I was disappointed with the match against Oldham as I thought we could have done a lot better particularly when they went down to ten men. We struggled in the final third. Overall it wasn't one of our better performances even though everyone won their individual battles. But when it came to that last ball, that last touch, that cross or finish we lacked what was required. It needed someone to put their foot on the ball, weave a bit of magic and smack the ball right into the top corner. Then I believe a few more would have flown in. But it was just one of those days when nothing quite seemed to go right although I'm sure that will soon be put right.

Oldham were looking to slow it down as that's the way they like to play and we were trying to keep the tempo up. But it was hard doing that and no doubt contributed to how poor the game was. Maybe on a slightly cooler day it would have been a bit livelier and a few more passes may have been strung together. But we just have to get on with it whatever the conditions.

I felt though that we capitalised on our youth against their more experienced, and older players, and didn't allow players such as Eyres and



Sheridan much time on the ball. So in that aspect we did quite well and closed them down. But it was that little bit of experience in getting the ball down and getting into the right places that we lacked on the day. The heat was awful. Everytime you ran the full length of the field it felt like you didn't have any energy to get back, and it didn't matter how much fluid you took on from the side of the pitch, it wasn't enough to compensate for what you were losing. So it was very hard for everyone out there particularly in that sort of game.

Obviously it's early days, and of course these notes were written before the weekend matches, but at the moment Swindon look to be doing quite well which doesn't surprise me as they always appear to be a team who will give 100%. So it'll be a hard battle and hopefully, with your help, we can achieve another three points.

No goals at Griffin Park on what was an extraordinarily hot day,

and apart from a sending off on the hour mark there was also very little incident.

It was the experience of Oldham Athletic against the youth and inexperience of Brentford...and the elements won the day. Another day it may well have been a

different story, but with supporters waning in the heat it was a gruelling afternoon for the players.



There were few chances of any note for either side although the Bees did force 10 corners in total to the visitors three.



Wally Downes selected the same side that had gleaned 3 points against Bristol City four days earlier. But it was Athletic who forced the games first corner when Michael Clegg's shot was cleared by Michael Dobson and Carlo Corazzin's follow up shot flew wide.

Brentford won their first corner five minutes later when Dobbo dispossessed David Eyres only to see his resultant centre cleared away over the byeline.

Little of note happened until good interplay involving Mark McCammon and Stephen Hunt led to a fine centre and the first of two blocks leading to two more corners. In the 34th and 35th minutes, Matty Appleby and Fitz Hall were both shown yellow cards for tackles on Hunt as he looked to run clear.

Two minutes later Dobbo this time dispossessed Chris Killen, played a one two with McCammon, played an excellent ball into the area only to see it headed away for another corner.

The half effectively ended when Dobbo was on the line to clear from an Appleby shot.

Six minutes after the break Corazzin had a great chance to secure the lead for the visitors. But having run clear his shot was blocked by the outstretched foot of Paul Smith. Play immediately moved to the other end where Hunt picked up the ball wide and centred, whereupon McCammon saw his header fly wide of the target.

Sixty seconds later excellent

defensive play by Jay Smith saw him deprive Killen of an opportunity to run clear when well placed on the edge of the area.

Then on the hour mark, following a clumsy challenge on Rowan Vine, Hall was shown another yellow card and the resultant red.



But as has so often proved in the past, the task of beating ten men is no easier than that against eleven, Mind you the Bees did try and they not unexpectedly enjoyed most



of the possession for the remaining half hour.

But for all of that Oldham may well have snatched three points in the final few minutes when second half substitute Josh Low flashed his shot across the face of the goal and just beyond the far post.

The final whistle no doubt came as a blessed relief for both sets of players, and both managers must have been reasonably happy with the outcome on one of the hottest days of the year.

