GOOD AFTERNOON AND A WARM WELCOME TO THE COUNTY GROUND THIS AFTERNOON. MAY I ALSO WELCOME STEVE WHITTON, HIS MANAGEMENT TEAM, PLAYERS, DIRECTORS AND SUPPORTERS WHO HAVE MADE THE JOURNEY FROM ESSEX TODAY.

As I write these notes I am finding it difficult to know what to say. In fact, I almost feel as though I am in the same position as last week. Results are not good and public opinion is such that many fans would like to see me replaced.

It is a very difficult situation for me. I would go as far as saying that this is the lowest time since I've been here and I am not stupid – this is not a good time for us all on the field. But the fact of the matter is that I simply can not walk away from this situation because I am not a quitter. I would be lying if I said I liked the atmosphere at the moment. The number of fans venting their frustrations towards me is growing and is no longer a minority – but I am still hoping that I can sway their opinion with some good performances and positive results. That is the difficult part, but something that I am adamant we can achieve.

I still have belief in myself as a manager to lead this club forward. Not only that, but I also have belief in my players and although it is hard for them, I think that they will come through this and be stronger for it. With the start that we had and the confidence in the camp – I never expected this latest run of results to happen, but in my opinion the only

thing to do is to keep working as hard as we can in order to put it right.

Last weekend's result was particularly disappointing because, in the first half, we created a number of chances and played fairly well. Not only that, but in the second half when we were up against ten men, we struggled to break them down and it was an irresponsible performance. It was better than Luton, but it was still disappointing and I almost wish Oldham hadn't gone down to ten men because we were worse when we had the extra man. We just didn't take responsibility and the players didn't do as they were told at half time. There were individual decisions being made that were wrong and the lack of potency up front was there for all to see. We didn't even create many chances and if that doesn't happen, then you are always going to struggle to score goals. It is something that has been a problem ever since I joined the club and it is something that needs addressing. But then again when you're winning games going forward and creating chances comes easily - it's not so easy when you haven't scored for a while and things appear to be going against you.

This week we play a side in stark contrast to last week's opposition. As you know Oldham came here on the back of a good run which didn't help us, but today's visitors have lost five in a row and so their confidence is likely to be low too. Put simply, this is a game we must win and if we do things correctly and just go out there with a bit more belief and confidence – then we know we can beat Colchester. It will take a passionate performance, but I am confident that the lads have it within themselves to overcome this current problem.



The players need you, the fans right now to get behind them and really urge them on to victory. Yes it's hard and yes, there are those of you that believe that I am not the right man for the job here. But I would ask that today, you sing your hearts out for the lads because it makes such a difference to them. I will take the stick, I did so last week and I will do it again – but please support the lads because it is a difficult time for them as well.

Finally, as you know this week we lost the services of Steve Coppell. Steve came here for a couple of weeks and helped us out and I thank him for that. Unfortunately Steve was given the opportunity to return to management in a higher division and I don't blame for moving on. Instead I wish him all the best of luck with Brighton.

Got plans this Saturday?



Good afternoon and welcome back to the County Ground for today's visit of Colchester United. A warm welcome also to the visiting directors, management, players and supporters who have travelled across from Essex.

Naturally, there was a great deal of disappointment amongst everyone at the club, particularly our supporters after last Saturday's result. However, listening to the phone-in on BBC Wiltshire Sound I was made aware that there are some half-truths and myths out in the public domain that need responding to and rectifying. Let me try and answer some of them:

 Andy King remains the manager of our club because the board believe he can still turn the results around and develop our on-field long-term strategy. It is not because we owe Andy money from previous times that we cannot afford to pay him if he were to leave.

2. The club has managed to 'right the boat' financially over the past few months. However, cash flow, as it is at most football clubs, is very tight, and without outside assistance we cannot make the loyalty payment to Neil Ruddock. Yes, the board understood the contractual obligation to Neil, but it should be understood that over £1.4 million, in shares and loans has been invested in the club since December 2001 to keep the club going and get us to where we are now. As with all disputes there are arguments on both sides, and whilst Neil has been unable to get himself fit enough to challenge for a first team place, we believe it is wrong that the club, when it cannot afford to do so, should be punished for not paying a 'loyalty fee'.

 Until such time as the club successfully defends against the debenture held against the stadium by the previous owners, there is no chance of any additional investments into the

club. That is why the club are so driven to defend itself.

4. Ticket prices had to be increased to ensure that the club could continue to pay its way. Without the increase, unpalatable as they may have been to some people, this club would not have survived this far. If we can achieve a regular number 5,500 (or more) paying customers for every home game then the club can survive, and prosper. The club will not be able to continue if people stay away or are encouraged to stay away by misguided comments from certain sections. We cannot afford to let this club face the financial abyss again - I don't believe it will be able to pull off a third escape act.

I hope this helps you to understand the position a little more clearly.

The concerns over team performances have deflected us from our intentions to open more communication routes with our fans. Please be sure that we still intend to develop our communication processes as quickly as possible.

Please support the team positively, your frustrations are completely understandable, but with your vocal support we can make the County Ground a difficult place for opposing teams to visit.

Enjoy the game.

An early goal from Lee Duxbury was enough to see Oldham record a sixth straight victory as Town lacked ideas on a sunny autumnal afternoon.

Despite playing well in the first half and playing against 10 men for 45 minutes, Town just couldn't apply themselves in the second half and, instead, frustrated the 4, 326 crowd with a disappointing display - many fans subsequently making their feelings perfectly clear at the end of the game.

Town started with five at the back, Willis, Reeves and Heywood joined by Gurney and Duke on each flank, whilst Miglioranzi, Hewlett and Jackson made up the midfield trio. With Parkin suspended, it was up to Sabin and Invincibile to take charge up front.

