
GOOD AFTERNOON AND A WARM WELCOME TO TODAY'S ENCOUNTER WITH PORT VALE.

This is our third home game in as many weeks and, like you, I will be hoping for a bit more luck. I hope it's a case of third time lucky because in our last two home games against Cardiff and Stockport we have played extremely well and have come away with nothing. It seems unbelievable really when you look at our form guide and the league table because neither would offer a fair reflection on the way we have been playing.

Last week's game in particular, as I'm sure you will agree, was one of the most one-sided games I have ever experienced, yet we somehow managed to lose the game! The very fact that we allowed them to break on the right hand side. having told the lads to keep him quiet at half time, was extremely frustrating. But other than that it was a faultless performance and another one of those today and a bit of luck in front of goal and I'm sure we will emerge victorious. As a team we were superb and in particular, I thought Jimmy Davis was, once again, fantastic. The most frustrating thing about Jimmy is that he's not our player and at some stage, he'll return to Manchester United. Yet while he's here I am hoping that he can continue playing the way he is because his energy and skill will cause problems for any team.



Good afternoon and welcome back to the County Ground for today's visit of Port Vale. On behalf of the board of directors I would like to welcome the directors, officials, players and supporters of Port Vale to the home of Swindon Town Football Club.

Firstly, I would like to talk about the delay in having replica kit available for sale in the club shop. Let me first offer you our sincere apologies for the delay and explain the current situation. Due to the financial situation at the club last March, the club was clearly not in a position to plan or pay for its replica requirements for this season. Normally, if you haven't ordered by March most kit suppliers are unable to guarantee supply before mid-July at the earliest. It was not until the CVA was approved in late May that the club was able to back up its order with a cheque. Because of problems (on both sides admittedly), we did not seek to continue our agreement with Xara. A new company, Goal International, based in the Far East, was selected to supply our kit. They were able to offer good references from three different English Leauge clubs. As you are aware a small initial order arrived in time for the Sporting Gijon game - these were mostly used for pre-orders. We then expected the remainder of our replica kit, including training wear to arrive for the weekend of the Cardiff City game. Sadly, although the stock reached the port of Felixstowe five days before the game, problems with UK customs meant that the stock stayed at the port. We then expected the clearance to be achieved on Monday August 26, but as I write these notes, despite many phone calls, our stock remains at Felixstowe whilst our kit supplier works to get the clearance through customs. This is meant as an explanation not an excuse. we know that we are not providing the level of customer service you should expect, and of course, the club misses out on much needed revenue. I can only hope that by today's game the situation is resolved and happy faces are seen

again in and around the County Ground.

Wednesday sees the start of another Worthington Cup campaign when Wycombe Wanderers visit the County Ground. It picks the whole club and town up if we were to embark on a long cup run and I hope that as many of you as possible make it along to support the team and cheer them on to victory. We appreciate that three home games in quick succession is a considerable expense and in view of that we have reduced prices around the stadium. Adult tickets in the Arkells and Nationwide Stands are just £15 per

person, and in the Town End it's just £10 per person. Kids and concession prices are £5 irrespective of the stand. Season Ticket holders can gain admission for just £5 per person. Your support is crucial so if you can, please come along and offer the team your support.

It was good to see such great support at Brentford, both numerically and vocally, thanks again for your continued loyalty – it is appreciated by everyone at the club.

JACKSON HITCH

Last week Town were poised to secure the loan signing of Tottenham Hotspur midfielder, Johnnie Jackson, but a lastminute hitch put his three-month loan switch to the County Ground on hold. Jackson arrived at the County Ground last Friday morning and trained with the Andy King's squad for the first time. 20-year-old Jackson was introduced to the press as his signature in the afternoon was thought to be a mere formality. However, just as the transfer was about to go through, Tottenham Hotspur received word from the Football League that Jackson was due to serve a three-match ban, therefore preventing him playing in Town's next three matches. Obviously, Andy King was reluctant to have Jackson on the payroll while he was unable to turn out for the team and the deal was put on ice while Jackson serves a reduced two-match ban in the light of his pending loan move to the County Ground. Andy King spoke with Tottenham officials last week and has confirmed that Jackson will continue to train with the squad but will miss today's match against Port Vale.


CHRISTMAS PACKAGES – JUST A FEW PLACES LEFT

Town were left ruing a host of missed chances and some sloppy defending as they slumped to their second consecutive defeat of the season at Griffin Park.

They started the game with a similar 4-3-3 formation, Jimmy Davis replacing Danny Invincibile up front (with Sam Parkin finishing the forward trio), Andy Gurney, Stefan Miglioranzi and Steve Robinson occupying the midfield. At the back it was a similar looking quartet, with the impressive Edds lining up alongside Willis, Heywood and Duke.

