






Captain's Comments

Wigan and Bournemouth were winning, it looked as though we might go into today's game with our fate taken out of our hands.

Then we scored twice and suddenly we are back in control.

That was a terrific character test for the lads and they came through brilliantly. The pitch was a mudheap, it was raining, it was windy, we were undeservedly a goal down, and their goalkeeper was playing a blinder and stopping everything we threw at him. But we kept going.

First and foremost, the players would like to thank you for your terrific support. I know the manager said after the match how impressed he was with your non-stop backing but the players would like to express our gratitude as well.

There is no finer accolade for a player than to be honoured by your fellow professionals and Graham deserved his place.

It was a bit disappointing to see no-one else made the line-up, although it was pretty well spread throughout the division with ourselves, Millwall, Reading, Wigan, Bristol City and Walsall all represented.

Contrast that with Division One, where ten of the 11 players came from either Blackburn or Fulham. I think that tells you the First Division has gone pretty much to form this season!

Andy King is no stranger to the difficulties of managing a club on a tight budget. He did it at Mansfield for three years in the mid-1990's and was handed the task again when Colin Todd left Swindon in December to join Derby County.


King, 44, was brought to the County Ground by Todd as his assistant last summer after working as a scout for Peter Reid at Sunderland.

Influenced by the likes of Howard Kendall, Colin Harvey and Bill Nicholson as a player, he starred for his home-town club Luton in two spells, along with Everton and Queens Park Rangers, and later in his career had a stint at Wolves and in Holland playing for SC Cambuur.

An attacking midfielder, he netted 92 goals perhaps the most famous of all for Everton against Liverpool in 1977 to break seven years of non-stop Mersey derby success for the Reds.

His first job in management at Field Mill saw him steer Mansfield to a high of sixth in Division Three, along with a shock Coca-Cola Cup win over Leeds.

He initially took charge of Swindon on a temporary basis after Todd's departure, but was quickly handed the job permanently by chairman Terry Brady after an upturn in results. Some astute buys encapsulated a successful transition period for King, whose animation from the sidelines is a clear indication of his passion for the challenge.

Today's Opposition...

Swindon arrive at the Britannia Stadium this afternoon on the final lap of a nerve-wracking season.

The Robins went to great lengths to secure their Second Division safety with last weekend's dramatic 2-I home win over Peterborough, then sat back to see whether relegation rivals Cambridge United and Bristol Rovers would put the pressure on again in midweek to set up a heart-stopping finale today. That, s the sort of roller-coaster ride the club's fans have been through over the last nine months - but then Swindon's fortunes have risen and plummeted on a regular basis for the last 15 years.

In 1984 Lou Macari began the groundwork which saw the Wiltshire club rise from bottom of the old Fourth Division to claim a Premiership place in 1993 - by which time, ironically, he was guiding City to the Second Division title. The adventure lasted only one year, they finished bottom of the Premiership, and within two seasons Town were in the Second Division. Steve McMahon led them back into Division One, where they stayed for four years before coming down last May, and they have since flirted with another relegation 'double'.

A troubled campaign began badly with a draw on the opening day followed by three defeats and took a further turn for the worse when manager Colin Todd quit to rejoin his old club Derby as assistant to Jim Smith.



It was left to Andy King - best known as an Evertonian during his playing days and who spent three years as Mansfield boss in the 1990's - to pick up the pieces.

King has done well under trying conditions, keeping Swindon just above the danger zone since taking over in December.

Their form in March, when they were unbeaten in six games, was a decisive factor, although results deteriorated after and last weekend, stimely victory was only their second in nine attempts.

Swindon haven't been in the basement division since they leaving it as champions with a club record 102 points under Macari in 1986. The 1969 League Cup winners have, in fact, spent all but three seasons since that overwhelming title triumph in the top two divisions.

King believes his team can sign off on a high.

Swindon's form away from home has helped keep them out of deeper trouble and they have won more games on their travels - seven - than any other side in the lower half of the table.

He says: "Last weekend's win gave



everyone a lift.

Without it, it could have looked very ominous today but we are brimming with confidence and there's no reason why we can,t get a result."

