





Today we face Cardiff City and times have most certainly changed since I used to watch them whilst at University in the Welsh capital. In fact, the last time I frequented Ninian Park, The Bluebirds drew 1-1 with Oxford in front of just over 6,000 fans in Division Three. These days, crowds of over 11,000 are 'the norm' and they now have, in their side, some of the best players in the division. Fortunately, our record against City is impressive; four wins in the last four home encounters, including fourteen goals is not bad going. Less convincing is our record in front of the cameras (today's game is being televised by ITV.) In the early nineties, Town featured quite heavily 'on the box' and victories over both Tranmere and Leicester in 1992/93 figure highly amongst the most memorable occassions, but successes since then have been few and far between. Town have lost more games than they have won in front of the viewing public, but we can take heart in the fact that both Reevesy and Bobby Howe have scored in our last few television appearances. A repeat from either today would go down very nicely!

BEHIND THE SCENES

Leaping up and down in an away Director's Box is often fraught with either difficulty or embarassment - but last Saturday at Reading I threw caution to the wind and I made sure the enjoyment was plain for all to see.

Etiquette rules often dictate that, as a visiting club official, polite applause is the maximum one is allowed. But going 2-0 up in a derby game - at their place - brings out the fan element in me. The sheer delight at such a victory should be allowed to be released through passionate adulation - I only wish we could have joined in the singing as young Jo Kuffour wrapped up the game. However, as with most things in life, there is always a down side to such a great day out and I would like to apologise to some Town fans who were caught up in ticketing problems caused by our hosts. On the Thursday before the game, our ticket office staff received a request from Reading's ticket office to return 500 tickets. We informed them that we could bring them with us on the day of the game, but we were asked to send them via Securicor so they could be made available for sale on the morning of the match. Consequently, some Town supporters travelled to the game hoping to buy a ticket. I believe a decision was taken by Thames Valley Police (in my experience one of the worst forces for football organisation) not to allow these tickets to be sold. I am very disappointed that the incorrect information was relayed to us as I believe we could have sold those tickets prior to the game. It's not as though there was a capacity crowd and it was clear to all of us there that there were spaces available. Unfortunately, because of the threat of trouble between rival fans - a minority of fans at that - there is sometimes a need by the police to be cautious in their planning. Perhaps, one day in the future we will be able to rid ourselves of this problem and allow law abiding fans the opportunity to watch their team play. Having said that, I must offer my support to our local police authority who today face a difficult job. It is because of that potential danger to others that today's game has had to be made all-ticket. It is not a decision we take lightly, but in view of problems at previous games this season, we have had to ensure the safety of the vast majority of supporters. Today we also welcome ITV's cameras to the County Ground for a live transmission on HTV and HTV Wales. It's been some time since Town appeared live on TV and I hope we can put on a display. This week is also national 'Kick Racism out of Football' week and I am delighted to be part of that campaign today. You will see posters, banners and free magazines around the ground - all proclaiming our support for a worthy cause. I think our message over the PA system says it all" 'Keep your support loud and proud - but never racist. Finally, a warm Wiltshire welcome to the directors, players and supporters of Cardiff City, but as I always say - Come on you Reds!

CAN THE TOWN AFFORD TO PUBLISH ITS ACCOUNTS?

Forget the reasons why Swindon Town has yet to produce its audited accounts for its Financial Year 1998/1999 the question to be asked is 'Can the club afford to publish them?'

Company Law requires that Swindon Town Football Company Limited send out a copy of its audited accounts to each of its shareholders and the club currently has 3,434 Shareholders. By the time the accounts are printed and posted, it's likely to cost at least £1.50 per shareholder, that's over £5,000. In real terms, that's not a great deal of money, but there are some creditors of the club out there who would be grateful for some of that money!

The irony of this is that many of the club's shareholders hold shares with a face value of one third of the cost of the document! 1,473 shareholders have only one, fifty pence share in the company.