However, it was the home side that enjoyed the best of the early exchanges and with just three minutes gone Stephen Hunt shot wide from the edge of the area. Two minutes later, Rowan Vine showed how dangerous he could be when he got himself into a shooting position twenty yards out. Fortunately for Griemink and those behind his goal, he dragged his effort wide of the goal. Town's sigh of relief was short-lived and just a minute later Vine had given the home side the lead. Having controlled a quick ball into his feet from the right hand side, Vine beat off challenges from Matty Heywood before turning and shooting into the top corner from ten yards, Town were devastated. Yet no sooner had they gone about the business of getting themselves back in the game - it was 2-0. Vine again was the perpetrator, this time the 20-year old heading home a wicked cross from the right hand side, leaving Griemink with no chance in the Town goal.

Town were clearly shell-shocked, but Jimmy Davis threw them a lifeline three minutes later. The diminutive winger broke free on the right just after the guarter-hour mark and he cut inside with devastating effect, cutting the ball across Paul Smith's body and into the bottom corner of the net - the first goal that The Bees had conceded this season, Town, like Brentford, looked dangerous going forward, but it was in midfield that they were losing the battle. Steve Robinson apart, Town looked disjointed

and the back four were struggling to cope with the growing numbers of Brentford midfielders pushing forward.

If Vine and McCammon were causing havoc for Town's defence, then Jimmy Davis was doing exactly the same to the Bees rearguard, the on-loan star crossing to Sam Parkin at the back post. Unfortunately for Town, and with no defenders around him, Parkin headed over the bar when he really should have done better. A minute later and Davis was at the centre of the action again, this time going it alone with the ball at his feet. Having squirmed his way around three or four defenders, Davis got himself in to a shooting position and angled a low drive just wide of the target.


Town came out for the second half confident of at least salvaging a point. On 76 minutes Town had their best chance to equalise when David Duke was released by a Davis through-ball on the left-hand side. The Scotsman broke free and was one-on-one with the 'keeper. Unfortunately, Duke delayed in shooting and just before he was about to release the ball, he was tackled by a last ditch lunge by a Brentford defender.

Similarly, Danny Invincibile, on for Steve Robinson, was through shortly afterwards. However, having got himself into a shooting position, the Australian was indecisive and his effort found the 'keeper in a good position. Two minutes later and Town were punished for their miss. Another wayward pass in the wrong area of the pitch allowed Mark McCammon to break free on goal. With just Griemink to beat, the tall striker slid the ball home under the Dutchman's body and the game was effectively over.

With many Town fans dispersing, Andy Gurney wasted another opportunity with an effort that encapsulated Town's afternoon. The captain latched onto a Sam Parkin flick and from six yards out - he could only force his shot straight at the goalkeeper.

Town's faithful will be wondering how their side lost this game having dominated last week against Stockport County.

Jimmy Davis orchestrated the proceedings and on four minutes came close when he volleyed over from just six yards out. Four minutes later and Town came close again, this time Miglioranzi firing a long-range effort straight at the 'keeper. On 11 minutes Davis shot straight at Lee Jones in the Stockport upright before he angled a cross towards Eric Sabin on 16 minutes. Unfortunately the ball was plucked away from the Frenchman's head before he had the opportunity to head home.

Miglioranzi saw another volley finish just wide of the target before Sabin shot wide following a melay in the penalty area.

Stockport's main attacking outlet was through Ali Gibb on the right hand side of midfield and on 24 minutes he crossed for Luke Beckett to angle an half volley towards Town's goal. Fortunately Griemink was on hand to palm the effort round the bar.

Town broke again just after the half-hour mark and Gurney shot straight at the Jones once again from 25 yards. Seven minutes later came Town's best chance of the game. Jimmy Davis cut inside following a short corner and his goal bound effort was headed over by Reeves on the six-yard line.

The second half started as the first period finished and on 50 minutes Jimmy Davis, who absolutely terrorised Stockport's defence, fired straight at the 'keeper. A minute later and it was Sabin who was causing problems with his pace; having beaten a defender on the right he sent in a dangerous cross that went across the face of the goal.

Four minutes later Town really should have opened their account.

A cross fell to Parkin on six yards and, after the keeper saved from Town's top scorer, he quickly picked himself up off the floor to tip the ball over from Gurney's rebound.

Having missed so many chances you got the feeling that it wasn't going to be Town's day and just before the hour mark, Luke Beckett applied the killer blow. Another cross from Ali Gibb on the right went across the face of Town's goal and the former Chesterfield man stubbed the ball over the line following Burgess's attempt.

Town's relentless pressure continued and the home side looked likely to get a quick equaliser. Two minutes after having gone behind Andy Gurney found himself clear in the box following a Jimmy Davis cross. Unfortunately Town's skipper mis-controlled when it seemed easier to hit the ball first time and the chance was wasted.

Two minutes later and Davis crossed again, this time to Sam Parkin whose header was deflected wide for a corner.


On 65 minutes Town were awarded a free kick on the edge of the area. Jimmy Davis stepped up to take it and Lee Jones in the Stockport goal scrambled his effort off the line. Five minutes later and Parkin came close again. This time another header (from yet another Davis cross) was saved off the line.

