Argos

Good afternoon and a very warm welcome to everyone for today's game with Tranmere Rovers. On behalf of the board can I also welcome the directors, management, players and supporters who have made the long journey south from the Wirral.

Before I joined the club I was told there was never a dull moment at the County Ground and recent weeks have certainly been true to that sentiment. I would firstly like to congratulate Andy and all the players on their tremendous performances of the last fortnight. It must have been difficult for the players to keep their minds focused on playing whilst their salary has been late in arriving, and it is testimony to their professionalism and desire to play for this club that they produced such good performances, with the results to match, during this difficult period.

As I write these notes we are working hard to find the money to meet the player's wages and we are very hopeful that this will have been achieved. Without going into too much detail, let me try to explain why we are faced with the current financial situation:

The first two months of the season were relatively on target from a financial point of view, with no outside financial assistance required for the club to pay its way. All that changed in October. Firstly, the attendance figures fell sharply leading to a shortfall of approximately £80,000 against budgeted revenue. Additionally, we have no leeway when it comes to paying Inland Revenue related bills. Because of our financial past we must make sure these payments are made as they fall due, otherwise we face the very real prospect of the CVA being challenged, with the grave consequences that would bring. And lastly, we are now faced with an increase in salaries as the personnel previously employed and salaried by Dunwoody Sports Marketing

transfer back to Swindon Town FC's payroll.

The delay in finding the additional funds to pay the player's salaries is because before any monies are made available on this occasion, our investors want to be satisfied that we have our forward costs under control. This particularly affects us when we have long-term contracts that the club cannot afford given the current revenues we are generating from the various methods available to us. My intention is that the club can stand on its own two feet without needing continual third-party funding and that means we will have to take a hard view at our forward costs and make them even more manageable.

The anti-Andy King fratemity were quietened by Town's second win within a week - Eric Sabin scoring the winning goal with a neat finish just after half time following Sam Parkin's first half equaliser. And whilst Town climbed just one place in the league, the victory certainly took the pressure off the former Mansfield boss.

Unfortunately the small minority in the Town End continued to berate Andy King and even began to argue amongst themselves whilst the vast majority of the 4,136 crowd got behind King and his men as they notched their first win of the month against a poor Mansfield side.

It wasn't quite as entertaining as the rout against Southend three days earlier, but it was a case of 'job done' for Swindon as they put four points between themselves and the visitors and in doing so, leapfrogged Peterborough in the table. There were changes from the side that beat the Shrimpers in the week; Sabin, Reeves and Hewlett returned to the starting line-up whilst Willis, Edds and Invincibile had to make do with a place on the bench.

However, it was the visitors that struck first blood. Liam Lawrence seizing on a poor clearance from Bart Griemink following Reeves' back pass. The youngster curled a clever left footed shot into the empty net much to the dismay of the Dutchman, who must have thought lightning had struck twice following his antics against Colchester.

On nine minutes Eric Sabin headed straight at Van Heusden before Hewlett's teasing cross was deflected over a Town corner.

The deserved equaliser came on 19 minutes. A long ball from Johnny Jackson was controlled by Sam Parkin who neatly rounded the 'keeper and fired into the top corner of the net. It should have been two three minutes later, Miglioranzi forcing Van

Heusden into a save from a fierce left foot drive. Town started to exert their influence on the game and to be honest. The Stags rarely threatened Town's half let alone their goal.

Just before the half hour mark Jackson sent in a wicked cross only to find no-one in the box to finish it off before Reeves saw his close range header tipped over. A minute later and it was Herwood on the end of Davis's cross, he too couldn't head home from close range.

On 30 minutes Gurney saw a long-range effort find Van Heusden's hands before Heywood headed over again from another Davis corner. On 34 minutes Van Heusden was called into action again, this time by his own player following Hewlett's surging run. It took a full stretch save to prevent the ball from going in, however, in pushing the ball round the post the 'keeper did enough to keep the scores level at half-time.

If Town were after a perfect start to get them going in the second half then it was provided by in-form striker, Eric Sabin. The Frenchman seized a poor back pass and showed great composure in rounding the 'keeper before slotting the ball home into the empty net. Town's players carried on regardless of the antics of the Town End and Johnny Jackson was unlucky not to extend Town's lead when his shot was blocked following Sabin's incisive through ball. At the other end Mansfield scared Town with a rare attack and Lawrence came close again, his shot was flicked into Griemink's hands by Craig Disley on the goal line. Four minutes later and Lawrence came close again, this time he cut inside from the right before hitting the post.

Unfortunately the game became rather stale, events off the field contriving to affect those on it. However, Eric came close once more before the final whistle when he headed wide from Jimmy Davis's cross.

Andy King made two changes to the side that started against Mansfield with Steve Robinson and Danny Invincibile returning to the side in place of Jimmy Davis and Stefani Miglioranzi.

On what was a cold and misty night Town began the match brightly and a Johnnie Jackson free kick was headed away from danger with just two minutes on the clock. Eric Sabin also started the game well with the Frenchman showing confidence and composure on the ball. On eleven minutes Sabin played in Sam Parkin and after cutting inside his man, the former Chelsea man saw his left foot shot blocked on the edge of the box.