A few more facts about the club's shareholders: just under 2,500 shareholders hold shares of £10 or less at face value; and of the 3,434 shareholders, only 317 have £100 or more of shares at face value. "The cost of managing this number of shareholders far outweighs the investment that people have made," commented TrustSTFC Treasurer, Leigh Collett. "Whilst people may believe they have helped the club by becoming a shareholder, with so many people holding so few shares, the opposite is in fact the case."

TrustSTFC, the Swindon Town Supporters Trust, is asking for existing small shareholders in the club to donate their shares to the Trust. "TrustSTFC holds shares in trust on behalf of its members," stated Tony Norris, TrustSTFC Chairman. "By donating shares to TrustSTFC, those shares will hold far more sway with the Board of the Club than any one individual could ever hope for, and it will be reducing the cost to the club for managing its shareholders."

Norris also stated "We will be exercising the voting rights of our existing shares at the next AGM. We will vote based on the democratic decision of our membership." 

Town's young reserve side lost its second game in as many weeks against a strong and resolute Norwich City side at the County Ground two weeks ago.

Mark Robinson returned to the side following a prolonged period in the treatment room and he took his place alongside Garth Davies and Bryan Smith in the centre of defence. Smith was involved in Town's first chance on six minutes when he combined with Kevin Halliday, however the impressive midfielder could only send his shot straight into the arms of Paul Crichton in the Norwich goal, Halliday became increasingly involved in the game and his competent display will not have gone unnoticed by 'Razor' and Malcolm Crosby. In the eleventh minute, Neil Edwards had a penalty appeal turned down, only for the referee to award an inoccuous spot-kick four minutes later, Jason Shackell adjudging to have handled the ball. Berti Brayley confidently slotted the ball home to give Town a slender 1-0 lead. The Canaries should have equalised five minutes later, but Brian McGovern volleyed over from point-blank range following good work from the impressive Lewis Blois on the left hand side. Town had several chances to increase their lead both at the end of the second half, and at the beginning of the second - Brayley the main orchestrator. However, Town were defeated by a crushing double blow with just 15 minutes remaining. 





52 pages @£2 printed by: PPP Speculation aside. Cork seems to be relishing the task of rebuilding the Welsh club, and has an enviable budget with which to do it. Over the close season City splashed out on half a dozen players, including the midfield pairing of Graham Kavanagh from Stoke for £1 million and Des Hamilton from Newcastle United. Spencer Prior was convinced he could re-ignite his career in Wales, and was recruited from Kevin Keegan's Manchester City for £800,000 and more recently, the Bluebirds have signed Peter Thorne from Stoke City. Cardiff have enjoyed mixed fortunes so far this season, and good home wins at the now 21,000 capacity Ninian Park against Wycombe and Northampton were followed by a home defeat by Huddersfield, ending an unbeaten run at home of 15 months. Subsequent draws with Brighton and Wigan were equally disappointing as City dominated both games without reward. Away from Ninian Park City have been a real Jekyll and Hyde outfit; losing disastrously at lowly Cambridge and then producing an outstanding performance to win at the Madjeski Stadium over Town's rivals Reading. A subsequent draw at Ashton Gate denied Bristol City top spot, and reaffirmed the potential in the Cardiff side.

Indeed, no one could deny that play-off success at Wales very own Millennium Stadium, would be a fitting twist in the Sam Hammam/Cardiff City story. I for one, wouldn't bet against it.





Former Wimbledon striker Alan Cork has made a promising start to his stint at Ninian Park after taking over from Bobby Gould. With the backing of Owner Sam Hamman, Cork has spent well in the transfer market and guided the Bluebirds to promotio to Division Two. However, this season, has side have started slowly as they attempt to gain promotion from Division Two at the first attempt.

This is Cork's second effort at management after a brief spell in charge at South Wales rivals Swansea three years ago, but he also gained coaching experience alongside Mickey Adams at Brighton before his move in September 2000 to Cardiff, where he initially worked under Gould before going solo this season.