Town were becoming increasingly frustrated as the game went on. Once Parkin had headed over for the third time in the half, the home side's efforts were coming from further and further out. With 15 minutes remaining Miglioranzi shot wide from 30 yards, Town's enthusiasm seemingly evaporating the longer the game went on and not even the presence of Matt Heywood up front could unsettle Carlton Palmer's defence.



meet the queen!




Nevertheless, Rockin' Robin didn't disappoint in the evening function with an energetic, match day dance!

TODAY'S VISITORS PORT VALE

Brian Horton admitted his side weren't battling enough, but refused to make any major changes, believing his strategy and players were better than results suggested. Perhaps most worryingly, the fans made vocal their displeasure with Horton's tactics and were beginning to turn on the team.

But football's a funny old game we're so often told, and in the space of a week Vale's fortunes have been turned around by two hard-fought 1-0 wins. The first, to the surprise of everyone, came away to then league leaders Wigan. And last Saturday saw Brett Angell tap in a late winner against struggling Peterborough to lift the Burslembased side to within a point and a place of Town. Which makes today's game all the more fascinating.


Vale's dismal start came as quite a shock, given the team's gradual improvement last season which looked to be improved with the fresh injection of blood in the summer. Seasoned veterans Brett Angell and Ian Brightwell were brought in to give experience to a young, blossoming side and ex-Vale favourite Jon McCarthy began his second stint at Vale Park. Crucially, Horton was able to retain his prized assets in the summer, with key players like goalkeeper Mark Goodlad and attacking midfielder Marc Bridge-Wilkinson signing new contracts.

The turnaround in the last two games means that Vale go into today's match with a renewed confidence. While last Saturday's narrow home victory against Barry Fry's Peterborough was hardly a convincing win, as Horton admits, the result is everything when the team is at the wrong end of the table.

Of course, that's a sentiment every Robins fan will know too well, when Town come into this afternoon's crunch game on the back of two defeats. While King's men have played well and had the lion's share of possession, failure to convert chances in front of goal against Brentford and a superlative goalkeeping display from Stockport keeper Lee Jones has meant Town are in danger of getting stuck in the wrong half of the table if today's result goes the same way.

However, Town can take heart from the fact that Vale suffered twice at the hands of Andy King's team last season, most notably the comfortable 3-0 win at the County Ground last Spring.

Brian Horton, of course, is not the kind of manager to take that kind of defeat lightly and if Vale produce a similar performance to that of their last two games, we should see a much closer game this afternoon.



THE GAFFER



Brian Horton joined Port Vale as manager in January 1999. On leaving school he played non-League football for Hednesford Town before joining Port Vale as a professional. He played 236 League games for Port Vale and scored 37 goals (13 from the penalty spot) before he signed for Brighton in March 1976, and then Luton in 1981.

He became player-manager at Hull City in May and led them to promotion to Division Two in his first season. He was sacked in April 1988 and moved to Oxford United as assistant to Mark Lawrenson. He took over the managerial role there six months later before being appointed to the Manchester City hotseat in August 1993. Just two years later and he was on the move again. this time to Huddersfield where his tenure ended in 1997. He then moved back to his old club Brighton as manager where he proved to be popular with both fans and players, while getting results on pitch. He helped prevent The Seagull's relegation from the Football League as they finished 23rd in Division Three for the second year in a row. He left Brighton to return home to Port Vale in February 1999.

MICHAEL WALSH




It was an in-and-out season for the ex-Manchester City trainee last term. He suffered from a few injuries, which limited his number of starts in the first team. Strong and hard-working, Neil's best games are surely to come in black and white.

MICHAEL CUMMINGS

The Dubliner was ever-present last season - a rarity in the days of squad rotation. Just pipped for the Player of the Year award and having scored 10 times from midfield last season, he will be expected to continue in the same vein. Signed from Middlesbrough in March 2000 and is a Republic of Ireland Under 21 international.



A real bag of tricks, the young Scot terrorised defences last season and you can expect the former Coventry man to be prominent again this time out. His pace and gulle make him a very exciting player and he would have collected more strikes in front of goal had he calmed his exuberance. He has skill and ability in abundance.



M BRIDGE-WILKINSON

Marc missed the first half of last season through injury and probably didn't want the season to end, as he was just picking up form on his return to the side. The ex-Derby talent has enjoyed a full pre-season and will be looking to return to the form that saw him pocket 15 goals from midfield in his first year with the club. Bigger fish have taken a look, but 'Bridgey' has recently signed a two-year contract.

IAN ARMSTRONG

The fleet-footed Liverpool youngster was hampered by injuries last season, but still showed everyone his underlying potential. A mercurial strike against Brentford at Vale Park last time around gave notice that an injury-free spell will ensure he has a bright future in the game. An England youth international, who saw little chance of breaking through at Anfield - their loss is Port Vale's gain.

YOUNG GUN STEVEN ROWLAND

Ever since the 19-year-old broke into the first team from nowhere at Wigan's JJB stadium last season, his play has been a

model of consistency. Tough in the tackle, performances have belied his years and he will hope to continue the swift progress he has made.