The home side then began to slowly make their mark on the game and had a good spell of possession that culminated in a cross that was easily gathered by Bart Griemink in front of the travelling contingent from Wiltshire. Danny Allsop then hit a shot on the half volley that flew just over the Dutchman's upright as County edged into the game. Eric Sabin carved out a goal scoring chance for Town on 21 minutes when he cut inside his man in the area, but wanted too much time to get his shot away and the ball was cleared. Steve Robinson, playing against the club he supported as a boy, was influential in midfield and played an acutely angled ball through to Sabin and the Frenchman raced clear down the right only to see his cross turned out for a corner. The resulting centre by Jackson was headed goal wards by Alan Reeves but the ball was cleared off the line having been well stopped by Garden in the County goal, who continues to deny ex-Town player Steve Mildenhali a first team start this season. Eric Sabin was at the centre of things again on 24 minutes when his glancing header, following a Jackson corner, rattled the County bar as Town looked to break the home side down.

On 31 minutes Heffernan edged past Duke as the 18-yard box approached, but the Scot put in an excellently timed cover tackle to save a near certain goal for the Magpies. Just two minutes later Town scored their first away goal since August to take the lead. Johnnie Jackson crossed low into the box and after Invincibile's shot was blocked, the ball fell to Parkin who swept his eighth goal of the season calmly past Garden. Town ran out for the second half unchanged as they looked to build on their first half lead. With this in mind, Eric Sabin rampaged into the County half following a cross field Hewlett ball, cut inside his man before bending the ball not quite like Beckham, but just past Garden's upright. On 53 minutes Sabin was guilty of missing a golden chance. Captain Gumey crossed from deep and the ball fell to the Frenchman who could only plant his header firmly into the stand from just seven yards out when perhaps he should have scored to seal the points. Notts County boss Billy Dearden made his second change of the night when he took off Allsop and brought on Marcel Cas on the hour mark - a move that proved to be the catalyst to Notts County's revival. On 63 minutes Bart Griemink had to be on his guard to gather a Stallard cross as Bolland waited to swoop at the far post. The big Dutchman then made a superb double save two minutes later tipping a Michael Brough drive onto the post before saving a follow-up shot from Bolland.

Jimmy Davis made an entrance to the field of play on 67 minutes as King decided to take off Invincibile and bring on the fresh legs of Davis to add further energy and invention to the Town cause. With 20 minutes to go Town produced the best move of the match that involved a neat interchange of passing between Davis and Parkin with a one-two presenting Davis with a clear-cut chance. The Manchester United Ioan player saw his shot blocked from 12 vards out.

With Swindon Town just 14 minutes away from an elusive away win, Notts County equalised. Paul Bolland was first to react following a long free kick into the box, from which the flick on was poked home past Griemink to set the scores at 1-1. On 80 minutes Bart Griemink made another good save when he palmed a low shot from substitute Marcel Cas away from danger. Alan Reeves helped to preserve a point when he made an excellent tackle on Heffernan as the front man set his sights on goal just inside the area.

There may have been just 637 Town fans at Adams Park last Saturday, but those that did weather the rain and the cold conditions were rewarded with a magnificent performance and grandstand finish as Sam Parkin struck twice in the last ten minutes to earn three well-deserved points. Andy King made just one change from the side that played so well at Notts County on Tuesday night - Jimmy Davis returning to the starting line-up in place of the ill Danny Invincibile.

Wycombe had the first chance of the game when, on two minutes, Faulconbridge evaded Town's offside trap. Reeves managed to get a tackle in on the former Wrexham striker and in doing so, gave the home side the first corner of the game. Faulconbridge then headed over the Town goal from the cross, the ball bouncing off the surface and over the bar. On ten minutes Faulconbridge's glancing header went wide from a deep cross before Town took the lead. Jimmy Davis latched onto a Parkin flick and slotted the ball past Talia into the bottom right hand corner of the net. Jimmy Davis was involved again soon after when he was tackled on the left when he should have released following a good run from deep inside his own half.

On the 15-minute mark Darren Currie was brought down on the edge of the Town area although it looked like a good tackle to those behind the Town goal. Bulman's subsequent shot was deflected from the free kick. A minute later and Faulconbridge equalised for the home side with a close range header following a Wycombe corner; Rogers' flicking on to Faulconbridge who, unfortunately, wasn't marked at the far post. On 21 minutes Hewlett shot straight at Talia from the edge of the area following good work from Davis on the left. At the other end a Faulconbridge cross from the left (when Town's defence thought that the ball was running out of play) just eluded those in the box.