A Look at some of The Robins' Key Men

MARK ROBINSON

Started his career at West Bromwich Albion, joined Barnsley on a free in June 1986 and such was his form there that Newcastle snapped him up for £450,000 in March 1993. After losing his place in the first team through injury, Mark is now the Town's longest serving player since Swindon paid a Club record £600,000 for his services in July

1994. He has been a consistent and versatile performer ever since, however, he could face competition from new signing Juan Cobian for the right-back slot this season.

ADAM WILLIS

Released by the Sky Blues after failing to make the grade in the Premiership. Adam was called into action from the reserves towards the end of last season to cover for injuries and suspensions. Adam worked very hard in the gym after training to improve his physical presence and it paid off. His confident displays earned him a place in the starting line-up on merit and he was rewarded with a new contract under Colin Todd after being previously told that he could leave the club.

MATTHEW HEWLETT

An attacking midfielder that signed for Town on a free transfer in July 2000. A hot prospect at local rivals Bristol City in 1998/99. At the time a succession of injuries meant that he missed most of the season and failed to live up to his potential. A fresh start may be just the challenge he needs and there will be no better place to impress and improve his performances than at the County Ground this season. If he can find his form he may just be the attacking spark the Town midfield is

so dearly missing.

GIULIANO GRAZIOLI

Signed in June 1999 on a free transfer from his former club Peterborough Utd. Giuliano's previous visit to the County Ground was in 1997 with Stevenage Town in the FA Cup 3rd round. His winning goal dumped Swindon out and handed Stevenage a moneymaking 4th round tie against Newcastle Utd. Missed most of last season through injury, but when he did play he was the shining light in a very dull season for Swindon. Following the departures of fellow strikers Chris Hay and Iffy Onuora, 'Graz' established himself as the Town's main threat. If he stays fit, he will be a handful for opposing defences this season.

GARY ALEXANDER

Highly-rated 21-year-old who joined the Robins in early August from West Ham United in a £300,000 deal. Gary spent most of last season on loan at Exeter City where he made a big impression - scoring 16 goals in 20 appearances and keeping The Grecians out of relegation trouble in the process. A powerful and hard-working forward, Alexander could be the one to watch this season.



Watch out for... Danny Invincible

What's in a name? Well, it's not true to say Swindon have been unbeatable this season, but they would have been a lot worse off without the contribution of shooting star Danny Invincible.

The 20-year-old Aussie midfielder is the Robins, leading scorer with nine goals.

His last-minute winner against Peterborough last weekend could prove priceless, yet it was his first in 2001 after a form dip since the turn of the year. The former Marconi Stallions star, who has represented his country at under-20 level, went through a troubled spell hampered by injuries, but is now back to his best.

Manager Andy King thinks so - and is tipping a bright future for a player spotted and snapped up by

previous manager Colin Todd after impressing in a trial match for West

Invincible scored on his debut and his eye for goal,

allied to his pace and ability to run at defences, has

> made him a favourite with the Swindon fans - and a clear danger to the opposition.

> > Predominantly a rightsided midfielder, King says:

"He's finishing with a flourish and that's going to make people sit up and take notice.

"He has a wonderful talent and if that can be nurtured and if he works at his game then he can have a very good future." Andy King pulled of something of a coup with one of his first signings after taking over as Swindon manager in December.

He persuaded a former Premiership player with plenty of life still left in his boots to join the relegation fight at the County Ground.

Fans were surprised, not to say shocked, when lan Woan arrived. The left-sided midfielder, just turned 33, was a cornerstone of Nottingham Forest, side in the 1990's after stepping out of non-league at Runcorn, but had lost his way after an unhappy spell at Barnsley earlier this season.

In fact, he was ready to write-off his career in England and head for the United States until King stepped in.

He made an immediate impact with a stunning free-kick as the Robins recorded one of their best results of the campaign when they defeated Rotherham at home 2-1 just before Christmas. Woan has chipped in with two more goals since and has made over 20 appearances, consistently

performing well in midfield and offering the team a dimension so often lacking at this level - a player who appears to have time on the ball.