# FRANKLY SPEAKING

### PENALTY SHOOT OUTS

There are two aspects of modern day football organisation that I dislike. Firstly the "Play Offs". Plenty was written about them at the end of last season when we made our fourth unsuccessful attempt to win them. Secondly the Penalty Shoot Out. I'm an advocate of the Golden Goal system, with it continuing until somebody scores, however long it takes! In this article I propose to look back at the seven occasions Brentford have taken part in penalties to decide the outcome of a cuptie.

The first came in February 1990 in the Leyland Daf Cup. Neil Smillie gave the Bees an early lead but Rovers equalised to force extra time. When Bristol scored again all looked lost before Dean Holdsworth headed home in the last minute of extra time to force the tie into the penalty shoot out. With former Bee Ian Holloway, now QPR manager, missing first and Roger Stanislaus, Dean Holdsworth and Allan Cockram converting, the Bees led 3-2 with two penalties left each. What happened? Rovers scored their last two and Brentford substitutes Gary Blissett and John Buttigieg missed to enable Rovers to progress to the next round. A year later, again in the Leyland Daf, Brentford were involved in another penalty shoot out. This time the opponents were Fourth Division strugglers Wrexham. After a goalless 120 minutes came the shoot out. Bees' supporters were not very confident as regular penalty takers Dean Holdsworth and Allan Cockram had been substituted during the match. Brentford triumphed, however, by 3-0 as Keith Jones and Neil Smillie scored, Jason Cousins effort went over the bar and Kevin Godfrey converted. The real hero, however, was Graham Benstead. He saved all three Wrexham penalties and looked invincible in the Bees' goal. Brentford's third penalty shoot out brought together my own personal nightmare, losing a shoot out in a Play Off. 1995 saw the Bees and Huddersfield level at 2-2 after 210 minutes football. Of course we lost on penalties 4-3. Regular penalty taker Martin Grainger and Robert Taylor both scored before Denny Mundee didn't. Simon Ratcliffe then converted before captain Jamie Bates didn't and Brentford's promotion hopes had gone.

Usually on leaving the ground people are chatting away happily if the Bees have won, or moaning if we've lost. On this occasion there was an almost eerie silence as we all filed away back to our cars.

1997/98 saw Brentford draw 2-2 with Colchester at Griffin Park in the FA Cup First Round thanks to two Robert Taylor goals. The replay finished 0-0 after extra time sending the tie into penalties. Carl Hutchings and Charlie Oatway both scored but Marcus Bent and Jamie Bates, again, didn't and the Bees were out of the Cup (4-2). Incidentally does anyone agree with me that our new signing Leon Constantine has the same build and running style as Marcus Bent? 1998/99 saw Brentford in two penalty shoot outs. In the FA Cup Second Round Replay the Third Division Bees held Oldham to a 2-2 draw after extra time, following a 1-1 draw at Boundary Park. It was Second Division Athletic who triumphed in the shoot out by 4-2. Martin Rowlands failed to convert before Charlie Oatway and Tony Folan were successful but Robert Quinn's miss virtually sealed things

Second Division Walsall knocked Brentford out of the Auto Windscreen Shield a month later 4-3 on penalties after a 0-0 draw. On this occasion Charlie Oatway missed. Gavin Mahon, Hermann Hreidarsson and Tony Folan scored before liah Anderson missed the last kick. Brentford's seventh penalty shoot out ended with a win. Bees were two down to Brighton in an LDV tie at Griffin Park in January 2001. This was Brighton's home game but as the Withdean was flooded the match was played here. Scott Marshall pulled one back before Mark McCammon equalised. There was no golden goal so penalties followed. When Paul Evans had his effort saved another shoot out defeat looked likely but Martin Rowlands, Scott Marshall, Lloyd Owusu and Paul Gibbs all scored to secure victory. Even then the Brentford Penalty Shoot Out curse could be said to have struck as the two Brighton players to miss were Paul Watson and Darren freeman, ex Brentford players. In addition another ex Bee Danny Cullip, was sent off and another, Charlie Oatway, missed the game due to suspension. So, to date, we have taken part in seven penalty shoot outs, winning two and losing five. You can see why I ll be quite happy if we don't take part in a penalty shoot out again!