Five minutes later and Sam Parkin was free on the left inside in the area, unfortunately his pass to the oncoming run of Gurney was cleared by a Wycombe defender. On the stroke of half time Davis cut in and his shot deflected wide for Town comer, of which Parkin headed wide from Jackson's cross. Town started the second half with greater purpose and, like Tuesday, dominated proceedings without taking advantage of their superiority. On 50 minutes Talia, who was already being barracked by the Town fans behind his goal,

mis-kicked the ball straight to Parkin whose first touch let him down before Jackson shot over from edge of area. Swindon continued to pile on the pressure, yet whilst they continued to dominate the game they just couldn't convert. On 56 minutes Eric Sabin won the ball in the Wycombe area before turning and angling a fierce drive just wide of the goal. Immediately afterwards and Sabin was clean through on the Wycombe goal. Add to that the emergence of Wayne Rooney and the return to form of Michael Owen, it's looking pretty good for Sven Goran Eriksson too.

However, in the shadow of arguably two of the greatest clubs in the country are Tranmere Rovers who, since their relegation two years ago, are desperately trying to return to familiar surroundings – Division One.

That task appears to have been made more difficult by the departure of their best player in recent years, Jason Koumas to West Brom. Furthermore, when the club encountered a change in management just days ahead of the season's kick-off it seemed as though the club was set for a year of turmoil as opposed to the predicted promotion surge.

However, a three game unbeaten run (including an opening day 4-1 mauling against Port Vale) suggested that, like the previous year, they would be 'there or there abouts' come the season's end. Unfortunately for Ray Mathias' men early season optimism on the field dwindled and at the time of writing, Rovers currently occupy twelfth place following last weekend's win against Plymouth.

Defeats against Bristol City, Blackpool and Oldham followed in their next four games following that impressive start and slowly but surely, Tranmere started to descend down the table. A welcome break from league proceedings brought a much-deserved victory away at Hartlepool in the Worthington Cup and their league form immediately benefited, with top scorer Simon Haworth grabbing a brace in a 3-1 win over early pace-setters Brentford. Since then the Merseysiders have been on the wrong side of two 6-1 defeats against Southampton and Mansfield.

However, more recently Rovers have enjoyed a more prosperous period with back to back wins against Barnsley (league) and Hartlepool (who they've now dumped out of two cups) and last Saturday, their 2-1 win over Plymouth returned them to the top half of the league table. More importantly perhaps is that they've managed to keep – two clean sheets whilst at the other end goals have been at a premium and their goals for column is still an issue. Perhaps the 5-0 demolition of Hartlepool in the LDV Vans Trophy may prove to be the catalyst they need to boost the goals for column. As long as that's after our encounter I don't mind!

Key to Rovers' success this season will be whether or not they can hang on to 'keeper John Achterberg, striker Simon Haworth and youngster lain Hume. Koumas' departure was a bitter pill to swallow for the Wirral club's faithful, let's hope for their sake they can keep the rest of their stars.

JOHN ACHTERBERG

Tall Dutch goalkeeper signed on a twoyear contract in September 1998 after impressing on an initial two-week trial. Achterberg joined Rovers on a Bosman-style free transfer. With a style not previously seen at Prenton Park. but more commonplace amongst foreign goalkeepers, Achterberg has turned out to be a real bargain signing.

GRAHAM ALLEN

Bolton-born Graham Allen joined Rovers in part exchange as part of the Steve Simonsen deal having been unable to break through at Everton, where he had been since his YTS days. After making just six first team appearances at Goodison Park, the chance of a permanent move to Prenton Park and the opportunity of first team football was not one he was going to reject. Initially, signed on a one month loan, his move became nermanent in September 1998 with Everton placing a £300,000 valuation on his head.

SHANE NICHOLSON

Shane Nicholson joined Rovers after being released from his contract with Sheffield United, ironically following their signing of Steve Yates. Predominantly a left sided defender, he has had spells at Stockport, Chesterfield, West Brom, Derby and Lincoln and has recently signed a two year contract with Tranmere.

RYAN TAYLOR

Ryan signed professional terms in the summer of 2002 after completing a successful two-year scholarship with the club. He is a right full back, who is excellent from dead balls, capable of both in-swinging and out-swinging shots rather reminiscent of David Beckham. Taylor hails from Liverpool and has progressed through Rovers youth sides



lain Hume became the youngest ever player to appear in a Tranmere Rovers shirt when he made his debut as a substitute against The Town in March 2000. At just 16 years and 167 days old and still registered on schoolboy forms, he beat a certain Dixie Dean's record by 192 days. After signing scholarship forms, he progressed rapidly through Tranmere's youth and reserve team sides and he ended the 1999/00 season as a regular on the substitutes bench. A fast and energetic striker with masses of potential, Hume is already a Canadian U20 international.

MICKEY MELLON

Mickey Mellon rejoined Tranmere for his second spell with the club in March 2000 on a free transfer from Burnley after initially signing as a loan player. The Paisley-born midfielder had spent two years at Turf Moor, helping the Clarets into the First Division, before being told he was surplus to requirements by boss Stan Ternent.

