

I look forward to monitoring Matty in training and perhaps there will be a further update later in the week.



Swindon Town

This evening we give a warm Boundary Park welcome to Swindon Town, managed by Andy King who is now in his second spall in charge. Over the last few weeks the Robins have slowly but surely edged themselves back up the table having lost their form before Christmas.

In fact, if you glance at the League table you will see that Swindon - a Football league club since 1920 - are not too far off the play-off zone...although they are still looking behind them as their points tally does tend to place them on the brink of those clubs trying to pull clear of the relegation zone.

Earlier this season the Robins were playing some excellent football. They caused a mini shock by beating Wolverhampton Wanderers in the Worthington Cup at Molineux - and then they took West Bromwich Albion to extra-time in the next round before losing 2-0. These performances clearly indicated at the time that the Robins would be no easy pickings as the season continued. And so it has proved. They are have a competent bunch of players - some vastly experienced -and will give nothing less than 110 per-cent out on the park against the Latics, hoping to avenge last season's 1-0 reverse.

Last Season Swindon Town, managed now by Andy King (who is in his second spell in charge incidentally) battled hard and long throughout last season and eventually scrambled to safety, finishing one place above the drops-zone with 52 points. In fact, they finally pulled clear with one game to play at the end the season, beating Peterborough United 2-1 at

On their travels in 2000-01 the Robins won more games that they did at home (seven against six). They also drew five times and collected 26 points, exactly half of their overall

Defensively they were solid enough, conceding only 30 goals in 23 away games - but they were poor scorers themseives, mustering only

This disappointing strike record certainly made them into a struggling and indeed in late February they were actually anchored at the foot of the Division, struggling both at home and away to string together a decent run. Relegation was starring the Robins smack in the face!

But as the season progressed, results began to pick up and in the end Swindon just did enough to retain their Second Division status. But it was close, mighty close!

So far this season The Robins have played 25 League games (13 at home, 12 away). On the road they have lost 1-0 at Blackpool, drawn 00 with Bournemouth, lost 3-1 at Bristol City, won 3-0 at Gigg Lane against Bury, crashed 4-0 at Chesterfield, shared the spoils at 1-1 with Northampton Town, slumped to another 3-1 defeat at Notts County, won 2-0 at Port Vale, got hammered 4-0 for the second time at QPR, beat Reading 3-1 (one of their best displays of the season), succumbed to a 1-0 defeat at Wigan and drew 1-1 at Adams Park with Wycombe Wanderers.

Also they were beaten in a Worthington Cup replay at West Brom and slipped out in the 3rd round of the FA Cup, beaten 2-0 by highflying Manchester City at Maine Road (after a gritty performance).

The Squad

The Swindon Town the squad (formerly under the control of the ex-Liverpool manager Roy Evans who left before Christmas) is now under the strict supervision of the former Everton. QPR, Luton Town, WBA and Wolves midfielder

Bromwich Albion in the mid-1980s; Andy Gurney (once of Bristol Rovers, Torquay United and Reading); Matt Heywood (who was signed from Burnley two years ago); the vastly experienced figure of Neil 'Razor' Ruddock (who has been in the game for 16 years, having started out with Millwall and later serving with Tottenham Hotspur, Southampton, Liverpool, QPR, West Ham and Crystal Palace - and of course England); David Duke (ex-Sunderland), the aggressive and combative midfielder Bobby Howe; defenders Alan Reeves (who in the past has assisted Norwich City, Gillinghaam, Chester, Rochdale and Wimbledon); penalty-expert Keith O'Halloran, 25 year-old Matt Hewlett (ex-Bristol City); Cheltenham-born Sol Davis, Joe Osei-Kuffour; Steve Robinson (a former Spurs apprentice who has also been with Bournemouth and Preston); Paul Edwards; Paul McAreavey (from Belfast); the versatile Danny Invincible, Frenchman Eric Sabin (who is now fit again after a knee injury), Gareth Davies (a former Welsh Under-21 international), Berti Brayley (on loan from West Ham United) and striker Gulliano