# BEE-HIND THE LINES

Is the day approaching when a Premiership club is given the green light to take a poor Nationwide League cousin under its wing and use it as a stepping stone for some of its promising youngsters?

As it stands at present the gap between reserve team football and the Premiership is enormous and a lower Division tie-up could help pave the way to the top for more young English talent.

With the transfer market in disarray it might well work to the benefit of all. The Premiership club could farm the youngster out for a season and keep tabs on his progress in a far more competitive grade of football. The Nationwide club would benefit from a subsidised talent on the team roster who otherwise might be out of their league, financially.

You could argue this is pretty much what happens now, especially as the ruling governing the number of



The Cherries Ferdinand loanees has been relaxed still further. From this season it is possible to table a maximum of five loan players on the teamsheet each game, four of whom could be signed on a season long basis.

However, I still believe the "nursery" scheme is worth a second glance. The following is a simplistic view, but try it for size.

Brentford form a liaison with Arsenal and Chelsea which sees a selection of their most forward youngsters pull on a Bees' shirt for a season while the parent club assesses whether they will make the grade at the highest level.

Take it further.

Dennis Berkamp and Gianfranco Zola have been out injured. To help regain match fitness they are loaned to Brentford for a month.

Before anyone jumps down my throat, consider this: two of the most influential figures in the Bees' team which came within 12 minutes of automatic promotion last season were Steve Sidwell (Arsenal) and Ben Burgess (Blackburn).

Neither were our own and without the loan system we wouldn't have had a cat in hells chance of getting them to wear a Brentford shirt. So without Sidwell's flair (not to mention the cracker he scored against Stoke) and Big Ben's striking ability, it is unlikely we would have sustained a promotion challenge. Sidwell this season has been farmed out to Beveren in Belgium along with a few of his teammates, although he has subsequently returned! Wouldn't it be preferable if he showed off his talents again at Griffin Park?

More than 60 players have signed on loan for Brentford down the years, with various amounts of success. The likes of Paul Merson, Les Ferdinand and John Moncur went on to make it big in the Premier League and we had our moneysworth out of Detzi Kruszynski and Perry Suckling in the 1991-92 Championship campaign. For others it has been a case of "here today, gone tomorrow", but overall the system has worked in Brentford's favour.

And it is worth mentioning that David Beckham (Preston) and Rio

Ferdinand (AFC Bournmouth) tasted life under the loan system before moving into the superstar bracket. Brentford could even play piggy in the middle and tie up a deal with, say, Aldershot Town of the Ryman Premier and test out their own youngsters in a carbon copy of the Chelsea/Arsenal arrangement. Worth considering, or not? 0

## SWINDON TOWN

## Swindon have enjoyed a good start to the season both on and off the pitch.

While their League start mirrored ours, with two wins and a draw giving them seven points before Saturday's game with Cardiff, last Monday they also received the welcome news that they have come out of administration. Town's chief executive Mark Devlin told their official website: "Coming out of administration means that the club is now fully in charge of its own affairs and it is up to the board and I that we ensure that the club is run on professional business guidelines and builds upon the early success on the field."

That on-field success started on the opening day of the season when new signing Sam Parkin scored a hat-trick, the third goal a penalty, in a 3-1 win over relegated Barnsley. The goals continued flowing three nights later when they triumphed 4-2 at Chesterfield with Parkin again on target to follow two goals from Danny Invincible and one from Eric Sabin. However the scoring glut dried up nine days ago when The Robins dropped their first points of the season in a goalless draw at Blackpool.

With more stability at the club, manager Andy King will hope to build on last season and launch a promotion challenge. King was sacked a week before the last campaign started and was replaced by former Liverpool boss Roy Evans, but he resigned in midseason after being told there would be no money for new players, leading to King's return. The club spent most of the season in mid-table, eventually finishing 13th, which was probably a relief to their fans who had endured relegation from Division One in 1999/2000 and survival in Division Two by a single point the following campaign.

