








STEP 1. Approach defender with ball under close control.



And we now have a pitch which is exactly the same size as the main Vale Park pitch.


Believe you me we spend a lot of time practising set pieces and it pays off when you have a training pitch which is the same as the one you play on.




a mention of what a good and exciting game it had been.

While we're on this sort of theme, people often ask me (to be truthful, no-one has ever asked me) who would be in my all-time favourite Vale team.



Thursday Port Vale played their fist ever game at Vale Park.

On 24th August 1950 more than 30,000 spectators watched Port Vale romp home with a 1:0 victory over Newport County in the Third Division South. Since then the club has enjoyed the greatest period of it's history and supporters have seen some of the most exciting games and skilled players here at the Wembley of the North. We take a look at the highlights since that inaugural game at the Hamil Road site.



1950

In 1950 the Club moved to its present home at Vale Park which due to its size and the planned developments became known as 'The Wembley of the North', 1953-54 saw the best season in the Club's history as it romped to the Third (North) Division Championship, losing only three games and conceding just twenty-one goals, whilst also reaching the semi-finals of the F.A Cup only to lose controversially

to West Bromwich Albion. The stay in Division Two lasted only three years until 1957, then going straight down to become founder members of the newly formed Fourth Division. It turned out to be a successful season though as a Club record 110 goals helped to take the title.

1960

The next few seasons saw the F.A Cup providing the highlights as the 5th Round

was reached in 1960 and 1962 with 4th Round matches in both 1963 and 1964 with a draw at Champions elect Liverpool in the latter campaign. Relegation back to Division Four in 1965 and a barren spell followed with the ignominy of having to seek re-election in 1968.

1970

Gordon Lee became manager and put together a promotion winning team in 1970 and then after again reaching the 5th Round of the F.A Cup in 1977 were relegated the follow-

ing season. The Club continued to sink to its lowest ever position in 1980 and this saw the arrival of John Rudge as coach to manager John McGrath. A promotion campaign was mounted in 1982-83 to revive the Club's fortunes but unfortunately a year later relegation saw the Club going straight back down with John Rudge taking over the reins as manager for the first time. Promotion was again achieved in 1986 and striker Andy Jones rose to International status following his 37 goal haul in 1987.

1988

A major turning point in the Club's history arrived in January 1988, when a late winner in the F.A Cup against non-league Macclesfield Town earned a plum 4th Round home tie against Tottenham Hotspur. When Port Vale won 2-1 to earn National recognition Club's fortunes appeared to take off. In 1988-89 a third place and promotion via the play-offs took the Club back to Division Two for the first time in thirty-two years. This rekindled the long awaited local derbies with Stoke City and all went well until midway through the 1991-92 season when a run of eighteen games without a win ended in relegation.

Fortunately the Directors stood by John Rudge and in the 1992-93 season after a long battle finished in third place on eighty-nine points, a record total for a team failing to gain promotion. This meant a second participation in the play-offs but it ended in defeat at Wembley against West Bromwich Albion. The previous weekend vielded a never-to-be-forgotten though, as the Club's first ever Wembley visit ended in victory in the Autoglass Trophy Final backed by over 25,000 supporters to climax a run that included a 1-0 win at holders Stoke City. Goals by Paul Kerr and Bernie Slaven

in the final secured a 2-1 victory over Stockport County. 1993

In 1993-94 the Club finished second in Division Two to gain automatic promotion and in the 1995-96 season played a record sixty-two games which saw them reach the Anglo-Italian Cup Final at Wembley and the 5th Round of the F.A Cup. In the latter, victory over reigning Cup Holders Everton was rewarded by Sponsors Littlewoods presenting the Club with a special 'Giantkillers' award.

RECENT YEARS

Despite being quoted as preseason relegation favourites in 1996/97, the Vale confounded their critics to finish in their highest position since 1931. 1997/98 will be best remembered for the last match victory at Huddersfield that saw the Club safe from the threat of relegation and the exciting F.A Cup games versus eventual double winners Arsenal, where only a penalty shoot out separated the teams.

The club once again retained their place in the First Division under new manager Brian Horton in 1998/99 but lost their position the following year.

The team is now looking to win promotion from the second division this season and win back their place in division one.