Goalkeeper BART GRIEMINK(Pictured Left) who was born in Holland on 29 March 1972 played for WK Emmen in the Netherlands before joining Birmingham City in 1995. From St Andrew's he switched to Peterborough United for £25,000 in 1996 (signed by his former manager at St Andrew's. Barry Fry) and after a loan spell with Swindon Town, he moved permanently to The County ground in July 2000 on a free transfer. Standing 6ft 4in tall and weighing well over 15 stones, Greimink is exceptionally agile, a safe handler and fine shot-stopper. He has now appeared in more than 150 senior games in

Rugged defender NEIL 'Razor' RUDDOCK (Pictured top right) had two spells with Tottenham Hotspur (the first from April 1986 to June 1988 and the second from July 1992 to July 1993). He made a total of 59 firstclass appearances for the White Hart Lane club, scoring four goals. Born in Wandsworth on 9 May 1968, he started out as a professional with Millwall, joined Spurs, first time round, for £50,000 and returned to The Den for £300,000 (good business). In

1989 Ruddock, tough and rugged, switched his allegiance to Southampton, bought for £250,000 and it cost Spurs £750,000 to get him back! His next move took him to Liverpool for £2.5 million in July 1997 and after that he served with three London clubs, QPR, West Ham United (signed for £100,000) and Crystal Palace before joining Swindon



NEIL RUDDOCK

Town last summer. When the 2000-01 season ended Ruddock, capped by England at full, 'B', Under-21 and Youth team levels and a League Cup winner with Liverpool in 1995, had accumulated in excess of 450 club and international appearances.

MANAGER

Midfielder Andy King has had an excellence career in League football - certainly and a player. Born in Luton on 14 August 1956, he represented Luton & Dunstable Schools, Bedfordshire Boys and Stopsley Youths and had unsuccessful trials with Tottenham Hotspur before signing apprentice forms for the Hatters as a 16 year-old, turning professional at Kenilworth Road in July 1974. He went on to appear in 33 League games for Luton before transferring to Everton for £35,000 in March 1976. During his four years at Goodison Park he amassed 151 First Division appearances and scored 38 goals, helping the Merseysiders get into the UEFA Cup for the 1978-79 season.

In September 1980, King moved to Queens Park Rangers for £425,000. Twelve months later he joined West Bromwich Albion for £400,000 and was a member of the Baggies' FA Cup semi-final side (v. QPR) in 1982 before returning to Goodison Park in July 1982 in an exchange deal involving former Wolves man

Peter Eastoe, plus £250,000.

In August 1984 King went over to Holland to sign for S.C. Cambuur, returning to England to sign for Wolves in January 1985. He spent 11 months at Molineux (finishing up as top scorer in 1985-86 under Bill McGarry) having had a loan spell with Orebo FC (Sweden) (April/May 1985).

He rejoined his first 'love' Luton Town in December 1985 and later assisted Aldershot (August 1986), Aylesbury 1988), Waterford (as player-manager from August 1988), Cobh

Rambiers (January 1989) and Southport (August 1989).

He then chose to return to Kenilworth Road as Commercial Manager and moved back into football management with Mansfield Town in November 1993, holding that position at Field Mill until September 1996 when he was replaced by another ex-West Brom player, Steve Parkin. He edged himself back into League management with Swindon Town in 2001 - after Colin Todd had left the struggling Wiltshire club - but was then replaced by Roy Evans, only to reclaim the position before Christmas.

In his playing career King amassed exactly 350 League appearances and scored almost 100 goals. He was capped twice by England at Under-21 level.

DID YOU KNOW?

* Ernie Hunt was leading scorer for Swindon
Town in four successive seasons: 1960-64 with
14, 18, 224 and 12 League goals respectively.

* Swindon Town found themselves 2-0 down
to Bournemouth in a Third Division (S) game
in January 1926. They bounced back in style,
winning 8-2 with Frank 'Swerver' Richardson
scoring four times.

* Swindon reached the FA Cup semi-finals twice in three years (1910 & 1912) and in 1969 they beat Arsenal 3-1 to win the League Cup Final at Wembley, claiming the Anglo-Italian Cup twelve months later.

