Wally Downes has certainly a fantastic job on a slender budget and what he's mgot at his disposal are a large number of young players hungry for success.

The fixture list certainly hasn't been too kind to us over the festive period, with Wigan and Cardiff next up after today's game. However, a win against Crewe and another today and we'll certainly be looking a lot healthier. With that said, Brentford are a very good young side and we will have to play to our strengths if we are to overcome them this afternoon. As these notes were penned the Club looked set to be freed of the embargo that had prevented us from moving in the transfer market. That is great news for the club, but getting players in at this time of year is certainly going to be difficult. With all clubs having four games in eight days, very few managers will be prepared to relinguish any of their squad. However, I will be hoping to bring in at least one new face and you never know - there may be a new name in today's line-up (STOP PRESS - John Sutton signed on 20.12.02).

Yet just because we need new bodies doesn't mean that I'll be rushing to get any player in. As I've always said, we need players that are as good, if not better than what we already have - let's just hope that some of the names I have on my list are available. By getting players in it creates competition for places and pushes those in the squad at the moment - something that isn't happening at the moment. Moving in the other direction last week was Daren Dykes. Daren is yet to establish himself in the first team squad here and despite his pace, I think the jump from non-league to Division Two has been a big one for him. He has now gone up to Lincoln for a month and I think the move will do him good - he'll certainly gain some invaluable experience if he's selected. The lad certainly has something about him, with a few games he could become a better player. Get behind the boys today and let's hope that come 4.45pm, we'll be celebrating another victory.

Good afternoon to you all and welcome to the County Ground for today's Boxing Day match up with Brentford. A warm welcome to the directors, management, players and supporters who've travelled along the M4 from West London.

There is always a keen sense of anticipation for Boxing Day matches. I don't really know why, but the desire to get away from Christmas Pudding and dodgy sweaters and enjoy the world's favourite sport seems to be overwhelming.

On a personal note I would especially like to welcome Wally Downes to the County Ground. Wally and I went to the same school in West London, although he was a couple of years older than me. My clearest memory of Wally was of him and another pupil bowling bouncers at both myself and my playing partner during a game of cricket played in torrential rain. I can still vividly see the ball whistling past my ears as I made attempts to bat it away. I would like to wish Wally all the best for the rest of the season (after today of course). It is a couple of weeks or so since we finally managed to reach an agreement with Neil Ruddock over the severance of his contract. One question asked of me since is why did it take so long to sort out? My answer is a simple one - it needs two to tango and for some time I did not believe that our negotiations were going anywhere, as Neil's original settlement demand was for a figure far in excess of what was sensible, reasonable and affordable. We made it very clear that the settlement would be funded outside of the club as the club's cash position did not allow it to make the payment. We were very keen to reach an early settlement because the transfer embargo was hurting us, as was the constant negative publicity the issue warranted.

As far as I'm concerned a major hurdle to the re-building of the club has been cleared and the path ahead is that bit easier. Neil has walked away with a substantial settlement and the club has been able to make a considerable saving over the course of the next 18 months.

This morning saw the much-talked about AGM, which took place at the County Ground. Unfortunately we would not have been in a position to present our accounts, due simply to the sheer lack of financial information available to us. However,

Swindon Town travelled down to Home Park looking for three points to take them up to 13th place in the Nationwide Second Division. King started with Steve Robinson returning to the midfield along with Andy Gurney returning at right back and it was Town that started the brighter of the two sides, Danny Invincibile making a bright foray forward in the opening minute.

On 11 minutes good work from Miglioranzi and Sabin down the Town left earned a corner, taken by Miglioranzi. The New Yorker curled a teasing ball into the box but the referee, Mr R Olivier, gave a free kick for a foul on Romain Larrieu, the home keeper.

The returning Steve Robinson played a testing ball across the edge of the 18-yard box which should have been attacked by any one of the Town front three. Nearest to the ball was Eric Sabin, who only stood and watched as Larrieu stepped out unchallenged to claim dive on the ball, when only a touch was needed from Sabin to roll the ball under the keeper. For Plymouth, a Lee Hodges cross was hit over by former West Brom frontman Mickey Evans in the 22nd minute when, from eight yards, a header could (and possibly should) have tested Griemink. As the drizzle turned to driving Devonshire rain Town looked to set pieces to provide a break through. Eric Sabin tested fellow countryman Larrieu on 25 minutes with the keeper turning the ball away after a low shot. Sam Parkin was then put away after an acute through ball from Andy Gurney. On the left-hand side of the box, Parkin looked towards goal but could not get the ball out from underneath his feet and the ball eventually was put out for a Plymouth goal kick. On 34 minutes Danny Invincibile should have done better when his cross floated tamely into the arms of the home keeper Larrieu. On 38 minutes Marino Keith had a shot deflected to Griemink, before heading over from a Mickey Adams cross two minutes later without testing the big Dutchman in the Swindon goal.

