Andy King, still defiant following a week of increasing press speculation surrounding his future at the club, made one change to the side with Stefani Miglioranzi stepping into the midfield in place of Johnnie Jackson. And it was King's side that nearly got off to a flying start to when, on two minutes, Miglioranzi swung in a free kick from the right hand side. Unfortunately, despite finding Eric Sabin, the unmarked Frenchman could only plant his header over the bar and into the safety of the home fans behind the goal. Matt Hewlett, returning to his former club, made his presence felt with a strong challenge on City's Mickey Bell after just four minutes into the game. Hewlett won the 50:50 challenge, but Bell stayed down for a short period and was substituted on 15 minutes being replaced by Andy Woodman. Sabin then darted his way into the City box cutting neatly inside from the left on six minutes but his shot was taken well down to his right by home 'keeper, Steve Phillips, Alan Reeves also looked composed at the back and was in command of Christian Roberts (who scored a hat trick last week) in the early stages with some timely interceptions.

Bristol City then took the lead with just 12 minutes on the clock. A defence splitting 40-vard pass by captain Tommy Doherty found Scott Murray who chested the ball down and swept the ball underneath the body of Griemink.. This followed a brief spell of good City passing, but the ball from Captain Doherty was a superb piece of play which left David Duke on the back foot.

Following the goal Town looked the better side for a spell. Davis, Miglioranzi and Invincibile all had shots blocked as they looked for the equaliser. Miglioranzi's over exuberance saw him booked for a powerful challenge on Tinnion on the half hour as temperatures rose on the pitch. At the other end Scott Murray was again at the centre of things, his shot from inside the area hitting Griemink's legs before Heywood cleared the ball off the line.

City made it two on 38 minutes, Brian Tinnion receiving a pass 30 vards out and was allowed time on the ball. He took aim and unleashed a rocket of a shot which Bart Griemink could do nothing about. Andy King made his first substitution during the break as he brought on Alan Young for Danny Invincibile, who had little service to work from in the first period. However, Reeves nearly let the home side in for another on 48 minutes when he left a through ball for Griemink to claim instead of clearing the danger. This let in Murray whose cross was narrowly missed by the oncoming Christian Roberts. The watching Andy King, who had moved down from the stand to dupout for the second half, would have been frustrated as his side created a chance but could not finish it once again. Miglioranzi's right hand cross was met by Sabin who was virtually unmarked but could only head harmlessly over without forcing a save from Phillips. Griemink had to be alert to rush out and deny Roberts before another effort from the former Exeter City striker fell the wrong side of the bar for City supporters. The home fans began cheering each pass between their players on 58 minutes and just a minute later Andy King made his second tactical substitution bringing on Jackson for Miglioranzi to try and improve the delivery from set pieces. However, Bristol City began to take a firm hold on the game and Town were fortunate not to see efforts from Roberts and Tinnion add to the scoreline. Griemink was again the busier of the two custodians as the game drew to a close. He rose high to claim a Beadle cross before gathering a Beadle shot from 20 yards following a neat turn from the former Bristol Rovers man on the edge of the box. At the other end David Duke, who featured in last week's Nationwide Second Division Team Of The Week, could not break the City defence as his 25vard effort got a deflection and rolled into the untroubled arms of City keeper Phillips.

Town are still hoping for their first victory of October, whilst City go up to third in the league.

Swindon Town tonight progressed into the second round of the LDV Vans Trophy with a scintilating performance against Southend United on Tuesday night. With three changes to the side that lost at Ashton Gate (Willis replacing Reeves and Edds and Parkin returning in place of Hewlett and Sabin respectively), Town romped home with their best performance of the season.

Town started brightly with Johnnie Jackson delivering a number of superb balls into the box. Jackson was again at the centre of things as his free kick provided the first goal of the night on ten minutes. The Spurs loanee executed a superb curling free kick from all of 35 yards which flew past Flahavan in the Southend goal to give Town a deserved lead. Danny Invincibile then strode forward into the box but his snapshot was cut out for a corner as Swindon attempted to build on their early lead.

After a brief spell of pressure the Shrimpers shocked the Town faithful on 22 minutes when a corner from Steven Clark was rifled home by Graeme Jones to level the scores. However, it took Town just four minutes to take the lead, Jimmy Davis picking the ball up on the halfway line and rampaging forward before cutting inside his man and unleashing a right foot shot which left Flahavan with no chance in the visitors' goal.

