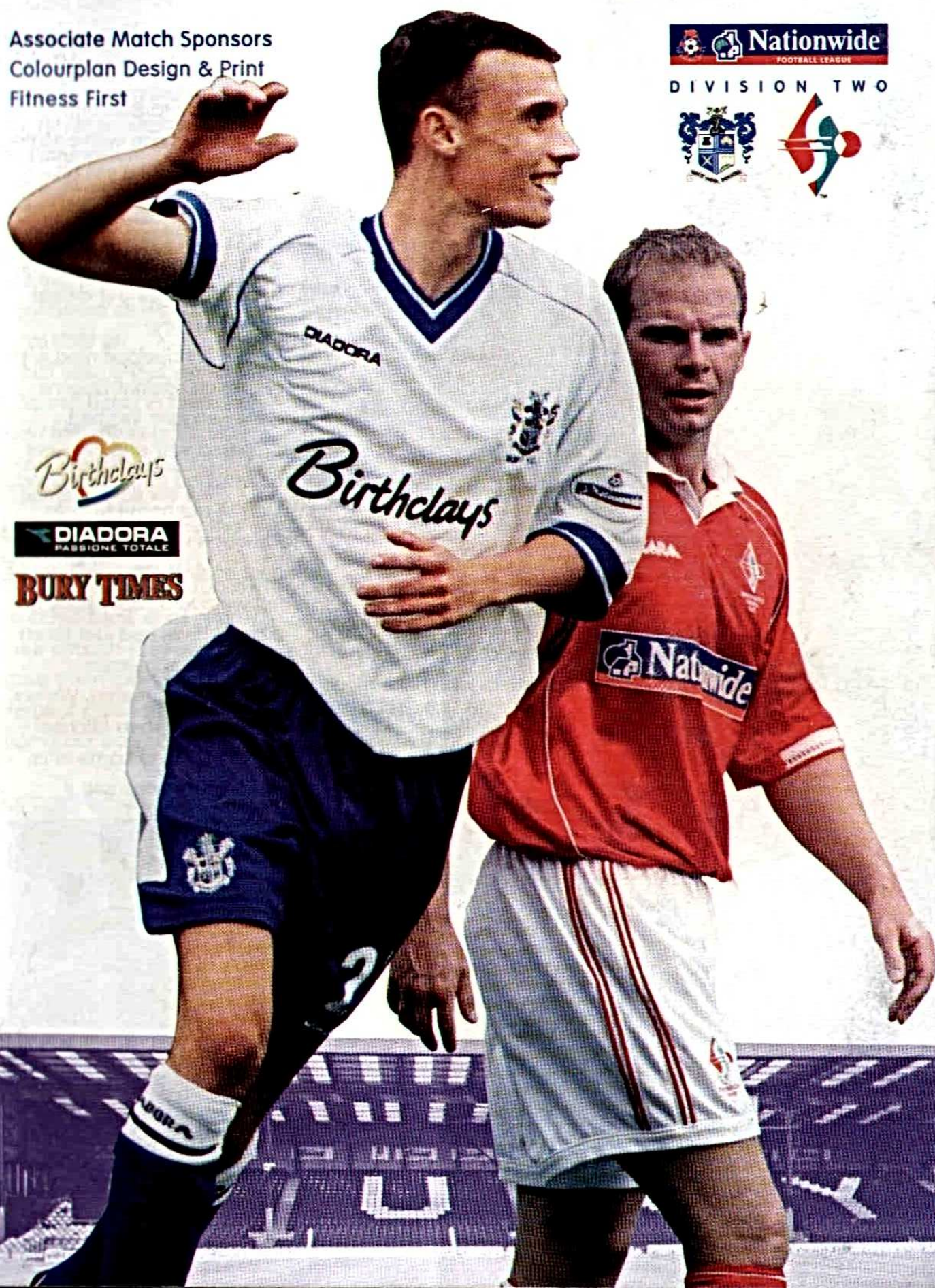

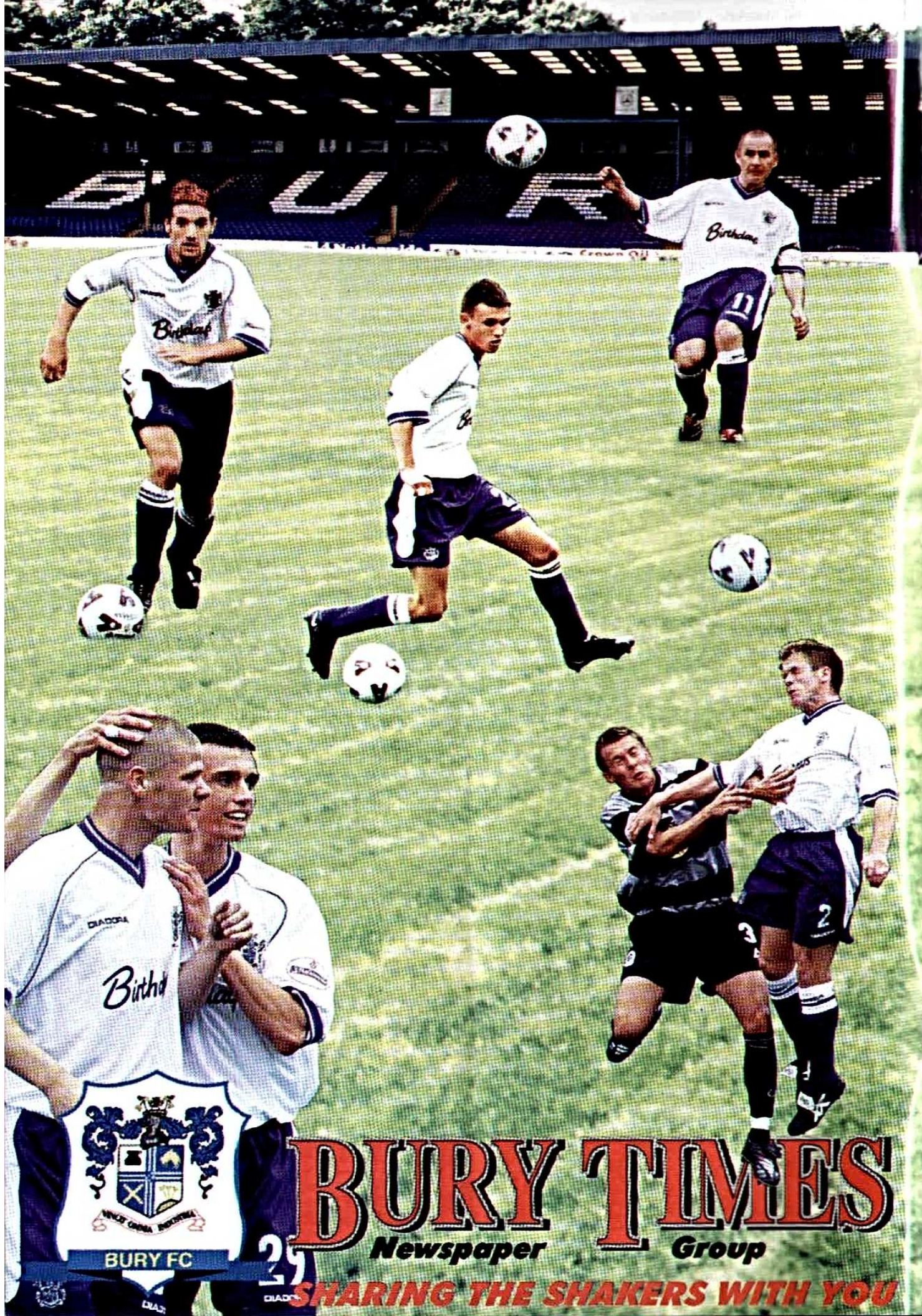

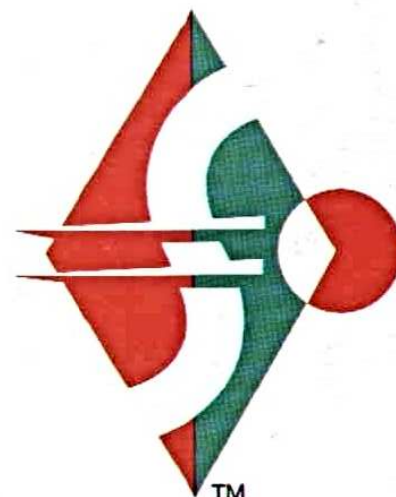

The Opposition

Bart Griemink Giant keeper signed by Colin Todd on a free transfer in the summer of 2000. Griemink is a former Dutch Under-21 international who spent a successful loan spell with The Robins two years ago as cover for Frank Tala. He came to English football in 1995 with Birmingham and deputised competently for the injured Ian Bennett, playing in the 1995 League Cup semi-final. He then followed Barry Fry to Peterborough United but lost his place to the promising Mark Tyler. Griemink started the 2000-01 season as first choice goalkeeper and even deputised as captain, but ended up on the bench as Steve Mildenhall took his place in goal following two dismissals and a lengthy suspension.

Mark Robinson A former club captain, 'Robbo' has made over 300 appearances

for the Robins. An apprentice at West Brom, Mark made three appearances for the Baggies before switching to Barnsley where he played more than 150 games. He spent a year at Newcastle before joining the Robins. Robinson cost £600,000 in 1994 from Newcastle and has been a regular ever since. Tipped to leave in the summer of 2000, Mark instead became captain, though defensive sidekick Alan Reeves later replaced him as skipper. Steve McMahon used him as a wing-back but he can also play right back and centre back. Fended off competition from Juan Cobian, but could face stiffer competition for the right back slot this year with the arrival of Andy Gurney.