Haworth joined Tranmere Rovers for £125,000 from local rivals Wigan Athletic. The 24-year-old was formerly the Latics record signing, when he joined back in 1998 for £600,000 from Coventry City. He was signed by then Manager Ray Mathias, who is obviously now in charge at Prenton Park. The Welshman began his career with his hometown club Cardiff City, where he scored 13 goals in just 40 starts. He staved with the Bluebirds for two seasons before moving to Premiership side Coventry City for £500,000. Chances were limited for the youngster with the Sky Blues, where he stayed for just one year before being snapped up by Wigan.

JASON PRICE

Price originally joined the club as a midfielder, but is also capable of playing in defence and attack. The 24-year-old joined Rovers in November and he made his debut in the 2-1 win over QPR, following a successful three-

month spell at Brentford. A former Welsh U21 international, where he played in the same side as Gareth Roberts, Price was previously with Swansea, for six years before moving to Brentford on a short-term contract.

GARETH ROBERTS

Wrexham-born Gareth Roberts initially joined Tranmere on a two-month trial during the summer of 1999 from Greek club Panionios. Having been released by Liverpool, the young defender was persuaded to move to Greece by Panionios boss Ronnie Whelan who paid just £50,000 for his services. He was rewarded with the experience of playing against Italian giants Lazio in the European Cup Winners Cup quarter-final.

KEVIN GRAY

Kevin Gray completed his move from Huddersfield Town and was immediately named Club Captain by new boss Dave Watson. The 30-yearold defender joined on a free transfer, after calling an end to his eight-year spell at the McAlpine Stadium. Gray started his career at Mansfield Town in 1988 and was made captain at the age of 19, playing 170 games for the Stags before signing for Huddersfield in July 1994.

DANNY HARRISON

Central midfielder Danny Harrison is yet another product of Tranmere's highly successful youth production line. With the club since the age of 10, Harrison made his first team debut in the home defeat by Wigan Athletic in October before starting the LDV match at Oldham the following week. He signed his first professional contract during the summer of 2002.

THEM AND US

Considered the best product of Swindon's youth programme of his generation, Paul Rideout was born in August 1964 and spent less time at the County Ground than most would have liked. Breaking into the first team while still an apprentice. Rideout was introduced to a side that desperately needed goals to halt a downward spiral destined to culminate in Division Four. Sixteen-year-old Paul made a goalscoring debut on November 29 1980, but he had already gained national attention in a televised England schoolboys match when a 30-yard screamer was included in a hat trick. He was also to represent his country at youth and U21 level but after just 95 League games and 38 goals, financial pressures led to Town

accepting a £250,000 bid from Aston Villa in June 1983.

Rideout flourished at Villa where the Bournemouth-born striker learnt from such luminaries as Gordon Cowans, Peter Withe and Mark Walters. In July 1985, Bari came calling at Villa Park and while most were not surprised that Cowans was subject to the Italians attention, some evebrows were raised when 20-year-old Rideout also made the continental switch. Almost 100 games and 23 goals in Serie A followed after which Paul returned to home to England and Southampton to play in the same team as Matt LeTissier, Tim Flowers and a certain Neil Ruddock A loan period back at the County Ground in 1990/91

saw Paul add another nine games to his Swindon career and a move to Notts County may have heralded the beginning of the end of his playing days. Nothing could have been further from the truth as, after 11 games, Paul up-rooted once more and headed for Scotland where he joined Rangers. 12 games, a goal and a Championship later, a move to Goodison Park set Rideout up to score the FA Cup winning goal against Man United in 1995.

112 League games saw Rideout on the Everton team sheet, and then he decided to go traveling again. Spells at Huang Dao Van, Kansas and Shenzhen, (guess which two are in China) eventually brought him back to Tranmere where he 'THE CHIEF' WAS THE LATEST TOWN PLAYER TO MOVE UP NORTH WHEN HE SIGNED FOR TODAY'S VISITORS DURING SEPTEMBER '99. made 46 League appearances to the end of 2001/02. Now 38 years old and after 540 games, Paul holds the distinction of having scored in every calendar year since 1980. How many other current players can possibly make such a claim?

Steve Peplow was a winger who played for Swindon at the turn of the 70's. Born in Liverpool in 1949, he joined the club in the red part of the city in January 1966 but made just two appearances on Merseyside before migrating south to Swindon in May 1970. Town manager Fred Ford saw the opportunity to play Steve as a foil to the opposite wing raids of Don Rogers and after initially joining on loan he was to stay in Wiltshire for three seasons, during which he was to

appear for Swindon on 40 occasions.

A return of 11 goals in these matches seems a healthy score for a winger, but such a total of appearances over three years perhaps disappointed Steve. Competing for a place against David Dangerfield, the sale of Rogers to Crystal Palace was followed by the arrival of Tommy Jenkins as his replacement which maintained the winger tally at the club. Looking to improve his League career appearance count Peplow made a move to Second Division rivals Nottingham Forest in July 1973. Nottinghamshire unfortunately was not the place to solve this particular problem as he took to the field just three times for Forest, and while a loan spell at

Mansfield added a further four appearances and a very respectable three goals. Steve returned to his home locale and Tranmere in January 1974.