Bobby Robson is well-known for his gaffes with players' names and the like. He is more than likely to refer to his England winger as Kevin Dyer and has serious problems remembering the countries of origin of some of his non-English players. I cannot believe that his recent statement on the role of certain players' agents was anything other than 100% accurate. however. They were, claimed the Newcastle manager, "parasites in the game". accused one in particular of "putting his own personal gain in front of the interests of his client".

The gentleman in question was Mr Dennis Roach, who has been acting on behalf of Duncan Ferguson during the recent protracted negotiations surrounding the Scotsman's return to Everton from his brief and injury ravaged sojourn in the North East. You may have followed this saga on the back pages of the tabloids. on/off nature put me in mind of the goings on between Deirdre and Ken in the "Street"!) Robson's bone of contention was the fact that Roach sought severance payment of between £250,000 and £1 million (depending on which version you read), a large percentage of which was, it seems, the agent's personal fee for agreeing to allow his client to move! Roach implied that Ferguson's contract allowed for a payment of this sort if he did not ask for a transfer. When have agents ever allowed contracts to get in the way of their negotiations before, however?

Now it may well be that the occupants of the two respective dressing rooms today, should they find a moment to read this garbage, will nod wisely and agree entirely with the actions of Mr Roach. The vast majority of players have agents, whose job it is to ensure that their clients are not ripped off by greedy, grasping managers and chairman. It's a short career isn't it - got to get what you can from any mugs prepared to pay it. I might be prepared to argue with that but what I do object to violently, are the agents (and I am sure there are respectable members of that profession to whom this does not apply) whose sole contribution to the game is to take out as much as they can whilst putting absolutely nothing back in.

I have bemoaned this situation before in these pages and, quite frankly, it seems to be getting worse rather than bet-When the PFA offer a ter. financial advisory service which precludes the need for agents, and which, I would assume, is for the benefit of the profession as a whole, one wonders why individuals persist in arming themselves with "independent" advisors of this nature unless it is on the basis of "Beggar the future of the game as whole - what can I get for myself". Robson was quoted as saying: "It would be interesting to find out how much money has actually gone out of football into agents' hands. It would be very, very interesting, and that money shouldn't have gone, in some cases, where it has gone."

Does this mean that integrity has finally beaten the dust in the world of football? transfer of George Weah to Manchester City would suggest not. When he left AC Milan, the club president Silvio Berlusconi, wanted to give him a golden handshake of £1 million which Berlusconi claimed was in Weah's contract. Weah graciously refused to accept it on the grounds that he did not think he had done anything to deserve it and he wanted to be able to look Berlusconi in the eve should he ever return to Milan. Weah might already be a very wealthy man. But so are many of the players and in particular, agents, who are currently trying to squeeze the very last financial drop from anyone prepared to hand it over. They could learn a great deal from the former World Footballer of the Year.

Like ourselves, the Robins were relegated at the end of last season and are now aiming to make a rapid return to the First Division under manager Colin Todd.

In terms of performances Swindon played well below par for most of the 1999-2000 campaign and at one stage they were on course to reap their lowest number of points. But they battled on bravely towards the end and although taking last position, they secured 36 points (the same number as the Vale).

Given some inspiration and confidence from their performances during April and May last term, Swindon have been marked up as one of the bookies' favourites to figure in the promotion race this season.

They began (fielding six new players) with a hard-fought goalless draw at home to Colchester United before losing 2-0 at Reading in a local derby. A home Worthington League Cup clash with Exeter City and on Saturday the Robins played host to another 'demoted side, Walsall.

It's early days yet, but Swindon know they have to stay in touch with the top six or seven clubs to have any chance of leaping out of the Second Division at the first attempt. Therefore manager \ Todd, vastly experienced in football, will be urging his players to put in a solid performance against the Valiants this afternoon.

IN GOAL Dutchman BART GRIEMINK (aged 28) was a summer signing from Peterborough United. The former WK Emmen and Birmingham City 'keeper had an excellent campaign with Posh whom he helped gain promotion via the Third Division Wembley play-off Final last season. A fine shotstopper, he made 67 appearances under Barry Fry and London Road and 26 under the same manager at St Andrew's.