King describes Woan as 'Premiership' quality in the Second Division, and would like to extend his contract beyond the end of the current season.

BIG WINS

The Potters won 3-0 at The County Ground earlier this season to register their best victory (in terms of goal-difference) over the Robins.

Prior to that mark Stein's doublestrike earned the Potters a 2-0 home win in December 1996. The Robins hammered Stoke 6-0 at home in November 1989 (Division 2) while in two Southern League fixtures in 1911-12, Swindon won 3-0 at home on Christmas Day and 4-1 at The Victoria Ground 24 hours later.

WINNER

Peter Thorne scored Swindon's winner in their 1-0 home win over his future and current club Stoke City in March 1997 (Division 1).

FA CUP ACTION

Two goals by Frank Mountford helped Stoke defeat Swindon 3-1 in a 3rd round tie at The County Ground in January 1949 when the crowd was an impressive 26,335.

FIRST AT THE BRIT

Swindon Town were the first League visitors - and indeed the first winners - at The Britannia Stadium, beating Stoke City 2-1 in a Second Division game on 30 August 1997 in front of a full-house crowd of 23,000.

Later in the season the Robins doubled up with a 1-0 win at home.

FOOT IN BOTH CAMPS

Among the many players who over the last 25 years or so have served with both clubs we have: Paul Allen, Dave Bamber, Steve Foley, Dave Hockaday, Chris Kamara, Paul Richardson, hot-shot Peter Thorne, Keith Scott and Mark Walters.

MANAGER

Lou Macari, now in charge of Huddersfield Town, held the post of team manager at both Stoke City and Swindon Town; Louis page was a Stoke player and Swindon manager while Chic Bates also played for the Robins and was assistant-manager/coach under Macari at Stoke.

STAR MAN

On 5 May 1979, midfielder Paul Richardson scored a dramatic goal at Meadow Lane to earn Stoke City a 1-0 victory over Notts County and as a result guaranteed promotion to the First Division. Some 14,000 fans followed the Potters to the game and there was a terrific atmosphere inside the crowd as the 21,579 crowd looked on nervously. But it was Paul's decisive effort late on which won the day.

Born near Selston (Notts) in October 1949, he played initially for Nottingham Forest and had one outing for Chester before joining Stoke City (signed by George Eastham) in June 1977 for £50,000. Paul went on to score II times in more tan 140 appearances for the Potters before transferring to Sheffield United for £25,000 in August 1981. After that he assisted Blackpool, Swindon Town (1083-84) and Swansea City and then became player-manager of Gloucester city before later taking charge of Fairford FC whilst working for British Telecom. An England youth international, Paul made 435 Football League appearances all told and netted 32 goals.

True Supporters Against Violence

Stoke City will take the strongest possible action against so-called supporters who are identified as being involved in the reported racially-motivated disturbances outside Boundary Park and around Oldham before and after Saturday's match.

The Club can confirm that this action could include life bans from the Britannia Stadium.

Revealing the hard-line stance today, Chief Executive Jonathan Fuller has reiterated the Club's determination to defeat the hooligans.

He says, 'It is with great dismay that we have had to read about and hear the reports of the troubles in Oldham on Saturday. It is extremely unfortunate that a small minority of our so-called supporters chose to use the name of our football club. We deplore hooliganism in all forms - but especially that directed specifically against ethnic minorities at a time when society, not just

football, is working hard to achieve good race relations. Stoke City F.C. remains wholehearted in our support of both True Supporters Against Violence, which aims to stamp out hooliganism in it's broadest form, and the Kick It Out campaign, which is designed to stop racism, not just within the game, but around it as well. The City of Stoke on Trent is a multicultural city and has one of the best records for race relations in Britain. As a football club we want to reflect that, and we believe the vast majority of our supporters do too.' Those arrested and charged with public order offences on Saturday can expect automatic bans from the Britannia Stadium. The Club has the power to eject and ban from the stadium any supporters who indulge in racist chanting, which is also

an arrestable offence.

