MANAGER Joe Kinnear watched strikers Andrew Fotiadis and Tony Thorpe stake claims for a place in this afternoon's line-up when they played for the reserves on Wednesday, leaving him to ponder on whether or not he should change a winning team.

The squad on duty for the win at Huddersfield earned praise all round from the boss, but as he seeks the first back-to-back wins since early April he has four attackers competing for two places in today's front line.

Leading scorer Steve Howard can be pretty sure of his place. His winner at the McAlpine was his seventh goal of the season, and his fourth in consecutive games.

Dean Crowe played alongside him at Huddersfield, but was subbed by Fotiadis, who impressed with his pacey and muscular contribution, including laying on Howard's goal.

On Wednesday, watched by his manager, Fotiadis scored in a 4-1 Avon Combination victory at Kenilworth Road over a not very good Peterborough side. The 25-year-old former England schoolboy international is quite possibly in a make or break season, with his current contract due to expire next summer, and the manager confirms that he has reminded Fotiadis that he needs to deliver a better scoring record to earn a new deal.

In Wednesday's game Fotiadis accepted orders to take men on and be positive, and pleased the boss with his response. "He scored with a very good finish, and showed a bit," said the boss. "When I sent him on at Huddersfield I told him to take the bull by the horns by getting forward and taking people on, and he did.

Also "showing a bit" on Wednesday was Thorpe. Playing his first game after a fortnight out because of an eye infection, he netted twice with two confident finishes. One was a clever chip, catching the goalkeeper off his line, and the other came when Fotiadis squared a pass for Thorpe to dummy the keeper and dribble round him.

The boss is not keen to change the shape of the side by including three strikers today. As the team is set up at present, Matt Spring is effectively the third attacker as the midfielder with main responsibility for breaking forward while Kevin Nicholls operates just in front of the back four in a mainly defensive and covering role.

The boss said his inclination was to retain the side which played at Huddersfield, except for the possibility of a change in the front line. He

Steve Robinson is set to retain his place on the right of midfield, having replaced Ahmet Brkovic at the McAlpine. The boss said: "Berkie was disappointed to be left out, but he is a very good pro, and admitted that his form had dipped a bit."

BEARING in mind what happened at Dagenham last season, we might be tempting fate to suggest that the Town have a very good chance of progressing through to the second round of the LDV Vans Trophy. having been drawn away to Woking in the first round.

Joe says he has not begun to think about this game yet - it is to be played on October 22 and after today we have three league matches and the Villa Park cup-tie before then.

Last season we fielded a mainly reserve side when we lost to top Conference club Dagenham & Redbridge. Woking, on paper at least, are not such a difficult proposition. They were top of the Conference briefly a month ago, but Saturday's 5-0 thrashing at Morecambe was their fifth consecutive defeat and they are currently fourth from bottom.

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WITH ten games played so far, we are approaching the point at which the league table begins to give a realistic reflection of how teams are performing. My belief has always been that a dozen games is enough for the table to sort itself out, and today I think that our current position is several notches below what it should be.

It is strange that currently our away record is better than our home results, and that is something we must put right if we are to achieve our ambition.

A couple of weeks ago, when we were anticipating two home games in four days, we knew that six points were there for the taking if we played at somewhere near our best. Instead, we gave silly goals away to Notts County and then to Mansfield, and finished up with just one point.

After the Mansfield game we were asking ourselves how we could be so poor just seven days after we had been so good at Watford.

One obvious requirement was to stop making mistakes that gifted goals to opponents, and the deserve credit for players bouncing back from the Mansfield defeat by being much professional more at Huddersfield. That game was always going to be very close, and so it proved, but I did not agree with the suggestion that we had stolen the points by scoring in stoppage time.

Over the 90 minutes, Huddersfield never looked like hurting us. They created hardly one decent chance, and the

closest they came was from a free kick, which hit the bar. We looked much more impressive as attackers, and while we had to wait a long time for the winner I felt it was always likely, and no more than we deserved.

In a sense a quick away win after a home defeat goes some way towards putting the record straight. But I do not entirely share that view. I want a team of winners, home and away alike. You will have seen, the same as I have, that we are not yet consistent enough in our defending, and that is something we must put right, wherever we are playing.