Just before the break. Matt Hewlett came closest to scoring for Town when he stepped past his marker and unleashed a 28 yard shot that somehow flew past the left hand side of Larrieu's goal. On the stroke of half time Hodges tested Griemink with a long-range shot that bounced off Griemink out for a corner, with the away keeper struggling to get hold of the ball in the wet conditions.

Town emerged unchanged for the second half whilst Plymouth

replaced Stonebridge with Blair Sturrock. Andy Gurney nearly gifted Plymouth an early opener in the second half when his back pass created panic amongst the Town ranks. Griemink raced out and cannoned the ball off the advancing striker and luckily, out for a Swindon goal kick. Stefan Miglioranzi provided a moment of sparkle when his pinpoint pass tound Danny Invincibile who paced towards the Plymouth box. The ball was then diverted out for a corner, taken by Miglioranzi who had taken over the duty after Johnnie Jackson's return to White Hart Lane. The ball flashed across the danger zone with Invincibile being closest to getting on the ball.

The rain continued and began to cause problems for the players with the ball holding up in parts of the field. David Norris, a summer target of Town manager Andy King, signed on a permanent basis from Bolton Wanderers before kick-off for the Pilgrims. Norris picked the ball up on 57 minutes and bent a shot that bounced off the wet surface just in front of Griemink. The Town keeper was unable to hold the ball and palmed it away for a corner, which was subsequently cleared.

Both sides were looking to extend their unbeaten records before kick-off, with Plymouth unbeaten in five and Town not registering a league loss in six. The match looked to be heading for a 0-0 draw when Town were awarded a free kick, central, on 77 minutes following a foul on Hewlett on the edge of the box. Former Torquay favourite Gurney stepped up and curled the ball into the top left hand corner past the helpless Larrieu in the Pilgrims goal. Gurney ran straight to the Swindon fans behind the goal and celebrated his return to the side, with a goal which put Town in the driving seat.

Then came drama at the finish. A hopeful ball into the Town box found Mickey Evans and Alan Reeves together challenging for the ball. However the linesman raised his flag for handball and a controversial penalty was awarded for the Pilgrims. Surrounded by Town players, the referee stood by his decision and ordered a spot kick to be taken. Lee Hodges stepped up and drove the ball down the middle past Griemink, who dived to his right, to seal a point for Plymouth.

Before the game Town may have settled for a point, but this will be seen as two points lost in a game where Town could have taken the win.

SWINDON TOWN RESERVES PLAYED HOST TO PLYMOUTH ARGYLE AT THE COUNTY GROUND LAST WEEK IN WHAT WAS THE FIRST HOME GAME SINCE OCTOBER, WHEN READING WERE THE VISITORS.

On just three minutes Daren Dykes made a positive run forward and his 25 yard shot was deflected narrowly wide, with the subsequent corner being cleared. However the visiting Pilgrims pushed forward, constantly causing the Town back four problems and took the lead in the sixth minute. A pinpoint cross from Martin Phillips was volleyed into the back of the net by the oncoming Nathan Lowndes, leaving Farr with no chance in the home goal.

In the initial stages after conceding, Town responded well. Dykes was again at the heart of the Town attack on 16 minutes, but a great covering tackle from Stuart Malcolm denied the former Buckingham player a shot. On 20 minutes a Collins free kick was headed clear from the Argyle box, only to be met by Dave Bampton who showed excellent technique with a volley. However, his powerful shot just flew agonisingly over Luke McCormick's bar to keep Town a goal behind.

On the stroke of the half hour, Plymouth doubled their lead. A defensive mistake let in Martin Phillips down the left hand side and he clipped the ball across the area for Lowndes, who made no mistake from eight yards to make it 2-0 to the visitors. Just two minutes later Farr made another superb save. Phillips squared the ball to McGlinchey who hit a first time drive destined for the back of the net, but Farr made a great save palming the ball wide for a corner.