No true supporter of Stoke City wishes to see hooliganism at our football grounds, and this applies equally to racism. Racist behaviour has absolutely no place in football; it is illegal, derogatory and highly offensive, bringing shame to those who partake in it, and more widely to Stoke City supporters as a whole. The True Supporters Initiative is totally committed to eradicating racism from football. We hope that you, the supporters, will help us to help yourselves in banishing the scar of racism - raising the profile of Stoke City football fans nationwide, and creating a truly supportive atmosphere at our multi-racial club.

LETS LOCK THE VIOLENCE AND RACISM OUT; LOCK THE PASSION IN.



Player Interview with ...

...Rikhardur Dadason

Rikhardur Dadason may have altered the course of history with his late but vital winner at Oldham last weekend.

Time till tell, but if ever a goal was greeted with an explosion of relief it had to be the one scrambled home by our Icelandic international striker at muddy Boundary Park.

One thing's for sure, though - today's final league game of the season would have had a totally different complexion without it.

For starters, City would be kicking-off in seventh place, not fifth.

And we would be going into the match knowing that even three points might not be enough to claim a play-off place if Wigan and Bournemouth also won.

So maybe at 4.50pm today there will be a debt owed to the player who is hoping last Saturday's timely intervention - his eighth goal for the club - will not only prove to be a turning point in our season, but his.

By his own admission, Rikhardur has endured a stop-start time since his arrival from Norwegian outfit Viking Stavanger last autumn.

There was the drama of an injury-time goal on his debut - within minutes of coming on as a substitute - to knock First Division Barnsley out of the Worthington Cup in November.

That was followed by a back injury suffered in training which hampered his transition from Scandinavian to English football.

Things looked up again in the first couple of months of the New Year with a run in the side and a few goals to boot, but the last few weeks have been frustrating.

With leading scorer Peter Thorne and Andy Cooke in pole position for claiming places, Rikhardur's opportunities have largely boiled down to the boss deciding between two and three up front.

"It has been disappointing, because I've not been on the bench so much in my career," he says. "It's the first time since I left Iceland and started to play abroad that I have felt I haven't really been moving forward.

"The last couple of months have kind of been a backward step for me, but hopefully that's now going to change over the next few weeks.

"There is still plenty of time, especially because of the play-offs. Our season could easily have another month to go, and in football while there's another game coming up things can always change."

As they did at Oldham. A goal down with less than twenty minutes to go - and with Wigan and Bournemouth winning - City needed inspiration and it was Gudjon Thordarson's substitutions and switch to 4-3-3 which did the trick.

The manager elected to play that way against Wrexham in our last home game from the off, and if he does so again today then Dadason can expect to be involved from the start.

"I hope that's the way we go. When you haven't played that much, as I haven't lately, you are always dying to get into the side," he says.

"We've used 4-3-3 late in games quite often recently, and whenever we have we have always put teams under pressure.

"At Oldham we got the goals to go with it, but against Wrexham it worked well for the whole match and we created a huge number of chances.

"Okay, we scored three and the forwards didn't get any of them, but we could easily have done because we were always pressing for goals and if those chances are made again this afternoon I would back us to pop one or two in. "Everybody knows how important a result is for us again, and we will all be up for it. Ideally, we would have clinched a play-off place by now and taken away some of the tension, but that didn't happen and we just have to deal with the situation facing us."

When Rikhardur scores they tend to be vital goals - the winner against Barnsley, last Saturday's, the only goal in the I-O home win over Brentford in January, the late equaliser at Brentford in March. The scene, therefore, may just be set for him once more...

When end of season play-offs were first introduced, many were critical of the system. They said that it was unfair for a team which finished in third place to maybe lose out in the semi-finals to the sixth placed team. Managers were also dubious, but I know that everybody within the game is now totally converted.

From Stoke City's point of view, we scraped in last year, and were unlucky to lose out. Whoever wins the pay-offs will be the deserving winners, no matter where they finished in the final placings. To come through three high pressure games is testimony enough of a good side.