Sol Davis Young left back who progressed through the youth team ranks at Swindon to make his debut in 1997 just after his 18th birthday. He played in more than half the games in the 1999-2000 season and was a regular again the following campaign. A committed player, Davis' main problem is his poor disciplinary record, which results in frequent suspensions: he was booked 14 times in 2000-01. He is a quick and hard-working player and will no doubt figure in Andy King's plans this year. Rumour had it that Colin Todd was to take Davis with him to Derby, but he went on to become one of Town's most consistent performers.

Matthew Hewlett An attacking central midfielder, Matt Hewlett was once tipped for the top by all at Ashton Gate. The former Bristol City player was called into the England Under 21 squad, but a number of injuries curtailed his flourishing career. Hewlett made over 100 appearances for City, but left them to join the Robins on a Bosman in the summer of 2000. He was a regular for Colin Todd until being hit by injury again and went on to play 26 league games, the skilful, passing midfielder didn't open his account for the club in his first year.

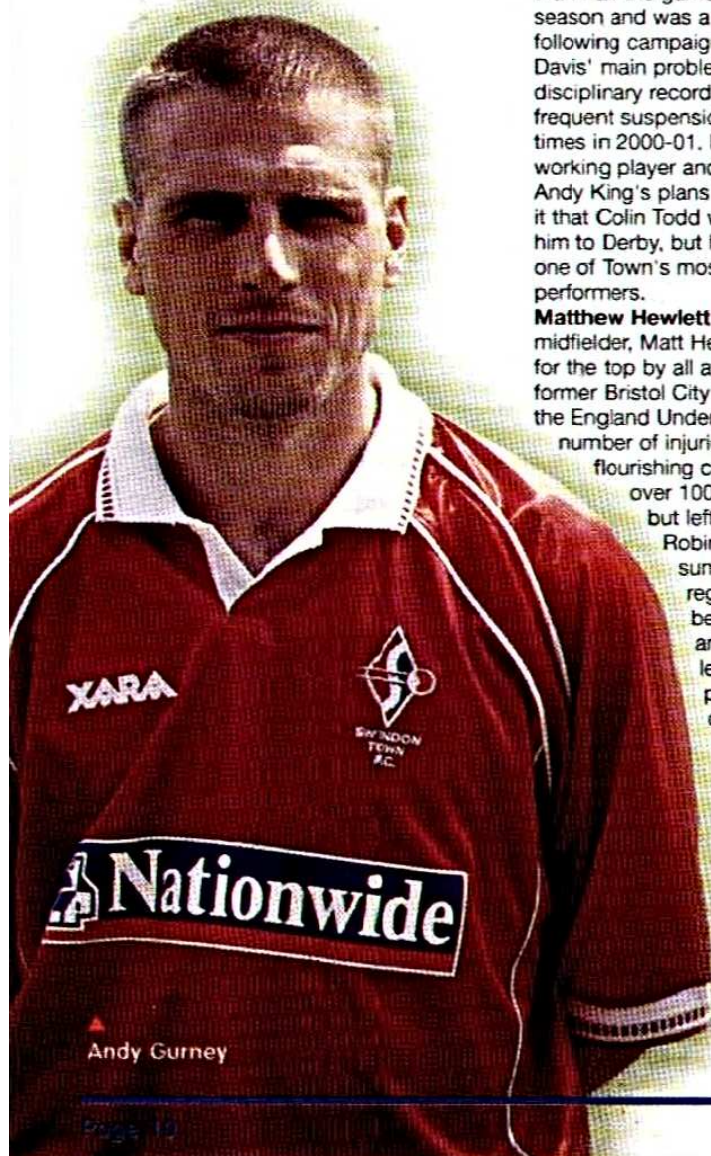
Adam Willis Centre back who was revitalised under Colin Todd. Willis arrived at the County Ground in 1998 on a free transfer from Coventry and was Steve McMahon's last signing for The Robins. He scarcely figured for Jimmy