BRETT ANGEL

A striker with a wealth of experience, signed after going on trial during the close season. Served with many clubs, including Southend and two spells with Stockport. Played for Rushden & Diamonds last season. Brett will be hoping to provide competition for places in the Vale forward line, especially having scored the winner against Peterborough last week.

JON McCARTHY

Many fans saw 'Macca' re-signing as the return of the prodigal son. After three broken legs he was signed by Brian Horton at the start of this season having been released by Birmingham City. Left for Birmingham in what was a record transfer of £1.5million. Vale signed him from York City for £450,000 after previously being with Hartlepool. Fans are hoping to see the form they remember well and hopefully Jon can put all his injury problems behind him.



THEM AND US

Beamish was born in Bebington on Mersevside in August 1947, so the fact his first port of call as a League player was Tranmere Rovers shouldn't be a surprise to anyone. Rovers were, at the time, challenging for promotion from Division Four and after successive fifth place finishes claimed just one place higher in 1966/67, which rewarded Prenton Park with Third Division football. Tranmere held their elevated status until striker Ken completed a move to Brighton in March 1972. In his 177 League games for Rovers he had scored 49 times, a ratio of over one goal every three matches, and his move to the South coast took Ken to a side competing in Division Two. It was a sad. short stay for Brighton, who finished four points adrift at the bottom of the table, and 96 games and 27 goals later Ken migrated north to Blackburn in May 1974.

At the end of 1974/75 Blackburn and Beamish had claimed Third Division championship honours. Ken played 86 League games for the Ewood Park club, scored 18 goals and helped consolidate a Second Division place before moving to today's visitors Port Vale in September 1976. As today, Vale were divisional rivals of Swindon and 25 years ago next month, Ken Beamish was turning out at the County Ground in a 1-1 draw in Division Three.

85 games followed at Vale Park, as
Beamish chipped in with 29 goals, his
highest goals per game ratio of his career
to date. The Valiants dropped into the
Fourth Division in 1978 and Ken, who
seemed to have liked a move every two
years, retained his Division Three status
when he moved on to Bury in September.
Now at the age of 31 he hit his best

scoring vein ever as he produced 20 goals in 49 games for the Shakers, and Tranmere, now back in the Fourth, took him back home to Merseyside in November 1979.

It was the sort of back-to-my-roots move that players often make at the end of their career, but Ken was tempted to make one more southward trip when he joined struggling Swindon in August 1981. Town were having a desperate time as they tried to keep their heads above the line that was relegation to Division Four. Making just two appearances under manager John Trollope, Beamish couldn't stop the slide and was invited to replace Trollope at the helm in March 1983 as Swindon stared at Division Four football for the first time.

It wasn't the most auspicious of managerial

spells. With Town under severe financial pressure, Ken was unable to make much impact on the dire situation that the club was experiencing. Replaced by Lou Macari in July 1984, Ken subsequently joined the backroom staff at former club Blackburn as Commercial Manager. Never costing any of his clubs more than £30,000, Ken Beamish looks to have offered them all value for money.

There's currently a Mr. Parkin on Town's playing staff who is earning some praise, but 16 years ago Parkin Mk1 was turning out at the centre of Town's defence. Tim Parkin, at 6'2", had joined Town in July 1986 for £27,500

Born on New Year's Eve 1957, Tim started his career with an apprenticeship at Blackburn during the spell that Ken Beamish was at Ewood Park, although with Tim making his debut in March 1977, Beamish had already played his last Blackburn game some six months earlier. In the next two seasons Tim made just 12 further appearances and decided to try his hand elsewhere, choosing Malmo in Sweden to further his career in a £25,000 move.

August 1981 saw Tim return to England when, after a brief liaison with Almondsbury, he joined Bristol Rovers and set about clocking up the League appearances that the preceding years had denied him. In five seasons Parkin established himself with around 40 games a year as neither promotion nor relegation seriously threatened Rovers' Division Three position. The call from Lou Macari brought him to the County Ground

and to a team fresh from promotion to the Third.

Tim made 32 League appearances in 1986/87 and added all five play-off games as Town moved straight through Division Three at the first attempt. After 110 games which helped establish the team in Division Two, Tim found it difficult to dislodge Colin Calderwood or Jon Gittens in the centre of defence. A move to Port Vale in December 1989 brought a fresh start and Tim was back at the County Ground making a substitute appearance in a Town 3-0 win at the County Ground in March 1990.


In 1991/92, Vale finished bottom of Division Two. Tim, who had a five match spell on loan to Shrewsbury earlier that season, played his last League match in April at the age of 34.


NEW ARRIVALS FOR STAG WEEKENDS

Former Wimbledon midfielder Downes took over as manager following the shock walk-out of previous boss Steve Coppell in June and with the Bees set to lose several top players on Bosman-style free transfers. The omens did not look too bright for the London outfit, but Downes quickly galvanised his squad and they entered the season with quite a flurry - four wins and two draws from their opening six games gave them sixteen points and top spot.