Talking of pressure, you can imagine the feelings of Sir Alex Ferguson and Arsene Wenger when Patrick Vieira and Roy Keane are openly critical of their team mates. Stating that the clubs' lack big occasion players, is a reflection on both managers. I'm sure players on both sides wouldn't react favourably to those statements expressed by the midfield dynamo's.

When you consider that Arsenal won the double only three years ago, the press have been fairly critical of Wenger. Consider that they have finished runners up in the League in the last two years, have reached the F.A. Cup Final again, and were somewhat unlucky to lose out to Valencia in the quarter finals of the Champions League. Now if you think that's failure, well I would settle for that record any time, and I'm sure all of our supporters would do the same. Ferguson has a problem of another kind. He knows that


they will be favourites to win the Premiership again next season, but is that good enough for him? He doesn't want to retire without adding another Champion's League pennant to his C.V. He is aware of the record of the great Liverpool teams of the past, and their record in Europe. Signing Van Nistelrooy will be a major asset, but he knows that the team needs strengthening in other areas. Two new defenders are vital if they are to have any say in next year's competition. In order to compete with Real Madrid and others, they will have to spend a considerable amount of money. Yet the PLC company which controls Manchester United have urged caution, and therein lies Ferguson's problem. They have obstructed his plans to bring in new players, and this has frustrated him to the point of wondering that the success he has brought them over the last 10 years really doesn't count for much. Summer signings will be viewed with greater interest than is usual. He could also bring in £20 million overnight by selling Yorke and Butt. We shall se!

Have you enjoyed your experiences playing with Iceland?

Do you feel promotion is a possibility?

If you get into the playoffs the teams involved have an equal chance of making it into the first Division, and if you reach the final, and have luck on the day, you will be the team to triumph.

Is there a confidence in the dressing room? Yes, there is a lot of confidence in the dressing room, we all want to go up into the First Division, and we are sticking together to do our utmost to achieve that aim.

Have you a message to the supporters?

The support from the Stokies at Oldham was tremendous, and the players are grateful for this. The attendances at home, in the region of 13 to 14,000 have been magnificent. We can be very proud, as players, of our support.

Fans Forum

This may be the final League game of the season, but if events go according to 'Gudjon's Plan' we should have another home match, hopefully on a Wednesday. That will give me the opportunity to let you know about recent activity with the SCFF on top of what is contained here.

Extracts from the minutes of the last meeting with the Club concerning ticket prices for 2001/02 are reproduced below, however, today, the SCFF are after your help.....we have agreed with the Club to survey fans for their views about various aspects of matchday catering at the Britannia Stadium.

Catering

Around 15,000 questionnaires are being distributed which ask your opinion on service, product range, product quality, value for money, as well as your views on where you believe catering is best from the grounds you have visited in the last two seasons. In doing this, we want the Club to benchmark us with the best in the land.

The outcome of the exercise will be an agreement with the Club, laying down minimum standards supporters expect from Stoke City's catering provider in the short, medium and long term. PLEASE TAKE TWO MINUTES TO COMPLETE AND RETURN THE FORM, AS IT WILL FORM THE BASIS OF THE SERVICE YOU GET IN THE FUTURE!!

Ticket Pricing

- Given the strength of feeling from supporters and the number of unanswered questions surrounding ticket prices and policies for next season, it was felt that everyone would benefit by focusing on ticket pricing during the next meeting.
- The forum is committed to supporting the Club to attract more supporters into the stadium. But



having reflected on the pricing for next season, forum members were disappointed that it appeared that the Club had not incorporated suggestions made at previous meetings, with the exception of the price reduction for 'helpers' who attend games with disabled supporters,

