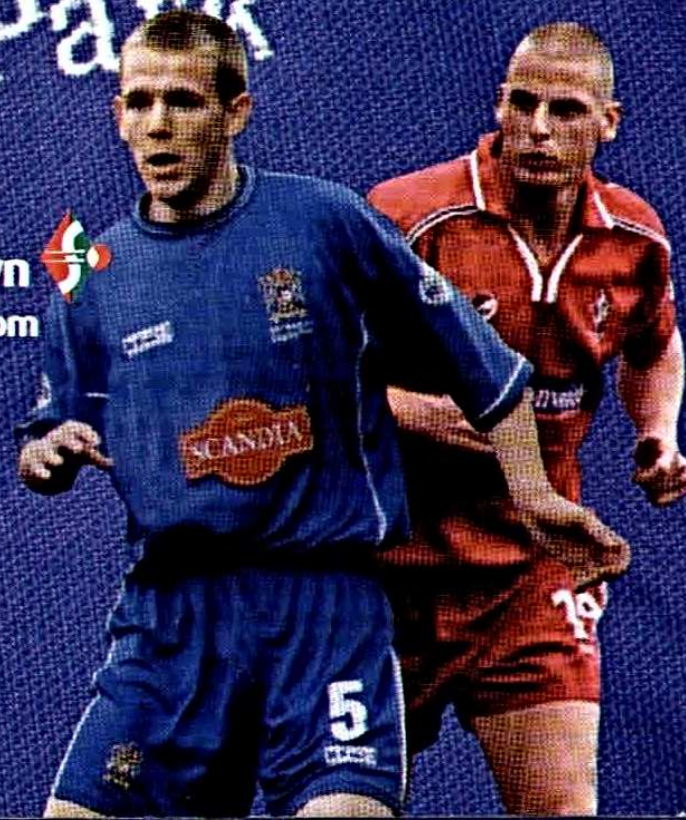

May I start my note today by explaining why I have allowed Ben Burgess to go on loan to Oldham and why I've sold Neil Ross and Keith Briggs.

I looked long and hard at Briggsy's situation. He's on good money for the Second Division and if he's not in the team then he's an expensive substitute. He's good cover in a lot of positions but, unfortunately, the positions I think he's suited to, which is right back or right midfield, are currently occupied. I thought the offer from Norwich was a good offer and we've built in a 30% sell-on clause should he move on.

With Rossy I always knew that once Alby was fit then, unfortunately, he'd be surplus to requirements. Macclesfield have paid us good money and to be quite honest, we had to take it. I'd like to wish Keith and Neil all the best at their new

clubs. I hope Ben is a big success at Boundary Park as well because the door certainly isn't closed on him here at Edgeley Park. Today is a very important game for us. I've said to the

players that we don't want to get dragged into the bottom four.

I've also told them to keep working hard and keep trying to pass the ball and hopefully things will begin to go our way. I don't think we could by a little bit of luck at the moment.

Like us, Swindon have a striker who has scored most of their goals. Sam Parkin is a handful, that's for sure, but so is Luke and to be honest, it's not a habit of mine to talk too much about the opposition.

I'm much more concerned about what we do. It's going to be a difficult game, we know that, but we will approach it in the right way. We need produce the form we showed in our last game at Queens Park Rangers when our performance had everything but a goal. Once again, though, luck went against us when they were awarded a penalty. It was never a penalty and I know people are telling me to stop talking about the official but what else can I do?

On a positive note, though, when I looked around the dressing room after the game everyone was as sick as me and that's probably the first time this season that's happened.

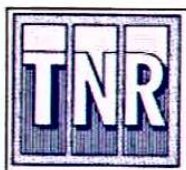
To me that's a good sign that shows what we are doing is heading in the right direction.

The freezing weather put paid to County's home match on January 8th against Rochdale. Only one game took place in the week when Doncaster Rovers drew 2-2 with Chesterfield and County remain in fourth place in the League.