LAST TIME HERE

Swindon's last League visit to Boundary Park ended in a 1-0 defeat in October 2000. Craig Dudley scored the only goal of the game after 72 minutes in front of 4,009 spectators. After this result the Latics moved up a place to 22nd in the Second Division while Swindon were 19th.

NEXT AT BOUNDARY PARK

WREXHAM are our next visitors to Boundary Park. The Welsh club travels down from their Racecourse Ground on Saturday for a 3.00pm kick-off and will be desperate for a result. They are currently struggling at the bottom end of the Second Division and their away form leaves a lot to be desired.

Manager Denis Smith, a vastly experienced professional, having plated over 400 games for Stoke City before becoming a soccer boss with Bristol City, Sunderland, Oxford United and West Bromwich Albion, has struggled to keep a settled side since taking charge last year (from Brian Flynn).

Dumped out of the FA Cup by non-League Hereford United, Wrexham have, in recent weeks, 'not been at the races' says Smith and he knows full well that points will have to start rolling in pretty quickly or relegation will be looming the welsh club smack in the face. So far this season Wrexham have won just two league games on the road - 2-0 at Cambridge United and 3-2 at Wigan Athletic. Their heaviest defeats have been suffered at Huddersfield where they crashed 5-1 and Tranmere where they were demolished to the

They simply can't score goals - only 14 away from home so far (in 13 starts). They have been beaten 10 times in all and Smith is now depending on some of his veteran campaigners to help tun the tide.

tune of 5-0.

The squad Smith has had available (of late) has comprised the following: goalkeeper Kristian Rogers (currently first choice) and Welsh Under-21 international David Walsh; defenders Brian Carey, Jim Whitley (on loan from Manchester City), David Warren, Peter Holmes and the versatile Steve Roberts, midfielders Paul Barrett, Steve Thomas, Wayne Phillips, Dennis Lawrence, Darren Ferguson (a former Old Trafford player and son of Manchester United's Sir Alex) and forwards Michael Blackwood, Hector Sam, Andy Morrell, Martyn Chalk (ex Derby County and Walsall) and Carlos Edwards. Another striker, Craig Faulconbridge (ankle) may still be sidelined through injury, likewise Lee Trundle (suspended) and Kevin Sharp (ankle), although the latter duo may be available albeit only as a substitutes (due to lack of match practice). But Keith Hill (hernia) will certainly be missing and so could Kevin 'Rooster' Russell who has not figured for quite awhile.

Whatever line-up Smith chooses to send out, you can be sure that the Wrexham players will be totally committed and eager to gain the right result, which could just be the firing pin to re-ignite their season. On the other hand the Latics will be keen to go one better than the 3-3 draw they earned at the Racecourse Ground on the opening day of the season. Another six-goal thriller wouldn't go amiss especially if the Latics won 4-2 (or better).



he Latics left-back is still revered for his spectacular long-range strikes, even though it will soon be 25 years since he left Boundary Park.
Whittle joined Latics on a free transfer in 1969 from Blackburn Rovers, for whom he made seven league appearances, they were at a low ebb.

But within the space of less than five years, Whittle had helped hoist Latics from near the foot of Division Four to the Second Division.

Latics Legends

Whittle, converted by Jimmy Frizzell from wing half to left back, was a star performer in the Third Division titlewinning campaign of 1974/74.

He scored nine league goals, though seven were penalties, still a significant contribution to only the second of three championships Latics have ever won.

Frizzell still remembers Whittle, who made 343 firstteam appearances for Latics between 1969/77 scoring 41 times, with great affection. He said: "Maurice came as a wing half but his early form was disappointing so I switched him to left back where he was an immediate success.

"Maurice lacked pace, but what a left peg he had and he would have been a firstclass full back/wing back today.

"His free kicks were

JJB Sports, is still actively involved in football. He runs twice weekly evening coaching sessions for youngsters in hometown Wigan and an annual soccer school each summer. Whittle said: "I probably enjoy working with kids more than I did with players at semi-professional and league clubs.

"They are so keen and, if they learn something as well, that is the icing on the cake."

Whittle recalled how his career took off with Latics after being freed by Blackburn.