Quinn and was allowed to go on loan to Mansfield after being told he could leave Swindon. But Todd liked the tall defender and gave him a new contract. Willis was a regular in the first half of the following season and scored his first goal for Swindon in the 4-1 win against Ilkeston in the FA Cup. A trainee at Coventry, Willis never made the break through to the Sky Blue's first team and will need to re-establish himself in the Robins' side.

Keith O'Halloran Irish midfielder who was one of several Bosman signings Colin Todd made in the summer of 2000. O'Halloran is a talented right-sided player who became first choice on the right of midfield, a position Swindon struggled to fill the previous season. O'Halloran was a trainee at Middlesbrough, but only made six appearances for Boro before moving to Scotland in 1997. He was a success at St Johnstone, and was offered a new contract but preferred to try his luck in Division Two. A good striker of the ball, O'Halloran proved one of Swindon's best signings of 2000, netting seven goals from midfield (most of them from the penalty spot). Had it not been for injury, O'Halloran probably would have played in every game for Town last season.

Bobby Howe Attacking, skilful midfielder Stephen (who likes to be known as Bobby) often bears the brunt of the crowd's frustration at the County Ground. Howe had a disappointing start to his Swindon career, but recovered to become a regular in their relegation season of 1999-2000 season and was expected to leave Swindon that summer. But he impressed Colin Todd in training and pre-season friendlies and earned a place in the team. Nonetheless, he was criticised by fans during poor results last season. Howe began his career with Nottingham Forest, where he showed promise but only started nine games.

Guiliano Grazioli Robin's fans had high hopes of London-born striker Grazioli for the 2000-01 season. His form was one of the few positive aspects of a disappointing campaign during previous season. Grazioli's eight goals from only 11 starts compared well with many of his team-mates and with fellow forwards Chris Hay and Iffy Onuora sold, Grazioli was expected to be the spearhead of Swindon's attack the following season. Instead, after a disappointing start, he largely featured as a substitute and netted only two goals (albeit with one against Oxford), leaving the striker to prove himself again. Grazioli was signed for Peterborough from non-league Wembley in 1995. His goalscoring record for Fry's Peterborough was impressive: 16 in 23

league starts. While on loan at Stevenage, he scored the goal that knocked Swindon out of the 1999 FA Cup. Jimmy Quinn was impressed and signed him that summer.

David Duke Left-sided midfielder that arrived on a free transfer from Sunderland in 2000. Unfortunately, Duke never managed a start for the Black Cat's first team. Duke appeared regularly in his first season with the Robins. He combined well with Sol Davis down the Robins' left and is a good crosser of the ball. Duke can also play at wing-back and will want to build on a decent start for Swindon.

Juan Cobian Attacking right back who chose Swindon instead of his former club Sheffield Wednesday in the summer of 2000. Argentinian Cobian played for Boca Juniors before moving to Hillsborough in 1998. He was subsequently sold to Charlton and Aberdeen without playing much first team football. Made only three league appearances in his first season for the Robins, with Mark Robinson the normal right back. Talented though Cobian is, he needs a regular spell of first team football to prove what he can do.

Danny Invincible Australian midfielder who endeared himself to the fans having been recommended to Colin Todd by Harry Redknapp at West Ham. Danny subsequently joined the Robins on a free transfer. After a slow start (although he did score on his debut against West Brom), Danny showed the club what he was capable of with five goals in four games in October/November last season. The former Marconi Stallion and Aussie Under-21 star would later become Town's top scorer with ten goals, arguably his most important coming in the last home game of the season against Peterborough in the ninetieth minute.

Gareth Davies Welsh centre back who has been plagued with injury during his time at the County Ground. Davies is a solid centre back who is competent in the air and a good tackler as well as being more comfortable on the ball than many defenders. He was signed by Swindon by his former Reading boss, Jimmy Quinn in 1999 after falling out of favour with then Royals boss, Tommy Burns. Davies made over 100 appearances for Hereford before signing for Crystal Palace in 1995. He joined Reading two years later but missed the entire 2000-1 season through injury.

Alan Reeves Experienced centre back who is particularly strong in the air. Reeves always causes problems from set pieces and for a brief period last term he was the club's top goalscorer. In 2000/01 he was told by Colin Todd that he could leave the club, but persuaded the manager to reconsider with some fine pre-season performances. Before joining Swindon in 1998, he spent four years at Wimbledon, where he had the tough task of replacing John Scales. Reeves has also played for Gillingham, Chester and Rochdale.