Cheshire Cup Senior Cup

The next game for the reserves is the Semi Final of the Cheshire FA Unibond Senior Cup when Conference side Northwich Victoria visit Edgeley Park next Wednesday January 22nd for a 7.15pm start. County's route to the Semi Final saw a 1-1 draw at Nantwich Town on

September 16, 2002, where David Holt scored the Hatters' equaliser. Holt gave County the lead in the replay at Edgeley Park seven days later with Kevin Ellison scoring the winner five minutes from the end. In the Second Round Chester City won 3-1 after extra time at Edgeley Park on November 4, 2002. However, the Deva Stadium outfit were expelled from the

competition for playing Chris Tate, who was on loan from Leyton Orient, as the rules of the competition do not allow teams to play loan players. Neil Ross was on the mark after 30 minutes to give County the lead but goals by Tate and two from Danny Byrne in the extra half hour gave the Seals the win.

The Vics had to start in the Preliminary Round with a 3-1 win at Ewen Fields against Hyde United. Manager Jimmy Quinn gave the visitors an early lead before ex-County reserve Lee Evans scored the Tigers' equaliser. Northwich won the game with two goals from Greg Blundell in the last two minutes. In the First Round the Vics won 2-1 at Wincham Park against Stalybridge Celtic with two second half goals from Garvey. In the Second Round Northwich won 3-0 at Winsford United to qualify for the Semi Final with goals from David McNiven, Rickie Norris and a Jimmy Quinn penalty.

Duo Depart

Two of the reserve team squad have left the club recently after being informed they are not in County's plans for next season. One is Jon Scragg who joined the club's Centre of Excellence at 13 and was in his first year as a professional. The other is Mark Byrne who joined County last season from Blackburn Rovers after impressing for the youth team. He was given an 18-month contract and played five times for the first team.

Blackpool 2 County Reserves 4

Aaron Wilbraham made an immediate impact when he made his first appearance of the season at Bloomfield Road on Wednesday afternoon.

The big striker came off the bench to replace David Holt with 30 minutes remaining to set up two goals as the Hatters came from behind to complete the double over the Seasiders.

With the scores locked at 2-2 Wilbraham was brought down on the edge of the box by Tommy Jaszczun and Rickie Lambert scored against his former club, curling the resultant free kick past the helpless Mark Russell in the home goal.

And five minutes from time Lambert added his second, and County's fourth, after Wilbraham had laid a cross from Chris Williams into his path.

Martin Pemberton had given County a 24th minute lead when he pounced on the loose ball after Russell could only parry Peter Wild's shot.

It might have been different had the visitors not had a man sent off, but how often do we see a side playing better with ten men than with 11?

They had to wait 20 minutes for their first sight of goal while we forced seven corners in the first half but all we had to show after an excellent game of football was a Ben Burgess penalty.

A couple of days later County put together their best football of the season as QPR struggled to cope with their high tempo game.

But once again the Hatters paid the price for failing to convert chances into goals and were denied any glory by Kevin Gallen's highly contentious last minute penalty.

I know the players have been looking forward to a return to playing after last weekends postponement and I'm sure if we carry on the good work from our last two games we'll all be celebrating at 4.45pm.

SOMETHING YOU OUGHT TO **KNOW**

HEALTHY STOCKPORT COMMUNITY GRANT SCHEME

Healthy Stockport Community Grant Scheme was set up by Stockport Health Authority in order to recognise the vital role community groups play in promoting the health and well-being of Stockport residents. The grant scheme is able to offer small sums of money to local community groups to help support them in their health promoting activities by developing new and existing projects.

Who can apply?

- Any self-help group, community group or small voluntary group (or field worker on behalf of a group) for projects which promote the health of the group.
- The most disadvantaged groups or communities will receive priority.

The project must:

- Emphasise prevention rather than treatment
- Benefit Stockport residents
- Involve the community in its own health
- Demonstrate fresh approaches and new ideas in promoting health

We also look for projects which:

- Demonstrate fresh approaches and new ideas in promoting health
- Encourage groups to work in partnership with other organisations

What types of project might get a grant?