- The Club expressed surprise at this, and were under the impression that feedback from fans and the SCFF had been positive.
- Forum representatives stated there was a need to explain to supporters why our prices must go up when many Premier League clubs were holding their prices for next season.
- Since the take over the new board has invested £6 million into the team and ground, and would hope that supporters could see some improvement. This season the Club will lose an estimated £1.8 million and will continue to lose money whilst they remain in Division Two. It is a very difficult act to balance the books and some costs have to be passed on to the customer. However, the Club is listening to supporters, and taking ideas on board.
- The Club stated they had looked at the pricing policies of many clubs and as a result of this student prices have been introduced on a promotional basis. Leaflets had been delivered to local universities and they had sold 400 student tickets for the Wrextam game. None of the forum members were aware of this, and suggested the need for more advertising.
- The Club was asked why prices in the Boothen End has risen by £2 per game when everywhere else was only £1. They stated that for the previous season only, supporters in the Boothen End were given a loyalty bonus, but that the new prices still represented a good deal for supporters (pay for 18 games, get 5 games free.)
- Representatives were concerned that the 4th May deadline had not been extensively communicated, and asked the Club how many season tickets had been sold so far! The Club stated that they had sold 750 to date. (20th April.)
- Representatives voiced their concerns that supporters may have budgeted to buy their season tickets in June, and were now worrying how to buy their bargain' ticket earlier.
- The club stated that the idea to reward supporters who buy their season tickets early, guaranteeing 2nd Division prices was a good one.
- The Club was asked why it was now charging £10 season ticket insurance!
- They stated that in offering the insurance they were trying to provide another service for supporters, and it was not compulsory. They also stated that they would review the wording of the offer as it appears a little ambiguous.
- The Club was asked about it's policy regarding credit card charges. They stated that it is standard practice to pass on these charges to cardholders, and that last season the Club's service charge bill was substantial.
- Representatives expressed concern over the large increase in car parking prices at the stadium. It was suggested that as the Trentham Lakes site was developed supporters may get more choice on parking alternatives, and that improved safety features may be a way of offering supporters a return for the increase in charges.
- The Club was asked if they had given any more thought to implementing a loyalty card scheme? They stated that they were still looking at this possibility.

"Please take two minutes to complete and return the form, as it will form the hasis of the service you get in the future."

- Representatives asked about OAP's in the Family Stand having to pay their price increase in one season. The Club replied that the price for OAP's in the Family Stand for last season was a mistake that they need to correct in time for next season.
- Representatives enquired about the age a female supporter needs to be to become an OAP. The Club stated that the Football League recommended 65 years, and that most clubs will be implementing this policy.
- The Club was asked why they haven't promoted Vice President's and Waddington Suite prices yet? They stated that the packages hadn't been finalised, and prices would be announced shortly.
- Mr. Gislason stated that following the take-over the new board hoped to be in Division One by the end of their second year at the Club, and they are still optimistic that we would go up this season.
- The Club was asked if it intended to change their pricing policy for away supporters? Representatives stated that Stoke fans were now paying more at away matches as a consequence of this policy. The Club replied that there are no plans to after the pricing policy for away fans, as the Football League supported their approach, but they would look into reports that travelling Stoke supporters are now being asked to pay more.
- Representatives stated that although the new Family Stand had been a great success, there was disappointment that the Club had not looked at some price reductions for children in other areas of the stadium. It was brought to their attention that a child of 6 years had watched the England/Poland World Cup qualifying game at Liverpool for £11. This is the price charged for the same child to watch 2nd Dwision football at Stoke in the Upper John Smiths (Premier Club.) It was felt that adults with children were being penalised for choosing to be in the Premier Club, and were left with a feeling of being pushed out. The Club stated that they would look at prices for U13's throughout the stadium.
- Forum members agreed that it had been an extremely useful exercise to concentrate on ticket pricing issues, and thanked the Club for the opportunity to do so.



Lawsons Travels on the Road Travels with The Potters

The final home League fixture of the season, and an opportunity to look back at the away campaign with all it's highs and lows, both on and off the pitch.

It has certainly been a season of long distance mid-week away fixtures and more than a fair share of traffic and weather problems during one of the wettest winters on record. However, the scene was set with weather of another extreme back in the heat of summer last year when the August Bank Holiday game down in the West Country at Bristol City saw hundreds of Stoke fans caught up in horrendous traffic problems on the M5 motorway and in the City of Bristol following an earlier accident - many fans, including myself, arriving at Ashton Gate half an hour after kick-off. Contrast that with the frost bound scene greeting Potters fans at the Shay, home of Halifax Town, for a mid-week LDV Vans Trophy game in early January, and the soaking


November night that saw that ignominious F.A. Cup First Round exit at Nuneaton Borough.