He said: "I was once a midfield player so you could say I worked my way back. "Jimmy Frizzell switched me to left back, though initially I couldn't get into the side because 1966 World Cup winner Ray Wilson and David Bright were the first choices.

"When they were both injured I got my chance and never looked back. And I was fortunate with injuries

and did not miss many matches.

"The Third Division championship season obviously stands out and I can remember being well adrift at Christmas. "We strung together 10

straight wins and from what I can recall won the title by one point."

Whittle helped Latics establish themselves in the Second Division before embarking upon an adventure in the North American Soccer League. We spent three years with the Fort Lauderdale Strikers, initially joining them on loan for the summer before it became a permanent move. The NASL was at the height of its success and Whittle could count former West German legend Gerd Muller and Peruvian star Veofilo Cubilas as team mates. Opponents included Gordon Banks, Frans Beckenbaur, George Best, Rodney Marsh, Georgie Chinaglia and Pele.

Whittle said: "It was a lot of fun and nice to play with and against players like those mentioned.

"In the first year we won our division which included the likes of New York Cosmos and Tampa Bay Rowdies who were the two fancied teams."

Whittle would return home

for the winter rejoining
Latics and later having stints
with Wigan Athletic,
Southport and Barrow
having several spells at the
latter including one as
manager.

He also had one season as player-manager of Finnish club OBS and he says it could not have offered a more stark contrast to America.

"It was quite a shock to the system going from Florida sunshine to the sub-zero temperatures of Finland. "Finland was an altogether different experience to America, but it was a chance to sample another country."








A Smart Move For Allan



If Latics need a goodluck charm in their bid for promotion, they ought to look no further than new-signing Allan Smart.

he 27-year-old Scot signed from Watford for £225,000 can proudly boast that he has savoured the moment at every club he has been at.

And it comprises quite a list - St Johnstone, Brechin, Inverness Caledonian, Preston, Carlisle and Watford.

Throw in a couple of relegations with Carlisle and Watford and there hasn't been many mundane seasons in Smart's eventful career.

Smart explained: "I have lost count but there has been six or

seven promotions.

"The only one missing is promotion from Division Two so hopefully I can put that right." And Smart added that the vibes he has received so far at Boundary Park have been encouraging.

He said: "When you have been involved in so many promotions, as well as a couple of relegations, you know when the manager is getting things right.

"And it certainly feels that way here. It is similar to Watford when, under Graham Taylor, we went up to the Premiership. Now, as then, there was a good spark and the training was lively."

Smart believes Latics have a great chance saying their current form is that of champions.

He added that when he spoke to

head coach Mick Wadsworth and chairman Chris Moore he immediately realised the club was on the 'front foot.'

Incredibly Latics are Smart's fourth club of the season which has been eventful both on and off the field.

Smart enjoyed some special times at Watford which included scoring in the First Division play-off final against Bolton at Wembley.

He said: "The Wembley goal was a dream, but one which gave me a lot of satisfaction was my first in the Premiership in a 1-0 win against Chelsea.

"You wonder and ask yourself if you can do it at the top level." It was injury which effectively ended his Vicarage Road days as when he returned following a lengthy lay off they had a settled side so he found opportunities limited.

He claimed Watford priced him out of a move late last season and when he remained in a state of limbo at the start of the current campaign jumped at the chance to go to Hibernian on a three month loan.

He viewed it as a great opportunity to put himself in the shop window. Sadly during his time there he made only two starts which baffled him and made him wonder why they took him in the first place.

"I scored on my debut and was dropped for the next game. It was more frustrating than had I stayed at Watford," he declared. And things did not improve when

he then went on loan to Stoke where he did not make a start. The fact that Smart was desperately unhappy undoubtedly had a bearing on being sent off for thumping John Sheridan during Latics' match at the Britannia Stadium.

Smart said: "I knew before the game Oldham were interested and that made the sending off so disappointing.

"Fortunately the manager had faith in me, and I am desperate to repay

"When I signed for Oldham days later I said to my wife that I would have to walk into the dressing room and eat humble pie.

"The lads have been brilliant and luckily have taken it the right way. There was a pair of boxing gloves stuck up on my first day. I still get stick, but it is in good spirits."