The Robins were flying and an air of expectancy among the 1,700strong crowd buzzed around the ground and this seemed to be the catalysr for the players as they continued to perform. Sam Parkin, who returned to the side after suspension, showed his qualities when he held off his man and layed the ball to Gareth Edds but his shot was deflected wide for a corner as the buoyant red sea continued to surge forward. Another through ball from the Town defence found Invincibile who foraged forward with purpose. He strode across his man but should have squared the ball to the unmarked Davis, but went alone only to see his run ended by a covering tackle. The ball fell to Davis who unselfishly squared the ball to Invincibile but he could only hook his shot over the bar. Just two minutes before the break an inch perfect cross by Duke on the left was met by Davis but he could only head over Flahavan's goal. Soon after Gumey hit the woodwork with a beautiful free-kick before Matty Heywood increased Town's advantage. A minute into added time a cross from the right was met powerfully by the central defender who headed home.

Neither side made any changes at half-time and it took the home XI just three minutes to add to their tally. An interchange of passes between Parkin and Davis resulted in the former Chelsea man driving the ball across goal which evaded Flahavan, but Danny Invincibile made no mistake from five yards out. There was nearly a fifth when an excellent low cross from Edds was narrowly missed by the onrushing Parkin and Invincibile. Stefani Miglioranzi was the next player to try his luck when on 53 minutes a quickly taken free-kick by Gurney was squared to the American who hit low shot narrowly wide of the right hand post.

On 77 minutes Andy King made a treble substitution replacing Jimmy Davis, Danny Invincibile and Bart Griemink with Eric Sabin, Daren Dykes and Craig Farr. Griemink left the field to great applause whilst Farr received a hearty Wiltshire welcome to the County Ground on his competitive first team debut. Farr gathered a curling cross from the left by Damon Searle on 79 minutes and showed good initiative by quickly bowling the ball out along the surface to set-up another Swindon. Gurney then rocketed a 40yard free kick straight at Flahavan who did well to hold onto the captain's vicious strike. Stefani Miglioranzi made no mistake two minutes before time to make it 5-1. Eric Sabin had a drive tipped round for a corner and Jackson's centre was headed out to the American whose speculative effort flew past the diving Flahavan.

The referee's assistant indicated three minutes of injury time and this allowed Swindon time to craft another well-worked goal. The influential Miglioranzi threaded a ball neatly through to Parkin who got the ball onto his left foot and stroked the ball under the oncoming Flahavan to take the Swindon goal tally to six as Southend awaited the final whistle.

Arnid all the worries of recent seasons here at the County Ground, the emergence of an extreme right-wing faction amongst Town's home support has arguably been as bad as anything else.

The presence of this 'minority' is an unwelcome one that can only damage the reputation of the club. It has been a long, hard, and not yet completed fight to drive overt racism out of football. Thankfully, the monkey noises and racist chanting that were once prevalent not just at the County Ground, but throughout football, have largely been confined to the dustbin of history. Those supporters who used to indulge in this behaviour, however, have not. They have been quiet in recent seasons, but something triggered their re-emergence as we battled relegation during the 2000/01 season.

The club has done what it can to eradicate their threat, and has reacted positively. The disappearance of the No Surrender cross of St George from the Town End is one example of the club taking positive steps. It is also notable that the club's staff team recently took on an Asian football team from the town,

However, and perhaps the greatest part of that problem lies in the fact that the worst offences take place out of the club's jurisdiction, away from home. It then becomes the responsibility of us, the supporters, to drive these people out or at least shut them up. Surely we owe it to ourselves to refuse to join in with their songs of hatred and to isolate them from the body of decent supporters. Better still, those who like to make some noise should drown them out with relevant, Swindon-orientated, songs. Surely this is preterable to just joining in, whatever they sing, and making it seem to others that they enjoy widespread support among Swindon's fan base. We would appear to have had some success, given that the chanting has gone away of late, but on the evidence of that Wycombe game less than two years ago, we still have some way to go.

Town, despite playing well at times, fielded a young side once again and they were overpowered by an experienced Norwich side that included the likes of Daryl Sutch.

Mark Rivers, starting his first game from an injury lay-off for the Canaries, began well creating chances for Daryl Sutch and Chris Llewellyn. On 26 minutes, Llewellyn spurned a good chance for City. Henderson's right-wing cross was met by the Welsh forward before he shot straight at Craig Farr who gathered the ball with ease.

Town were keeping the ball well but Young and Hughes were struggling to create the chances in Norwich's half. At the back Edds looked composed, whilst Dykes and Herring were doing their best to maintain the midfield. Norwich continued to build patiently and were rewarded five minutes before the break. A wonderful first time pass from Damian Batt found Henderson who lobbed Farr from 20-yards out. Farr up until the goal had had a great game, but even he could do nothing to prevent Henderson from breaking the deadlock.