However, it was the visitors that struck first blood and as early as the sixth minute Oldham scored what later turned out to be the winning goal. Lee Duxbury cut in from the right hand side to force a low left-footed effort past Griemink in the Town goal. It was an impressive finish, but to be honest Duxbury had all the time in the world to line up his shot and King will be frustrated by the lack of urgency in his defence.

Town looked dangerous following the visitors' goal however, and Invincibile and Sabin caused the away defence all sorts of problems with their pace.

In fact, Invincibile came close from several long-range efforts but didn't quite trouble Pogliacomi in the Oldham goal.

Johnny Jackson was perhaps Town's best outlet - the Tottenham

midfielder linking the midfield and the attack well. And it was from his corner that Town nearly equalised, Pogliacomi saving well from the Tottenham midfielder's wicked cross.

With minutes remaining in the first half Oldham were reduced to ten men. Danny Invincibile turned on the half way line and looked to have got the better of Julian Baudet until the defender brought him down. Baudet was subsequently sent off and Town looked forward to facing ten men in the second period.

Town's faithful were expecting a barrage of pressure from their team in the second period but it wasn't to be. Instead Town looked devoid of ideas and despite having much of the ball, they failed to penetrate in the final third. Danny Invincibile headed wide from a corner before Wijnhard came close to adding a second for Oldham, the former Leeds man directing a shot straight at Griemink.

Jackson came close soon after, the midfielder angling a low drive towards the bottom corner of the net. Unfortunately Pogliacomi tipped the ball round the post and Gurney headed over from the subsequent corner.

John Eyre fired over the bar for Oldham before Gurney forced Pogliacomi into a spectacular save, Town's skipper sending a fierce drive towards the top left hand corner before Oldham's "keeper tipped the ball over the bar.

Town were running out of ideas and it was Oldham that looked the more likelier to score. Wijnhard beating Willis and Reeves to force Griemink into a save before Corazzin saw his effort thwarted by the Dutchman.

1. HOW DID YOU FIND YOUR TIME AT MIDDLESBOROUGH?

I really enjoyed it, I played a few first team games there but they were starting to spend a lot of money. When they were bringing in the likes of Ravanelli and Juninho it wasn't looking like I was going to get a chance so it was time to move on.

SWINDON TOWN'S RESERVES CLAIMED A 2-1 VICTORY OVER LOCAL RIVALS BRISTOL ROVERS AT THE COUNTY GROUND LAST WEDNESDAY AFTERNOON.

The visitors included first team players Bryant, Richards, Gall and Emblem in their side whilst with the exception of first team substitute keeper Craig Farr, only Gareth Edds and Daren Dykes had appeared for the first team this season for Swindon.

The home side began brightly with Crosby seeing his drive well saved and Daren Dykes dragging his shot wide following a mix up on half way in the Rovers defence, which let the ex-Buckingham man in. However the visitors took the lead on just 8 minutes when Rovers broke away down the right hand side and the ball was crossed to the back post where Kevin Gall was allowed to chest the ball down before firing a fierce shot past Farr from 10 yards out. Just three minutes later Swindon responded with a swift equaliser from lan Herring. A corner found its way to Mark Draycott whose clever back heel laid on Herring who rifled his shot past the visiting Clarke in front of the Town end. Chris Hughes was guilty of missing the best chance of the first period for Town. Slack defending from Rovers let in Chris Hughes who ran the ball to the edge of the box but fired high and wide with only the keeper to beat with no defender near him.

Malcolm Crosby's side came out for the second half looking bright and Juan Cobian's excellent low drive from the right across the face of the box was admired by his teammates rather than followed up. Defender Shore cleared the danger following the resulting corner. 5th MICHAEL CARRICK

OF THE BEST

Last week Sven Goran announced his squad to face Slovakia and Macedonia, Amongst our favourite Swede's 24-man throng is David Thompson, currently at Blackburn, but who made ten appearances for **Town under Steve** McMahon. This got us thinking, who are five of the best England internationals to have spent time here at the County Ground? This is what we found...

MICHAEL CARRICK

Michael was brought in on loan by Jimmy Quinn from West Ham and made his Robins debut at home to Norwich in the First Division. He made six appearances for Town with two goals to his name. After leaving the County Ground Michael then starred for West Ham at the end of the 1999/2000 Season and scored in The Hammers' 5-0 demolition of Coventry. After a successful spell at The County Ground he caught the eye of Under 21 Manager David Platt and earned his first England cap as a substitute in the 4-0 win over Mexico in May.

TERRY FENWICK

Terry's England career saw him play in the 1986 World Cup in Mexico and he played against Diego Maradona when the Argentine scored THAT goal. He featured in four of England's five World Cup matches in Mexico which were among his total of 20 appearances for his country. The Durham-born defender joined Town on a free transfer from Spurs in September 1993. He made 23 appearances for Swindon in the Premiership but just two the following season after an altercation with fellow Town player Luc Nijholt. He moved to Portsmouth and later became manager at Fratton Park.

HARRY FLEMING

Described as a 'great footballer and gentleman' Harold Fleming was capped nine times for England. He actually played twelve times for England but caps were not awarded for matches against continental opposition. Perhaps Fleming's greatest day came in 1912 when he scored a hat-trick against Ireland. In all, he scored nine goals for England and had it not been for World War

One, undoubtedly it would have been many more. An inside-right whose ball control and balance seem to have been his main attributes, Harry died on the 23rd August 1955.

He may have been here for a couple of weeks, but by becoming Town's assistant manager Steve qualifies for our top five. With 42 caps (and seven goals) to his name it is no surprise and Steve made his international debut against Italy in 1977. Steve was of a new breed of wide midfielders who, in addition to being able to beat defenders and whip over telling crosses, would track back and provide cover for his defence. Steve, since leaving the County Ground and at the time of writing this programme has now taken over the managerial reigns at Brighton.