The lessons from recent matches are obvious. We defended very well at Cardiff, Brentford and Watford. If we hit that standard regularly, we will for sure start to move up the table, because we are always likely to score goals. And well done to Steve Howard for getting his seventh of the season at Huddersfield - with a just a little luck he can collect another golden boot this season. well And done the 700 supporters who gave us such spirited backing at Huddersfield a wonderful turn-out, especially in view of the game they had seen just a few days earlier, against Mansfield.

We were so pleased to give you something to cheer about at the McAlpine Stadium, because we knew we had let you down - and ourselves, of course - when we threw away the points in the Mansfield match. I had no problem with the crowd's reaction that night: our players deserved criticism, and know they brought it on themselves. It goes without saying that

footballers prefer to be heroes,

not fall-guys, and

this

afternoon we have another chance to put things right, for ourselves and for you.

So far as I am concerned three home defeats so far this season are more than enough for the whole campaign. Before meeting Mansfield we put together a little run of five league and cup games without defeat. Now we need another run, preferably a lot more than five, and with draws turned into victories. Today we have the chance to make it backto-back wins for the first time this season, and who knows what effect that might have on our league table placing?

It was certainly encouraging to see the Huddersfield result push us out of the relegation zone, and now we have to build on that.

In our early games we found it difficult to cope with the higher standard of football we meet in the Second Division, but I feel we have now come to terms with it. At Watford we showed that, on our day, and when we are all focused, we can compete with the First Division too.

One lesson from our campaign so far is very clear: there are no easy matches, because this is a division where any team can beat any other.

And not until this afternoon's important match is over will I begin to give any thought as to how we are going to win at Villa Park on Wednesday. We will relish the chance to pit ourselves Taylor's against Graham Premiership side, but this afternoon league points are much more important.

Keep the faith, and enjoy the game.





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I AM tempted to spend all of my column today talking about Huddersfield, and our tremendous performance at the McAlpine Stadium to get the win we all wanted. But I realise you might also want to know our reaction to our poor showing in our last home game, when we gifted three points to Mansfield.

Like you, the players were very unhappy about our performance. There was a lot of straight talking about it afterwards, but what was said is a matter between us, for public and not consumption. Suffice to say we knew we had made stupid mistakes and passed up a golden opportunity to move out of the bottom four. have Different players different reactions to crowds who start to have a go. The gaffer made it clear that we had brought criticism down on our own heads against Mansfield, and we couldn't argue with that.

The big question is how could we be so good at Watford and so bad against Mansfield just seven days later? We have got to be more consistent, and having spoken about that we knew we owed it to everyone, not least ourselves, to do a good professional iob at Huddersfield. Even the most critical supporter would have to agree that we did exactly that.

I thought it was a marvellous

performance, perhaps our best of the league season so far. We should have won more comfortably, but we all felt that if we stuck to our game plan, and did our individual jobs properly, goals would come. Even so, we had to wait until stoppage time before the big man popped in the winner. Steve Howard is really on song, and I was pleased for Andrew Fotiadis, who laid on the opening for the goal. He had to wait until the last ten minutes to get on, but then he caused Huddersfield all sorts of problems. The defence and midfield was absolutely solid, and we kept another clean sheet.

We passed the ball well, and the team that had been chasing shadows in losing to Mansfield was transformed into a compact unit. It was a vast improvement, and we took professional pride in that.

It has set the pattern we must try to follow in all our games. We had done well earlier, when we went five matches without defeat, but it is no good setting standards in two or three matches and then letting them drop.

The victory turned out to be all the sweeter when we discovered that it had pushed us up the table, and out of the relegation zone at last. It just shows what one good result can do – so obviously V several more

can be even more beneficial. We know that it will be another tough game this afternoon, because it is another six-pointer. Once more we are entertaining visitors who will be overtaken if we beat them. It's an attractive prospect, but we can hardly forget that the same circumstances applied in our last two home matches, and we failed to deliver.