MATHIAS BLAST FOR REFEREE



Tranmere Rovers manager Ray Mathias has blasted the referee after last Saturday's 2-0 defeat at Bristol City. Mark Warren awarded the Robins a controversial 70th minute penalty which Brian Tinnion converted to open the scoring. The Rovers boss told the club's official website: "The lads worked tremendously hard and then a decision like that goes against you, I think it was absolutely ridiculous, how you can give a penalty for that I will never know. I think it was a matter of decisions which has cost us the game, I have had a player injured because of a two-footed tackle and if that's not a sending off offence then I don't know what is, at this present time I am very, very annoyed. After Shane Nicholson came off we lost our shape, I had to put a right back at left back and it did disrupt us but the lads battled on and then how the referee can give a penalty for that I just don't know. Graham Allen was actually turning away from the ball and was looking the other way, with no intention whatsoever, the ball has just hit him and the penalty has been given."



NORTHAMPTON APPEAL OVER SAMPSON RED



Northampton have lodged an appeal against Ian Sampson's sending off in the win over Barnsley. Sampson was dismissed for a professional foul on Bruce Dyer in the 42nd minute. The centre-back now faces a mandatory one-match ban, unless the card is rescinded. Manager Kevan Broadhurst said: "We feel the decision was very unjust and after watching the video of the incident we will be appealing."





SUPERMARINE CRASH OUT OF FA CUP

Swindon Supermarine manager John Murphy saw his side crash out of the FA Cup 2-0 at Chard Town, and then described the upset as the lowest point in his 20-year managerial career. Supermarine travelled to Somerset with just a point to their name in the Dr Martens League Western Division table, but Murphy's side were still expected to ease past a Chard side who are unlikely to make any impact in the Screwfix Direct Western League First Division. "I've managed for 20 years, and I can't think of a poorer result than that," said a shell-shocked Murphy. "From the club's perspective it's a dreadful result. We conceded early and that put us on the back foot straight away. We haven't been clinical in recent league games, and we weren't again today. We've had balls cleared off the line and their keeper has made good saves, but we couldn't get it in. We now have to re-group as a team and as a club."

AUSSIE RULES!

FIVE CONSECUTIVE GAMES FOR TOWN AND AN AUSTRALIAN UNDER 23 CALL-UP TO BOOT, NOT A BAD START TO THE SEASON TO TOWN NEW RECRUIT, GARETH EDDS!

It's been an incredible couple of months for Town's latest Aussie recruit, 21-year old defender Gareth Edds. Having been released by his former club, Nottingham Forest, at the end of last season Edds was preparing for a period of uncertainty. Like many footballers, he was facing the prospect of finding a new club along with thousands of other players in the same situation.

However, fortunately for Gareth (and Town) he was thrown a lifeline by Town boss Andy King in the summer when 'the gaffer' invited Edds along for a trial. The former Australian under 20 gratefully accepted and a string of impressive performances at right back have since seen him sign for the club for a year. Not only that, but the youngster was boosted last week by the news that is set to make his debut for the Australian under 23 side.


"I must admit it does all seem to be happening at once!" he enthused. "I had a period of 12 months when nothing seemed to be happening and now it all seems to be going well. I just hope it continues because I know what it's like when things aren't going your way."

Few had heard of Edds when the fresh-faced youngster arrived at the club ahead of the trip to Hereford. However, as well as dislocating his finger, Edds made an immediate impression and he has since gone on to become one of Town's most consistent

performers so far this season. Strong in the tackle and with good distribution – Edds has made the right back position his own.

Edds came over to England in 1999 when he was invited to Leeds United as part of a Big Brother scholarship at the Elland Road club (Mark Viduka another to have followed the same path). The scheme provides players with the opportunity (and money) to spend one month with a club to try and earn a professional contract. Unfortunately Edds failed to do enough to earn himself a permanent job with the Premiership giants, but when Leeds' youth manager at the time, Paul Harte, left to join Nottingham Forest, Edds was soon on his way to The City Ground with him.

Edds soon joined the club's highly successful youth academy amongst players such as David Prutton and Jermaine Jenas – both who have now gone to become the centre of much media attention having played for England's under 21 side. "David and JJ were fantastic players with a lot of skill. We grew up together at Forest's Academy. David was obviously given the chance to see what he could do in the Forest first team and he took it, whilst JJ's record now speaks itself, the player now playing at the highest level with Newcastle. But you could always tell that they were good players. However, I always thought that I had the ability to succeed as well and when I wasn't getting the same opportunities, I knew it was time to move on."




Edds subsequently went on trial at Millwall. Yet having played one or two games in the Lion's reserves side, he was, once again, told that he had no future. Millwall's loss became Swindon's gain however, and ahead of the start of the season Edds was invited to join Town's squad on trial. Having impressed in pre-season, Edds joined on a short-term noncontractual basis, which was later extended to a year following his impressive string of performances since the start of the season. Such have been the nature of his performances that it seems amazing that Millwall never took him on board, for he certainly looks as though he has the potential to succeed, certainly in this division and maybe even at a higher level too. "I've been fairly pleased with the way things have gone so far. It's been great just to be able to play on a regular basis again and I'm enjoying every minute of it, I just hope that I can keep doing what I'm doing so far."