GLENN HODDLE

Recently voted the best Tottenham player of all time by fans on the Official Spurs Website, Glenn Hoddle was, without doubt, the most naturally gifted English player of his generation and is now back 'home' at Spurs as manager. He played 53 times for his country with 44 of those caps coming whilst at White Hart Lane. Glenn enjoyed a successful spell here at The County Ground winning promotion with some outstanding football including that Play-Off Final victory against Leicester City in 1993. After a spell . as Chelsea boss, he managed his country at the World Cup France '98. Southampton was his next port of call as 'gaffer' but he returned to his 'home' at White Hart Lane and has enjoyed a successful spell at the helm so far.

Record against the Town: STFC wins 21, CUFC wins 20, Draws 13 Yet these games have become synonymous with the U's (and us I suppose as well) in recent years and Colchester, like Town, are struggling this time around having started the season amongst the bookies' favourites to go down. With a small squad, lack of high-profile names (since the departure of Lomano Tresor Lua Lua to Newcastle), a dilapidated ground and no money to spend it is easy to see why the same assumption is made year after year. In fact, the club is arguably more famous for being the club that Lua Lua came from, rather than for its own merits.

However, Colchester by their very nature are a club that thrives in the face of adversity and for the last two years, they have defied the odds and remained in Division Two when bigger clubs such as Bristol Rovers and Oxford have not. Even their club history suggests that they are more resilient than most. Located in a city founded by the Romans, Colchester not only boast one of the greatest cup shocks of all time (against Don Revie's Leeds), but they also rose back from the dead following their relegation from the Football League in 1990. In 1991/92, following their relegation from Division Three, the U's not only won the Conference (ahead of Divison Two rivals Wycombe) but also the FA Trophy before returning to Division Two in 1997/98 (thanks to some heroic goalkeeping from Carl Emerson).

Mick Wadsworth came and went (as did George Burley and Mark Kinsella in the 90's) before Steve Whitton took permanent charge of the club in 1999/00 and Whitton, despite having little money to spend, has kept the club in the division ever since, endearing himself to the Layer Road faithful in the process.

With that said this year looks set to be another tough one for the U's, the current economic climate contriving to further their economic plight - but so far the Essex boys have acquitted themselves to the extent that they currently sit above Town by one place in the league. Had it not been for their recent run of five games without a win they would probably be enjoying better times too, a combination of injuries and suspensions whittling down Whitton's already thin squad (sound familiar?).

An opening day victory against Stockport was closely followed by a creditable draw against Tranmere at Prenton Park. Two defeats followed before victories against Peterborough and Wigan lifted the U's from the bottom half of the table before their recent run has seen go in the opposite direction.

Goals have been at a premium for Steve Whitton's side and at the time of writing, they've managed just five since the start of the season. As a consequence Colchester are yet to register a win since the Wigan victory in August and they have collected just one point in the process - let's hope that their dismal run continues today.

STEVE WHITTON

Steve's playing career saw him play at the top level with Birmingham, Sheffield Wednesday, Ipswich Town and Colchester United, although his greatest days were spent at his boyhood heroes, West Ham United.

Injury forced him out of the game early in 1998 and led him to concentrate on coaching as assistant to Steve Wignall at Colchester United. In his time as Assistant Manager, Steve helped guide the U's to two Wembley appearances, including the 1998 Play-Off Final, where they gained promotion to Nationwide League Division Two.

In January 1999, Steve took over as Caretaker-Manager before the arrival of Mick Wadsworth, reverting back to Assistant Manager following his arrival. Wadsworth resigned just weeks into the start of the 1999/00 season however and Steve took permanent charge of the team.

THE GAFFER THE SQUAD

SIMON BROWN

Chelmsford-born keeper who was signed from Tottenham in the summer of 1999 at the age of 23. Failed to make the first team at White Hart Lane, but had spells on loan at Lincoln and Fulham. Established himself in his first season at Laver Road, making 41 appearances in all competitions.

JOEY KEITH

Talented young wing-back who signed from West Ham in the summer of 1999. Despite no first team experience he went straight into the U's side and missed only one of the 50 first team games in 1999/00 - a feat only equalled by one other player. Discovered a new talent when pushed forward in the latter half of the 2000/01 season and has proved his ability around the box with some superb freekick taking.

ALAN WHITE

Released by Luton in May 2000, this tall central defender joined Colchester in the summer for his second spell at Layer Road, following a month's loan midway through the previous season. Made nearly 100 first team appearances in all competitions at Luton, where Lennie Lawrence had recruited him for £40,000 from Middlesborough in 1997. Aged 24, Alan hails from Darlington and signed a year's extension to stay with the club for the 2002/3 season.

SAM STOCKLEY

Sam joined Colchester United on a month's loan at the end of August from Oxford United. Having fallen out of favour with the Third Division club, Sam will be hoping for regular football with the U's. Cost Oxford £150,000 from

Barnet in 2001, and was a part of the PFA Third Division Team of the Year for that season.

DANNY STEELE

Big 19-year-old centre back who signed in July 2002 after being released by Millwall's academy at the end of the 2001/02 campaign. Danny was invited for a trial with Colchester after impressing Steve Whitton in a couple of reserve matches at the tail end of the last campaign. Steele is a no-nonsense centre-half who will be hoping to force his way into Colchester United's defence.

MICKY STOCKWELL

Colchester were delighted to capture the summer signature of this midfield ace, who has more than 600 first team appearances with Ipswich Town under his belt. Essex born, his experience and irrepressible energy and enthusiasm proved invaluable at this level as he scored 11 goals and was an ever present in the first team - winning a string of Player of the Year awards in his first season.

BOBBY BOWRY

Signed from Millwall in July, Bobby was signed to fill the role vacated by Aaron Skelton's departure to Luton Town during the summer. An experienced midfielder, Bobby's passing ability will provide a spark for the likes of Kern Izzet and Thomas Pinault to feed off in the centre of the park, whilst his defensive strengths allow the younger duo to push forward.



Thomas is a young Frenchman who signed in the summer of 1999 and after

a long time on the sidelines, has now established himself a regular midfield place in the U's line up. His first taste of senior action came as a sub in August 1999, but he had to wait another eight months for his full debut.