Steve Robinson Tough-tackling, energetic right-footed midfield terrier signed from Birmingham City for £50,000 in February 2001, he was an automatic

choice for the Robins for the remainder of the season. A former Birmingham trainee, he broke into the Blues team under Barry Fry but has constantly been dogged by injuries that have limited his first team chances. He made over 50 league starts for Blues, but almost joined Sheffield United in 1999, only to fail the medical. Involved at the start of the 2000-01 season, but was transfer-listed by Trevor Francis in November after failing to hold down a regular place in the first team squad.

Alan Young Still only eighteen, Young is one of Swindon's brightest hopes for the future. Having already played for England's Youth team, Young has risen from Town's youth set up to the fringe of the first team squad via the Reserves. Scoring goals for fun with the youth side, Young more than held his own in the club's second string and marked his first team debut in the FA Cup by scoring against non-league Ilkeston Town. Unfortunately he was unable to command a place due before an ankle injury sidelined the youngster. King has made his admiration for the youngster very clear and he could well figure in his plans this year.

Paul McAreavey Northern Ireland Under 21 international midfielder who holds the dubious distinction of being the first player sent-off for his country at that level. Made his first two appearances for Swindon as a substitute against Norwich and on another substitute appearance, he netted his first Swindon goal against Oldham in March 2001, impressing with his lively movement.

James Williams Teenage defender who first played for Swindon at the end of the 1998-9 season when just 16 and appeared in more than half of the Robins' games the following campaign. A quick right back who is composed in possession, Williams only played seven league games in the 2000-1 season. However, with Mark Robinson returning to form and the further signings of Juan Cobian and Andy Gurney, has struggled to earn a place since.

Matthew Heywood Heywood failed to break through at Burnley's Turf Moor and, after being alerted as to his availability by Shaun Reid, Andy King snapped him up on a free transfer. Has signed until the end of next season and has shown in the few games that he's played, just how good a player he is. Strong in the tackle and good in the air, Heywood could prove to be a great asset to the club.

Andy Gurney Andy joined Reading from Torquay in January 1999 for £100,000 as an attack-minded, right-sided defender who can also play in midfield. He started his career at hometown club Bristol Rovers, where he spent four seasons

before moving to Torquay for one year and impressing during their surge to the play-offs. Established a regular starting place with Reading in 1999/2000 and figured in the Royal's promotion push last year. Crowned an impressive home debut performance against Tottenham with a long-range goal.

Craig Farr Goalkeeper who was an unused substitute for the Robins in the 2000-1 season and will hope the departure of Steve Mildenhall gives him more of a chance. Has impressed greatly when given the chance in Town's second string.

Eric Sabin Few have heard of the young Frenchman, but if he is half as good as King says he is, then Town supporters could be in for a very exciting season. Sabin joins Town from French Second Division club Wasquehal who finished 18th last season. Sabin contributed with seven goals in 58 starts but King describes his style of play as that of Thierry Henry. With youth on his side, Sabin could be a great prospect for the club.

Richard McKinney Young goalkeeper signed from Manchester City in the summer of 2001. He progressed through the youth system but was behind Nicky Weaver and Carlo Nash in the queue for the keeper's position and moved to the County Ground for the greater chance of first team football. Andy King described him as a "tall and commanding" keeper.

Bury have played 19 league games, one League Cup and one Rumbelows Cup game.... Their first league game on this day was in 1921 when they were beaten 3-1 away by Clapton Orient. Billy Ritchie was the Bury scorer.... In 1923 they beat Fulham 2-1 at home with goals from Wally Amos and Stan Woodhouse.... 1927 saw Bury kick off their new season in Division One in fine style beating Arsenal 5-1 at Gigg Lane with goals from Amos (2), John Ball (2) and Norman Bullock. That promising start lasted only four days as Bury were then beaten 5-1 at Liverpool.... 1934 brought a 4-1 away defeat at Norwich City, with Amos again the scorer... There was another big scalp for Bury on this day in 1947 when Tottenham Hotspur were defeated 2-0 at home by goals from Jimmy Constantine and Don Carter.... In 1952 Leeds United came to Gigg Lane and gained a 2-2 draw. Ken Plant and Walter Kelly were on the mark for Bury.... Don Watson (2) and Johnny Hubbard scored in a 3-1 home win over Port Vale in 1960.... Two late goals by the visitors gave Charlton Athletic a 3-2 victory at Gigg Lane in 1968. Jimmy Kerr and George Jones had earlier scored for Bury.... In 1977 John Thomson and Wayne Entwistle scored in a 2-2 away draw at Exeter City.... There was a League Cup 2nd Round 1st Leg game at St. James Park on this day in 1980 when Bury lost 3-2 to Newcastle United. Mick Butler and Steve Johnson scoring. Bury went on to the next round by winning the second leg 1-0 at Gigg Lane... In 1988 Bury opened up the new season with an 11 o'clock morning kick off against Wolverhampton Wanderers. Goals from Jamie Hoyland, Liam Robinson and Charlie Bishop gave Bury a 3-1

victory..... Goals from Roger Stanislaus and Ronnie Mauge in a 2-2 home draw in the Rumbelows Cup 1st Round 2nd Leg against Hartlepool United in 1991, were not enough to keep Bury in the competition, having been beaten 1-0 in the first leg.... In my Opinion

Welcome to Gigg Lane for this Bank Holiday Monday fixture, and a special welcome to all concerned with Swindon Town.

I can't help wondering what surprise the Robins kitman has in store for us today! Two years ago, the then management team of Steve McMahon and Mike Walsh sported kits identical to Bury's with the aim, I can only assume, of distracting the linesman on the south stand side. Then last year, the visitors turned out in a dark blue and white strip that clashed with our own, whereas the normal red and white could not have been more different! I await their arrival on the pitch with baited breath. The Wiltshire club are, of course, under new management this time round, with former Evertonian Andy King having been replaced by former Liverpool boss Roy Evans. He must have wondered whether he would have ever been offered another job in football for since his departure from Anfield, and despite his name being initially linked with just about every vacancy, no-one seemed to be prepared to give him the chance. Now with another former Liverpoolian, "Razor" Ruddock on board, this could prove to be quite an eventful season down in Swindon!