The Huddersfield result made it all the much harder to understand why we had not done the business against Notts County and Mansfield on our own pitch. In both those games we started much too slowly, and allowed our opponents to take the initiative. That's a warning to us: today we must get out of the traps early, and impose ourselves. There might be some consolation in being able to come back from two down to earn a point, but not much - far better never to fall behind in the first place. In fact, far better not to concede goals at any time. We know what is required, and I trust that this afternoon we will give you a Huddersfield performance, not a Mansfield one.

His progress after that will depend on his recovery from the surgery, and obviously we will work closely with the specialist in deciding a schedule for his return to fitness.

It was a pleasure to see Tony Thorpe back in business with the reserves on Wednesday, proving that he was 100 per cent OK again after his eye infection. The medical advice when it struck was to give it a couple of weeks for the infection to clear up, and then start playing again "when you feel comfortable." Carl Griffiths had hoped to be involved in that game, but his return after a broken leg has suffered a very minor interruption with a calf muscle strain. It is nothing serious, and I expect to see him back in full training within a few days.

I had thought that Griff and Mark Ovendale would be able to return to competitive football on Wednesday, but both will have to wait a further week because the scheduled reserve fixture against Bournemouth has been postponed.

The goalkeeper has worked hard recover from his hip to operation, and is looking fit and comfortable in training. He has been out of action since the start of the season, but is now very close to being ready for a return with the reserves. He should be able to make his comeback at Plymouth on Wednesday week. Ben Roberts is also back in training after his illness and shoulder injury, and will probably be in contention for a

return this afternoon, subject to the boss's team selection. Also close to a return is Alan Kimble, who is running again and feeling no ill-effects after a

MANAGER

ANDY KING

Born in August 1956, in Luton, King made his name as a lively midfielder having joined his home town club in 1974. His next stop was Everton, the club with which most people associate him, who he signed for in 1976 for £35,000.

He made 150 appearances for The Toffees, scoring an impressive 38 goals in four seasons at Goodison before joining QPR.

One season with the Superhoops was followed by another at West Bromich Albion before a return to Everton for the 1982-83 season, where Andy played a further 43 games and added another 11 goals to his tally for the Toffees.

A short period with Dutch side Cambuur followed, before Andy returned to England with Wolves, for whom he played 28 times scoring 10 goals.

A very brief spell back at Luton in 1985 (just three appearances) precedeed Andy's final move as a player when he joined Aldershot and notched 11 goals in 36 games for the Surrey side.

GOALKEEPERS

1. BART GRIEMINK

Giant keeper signed by Colin Todd on a free transfer in the summer of 2000. Griemink is a former Dutch Under-21 international who spent a successful loan spell with The Robins (as cover for Frank Talia) before eventually joining the club. He came to English football in 1995 with Birmingham and deputised competently for the injured lan Bennett, playing in the 1995

League Cup semi-final. He then followed Barry Fry to Peterborough United but lost his place to Mark Tyler. Griemink started the 2000-01 season as first choice goalkeeper and even deputised as captain, but ended up on the bench as Steve Mildenhall took his place in goal following Griemink's two dismissals and subsequent lengthy suspension. However, following Mildenhall's departure to Notts County Bart played every game last season and was one of the most consistent performers.

32. CRAIG FARR

Goalkeeper who was an unused substitute for the Robins in the 2000-01 season and will hope the departure of Steve Mildenhall gives him more of a chance.

Has impressed greatly when given the chance in Town's second string and could become Bart Griemink's understudy this season. Andy King is a huge admirer of Farr and his display between the sticks against Wimbledon in pre-season is testament to the lad's ability.

DEFENDERS

2. GARETH EDDS

21-year old Australian who joins us on a month's loan from Nottingham Forest. Played nearly 40 games at Forest before joining Town on loan and has been excellent in the right-back role. Andy King will be hoping to secure his signature on a more permanent basis.

5. ADAM WILLIS

Willis arrived at the County Ground in 1998 on a free transfer from Coventry and was Steve McMahon's last signing for The Robins. He scarcely figured for Jimmy Quinn and was allowed to go on loan to Mansfield after being told he could leave Swindon. Fortunately Todd liked the tall defender and gave him a new contract. Willis was a regular in the first half of the following season and scored his first goal for Swindon in the 4-1 win against llkeston in the FA Cup.