KEM IZZET

Exciting and combative midfielder who joined the U's on transfer deadline day in 2001 after being released by Premiership side Charlton. Initially brought to Layer Road on a month's loan, Kem impressed manager Steve Whitton and earned a permanent move. Brother of Leicester's Muzzy, 21-year-old Kem has already attracted interest from higher divisions.

SCOTT MCGLEISH

The U's top scorer last season with 15 goals, Scott is a lively striker who joined Charlton from non-league Edgware at the age of 20 in May 1994. After six Division One appearances as a sub and a loan spell at Leyton Orient, he moved to Peterborough. The goals began to flow in a 1996 loan spell at Colchester where he helped the U's into the Division Three play-offs. After a £50,000 move to Leyton Orient in November 1996, Barnet paid £70,000 for his services and he scored nearly 40 senior goals before new Steve Whitton snapped him up for Colchester in January 2001.



Became the U's third signing of last summer after an impressive trial spell. Having fallen out of favour with Notts County, 23-year-old Kevin was signed by Steve Whitton to provide strength in depth up front. Hard-working and determined, 'Raps' became the second U's player to hit double figures for goals scored during the 2001/2 season.

ADRIAN COOTE

Proven goalscorer who has represented England at both B and Under 21 level, as well as representing the Football League. Started his career with York City before Sunderland recognised his talents and paid £80,000 in 1987 to take him to Roker Park. Scored 87 goals during his four seasons stay before Crystal Palace splashed out £1.8 million in October 1991 to secure his services. Gabbiadini then enjoyed spells at Derby, Panionios, Birmingham City, Oxford United, Stoke, Darlington and Rushden and Diamonds before joining today's visitors.

DEAN MORGAN

An effervescent striker who is expected to make his breakthrough into the U's first team this season. Aged just 18, Dean is rated highly by the backroom staff at Layer Road, and after a season of substitute appearances will be keen to force his way into the starting line-up on a more frequent basis.

THEM AND US

Ray Bunkell was a Swindon Town midfielder between June 1971 and December 1973 during which he clocked up 56 Division Two appearances. Born in Edmonton, Ray signed for Tottenham in 1967 but failed to make an appearance for the White Hart Lane club despite winning England youth international honours. A move to Swindon, then in Division Two, gave him his first start in a 0-0 draw at Watford and 31 outings were to follow before season 71/72 drew to a close, encompassing goals in the home wins against Portsmouth and Cardiff. With a further 23 appearances in

1972/73, Ray looked like an established member of the Town's first team but despite the common Tottenham ground between Bunkell and Town manager Les Allen, Bunkell left the County Ground to try pastures new at Layer Road, Colchester.

United were then in Division Four but Ray had joined a promotion bound team who completed the season in third place, and as Town were destined for bottom place in Division Two Ray kicked off 1974/75 on an equal fitting with his ex-team mates. Ray played in 129 League matches for Colchester in a period stretching to 1979 and contributed nine goals as Colchester spent further spells in Division Four and Three.

Will Dixon joined Town in September 1973 and in doing so enrolled in a pretty exclusive club. Other members were to include Clive Allen and Joey Beauchamp. All three left the club for whom they'd signed within weeks of joining without ever making a League appearance.

Only a month earlier Will had left Fourth Division Reading and signed for DAVE WALLIS WENT BACK ON THE SEARCH FOR PLAYERS THAT HAD PLAYED FOR BOTH CLUBS AND THIS WEEK, WITH THE VISIT OF COLCHESTER, HE FOUND RAY BUNKELL AND WILL DIXON.

Ray Bunkell in

promoted Colchester, newly of the Third. For whatever reason, Dixon chose to 'up-sticks' (if any sticks had been downed at that point) and venture back along the M4 to Swindon.

A London-born lad who started his career at Arsenal, it seems that west of the capital suited him better than Essex, which was surely a wise choice. Having never made a first team appearance at Highbury, Dixon of Wood Green had moved to Reading in 1969 and made in excess of 150 League appearances for the Elm Park club. Reliable and consistent would describe Will, apart from his 'stint' at Colchester that is, and the move to Swindon was to add 140 Division Three appearances as he became established as Town's regular right back.

Another strange circumstance took Dixon away from the County Ground to Aldershot in 1977. Despite making 38 League appearances that season and despite Dixon's open desire to stay at Swindon, manager Danny Williams moved Will on to the Recreation Ground for a nominal fee. A disagreement over travelling expenses was cited for the split and Will received a presentation from Town supporters in his last Town match at home to Portsmouth for his contribution to the club's cause. Perversely, it had been Dixon's goal at Aldershot in April 1976 that had provided the Town with a 1-0 win, and the points that made the difference that sent Aldershot down to the Fourth Division and scrambled survival for Town.

So, still west of London, another 120 games followed at Aldershot leaving Will with a healthy career total of over 400 games when he retired in 1979.



DUTCH COURAGE

BART GRIEMINK, DUE TO MAKE HIS 96TH APPEARANCE FOR TOWN THIS AFTERNOON, TALKS TO CHRIS TANNER AND PREDICTS A 3-0 WIN...

Believe it or not, Bart Griemink, Town's influential goalkeeper, is now one of Swindon Town's longest serving players. The big Dutchman arrived at The County Ground on loan from Peterborough United in February 2000 after being brought in, initially by Jimmy Quinn, before Colin Todd signed him in the summer of the same year.

Born in Oss, Holland, Bart started his career in his home country, signing his first contract for WKE Holland at the age of 18. 'Dutch football is certainly different. I haven't seen a game from the league I used to play in for about seven years so it is a bit hard to compare it with the standard over here in England. Coaching in Holland starts early at around seven or eight years old so it follows right through.'