That was not the last of Smart's troubles, however, as he landed himself in a spot of bother during the player's Christmas night out, something which cannot be discussed for legal reasons.

Smart said: "When you look at what has happened I must appear a lunatic to those on the outside. "But it is not a reflection of the person I am. I find it unbelievable what has happened. I have only been sent off twice in my entire career."

Smart has also had to uproot his family from Buckinghamshire. Wife Janette, who is nine months' pregnant, two-year-old son Kian and Smart are staying with his inlaws at Chorley.

They thought they had found a

new home but it fell through so the house hunting has begun again.

"It has been a strange, if not bizarre, season and one which I have lived almost entirely out of a suitcase.

"My in-laws have done us a great favour but moving is one of the perils of being a

professional footballer."
Smart added that it was a wrench to leave Watford as his family was settled. He pointed out it would have been easy to sit out the 18 remaining months of his contract and pick up a good salary.

"Watford aren't far off the play offs and who knows they might be in the Premiership again next season. "I need to be playing regularly which is why I decided to join Latics to try and kick start my career. And from initial impressions it has been a good move for me," he concluded.

Of all Latics' home-grown players there can be few, if any, who can rival Gary Hoolickin for loyalty.

he versatile defender, instantly recognisable by his flame-coloured hair, was a one-club man spending 15 years at Boundary Park.

Gary followed in the footsteps of older brother Stephen, who made eight League appearances for Latics, when he became an apprentice in 1974.

In the early years Gary, who was handed his debut against Luton in the final match of 1976/77 season, had the unrewarding role of understudy to Ian Wood as the reliable right back clocked up his club record 525 League

appearances.

Gary eventually established himself as a valuable first-team player equally at home at right back or centre of defence. And but for being bedevilled by injury - a cruciate knee ligament ended his career - he would have made more than 244 first-team appearances for Latics, his one and only League club.

Gary's efforts were rewarded in 1986 with a testimonial against Manchester City, though it only earned him a modest sum to help him set out on a new life outside football. After running a pub in Middleton for seven years, Gary now buys and sells property.

He explains that during the summer break during his playing days he worked in the building trade to learn the ropes as even then he had one eye on the future.

It was hardly surprising Gary became a professional footballer as Stephen had a long career in the game with Latics, Bury, Carlisle and Hull while Dave, another elder brother, had a spell at Manchester City.

Gary was spotted by Latics playing for the Middleton town team and Lancashire Boys and signed schoolboy forms. He added that only since the death of his father he realised how sought after he was as a youngster.

"We were having a clearout and I found letters from Leeds United, Manchester City and Crystal Palace who were all interested," he explained.

Gary has no regrets saying he enjoyed every minute of his

time at Boundary Park.

He said: "I was fortunate to have such a long career and but for injury may be it may have been for a year or two more. "You have to feel sorry for those players who have to finish

so young. That is why I served on the testimonial committee for Wayne Harrison when he had to do so in his early twenties."

Gary signed for Latics as an apprentice at the end of the season in which they won the Third Division title.

And even in those long-gone days, Latics were producing

their own players.

Steve Edwards came through at the same time as Gary while Graham Bell and Keith Hicks had just established themselves. Gary also remembers the likes of John Ryan, Paul Atkinson and Jim Steel and is full of praise for the work done by Bill

He added it was hard establishing himself in the side as he was taking over from long-serving players like Ian Wood and Ronnie Blair.

"They were big names in that era having made a lot of appearances. And both were great servants to the club," he explained.

When Gary looks back to his own career he says he was privileged to play against some of the game's top names such as Kevin Keegan, Ian Rush, Kenny Dalglish and Peter Shilton.

"I have a lot of great memories. I always enjoyed playing on

the big grounds in front of big crowds," he enthused. And it was fitting that Jimmy Frizzell, who signed him as an apprentice, should bring his Manchester City team to Boundary Park for his testimonial.

Gary followed Latics avidly during the glory days and was at Wembley to watch them in the final of the Littlewoods Cup. He also went to see many of the other big games during the 1989/90 "pinch me" season.