The highlight of the season probably came early on when they won 2-1 at First Division Wolves in the first round of the Worthington Cup before being put out 2-0 by West Brom in round two, while they enjoyed a third round day out in the FA Cup at Manchester City, where they lost 2-0.

#### FIVE FASCINATING FACTS ABOUT SWINDON

1 - Swindon have their place in football's statistical records - for both good and bad reasons. Their side which romped away with the Fourth Division title in 1985/86 set a new record points total of 102 a haul which was never eclipsed in the rest of the Division's history before it was renamed in 1992. However their Premiership squad of 1993/94 only mustered an alltime low of just five wins during the season in the new top flight, an amount matched by Leicester last season, while they conceded 100 goals in their 42 matches -

another record.

2 – Town defender John Trollope also has his place in football history after playing 770 League games in Swindon's colours between 1960 and 1980 – a record for a single club.

3 – The Robins pulled off one of the biggest Cup shocks in English history when they beat Arsenal 3-1 in the 1969 League Cup final at Wembley. Town were in the old Third Division at the time and Arsenal had only conceded 18 goals in their 30 League games in Division One at the time, but that proved irrelevant as Don Rogers scored twice in extra-time on an extremely muddy pitch to earn The Robins a 3-1 win.

4 – Swindon are the only club to date to win a play-off final but not be promoted. They had finished fourth in the old Second Division and after beating Blackburn 4-2 on aggregate in the semi-finals, an Alan McLoughlin goal gave them a 1-0 triumph over Sunderland at Wembley. However less than a fortnight later, the League relegated them from the First to the Third Divisions after they admitted breaches of League rules. They won their Second Division place back on appeal.

5 – The stand which used to be on the Shrivenham Road side of Swindon's County Ground was bought from the Aldershot military tattoo in 1958 and stood in its new home for 36 years.

#### LAST TIME

Swindon's last visit was only just a shade under six months ago on a Tuesday night in early March when two goals from Lloyd Owusu either side of half-time, his 16th and 17th League strikes of the season, gave us our first win over them here in six attempts. The result left both teams roughly in their finishing positions in the table.

Previous to that our last home victory over them had come back in April 1982. Terry Hurlock, Keith Bowen, Stan Bowles and Jim McNichol were on target for us with two Roy Carter penalties replying.

#### THE MANAGER

As mentioned earlier, Andy King is in his second spell in charge of Swindon, having replaced Roy Evans in December 2001. King worked as a coach at the County Ground while Colin Todd was in charge and took over from him as manager when he left the club in October 2000 and was at the helm until last August. He had started his managerial career with a three-year spell at Mansfield. He enjoyed a playing career as a striker at Luton (two spells), Everton (two spells), QPR, West Brom, SC Cambuur, Wolves and Aldershot.

#### THE PLAYERS

(Squad numbers in brackets) Former Dutch under-21 keeper Bart Griemink (1) (ex-Birmingham

and Peterborough) is likely to be between the posts this afternoon to continue his everpresent run from last season with youngster Craig Farr (32) on the bench. Australian Gareth Edds (2) (ex-Nottingham Forest), currently with Swindon on a non-contract basis, David Duke (11) (ex-Sunderland), Matthew Heywood (19) and Adam Willis (5) (ex-Coventry) are the likely back four with Alan Reeves (22) (ex-Norwich, Chester, Rochdale and Wimbledon), twin brother of Oldham's David, on the bench. #### A BARROW SPECIAL

A few weeks ago, I was on holiday in Cumbria, near to Barrow. So near in fact that I decided to pop along to see if I could find Holker Street. I found the ground, popped my head through the gate to take a few photographs and then heard this "oy". I thought here we go, it was the old "go away" routine common with London clubs. But no, I was beckoned in and invited to take some more photos, by Safety Manager George Woods. Then he offered Karen and myself a tour of the ground and then gave me some programmes! Northern hospitality!