Griemink then made the move to England through a friend of his who was playing football in the Dutch non-league. A trial then came about at Birmingham City and after playing in a reserve match, the rest as they say, is history. The Manager that signed him was none other than the enigmatic Barry Fry. He then resigned Bart when he became the manager at Peterborough United and paid £25,000 for his services in 1996. Griemink's displays at St Andrews obviously impressed Fry as Bart went on to make 62 appearances at London Road.

'He is a great guy. He gave me a chance to come over to England and play and I was very grateful for that. Barry Fry is one of those old fashioned managers who likes to throw tea cups about at half time but I always got on quite well with him. The spirit was always good and he was definitely a character!'

Bart has played under a number of managers since his time with Barry Fry and in his time at the County Ground alone, Bart has played under four managers in just two years with Jimmy Quinn, Colin Todd, Roy Evans passing through the revolving managerial doors - Andy King now in charge. When on loan here, Bart played four games in Division One under Quinn before returning to East Anglia. Following Swindon's relegation to the Second Division he was signed by Colin Todd who arrived in the summer of 2000 along with a glut of new signings. Bart's permanent County Ground career began brightly with a clean sheet in the goalless draw with today's opponents Colchester United. He is now one of the more experienced members of a young Swindon side.

"We have a very young side at the moment and everyone is working hard. I think Alan Reeves is the oldest player at 34 and I am 30 myself. Then there is 'Gurns' (Andy Gurney) and a few in their late twenties and I think experience helps in the type of situations that we find ourselves in now. I can understand the fans current displeasure, everyone is frustrated though, not just the fans, it is everyone connected with the club including the players. When you are losing games it is hard, but we just have to keep working hard to try and get ourselves out of trouble."

Griemink comes across as a down to earth family man who is settled at the club and enjoys what he does. He and his wife have just had a baby girl which he says keeps him occupied in his spare time. The Griemink family also say Bath is one of their favourite places to visit when they get the chance. Bart was on his way into the famous rugby city as we conducted this interview. He also divides his spare time between the gym and spending time with friends.

'I get on with most people at the club, Keith O'Halloran is a good



friend and we meet up at the weekends sometime and go out. I try and go to the gym at least three times a week and do a weights routine which concentrates on my upper body which helps my game.'

His matchday routine remains constant and involves an 8.30am rise, a walk, then a pre-match meal of chicken, rice and beans. He claims not to be the nervous type, but his morning walk calms him before an hour and a half of extreme concentration in the hustle and bustle of the tough English Second Division.

"I do all sorts of things on match day. I get up at 8.30am and have breakfast then go back to bed and watch a bit of television then have my pre-match meal at around 11.30am, which is then followed by a walk. I set off for the ground at around 12.30pm. I try to think about the game as much as possible and think of things that I would like to do during the match. I get a little bit nervous before the game, but it is just the usual pre-match nerves. I just like to get on with the game as 3.00pm approaches."

Craig Farr is Bart's main rival for the Number One shirt and he is full of praise for the former Youth Team stopper. 'He is a great keeper and played very well in pre-season so it is clear he has promise for the future. He is a good all rounder and working with him in training you can see his potential. We have goalkeeper training on Monday mornings and Thursday afternoons with Alan Judge. The rest of the time is spent with the squad as we work together. There are a few keepers I look at and try and learn from. I think Peter Schmeichel is one of the better keepers certainly. Opposition strikers are not something that I pay great attention to or analyse before a match. I take every game as it comes no matter who we are playing - I just concentrate on keeping a clean sheet."

Penalties are certainly a chance for 'keepers to shine and as the 6'4 Dutchman explains, the solution to Swindon Town's goal scoring problem could be a lot closer to home than we all think. Bart claims to have had thoughts on notching that vital FA Cup winner in the dying seconds.

'I keep an eye on the foot position of the penalty taker, but it is normally a guess on penalties. Sometimes it works sometimes it doesn't! I do think sometimes that I would like to go out and score a few goals but it doesn't happen to often, the lads always tell me to get back in goal! I have thought about it in the league but I think I might just end up getting in the way of our strikers, for the moment I will let the others get on with it.'

On the visit of Colchester United to the County Ground today, Bart is hoping for three points against Steve Whitton's United side that lye just one place above Town in the league and who have just one away win this season to their name.

'They started the season in similar fashion to us but haven't had a great run lately and seem to be struggling. Hopefully we will beat them today – I'll say 3-0 in our favour.'

I thank Bart for his time and let him continue on his journey into the cultural heart of Bath with its varied lifestyle, renowned spa's and outstanding charm. But despite the tranquil surroundings, there is a firm sense that Bart Griemink remains totally focused on rising head and shoulders above all around him in his quest for a win today.

Cheltenham Town defender Steve Jones suffered heartache on his return to Robins action, breaking his right leg in the 3-1 defeat by Blackpool. The 31year-old former Swansea stopper landed awkwardly after a clearing header and was stretchered from the pitch just before half time. Jones had previously broken the same leg while at the Vetch Field and has made just three appearances since his return to Cheltenham due to a catalogue of woe. "The bone is broken in two places. I knew I'd done it straight away," Jones told the Gloucestershire Echo. "I heard a crack and it felt a bit sore. I couldn't stand on it. I've got to go and see a specialist this week sometime. It's just one of those things, but I haven't been the luckiest with injuries."



CARLISLE INJURY WORRY



QPR are waiting to assess Clarke Carlisle's calf injury after the defender limped out of the 2-0 defeat at Crewe early in the first half. "Clarke's got a problem with the back of his knee which has stretched to the calf muscle and we will have to wait and see the extent of the problem," said Rangers manager lan Holloway.

Before Saturday's setback Carlisle had been looking to re-establish himself as one of the country's brightest prospects having recovered from a knee injury doctors feared might have ended his career. The QPR defender returned to league action against Mansfield last month - 19 months after severely damaging his cruciate ligament. In fact the damage sustained was so serious, it was initially feared the player might not walk properly again, let alone resume playing.