After starting his playing career with Derby, Cork's career was transformed when he joined Wimbledon in 1978. He played a key role as the South London club enjoyed an amazing rise through the leagues, which was ultimately crowned by victory in the 1988 FA Cup Final against Liverpool. Cork holds the all-time appearances and goals record for Wimbledon, but there was life after the Crazy Gang, and he had playing spells with Sheffield United and Fulham before setting out on his coaching career.





Born in Zambia, City's diminutive striker finished last season as top goalscorer with 25 goals in all competitions. He opened his account this time around in the Worthington Cup defeat at Millwall, his second coming in the same week against Bournemouth. He has made just four starts this season following Thorne's arrival.









Neil Alexander

Alexander is a highly rated, former Scotland under 21 international who arrived from Scottish Premier League side, Livingston during the summer for a fee of £200,000. With two clean sheets under his belt this season, Neil is widely tipped to become Scotland's number one over the next few seasons.

Daniel Gabbidon

A former West Bromwich Albion defender who made, in total, 26 appearances in all competitions for the Baggies. Signed for The Bluebirds in September following a successful loan spell at the start of the season, and was a regular fixture in the promotion winning side. Gabbidon is also capped at Welsh under 21 level.

Des Hamilton

Des joined Cardiff City from Newcastle on a free transfer in the close season. He started his career with Bradford City in 1994 before moving on to Tyneside. Following the acrimonious departure of Kenny Dalglish, Des found it difficult to progress under both Ruud Gullit and more recently, Bobby Robson.

Graham Kavanagh Andy Legg

Kavanagh became Cardiff's record signing this summer when he joined them for £1million from Stoke City. Graham started his career with Home Farm before he was spotted by Middlesbrough in 1991 before moving to the Brittannia Stadium in 1996. He has also made a number of appearances for Eire.

Andy Legg, possibly more well known for his lethal long-throws, joined The Bluebirds from Reading. Previously, he had moved to Swansea in 1988 before joining Notts County in 1993. A spell at Birmingham City followed before his spell at Elm Park. He joined Cardiff City in 1998 on a free transfer.

Spencer Prior

Another summer signing, Prior began his career as a central defender with Southend United, before moving on to play for Leicester City, Norwich City, Derby County and Manchester City. Signed for The Bluebirds for £700,00 and his ability in the air makes him a threat both in defence, and in attack.

Michael Simpkins Rhys Weston

Another summer signing, Simpkins was obtained by the club on a free transfer from Chesterfield. A solid midfielder, Michael made more than 20 appearances for the Spireites and he has figured in every game so far this season. He will be hoping to establish himself in the side for the rest of the campaign.

Another ever-present, Rhys started his career with Arsenal in the summer of 1997. He made his debut for the Gunners at the end of the 1999-00 season, quickly followed by his first Welsh senior cap afterwards. Signed for the Bluebirds in November 2000, Rhys went on to make over 30 appearances last season.

Formerly with Town rivals, Bristol Rovers, Josh went on to sign for Leyton Orient in 1999. Initially on loan from the London club, he made his move to Cardiff City more permanent in November 1999 by signing on a free transfer. His agility and pace as an attacker made him a threat to many defences last season.

Leo Fortune-West

A late starter in the professional game, the 30-year old began his career with Stevenage Borough before joining Gillingham in 1995. Three years later and he was on the move again joining Lincoln before moving to Brentford and Rotherham. From here he joined City for £300,000 and he was instrumental last season.

Paul Brayson

After a three-year spell with his hometown-club, Newcastle United, (starting in 1995 and including a brief loan spell at Swansea City), Paul signed for The Royals for a fee of £100,000 in 1998. He joined The Bluebirds in the summer of 2000 on a free transfer and he has already bagged two goals this time around.

GavinGordon

Gavin has made astonishing progress at the club since joining from Lincoln City in December 2000. Gavin started his career with Hull City for whom he made 40 first team appearances before joining The Imps for £30,000 in November 1997. He scored 29 goals in 99 games before making the switch to Ninian Park.