The Barrow ground has changed quite a bit since our last visit in 1972. New stands have been erected and terracing removed (see pictures), but the pitch is immaculate and the groundstaff are rightly proud.

Earlier this year the club celebrated it's centenary and have played celebratory



games against Leeds and Man United. As many will be aware, Barrow spent 50 years as a League club and met the Bees on numerous occasions, primarily in the late 50's and 60's in Division 4. Indeed the

BARROW AFC visitors to Holker Street for two of the most significant games in Barrow's history. Firstly in 1967, when a goal from Tony Field assured Barrow 3rd place in D4 and a place in the Third Division. Around that

time Barrow included former Bee Billy McAdam, a former Northern Ireland international, in their line up. The second significant game came in April 1972, it was our turn for promotion and we won 3-0, unfortunately this transpired to be Barrow's final home League game as they were not re-elected and were replaced by Hereford. Since leaving the Football League, they have floated between the Northern Premier and Conference leagues. They were founder members of the Conference when it was formed as the Alliance Premier, but are now back in the Unibond, having been relegated for financial irregularities a few seasons ago. One of the clubs highlights in recent years was the 1990 FA Trophy win down the road at Wembley.

Crowds at Holker Street still average around 1,000-1,200 and they are still one of the best supported in their league. With the nearest big club, Preston, 1 hours away, they do have a good catchment area. On the other hand, the clubs remoteness does mean that higher wages do have to be paid to entice the players to make the long journey. On saying this, George did advise me that one of the current squad travels in from Hull!

Like a number of clubs, Barrow are currently in financial difficulties and are currently in liquidation. However, according to George, fundraising is going well and let's hope they can sort themselves out sooner rather than later.

### FEAR AND LOATHING IN TW8

Welcome back! Whilst domestic football took a break, the Super League season began to hot-up. Many supporters decided as the season got underway in March that the top four play-off places were safely accounted for by the 'big four' (Bradford, Wigan, St. Helens and Leeds) and they've mostly been correct. Add to the top six equation a resurgent Hull side, the surprise package of SL new boys Widnes and a season which has seen a good few upsets and Super League 7 will go down as a belter. But what of the only professional club outside the north? What of the nomadic London Broncos?

London came to Griffin Park after a traumatic two seasons at the Valley, 2001 seeing former owner Richard Branson sell his shares to David Hughes who has steadied the ship but kept a very low profile in comparison. The big signings of the final Branson season, hooker & skipper Jason Hetherington and half-back Jim 'Gucci' Dymock are still aboard the good ship London and have made vital contributions, although injury has affected Hetherington's season. Barnett succumbed to a mystery 'exhaustive condition' in July, the mystery deepening later when he signed a two-year deal with Hull...

The season got off to a dodgy start with another early exit from the Challenge Cup and four SL7 games without a win. Late March saw a home drubbing of St. Helens 40-6 (the first time London had beaten Saints in the capital). The Broncos then got into gear and chalked up four useful wins, pipping the in-form Bradford by 15-



14. Ironically, May was to see two more onepoint margins; London beating Wakefield 18-19 before losing to Widnes at GP by the same margin just six days later! Rugby league is a cruel game... The big four continued to dominate and the Broncos found them harder to crack, going down three times in succession as May became June. We then drew the short

straw again and departed for south-west France to face Warrington in this year's 'on the road' fixture. London are often given this due to our nomadic past. Despite scorching temperatures, London took the two points 30-18 which could prove crucial come the reckoning for the cut next month.

The Broncos raced into an 18-0 first-half lead and many thought the floodgates would open further after the restart. How wrong they were! Wakey roared back as London took



their foot off the gas and we went down 24-31. The points lifted Wakefield off the bottom and London coach Tony Rea went ballistic.