6. ANDY GURNEY

Andy joined Reading from Torquay in January 1999 for £100,000 as an attack-minded, right-sided defender that could also play in midfield. He started his career at hometown club Bristol Rovers, where he spent four seasons before moving to Torquay for one year and impressing during their surge to the play-offs. Established a regular starting place with Reading in 1999/2000 and figured in the Royals' promotion push last year. Was keen to join Town after their impressive performance against Reading and King snapped him up on a Bosman in the summer of 2001. Crowned an impressive home debut performance against Tottenham with a long-range goal and proved to be one of King's best buys. Will be an integral part of King's squad this season and is set to continue as club captain.

12. JUAN COBIAN

Argentinian Cobian played for Boca Juniors before moving to Hillsborough in 1998. He was subsequently sold to Charlton and Aberdeen without playing much first team football. Made only three league appearances in his first season for the Robins, with Mark Robinson the normal right back.

19. MATTHEW HEYWOOD

Heywood failed to break through at Burnley's Turf Moor and, after being alerted as to his availability by former scout, Shaun Reid, Andy King snapped him up on a free transfer. What a signing he's proved to be, ever-present in the latter half of 2000/01 and missing just four games last year, it is no surprise that he swept the board in last year's Player of the Year Awards. The tall defender has signed an extension to his contract, much to the delight of the fans and he will be looking to show the same strength and commitment as he did last year. Strong in the tackle and good in the air, Heywood could prove to be a great asset to the club - if they can hang on to him.

Reeves always causes problems from set pieces and for a brief period in season 2000/01 he was the club's top goalscorer. At the beginning of the season he was told by Colin Todd that he could leave the club, but persuaded the manager to reconsider with some fine pre-season performances. Reeves went on to be a permanent fixture and even ended up captaining Swindon in Mark Robinson's absence. Before joining Swindon in 1998, spent four he years at Wimbledon, where he had the tough task of replacing John Scales. Reeves has also played for Gillingham, Chester and Rochdale where he was considered one of the best

players in the club's history.

4. MATTHEW HEWLETT

An attacking central midfielder, Matt Hewlett was once tipped for the top by all at Ashton Gate. The former Bristol City player was called into the England Under 21 squad, but a number of injuries curtailed his flourishing career. In the end Hewlett made over 100 appearances for City, but left them to join Town on a Bosman in the summer of 2000.

22. ALAN REEVES

Experienced centre back who is particularly strong in the air.

8. JIMMY DAVIS

He scored two goals for England,s under 20 side in Toulon and showed glimpses of what he's capable of against Barnsley and Chesterfield where he came on as sub in both games.

10. STEFANI MIGLIORANZI

Miglioranzi is the product of the American College football system in which the most promising players are drafted into Major League Soccer. Stefani helped St John's University win the 1996 NCAA Division I Championship and played for MLS team Chicago Fire before joining Everton on trial. They were keen to sign him but no deal came about. Portsmouth then outjumped Liverpool in inviting him for a trial and signed him soon thereafter. The 22-year-old is a Brazilian born American but holds an Italian passport. As a footballer the genes don't come much better.

11. DAVID DUKE

Left-sided midfielder that arrived on a free transfer from Sunderland in 2000. Unfortunately, Duke never managed a start for the Black Cat's first team. Duke appeared regularly in his first season with the





Robins. He combined well with Sol Davis down the Robins' left and is a good crosser of the ball. Was in and out of the side last season but with a bit of consistency, can make the left side his own following the departure of Sol Davis.

15. DARREN DYKES

Darren is somewhat of an unknown quantity having signed from Buckingham Town. However, the youngster made a huge impression when facing Didcot Town in a pre-season friendly and he was subsequently snapped up in a matter of weeks. The central midfielder has had trials with Spurs and Levton Orient, but after failing to secure a contract had been helping out with his father's business before he landed the deal at Town. Will be a couple of weeks before he reaches match fitness, but Dykes could be one for the future.

17. Danny Invincibile

Australian midfielder who endeared himself to the fans having been recommended to Colin Todd by Harry Redknapp at West Ham. Danny subsequently joined the Robins on a free transfer when Todd watched him in a trial game.