Town made a half-time substitution at the break with Chris Hughes replacing Chris Collins. Three minutes into the second half a teasing cross from Fenwick found Dykes, but McCormick got a hand to the ball and with no Town player following up, the danger was cleared. Then on 62 minutes Plymouth extended their lead. Joe Broad crossed the ball into the box with Matt Viilis notching the third goal for the visitors. With ten minutes to go substitute Jamie Cheeseman had Town's best effort in the closing stages when his left foot volley was saved well down to his right by McCormick. Just two minutes remained on the clock when Plymouth extended their lead to four. A cross from Brian McGlinchey was met by Osvaldo Lopes at the back post, who ensured a happy trip back to Plymouth making it 4-0.

Record against the Town: STFC Wins 27, BFC Wins 23, Draws 17 Add to that the departures of manager Steve Coppell to Brighton (via the County Ground) – as well as lan Sidwell and Ben Burgess back to Blackburn and you can understand the sombre nature of the Bees support in the closed season. However, despite everything that's happened, Wally Downes' side have knocked the critics who, at the beginning of the season, a season encapsulated by relegation and moving home. At the time of writing – Brentford occupy a play-off position, are in the third round of the FA Cup and the semi-finals of the LDV Vans Trophy – not bad for a side seemingly in 'turmoil'.

Brentford's new manager, Wally Downes, was promoted to the manager's chair from coach during the summer and was not the most popular choice amongst some of the Brentford supporters, probably because names like Tony Adams were being mentioned as Coppell's successor (sound familiar?!). However, a 2-0 away win for the Bees on the opening day should have been a hint as to what was to follow in the weeks ahead.

By the time Andy King's high-flyers visited Griffin Park the Bees had already registered seven points from nine (the same total as Town in fact) and despite some suspect defending from both sides, Brentford emerged victorious 3-1 and in doing so, commanded top spot after just five games.

Unfortunately the heady heights of top spot were a little un-nerving for Downes' young squad and after two consecutive draws, home to Luton and away to Notts County, these were then followed by two defeats by Tranmere and Cardiff away. However in between the draw against Luton and the defeat by Tranmere Brentford beat Bournemouth away in the Worthington Cup and in doing so earned a plum draw against Middlesbrough.

Back in the league and Brentford had to lose again before they returned to winning ways against Northampton. A draw against Port Vale preceded a topsy-turvy game against Stockport (the Bees eventually edging out Cariton Palmer's side 3-2.) A nilnil draw at home against Plymouth was followed up in style by a very convincing thrashing of Steve MacMahon's Blackpool 5-0 to put the Bees back to sixth position before three straight defeats followed. More recently, a win against Chesterfield has seen the club's promotion push get back on track and you can't fail to be impressed by the influence Wally Downes and his back-room staff have had on this young squad of players. Not only that, but the Bees sit one place above their greatest rivals (QPR) too...

THE GAFFER



WALLY DOWNES

Wally Downes was handed his first managerial role by Brentford chairman Ron Noades, on June 28 2002. Wally had been working as the assistant to The Bees' previous manager, Steve Coppell, who resigned earlier that month after taking the club to the brink of promotion in the Second Division play-offs.

Wally Downes took up a coaching position at Griffin Park in the summer of 2000, having gained experience at Crystal Palace after fifteen years as a professional player at Wimbledon and Sheffield United. A tough yet skilful midfielder, Wally signed for Wimbledon from apprentice in 1979, and is generally credited with the dubious honour of inventing 'The Crazy Gang'. He was part of the side that climbed from Division Four to the top flight under Dave Bassett, making nearly 200 appearances for the Dons despite suffering three broken ankles during his career. Loaned out briefly to Newport County in 1987, Wally signed for Sheffield United the following year and made a handful of appearances for The Blades before being forced to call time on his playing days.