CREDIT TO THE LEAGUE

The news that the new owners of Wimbledon were planning to take the club away from its south London base horrified those loyal supporters who feared a 140 mile round trip if they were to continue to support their club.

The owners cited poor support and a failure to own their own ground as reason enough to move. Excuse me? Was that not the situation when they bought the club? Fortunately the Football League has ruled out any possibility of such a move stating quite rightly in my opinion, that a football club is part of a community and not a franchise to be hawked around the country at a whim.

Brentford have similarly been refused permission to move to another county, this time Surrey, and move in with Woking, some 20 miles away. They had hoped to do this, initially on a temporary basis, to give them time to either redevelop the hemmed-in Griffin Park, or have their local Hounslow

council find a suitable site for a new stadium. The League fear that such a move would be detrimental to the local folk of Brentford, as a new home may not necessarily be forthcoming.

Good for them.

Football must never go down the "Americian" route of treating clubs merely as franchises to be upped and moved at regular intervals. Goodness knows how crazy the idea is, and you only have to look at one of this country's greatest but most badly managed sports, Rugby League, to see what would happen. They wanted to expand the game, and Gateshead were recruited to open up the north-east, and Sheffield took the game nearer the midlands, but within a matter of a few years, both sides were encouraged to merge with "heartlands" clubs, namely Hull and Huddersfield, and their identities were lost. Crazy, but then again, we are talking of the idiots who run that excellent sport.

Perhaps not many people know this, but there was a time in the early 1950's when this club considered moving lock, stock and barrel away from Bury because of the poor support (nothing changes does it?), but fortunately the idea was voted down, otherwise we may not have had a town team to support!

Well done the Football League. I would say to those in charge at Wimbledon and Brentford, if you don't like the club's situation, clear off and let some genuine supporters take over.

BOTTOM OF THE LEAGUE

It's not often that we celebrate such a position, but on this occasion we must. A recent survey on arrests at football ground has placed ourselves and Macclesfield Town at the bottom of the list with NO arrests last season.

Well done to everyone who supports the Shakers. Proof that Gigg is a safe and welcoming place to follow football.

CONGRATULATIONS...

Another recent report, this time financial, has revealed that football is now a £1 billion industry. That has lead to much back slapping and self-congratulations amongst those in charge at various levels.

It also again highlights the fact that wages are soaring much higher than the increase in revenue. It currently appears to be running at around 15% more and has done so now for a considerable time. Many clubs continue to pay their already overpaid "stars" more than their turnover!

Whoever said business sense goes straight out of the window when you enter a football boardroom, has never spoken a truer sentence. So until the ludicrous situation regarding players wages has finally been tackled, are those charged with running the game really entitled to be congratulated on this new report?

MORE EX-SHAKERS NEWS

Further to the list printed in the Sheffield Wednesday programme, I can confirm a number of further moves by our former players. Paul Robertson has been swiftly shown the door at Leigh RMI after a poor pre-season (he gifted Jon Newby a goal during our game at Hilton Park), whilst Neville Southall has made a return to the playing field by turning out for Rhyl in the League of Wales, and Mark Patterson is now with Rossendale United.

Ryan Souter has joined Newport County, in the Doc Martens League, whilst also down in the south west, former Stoke City player Dean Crowe, who spent some time with us, is trying his luck at Plymouth Argyle, again on loan.

Former youngster Carl Gleaves has joined Unibond side, Bamber Bridge, whilst at the other end of the age scale, Phil Stant has joined Worcester City from Brighton.

The very early days of the club saw a twelve-man committee formed with Mr John Hall (President), Mr W. Barrett (Treasurer) and Mr J.D. Turner (Secretary) occupying the principal roles. The committee's immediate priority was of course to acquire a pitch where Bury could play their home games and they opened negotiations for "Mr. Barlow's field, Gigg Lane." Thomas Barlow was an agent for the Earl of Derby and lived at Bankfield Farm, which still exists on

with Mr Barlow involved the payment of an annual rent of twenty-five pounds. There was no strict close season in operation at the time and the new club wasted no time making plans to commence operations as soon as possible. Having no doubt obtained special permission from Mr Barlow to hold the inaugural match at Gigg Lane, an exhibition game was held on Saturday 6th June between two specially invited prominent teams from 'up the valley'. Accrington (winners of the East Lancashire Charity Cup) played

newspaper advertisement to attend for trial games at Gigg Lane. Those trials were held on Tuesday 14th July 1885 and the club seems to have favoured Tuesday for midweek matches ever since.

Most of the early players recruited were perhaps not surprisingly local although two experienced Scotsmen, Billy Pollock and George Douglas, were recruited as player-coaches. The name 'Ross' also joined the playing staff for the first time as Jack Ross - elder brother of George and David - signed



Over the years there has been more than one account put forward as to the precise manner in which Bury Football Club first came into being back in 1885. The truth is, perhaps, that no one is really quite sure all these years later as to the exact facts behind the club's formation.

but it is highly possible that another local side had occupied the site of Bury Football Club's new home prior to them taking up residency - possibly the aptly named Gigg Rovers? There were no facilities whatsoever available at the field, no grandstands or even changing rooms - but it immediately became 'home' and has remained so ever since. A rope separated the spectators from the field of play, farm buildings and a fence ran along the length of Gigg Lane and entrance to the enclosure was through a narrow admission gate on Gigg Lane almost opposite Brierley Street. The club's tenancy agreement

Accrington President, Mr J.P. Hartley, commented that he had no doubt that the Bury club would be successful. A special General Meeting was held three days later at the White Horse, on 9th June, at which the committee looked to attract subscription-paying members in their quest for funds. At the same meeting they also set the annual subscription fees at three shilling (15 pence) for an Ordinary Member and 'not less than half a guinea' for Honorary Members. Five days later, attentions turned to recruiting players as practice games were held with local players being invited through another

Against QPR last Saturday I thought it was another case of "We wuz robbed". After going one up courtesy of Man of the Match Michael Nelson's second goal for the Shakers we were denied one clear cut penalty - which even R's boss Ian Holloway admitted was handball - and one which I think 95% of referee's would have given in the second half. This coupled with the fact that Rangers Andy Thompson looked two yards offside

The Match

On paper, this was the greatest mismatch for years. Don Revie's Leeds United bestrode English football - and the European game too - as an 8 year spell of trophy collecting neared its conclusion. They had a team of internationalists, while Sunderland were from the Second Division, a collection of journeymen professionals in the main, without a cap to their name at that point.