After a slow start (although he did score on his debut against West Brom), Danny showed the club what he was capable of with five goals in four games in October/November in season 2000/01. The former Marconi Stallion and Aussie Under-21 star would later become Town's top scorer with ten goals, arguably his most important coming in the last home game of that season against Peterborough in the ninetieth minute - a goal that some say kept the club up.

25. STEVE ROBINSON

Tough-tackling and energetic right-footed midfield terrier signed from Birmingham City for £50,000 in February 2001.

Found in the centre or right of midfielder, Robinson likes to win the ball and pass it on quickly. He made over 50 league starts for the Blues, but almost joined Sheffield United in 1999 only to fail the medical. Involved at the start of the 2000-01 season, but was transfer-listed by Trevor Francis in November after failing to hold down a regular place in the first team squad. Looks set to be a part of King's plans once again this season and he will be eager to add to the two goals he scored against Oxford in 2000/01., not to mention improve his disciplinary record!

FORWARDS

9. SAM PARKIN

Very young and very promising forward who joined the club from Chelsea on Thursday August 1, 2002. Parkin joined the club from Stamford Bridge where his development was hindered by a glut of international stars. However, whilst at the club he joined several other clubs on loan and it is with them that he built up a reputation as a lethal striker.

Has scored three goals already in pre-season and could be a hot prospect this year.

14. ERIC SABIN

Few had heard of the young Frenchman when he joined the club last summer, but with Andy King com-

Thierry Henry he brought a lot of flair and excitement to Town's front line. Sabin joined Town from French Second Division club Wasquehall who finished 18th in season 2000/01. Sabin contributed with seven goals in 58 starts in France and last season, he didn't get the goals he deserved scoring just five in total. However, in terms of hard work Sabin brings much more to the team and in the first few games alone he earned four penalties. Sabin looks particularly dangerous when the ball is played behind the opposing defence for he has blistering pace. With a bit more confidence in front of goal, Sabin could prove to be a great acquisition.

26. ALAN YOUNG

At 19 years of age, Young is one of Swindon's brightest hopes for the future. Having already played for England's Youth team, Young has risen from Town's youth set up to the fringe of the first team squad via the Reserves.

Scoring goals for fun with the youth side, Young more than held his own in he club's second string and marked his first team debut in the FA Cup by scoring against non-league Ilkeston Town in 2000/01.

King has made his admiration for the youngster very clear and he

could well figure in his plans this year after a growing influence on the first team last year; he made seven appearances in total in scored the winner in Town's 1-0 win over Blackpool.

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Blast From the Past

When the Town were pro-

moted from the old Division Four in 1968 they started off the following season in blistering form and looked odds-on favourites to walk through the third as well. Remaining unbeaten for the first eight games, a place at the top of the table was quickly established.

Boosted by the astute signings of Mike Harrison from Plymouth, Laurie Sheffield from Oldham and Brian Lewis from Coventry for the then huge total sum of £37,000, Oldham, Rotherham, Barnsley, Tranmere and Mansfield were all seen off at Kenilworth Road, while points were picked up on travels to Barrow, Gillingham and Orient. The bubble had to burst eventually and, at Brighton on September 21st, the Town went down 0-1 in a lacklustre display against a side they had hammered out of the League Cup only ten

days previously.

The barnstorming displays were now beginning to take their toll, and although a 1-0 win was recorded the following week against Torquay at Kenilworth Road, it was a very tired performance that barely warmed the hearts of the crowd of 14,936.

Injuries were now starting to cause a problem, coupled with the downturn in form, and back to back away defeats were suffered at local rivals Watford and at that ground where we rarely seem to get a result, Oakwell, Barnsley.

Win at home and lose away now seemed to be the pattern that was setting in, and in a bid to rejuvenate the side manager Allan Brown went out and signed goalkeeper Sandy Davie from Dundee United and defender Jack Bannister from Crystal Palace.

players made their debuts in the game home against Northampton at the end of October, before a crowd of 17,818, and they played their parts in a hard fought 2-1 victory.