FROM THE PRESS BOX







RAGS TO


Every now and again the footballing world thrusts and the limelight the most unlikely of names and by doing so, creates a true 'rags to riches' story, the stuff that boyhood dreams are made of. Mercifully for Swindon Town, it happened to Paul Edwards. Plying his trade with The Robins of a different kind (Altrincham Football Club of the Unibond League) no less than three months ago, you would be forgiven for having not heard of Town's most recent fan favourite. However, a bit of luck and three man-of-the-match awards later and Edwards has now firmly endeared himself to the County Ground faithful and, as he tells Nick Judd, he couldn't be happier.





Paul Edwards comes from a growing breed of players making the transition from non-league football to the professional game. With more and more clubs finding it increasingly difficult to include at the higher end of the transfer spectrum, players like Edwards are making the most of the growing number of opportunities being made available by those looking to unearth 'a gem'. For Edwards, his career started in the Sunday League. "From there I went on to play for Manchester Boys before joining Manchester City and I was at Maine Road for quite a while" he explains. Whilst at City, Edwards flirted with the international scene, "I went for an England Schoolboys trial but to be honest, it didn't really work out. Whether it was nerves or not, I don't know, but I was absolutely shocking! After that I went to play in the Conference and Unibond league." For many, such a shattering of confidence would be the end of any aspiration to play professionally. Yet it was whilst playing in the Conference that Edwards was handed a trial. "I was playing for Leigh RMI when Shaun Reid came to watch a game up there. He invited me down to Swindon for a week to see what I could do, but the day I was due to play in a trial he left the club! Crozzer told me to just go and play my game and he said that he would introduce me to the new manager. Roy watched me and said yeah, we'll have you and here I am!"

To impress a new manager in just ninety minutes of football can be tricky business and there were many who didn't make the grade this summer. "I suppose it can be quite hard but to be honest, I just tried my hardest and put it out of the back of my mind. The 'gaffer' just told me to enjoy it and try and play my game, thank god it was enough!" Few would have thought he would go on to be as successful as he has been since his arrival at the County Ground on August 15. Nevertheless, it took some time to infiltrate the first team; "I started playing for the reserves because I wasn't at the same level of fitness as the rest of the lads. It is a big step up from non-league football, both in fitness and speed and so I had to adapt quickly. The pace of the game is a lot quicker in Division Two and you certainly have to cover more ground." Fortunately, it didn't take Edwards long to enforce himself on Town's second string and he scored his first goal for the club in a 2-0 victory against Bournemouth Reserves at the County Ground.





A first team berth quickly followed and Edwards was thrown into the limelight in extra-time at the Hawthorns before making his full debut at Vale Park. "I was so nervous! Thankfully I settled pretty quickly and started to play the way I like to. I think it helped that the lads were playing well, it is a lot easier to come into a side that is confident and playing well as opposed to one that is on a losing streak or low in confidence. The other lads were there for me on the night and many of them talked me through the game." From there, Town's wing-wizard has not looked back. His best performance of the season so far came during Town's 2-0 victory over Brentford and he even had the supporters chanting his name. "That night was incredible," he says with a huge smile. "It was just nice to know that I could make the fans feel that way about me, but to be honest, I was really nervous ahead of that match, It can be difficult to play in front of your own fans when you are new to the team, but their reaction gave me a lot of confidence."

However, with just five games under his belt Edwards is quick to admit that there is still room for improvement. "I am really happy with how it's gone so far, but as the 'gaffer' keeps pointing out, I have still only scored one goal for the reserves! That is an element of my game that I definitely want to improve, but both Roy and 'Razor' have been great and they are there for me all the time. It has been a pleasure to work with the two of them so far and I am learning so much from their experience." Following positive comments from Town's management team, the pleasure appears to be all theirs and both Evans and Ruddock have stated their admiration for the Manchester-born winger on the back of Saturday's performance. But Evans has also been equally as quick to play down Edwards's success, the former Liverpool boss afraid that expectations may place Edwards under too much pressure. "I just want to keep playing well really. I have had a taste of the action and I don't really want to lose my place. I am also on a twelve-month contract and so my ultimate aim is to earn something a bit more long-term. "When I got a contract here I set higher standards for myself and now that I have earned a place in the team, they have gone higher still and ultimately I want to keep improving."