London now have the unenviable task of playing all of their final matches against teams above them in the table including all of the big four plus Hull. It's a massive challenge but London went back into sixth place a while back and look to be hanging on for dear life. Hopes are high of making the cut if London can raise their game and really mean business. The play-offs are very much their own entity and a fine season will count for nothing if a side are not in the hunt for a place. Seventh place is no place! As Super League 7 draws to a close, the race to make up the six takes on a new intensity. Keep your fingers crossed! PS...GP has been chosen to stage the England v New Zealand match in November, the first time international RL has been played at GP. It should be a great occasion. The Kiwis claimed their last tour here (98) 2-0 with one game drawn. London's former full-back Richie Barnett is likely to lead his countrymen for the tour.

#### GRAHAM HAYNES CONTINUES WITH HIS EXCELLENT SERIES IN WHICH HE SELECTS ONE MATCH FROM EACH SEASON AS HIS "MATCH TO REMEMBER"

Football at the League's lowest level (Division Four) was going through a particularly lean period at the turnstiles and for the first time since regionalisation was abandoned in 1958 the aggregate attendance slumped below 2 million (it was 4.2 million in 1958-59). Brentford had just experienced their worst average attendance (5,063) in 47 seasons membership of the Football League and this reflected the general air of gloom at Griffin Park. Behind the scenes the Board was in disarray and rookie manager Mike Everitt was running on empty with a squad of 15 plus five juniors. Little was expected and little achieved in the opening part of the campaign, although the Bees did give League leaders Liverpool a run for their money in a League Cup tie at Anfield, taking an early lead through Roger Cross before losing 2-1.

Results at home were fair to middling but a masochistic streak was required

to follow the team away, as the 1-0 victory at re-election regulars Workington late in November represented the first success in 20 games. The goalscorer was Willie Brown signed from Newport County a few weeks earlier along with Southend's Terry Johnson for £10,000 apiece. Resultwise their inclusion helped to slightly improve Brentford's League position although when Dan Tana was made chairman in succession to Les Davey in December, the writing was on the wall for the unfortunate Everitt.

Initially Tana gave the manager his "110% support" but his patience soon wore thin.

Brentford were in dire need of corrective surgery. After one match in which trainer Jess Willard picked the side, former Bee John Docherty, now on the books of QPR, was named manager...his fourth time at Griffin Park. Docherty's appointment bucked up spirits and after promotion chasing Reading were beaten 1-0 in his first game, the Bees achieved a commendable 1-1 draw away to champions elect Mansfield.

The team continued to give a good account of itself and Docherty underlined his credentials as one of the most promising young coaches around by moulding Brentford into a force to be reckoned with, the only addition to the side being Mickey French on a free from QPR. As the season drew to a close, minds turned to 1975-76 and would Docherty's Bees now be good enough to sustain a promotion challenge? The perfect opportunity to test the water presented itself in the final home game and the visit of Shrewsbury Town.

They had been in the vanguard for promotion from the outset, and apart from Mansfield had the best away record in the Football League. A crowd of almost 6,000 assembled, easily the highest in the Division that afternoon and were rewarded with a cracking game of football. Shrewsbury soon should their pedigree and Player of the Year Steve Sherwood had to be on his mettle to keep out a couple of early goal bound efforts.

Sherwood who spent the season on loan from Chelsea and was the side's only ever present in all 50 League and Cup games, continued to be the busier of the two custodians and it came as no surprise when the visitors broke the stalemate on 24 minutes when Bates thundered home a header from McGregor's cross.

Earlier in the season that would have been the signal for Brentford to pack up and go home, but this was a different side under Docherty and within three minutes they were back on level terms.

Roger Cross found Jackie Graham unmarked in the box and his first time shot didn't give Mulhearn in the Shrewsbury goal an earthly. An entertaining game continued to ebb and flow with both teams coming close to another goal. O' Loughlin should have scored but Mickey Allen cleared off the line and Cross headed over when well placed.