Back on familiar stamping ground he set about making up for lost time, finally putting together the run of first team appearances that his career had lacked. Rovers, then of the Third Division dropped into the Fourth at the end of 1974/75, but bounced straight back twelve months later. Steve made almost 250 League appearances for the Prenton Park club and scored 44 goals during spells in Division Three and Four, being released by the club at the end of 1980/81.



AUTUMN REEVES

BACK IN THE SIDE AND INSPIRATIONAL AT THE HEART OF TOWN'S DEFENCE IN RECENT WEEKS, NICK JUDD CAUGHT UP WITH TOWN'S 'BLACK-EYED BOY', ALAN REEVES, AND TALKED FOOTBALLING MATTERS (INCLUDING BEING ELBOWED BY ANDY RAMMELL!)

Only November and it already feels as though it's been a long campaign for us 'Townies'. We've been both top of the table and in the bottom four, felt devastated at Cheltenham, yet jubilant at Wycombe, not to mention fragile what with the ongoing speculation and uncertainty off the field – and the season is just three months old! Yet, like many Town fans, Swindon's central defender Alan Reeves has been there and done that and having been at the County Ground for nearly four years, the current chapter in Town's chequered history comes as no surprise.

"I was here when the side went 19 games without a win – now that was a bad run!" Reeves laughs. "The club literally had to sell players back then, it really was dire straits. But back then the team seemed to expect to lose and despite our recent run this year, there has never been that feeling within this team. There really is a sense of belief in this squad and now, like the start of the season, you are getting a true sense of the character this team has, we've come from behind to win two games in the last three," he continued.

It really has been a 'Jekyll and Hyde' campaign for Town this year. Unbeaten in four, the side then lost ten in the next twelve and it wasn't until last Saturday's last-gasp win against Wycombe that King and his troops managed to add another victory making it two in three. "It was a great win, but nothing less than we deserved," Reeves commented. "We played really well against Notts County and subsequently felt confident going into the Wycombe game. Typically, we made it very hard for ourselves and despite going a goal up we let them back and gave away a couple of sloppy goals. However, we showed tremendous spirit and with the help of the fans, got back into the game, it was a great finish to what was a great performance! "But this is a funny old game, one that's all about confidence and it's a snowball effect, despite our bad run we managed to keep going and pick ourselves up. The Southend game came at the right time and we put six past them, after that we seemed to grow in confidence and I think we honestly believe that we can go anywhere and get a result. I imagine we'll go into the Tranmere game on a high after Saturday's win – I just hope we can build a more prosperous unbeaten run than the one at the start of the season."

Reeves himself has had to contend with his own problems. As if having to vie with Adam Willis for a spot in Town's back line wasn't enough, there has also been the booing from a small minority of Town fans. It's a topic that I felt awkward about asking, but one in which Reeves answered honestly and sincerely – he has obviously been hardened by years in the Crazy Gang! "I'd be lying if I said it was nice, just ask Andy (King). Having people react like that makes life a bit more difficult, but I've been here before and I've just got to get on with it. Unfortunately, I have to put up with the fact that people are always going to be waiting for me to make the first mistake – for some reason other players can get away with it where as I can't. However, it makes you more determined and that's not necessarily a bad thing."

Reevesy's determination seems to have been good enough in recent weeks and whilst King has always been an admirer of Reeves' professionalism, the former Wimbledon defender (who was once described as a 'dashing blonde defender' whilst at Rochdale — it was a while ago!) is playing magnificently alongside Matt Heywood and deserves to start on merit. "I am confident in my ability and whilst I haven't got the pace of some of the other lads, I do have other advantages. The main thing is that the team does well, but if I do happen to have a good game as well then it makes it a little bit better. To be fair, the whole defence has been playing well at the moment and with the support that we had in the last two games from the fans, it makes life slightly easier for us."



Yet despite his current upturn in fortunes Alan Reeves seems to be a little bit worse for wear. With a black eye and a couple of stitches to boot - it seems as though Reevesy has been in the wars, and not for the first time either. "Unfortunately it comes with the job! Being a central defender means that you sometimes have to put your head in where it hurts and it isn't the first time I've come away from a game with scars. This time it was Wycombe's Andy Rammell - he's a big fella! At first I thought he did it on purpose, but I realised that it was just a mistake, it still hurt though!" Despite his war wounds Reeves looks destined to start again this afternoon, with a club close to his hometown of Birkenhead the visitors. "Tranmere will be a difficult side to beat. They came down two years ago and like us, will probably think they deserve to be in Division One. But as we've found out it's a little bit harder to get out of the league than it looks and they're struggling of late - a lot of clubs are."

And it's not just on the field either. This week alone three clubs have announced huge losses that could threaten their very existence including Oldham, his brother's club. "A lot of clubs are having to sort their finances out after what seems to have been a crazy period in terms of high wages and so forth. Oldham are no exception and what's happened there is that they've offered nine players, including Dave (his brother), a percentage of their wages to leave. He's on loan at Chesterfield at the moment and I know that they're offering less money than some non-league sides - so football as a whole seems to need sorting out. Frank Talia is another example. I spoke to him after Saturday's game (only because we won!) and he said that he was on a month-tomonth contract, apparently they can't afford to offer him anything more."