Many of today's visiting players couldn't be further from Edwards' own personal experiences in the game. With the financial backing of Sam Hamman, The Bluebirds side are encapsulated by a number of bigmoney signings including Graham Kavanagh and former Town favourite, Peter Thorne. "In a way, you always want to prove to teams like Cardiff that you can play football and can compete with the big name players. We have proved on a number of occasions that we can outplay the big teams, including last week against Reading and I think we will do well against Cardiff. It will be my first game on TV so I will be hoping to have a good game myself."



Whilst Town entered this hotly anticipated M4 derby with confidence in abundance, the same couldn't be said for the home side who, having lost three of the previous four games, were under pressure to appease their disgruntled fans. In the first twenty minutes neither side looked capable of breaking the deadlock and instead, both seemed comfortable merely quashing the others attacking options. Both did so with overwhelming success. Yet as the first half developed, Town became increasingly confident and 'Razor' had the first worthwhile effort of the game on the half-hour mark. Unfortunately his shot failed to seriously test Phil Whitehead in the Reading goal, but Ruddock was to prove influential eight minutes later when Grazioli gave Swindon the lead. Razor's long ball from the back took an eternity to fall for Town's in-form striker, yet whilst the Royals defence waited for the linesman to raise his flag, 'Graz' confidently converted his fourth goal of the season. Reading searched for an immediate equaliser without seriously testing Griemink in Town's goal before Bobby Howe struck the post on the stroke of half-time.

Nicky Forster and Martin Butler were replaced by Tony Rougier and Andy Hughes at the interval and the former Port Vale striker should have done better with a close range header, only to blaze over Griemink's upright. Then came the killer goal. With Paul Edwards in acres of space on the left-hand side, he delivered a teasing cross for Invincibile to head home at the far post in front of Town's travelling supporters. Town's fans celebrated, with many assuming the points were safe until Reading substitute, Darius Hendersen latched on to a defensive mix-up and lobbed the advancing Griemink with just seven minutes remaining. Fortunately, the home side could not force an equaliser and Jo Kuffour, on for Grazioli, wrapped up the game when he latched on to a mistake at the back before slotting home Town's third from the edge of the area. Town move up to tenth place, whilst Reading, under increasing pressure to repeat last year's form – slide down to fourteenth position.

VINTAGE RED with Dick Mattick

Dick Mattick completes his look back at the memorable season of 1968/69 in the second of two parts.

At the end of the 1967/68 season the patience of the Swindon board was evidently wearing thin, Danny Williams was awarded a mere twelve month contract. However, due to the large average gate from the previous season, there was money available to spend on new players; Frank Burrows, John Smith and Chris Jones. Frank Burrows was signed to fill the void left by the departure of Mel Nurse to



Swansea. Strong in the air and fiercely determined, he forged a partnership with Stan Harland at the centre of the defence that was to be a major part of the team's success. John Smith didn't look like a footballer, but he managed to cover a lot of ground and was the brains behind many Swindon attacks, that despite his portly stature.

Although the season started well, the League Cup placed heavy demands on the club's resources. Fortunately though, apart from a broken arm sustained by John Trollope at Hartlepool, there were few injuries. However, there were stutters along the way. Victory over Arsenal at Wembley was sandwiched between away defeats at Stockport and Plymouth. The only home league defeat of the season was also a bitter blow, promotion rivals Watford came leaving the County Ground with three points following a 1-0 win (in front of a then record attendance of 28,898). The penultimate match of the season saw Swindon travel to Millmoor needing just one point to clinch promotion. Jim Furnell did well to keep out a Willie Penman header and a Don Rogers shot in the first half, but the second period saw Jim Storrie volley the Millers in front after 52 minutes. It was at this point that Town substitute, Chris James (nicknamed Snowball by his mates due to his partiality to the drink and who missed out on a Wembley appearance) made his mark on Town's history. Noble found Harland, who had moved up as Swindon threw everything forward, and he slid the ball behind the Rotherham defence into the path of Jones who strode through the mud and cracked the ball home. Despite beating Barrow 2-0 at home in the final league match, Watford edged Town out of the Third Division championship spot on goal average.