He said: "Nobody was more proud than me when Latics won promotion to the First Division which is now the Premiership and it was great to know that I had helped them along the

"And in recent years I have been gutted to see them slip down to what was the old Third Division."

Gary also followed Latics intently later when son Anthony was a trainee at the club.

Sadly he wasn't taken on as a professional and is now a decorator though he still plays Sunday football.

Gary said: "We had the extremes. I had such a long career while Anthony was released in his teens.

"He was borderline as to being kept on. But he was big enough to take the decision and to start his life afresh outside football."

An unwanted record

ATHLETIC'S relegation in 1996/97 meant they had tumbled from the Premiership to the second division in the space of just three years.

With their glory days so fresh in the memory, it was a sickening blow to everyone at Boundary Park.

ot since the early 1970s had Latics tasted life outside English football's top two divisions. But that was the fate which awaited them after a season of stress which began badly and failed to get much better.

CASHING IN

By the time the season was in full swing, Athletic's defence had been torn apart. On July 26, local lad Chris Makin became the first-ever player to take advantage of the Bosman ruling by moving abroad as a free agent. The full-back, who now stars in the Premiership for Ipswich, joined French giants Marseilles when Latics hoped he would stay in England and pocket them a fee of around £500,000. Only five days later, another product of the Boundary Park youth system

was on his way out. Goalkeeper Paul Gerrard was snapped up by Everton - though this time there was healthy consolation in the form of £1million. And that wasn't all. A third highly-rated player was wanted in the top flight and Athletic couldn't stand in his way. He was Norwegian

international Gunnar Halle, who spent six years at the club before Leeds signed him for £400,000.

The gaps had to be plugged, of course, and manager Graeme Sharp found a new 'keeper for one per cent of the fee he received for Gerrard. Gary Kelly cost just £10,000 but, as he has since played over 200 games for the club, it



was a wise investment. Centre-back Shaun Garnett cost £150,000 from Swansea, while a new striker arrived - or rather returned - when Ian Ormondroyd signed. It wasn't looking good,



though, as Athletic were in the process of setting an unwanted record.

BLUNTED

Sharp's team had an awful opening to 96/97, losing to Stoke, Crystal Palace and Swindon in their first three games.

There was a 3-3 draw against Ipswich, with Paul Rickers scoring after 15 seconds, but points stayed few and far between.


Latics travelled to Charlton in the knowledge that if they didn't win, it would be the worst start in the club's history.

They lost. And when a victory finally came in early October -Ormondroyd and Nicky Banger on target against Port Vale - it had taken 11 league games to

Inevitably, Athletic were bottom of division one and already playing catch-up with the teams above them. After beating Vale, they went another four games without

winning and had a grand total of eight points from 15 matches.

Sharp, in his first managerial post, decided a lack of goals was the problem and set about finding new players. But Mark Bright turned down a loan move from Sheffield Wednesday, Tranmere's Graham Branch also decided to stay put ... and Athletic couldn't escape the drop zone.

THE HANDOVER

D-Day arrived on February 10 when rock-bottom Athletic parted company with their manager.

They had just slumped 3-0 at home to struggling Grimsby and Sharp's resignation along with that of assistant Colin Harvey - came less than two and a half years after their appointment.

Athletic turned to experience, recruiting Neil Warnock in the hope he would trouble-shoot them to safety.

With an eye on the future, they also brought Andy Ritchie back from Scarborough, though Warnock later named his own right-hand man in Ron Reid.

Transfer activity stepped up as the new boss, well known for his wheeler-dealing, looked for a winning formula.

He kicked off with a home defeat to Bradford, but a strong debut by Aussie defender Doug Hodgson helped Latics beat OPR 1-0 and secure a seventh win of the season. By now, however, it was March and there was no time to waste in following up that precious victory. Athletic


couldn't do it, despite moving for Lee Duxbury (£350,000 from Bradford), Mark Foran (on loan from

Peterborough), Paul Reid

(£150,000 from Huddersfield) and Matthew Rush (£165,000 from Norwich).

The deals were financed by selling Nick Henry and David Beresford, and results did show a slight improvement. Warnock was rewarded with a 12-month contract. But his efforts were to no avail and Athletic finished in 23rd place, unable to make up for that horrendous start.