Swindon's financial situation has been well documented over the years and this season has been no different. Hopefully, by the time you read this programme the players should have been paid, but it puts a footballer's lifestyle into context when you consider that, like us, they also have bills to pay. "We were expecting to get paid before the Wycombe game and then we were told that that wasn't going to be the case. It's difficult, not playing football because we all love the game, but in terms of our life away from the game – I mean many of the lads have had to defer their mortgage repayments. But these things happen, as a footballer you know that clubs have ups and downs, it's part of the game, but it doesn't make it any easier."

Such is the very nature of football that all clubs do tend to experience both good times and bad (just look at Manchester City). Yet whilst financially many clubs seem to be experiencing a rather fragile time of things, on the field for Town results are looking up. With a bit of luck our bad run for the season has already been and gone and a win today will ensure that Town's steady ascent will continue - let's hope that Reevesy and his defensive troops can play their part and prevent Rovers from scoring. We can do our bit by getting behind him, King and the rest of the lads - as those that travelled to Wycombe saw last week, vocal support can work wonders.

Cash strapped Oldham Athletic have named nine players that they are in discussions with about terminating their contracts. Arguably the most high profile among the group is veteran midfielder John Sheridan, who has become a firm favourite with the Boundary Park faithful since his arrival from Doncaster in 1998.

The 38-year-old has made over 100 appearances for the Latics, but has struggled to hold down a place this season and that looks to have cost him his job. The other eight players in negotiations with the club had all previously been handed free transfers. They are Gary Kelly, David Reeves (brother of Alan), Shaun Garnett, Stuart Balmer, Wayne Gill, Danny Boshell, Joe Doran and Tom Whittle.



CITY ANNOUNCE CUT BACKS



Local rivals, Bristol City, have announced losses of £3million and chairman Steve Landsdown has warned that the club will have to find a way of reducing its wage bill. With City pushing for promotion, fans will be hoping that does not mean the sale of star players like Scott Murray and Lee Peacock. Lansdown told the club's official website: "These accounts illustrate the tough financial world in which football, and our club in particular, has to exist. The losses to date have been funded by the directors in the form of loans and share capital. In order to survive and be successful we have to bring our wage costs down as a percentage of turnover and look to break even. Careful management can keep wages under control, whilst still maintaining a squad strong enough to take the club forward," he concluded.



Barnsley may be heading towards extinction with the news that the administrator has yet to receive a single bid for the club.

Administrator Matt Dunham has told how he has spoken with several interested parties, but has yet to receive a concrete offer. Dunham told the club's official website: "We are still talking to a couple of very interested parties and are hopeful that a formal offer will be made in the near future. I am not overly worried that there has been no formal offer at this stage. I would have liked there to be a bid on the table by now but there is no point worrving about it. We have done all we can and we now have to wait for one of the interested parties to come in and put something on the table," he added. The club returns to the High Court on December 2 and if no bid is in place by then the court may decide to order that the club is wound up.


LAWRENCE PROMISES PROMOTION PARTY



Cardiff City boss Lennie Lawrence has promised fans that his team will not only achieve promotion, but that they will do it in style. The Bluebirds stayed at the top of the Division Two table with a 3-0 win over Peterborough at Ninian Park last Saturday and Lawrence is now convinced that they have created a fear factor for visiting teams. "Playing at Ninian Park used to be a problem for us. But we have won the last seven at home," said Lawrence "Now the opposition are coming to our ground thinking, 'We are not sure about this, let's get out of here with some respect'. We are going to show that you can get out of this division playing good football, the sort that the crowd at Cardiff demand," he continued. "If you do not pass the ball and end up hoofing it and not getting the results you will be heavily criticised. But I have got players who have the ability to play good football. We are getting a passing style going. We are working on this and recent results have helped."

The most famous clashes between Swindon and Tranmere were probably the two semifinal play off matches in 1993. Swindon had seldom done well in Sunday matches during the season, but they broke the jinx with three goals in the first half of the first leg at the County Ground. Tranmere pulled a goal back in the second half to give themselves an outside chance in the second leg. Swindon fans, both at Prenton Park and around their radios in Wiltshire, were kept on edge in a thrilling match that ended in a 3-2 victory on the night for Rovers but put Swindon through to the final and eventually a Premiership place.

Today's feature game was the Division Four game played at the County Ground on the November 2 1982. Swindon had been relegated the previous season and were pressing for a return to Division Three. They must have been optimistic playing against a team which had experienced six straight away defeats prior to the game. Swindon would have taken the lead in the 27th minute had Neville Powell not handled a goal bound shot by Leigh Barnard. Despite playing with a badly bruised right toe, Paul Rideout made no mistake with the spot kick. It took the team from the Wirral only seven minutes to equalise. Jimmy Allan failed to fold a shot from John Aspinall and Owen Brown headed in the loose ball. Five minutes from half time Swindon equalised thanks to some fine individual play by Andy Rowland. First he nipped in between Powell and David Burgess and as Scott Endersby (later to become a Town player himself) advanced to block his angle, placed a beautifully judged lob just under the cross bar.