Norwich enforced their experience and authority on Town's fledgelings in the second half Henderson and Rivers caused continuous problems. On 63 minutes Henderson was again put through on goal but failed to round Farr, then Batt shot wide after an excellent cross by Rivers. In the dying minutes Craig Farr made a superb save from substitute Danny Self to deny City a two-goal lead.

Malcolm Crosby, talking to swindontownfc.co.uk about the defeat at Norwich City, said that his side had performed well against an unbeaten side. "We did very well against a very experienced Norwich side which included a number of first team players. The only criticism I would have of the lads is that when we had the ball we gave it away too easily rather then maintaining controlled possession. But you couldn't fault them for effort at all. I am not too disappointed with the result, although we lost, because we put in a good performance against a side that included established players such as Craig Fleming, Mark Rivers and Daryll Sutch amongst others."

MANSFIELD UNITED

In 1994 a certain Andy King lead the Derbyshire club to an infamous League Cup victory against Leeds United at Elland Road before he was relieved of his duties two years later.

King's replacement was his right hand man, Steve Parkin, who has only recently experienced the other side of the managerial coin himself when he was released by Barnsley two weeks ago – The Tykes failing to establish themselves in Division Two following their relegation from the First Division last year.

However, whilst at Field Mill Parkin managed to lay the foundations of a side that would later earn promotion to Division Two and it is last year's third place finish that sees Mansfield visit us this afternoon.

Their inception to Division Two under the guile of Stuart Watkiss has been relatively harsh. Despite an opening day win against Plymouth Argyle, Mansfield failed to win a game in their next eight (in all competitions) and they subsequently slipped down the table. The transfer of last season's top scorer Chris Greenacre to Stoke in July appeared to take its toll and the lack of goals has proved to be their achilles heel. Perhaps more alarming however was the number of goals going in at the other end, with Watkiss' side conceding no less than 37 goals – the most in the Second Division. Crewe slipped five past the Stags before QPR added four a week later, but Mansfield's worst defeat came a week later when they were thumped 6-1 by Oldham.

However, Mansfield's form seems to have taken a turn for the better in recent weeks and against Tranmere they enacted some revenge by putting six past the Wirrellbased side and a 0-0 draw against Peterborough last weekend would suggest that they may have cracked their defensive problems. At the other end lyseden Christie and Colin Larkin have both got four goals apiece and it is from these two players that the Field Mill faithful will be pinning their hopes of survival.

As for their record against the Town, Mansfield (without tempting fate) haven't beaten us since the early eighties. As for their last win at the County Ground you have to go back until 1976/77 when they beat us 1-0. The Stags later went on to win Division Three whilst Town finished in mid-table - given our current predicament I think both club's would accept a similar finish!

Stuart Watkiss was appointed manager of Mansfield Town on January 9 2002 following Billy Dearden's move to Notts County. Stuart had been Dearden's assistant since the summer of the previous year having moved through the ranks at Field Mill. He arrived at Mansfield in July 1996, signed on a free transfer from Hereford, and played until May 1999 when he was put in charge of the club's youth team. Stuart's playing career began with his hometown club. Wolves, when he was signed from the youth team in 1984. After making just two appearances for the senior side at Molinuex, the central defender was taken on a non-contract basis by Crewe. He failed to make an impact at Gresty Road however and moved into nonleague football.

His return to the professional ranks came in 1993, with Walsall, who signed him from Midlands Alliance side Rushall Olympic. After making 60 appearances for The Saddlers, Stuart moved on to Hereford and, five months later, to Mansfield.

After taking over as manager at Field Mill in January, Stuart's immediate aim was to keep up the good work his predecessor had done at the club. With The Stags in a strong position, in the top three of the division, the new boss was hopeful that he could achieve promotion in his first few months at the helm.

Neil joined the Seasiders in the summer of 2001 after rejecting a contract offer from former club Kidderminster Harriers. The 25-year old midfielder made his first league start for the Seasiders in their opening away victory over Bournemouth at Dorchester Town in August 2001. Played his part in Blackpool's LDV success but was limited to appearances mainly from the bench in league fixtures.



MARK LEVER

Experienced central defender who previously played for Grimsby Town and Bristol City. Having made more than 400 appearances for the Mariners he brings a wealth of experience to the back row at Field Mill, making his Stags debut in a reserve match at Meadow Lane against Notts. County he is seen by all as a prize signing for Mansfield.

IYSEDEN CHRISTIE

lyseden signed for the Stags on a free transfer from Leyton Orient this year. It is not the first time he has played for the club, after being on loan from Bournemouth he signed a two-year deal before leaving for Leyton Orient where he managed to score 14 goals.