Reserve 'keeper is both club and international _STEVE MILDENHALL (22) who stands 6ft, 4ins tall and weighs over 14 stone. He has been associated with the Robins for six years and a professional for four. He has made just over a dozen first-team appearances to date.

IN DEFENCE

Full-back MARK ROBINSON (aged 31) who can also play in midfield, began his career with West Bromwich Albion in the mid 1980s. He then did well for Barnsley (over 150 appearances) and Newcastle United before joining Swindon Town in July 1994 for £600,000. A player who loves to carry the ball out of defence rather than hoofing it downfield, he enjoys getting forward (like a winger) and delivers a fine cross when allowed to. He has now amassed in excess of 270 firstteam appearances for the Robins.

Centre-back SOLOMON DAVIS (21 next week) was born in Cheltenham and joined Swindon as a trainee, turning professional in May 1999. He has already appeared in over 60 first team matches and is highly thought of at the County Ground.

ALAN REEVES (32) has been in League soccer for 11 years, having made his debut back in the second-half of the 1988-89 season with Gillingham (on loan from his first club Norwich City). He moved to Chester from Carrow Road and in 1991 was signed by Rochdale. switching south to Wimbledon in 1994 for £300,000. He played 57 games for the Dons in the top flight (4 goals scored) before moving to Swindon on a 'free' in June 1998. In a varied career Birkenhead-born Reeves has now netted 20 goals in over 300 competitive matches.

The Australian DANNY INVINCIBLE (24) came over to England in the close season

Signed in January 1998 for £30,000, BOBBY HOWE has certainly been value for money and has now played over 70 games for Swindon having previously made four on loan

with Ipswich Town and 18 for Nottingham Forest. The 26 year-old former England youth international, is best suited when playing just behind the front two.

Scotsman DAVID DUKE from Inverness arrived in July from Sunderland where he had become surplus to requirements The 21-year-old midfielder failed to break into the first XI at The Stadium of Light.


IN ATTACK

CHARLIE GRIFFIN from Bath has been with Yeovil Town (on loan) and Chippenham Town before joining Swindon in the summer. A striker with two good feet, he enjoys a challenge but needs to build up the physical side of his game.

GARY ALEXANDER, aged 21, from Lambeth (London), was previously with West Ham United and Exeter City (on loan). He failed to get into the first XI at Upton Park but gained experience by making 60 appearances and scoring 19 goals for the Grecians - before his summer move to the County Ground. He was voted Exeter's 'Player of the Year' last season.

GIULIANO GRAZIOLI was born in Marylebone (London) of Italian parents in March 1975. He played for non-League side Wembley before joining Peterborough United in 1995. For Posh he scored 17 goals in 52 appearances before joining Swindon in July 1999 on a free transfer. He has good pace and an excellent eye for goal.

Without having made the first XI, striker STEVE COWE (who will be 26 in a month's time) was sold by Aston Villa to Swindon for £100,000 in March 1993. He has now chalked up almost 100 appearances for the Robins.



in Chester-le-Street, County Durham in December 1948, Colin Todd represented the town's schoolboy team before joining Sunderland as a 16 yearold, turning professional at Roker Park in December 1966 - seven months before helping the Wearsiders win the FA Youth Cup. He spent the next four years with Sunderland before transferring to Derby County for £180,000 in February 1971. Seven-and-a-half years later, in September 1978, he moved to Everton for £350,000 and twelve months after that he became a Birmingham City player for £350,000. In August 1982 Todd switched to Nottingham Forest for £70,000 and in January 1984 he signed for Oxford United before trying his luck in the NASL with Vancouver Whitecaps. He then returned to England to assist Luton Town, retiring in the summer of 1985 to take over as manager of Whitley Bay. In May 1986 Todd became reserve team coach at Middlesbrough; four months later he was given the position of chief scout/assistant-manager and then when Bruce Rioch left he became manager (March 1990), retaining that position until May 1991. Twelve months later Todd was given the assistant-manager's job at Bolton Wanderers (again under Rioch) and in




January 1995, with Roy McFarland, he became joint-manager of the Trotters, taking over the reins himself when McFarland left for Cambridge United in November 1996. He left The Reebok Stadium in 1999 and in April 2000 became manager of relegated Swindon Town.