1982 Re-visited

Joe Royle's appointment as Latics' manager in July 1982 proved one, if not the most defining moment in the club's recent history.

It was under Royle in the late eighties and early nineties that Latics enjoyed their most successful-ever period. Latics finish the 1981/82 campaign in a respectable 11th place in Division Two - today's First - and Jimmy Frizzell was already planning ahead when the board delivered a bombshell. Frizzell was sensationally sacked after 22 years as player and manager, and with two years remaining on his contract. He had hoisted them from the foot of the Fourth Division to the top half of Division Two.

"There is no particular reason for our decision, but we feel that the club needs a new challenge, and people coming through the





turnstiles. We are hoping for a new impetus throughout the club," a club spokesman explained. Latics had 30 applicants for the manaerial vacancy but despite what the club has long maintained, Royle was not the unanimous choice as they claimed. John Wile, the former West Brom centre half, accepted the job only to have an 11th hour change of

So it was by fate, destiny or whatever that Royle was confirmed as manager on Wednesday, July 14, 1982. He was 33 years of age with his career having been ended by injury.

Boardroom politics saw Harry Wilde resign as Chairman in mid-September with Ian Stott, a board member since 1974, taking over at the helm.

He was immediately confronted by a financial crisis which was solved when brewers J W Lees, the club's major shareholder, bought the Boundary Club and sports hall complex (Clayton Arms), discharged the club's bank overdraft, loans and other debts and breathed an air of hope and optimism into the club.

Despite the financial cloud hanging over the club, Royle enjoyed a moderately successful first season with Latics finishing seventh and only nine points behind Leicester who occupied the third promotion place.

SPORTS STORIES Italy were the surprise winners of the World Cup for a third time after stuttering into the second phase in Spain following draws in all three games in the opening phase. They then exploded to life beating holders Argentina, favourites Brazil, Poland, who were to finish third, and European Champions West Germany in the final. England could not have made a better start as Bryan Robson after 27 seconds of their opening game against France in Bilbao. Sadly England went out in the second phase, even though they were unbeaten in the whole tournament. How unlucky! Bobby Robson succeeded Don Greenwood as England manager after 13 successful years in charge at Ipswich Town. QPR became the first British club

to play a league game on an artificial surface. Oldham, Luton and Preston followed, but in 1994 they were banned.

Liverpool were crowned League Champions for a 13th time while Tottenham retained the F.A. Cup, though the Falklands war hung over the final against Second Division OPR.

Twenty-four hours before the final the British task force landed in the Falklands making it impossible for Argentinian duo Osvaldo Ardilles and Ricardo Ville to play.

Geoff Boycott became the most prolific run scorer in Test cricket then was one of the 'dirty dozen' to sign up for a rebel tour of South Africa. It earned them a three-year ban from Test cricket so ended the international careers of Boycott, Mike Hendrick, Alan Knott, Chris Old and Derek Underwood.

Gilles Villeneuve, the French Canadian Formula One driver, was killed in practice at the Belgian Grand Prix. and Colin Chapman, one of motor racing's great



innovators, died of a heart attack at the age of 54.

The Falklands conflict was the major news story of the year as Britain went to war with Argentina over the islands in the South Atlantic.

It began when Argentina invaded the Falklands and neighbouring South Georgia in support of a long-standing claim over their

Britain took swift action sending a task force to reclaim the territory which had been taken.

They succeeded but it was a war which cost the lives of 254 British servicemen along with 750 Argentinians.

The IRA carried out two of its worst atrocities attacking the Queen's Household Cavalry as they were making their way to Whitehall for ceremonial guard duty.

The second bomb went off under the bandstand in Regents Park where members of the Royal Green Jackets were giving a concert.

But on a more cheerful note the Prince and Princess of Wales celebrated the birth of their son William, a royal heir to the throne. And the Mary Rose, the flagship of Henry VIII's fleet, was raised from the seabed off Southsea in the English Channel

Wrexham make the trip across from North Wales this Saturday hoping to improve on recent results which has seen them fighting a relegation battle. The two sides