JAMIE CLARKE

Another talented youngster to come through the youth ranks at Field Mill. Jamie made his professional debut against Luton Town in April 2001 and he has been a central part of Stuart Watkiss' plans ever since. An asset to the club both on and off the field.

DAMIEN DELANEY

A young defender who made a huge impact when breaking into Leicester's first team in January 2001, Damien joined Mansfield on Ioan in September. He actually joined the Foxes in the October 2000 for £50,000 from Irish outfit Cork City. Joined First Division Stockport County on Ioan in November 2001 to boost his first team experience, and Huddersfield boss Lou Macari snapped him up in another Ioan deal in March 2002.

COLIN LARKIN

Colin won the hearts of Wolves Fans in his time at the club, they thought of him as being the next Robbie Keane. He has spent time on loan at Kidderminster last season so sees joining the Stags in Division 2 as progression to his career.



THEM AND US

Born in January 1956, Dave Syrett was a Salisbury lad who signed professional terms with Swindon in November 1973. A striker who had already gained England youth international honours, he became an established part of a forward line that included David Moss and Trevor Anderson. Early competition for places saw him loaned out to Wolves to gain useful professional experience, but the move failed to bring about an appearance at Molineux.

In August 1977, after 122 appearances that returned 30 goals, Dave moved on to our visitors today (then in Division Two). Yet despite scoring a further 15 times that season as he finished top goal scorer Syrett's goals couldn't prevent a slide into Division Three, and March 1979 saw the striker transferred to Fellows Park to fellow divisional rivals Walsall. The fellowship didn't last long however and after just 11 games, three goals and five months, Dave was a Peterborough player, where he settled more comfortably. Syrett then managed almost a goal every third match over a 79-game period that stretched to June 1982 and included two Peterborough finishes immediately below the Division Four promotion zone. At the end of 1981/82, a further move took him to Northampton who had just finished third from bottom of Division Four and who had endured the indignity associated with re-election to the Football League. He was to be joined by another ex-Town player, Russell Lewis, and an improvement saw a healthier finish the following year when Swindon finished just seven places higher.

At the end of 1983/84, Dave Syrett had played 321 League matches and scored 90 times when his professional career drew to a close. In 1973/74, just as Dave Syrett was making his League debut for Town, another England youth international striker was taking his first steps on the County Ground stage. Ray

Clarke had joined Town from Spurs in June 1973, and while Syrett was making 27 appearances that year, Clarke chipped in with 14 of his own. The two played together as part of a youthful forward line on more than one occasion that season and Clarke would beat Syrett to Mansfield by three years.

Born in Hackney in 1952, Ray made just one substitute appearance for Tottenham whom he had joined as a professional in October 1969. Ex-White Hart Lane man and Town manager Les Allen tempted Clarke to try his hand at Swindon, but when Allen was replaced by Danny Williams, the sale of number nine Ray Treacy led to Williams recruiting Peter Eastoe from Wolves, rather than pinning his faith in the further development of the Syrett/Clarke partnership. At the end of the season, and with just two goals to his credit, Ray tried pastures new at Field Mill in exchange for £5,000. It was quoted that Williams sold Clarke due to an embarrassment of striking riches, a strange statement from a team that had just finished bottom of Division Two and a problem that the present management team would love to have.

Clarke's career took off at Mansfield, where he scored over 50 goals in

around 90 League appearances as Mansfield took the Fourth Division championship. Attracting the attention of the scouts, Ray became one of the earlier football migrants to the continent in a move that took him to Sparta of Rotterdam in 1976 for a then considerable fee of £180,000. Subsequent spells at Ajax and FC Bruges followed before Ray returned to England in October 1979 when he joined Brighton in Division One. Scoring eight times in 30 League appearances he made one final move, on this occasion to Second Division Newcastle in June 1980. Two last goals in 14 appearances followed.

ERIC OUR IDOL

NICK JUDD CAUGHT UP WITH ERIC SABIN (NOT LITERALLY – I'M NOT THAT QUICK) AND TALKED TO TOWN'S STRIKER ABOUT THE SUBJECT OF RACISM.

Before we get started, may I wish Eric Sabin the best of luck this afternoon. A slightly odd request you might think? Well, if the programme curse is anything to go by, our favourite Frenchman is destined to have what's commonly known in the trade as a 'stinker' today.

The programme curse that I refer to appears to be affecting each player featured on the front cover and the phenomenon started pretty much when my tenure as Editor (coincidence? Surely not!). Bart Griemink had just been sent off having appeared on the cover and to be honest, I didn't think too much about it. Yet when Sol Davis gifted Coventry City with the opening goal in the FA Cup Third Round defeat two years ago I started thinking that something might be afoot. More recently, and despite playing well all season, Bart was once again the unfortunate victim when, uncharacteristically, he played below par against Colchester two weeks ago.