A man who has certainly seen it all and done it all in the world of football, Todd amassed more than 700 appearances at club and international level. A powerful, determined footballer able to occupy the right-back, wing-half, centre-half or midfield positions, he won 27 full caps for England as well as representing his country at youth and under 23 levels. He also played for the Football League side. He won two League championship medals with Derby in 1972 and 1975; helped Blues gain promotion from the Second Division in 1980 and was voted 'Footballer of the Year' in 1975. As manager he took Bolton up to and down from the Premiership and has been the oldest player so far to appear in a League game for Oxford - 35 years, four months.








The shortest route to Bournemouth is down the M5 then across country. The trouble is, the last 70 miles or so are all on ordinary A roads and you can easily get stuck behind a tractor. This route adds a few miles on but keeps you on motorway and dual carriageway all the way.

Take M6 south to junction 4a M42. Follow the M42 south to junction 3a and

then follow M40 south signposted London. Leave the M40 at junction 9 and take the roundabout exit singposted Oxford A34. Stay on the A34 dual carriageway round Oxford, over the M4 and along the new Newbury by-pass. As you approach Winchester pick up the A33/M3 signposted Southampton. From the M3 join the M27 westbound to Southampton Docks and Bournemouth. Stay on the M27 to the end where the road becomes the dual carriageway A31. This road goes through the New Forest to Ringwood.


About a mile beyond Ringwood at the Ashley Heath junction take the first exit at the roundabout signposted A338 Bournemouth. As you approach the town, you should see the floodlights on your left. Take the exit to Boscombe (A3049) then to Kings Park for the ground. There is quite a large car park right next to the ground.

....six qoals for the 'clown'.....

In October 1946, Newcastle United whipped Newport County 13-0 in a Second Division League game at St James' Park in front of more than 52,000 spectators.

Making his debut for the Geordies was, in my opnion, one of the greatest players ever to wear an England shirt-the 'Clown Prince of Soccer' himself Len Shackleton, who had been signed for what was to prove a bargain fee of just £13,000 from Bradford Park Avenue.

"With Newcastle playing five forwards, all of them potential marksman, Newport had no answer,"

He had a brilliant game, destroying the Welsh side's defence with some magical skills - and he helped himself to six goals (a double hat-trick) as well as laying on five more for his colleagues.

With Newcastle playing five forwards, all of them potential marksman, Newport had no answer, being swept back time and again by waves of Black and White pressure.

The game got off to a flying start when Newcastle's Charlie Wayman blasted a 90th second penalty two yards wide of the County goal.

But by half-time Wayman, later

to play for Preston, had helped himself to a hat-trick, while Shackleton himself netted four times including three in the space of just six minutes.

He tormented every Newport player on the park!

He crossed for Wayman to head home on seven minutes. Six minutes later 'Shack' beat three men, played a one-two with Wayman, and opened his account (2-0).

Shackleton then carved out two more chances in the space of 50 seconds which Wayman put away with sweet aplomb to complete his hat-trick (4-0) and then Shack himself weighed in with numbers five (after another mazy dribble in the 26th minute), number six when he cleverly chipped 'keeper Charlie Turner and number seven with a slide-rule cross-shot.

Newcastle, in fact, claimed five goals in a seven-minute spell during the first half.

Poor old Newport didn't know what had hit them. They tried to put two men (sometimes three) on the elusive Shackleton who still bamboozled his markers to a degree that four defenders were spoken to by the referee for overzealous play!

He tormented every Newport player on the park! The impressive Shackleton

was on target again early in the

second-half (8-0). Jackie Milburn netted twice to bring up double figures and in the 73rd minute Wayman pounced to net his fourth goal of the game to make it 11-0.

Still Newcastle poured forward. Roy Bentley, soon to play for England with Chelsea made it a round dozen and the thirteenth goal was credited to Shackleton whose angled shot was helped over the line by inside-right Ken Wookey.

Final score: Newcastle 13 (Shackleton 6) Newport 0

Newcastle, in fact, claimed five goals in a seven-minute spell during the first half.