The decider came with 20 minutes to go. Sherwood punted long and deep

into the Shrewsbury area and Cross hit it first time past Mulhearn for his seventh goal in ten matches. The final whistle was greeted with an appreciative roar from the home fans who since Docherty's appointment had seen their team rise from 17th to a respectable 8th. Victory sealed the "Manager of the Month" award for Docherty to finish the season on a high, and for the first time in a couple of years Brentford looked to have a team worthy of the name. His name was Maurice O'Mahoney and in 1974 he had been convicted of armed robbery. To lessen his sentence he turned informer and put the finger on more than 100 criminals, helping to clear up London crimes involving E2million in stolen cash and goods.

For his own protection O'Mahoney served his sentence in the relative safety of Chiswick Police Station and being a keen Bees' fan was allowed out on match days to attend games handcuffed to a detective.

#### **CONSTABLE DAN**

Brentford manager John Docherty was never afraid to give youth it's chance and for the match at home to Watford on 15th November introduced Danis Salman as substitute for Gordon Riddick with ten minutes remaining.

The afternoon was significant for another reason as chairman Dan Tana took the bull by the horns, so to speak, and performed a citizen's arrest on a Watford supporter causing offence with his foul ad abusive language.

#### WALKER TAKES THE BISCUIT

Still on the youth front Bees regular midfielder 17 year old Nigel Smith earned a call up for the England Youth squad and associate schoolboy Paul Walker skippered England schoolboys to a 4-1 win over Wales at Wembley in March. The previous month Docherty signed Scotland Under 18 schoolboy's captain David Oxley. Although he never made the first team, Walker did and was 15 years, 7 months, 28 days when he made his debut in a League Cup-tie at Watford on 14th August 1976.

Against Rochdale, their keeper Mick Poole and Bees' Gordon Sweetzer and Terry Johnson failed to last the trip and the Yuletide visit of Reading ended ten a side after Cumming went early for a tackle on Roger Cross so late it almost missed the match. Cross was just that, retaliated, and joined Cumming on the long walk down the tunnel.

Brentford beat Rochdale 3-0 and won the return as well (2-1), where the crowd of 894 is the lowest authenticated audience at a League game in which Brentford have been involved. We were definitely Rochdale's bogey team as it took our record against them to played 16, won 10, drawn 6.

With the Centre of Excellence not having started their season yet, it gives me the opportunity to explain a little of what is going on with our Youth Teams. Last year we went into the Scholarship scheme for the first time leaving us with half a squad on the old Youth Training scheme and the other half Scholars. This season we now have 13 scholars along with a couple of non-contract players and first year professionals still eligible to play under 19's football. The scheme caters for the individuals far more than the old Y.T. programme. This season we will have lads taking a wide variety of educational programmes including, 2 doing sports science @ B-Tec level, 3 taking A S level qualifications, a Chef, a

Carpenter, IT courses, Media Studies and a variety of Leisure and Tourism qualifications. On top of this they will undertake Core Skill training along the way and will all be trained up to the first level of coaching qualifications via the PFA.

The scheme has Adidas to thank for their kit and boot sponsorship. Each first year Scholar receives two studded and one moulded pairs of football boots and a pack, which includes leisure trainers, shower shoes, tracksuit, t-shirts, polo shirts, sports bag, toiletries bag, towel, shinpads, drink bottle and boot bag. The second year players get a top up pack, which is almost as much again. Those players who go on to the third year next season are still sponsored by Adidas and will receive their own pack which again, is a 'top-up' pack consisting of the major items.

Finally, I would like to add my congratulations to Ryan Lake, one of our first year scholars, whose prompt action recently ensured the safe evacuation of his family from their home after a fire at his family home. The fire has destroyed half of their house with the remaining parts badly smoke damaged. The fire brigade tells us that the smoke alarms fitted woke Ryan first and he then woke the rest of his family who all got out safely. Despite the traumatic experience Ryan has handled it all in his stride.