With that said when Johnnie Jackson graced the Northampton issue he announced his arrival at the club with a goal and I am hoping that the same happens with Mr Sabin this afternoon and I have bravely decided to go against Mr Ritson's advice!

Indeed, another goal would go down well for our favourite Frenchman who, having scored against Colchester, has become a crowd favourite in recent weeks. His hard effort and seemingly endless running has been one of the highlights in what has been a disappointing run for the club, although it was rewarded with that glorious strike which levelled the scores in a game that appeared to slipping away from Town's grasp. "It was a relief to get on the scoresheet, but even more of a relief for us to get back into the game because we really needed to avoid defeat against Colchester," Sabin admitted. "It had got to the stage before that game that we just couldn't afford to lose any more and to be honest, we simply had to win. Unfortunately we got off to a bad start but it shows just how much spirit we still have in the camp that we managed to claw our way back into the game. A draw wasn't ideal, but the fact of the matter is that we didn't lose and we must draw on the positives from the game."

The relief of Eric's goal was clear to see and whether it was intentional or not, the enigmatic Frenchman made sure that Andy King was part of his celebration. "It was never my intention to run up to Andy – it was just such a relief that I suppose I went a bit mad and I ran in that direction!" he laughs. "When you are under such pressure and something like that happens you just tend to express yourself in some way and that was just my way of celebrating."

Unfortunately another defeat at Bristol City followed before Tuesday' night's emphatic victory against Southend – something that frustratingly, Eric had to miss out on. "It's not that much fun watching from the sidelines, but to be honest I was tired after Saturday's game and the main thing for the team is that we won. To be honest, it was great just to see the team play like that – we all know that we can do it because we do so regularly in training every day, but to see such passing and such movement is great in a competitive match. It doesn't matter who we beat or what competition it is in, the main thing is that we won because it proves to us that we can do it – the trick is now to build on that and make it two wins in two today."



A second win today would be fantastic and having scored six in the week, is there a chance we can see a repeat - after all, Mansfield's defensive record isn't too impressive. "I don't think that really means anything to be honest, they are in a similar position to us and so they will be equally as desperate to get a result. A win is a win and yes, it would be lovely to score a large number of goals, but to be honest we will take a 1-0 if it means that we get three points and we must not get carried away with the win. There is a danger when you play well like that to get carried away and we must not succumb to that, after all, we've all seen what happened following our good start to the season."

Today's game – as you may well be aware already, takes on greater precedence for reasons other than the football on the field. Last weekend signalled the start of the annual 'Let's Kick Racism out of Football' campaign and today Town's stars will be doing their bit by wearing t-shirts with the slogan on. Being the only black player in Town's squad, has Eric experienced any racism since his time in England? "I think you will find racists in every walk of life, but to be honest I have heard very little since I have been in England."

The problem, as he goes on to explain, is far worse in his home country. Sabin also suggested that the problem might be slightly more deeply rooted in society as opposed to the footballing domain on its own. "My first major experience of racism at its worst came in Hungary. I was playing for Nimes against Honved in 1996/97 in a UEFA Cup tie and some of things that the people said, just because of the colour of my skin, was horrendous. It wasn't very nice and to be honest, I thought it was pretty sad. Then again, like I said, I imagine you get these people in all walks of life - how do you change their opinion? You and I know that it is people's personalities that count, not the colour of their skin. But some people do not share

that opinion and if they are prepared to go to such lengths as to voice it in public, then how do you go about changing their feelings?

"To be honest, it is easier to just ignore it. But even that it is hard – it is a problem that isn't going to go away unfortunately but I don't know what we can do."

Unfortunately recent events would suggest that Eric isn't too far away from the truth, players such as Thierry Henry and Emile Heskey on the wrong end of some awful abuse with their respective clubs in Europe in recent weeks. However, one problem that could be eased today is Town's league position and if Eric has anything to do with it – he will be doing his part by adding to his tally of two for the season.

Should he score and Town win, then I will be able to sleep a little bit easier in the knowledge that the programme hasn't contributed to Town's poor form!

Two of the highest scoring clashes between today's teams came in the 1965/66 campaign when Swindon had just been relegated back to Division Three. The match at the County Ground proved to be a resounding success for Swindon centre forward, Keith East, who equalled the record for the number of goals scored in a league match by a Swindon player with five strikes. Don Rogers got the Robins' other goal in a 6-2 victory. The double was clinched at Field Mill in comprehensive fashion with a 5-1 win. East and Rogers were again on the score sheet but were joined by Dennis Brown and full backs, John Trollope and Owen Dawson, who scored in rapid succession, It was not until the 1968/69 season, in which Swindon won promotion, that Mansfield got revenge with a 2-0 victory at Field Mill.

