Sol Davis has came through the junior ranks and is now in his second season as a professional, and is an established member of the Swindon first team squad. Recent signing from Southampton Andy Williams was employed for his versatility. He can fill either of the full back slots or play as a winger. Youngster James Williams who was born in

Liverpool is a promising right back and has featured more often than was initially expected when the season

started. Adam Willis has made a handful of starts this term but seen most of his football as a substitute.

Midfielders Scott Leitch, Lee Collins and Bobby Howe were all brought to the club by Steve McMahon. Leitch, the club captain, and Collins were recruited from north of the



border, from Hearts and Albion Rovers respectively, while Howe arrived from Nottingham Forest. As mentioned in the intro highly rated youngster Michael Carrick will participate this afternoon if Harry **Redknapp** is prepared to extend his loan spell. had He scored twice in his six starts prior

Christmas. Ty Gooden is now the club's longest serving player having been signed by John Gorman in 1993 from Wycombe. James Hulbert who started the season in the first team but lost his place has been a regular on the bench recently. Other midfielders on the books include Phillippe Cuervo who has been on the injured list for the past fourteen months with a broken ankle, and first year pro Frazer McHugh.

Vatioawid

Up front Swindon have struggled to find the back of the net so far this term, and they have not been helped by the loss to injury of summer signing Giuiliano Grazioli who started the season with two goals in his first five games. In Grazioli's absence Quinn has selected various combinations (including himself recently) as he searches for a winning formula, the latest pairing at Maine Road being Scot Chris Hay who joined the club from Celtic a couple of years ago and twenty year old Charlie Griffin who made his first start of the season. Griffin scored on his full debut last term after being picked up from non-league Chippenham Town in January with a formidable scoring record, but he has been introduced to life in the first division slowly. Top scorer is Iffy Onoura a £100,000 buy from Gillingham in 1998, with just four goals. Last term he struck twenty and Swindon desperately need him to recapture that sort of form. Steve Cowe is yet to make his mark at the club since arriving from Aston Villa in 1996 but he did enjoy a successful loan spell at Conference club Hereford last season.

The Gaffer

When Jimmy Quinn was appointed to succeed Steve McMahon at the County Ground last autumn it was a case of returning to his footballing roots, having cut his teeth as a pro at Swindon in the early eighties. He spent three seasons with the club before the first of many transfers took him to

Blackburn Rovers in 1984. Whilst at Ewood Park he won the first of 48 caps for Northern Ireland. In 1986 Swindon spent £50,000 to bring him back to Wiltshire, and forty three goals in eighty two starts grabbed Leicester's attention. Unfortunately his time at Leicester was not a success and after only nine months at the club moved on to Bradford. Nine months later and he was on the move again this time joining West Ham were he spent a season and a half scoring 22 goals. His next port of call was Bournemouth and the goals kept on coming, 24 in 54 matches, but after just a season he was transferred to Reading. At Elm Park he finally put down some roots, staying with the club for five years. In that time he took his first steps into management when he was appointed joint-manager Natawide alongside Mick Gooding in the 94/95 season. Whilst in charge, Reading narrowly missed promotion to the Premiership losing the '95 Play Off Final to Bolton. After a poor 96/97 campaign Quinn resigned and joined up with Barry Fry at Peterborough. He was assistant manager at Posh when Swindon came calling.

Swindon in the 90s

Like our last visitors Norwich the past ten years have provided Swindon fans with more than their fair share of highs and lows both on and off the pitch. The decade started with Ossie Ardiles in charge of the Wiltshire outfit having been the surprise choice to succeed Lou Macari. The season was progressing well when reports of a betting scandal surfaced which implicated the former manager. Further allegations of improper payments also came under investigation by the FA Football League and Inland Revenue, but despite this backdrop the team maintained a strong push for promotion to the top flight. They eventually qualified for the play-offs, winning the Wembley final against Sunderland 1-0, Alan McLoughlin scoring the winner. Ten days later the League demoted the club to Division Three, with Rovers one of the beneficiaries being promoted to Division Two. On appeal the sentence was reduced and Swindon remained in Division Two, but the whole episode left a nasty taste especially as the League allowed 72,000 people to spend hard earned cash on a meaningless Wembley final. The traumatic summer of 1990 was plainly demotivating and in 90/91 the team came perilously close to relegation finishing only two points clear of the drop zone. Ardiles, who had seen players sold to reduce debts, left towards the end of the season and Glenn Hoddle was given the task of restoring confidence to the club.