Only three minutes of the second half had gone when Rovers drew level again. Ian Griffiths beat Charlie Henry and centred to Aspinall who beat three Town defenders to the ball and headed it back across goal to John Kerr who gave Allan in the Town goal no chance. Swindon poured forward in an attempt to restore their lead. Rowland was unlucky not to get a second goal when his header was kicked off the line and midfielders Mike Graham and Paul Batty both went close with shooting attempts. When a goal came it was not unlike Tranmere's second equaliser. A cross from Howard Pritchard was headed down by Rowland and as it bounced back up. Leigh Barnard dived to head it home in the 64th minute. Four minutes later Swindon went 4-2 up after Rideout had run on to Barnard's pass. Rideout ran into the area and was brought down by John Williams, causing referee, Michael Dimblebee to point to the spot for the second time in the match and again the former England schoolboy international made no mistake from the spot. He nearly completed a hat trick a few moments later when he beat his marker and bore in on goal but ended trying for goal from too narrow an angle.

They are dropping like flies at the FA this week! First to jump ship was the FA's chief executive Adam Crozier. Now I am like most fans in not being a huge fan of the political figures behind our 'Beautiful Game' (and you only have to cast an eye over the reaction towards Sepp Blatter at this summer's World Cup finals to understand where I'm coming from!). I was however saddened to hear that the breath of fresh air that is Crozier felt he had no choice but to leave his post. Crozier had been at loggerheads with the Premiership chairman over a number of issues ranging from their consultation on day-to-day decision making, through to the use of Premiership club superstars like David Beckham and Michael Owen in the Team England FA sponsorship deals. Crozier's no-nonsense management style - honed in the no nonsense world of advertising and marketing - had not sat comfortably amongst the more old school Footballing establishment.

Crozier's departure has sent shock waves through the FA. Sven Goran Eriksson's assistant, Middlesbrough boss Steve McClaren, followed Crozier's lead the following day, leaving the England manager minus his two strongest allies from both the admin and coaching sides of the England setup. Eriksson himself has stated that he will not quit as manager, despite press rumours to the contrary. Tabloid reports have linked Eriksson to a post with the Italian FA.

A third departure in this turbulent week was FA vice-chairman Frank Pattison. Pattison claimed that he had become concerned at recent developments regarding the running and regulation of the FA itself.

Three weighty departures and frenzied media speculation surrounding the future of the England boss in a single week has left the FA reeling at a time when the Premiership is actively looking to musclein on the running of English Football at all levels. It appears we are at the dawn of a new era for the English game. With my our own club still reeling from their involvement in the Premiership's Boom and Bust culture, you'll forgive me for viewing potential Premicrship led changes with a good measure of caution. OK Hanrahan, up on the bandwagon my old son! It is hard to avoid the fact that 17 year-old Everton starlet Wayne Rooney's goal-scoring form continues to set the Premiership alight. Winning goals against both Arsenal and Leeds has drawn the attention of the England Manager, with Sven-Goran Eriksson reportedly keen on fast tracking Toffees teenager Wayne Rooney into the full England squad. The Swede is said to want to invite the striker to the national side's December get-together with an eye on Rooney becoming the next youngest England International, following in the footsteps of fellow striker Michael Owen

Republic of Ireland Manager Mick McCarthy has ended weeks of speculation by agreeing a severance package with the FAI to leave his post as Eire manager. McCarthy held crunch talks with FAI bosses in Dublin on Tuesday evening where it was agreed that his position as team manager was untenable. The Roy Keane World Cup furore and recent defeats in Ireland's first two Euro 2004 qualifiers against Switzerland and Russia had done little to deflect growing criticism of the Yorkshireman's reign as the Irish team boss. Speaking of Roy Keane, The Man Utd Captain is one crocked Premiership midfielder that will be quite thankful for his current injury problems. Fresh from being given a five-match ban for bringing the game into disrepute with comments in his autobiography, Keane has encountered complications with a hip injury. The former Eire Captain and is unlikely to return to action until January 2003 at the earliest. Keane's disappointment at a lengthy injury setback will be tempered by the news that subject to appeal, his disciplinary ban was due to start this week lucky that!

There were three managerial changes in the Nationwide League this week. Former Portsmouth, Gillingham and Bournemouth boss Tony Pulis is the new 'Big Cheese' at Stoke City. Pulis was approached following George Burley's change of heart about the taking the job at the Britannia Stadium.

CLASSIC DERBIES REVISITED



The history of Rangers and Celtic, or Cettic and Rangers stems back to 1872, almost to the very beginning of football as a fully regulated sport, when Rangers FC was formed by a group of Highland Presbyterians. Their support was drawn mainly from the Protestant communities of the west, and the clubs first religious ties were formed. Celtic were not founded until 1887, one year before the conception of the Scottish Football League, the first professional Association Football league in Scotland. They began as part of an attempt by a Marist Brother known as Walfrid to raise money for the poor Irish immigrants of

the east end of Glasgow. Of course, the situation now is a little different, with Celtic being perhaps the wealthiest club in Scotland.