Today's feature match took place in the 1985/86 season at Mansfield on April 19. Swindon had already won promotion from Division Four and needed just one point to clinch the first ever Championship in their Football League history. Swindon looked to

be the more assured of the two teams from the kick off, but it took a brilliant save by the lanky Kenny Allen, who dived to his left, to save a free kick from Neville Chamberlain to keep the score sheet blank. Three minutes later Charlie Henry had the ball in the Stag's net only for it to be ruled out for an offside infringement. In the 33rd minute Mansfield took the lead against the run of play. A Paul Daniels cross was headed on by Keith Cassells and headed in by Chamberlain. Leigh Barnard nearly levelled the scores two minutes later when his shot was blocked on the line by former Swindon player, Mike Graham. Just before half time Swindon got the equaliser they'd been threatening. A free kick by Dave Bamber rebounded from the Mansfield wall to Bryan Wade. Rather than blasting in another shot he carefully controlled it before passing to Barnard whose left foot shot found the net. Cassells and Collins both went close for Mansfield in the second half, the latter with a shot which produced a great save from Allen, but again it was Swindon who had more of the

opportunities with Charlie Henry unlucky not to score on a couple of occasions. Wade, nicknamed 'the badger' due to his powerful shuffling runs twice brought excellent saves from Hitchcock in the home goal. Despite being the target for some vitriolic abuse from Mansfield fans who felt robbed by the decision of the Scottish central defender to move from Field Mill under the Tribunal System, he produced a towering performance at the centre of Swindon's defence while Charlie Henry worked tirelessly throughout. At the final whistle the scores still stood at 1-1 and Swindon were champions. Swindon fans who stayed on to cheer were rewarded when Lou Macari sent. his scantily clad players back out on to the pitch to salute the fans, many of whom had joined their heroes on the pitch.

MARK HANRAHAN TALKS PETER REID, AS WELL AS GETTING CAUGHT WITH HIS PANTS DOWN... READ ON!

Well, the news caught me with my pants down and I'm sure it surprised you too! Howard Wilkinson has taken the reigns at Sunderland following the sacking of Peter Reid. Whilst I confidently predicted any one of Mick McCarthy, David O'Leary or George Graham would take the reins at the Stadium of light, Sunderland opted to bring FA Technical Director Howard Wilkinson out of hibernation in an effort to preserve their Premiership status. Hot on the heals of Wilkinson's appointment came the news that Jan Molby's reign as Hull City boss has been brought to an end and that former England U21 coach Peter Taylor has agreed to chance his arm in Division Three with the Tigers. Taylor should fit the bill perfectly with a promotion track record boasting success with both Gillingham and Brighton. He has recently been working with Barry Fry at Peterborough.

Perhaps more of a surprise was lpswich's decision to sack George Burley. Burley, who had led lpswich into both the Premiership and Europe, paid the price for the Tractor Boys lacklustre start to this campaign and his failure to preserve Premiership status despite a rash of expensive arrivals at Portman Road including Nigerian International Finidi George and Italian 'Keeper, Matteo Serini. Burley's seat is expected to be filled by Peter Reid.

You have to feel sorry for Rotherham manager Ronnie Moore. The unfortunate Millers boss was left with egg on his face after confirming his intention to accept lpswich's offer of their managerial post. A cheeky prankster in fact made the 'offer' which allegedly came via the phone from lpswich chairman David Sheepshanks. Moore has threatened legal action if the authorities can identify the prank-caller.

Crisis-club Barnsley have sacked manager Steve Parkin. Reserve-team coach Glynn Hodges has been put in charge of first-team affairs at the cashstrapped club with immediate effect.

Neil McNab has been named as the new manager of Exeter City. The former Portsmouth and Manchester City coach replaces John Cornforth; himself sacked a fortnight ago.

Rumours abound regarding Darren Anderton's future at Tottenham. It appears that the £3 million Spurs saved on the Robbie Keane price tag actually represents Anderton's value in the swap deal that should be concluded when the transfer market opens again in January. It is suggested that when Keane headed for North London, a tight deadline in the new transfer window system meant Spurs and Leeds ran out of time to complete the deal. Anderton himself has failed to figure in Spurs surprise early season form that has seen Spurs rise to third in the Premiership. All eyes on January then! Not a game goes by at the County Ground without me making some kind of reference to money matters blighting the 'beautiful game'. Quite frankly I'm getting sick of it. This week, our former play-off final opponents Leicester City are the latest club to be placed into administration. Boss Micky Adams and Leicester's coaching staff have all agreed to 10% wage cuts whilst the players have agreed to a partial wage referral to ease the struggling Foxes financial woes. It has been confirmed that up to a quarter of Leicester's non-playing staff are to be made redundant whilst a consortium led by former Spurs and England striker, Gary Lineker, waits in the wings to save the ailing Midlands club which he has supported from childhood. Mohammad al Fayed took full advantage of Brazilian legend Pele's book signing appearance at his Harrods store, officially employing the world's greatest ever player as the club's official scout for rising Brazilian talent. It is hoped that Pele - who appeared draped in Fulham colours - will open the floodgates for top quality young Brazilian stars keen to make a mark in the Premiership at Loftus Road.