Here are a few examples from previous years:

- Friends of Etherow – towards material for a sensory garden.
- Offerton Hall Allotments Association – to purchase a polytunnel.
- Reddish Community Church – towards kitchen equipment.
- Pavilion Community Association – to support three members with disabilities.

Who will decide which projects receive a grant?

The grants are allocated by a panel with representation from the Health Services, Local Authority and the Voluntary Sector. The maximum amount allocated to any project is £500.

How can I apply for a grant?

The best job in the world?

I would have to say pensioner, I think.

I'm getting a bit of a taste for the way of the blue rinse brigade because I'm off work for a couple of weeks, and we haven't booked to go anywhere. Suddenly, it all becomes clear. After a couple of days cooped up in the house, I see the attraction of getting up at 5'o'clock in the morning and going to stand outside the Post Office. You could see the indignation on the faces of the old dears as they roll up at 5.30 a.m. to see this young whipper-snapper at the head of the queue. I only wanted to buy a first-class stamp (it would have been second-class if I were really an O.A.P.) but it seems to be a badge of honour for them. They positively bristled, made a mental note to set the alarm 5 minutes earlier next week...and then at 8.45 they started slowly, ever so slowly, edging their way in front of me in the queue. So slowly it was imperceptible, being sure to inadvertently dig me in the ribs with a rolled-up brolly as they stampeded past. Yes, it's the pensioner's life for

me.

You must not mistake my comments for criticism. Some of my favourite relatives are of pensionable age. I reckon it is just a wasted opportunity having that much fun at a time when your body can't cope with the excitement...surely it would make more sense to be a pensioner between the ages of, say, 30 and 50, and then spend the rest of your life at work.

Here's an example of how a seemingly everyday activity takes on a whole new magical lustre when seen through the eyes of the silver-haired. The other day, I stopped off at a motorway service station, for nourishment and a rest. I intended to stay for maybe 15 minutes and then get on my way. Then I heard it...the slow "whoosh" of the coach door opening, followed by the calls of this most feared pack animal. "Have you got your stick, Gladys?" If it isn't John Stalker trying to protect you from the "continual glare of the sun" (very much a problem in Stockport), you've got that nice Frank Windsor worrying you with life insurance, and June Whitfield cheering you up by asking if your funeral is paid for.

was Trophy bitter which I thought had been discontinued just after the Ark sank. Could things really get any worse? Oh yes they certainly could.

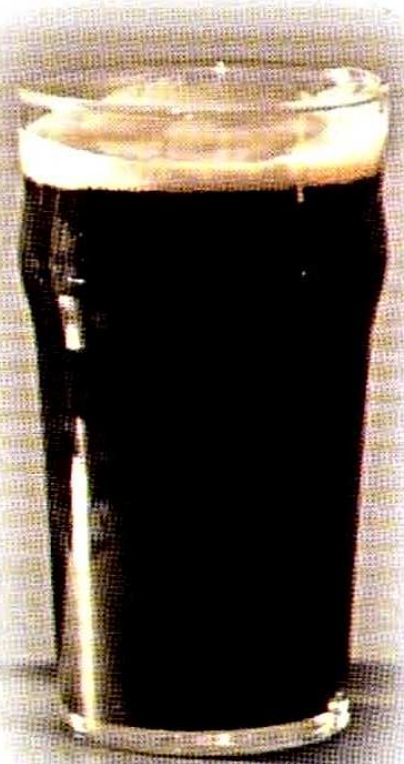

CHRIS PEEL'S REGULAR DIVISION TWO ROUND UP

Although the cold weather restricted action in the Nationwide Second Division last Saturday, the Friday night clash between Bristol City and Wigan Athletic at Ashton Gate went ahead and showed just how healthy a position Paul Jewell's now find themselves in. Peter Kennedy's first goal for Wigan Athletic ensured the Latics won 1-0 last on Friday to move 12 points clear at the top of the Second Division table. The Northern Ireland international's 49th minute