Despite his enthusiasm, Edds is clearly disappointed by Town's slump over the Bank Holiday weekend and he firmly believes that Town should be higher placed in the league. "I strongly believe that we should be higher up the table than we are. We have a great young squad and one that is capable of challenging for promotion, we played the first two teams off the park and deserved more from the games we lost. So I am not too worried by the three defeats because we have the capabilities of achieving something special. Today's game is the second at home in a row and if you win your home games then you'll be doing well."

A win against Port Vale today would certainly send Town back up in the right direction as far as the league table goes, but as well as that Edds also has a number of other, ulterior motives for a positive result this afternoon. "I remember making my debut for Forest against Port Vale back in the 1999/00 season - it brings back some happy memories for me! We won 2-0 that day as well so a similar result would be nice. But playing in goal for them today, like he did on my debut, should be Marc Goodlad, a player that I know from Forest very well and it would be nice if we could stick a few past him!"

A goal today would certainly cap a fine week for Edds, the former Forest defender making his debut for the Australian under 23's on Wednesday. "I've been involved with the under 20's before, but this is the first time with the under 23's and so it's an exciting time for me really. Obviously I couldn't have wished for a harder game playing against Germany in Leverkusen [!], but playing for your country is an honour and it doesn't matter who you come up against. It's such a proud moment for me because it shows where I'm from and hopefully I can do enough to put myself in a position whereby I'm considered for the 2004 Olympic Games. After all that's what myself and those alongside me, many of which I've played with before in the under 20s, are gearing towards.

I'm sure I wouldn't be the first person to wish Edds the very best of luck in his quest for success with 'the Socceroos'. And if he can repeat the kind of form he's been displaying in the red of white of Swindon then I'm sure international success is just around the corner.

PORT VALE HAVE ALWAYS PROVIDED STIFF OPPOSITION FOR SWINDON DOWN THE YEARS.

Even in the 1962/63 season, when Town won promotion from the old Third Division, Port Vale did the double over Swindon winning 3-2 at the County Ground and 2-1 at Vale Park. Strangely, when Swindon did kick-off the season with a 2-0 win over Port Vale (with goals from Jan Aage Fjortoft and Keith Scott in 1994/95), they ended up being relegated from Division One.

Today's featured match took place on October 21 1986. It was the fifteenth time Town had travelled to Vale Park and they were yet to record a victory there.

Swindon, newly promoted, were without the injured Tim Parkin and Peter Coyne. Phil Prosson (son of Roy, who made 761 league appearances for Vale) returned to the centre of defence for the home side. Lou Macari's Swindon team clearly aimed to make it fifteenth time lucky and within 10 minutes Town were two up. On both occasions it was Dave Bamber who was the creator. Firstly, after he had cut in from

the right and seen his shot hit a post, Chris Kamara was on hand to slide in the rebound. Six minutes later, he headed down a corner from Leigh Barnard for Steve White to shoot home. After 21 minutes, Robbie Earle pulled a goal back for Vale when he turned to crack home a volley from just inside the area. Five minutes from half time, White held up the ball well for support to arrive and then slid a pass into the path of Mark Jones who fired home.


The second half saw G. J. Wilkinson come off the line to replace referee Mike Dimblebee who was struggling with a torn hamstring. Swindon must have been wishing they hadn't squandered their first half chances when Port Vale began to pile on the pressure and after an hour they pulled one back. A half-cleared corner fell to Andy Jones on the edge of the area and he blasted the ball home. It was 3-3 minutes later when Paul Maguire crossed and, in attempting to head it wide, Bamber headed it into his own net. Bamber made

amends for his own goal by winning a free kick and, when Mark Jones floated the ball into the Vale box, Jimmy Gilligan headed home from close range to make it 4-3. Even then Port Vale might have earned a point, but on-loan 'keeper Fraser Digby produced two fine saves to lay Swindon's Vale Park hoodoo to rest. It was also good enough to see Lou Macari return to Old Trafford with his loan period extended until after Christmas.

The season ended with Town winning promotion through the play-offs while Port Vale finished in twelfth position, with Andy Jones knocking in 29 goals.

There finally seems to be light at the end of the tunnel for Tottenham fans. Despite what Glenn Hoddle said about one or both of Lazio's Hernan Crespo and Fernando Morientes of Real Madrid joining the club, he seems to, at last, got himself a striker. However, Robbie Keane might not be quite as exotic as either Crespo or Morientes, but Keane could prove to be a useful signing nonetheless. Hoddle was at pains to stress that we should only trust the rumour we hear from the horse's mouth - Hoddle himself being the trustworthy thoroughbred of truth in this instance - how wrong he was! At least he has a new face to unleash to the demanding Lilywhites' faithful. For the record, Morientes and Crespo looked destined to join Inter.

Aston Villa have lined up a double midfield swoop for Ireland duo Mark Kinsella and Matt Holland of Charlton and Ipswich respectively. Charlton captain Kinsella, with only 6-months left on his contract at the Valley, has already put pen-to-paper on a two-year contract after a knockdown fee was agreed of £1

million was agreed. At time of writing, Holland's £4.5 million move was on hold due to deadlock in agreeing personal terms.