The new player manager turned things around almost immediately and Swindon were up with the front runners by the autumn. Hoddle's presence in midfield was a significant factor but while he was out with a long term injury the club lost ground on the leaders, and when finances forced the sale of striker Duncan Shearer their chances of a play off place left with him. Despite just missing out on the play-offs in 1992 optimism about another promotion challenge in 92/93 was guarded. However the club made a bright start and a play-off place was always likely and duly achieved. In the semi final The Robins came up against Rovers, and emerged with a 5-4 aggregate victory to take them to Wembley. The gloss was somewhat removed as speculation grew surrounding Hoddle's future at the club and within days of their 4-3 victory over Leicester the manager had departed for Chelsea. Assistant manager John Gorman was appointed in his place and left to plan the club's forthcoming Premiership campaign.

All that can be said for the club's single season of Premier League football is "better to have loved and lost, than never to have loved at all". The team lost their opening four matches and never managed to escape from bottom position in the league table for even one week. It took them sixteen games before they recorded their first win, at home against QPR who were also the victims of their only away win. The defence conceded 100 goals but to their credit they kept to their principles and were always entertaining. 1994/95 saw Swindon relegated for a second successive season. They started reasonably and by mid October looked as if they would be challenging for the play-offs, however from then on league form nose dived and fourteen games without a win sent them spiralling down the table. John Gorman paid the inevitable price to be replaced by Steve McMahon, who could not arrest the club's declining league form. He actually managed to alienate himself from the Swindon faithful by selling Jan Aage Fjortoft (for a club record £1.3m) who represented the club's best chance of avoiding the drop. Surprisingly given league results, Swindon reached the semi finals of the league cup where they were beaten by Bolton 4-3 on aggregate.

In his first full season in charge McMahon put the club back on the rails, winning the Division Two championship with nine points to spare. They were only briefly unseated at the top of the table twice and also enjoyed a run to the fifth round of the FA Cup where they lost in a replay to Southampton. Top scorer at the County Ground in 95/96 was a certain Wayne Allison who hit twenty. Back in the First Division Swindon experienced an up and down season in 96/97, which by March looked as if it may end with a play off place. However eight defeats in the last eleven matches saw the team finish nineteenth. They were also the victims of a giant-kill by Stevenage in the F.A.Cup. The following season was inconsistent to say the least for the Robins, and unrest was rife at the club, after finishing just one place better off than the previous season. It was only due to the players' persuasive powers that saw McMahon stay in charge, but then last season Swindon began so badly that Steve McMahon left the County Ground in October to be replaced by Jimmy Quinn, and a finish in seventeenth place was eventually achieved.

In the 1970's John Kelly and Gary Williams were two Scousers to earn the respect of Wiltshire folk, likewise winger Steve Peplow. Goalie Scott Endersby is another from further back, full back Stewie Williamson - who settled in the town - Pat Jackson, Abe Rosenthal, Alf Day and Arthur Briggs were other names to switch between Prenton Park and the County Ground.

Another connection is that ex-Swindon boss Steve McMahon and Rovers Youth Coach John McMahon share the same father!....And of course Wayne Allison, who is the most recent player to have represented both teams, let's hope he gets one against his old club today.

Side ssues

Over the past few years it would be fair to say Swindon have enjoyed a few 'lucky' breaks against us. In the 1992-93 Play Off semi-finals, John Aldridge had a good goal wiped out at the County Ground leaving us with a mountain to climb after a Steve Vickers howler. Then losing to a John Aldridge double (2-1 up) in 1992 the lights went out and the game was abandoned. When it was finally replayed Rovers said goodbye to the three points! Given recent events you wonder if the far Eastern betting syndicates were at work even then.