NB: 13 was certainly not unlucky for Shackleton. He joined Bradford as a professional on 13 December 1940. He moved to Newcastle on 13 October 1946 for £13,000 and scored his first Newcastle goal in the 13th minute against Newport.

Good afternoon, on behalf of Football in the Community I would like to extend a warm welcome to Swindon Town and their travelling junior supporters.

'IT'S NOT AS SIMPLE AS BLACK AND WHITE'
During the month of July, Vale Park became the
venue for the play"Its not as simple as Black
and White," a schools racism project promoting
citizenship. This was the result of several
months of planning by Port Vale Community
Scheme staff in partnership with the New Vic
Theatre and the combined divisions of Stoke
and Staffordshire Police.

Workshops took place in local schools and competitions were organised in two catergories, poster design and written work, outstanding examples were displayed and performed at the New Vic Theatre. Three performances of the play took place at Port Vale F.C. in the Directors Restaurant with mixed audiences ranging from primary and secondary school children to adults and special needs groups. I am delighted to say that we had great support from our playing staff who were all present along with the management and coaches, the play was so well received that we are looking to repeat it again next year and meetings are now taking place to discuss new ideas and the way forward.

Below is a letter that was sent by a teacher from Pinewood Primary School in Meir following a performance of the play:-

I am writing to say what a privilege it was to have the racism theatre group in school yesterday. I have rarely seen in my twenty two years of teaching, such a powerful, performance which so thoroughly engaged and captured the children's attention in such a thought provoking way.

You dealt with the broad issues of racism honstly and sensitively. Using the theme of football was an "absolute winner" with our children. I was also very impressed by the way in which the actors interacted so successfuly with the children - drawing ideas from them about the negative images they saw and empowering them into thinking of strategies to deal with racism.

I will remember for a very long time the attack on the Asian boy. I was genuinely frightened for him and filled with anger and sorrow for the actions and words of the bullies.

i am sure that you must have noticed the wider range of emotions that flitted across the faces of our children throughout the afternoon. It does make one realise what an extremely powerful device is in communicating important ideas.

As the children left school they were absolutely "full" of enthusiasm for the performance and many went up the street reciting the "anti racism chant".

I feel that this project should continue if we are to start changing children's attitudes towards this very important issue.

Thanking you once more for a most remarkable afternoon.

the arsenal of the cheshire league - port vale reserves!

This is my second season of reporting Vale Reserve games in the programme but there are not enough Reserve fixtures that I can attend in order to supply a report for every programme, so I've decided to diversify a little. What I intend to do is cover a liitle bit of history about Vale Reserve teams over the years and a good place to start would be to cover a period of remarkable success.

I came across "The Arsenal the of Cheshire League" tag a few years ago in a Rhyl v Port Vale Cheshire League programme from 1958-59. It came as a bit of a surprise to me as I had been watching Vale Reserves since the mid-1960's, when they existed and they were hardly a force to be reckoned with. I knew that the Vale had worn red shirts and white shorts during the 1920's and 1930's as I have a red Supporters Club badge and a number of cigarette cards of Vale player's wearing the strip from that period. However I did not think that was grounds for a comparison with Herbert Chapman's Arsenal, who dominated English football at that time.

At about that time my first team programme collection was only increasing slowly as the gaps were becoming the rare and difficult to find ones, so I diversified into Vale Reserves programmes and began to look more closely at the history of the Reserves

playing record. I was pleasantly surprised to find that they had dominated the Cheshire League over a 10 years period in which they were only out of the top two places once as shown below.

Five Championships, four Runners-up, two League Cup wins and a League Cup Runners-up, including the double twice is quite an impressive record for any team over a 10 years period. It is even more remarkable that

over the next nineteen
years of competition
until they resigned at the
end of 1958-59 their only
other success was a
League Cup win in 1937-38.

The only reserve programme I have obtained from this period is away at Tranmere Reserves in 1927-28 and the Vale team that shows a couple of well known names in the Vale lineup. These are Billy Briscoe, the Club Captain and Stewart Littlewood. During that Championship winning season Littlewood scored a remarkable 55 goals for the Reserves. Littlewood of course scored six goals during Vale's record Football league win when they beat Chesterfield 9-1 in 1932.