On the playing front, best away performances were at the Valley, where the Potters progressed in the Worthington Cup at the expense of Premiership Charlton Athletic, where, despite defeat on the night 4 - 3, Stefan Thordarson's magnificent strike (surely the Stoke goal of the season) was enough to send the Potters through on the away goals rule. Another great win at Bristol Rovers - Peter Thorne 3 -Pirates 0 - and an excellent team performance at Wigan where a last minute own-goal denied the Potters a well deserved victory. Comprehensive victories at Swindon by 3 - 0 and at Peterborough by 4 - 0 saw the Potters gain almost as many away points as against those earned at the Britannia Stadium.

Amongst the grounds visited, the modern stadia at Reading, Wigan and Millwall contrasted sharply with the Swansea's, Colchester's and Oxford's of the Division. My vote for this season's best away venue goes to the Madejski Stadium, where Reading got the catering act together after last season's fiasco, the stadium offering excellent

views and facilities for visitors. Worst ground taking the Bloomfield Road award goes to the Manor at Oxford, but relegation to the new stadium at Minchery Farm means we must have seen the last of the rain soaked steel cage that is the away end.

Finally, the Away Player of the Season - a difficult one to call, with injuries, suspensions and inconsistencies all taking their toll, but Tony Dorigo takes the award in possibly his

Next season - will it be a return to familiar pastures in the First Division or familiar pastures at Loftus Road, Prenton Park, Ninian Park, and a first visit to the Withdean Stadium?

- The FIRST £100,000 player to join the club was inside-forward Jimmy Greenhoff who was secured from Birmingham City in August 1969.
- Alan Hudson was the Potters' FIRST £200,000 acquisition. The England international joined the club from Chelsea for £240,000 in January 1974.
- Goalkeeper Peter Shilton, at £325,000, became the club's FIRST £300,000 capture when he crossed the Midlands from Filbert Street in November 1974
- lan Cranson, the club's current coach, was the first £400,000 signing, moving to The Victoria Ground from Sheffield Wednesday for £450,000 in July 1989.
- Canadian international striker Paul Peschisolido was the Potters' first half-million footballer. He was recruited from Birmingham City for £580,000 in July 1994.

- The first £600,000 signing made by the club arrived as recent as December 1999 when the Icelander Brynjar Gunnarsson joined the club from Orgryte for precisely that amount of money.
- In the opposite direction, the Potters' first £500,000 sale was striker Lee Chapman, who moved to Arsenal in August 1982.
- Adrian Heath was Stoke's first £700,000 player - transferred to Everton in January 1982 and then, for the FIRST time, the million pound barrier was broken when mark Stein departed for Chelsea in a £1.5 million deal in October 1993.
- Fellow striker Mike Sheron then became Stoke City's first £2 million-rated footballer when he moved to Queen's Park Rangers for £2.5 million in July 1997 (some record books give the transaction figure as £2.75 m).

Hi Stokies!

Last week I said that I had a long that with two Stokies, both full backs, and both England interntionals. Our last League game of the season brings me one to one with a Stokie who I could quite easily fill this programme with his career and memories. Perhaps the rest will be told in more depth next season - until then, join me with Mike Pejic.

Mike's Stoke career began after his father took him to meet Frank Mountford. That meeting led to him signing for Tony Waddington and his journey through the junior ranks began. Progress was swift, and after signing professional forms on his 18th birthday, he made his senior League debut on the 12th April, 1969 at Queens Park Rangers. In a glittering Stoke career that included a League Cup winners medal, Mike was a firm favourite with the supporters, and a player that no one expected to leave, but he did, in February, 1977. So, why was that? 'The reason I left was solely down to lack of ambition from the board. Good players were brought in by Waddo, but they were then sold. Everton's boss, Gordon Lee, came in for me, and I left for £135,000. Before I left Waddo said that the Club would find it difficult to stay in the Division.'