This massive upset of the form-book turned on two moments. The first came in 32 minutes, when Leeds failed to clear a Dave Watson header from a Billy Hughes corner. The ball fell to Ian Porterfield, who lashed the ball past David Harvey with his "wrong" right foot.

Leeds enjoyed the bulk of the play, without breaking down a Sunderland team that played with enthusiasm and vigour, and no little skill. Midway through the second half, it seemed that the Yorkshire team had made the breakthrough they craved. Trevor Cherry's header produced a marvellous save from Jim Montgomery in the Sunderland goal,

but the ball broke to Peter Lorimer with an empty goal gaping. Montgomery recovered to fling himself across Lorimer's path, and the Scotsman's close range drive was somehow punched clear.

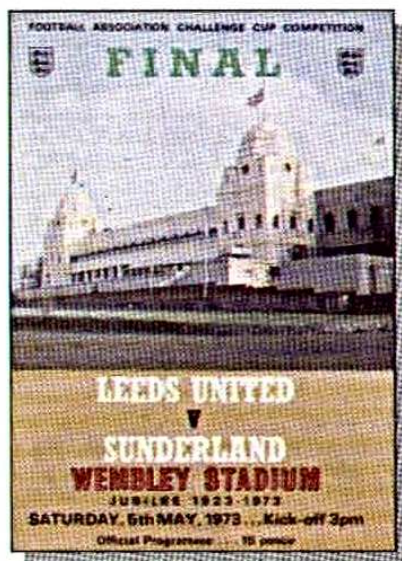
It was one of the most memorable saves in Wembley's Cup Final history - more famous than many winning goals, and it helped win the Cup for a Second Division side for the first time in 42 years. It was unsung Sunderland skipper Bobby Kerr - not his much decorated Leeds opposite number - who collected the Cup from the Duchess of Kent.

The Programme

A full colour photograph of the (deserted) twin towers dominated the front cover, with a gold panel at the bottom containing match details. Fifteen pence bought a 32 page programme in a size familiar to League issue purchasers today. Full colour photography was included on two-thirds of the glossy pages, the remainder having some spot colour. Colour photographs of the trophy and the Duke of Kent filled the first two pages followed by four pages on Leeds United, one on their recent history, a colour team group, and two pages of pen pictures. Two full colour photographs of Leeds' semi final against Wolves and an article on "50 Years of Wembley". "Cup Chatter", facts and figures compiled by Jack Rollin, were followed by Timetable and Programme of Music, Abide with Me being led by Frankie Vaughan. Teams Selections and their paths to Wembley each took up a page in the centre fold and the second half of the programme opened with four pages on Sunderland, and another page of

photographs from their semi final against Arsenal. There was a full page article on the athletics which formed part of the pre-match entertainment and a list of previous FA Cup winners took up half a page.

Advertisements included the producers of both Sunderland and Leeds United Cup Final Records, Golden Virginia Tobacco, Yorkshire and Tyne Tees Television, Littlewoods Pools, Automatic Catering Supplies, forthcoming athletics events and the



Empire Pool, Double Diamond and Player's No.6 cigarettes. Despite the memorable occasion, this programme remains fairly commonplace, and can be purchased from most major programme dealers for between £3 and £4.

A Match to Remember

...with Leigh Edwards

Colin Bell scored a hat-trick as Swindon Town were hit for six in this opening match of the 1964-65 season watched by 7,106 at Gigg Lane.

22nd Aug 1964

Bill Atkins flashed Swindon into a first minute lead and Bury hit back immediately in an amazing start to the new campaign. Outside-left Tony Bartley equalised after a second minute free-kick but Swindon keeper Norman Oakley sustained a shoulder injury during the goalmouth melee and was taken to hospital for X-rays shortly afterwards. With no substitutes allowed at this time, right-back Owen Dawson took over as

emergency keeper and Swindon's reaction was all-out defence in the hope of holding out and giving Dawson more protection than an established keeper would have needed. Mike Summerbee switched from outside-right to right-back and fellow winger Don Rogers was left as their sole raider for most of the time.

Ten-man Swindon packed their defence after the double shock of Bury's lightning equaliser and the loss of Oakley but there was nobody to steady them or bring organisation to their improvised line-up. Don Rogers' clever solo efforts down the middle worried Shakers on the intermittent occasions when Swindon were able to lift the weight off their defenders.

Bury shattered the visitors' hopes of hanging on against mounting pressure when they took the lead through Billy Giffin's goal in the 17th minute, then Colin Bell added two more in the 33rd and 37th minutes. Swindon manager Bert Head was left to reflect that with Oakley's injury coming so early, the damage had already been done by the time he could get hold of his players at the interval to sort things out. Swindon were noticeably steadier in the second-half after his briefing and prevented Bury from adding to their total until the later stages. But there was more misfortune for Head's side when centre-forward Frank Large dropped back to defend and went up for the ball with Roger Smart, only for the latter to touch it into his own net for Bury's fifth goal.

Colin Bell completed the rout with his third goal in the 83rd minute and the victory was Bury's biggest on the opening day of a season since they trounced Fulham 7-2 at Gigg Lane in August 1946. Swindon were destined to be relegated that season and Bert Head returned to Bury as manager for a year in August 1965, having previously been a player and coach at Gigg Lane.

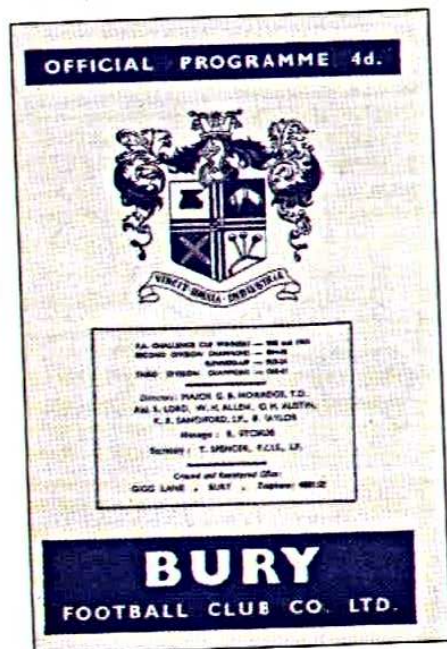

WHATEVER HAPPENED TO BURY'S TEAM?