Coming Soon! Sunderland

Things couldn't be better down at the Stadium of Light. Third place in the Premiership, the country's top goalscorer banging them in left, right and centre, sellout crowds every week - there's even talk of Europe.

And then a trip to Prenton Park looms. For some reason, the Wearsiders have never quite enjoyed their trips to the Wirral and many of the club's fans regard Tranmere as their bogey side. Sunderland's only league success in seven attempts at Prenton Park was back in April 1998 when goals from Kevin Philips and Micky Summerbee avenged an Andy Parkinson settled FA Cup fourth round encounter.

How ironic that the two clubs should be thrown together again, two years on, at the exact same stage of the competition. Peter Reid's outfit will prove an even tougher nut to crack this time around having set the Premiership alight in the few months they have spent there so far. The recent 4-1 demolition of star-studded Chelsea illustrated just how far they had come from the crushing opening day 4-0 defeat at Stamford Bridge which had the gloom and doom entics predicting another roller-coaster season.

Their success has largely been based around the goals of Kevin Philips and Niall Quinn, the little and large strike partnership. Philips, with 19 goals to his name prior to Christmas, has matured into one of the most sought after goalscorers in English football and is arguably one of the best pieces of transfer business ever conducted by Reid who paid Watford just £325,000 for his services. Quinn, who has won over 60 caps for the Republic of Ireland, missed the majority of Sunderland's short stay in the Premiership last time around through injury but is making up for lost time now. Injuries to either of their first choice strikers could prove costly with former QPR and Sampdoria marksman Danny Dichio ruled out for the next two months with a back injury.

Reid has been credited with fine business acumen in assembling his side with the recent £2.5m purchase of West Brom winger Kevin Kilbane the latest piece in his jigsaw. The signing of Kilbane seems to confirm the eventual departure of Scottish international Allen Johnston who has been frozen out of the first-team picture after failing to agree a new contract at the start of the season. Riding along the right hand side of midfield is Nicky Summerbee, who resurrected his career by moving to the North East from Manchester City where the burden of playing at the same club as his father appeared too great.

Kilbane, not eligible for this match having played for the Baggies in the third round, will compete with Swedish international Stefan Schwarz, who had a brief spell in England with Arsenal five years ago, was brought to the club for a record £4m at the start of the season from Spanish side Valencia. Occupying more central roles are former Evertonian Gavin McCann, who has blossomed under Reid's command, and Frenchman Eric Roy, a bargain £250,000 signing from Marseilles. Such has been the transformation in the midfield engine-room, club captain Kevin Ball recently ended his long association with the club to join up with Paul Bracewell's Fulham revolution.

Reid opted for experience when planning his Premiership assault during the Summer and picked up German international Thomas Helmer from Bayern Munich and Arsenal veteran Steve Bould to boister the defence. Helmer failed to settle in the North East and was loaned to Hertha Berlin but Bould proved a more astute capture. Paul Butler, formerly of Bury is Bould's usual central defensive partner. Reid paid £500,000 to bring Chris Makin back from a spell with Marseilles. The ex Oldham right back suffered badly with injury during his first season at Sunderland but has now bounced back to produce some of the best form of his career. At left back is the stylish Michael Gray, who used to ply his trade further upfield as a winger. Gray made his England debut alongside Philips last April and became the first Sunderland player to play for England at Wembley for over 23 years against Sweden in June.

Replacing cult-hero Lional Perez inbetween the posts was never going to be an easy task but the form of Danish international keeper Thomas Sorensen has meant flamboyant Frenchman is all but a distant memory. Ex Wrexham custodian Andy Marriott provides cover.

Victory over the Wearsiders would provide a magnificent confidence booster for Tranmere going into the two-legged Worthington Cup semi-final against Bolton. With three Premiership side's already tasting deteat at Prenton Park this season, Reid will be anxious to ensure his side don't become the fourth giant to be felled by Aldo's boys.