Unfortunately it was then back to the now expected away defeat in the next game, at Walsall, and the Hatters were pushed back to sixth position which was no place to be for a side backed by an ambitious board of directors who were determined to get the club back in to the top flight, which we had last graced in 1960.

The next visitors to Kenilworth Road were the new pacesetters Swindon Town, who boasted the mercurial winger Don Rogers in their side. As well as the desire to maintain our 100% home record we had a score to settle for the Wiltshire side had

rather fortunately knocked us out of the F.A.Cup at the County Ground the previous season.

Bob Luton secretary Readhead was said to be rather disappointed with the crowd of only 17,250 that turned up on a murky afternoon and put the 'low' attendance down to the pockets of fog that had blanketed many local areas.

The Town welcomed back skipper Terry Branston, as well as wingers Mike Harrison and Graham French after injury, while Swindon were at full strength hoping to add to



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fiercely contested match, belonged to the Hatters who had several chances to take the lead with Sheffield guilty of misses he would normally have put away.

The game had a scoreless look about it as the two midfields cancelled each other out, but in the second period Swindon decided to come out of their shell and subjected the Luton defence to a great deal of pressure.

It was only some smart saves from Davie that prevented Swindon from taking the lead, and it was therefore against the run of play when the Town went 1-0 up on the hour.

Sheffield had been guilty of a heavy challenge on Swindon goalkeeper, Peter Downsborough, and while he was still groggy the Luton forwards exploited this weakness and pumped a succession of high balls into the area.

From one of these, Sheffield took advantage of some hesitation and smacked a volley into the net.

The Robins now had to attack for all they were worth and consequently left gaps in defence which were increasingly exploited by the Luton forwards. From one such counter attack French beat two defenders and laid on an inch perfect pass for Lewis to put the game beyond doubt with ten minutes to go.

Whereas Allan Brown spoke of a "fine all round performance" after the match, the national press preferred to concentrate on the less savoury aspects of the clash, particularly Sheffield's foul on Downsborough and the running battle between Lewis and the Swindon captain Stan Harland.

'Crunch...! Luton swagger on' ran one national headline, with the reporter going on to say, "Some call it professional Some call it power instinct. play. I call it ugly...the way Luton preserved their perfect home record and ended Swindon's sweep of success". It is not often that a Luton Town side has been accused of bullying!

The 20 page issue for the visit of Swindon on 9th November 1968 had barely two pages of reading material, making it extremely poor value for the increased price of 1/- (5p), although we did get to marvel at the cover page drawing of a very strange shaped footballer.

The 'Club Notes' section offered congratulations to Swindon for reaching the semi-final of the League Cup where they were due to play Burnley. The Robins, of course, went on to lift the trophy that season beating Arsenal in the final at Wembley.

As always with Luton home programmes of this vintage the advertisements make interesting reading. A brand new Vauxhall Viva, the 'one-litre world beater' could be picked up for £650 while Wilds 'the kit suppliers to Luton Town' were offering a full team kit (twelve of everything) for £27-10-0 (£27.50).

Finally, that old favourite Cesars Palace, 'Entertainment... 1970 style', was advertising a four course dinner for 30/- (£1.50) while

The Road to Stockport

STOCKPORT is another of those grounds in the north west where the most direct route on the map is not necessarily the quickest. Take the M1 from Luton, and stay on it to junction 23a, and then follow the A50 towards and beyond Stoke, then join the M6 heading north. Leave M6 at junction 19, turning right onto the A556 towards Manchester. Just over four miles from the M6 you reach Bowdon. At a large roundabout there take the M56 towards Manchester and after nearly seven miles take the M60, signposted to Stockport. Leave M60 at junction 1, to head towards Stockport town centre, and then at a roundabout follow the signs towards Cheadle. Go straight on at one set of traffic lights, and turn right at the next, onto the A560, and after a further mile turn left by the Farmer's Arms, into Edgeley Road, and another mile takes you to the ground. Parking is a bit of a problem, with restrictions applied to many streets around Edgeley Park.