CHRIS HARKER: Goalkeeper who made 178 League appearances prior to joining Grimsby Town in June 1967, then reunited with Bob Stokoe at Rochdale and became Darlington's trainer. After 25 years as a maintenance fitter for Magnet in Darlington, he is now caretaker at Hummersknot Comprehensive School.

BRIAN GALLAGHER: Versatile right-back who replaced Eddie Robertson in Bury's team and scored once in 130 League games while at Gigg Lane before moving to Carlisle United in May 1965, then had a spell with Stockport County. He subsequently emigrated to the



United States and has settled in California.

BRIAN EASTHAM: Long-serving left-back who scored three times in 189 League outings for Bury prior to joining Toronto Falcons in April 1967, then played for Toronto Blizzard, Rochdale and Sligo Rovers. He worked for Telebank in Bolton and has since become a successful businessman based on the Isle of Man.

BRIAN TURNER: One of Bury's finest servants, this tough-tackling wing-half netted 24 goals in a post-war record 454 League games before moving to Oldham Athletic in August 1970. He then had a spell with Droylsden prior to running the Rosamar Café in Bury and suffered a fatal heart-attack in January 1999.

HARRY BUNNER: Loyal centre-half who played 106 League games prior to joining Stockport County in April 1965, then had a spell with Hyde United. He was a security man for Massey Ferguson in Trafford Park, then Hall's in Bury and is set to retire next month as a maintenance man at Manchester

University.

GORDON ATHERTON: Long-serving wing-half who reunited with Bert Head at Swindon Town in December 1964, then followed him back to Bury in January 1966 and scored 13 goals in 334 League games overall before moving to Drumcondra eight months later. He is still a regular visitor to Gigg Lane.

TOMMY CLAXTON: Young outside-right who netted three goals in 101 League outings before moving to South African side Cape Town City in May 1969, briefly playing for Bolton Wanderers on his return. He now lives in Whitworth and runs an office cleaning business as well as being a semi-professional musician.

BILLY GRIFFIN: Skilful inside-right who scored 22 times in 88 League games before being swapped for Workington's Barry Lowes in February 1966, then played for Rotherham United, Cambridge City and Frickley. Now living in Doncaster, he worked for Northern Dairies until a heart-attack in February 1995.

ALEC ALSTON: Versatile centre-

forward who netted 22 goals in 86 Second Division outings while at Gigg Lane prior to joining Barrow in September 1965 after being displaced by the arrival of Ray Pointer. He subsequently played for Fleetwood, then worked as a delivery driver and has settled in Blackpool.

COLIN BELL: Leading marksman who scored 25 goals in 82 League games before joining Manchester City for £47,500 in February 1966. He was capped 48 times by England until injury ended his career in May 1979, then ran his own restaurant in Whitefield and has since held several posts at Maine Road.

TONY BARTLEY: Fast, skilful outside-left who netted 24 times in 116 League outings for Bury before being sold to Oldham Athletic for £3,000 in September 1964, then played for Chesterfield, Sligo Rovers (P/M), Limerick and Dundalk. He is currently a sports centre manager in his native Stalybridge.

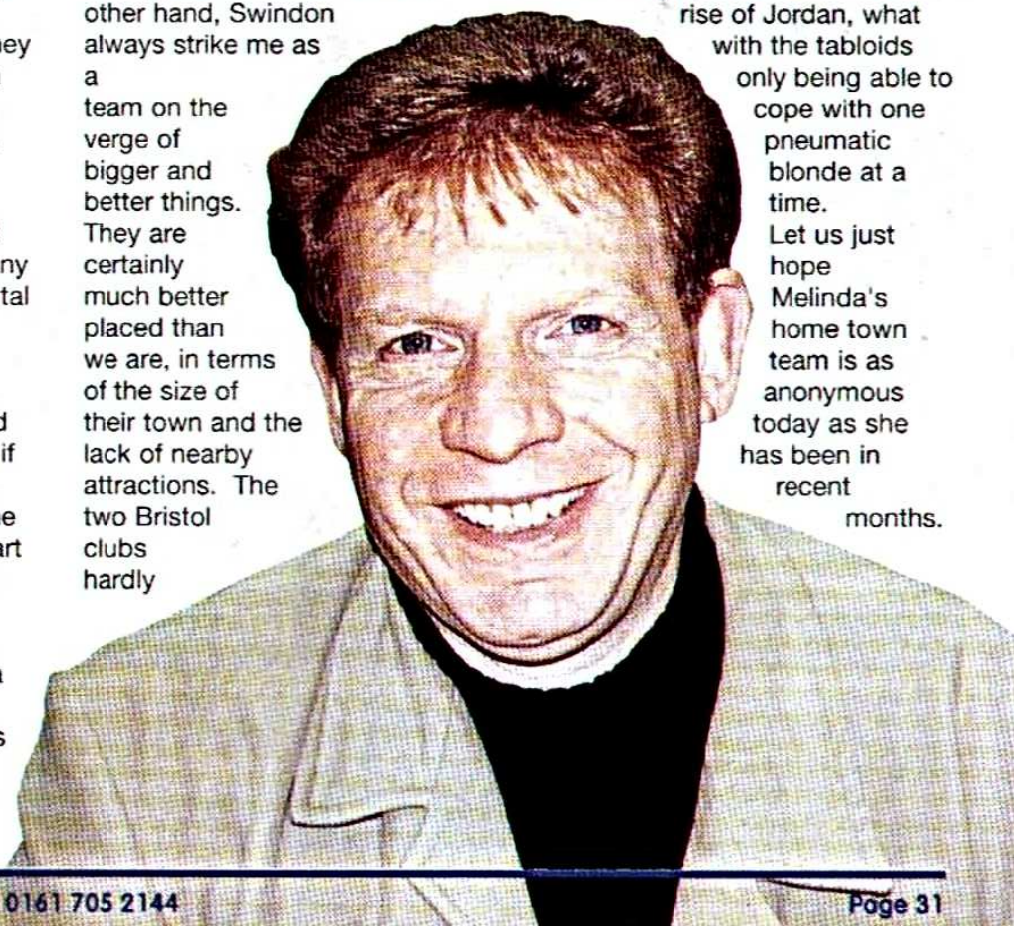
So well done, Bury fans. Not many of us, I know, but at least we are not causing the police any trouble; freeing them for their vital work,