THEM AND US

It was Chris Kamara's birthday yesterday and if he received greetings from all of his past teammates he will have needed a big mantlepiece. Signing for Swindon for £20,000 in August 1977 Chris left Portsmouth, where he had been an apprentice, at the age of 20 and had already notched up over 60 League appearances. In excess of 140 matches were to follow during his first spell here at the County Ground as Town's fortunes swung from a League Cup semi-final appearance in 1980 culminating in relegation to Division Four in 1982. By then Chris had jumped ship and reenlisted at Portsmouth in exchange for £50,000 in May 1981 but surprisingly, seeing that Kamara knew the club so well, the move didn't work out. Five months later he was a Brentford player. Chris was a versatile midfielder who

showed commitment and skill in equal measure. Always valued by his manager and supporters, some of his career moves seem a little strange in both direction and timing. After adding another 150 games to his League total at Griffin Park, 'Karnmy' was welcomed back at the County Ground in August 1985, a move that dropped him from the Third to Fourth Division, and he played his part in the Town revival that claimed successive promotions.

With Town now in Division Two a paltry £27,500 took him off to divisional rivals Stoke in 1988 where he stayed for 18 months, and those that had enjoyed Kammy's performances over the years will have been delighted for him when he had a crack at the top division. Joining Leeds United in January 1990 for £150,000, Chris helped the club to the Second Division championship and topflight football. Eleven months and 20 games later the same fee took him to Luton, then loan spells at Sheffield United and town-of -birth Middlesbrough, all in the Premiership, led to a permanent move back to Bramall Lane on a free transfer in June 1993. A subsequent fee took Chris to Bradford in July 1994 where he ultimately occupied the manager's chair before moving the chair into the TV studio as a pundit.

In a playing career spanning 750 League and Cup appearances, 19 years and nine clubs, Kammy was always respected by his teammates and feared by his opponents. position in Swindon Town history. Some of the details read like a TV soap.

Town had started 1985/86 with two keepers in Jake Findlay and Scott Endersby. By September Findlay had fallen out with Lou Macari and had played his last match, and by October Kenny Allen had been signed from Torquay. With Town through to the Third Round of the League Cup a tasty looking home tie against Sheffield Wednesday was scheduled for October 29. Swindon had recently sunk as low as 21st in the basement division, while Wednesday were sitting third in the old Division One. a huge 86 places between the two teams. Swindon were beginning to believe in themselves having eliminated Second Division Sunderland in the previous round and were climbing the

table. Now comes the problem. Allen was cup tied (having played against Town in round one) and Endersby, who had played second fiddle to Findlay, seemed to resent being expected to step in as second choice yet again and announced that he would refuse selection. A move to far flung Carlisle was the swift outcome. Just two days to go and Macari had to find a 'keeper who wasn't cup tied and whose club didn't mind him becoming so.

Enter Richard Key who had started his career with over a hundred appearances for Exeter and had initially joined Brentford via Cambridge, Northampton and Orient. He had made just one appearance in a 1984 1-1 draw at Rotherham before moving on to Sunderland, being loaned back to Cambridge and then returning to Brentford on a non-contract basis. He took to the County Ground pitch having spent just hours getting to know his defence. A tenth minute Peter Coyne goal was desperately protected to the end and Key's performance brought chants of 'Are you watching Endersby' and 'We don't need you anymore'.

The next episode is less of a fairytail. An away tie at Ipswich where Key helped out again saw him pick the ball out of his net six times, and his Town career was over. The following March, Macari moved to sign 19-year old Fraser Digby on Ioan from Manchester United as back-up to Allen, and Digby's Town career was certainly both longer and more successful than that of Key, Allen, Endersby or Findiay.

The fact that Andy King started the 2002/03 season at the helm was a blessing for a club devoid of any continuity in recent years. Last seasons managenal merry-go-round can't have helped as Town, once again, failed to get out of the 'starting blocks' under Roy Evans and later, Andy King.

Fortunately that wasn't an issue this time around as King's side, boosted by the eventual signing of Sam Parkin from Chelsea, got off to the proverbial 'flyer' with Parkin himself grabbing a dream debut hat-trick in a 3-1 win over Barnsley. Put simply, Town looked awesome, and whilst no one predicted a first half season of struggle for the Tykes, the visitors looked impoverished in comparison to Town's slick passing and movement. Miglioranzi, who has since drifted in and out of the side, marshalled the midfield with consummate ease alongside Robinson and Hewlett, whilst elsewhere on the field Edds was the only other newcomer. The Australian under 21 international looked confident, his upbringing in the Nottingham Forest academy manifesting itself in Town's defence and alongside Willis, Heywood and Duke - Town looked solid.