The similar close call at the other end was when a cracking Town move, instigated by Emmerson Boyce, ended with Paul Hughes smashing a drive against a post. Before that, Dean Crowe had found himself in the clear thanks to a Huddersfield defensive mistake. Just outside the penalty area, he got onto the end of a long ball, and had only to chip the onrushing keeper to put the Town ahead. He lifted the shot too high. The counter-balance to that came in the second half when Danny Schofield, for the only time in the game, was unmarked in the box to meet a cross, and failed to cash in by dithering long enough for the Town defence to cover.

Boyce must have been very close to earning a penalty early in the second half, when he seemed to be brought down, and as each side made substitutions the Town came more and more into the match as an attacking force.

Fotiadis, ever willing to run at opponents, carved out the chance for the late winner, leaving home boss Mick Wadsworth desolate.

"We have been caught with our trousers down in the last minute," he said. "Draws are not good enough, and trying to win the game we left the back door open. We were poor, but played better in the second half and controlled the game. Luton camped deep and made it hard for us, which they would do because they had had a bad run. The goal was a blow because I didn't think Luton were going to score."

Joe Kinnear disagreed with that. "I always felt we were the better side," he said. "The free kick which hit the bar was a decent strike, but otherwise there wasn't much for us to worry about.

"I wasn't as worried about keeping a clean sheet as in getting a result. I wanted maximum points, because of the position we were in. It was a late goal, but it was always on the cards that it was coming. It was the perfect time to score, and this is not the easiest place to come and get a result."

Second Division Scene

WHAT a difference a win can make! The Town's success at Huddersfield has pushed them out of the bottom four of the Second Division for the first time this season, with a chance today to rise another notch or two at the expense of visitors who are just one point and two places above us.

Lennie Lawrence was another enjoying the benefits of one result this week. On Tuesday his Cardiff side, in fourth place, picked up a point at Plymouth and shot to the top of the table for the first time this season. It might have been even better, because the Pilgrims needed a stoppage time equaliser to rescue a draw. Robert Earnshaw netted twice for Cardiff, taking his tally to eight goals, to become the division's joint leading scorer alongside Luke Beckett of Stockport. Plymouth's two goals – wouldn't you know it! – came from centre-halves Paul Wotton and Graham Coughlan

Cardiff's draw displaced QPR at the top. Rangers became the season's fourth leaders on Saturday by winning at Bristol City. That deposed Wigan, who were held to a home draw by Peterborough, a result which helped to make it all-change at the bottom of the table as well.

The Posh had briefly moved up to 20th place with a 2-0 home victory over Plymouth the previous week, and the Pilgrims had an even bigger shock to come. On Saturday Chesterfield, who didn't look the world's best at Kenilworth Road a month ago, succeeded where we, among others, failed – they beat Plymouth

The bottom of the table crunch game was at Mansfield, where Cheltenham won a six-pointer to shoot up six places, from bottom to 18th, ahead of the Town on goal difference because of their 2-0 success. Mansfield replaced Cheltenham in bottom place, and their win at Kenilworth Road ten days ago is all the more galling for Town fans because the Stags are struggling in this division. They have lost seven of their ten league games and since beating Plymouth 4-3 on the opening day of the season they have played 383 minutes of football at home without scoring a goal.

Notts County, another team we managed to make look like Brazil for half a game, are in the bottom four for the first time after a home defeat against Cardiff. In the top six in August, County's current run is eight games without a win.

Swindon come to town today having also suffered a dip following a bright start to the season. They were the first league leaders after two games, but then went seven without a win, and were also knocked out of the Worthington Cup at Wycombe. But Andy King, having hired Steve Coppell to help him on a short-term contract, has taken some of the pressure off thanks to last Saturday's 2-0 home victory over Northampton.

Sam Parkin, a £50,000 buy from Chelsea in the summer, scored the clincher from a penalty after he had been brought down by Cobblers goalkeeper Lee Harper, who was sent off. The opener had been netted by Johnny Jackson, who is on loan from Spurs. The overdue victory ended a run of seven consecutive defeats. On the road, Swindon have not won since their first away game of the season, 4-2 at Chesterfield. Since then their awaydays have been 0-0 at Blackpool, 1-3 at Brentford and 0-2 at QPR and at Cheltenham.