Cardiff had a good season in Division Two, finishing in fifth spot, nine points adrift of Bert Head's Crystal Palace in the runners up spot. They notched up 20 victories and John Toshack, with 22 goals, was the leading scorer for Jimmy Scholar's team. There was little cup joy for the Bluebirds who failed to score in both competitions.

Stoke City have confirmed they are interested in signing troubled striker Danny Cadamarteri who has been told he can leave Everton. The 22-year old was fined £2,000 after being found quilty of assaulting a woman during a night out a year ago. The former England Under-21 forward is still under contract at Everton but is searching for a new employer following the court case.

Stoke's Director of Football John Rudge is keeping his cards close to his chest on questions of a Cadamarteri-Potteries move. "It is true to say that we have been looking at him, but we have also been looking at other players as well and we have not decided whether to pursue our interest in Danny any further".

Division Two's surprise early pacesetters, Oldham Athletic have been busy signing up new Boundary Park recruits in an effort to continue their excellent start to the season. Bolton Wanderers' Dean Holden was the first of Andy Ritchie's new arrivals, moving to Boundary Park on a one month loan deal, closely followed by Blackburn's Under 19 international Marc Richards, who put pen to paper on a month long temporary transfer from Ewood Park four days later. On the same day, Tranmere's former Blackburn midfielder Wayne Gill arrived on a three year contract, with the Latics shelling out £70,000 to the Prenton Park side. Oldham boss Ritchie believes it is money well spent "It's a good bit of business, Wayne has everything."

Brighton striker Bobby Zamora has once again played down talk of a reunion with former boss Micky Adams at Leicester City. Adams was appointed number two to Dave Bassett at Filbert Street last week, with Zamora believed to be top of their wanted list. "I haven't heard anything at all, only paper talk. I didn't pay attention to it all last season, so I don't think I should this time" said the 20-year-old hitman, who netted 31 times last season and has claimed seven league goals this term. "Micky has an opportunity to go and prove himself at a higher level, and I don't think anyone can blame him for doing that" revealed Zamora, "He brought me to the club and I owe him a lot, we were gutted, but we get paid to do a job here".







Bhutia reckons his days in the North West could be numbered, "My contract expires in July and as yet, I don't know if I will be offered another one, no discussions have taken place between myself and the club". The Indian international skipper enjoys superstar status back home, but he is happy to stay with the Second Division's basement boys.

Brentford supremo Ron Noades has once again hinted that his Second Division leaders could ground share with their West London neighbours Queens Park Rangers, if they get the green light to sell off Griffin Park. The former Crystal Palace chairman is adamant the Bees have no future at Griffin Park, "We will end up as a non-league club or go out of business, ground sharing is ahead of us in future years and will become more and more evident. It could be that a new stadium is built for us and QPR to share," said Noades, however he is struggling to convince the club's fans, "I told them that we would not survive staying at Griffin Park, the problem is that there are a number of people that simply will not accept it".

Town Ladies have stormed to the top of the South West Combination League with three consecutive victories.







FA Cup Final, 2nd May 1953 Wembley, London

THE MATCH - 'The Matthews Final' is one of the most memorable matches in the history of one of the oldest football competitions in the world. Apart from the significance of the occasion, Matthews at last winning a domestic honour (after being the superstar of the English game on either side of the war) made it one of the most thrilling finals. With only 17 minutes left, the Nat Lofthouse-inspired Bolton side were leading 3-1 and had largely subdued "The Wizard of Dribble". He finally stirred however and crossed for Stan Mortensen to slide in a cross. Spurred on by the neutrals in the crowd and those watching on television, Mortensen completed his hat-trick by firing in a free kick with just three minutes to play. In the next attack, Matthews crossed for Mortensen who squared the ball for Bill Perry to fire home a dramatic winner.