Claudio Ranieri has obviously walked under a few ladders too many at Chelsea this summer. Having finally seen former England U21 stars Jody Morris and John Terry cleared of attacking doorman in a London bar, Ranieri faces a dilemma over star Striker Jimmy- Floyd Hasselbaink. Barcelona's re-appointment of former Dutch national team boss Louis van Gaal and Chelsea's inability to secure a Champions League place has unsettled Hasselbaink at Stamford Bridge. The temperamental striker is rumored to be keen on joining the Catalan giant's push for major honors. Chelsea - themselves with debts totaling £97.7 million may be keen to cash in before the 30-year old ace passes his sell-by date.

West Bromwich Albion's capture of former marksman Lee Hughes looks to be settled after Coventry agreed a cutprice fee, believed to be around £3.5million. The flame-haired front man returns to the Hawthorns with after the Baggies waiving the £1.5 million payment still owed from his initial transfer to Highfield Road.

Fulham have parted company with Director of Football, Franco Baresi. The AC Milan legend's role was deemed to be in conflict with owner Mohammed Al Fayed's vision for the club. Tipped by many to take over managerial duties from Jean Tigana, Baresi is now expected to return to AC Milan in some capacity. Given that Tigana had his feathers ruffled by the appointment in the first place, and has yet committed further than the end of the season, Fulham may live to rue missing letting an individual of Baresi's experience go.

Following the decision of David
Seaman's England understudy Nigel
Martyn to reject Southampton, Saints
boss Gordon Strachan has signed Hearts
stopper Antti Niemi in a deal reportedly
worth £2 million to the Edinburgh club.
The Finnish international keeper is
expected to be an automatic choice for

selection following a series of erratic displays from Jones, currently Mark Hughes' No.1 for Wales.

Portsmouth have continued their rebuilding under the guidance of Harry Redknapp with the capture of former Inter Milan and Middlesbrough defender Gianluca Festa. Festa, who suffered heavy criticism last season following a spitting incident, joins Paul Merson and co. at Pompey on a free transfer.

Cettic's former Leicester City midfielder, Neil Lennon, has been forced to quit the International scene with Northern Ireland a day before he was due to captain his country for the first time. The Hoops midfielder received a number of threats concerning appearances for his country since his move to Cettic two season's ago.

West Ham United have completed the sixmonth loan deal for Trinidad and Tobago international, Brent Rahim. Rahim was recommended to West Ham by their former keeper Shaka Hislop – his international colleague with Trinidad.

Everton's Swedish midfielder Tobias
Linderoth could be set to leave the Toffees
after demanding new boss David Moyes
plays him or allows him to leave.
Linderoth, who appeared for Sweden at
this summer's World Cup Finals, has been
nothing more than a bit-part player for
Everton since Moyes arrival at the tail
end of last season.

Peter Boizot, who earned his fortune as owner of the Pizza Express chain of restaurants is set to sell Peterborough United to Peterborough Sporting Club Limited. Boizot, who was tempted to the club by current manager Barry Fry is determined to sell his majority share holding which has attracted several offers.


Charlton Athletic are giving an extended

trial to Brazilian born Japanese international Alex. A cult hero in his 'native' country, Alex is said to be available for around £2.5 million. With the departure of Mark Kinsella to Aston Villa, Alan Curbishley's men require bolstering their attacking midfield options with the season still in its infancy.

Arsenal's goalkeeping soap opera has taken a fresh twist with the news that they are giving 33 year-old Argentinean goalkeeper Carlos Roa the opportunity to earn a contract at Highbury. Roa has enjoyed a colourful few years since helping knock England out of the France '98 World Cup with his penalty heroics. The talented shot-stopper pledged to retire from international football following France '98 due to his intense religious beliefs. He fully expected the World was going to end at the turn of the Millennium and as such it was pointless to play on, Indeed, the world did not end as Roa has been led to believe, prompting him to have a career rethink. His arrival on a free transfer from Mallorca could still prove to be quite a coup in the wake of Fabian Carini's collapsed transfer from Juventus.

As rumours continue that Alex Ferguson will make a move to bring Carini to Old Trafford, Denis Irwin's replacement at The Theatre of Dreams has been lined-up. Lille's French U21 starlet Julien Escude is tipped to complete a £3 million transfer when he has recovered from knee ligament damage suffered when he tripped walking his dog!

Finally, Walsall boss Colin Lee has completed the year-long loan of Brazilian striker Jose Luis Guimaraes Sanibio Junior, much to the delight of the replica kit name printer at the Bescot Stadium. Known as Junior for short, he arrives following an unsuccessful trial period at Bolton's Reebok stadium during the summer.

...Funds were low, yet with the new season just around the corner, much had to be done to improve the Ground and make Swindon Town Footbalt Club an attractive and hospitable venue for supporters and visitors alike.

The idea for the appeal was brought about by the plight of the Club's ground staff who, until the launch, were forced to cut the County Ground pitch using a domestic lawnmower.