Northampton Town goalkeeper Nathan Abbey has signed a deal to keep him at the Sixfields Stadium until the end of the season. The 24year-old made his full League debut for Northampton on Saturday and kept a clean sheet in place of the suspended Lee Harper.

VINTAGE RED

THIS WEEK DICK MATTICK TAKES US BACK TO THE EIGHTIES' AND, LIKE TODAY'S PRESENT CROWDS, THERE WASN'T MANY MORE THAN 5,000 THERE TO SEE TOWN BEAT THE U'S.

The number of goals and the heavy pitch made the Town's victory at Easter in 1963 one of the most memorable matches between the two sides. John Stevens scored a hat trick in Town's 6-1 victory. It was a vital win sandwiched between defeats at the hands of Peterborough on Good Friday and Easter Monday, and a key result in keeping Swindon's eventually successful promotion challenge alive. Dave Moss is another player to have scored a hat trick in a match between Swindon and Colchester. This came at the County Ground in 1974 when he scored 3 of Swindon's four goals, two of them from the penalty spot in a 4-1 win. Today's feature match took place on the 9th October 1982. Although less than 5,000 turned up to watch, it was Swindon's biggest crowd of the season to that point. The previous week had seen a dispute break out between two of the most long standing servants of the club. Manager John Trollope had spoken out against the Board's decision to loan Roy Carter to Torquay United as they were in a promotion challenging position alongside Swindon in

Division Four and the South Coast club was due to play Swindon during the loan period. Cecil Green argued that the financial position of the club dictated that the club saved money by putting the Cornishman out on loan. The first half of the match saw Swindon in command and playing good football, but half an hour elapsed without a goal being scored. Even 'Adver' reporter, Clive King, felt United were unlucky to have a penalty awarded against them thinking that Swindon player, Howard Carter, should have been penalised for pushing when the referee, Les Burden, awarded a penalty in the 32nd minute, Paul Rideout took full advantage to give the Town the lead and was unlucky not to increase it a short time later when he sent a blistering shot inches wide. Just before half time Swindon increased their lead when a left wing cross from Leigh Barnard was met by Andy Rowlands who headed it down into the Colchester net. The second half was only eight minutes old when Rowlands scored again. Again it was a header but this time the left wing cross came from an overlap by

Kevin Baddeley. United's manager, Alan Hunter, brought himself on and pushed former England international, Kevin Beattie, into the attack to try to turn the tide but although there were no further goals Colchester never looked like getting back into the game. Russell Lewis played for much of the match with a broken nose and helped stop the danger men John Lyons and Roy McDonough from getting into the game. The win lifted Town to fourth place but at the season's end they failed to achieve a return to Division Three at the first time of asking, finishing in eighth spot, two places below Colchester who won the return fixture at Layer Road.

KEYHOLE SURGERY, MANAGERIAL CASUALTIES AND EUROPE – IT'S ALL IN A DAY'S WORK FOR FOURFOURTWO'S MARK HANRAHAN.

The writing had been on the wall for some time so it was no shock when, late Monday night, Sunderland chairman Bob Murray announced his "...very difficult decision" that brought the curtain down on Peter Reid's eventful seven years at the club. Reid was undoubtedly a major force in turning Sunderland from a decaying club bound for Division Two into one of the largest concerns in the Premiership. However, whilst Sunderland are a totally different entity to the club Reid took charge of in the mid-nineties. results have failed to convince of late. In the mega-bucks world of the Premiership, money talks and sentiment takes a long walk off a short pier! The fear of losing Premiership status, the success of fierce local rivals Middlesbrough and Newcastle and growing frustration from supporters ultimately called time on Reid's tenure.

A list of candidates to replace Reid is long and distinguished with one of David O'Leary, George Graham and Mick McCarthy likely to land the post by the time you have read this. Seagulls Chairman Dick Knight has also brought Martin Hinshelwood's ten-game period in charge of Brighton to an abrupt halt by appointing former Swindon Yown assistant manager Steve Coppell as Manager. Despite Knight's claims that there never was a ten-game trial for his newly appointed manager, Brighton's 1-0 defeat away to Watford (their tenth league defeat in succession) proved to be one poor result too many. Knight moved fast to secure the services of Coppell on Tuesday after the former Brentford and Crystal Palace manager ended his stirnt at the County Ground over the weekend.

Manchester United and England have been rocked by the news that £30 million defender Rio Ferdinand has been ruled out for up to a month following keyhole surgery to clear up a knee injury. Ferdinand's absence means he misses England's two crucial qualifiers against Slovakia and Macedonia. Following the Paul Scholes injury debacle, both Alex Ferguson and Eriksson's assistant Tord Grip were keen to avoid another squad withdrawal controversy. Both stated in the press that the operation is the best solution all round. Rio's place in the squad was taken by Middlesbrough's inform Ugo Ehiogu.

Despite an impressive performance against Portugal at Old Trafford, Leeds midfielder Lee Bowyer has been controversially overlooked this time around. Bowyer, who set-up his Leeds colleague Alan Smith's debut strike has been omitted due to his poor club form of late. Also missing from the squad will be enigmatic West Ham's star Joe Cole. Cole at least has the consolation of dropping down the England U21 squad!

Hot on the heels of West Ham's Michael Carrick last season, another former Swindon Town loan star's impressive form has been rewarded with his first senior call-up to the England squad. Most people will remember David Thompson as the 'clockwork mouse' midfielder who brightened up Steve McMahon's final season in charge with a string of energetic performances. Whilst by no means guaranteed a starting place against either Slovakia or Macedonia, Thompson - who has already nabbed three spectacular goals since his bargain

£1.5 million move from Coventry - has been tipped by many as a candidate for England's troublesome left-midfield position. His penetrative runs and range of shooting drawing conclusions that he could bring valuable dimension to the England midfield if selected.