Finally, Bolton's Danish hard-man Stig Tofting was given a four-month jail sentence on Tuesday for assault following a fight in a Copenhagen restaurant in June. Tofting had been celebrating Denmark's participation in the 2002 World Cup finals this summer when the altercation took place. Tofting is appealing against the sentence and will continue to appear for Bolton's second string pending the outcome of the legal challenge.

CLASSIC DERBIES REVISITED

Ever since a certain 17-year old set the world alight with a blitz of goals in his first World Cup in 1950, Brazil has been the team to which any team aspires. They have been the symbol of Latin American flair, rhythm and movement, and have become a bastion of invulnerability. At international level they are synonymous with excitement, passion and brilliance, although the league itself is little recognised in the west. However, to the Brazilians and indeed much of the South Americans in general, the Brazilian league. much like the international team which it produces, sits proudly at the top of the game and represents everything with which its international team is synonymous. When all is considered, players, history, success, it is difficult to disregard this view. Even in terms of derbies Brazil reigns supreme. The majority of Brazilian clubs come from four of the largest cities, Rio de Janeiro, Sao Paulo, Belo Horizonte and Porto Alegre, and for this reason there are perhaps more derbies in the Brazilian top division

than in any other league worldwide. From Sao Paulo come Corinthians, Palmeiras, Portuguesa, Santos and of course Sao Paulo. Cruzeiro and Atletico Mineiro compete on behalf of the city of Belo Horizonte, whilst the rivalry in Porto Alegre is between Gremio and Internacional. Yet it is in Rio de Janeiro that we find the mother of Brazilian derbies; the classic 100-year old story of rich against poor. This is the rivalry known in Brazil simply as Fla-Flu. It is a rivalry between the people's club of Flamengo and Fluminese, the club of the upper classes.

There are no less than five teams all competing with each other for the support and adulation of the population of a city containing more than five million people. As well as Flamengo and Fluminese there is Vasgo de Gama, America and Botafogo who all do battle for local and regional supremacy. When it comes to captivating the fans, arousing the fervour and exhilaration of the city, there is no derby like Flamengo and Fluminese. It is the most exciting event in Brazilian football, one which typifies the carnival spirit of Rio. "The most delightful show on earth," as one famous Brazilian author described it.

Like many other football histories, the Flamengo Fluminese derby started with a cricket club. In 1895, Oscar Cox founded the club of Flamengo (albeit as a rowing club) as a subsidiary of the Cricket Club of Brazil. Fluminese were founded seven years later. At this point the rivalry between the two clubs was non-existent and the two clubs shared close working ties. Virgilio Leite de Oliviera was even president of Flamengo at the same time as being the Manager of Fluminese. It was not until 1911 that the club of Flamengo formed its own football section to compete with its counterparts Fluminese. The club was founded by Alberto Borgeth who opened his club to all enthusiasts of football. Unlike Fluminese, who had a select number of players on their books that were allowed to train at the club's grounds, anyone with a passion for

football was allowed to take part in Flamengo Club's training sessions. Flamengo became the people's club, an open, accepting and accommodating club for people who enjoyed the game of football. Fluminese gained the unfortunate reputation as the snob's club, a club only available to the upper classes, those who could afford to be discriminating. Rich against poor - Fla-Flu - the rivalry between Flamengo and Fluminese was born. However in the twenties and thirties the two clubs still continued to share the Laranjeiras Stadium. Since then it is the people's club Flamengo who have relocated, moving to their new home in the Jose Bastos Padilha Stadium(Gavea). On July 7 1912 the first ever derby between Flamenoo and Fluminese took place. It is testimony to the initial support that the two teams enjoyed that over 800 fans attended. The game ended 3-2 to Fluminese who began a period of short lived domination over Flamengo. It was during this period that the rivalry of Fla-Flu began to engage the attention of the