goal proved to be enough to secure a vital win. In a very tight game the Latics showed why they have moved so far clear at the top of the table as they produced a hard-working, disciplined performance. Mickey Bell fired just over the bar in the opening minute for the Robins while at the other end Nathan "Duke" Ellington was denied by 'keeper Steve Phillips. Gary Teale also went close for Wigan while at the other end Joe Burnell saw his shot saved by John Filan. The closest either side came to breaking the deadlock before the interval came in the 26th minute when Ellington rattled the woodwork. Jewell's side started the second period strongly and the winning goal came during their best spell of the match. The goal seemed to knock Danny Wilson's team out of their stride and it took them some time to create any worthwhile chances. Substitute Liam Rosenior fired wide on the hour while Scott Murray had his effort saved by Filan. At the other end Ellington almost doubled Wigan's advantage while Brian Tinnion and Murray went closest to grabbing a late equaliser. They defeat leaves Bristol City fourth in the table but they have now won just one of their last five games. Of the four games that survived on Saturday, Peterborough United won the relegation six-pointer 1-0 at the McAlpine Stadium against Huddersfield Town. Andy Edwards' late close-range finish from Dave Farrell's cross gave Posh the three points and lifted Barry Fry's men out of the bottom four, while the Terriers stay rooted to the foot of the table and in severe financial difficulties.

Huddersfield Town chairman David Taylor has confirmed that he is involved in crisis talks with the club's players in a bid to help the Terriers' current cash problems. Taylor has said that the wage bill for December has still not been paid as the club remains £6million in debt. Basically the club cannot afford to carry the contracts currently in existence and although the PFA are prepared to assist, deferring payments is not really a long-term option for the club, merely shifting the problem down the line rather than solving it. Crewe Alex came from behind to beat Colchester United 2-1 at Layer Road. Veteran Micky Stockwell netted the opener for the home side four minutes before the break. However, the Alex drew level 11 minutes into the second half as Steve Jones curled in a left-footed shot past Simon Brown and the former Leigh RMI winger repeated the effort

six minutes later with a right foot shot to secure the three points.

Richard Pacquette fired QPR ahead after 11 minutes at Loftus Road against Barnsley, netting from Matthew Rose's knockdown following a Richard Langley cross. Kevin Donovan struck the crossbar for the Tykes right on half time, but the visitors were unable to find a way back into the game and fell to a 1-0 defeat. The three points consolidated Rangers' sixth place in the league. The only other game saw Mansfield Town draw 0-0 at home to Wycombe Wanderers, although the Stags went close on several occasions through Iyseden Christie. Liam Lawrence also hit the woodwork for the home side.

One transfer of note saw Blackpool manager Steve McMahon complete the signing of Barnsley defender Mike Flynn on a three-month loan deal. The 33-year-old has been brought to Bloomfield Road because of the current defensive crisis at the club, which sees Colin Hendry, Ian Hughes and Chris Clarke all currently injured.

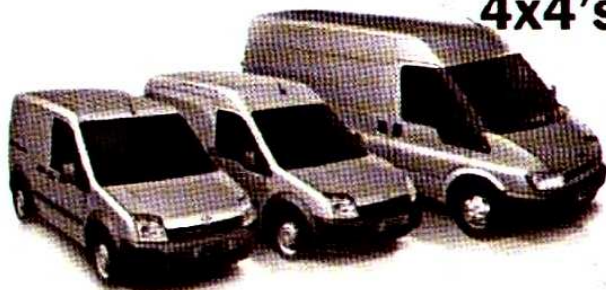

100 Years at
Edgeley Park

Throughout the season, Richard Harnwell and Phil Brennan look back at the good and the bad times that make up the history of Stockport County since admission to The Football League in 1900.

Part 16 - The 'deerstalker' comes and goes.

The 1983/84 season saw the start of a new Cup competition, which had been the brainchild of County Chairman Dragan Lukic. The Associate Members Cup was designed as a 'second half' of the season competition for Third and Fourth Division teams. The competition was originally based on the notion that most, if not all, of clubs in the two lower Divisions would have no further interest in the two 'major' domestic Cups.