This was the ideal time for the midlands to make a case and get Government backing and move away from the capital perhaps offering easier access to the ground for everyone in the country. At least that should have been the plan, except the midlands is no more at one with itself than the south is and we have ended up with Coventry scrapping it out with Birmingham and they have both left themselves with egg on their faces. Because they are neighbours they have been unwilling to offer help to each other and much deeper than that they have actually tried to obstruct each other. They have both resorted to attacking each other in the local press, offering wild allegations that have totally ruined any chance of working together in the future. The battle has become so intense that an emergency meeting has now been called by them both so that they can try and restore some order to the proceedings. Outsiders have become amused by the controversy and have now pointed out that whilst they have been locked in battle, Brent, Wembley's current home have quietly slipped back into the lead.

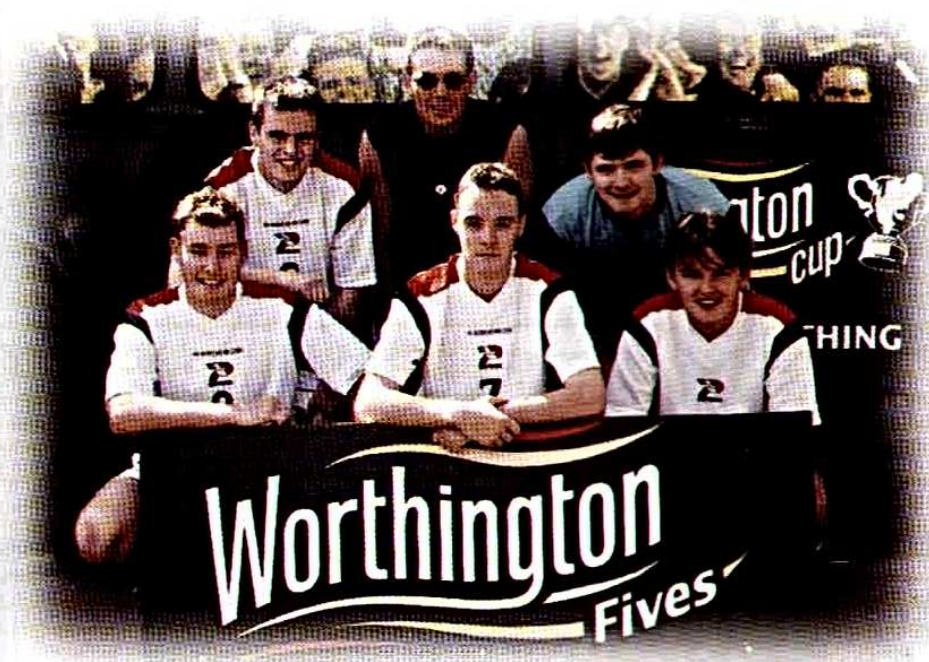

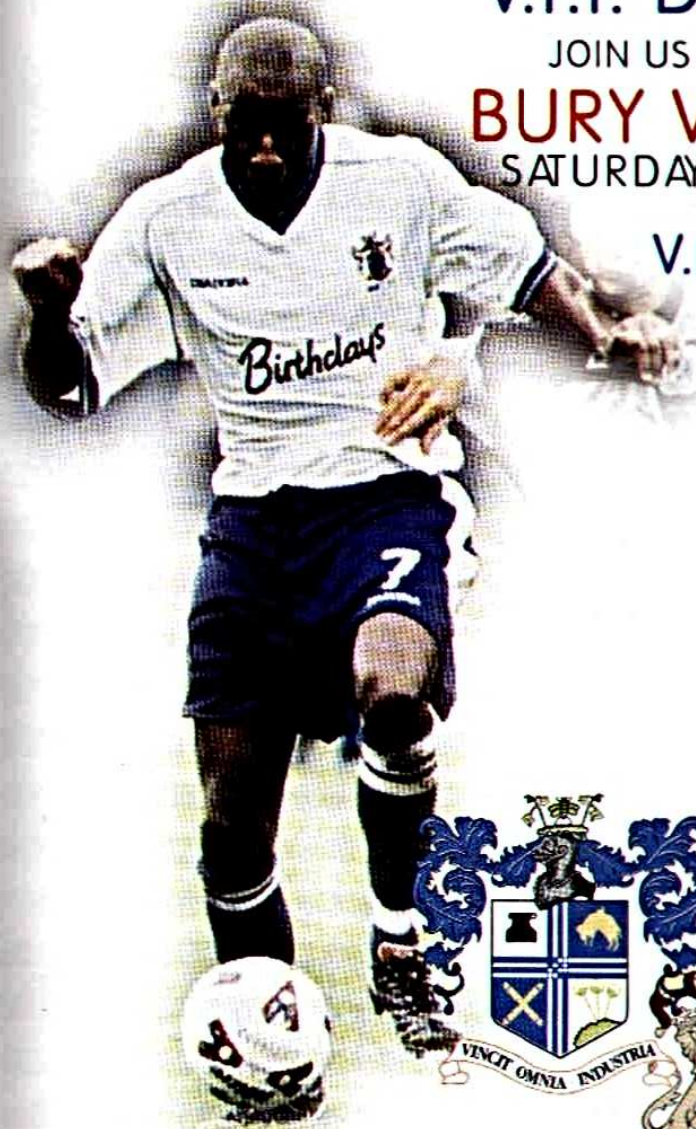