Leading us nicely into European action. The Champions League aside, the tie most likely to capture the imagination pits Scottish Champions Celtic against Blackburn Rovers. Rovers, fresh from their 3-3 (4-4 win on away goals) success against CSKA in Bulgaria, face Martin O'Neill's side in a match already attracting the inevitable tag of the 'Battle of Britain'. Whilst failing to impress in the Champions League, Celtic have made an impressive start to life in the Uefa cup with a 2-0 win over Suduva (10-1 aggregate victory) signaling their intentions to their future opponents.

Last season's Premiership cannon fodder Ipswich Town put aside their inconsistent start to life back in Division One to defeat FC Sartid 2-1 on aggregate. George Burley will be hoping their progression in the UEFA Cup is not at the expense of their domestic form as suggested when last year's illfated European adventure ended with defeat against Inter at the San Siro. The omens look good. Ipswich followed up the Sartid victory up with a hard-fought 1-0 away win at Wimbledon's Selhurst Park. Finally, if Andy King, Dave Jones, Glenn Roeder and Jan Molby think they have problems pitch-side, they can thank their lucky stars this week following bizarre news from India, Football 365 reports. "Monkey Tears Ear Off Football Coach". The report describes how a football coach in India lost an ear after he was attacked by a monkey! One Samir Chatterjee, was taking training at the Sodepur Sporting Stadium when his simian assailant took to the field, disrupting his carefully planned coaching session. Chatterjee hit upon the bright idea of luring the creature away from

the pitch with some fruit and veg he had hanging around. Unfortunately, the primate attacked him instead. Chatterjee was taken to hospital but doctors were unable to reattach his ear.

CLASSIC DERBIES REVISITED

Although it is currently the two teams from the capital, Lazio and AS Roma who are leading the way in Seria A when anyone mentions the word 'derby' in Italy they are invariably referring to the showpiece in the San Siro. None of the feuds between the Roman or Turin clubs, either now or previously, have ever produced such a fever pitch of passion.

The Milanese derby is a derby of history, legend, celebrity and fanaticism. It incites memories of Italian elegance and European domination: A rivalry of style, competition and football. Whereas most derbies will stir up years of resentment or bitterness that have emerged through years of cultural difference or clashes of class, the Milan-Inter derby is pure in that the passion that is aroused is caused largely through purely footballing history. Last years' 6-0 defeat of Inter by AC Milan not only resulted in an historic victory (or loss, depending on whose side you were on), but also in the Inter fans being lead off the pitch under heavy police escort after their fans had tried to storm the pitch. Such a derby defeat can either compensate for a whole season or else ruin it. The Inter fans' bombardment of the team bus and training ground, needless to say signalled quite clearly that they felt their season had slowly and painfully been desecrated over the course of ninety torturous minutes. In Inter coach Marco Tardelli's words the night was "the worst I have seen in my life".

The first of over 250 equally contested (usually) Milanese derbies was played in a small city in Switzerland in 1908. Earlier that year the 'Internazionale Football Club of Milan' was formed. Internazionale (so called because they were open to anyone, not only Italians) was the result of a group of footballers rebelling from Milan A.C.

Their original colours of gold black and blue are still used. Because of their international roots Inter were badly affected by World War I. Many players were lost to battle and many were never to return to their club. Virgilio Fossati who had captained his team to their first ever league championship in 1910, lost his life. It was largely due to the war that AC dominated the early years of their rivalry. Despite this early history, it is the 1960's in which both club's have their true roots. This was the decade of the city of Milan. Between 1962 and 1969 they won 5 of the 7 Scudettos between them. In a decade in which the two sides emerged to become perhaps the two most singularly powerful clubs in the country their rivalry became the most compelling. The sixties saw the Inter side of Helenio Herrera compete with a Milan team under the management of Rocco and captained by Cesare Maldini, father of Paolo and future

Coach of the international side. Yet it was Inter who remained on top. The side was captained by Giacinto Facchetti (now the Vice President) and continued unbeaten by their rivals for ten consecutive years. They won three league championships, two European Championship Cups and two Intercontinental Cups. Yet it wasn't purely a blue and black era. The red and black shirts of A.C Milan to their credit won the Italian league championship twice and the European Champions' Cup. The two clubs fought and battled over every single championship, over every point and every goal. It was the decade that made the Milan teams what they are today. Forty years later the two teams are still associated with the same things that connected them back then: A battle of precision and passion, flair and flamboyance, celebrity players, managers, presidents and even season

ticket holders. All this stems from this era. Inter became the very pioneers of the catenaccio (the Italian defending wall) the impenetrable wall being preferable to attacking flamboyance. Unlike Herrera, Rocco focused on the faith that he would have in his team, encouraging a relatively free and open style. "If you treat the . players like men, then they play like men. If you treat them like women, then they react like women" he maintained. For many critics, even the sides of Van Basten, Gullit and Rijkaard or Mattheus, Brehme and Klinsmann were nothing in comparison to the sides of the 60's, both in terms of the style of the football that was produced and pure footballing ability. The 60's set the scene for the legend of Inter and of A.C. In the role of Inter coach and after another poor performance from his team, Marcello Lippi drew comparisons with former players and admitted: "If I were

chairman, I would kick each player in the backside and then kick me too." Of course, Massimo Moratti obliged, sacking him promptly.

The Milan team of Van Basten, Gullit and Rijkaard, among many other multi-million pound signings backed by the club's president Silvio Berlusconi, never really gained the respect that was accorded to the Milan side of the 1960's. Milan of course had always been a very Italian club and the success given to them by three Dutchmen may, it's true to say, have been resented. Since then the success of both sides has diminished, with managers changing constantly (Inter have had three in the past two seasons). Yet what will remain is the passion for an eternal derby: one that ignores those unnecessary factors of socio-political setting and cultural context and cuts straight to the point in the most elegant way.



I turned 30 last week but I think my current weariness has little to do with old father time catching up with me. Miserable results, continuing strife off the pitch and even Oxford winning games. I am starting to wonder if the great referee in the sky really does have it in for this football club of ours.