On May 28 1888 Celtic played their first game at Celtic Park (also known as Parkhead). The game was played against Rangers and was fast, furious and frantic with Celtic leaving victorious, winning by five goals to two.

This was the point at which the rivalry began to gather pace. Queen's Park had, up until this point, been the dominating force in Scottish Football, but they continued to ardently disdain the professional game and refused to assert themselves in the leagues (even now they remain the only amateur team playing in the professional leagues of Scotland and England). This allowed Celtic to quickly assert themselves as the most successful Scottish club. Largely unthreatened, they began to dominate the game. The Scottish game needed someone ready and willing to compete with Celtic before the league became one-sided and uninteresting. It was in this way that Rangers emerged as a force to compete with Celtic. They played on the other side of the city and began a rivalry with Celtic that remained friendly in nature up until 1921 when the Irish War of Independence broke out.

The Old Firm rivalry as we now know it really emerged in the 1920's when hostility between supporters of Celtic and Rangers became deeply embedded in the religious context by which it was surrounded. As war was fought around them, by their family and friends back home in Ireland the ill feelings began to disperse through the streets of Glasgow and up onto the terraces at Parkhead and Ibrox. These ill feelings reached a climax when the mainly Catholic south of Ireland broke away from the largely protestant north to become independent, leaving the north as part

of the United Kingdom. This was the event that catapulted Rangers and Celtic into a history of violent confrontation. Running feuds became organised battles, and whenever the two sides met in Glasgow (which could be up to 10 times a season) fans of the two clubs would clash bitterly. The rivalry became something used by the public to either unify and unite or to despise and detest. The guestion became "Catholic or Prod? or Rangers or Celtic", and magazines and newspapers began to circulate that spouted false ideologies. Even as World War II was being fought, games between the two clubs would end in riots resulting in the destruction of anything that could be associated with the other side; be it religious, political or sporting, blue, white or green. Groups of particularly hateful fans began to parade their enmity around the streets of Glasgow. This occurred to such an extent that there still are designated parts of Glasgow that are either Rangers or Celtic. What is nteresting is that it was this very

sectarianism that became good for business, and the two sides began to set world records for attendance. Crowds of well over 100,000 became almost a weekly occurrence, and the circulation of magazines or fanzines would come to be entirely dependent on the anti-opposition content of that edition. The feud became good for the success of the two clubs as well. The two clubs began a domination of Scottish Football that remains as durable today as it ever was. After the second World War ended their domination began to stretch over the waters and the two clubs began a ten year period of Scottish domination in Europe, a suggestion that seems almost laughable today. Rangers reached the final of the European Cup Winners' Cup three times between 1961 and 1972, beating Dynamo Moscow in Barcelona on the third occasion. Yet this success was not to match the achievements of Celtic. In 1967 they became the first British Club to lift the European Champion Clubs' Cup. Their team was led by the

legendary manager Jock Stein and beat Inter Milan 2-1 in the final. In 1970 they played Leeds United in the Semi-Final in front of a record beating 136,505 crowd. The game was played at Hampden Park, and they went on to lose the final to Feyenoord in Milan.

Whilst the animosity of the two clubs and their supporters towards each other continued, the 1970's did mark the end of the first period in the history between Celtic and Rangers. This was a period during which an inescapable identity that became synonymous with the two clubs was formed and became definitive of the two clubs beliefs and passions. Religion became the central tenet to any prevailing passion and symbolised the very hatred between the two clubs because of its direct relevance to the very history of the two clubs. It signalled the end of Scottish football as a European force with which to be reckoned and beckoned in a new era, remarkably different from the previous one.

It is to be hoped that the lads will have been paid by the time you read this but it is interesting that the issue of pay as a whole has been on the football agenda this week. The big clubs got together to talk about wage caps. As I write these notes, the outcome of those discussions is unknown. Should there be a limit on wages or at least on the percentage of turnover that pay takes up? I have to say that I think the idea of wage-capping for players is unrealistic. Market forces come into play here. But perhaps capping the amount for clubs as a whole could be a workable option? How would the Premiership look if Manchester United could only spend the same on their squad as West Bromwich Albion? There is a fine line between helping clubs to get their finances in order and restricting their ability to operate independently.

But maybe we are being too harsh. Here at the County Ground, a sort of wage-capping has been introduced in order to learn from mistakes of the past. You cannot agree to give players

Town had twice held a two-goal lead but with the score at 3-3 and 15 minutes to go, McHale was ordered to retake his successful spot kick as referee Clive White leisurely carried out a booking. McHale chose a different corner and completed the conversion again.

There were fireworks on the fifth as Town defeated Gillingham at the County Ground by 3-2. It was Swindon's second League win on the trot and continued the process of hoisting Swindon up to mid table as Moss, Aizlewood and Anderson featured on Town's score sheet. However on 11th the trip to Layer Road Colchester returned no points as Town suffered a 2-0 reverse and their fifth League away defeat in succession.