County were to play twelve games, over six seasons, before they were to win their first ever game in the competition,

defeating Burnley 2-0 at Turf Moor in November 1989. In true County style, having won only 2 of a total 18 games in the competition, spanning 8 seasons, the club were then to reach two successive Finals in the early 90's.

The club's first ever game in the competition, a draw at home to Crewe Alexandra in February 1984, was notable for the fact that County, having already missed a spot kick during normal time, were to lose a penalty 'shoot out' by missing their first three kicks.

In the eighties a period relative stability in the Managers chair, which saw the club utilising the services of just two managers in a little under six years, then saw a further six managers incumbent over the next four. Following Jimmy McGuigan and Eric Webster's spell in the hot seat, the club were managerless for closed season of 1985 until the appointment

of Colin Murphy, for the first of his two spells as number one at Edgeley Park in August.

Although Murphy's tenure was brief it was eventful. Due to safety concerns raised by the Bradford City fire on the final day of the previous

season, Edgeley Park was still awaiting a safety certificate. The campaign began with County playing their first seven League and Cup fixtures away from home. His team were to play just four times at home under his leadership, before Murphy was lured away by a lucrative deal in Saudi Arabia.

Senior player Les Chapman was promoted

to player/manager seeing out the remainder of the season. Having taken over a side in 19th place, Chapman led his side steadily up the Fourth Division table to fifth position by the end of March. Following this five-month spell, the best for twenty years, disaster struck once again as the 'Hatters' lost six of their last eight games finishing eleventh. Despite the fact that the club had not finished in a higher position for 17 years, Chapman was inexplicably dumped during the closed season.

The decision to sack Les Chapman was to have near

catastrophic repercussions for Stockport County. The 1986/87 season saw the implementation of automatic relegation for the team that finished bottom of the Fourth Division. On the face of it, the 'high profile' appointment of Jimmy Melia as County's new manager did not appear to be a bad bet.

Just three seasons previously the former England International, had taken unfashionable Brighton & Hove Albion to within a whisker of lifting the FA Cup. Sadly Melia was unable to reproduce the form he had showed during his playing career, in his role as a manager. A closer look at his managerial record, the FA Cup run apart, shows him to have had unsuccessful spells at Aldershot, Crewe, Southport and abroad. On his return to England he took over at Brighton in 1983, despite their glorious FA Cup run, the South Coast club were relegated, prompting

Melia to resign.

Another unsuccessful spell abroad, with Belenenses in Portugal, preceded his arrival at Edgeley Park.

Accustomed as County fans were to seasons of dire performances the last 100 years paled into insignificance during Melia's four months in charge. The abysmal record of won one, drawn three, lost ten, goals for 6, goals against 29 speaks volumes for his fourteen League games. To add insult to Injury County were battered into oblivion by Sheffield Wednesday ten nil on aggregate in the First round of the League Cup. The second leg, seven nil defeat, equaling the clubs highest ever in the competition.

With the club facing certain relegation and possible extinction, it came as no surprise that Melia was sacked in November 1986.

In desperation the board of directors turned once again to Colin Murphy, still working in the Middle East, to save a near impossible situation.

Taking into consideration the teams League position, compounded by the further demoralizing First Round FA Cup defeat at the hands of non-league Caernarfon Town, Murphy's task seemed insurmountable.

Aided by several inspired

signings he somehow managed to instill a commitment and confidence in his players that had been sadly lacking. With the team suffering only two defeats in his first fourteen games in charge, morale both on and off the pitch received a tremendous boost.

Whilst a run of four successive defeats saw County drop back into the danger zone, their new found spirit gave them the heart and determination to fight back once more, winning six of the last nine games.