The immediate crisis (the lack of a serviceable mower) was soon solved by the generous loan of a lawnmower and servicing from Handy Garden Machinery, Stratton, which did in fact symbolise the impact the appeal aimed to achieve in and around the town.

Through the promotion of the list on the club's official website, the Evening Advertiser, BBC Wiltshire Sound and Central News, the Business Appeal grabbed the attention of not only local businesses but began to reach even the most isolated Swindon supporter and the offers of assistance flooded in.

Heartened by the response from the local area Chief Executive, Mark Devlin, said: "Some people I have spoken to recently have expressed the opinion that the Club had lost its community backing. This appeal has shown that nothing can be further from the truth and the offers of assistance have flooded in.

"We have been amazed by the generosity of the local community, one day we received a small package arrived containing two pens, a pencil, a pad of post-its and a rubber band from an anonymous sender. That exemplifies the kind of community

spirit we are talking about; no matter how big or small, the donation it is gratefully received.


My first inkling that life isn't fair struck home at the age of four during the sack race at my first school sports day.




to meet Trust members.



25 YEARS AGO by Dave Wallis

Town entertained Chesterfield on September 10 1977, keen to put their good start to the season back on track after the previous Saturday's loss at Walsall. Goals from Chris Guthrie and Andy Ford sealed a 2-1 win, with Ford, who had joined Town from Southend during the summer, scoring what would turn out to be his only strike of the season. The win left Swindon in fourth position in the Third Division table and the day saw John Trollope achieve his 800th senior game. Three days later a trip to Deepdale resulted in a 1-1 draw, courtesy of a fourth minute goal from Trevor Anderson against Preston North End. Town dominated the match throughout, having two efforts disallowed and saw a John McLaughlin strike cannon off the crossbar. North End saved the match with a 56th minute equaliser. On September 5 1977 The Daily Mirror alleges that ex-England and Leeds manager Don Revie had tried to fix the result of a Leeds fame with Wolves by bribing the opposition, and on the 7th, England, now under the guidance of Ron Greenwood, play out a disappointing 0-0 friendly with Switzerland. Third Division rivals Port Vale were to finish fourth from bottom and hence face relegation that season, when they were doomed to contest Fourth Division football until 1983.





NO. 4 TURBO'S TACO LASAGNE

- 1. You'll need 11 ounces lasagne noodles, 1 pound lean ground beef, 24 ounces tomato sauce, 1/2 cup water, 1 (1 ounce) package taco seasoning mix, 8 cups shredded Cheddar cheese and 1/2 cup crushed tortilla chips.
- Bring a large pot of lightly salted water to a boil. Add pasta and cook for 8 to 10 minutes or until al dente; drain.
- Meanwhile, in a large skillet, brown beef over medium heat until no longer pink; drain. Add tomato sauce, water and taco seasoning. Lower heat and simmer for 5 minutes.
- In a baking dish layer noodles, then meat mixture and cheese; repeat 2 more times. There will be 3 layers.
- 5. Cover with plastic wrap and microwave for 10 minutes. Remove from microwave, uncover and let stand for 5 minutes.
- Sprinkle tortilla chips over the top.



When Town face Wycombe Wanderers this Wednesday it will be the two clubs' second cup encounter in three seasons.

In fact it doesn't feel all that long ago that Town had dumped the Chairboys out of the LDV Vans Trophy at the quarter final stage courtesy of a Gary Alexander brace. The former West Ham striker's two goals were sweet music to the majority of the 3,244 crowd, who were delighted to see egg on Lawrie Sanchez's face following the Wycombe supremo's comments regarding the young striker, now with Hull in the Third Division.

However, one can't fail to be impressed with the Buckingham club's development in the last two decades. Just 15 years ago, Wycombe were still plying their trade in the Isthmian

League and in



the sixties, they'd turned down the opportunity to play at a semi-professional level when they were invited to join the Southern League. Yet for such an amateur club. the list of players and managers to come out of Adams Park is impressive. Martin O'Neill, Alyn Smith and John Gregory have all since gone on to manage 'bigger' clubs, whilst the likes of Steve Guppy and Keith Scott went on to play their trade in the top flight.

More recently the team plays under the guile of former Wimbledon and Swindon striker. Lawrie Sanchez, Sanchez, enjoying his first managerial berth, has performed wonders in his short time at Adams Park. The fact that Wycombe have managed to survive comfortably in the Second Division (and on a shoestring budget) is a fantastic achievement. Yet when Wanderers reached the semifinal of the FA Cup in season 2000/01, they surpassed the wildest dreams of even the staunchest of supporter.

This season has offered yet another consistent start for the Adams Park faithful. With just one defeat (at the hands of Bristol City) and the team currently in ninth place – next Wednesday's encounter looks set to be a difficult proposition for Andy King's side. A true test

of how good Sanchez's side are will be when they travel to Wigan's JJB Stadium this afternoon, although they do make the long trek north on the back of two impressive victories. The first, a 4-1 thumping of QPR before last week's impressive away win at Oldham in which Bulman and Harris got on the scoresheet.