Not available this season were the likes of Grazioli, Howe, Davis and McAreavey – all of which moved on to pastures new in the summer. And so it was a familiar looking line-up that travelled to Chesterfield for the second game of the season, a scene of despair a year earlier with David Reeves, brother of Alan, helping his old club along the way to a relatively easy 4-0 victory. Once again four goals were scored by one of the two sides at Saltergate, but two from Invincibile, another for Parkin and a first of the campaign for Sabin ensured that it was the red and white army that emerged victorious. Town were top of the league, playing well and unbeaten. And whilst there were those that were trying not to get too carried away (the previous two seasons as good as any excuse), there were others that sensed good times ahead

Town's first real test came via a familiar face as King's side travelled to Steve McMahon's Blackpool. Love him or loathe him, McMahon's tough style of management has seen a modest Blackpool side compete with the best in Division Two and when Town emerged with a 0-0 draw (and their unbeaten record still intact). there was a real sense that Town were not only becoming an attractive side to watch, but a difficult one to beat as well. However, a true sense of how far the Robins had come would be in the guile of their next visitors to the County Ground, a team that had been the cause of constant unhappiness in the previous two years. Lennie Lawrence's Cardiff City.

Town, for the first time since their most recent inception to Division Two, competed with the Bluebirds. Willis and Heywood kept the likes of Thorne and Earnshaw in check whilst the familiar three-pronged attack of Invincibile. Sabin and Parkin caused the visitors' defence a number of problems. Unfortunately, and despite deserving more from the game. Town lost out to the odd goal. Yet whilst in terms of points the afternoon may have appeared fruitless, the fact that Town looked accomplished against arguably the strongest side in the division must have given Town's faithful hope of returning to winning ways against Stockport.

Carlton Palmer's beleaguered side looked to be on the wrong end of a hiding as Town laid siege to the visitors' goal. Boosted by the previous weeks' performance against Cardiff. Town went forward in numbers and attacked County with gusto. Yet for all the passing and movement and countless opportunities on goal, Town couldn't find the back of the net. Instead Stockport, led single handedly by the impressive Palmer, snatched the cheekiest of victories and it appeared as though a familiar pattern was emerging, great football without an end result.

And so it was that Town went on to endure one of their most miserable runs of form in recent years. All the confidence that seemed to have been built up by King and his troops earlier on in the season appeared to have been drained by Stockport in swashbuckling style and despite taking an early lead, early strugglers Port Vale were the next side to heap more misery on King and his team. The Worthington Cup came and went by way of an undeserved 2-1 reverse at the hands of Wycombe (after extra time) before a fruitiess trip to Loftus Road set up Town for a crucial clash with newly promoted Cheltenham.

Meanwhile Andy King had been busy in the transfer market. With hands tied in terms of bringing in permanent players. King seemed to have unearthed a couple of loan gems in Johnnie Jackson and Jimmy Davis from Tottenham and Manchester United respectively, Jackson, a tireless worker with a sweet left foot, Davis a quick and highly skilled winger. However, neither could prevent Town from their worst performance of the season so far as lowly Cheltenham won with relative ease at Whaddon Road. King promised changes on the back of what was a poor 0-2 deteat. yet had few options at his disposal and so it was that the same side gave King brief respite with a 2-1 victory at home to

Northampton a week later. Jackson notched the first with a trademark free kick, whilst Parkin made amends for his sending off at Cheltenham with a late winner.

A lapse in form against Luton meant that the visit of Oldham a week later was crucial to Town's efforts. King remained defiant despite the growing pressure and whilst the press continued to link a host of names to his position (including Jan Molby, Tony Adams and Mel Machin), Steve Coppell joined on a short-term basis. Despite playing well and competing with their counterparts, Town went down to a late Clyde Wijnhard goal and the growing frustration of the fans culminated in a brief demonstration outside the Arkells Stand after the game.

It got worse a week later as Bart Griemink contrived to gift visitors Colchester with a two-goal lead. However, Town's players proved that there was some spirit left in the dressing room and goals from Alan Reeves and Eric Sabin ensured a dramatic point when it seemed as though defeat was a mere formality. Unfortunately defeat was the outcome a week later at Ashton Gate as Town experienced more derby misery and the subsequent visit of Southend in the LDV Trophy seemed to be a welcome break from what was turning out to be an arduous league campaign. And just as Stockport had proved to be a turning point earlier in the season, the visit of Southend would prove to be the catalyst for another prosperous run of form. Heywood, Miglioranzi, Jackson, Parkin and Sabin (as well as an own goal and not necessarily in that order) contributed to a vibrant 6-1 win. They may have been in Division Three and competing in the LDV Trophy but Southend had, unknowingly, proved to be the unfortunate victims of a hiding Town

had been promising to dish out all season.