Mike's career, though, came to an end through an injury that nobody could diagnose. 'I didn't want to leave Everton, but with the injury I just couldn't handle it. I then joined Aston Villa and signed a two year contract, but after only two and a half months, I broke down with the same injury, which proved to be a double hernia.'

On the international front Mike has great memories. 'After I kept my place in the under 23 team, I had the call from Alf Ramsey to join the first team, and I joined such greats as Banksie, Martin Peters and Bobby Moore. Life was great, and after my first full cap in Portugal I was picked for the three home internationals. With only Emlyn Hughes and myself as left sided players, all looked well, but then Alf was sacked and Joe Mercer took over and I was dropped for the Argentina game. Alec Lindsay took my place and I remember Les Cocker telling me that I didn't suit Don Howes style. Instead of facing up to it, I felt anger, but then the injury cropped up and you reflect on what might have been. I did have lots of highs in the game, but you tend to remember the lows. I can say that I played all my football at the highest level.'

Looking back on his time at Stoke, Mike recalls a tussle with Dennis Tueart. 'I'd had a few tussles with Dennis before, but this time the game was televised. I pulled Dennis back and ripped his shirt off his back and threw it into the paddock. The referee sent me off, which was fair enough, but I felt angry when after the game he said I had head butted him. Thankfully, I was cleared by commentator Brian Moore and the T.V. evidence.


Mike did have the last laugh though some time later as he recalls, 'Dennis and I were going by train with the England lads, and I had arranged to meet him on the Post House car park. It had been raining and the car park was covered in leaves. Dennis arrived and ran over to me and slipped on the leaves! He lay there, his white shirt soaked, with leaves stuck all over him. Did I laugh, and did I pick him up? Draw your own conclusions!

Mike's busy schedule means he gets very little time to watch Stoke, but he says it's going to take a lot of finance and skill to get the Club to where it once was.

Once again, space has beaten me, but in a future programme (hopefully the play-off one) I'll be telling you about Mike's thoughts on his time at the Vale, his time as manager of Chester, and his thoughts on Chris Kamara, Lou Macari, and much much more.

Collectors Corner

Stoke's first season at the Brit was not a happy one. The new stadium was not to prove a 'lucky one' Stan Matthews set the tone failing to 'score' from ten yards out before the inaugral home fixture against Swindon had started.

With problems behind the scenes, which was apparent in the 0-7 home defeat against Birmingham City, the culmination of which was Manager Chic Bates final severing of ties and Stoke's relegation to the Second Division.

Our playing record finished as Home played 23, W8 D4 L10 For

30 Against 40, and Away P23 W3 D8 L12 F14 A34 with a points total of 46, four more than bottom placed Reading and two less than Man City who accompanied us down. No one was ever present and Peter Thorne was top scorer with 16. We failed to the double over anyone and seven clubs including today's visitors Swindon managed home and away wins over the Potters. Stoke failed to get beyond Round 3 losing to West Brom (despite having an unbeaten record against the Baggies which stretched back to 1988) Leeds Utd put paid to our Coca-Cola (League) Cup hopes in the Third Round 1-3 AET, after Stoke had dispatched Rochdale and Burnley in Round's One and Two respectively. Stoke's first home game of the league campaign

was versus Swindon Town.

23.000 were drawn to the new stadium up from the 12,768 who had turned out for the opening game against Rochdale in the League Cup a 1-1 draw three days earlier. Only a short sighted regime headed by Coates & Humphries would have the inaugral game at the stadium against fourth division opposition - compare it to Sunderland's sell out game versus Ajax at the Stadium of Light. Richard Forsyth (featured on the front cover of the featured programme) scored the opening goal on 37 minutes. Sadly two second half goals on a hot sunny afternoon (surely the only one ever at the Brit) from Allison and Hay finished the Potters off and set the tone for the season.



Next up were Wolves - whom we have had some tough games against this season in league and cup - and despite once again battling well the lads were unable to produce the result their efforts truly deserved and we went down 1-0.

Goalkeeper Ben Foster made his debut for us in this one and there is no doubt he has potential and could be one for the future.


So mixed results but when we evaluate the progress the players have made over the last nine months there is still plenty of reason for satisfaction and optimism.