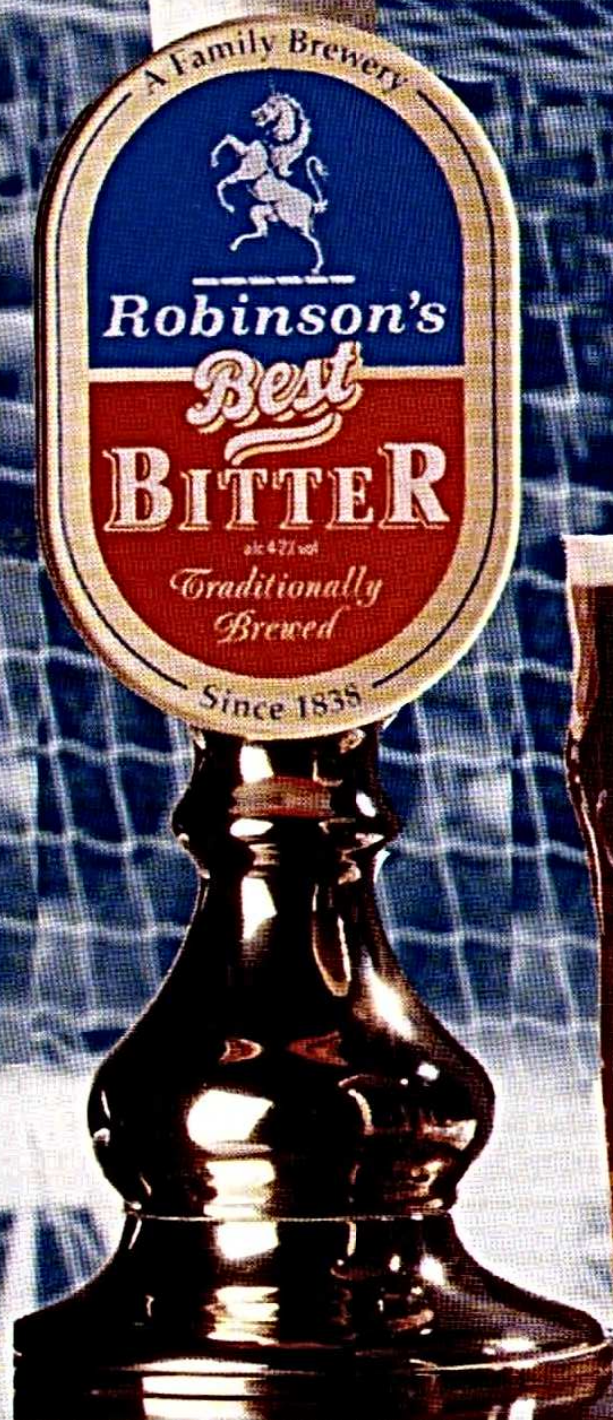
Not only did the club avoid the trap door to obscurity they also managed to finish outside the old 're-election' zone, in 20th place. Ironically having saved County from the drop, and having written himself into Edgeley Park 'folklore' in the process, Murphy stunned the club, not only by handing in his resignation, but by his decision to take over the Football Club that had been relegated, Lincoln City.