It was a romantic outcome to a dramatic match, arguably turned when


Matthews finally came into the game, although it is impossible to ignore Mortensen's hat-trick.

THE PROGRAMME - It was very much a typical Wembley, 20 small-ish page 1/- programme which greeted the 100,000 crowd for the final, although the front cover, most unusually, featured only one colour. The other two spot colours, green and red, were evident on the three advertising pages of the programme, but strangely not on the front page. There were portraits of the Royal guests, a time table and programme of music. Each team had four pages, two of which were pen pictures, a full page team group, and a lengthy article on the club and its history. Team line-ups were spread across the centre pages and a page-and-a-half on notes from the Cup's history completed an uninspiring production, for an inspirational match.

FA Cup Finals are undoubtedly the most popular collecting specialities and there is a ready market for all post-war finals. The prices of 1950's Finals increase at £5 increments as one goes back in time to the war, and you may expect to pay £40 to £45 from major dealers sales lists for the programme of "The Matthews Final".

The legs were definitely feeling it towards the end of the game, but when you are winning 3-1 you just get on with it and push the pain to one side – needless to say we were all happy/relieved when the third goal went in!

I think the result just goes to show how far we have come this season. Last year we would have been beaten when they pulled the goal back, but now we are definitely going in the right direction.

That said, we are still a million miles away from where the 'gaffer' wants us to be which shows you just how good we can be. If we can keep producing performances like that though, we will improve as a football club. There is a good spirit in the team now and we have to show that again today if we are to continue our good run and beat a strong Cardiff side.

On Tuesday night some of the younger players were given a chance to show what they can do and to be fair to them, they didn't disappoint. Obviously we would have liked to have progressed in the cup, but at the end of the day the league is our priority and at least we now know that some of the younger lads can do a job for us.

It is important we return to winning ways today because we have a couple of big game coming up in quick succession now. With your support and the same effort from the players on the pitch, we can repeat last week's result.

GOOD TO BE BECK?

A poor run of form (continuing from the back end of last season), including just three victories since the start of the new campaign have left John Beck's Cambridge side in nineteenth position with thirteen points from twelve games.

Since their progression to Division Two in 1998/99, the U's have been unable to recreate the form that not only earned them promotion in the first place, but that encapsulated their success during Beck's first tenure in the early nineties. It is hard to put your finger on what has changed, the management is the same Beck reinstalled following McFarland's departure last season) and the players have been plucked from the lower leagues as they were in the club's heyday (Dublin, Claridge et al came from modest footballing backgrounds before moving on to bigger things). Beck may take some solace in the fact that so far, the U's defeat's have come against the top sides. An opening-day draw with surprise leaders Brighton was followed by back-to-back defeats against Notts County, Stoke and Brentford, Their first win came in September in an impressive 2-1 win against Cardiff City and this was followed by a plucky performance against Reading at the Madeiski Stadium. However, just two wins have followed (QPR 2-1 - pictured) and Beck will be worried by his side's 5-0 mauling by Port Vale before Saturday's win against Bury.










BUILDING BRIDGES

SWINDON TOWN STUDY CENTRE

PLAYING FOR SUCCESS

The National Foundation for Education Research recently published a glowing report about the impact of Study Support at Football Clubs. STFC was one of the 12 clubs involved in the assessment of 'Playing for Success' in 2000 and 2001 which included the assessment of pupils before, and after their study support period. Parents and teachers were also asked to complete questionnaires. To ensure statistical accuracy a control group were also assessed. The effort and organisation was enormous and I would like to thank everyone that took part. The main findings were that pupils made substantial and significant gains in numeracy (bringing their performance closer to the expected level for their age group;) reading comprehension improved and ICT skills improved significantly.





HEROD'S 90 SECONDS OF FAME



A film crew arrived and spent an hour in the centre while pupils from Herod Parkway School interviewed Guiliano Grazioli and Danny Invincibile.