The victory had a knock-on effect on Town's league form and despite an early setback against Mansfield, Town went on to record a edgy victory against a side at the foot of the table. In the week a 1-1 draw against Notts County (which, to be honest, warranted more) prepared Town for what would turn out to be a dramatic game against Wycombe at Adams Park.

The in-form Jimmy Davis put Town ahead against a poor Wycombe side. However, and rather predictably. Town let the home side back into the game before failing behind against the run of play. However, Town appeared to be more resolute following the harrowing run of form earlier in the season and Sam Parkin, seemingly 'on fire' following his three-game suspension, popped up with not one but two late goals to send Town's trivolous supporters home in a frenzy Town were slowly climbing the table and despite Davis's return to Old Trafford (much to the disdain of King, the players and the supporters), a draw against Tranmere at home would see them extend that unbeaten run to five games in all competitions. Not only that, but Town also scraped into Round Two of the FA Cup by virtue of a 1-0 victory against Huddersfield at the County Ground. Sabin and Parkin had hustled and bustled against the fellow strugglers, but it was Andy Gumey that popped up with the all important goal just. minutes from time. More importantly perhaps (and the less said about the trip to Kidderminster the better) was the league victory against the Terriers a week later. Gurney and Duke gave Town a two goal lead at the McAlpine before Sam Parkin made sure of the points with a late goal having come on as a substitute and a 0-0 draw against Peterborough a week later

made it six games without defeat in the league for King's men.

Which brings us up to speed for the season so far, these notes penned before the games against Plymouth and Crewe That is except, for our cup adventure against Oxford – Town drawn against their local rivals following the victory against Huddersfield, Indeed, such was the impact of the draw that BBC One decided to get in on the action and the game was subsequently beamed to the masses on December 8.

Unfortunately, and despite an impressive first half performance: a sloppy goal via the head of Oxford's Louis would be enough to send Town crashing out of the cup and in doing so, preventing them from reaching the Third Round, something they had achieved in every season since the eighties. Moreover, the subsequent Third Round draw pitched the U's against Arsenal at Highbury - further confounding

Town's misery. Yet perhaps more intriguing was the glaring lack of options at King's disposal. With Robinson and Gumey suspended, Alan Young and David Bampton were both 'thrown into the fire' late on, further highlighting the lack of tools King has to work with.

With that in mind, one looks ahead to the rest of the season with both excitement and trepidation

For whilst Town have the potential to compete at the top end of this division (not to mention a prolific goalscorer for the first time in years) – it is clear that King is doing the best on limited resources. In a perfect world those coming through the youth ranks will emerge as candidates for the first team (Mark Draycott another to be added to the list of those emerging from Viv Busby's successful under 19's team), but it is becoming blatantly clear that Town must make do with what they've got for the time being. Let's hope for an injury-free 2003!

It was a match with Brentford that probably holds the record of the longest game in Town's history. Promotion between the Southern League Division One and Two was decided by an end of season Test Match and in 1902 Swindon, having finished at the bottom of the Division, had to play Brentford to retain their status. The match was played at Elm Park and by full time neither side had scored. The game continued and still neither side had scored by the time that bad light forced play to end. The Southern League ruled that Swindon had done enough to retain their First Division place. Two seasons ago a game at Griffin Park was equally vital to the club as Matty Heywood's headed goal was enough to give three points which were enough to make the difference between relegation and survival at the season's end.

Today's feature match was played at Griffin Park on December 14 1982. A few days earlier Swindon seemed to be heading for victory in the Second Round FA Cup clash as they led 2-0 at half time, but a goal in the closing minutes by Gary Roberts earned the Bees a replay. Although the first half was goalless it was certainly not without incident. In the opening minute Jimmy Allan slipped making a clearance and had to play the rest of the match with a torn hamstring. Before 10 minutes had elapsed Stan Bowles and Leigh Barnard had both been booked and the game really exploded after 18 minutes when Terry Hurlock, the stocky Brentford midfielder, and Kevin Baddeley kicked out at each other and were sent off.