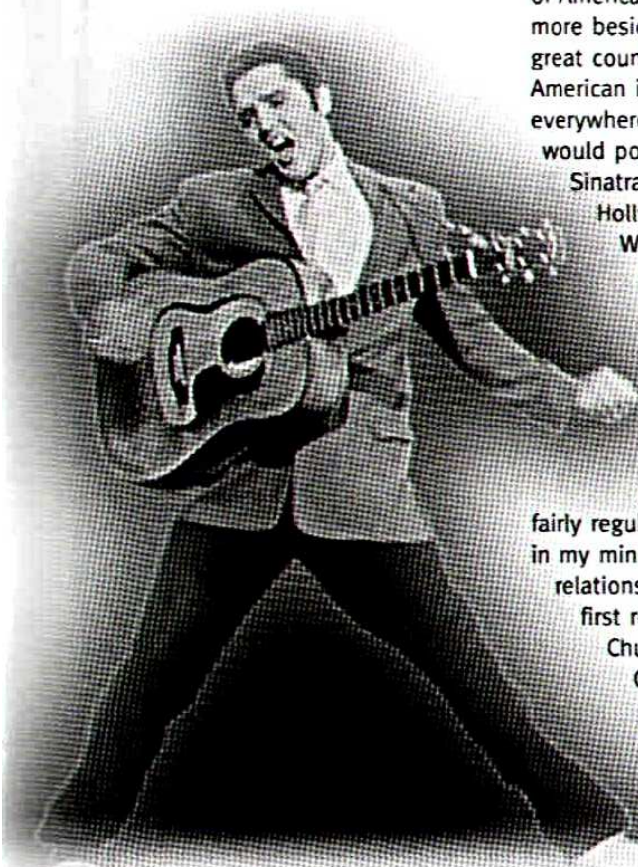

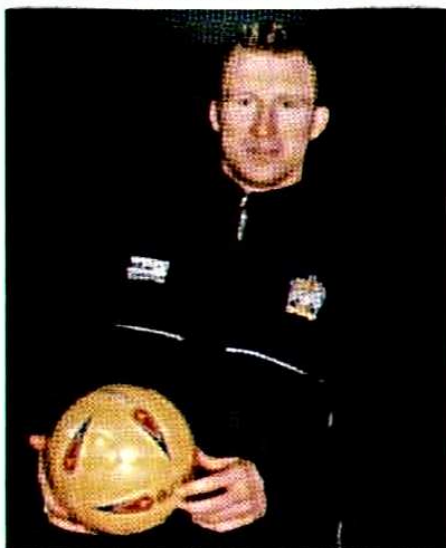

The Football Association have rejected the proposals from the Conference League to add one or two divisions to their constitution next season, albeit temporary. Thank goodness for that. Call me an old traditionalist but radical change in football goes against the grain.

The Conference are trying to add more strength to their already considerable armour by increasing the number of clubs in their competition. This would obviously seriously weaken the Unibond, Dr Martens and Ryman Leagues and whilst they would easily make up the numbers, I am totally against clubs 'jumping the gun' by obtaining promotion under false pretences. Hyde United, who are bottom of the Unibond League and who look certain for relegation, have applied and with their ground being up to standard they would almost certainly get into the Conference League. Isn't it morally wrong that a team deemed for relegation should suddenly gain promotion because of a new shake up? It is very similar to what could happen in the Football League. There has been talk of a Premier Division Two with invites to selected clubs. Sheffield Wednesday may be relegated at the end of the season to Division Two, but

because they are a 'big' club, they would be promoted if this idea came about for next season. Any plans for League re-structuring should be planned for at least two years ahead so that EVERY club has the same chance of promotion.

What a shame that Farnborough can't stage their glamour FA Cup game at home. Imagine Mr Wenger squeezed into a dug out that fits six people and the world press clamouring into a press area where you couldn't swing a cat. Two ex-County players could be lining up against Arsenal, goalkeeper Tony Pennock and forward Ken Charlery.

Carl Alford has got the move he wants by going to Conference club Nuneaton. He turned down a move to Droylsden but this move is fraught with danger. Apparently the fans are helping to pay his wages and that to me just doesn't sound right. Whilst Nuneaton manager John Askey knows Alford well from his Macclesfield days, it only wants Alford to struggle scoring goals and the fans would soon be asking questions. Nuneaton lost the first League game that Alford played and then got dumped out of the FA Trophy at Tamworth. Alford needs to score goals to keep the fickle fans happy.

Players who have played for County and this afternoon's visitors are thin on the ground. But those that have, have made significant contributions to Hatters' history.

Keith East and Tommy Henderson were teammates at the County Ground before moving north in 1966 to help the Blues clinch the Fourth Division championship later that season.

And another former Robin also played a part in securing our last piece of silverware. Bill Atkins was registered as a County player just four minutes before transfer deadline in March 1967. He then played the final fourteen games in our championship campaign, scoring three goals.

Our former player-manager Mike Summerbee started his illustrious career with the Town back in 1960 whilst super-sub Andy Mutch spent two years in Wiltshire after leaving Wolves in the summer of 1993.