football following of Rio de Janeiro. The derby became associated with emotion, love, belief, passion and lovalty, thanks in no small part to the writings of the Brazilian journalist Mario Filho. His writing invoked such a passion and fervour in the fans that they flocked to the stadium in their droves. Such a following was created that the games between the teams of Flamengo and of Fluminese would often have to be held at the Maracana Stadium due to the comparatively small capacity of the two clubs own ground. In fact, the two clubs still hold the record attendance for a match between two club teams. In 1963 the Maracana hosted the final of the Rio State Championship, which was won by Flamengo, 177,020 fans watched the game. Within Rio de Janeiro, Fluminese are the most successful team, having won the Rio Championship 28 times whereas Flamengo have won it 26 times. However at national and international level Flamengo have the upper hand. Fluminese have won the Brazilian League Championship only twice and have never

won a title outside of Brazil. Flamengo have won the Brazilian league four times and the Copa Libertadores, Copa Toyota and Copa Mercosur once. Despite Fluminese's wealthy following, it is Flamengo who have always had more stars in their ranks. Dida, Mario Zagallo, Jorginho, Zico, Bebeto and Romario have all worn the famous red and black shirt. From the list of all time Flamengo players the name Zico stands out above all the others. He is the club's all-time greatest scorer, scoring over 500 goals throughout the 1970's and 1980's, and is still their greatest fan. He is the player that above all epitomises the Fla-Flu spirit and the spirit of the Brazilian league in general. Whilst many Europeans consider it a shame that he never really tested himself by coming to one of the great European leagues, the Brazilians think the opposite. His history, like the history of Fla-Flu, is one of passion, loyalty and love, a love that can bind a player to his club for his whole career, and a love that could bind together two clubs for a century of memories.

Goals are the glaring problem. We don't seem to be able to buy a goal at the moment. However, such is the state of the club's finances that probably wouldn't be possible anyway!

Let's hope today is finally the day where everything 'clicks' and we start to pull ourselves clear of the drop zone. Having been given the boot earlier in his managerial career at Field Mill, I'm sure Mr King will be particularly desperate to secure three points. Again, there is a chance I may have been overtaken by events by the time you read this. Apologies if that is the case. Never a dull moment at this place is there?

Off the pitch, I attended the Swindon Town Supporters' Trust fans forum on Monday evening. I think a lot of people went home that evening heartened by the genuine spirit of co-operation that was displayed between TrustSTFC and the board. It never threatened to degenerate into a slanging match. There are always going to be areas of disagreement but the clear message appeared to be one of united we stand, divided we fold.

It's Tuesday morning as I pen these notes and I am not yet in a position to know whether we are in the second round draw of the LDV. I do hope so because it is a competition worth winning. The financial rewards are there for all to see as well as a day out at the Millennium Stadium of course. Then at full time today it is the draw for the first round of the FA Cup. Let's hope it hands us a nice home draw.

It is pure Roy of the Rovers stuff. I make no apology for jumping on the band-wagon and praising Everton's Wayne Rooney for an excellent first Premiership goal. I have been fortunate enough to be at the games where Beckham scored from the half-way line to score his first top flight goal, plus Michael Owen's full league debut when he slotted home from the penalty spot to open his account. Three very different goals from England's finest.

The major observation to be made of these three talents is that overnight, they became men when really they were, and as is in the case of Rooney, just boys. On October 22 1977 Swindon travelled to Chester to take on the side that stood just below them in mid-table Division Three. A 1-0 win to the home side saw the teams swap positions as Chester drove on to an eventual fifth place while Town continued to drop towards the relegation positions. Now with only one win in nine League games, it was reported that Town were ready to splash £20,000 to shore up the defence, but manager Danny Williams dropped out of the chase for Eventon defender Steve Seargeant when confronted with wage demands of around £150 a week.

On the 25th Swindon played a Third Round League Cup match at Fratton Park, forcing a 1-1 draw with Portsmouth through a David Moss equaliser six minutes from time, and on the 29th Town won a League game at home to Exeter. Incredibly, Swindon had scored eleven goals over the most recent six League games and still won only two of them, by 5-0 and 4-0 respectively.

NO. 5 TURBO'S CAULIFLOWER CHEESE

 You will need 2oz marg, 2oz flour, 1pt milk, 4oz grated cheese, 2tps english mustard, salt & pepper

 Get a good sized cauliflower, trim and cut into four pieces, then cook in boiling water for six minutes.

S. Melt the marg in a thick bottomed saucepan. Add sieved flour and cook for several minutes until mixture is of a sandy texture and leaves the side of the pan.

Add the warm milk slowly mixing in with a wooden spoon until smooth.

Add mustard and the cheese, do not boil. Mix until cheese has melted and remove from heat. Add salt and pepper to taste

6. Place cauliflower in an ovenware dish, coat with the sauce and sprinkle with the rest of the cheese.