The second half began badly for Swindon -Francis Joseph robbed Barnard and centred for Gary Roberts to shoot home. Despite this Swindon looked the stronger side with Paul Batty and Gary Emmanuel who were working like Trojans in the heavy conditions. Two good opportunities were missed before Tony Mahoney overstretched himself in a tackle and was carried off with a broken leg. Keith Bowen proved an able replacement and Brentford twice went close before Swindon got an equaliser. Paul Rideout's stinging drive was beaten out by Paddy Roache in the Londoners goal, but fell to Andy Rowland who made no mistake. Four minutes from time Brentford had a glorious

chance to seize victory when Terry Rowe ran through but shot wide with just the keeper to beat. Six minutes into injury time Brian Hughes replaced the limping Barnard and his fresh leas soon boosted Swindon's cause. He had been on the pitch only six minutes when he hit a fine cross that Rowlands headed down in to the path of Howard Pritchard who fired home. A minute before the end of first half injury time, Pritchard turned provider setting up a cross for Batty, who outpaced Graham Wilkins before firing home. With the club losing £3,000 a week it was enough to earn a Third Round clash with Aldershot and extend hopes of a lucrative Cup run.

FOURFOURTWO'S MARK HANRAHAN RETURNS WITH MORE FROM THE WORLD OF FOOTBALL.

Could this be the last season for the man Arsenal fans dubbed 'The Magic Man'? Despite his sparkling form as skipper of Division One high-flyers Portsmouth this season, Paul Merson stunned the club's fans by hinting that guiding Portsmouth into the Premiership may be his last punt at footballing glory. The 34-year old former Arsenal and England ace is keen to bow out on a high note and fears he may not be able to cut it in the top flight. Merson said: "I want to keep my standards. I don't want to be mugging anyone in the Premiership."

Portsmouth have also confirmed that Japanese International, Yoshi Kawaguchi is also set to leave the club after failing to adapt the physical nature of life in Division One.

Pompey's fierce south-coast rivals have also announced that there could well be changes in their goalkeeping personnel with the January Transfer Window approaching. Southampton's Finnish International Antti Niemi has performed wonders 'between the sticks' at the St. Marys Stadium since his £2 million signing from SPL outfit Hearts. With Wales' participation in the 2004 European Championships looking more and more likely, the current Welsh No. 1, Paul Jones, may be forced to move before lack of first team football for the Saints costs him his International place.

Speaking of January's Transfer Window, Chairman Ken Bates has reiterated that Chelsea have "no intention" of selling their top players when the transfer window reopens next month. Reports that Jimmy Floyd Hasselbaink, William Gallas, John Terry and Eidur Gudjohnson could be leaving to ease the £90million debt at The Bridge are, according to Bates well wide of the mark. "The only way we will sell is if we receive any good offers for some of our fringe players".

Meanwhile Manchester City boss Kevin Keegan has already lined up his first swoop of the new year with the capture of Liverpool Ace John-Ame Riise's brother Bjorn Helge. Riise will join City in January.

Manchester United boss Sir Alex Ferguson could make sweeping changes to his squad after suggesting his charges may have been together too long, despite their recent return to form. Ferguson is widely tipped to dip into the transfer market when the window reopens in January with Milan's Adrily Shevchenko rumored to be his next major acquisition. Ferguson admits alterations may be made to avoid reigning league Champions Arsenal and recent cup experts Liverpool increasing a gulf in class. Milan have been playing with a lone striker and Shevchenko is rumored to be unhappy with a formation that can limit the San Siro outfit to any one from World Cup winner Rivaldo, the prolific Inzaghi or Shevchenko himself.

Spurs injury prone playmaker Jamie Redknapp's jinx reared its head again after Redknapp learnt he could miss a resurgent Tottenham's entire festive period after breaking his toe. Scans revealed a hairline fracture that is said to need a four-to-five week rest period.

Sporting progress within the city of Bristol has taken a major blow when plans to build a super-stadium home for the city's two football teams and the rugby club were shelved by council officials. A joint statement issued by Bristol City Council, Bristol City and Bristol Rovers, and Bristol Shoguns rugby club revealed that the 40,000 capacity stadium project had been shelved indefinitely. The statement said: "We have considered several sites in Bristol and have employed specialist consultants to analyse whether any of them were suitable locations. Having considered their assessment, the clubs and the council have all agreed that it will not be possible to build a new stadium in the city within an acceptable time frame.