Apologies as I may have been overtaken by events by the time you read this. In an ideal world the transfer embargo will have been lifted, Luton will have had to pay us the full whack for Sol Davis and the snarls in the stands will have turned back to smiles. If things have gone the other way, well, let's just say the brown stuff hitting the fan is an experience we are used to. Is it really too much to ask, just to have a 'normal' football club? Admittedly, I am not really sure what the definition of a 'normal' football club is but strife-free would be nice. I realise that I am asking for the impossible. If my wish was granted. Town would be debt-free, own the ground and be playing in the Premiership. We have to accept what we are and where we are but that doesn't mean we have to like it. Steve Coppell has left to try his luck at Brighton. He clearly likes a challenge. The Seagulis are currently on an even worse run than we are. Best of luck to him. Andy King has endured a difficult week. First he has to contend with supporters calling for his head and then his best mate gets the push at Sunderland.

Who would be a football manager? I suppose it's one of those professions where the divide between success and failure is pretty thin. Hero one minute, villain the next. But enough of the football. Back to my problems. Turning 30 made me think about my early years of watching football. When you are eight or nine, 21 year-old players seemed old. The general view was the 30 barrier marked the end of your career. At 29 you are 'experienced' but once you touch 30 'you're past it'. I will admit that it troubles me slightly that only Razor,

Reevesy and Bart are the only Town players older than me, but I do at least take heart that 30 no longer means knackered (although Brian the Town backroom staff XI manager might disagree, having seen me play on the County Ground turf). David Seaman, Gordon Strachan and Stuart Pearce all shone went beyond their 30th birthday. Sir Stanley Matthews was still playing at 50. Can't see it happening in today's era though. Anyway, apologies for the age-thing. Next week I'll find myself complaining the music is too loud and saying things just 'aren't the same any more'.

October 8 1977 brought a trip to Lincoln City where Town succumbed 3-1. Chris Guthrie was on the mark for Swindon with his fifth goal of the League season as City inflicted Swindon's fifth defeat in the first 12 games. The loss saw Town, who at one stage had been second,, drop further down the Division Three table to 12th position.

Town were back at the County Ground on October 15 when Port Vale were the visitors and Steve Aizlewood's goal was enough to secure Town's first point since his last strike four games ago. At number ten for Vale that day was Ken Beamish. In between these games on October 12, Scotland qualified for the World Cup finals through an infamous 2-0 win against Wales played at Anfield. England meanwhile won 2-0 at Luxembourg, a result that didn't do enough to encourage optimism for England's progression to Argentina '78.

THE NAKED CHEF

This week, after his apperance in the Daily Telegraph and on Talksport, Town's resident chef goes back to basics with this pizza recipe.

NO. 5 TURBO'S TESTADO PIZZA

 You'll need: 1 1/4c Flour, 1 ts Baking powder, Salt, 1/2 c Milk, 2 tbVegetable oil, 1 lb Ground beef, 3/4 oz Taco seasoning mix, 1 c grated cheese, 8 oz Taco sauce, 4 oz Chopped green chillies, 1/2 c Chopped onion, 1/2 c Chopped tomatoes and 1 c Shredded lettuce.

Pre-heat an oven to 425 degrees. After that, combine the flour, baking powder, salt, milk and oil in a bowl and stir mixture. Press it into a ball and knead ten times.

S. Roll the mixture on a lightly floured board to a 13-inch circle and place on pizza pan or baking sheet. Turn up edge and pinch and bake for five minutes.

 Prepare ground beef using recommendations from your seasoning mix and then spread over pizza.

Sprinkle cheese over the top and bake for two minutes.

Top pizza with taco sauce, chillies, onion, tomato and shredded lettuce and 'Bob's your uncle!'.

At the junction with the A4044, turn right at the traffic lights into Inner Circuit Road. At the next roundabout, the St James Barton roundabout, take first exit into Inner Circuit Road A4044. Follow signs Avonmouth A4 and go over the roundabout at junction with B4468. At junction with A3029, take right hand lane into Brunel Way (signposted Weston Super Mare) to join A3029. Cross Cumberland Basin Swing Bridge and branch left at the junction with A369/A370 (signposted Taunton A38). BCFC is on the left.

When the chips are down the last place you want to go is your local rivals, but that is exactly the task in hand for Andy King and his men as they travel to Bristol City's Ashton Gate next weekend.

Bristol City, like every year, are always cast as one of the pre-season favourites for promotion. Indeed, since their demise from Division One in 1999 the perennial under-achievers have failed to deliver when the play-offs seemed a distinct possibility. In 2000/01, when Town endured their first season in Division Two, City started the season poorly. However, a prosperous run of form saw them climb the table and they narrowly missed the play-offs before last season, when the Robins faithful (of the Bristol variety) had to endure another painful seventh placed finish, just five points off sixth place.

Should the season finish now, as it stands City would have banished their playoff misery and would finish the season in sixth place – the club sitting proudly above Blackpool despite the two clubs sharing 21 points. However, it was a slow start for Danny Wilson's men who, having beaten the Seasiders on the opening day, endured two straight defeats against Brentford and Wigan. Only three defeats in the next nine games followed (ten if you include the humiliating defeat against Oxford in the LDV Trophy) against Oldham, Plymouth and OPR and without any draws, six wins has seen them slowly climb the table.

However, the achilles heel in recent years has been their inconsistency and in recent weeks, there have been signs that the same problem could come back to haunt them. An unconvincing 3-2 win away at Cheltenham was followed by another slender victory against Port Vale, a game in which City relinquished a two-goal lead.

The signs of weakness are there for all to see and what better way to kickstart our season than with a win at our closest rivals? Unfortunately our record against City on their home turf isn't that great and with the 1-0 victory (courtesy of 'Reevesy') in 2000/01 apart, we haven't won their since season 19990/91. Mind you, it was an emphatic 4-0 drubbing – what we'd do for another next week...