Recently appointed Barcelona boss, Louis Van Gaal, could be set to leave the beleaguered Catalan side after 'Barca' followed up their Champions League victory over Newcastle with a comprehensive 3-0 league defeat to struggling Sevilla. Whilst Champions League form has not been a problem for Van Gaal, League form has been atrocious by Nou Camp standards and they currently find themselves struggling in 13th place in the table.

Finally, are you a player given a three match ban for a sending off? Or maybe a manager fined and banished to the stands for bringing the game into disrepute? Perhaps you are a Goalkeeper booked for the wrong coloured cycling shorts? Well, either way, you can all consider yourselves very lucky to be plying your trade in the UK, following the latest news from Iran. Football 365 reports that an Iranian international footballer has been banned from playing for his country for five years after being caught in a brothel! Mojahed Khaziravi also received a three 'year' ban from playing for his club. Khaziravi is however considered to have got off lightly as Iranian appeal courts prevented the application of part of his original punishment - 99 lashes. The player was arrested in June on charges of immoral contacts. Prostitution is dealt with harshly by the law in Iran since the 1979 Islamic revolution that saw a strict set of rules governing sex imposed.

Port Vale's assistant-manager Mark Grew has been made redundant by administrators running the troubled Staffordshire club. Grew has been laidoff as part of a cost-cutting package which the administrators say is needed to save the club. Seven members of staff have also been made redundant, although chief scout Ray Williams is the only other one of manager Brian Horton's footballing backroom staff to have gone.

Former Vale keeper Grew, 44, said: "I would be lying if I said this wasn't a wrench. I've worked long and hard at this job. I'm absolutely devastated and I'm also thinking of the other people who have been made redundant. I said goodbye to everyone I could. They have all been friends to me. I went into the dressing room and shook hands with all the players, it was very emotional," Grew told the Stoke Sentinel newspaper.



Oldham boss lain Dowie will give a trial to a former Cameroon international Samuel Ebwea. The Latics boss wants to see what Ebwea can do following the news that Clyde Wijnhard (pictured) could be out for the rest of the season. Back in August 2001 Ebwea had an unsuccessful trial with Southampton and returned to Rapid Bucharest after a brief trial.



Under-pressure Queens Park Rangers boss lan Holloway has signed Watford forward Lee Cook on a month's loan. Cook, 20, operates mainly as a striker but can also play on the left flank, where he will feature at Loftus Road. The Hammersmith-born player almost joined QPR three years ago, when he was at non-League Aylesbury United. Watford pipped Rangers and several other clubs to sign him, but Cook has since been unable to establish himself in the Hornets first-team. He recently completed a two-month loan spell at York City.

Holloway's side have failed to win in 11 matches and were recently knocked out of the FA Cup by part-timers Vauxhall Motors. Cook has been brought in as a possible solution to one of Holloway's problems - a lack of natural wide players.



REEVES JOINS SPIREITES



David Reeves has rejoined Chesterfield until the end of the season. The veteran striker left the Spireites to sign for Oldham on a free transfer last January following a successful loan spell. But he returned to Chesterfield on loan in August, making 16 league appearances and scoring once before the deal ended last month. His new contract has an option for an extra 12 months. Reeves said: "It's fantastic to be back and I hope the fans make me welcome, because I love Chesterfield and the fans have always been good to me. I am sure I can give a bit more this time as I was really apprehensive when I was on loan." Reeves scored against Town in the Spireites 4-0 win last season and will be reunited with his brother, Alan, when the two sides meet on January 4.

Wycombe Wanderers striker Sean Devine could be on his way to Third Division strugglers Exeter City. NO. 15 TURBO'S TOMATO SOUP

You'll need 300g tomatoes, 1 tbsp olive oil, 2 shallots, peeled and chopped, 2 garlic cloves, peeled and chopped

45ml/3 tbsp white wine, 290ml/1/2 pint vegetable stock, salt and freshly ground black pepper, white wine

 To make the soup, in a medium saucepan heat 1 tbsp of olive oil.

Sauté the shallot for one minute to soften. Stir in the garlic. Season.

 Pour in the white wine and cook for 30 seconds.

Stir in the tomatoes and stock. Simmer until the tomatoes begin to break down.

 Carefully transfer the soup to a liquidiser and blend.

 Serve the soup with a swirl of herb oil, a spoonful of yoghurt, a basil leaf.