Hugely popular at Edgeley Park, Mutchy had the chance to spoil Swindon's promotion party on the final day of the 1995-96 season, but he headed John Jeffers' cross over the bar from point-blank range. Victory could have secured a play-off spot for Dave Jones' men – the game finished goalless – but it would have been academic as Bradford made sure of sixth place by winning at Hull.

Andy, though, played a key role twelve months later – mainly from the bench – when the Hatters regained their place in English football's second tier for the first time in 60 years.

Who will ever forget his late winner – and subsequent celebrations – against Burnley that sent the majority of the 9,187 inside Edgeley Park into raptures?

His eleven County League goals included a hat trick, against? ... Swindon's arch-rivals Oxford United in March 1996!

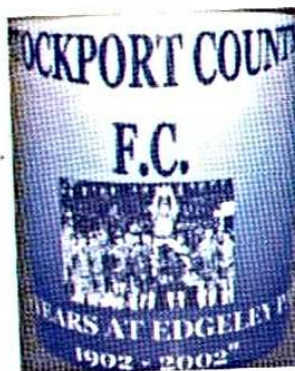

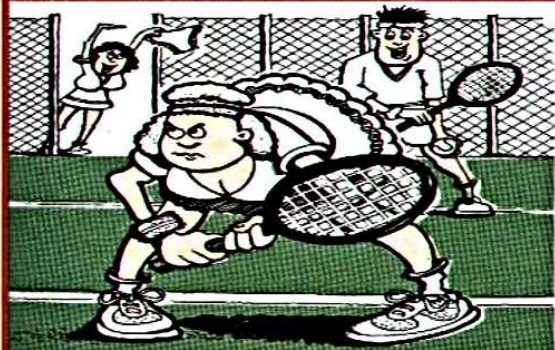

SATURDAY, 16th APRIL, 1966

A 12-page programme was issued for our Cheshire Senior Cup Final against Vics.

Edgeley Park is bracing itself for a Green and White invasion when Northwich Victoria come to town on Wednesday night. More than 400 fans are expected to follow Jimmy Quinn's side on their first appearance in Stockport for almost 29 years.

Their last visit was back on February 23rd, 1974 when the non-leaguer's won a Senior Cup tie 1-0. That game, incidentally, was the first time we'd been drawn out of the bag first against Vics in a competition that dates back to 1880. We have played four ties at Drill Field, though, (1 win and 3 defeats), and four games on neutral venues, (3 wins and one defeat). The last game played on neutral turf was at Macclesfield's Moss Rose on Saturday, April 16th. And, after hammering Chester and Tranmere 4-0 in earlier rounds, Northwich were red-hot favourites to lift the grand old trophy for the first time in more than a decade. But, roared on by more than 2,000 travelling fans, it was County Reserves who triumphed 2-0, thanks to a couple of goals from Frank Beaumont.

Whilst that following may sound incredible, an even bigger Blue Army made the journey to Stalybridge for the semi-final against the, then, mighty Altrincham. The Robins, arguably the top non-league side in the country, arrived at Bower Fold on March 19th, 1966 boasting a record that showed just two defeats all season – a Cheshire

League game against Runcorn and an FA Cup fourth round tie against the mighty Wolves!

But County Reserves stunned them with a 65th minute goal from 18-year-old amateur Malcolm Abbott and then refused to buckle under an Alty onslaught thanks, largely, to a terrific performance from 'keeper Steve Fleet. The Stockport Express described Abbott's big moment: "And then it happened. Left-half Mike Eckersall dropped a free kick into the Alty penalty area, right-wing Frank Peacock pushed the ball through a gap in the Robins defence for fellow winger Malcolm Abbott to scissor kick into the back of the net. It was a goal that rocked the Robins and sent the large army of County fans wild with delight."

County's success in 1966 was the fifth time they'd lifted the Senior Cup. Our first was 60 years earlier when Northwich, strangely, were beaten 2-1 at Gresty Road Crewe.

Other victories came in 1915, 1947 and 1949.

We have also tasted defeat at the final stage in 1939, 1958 and, much more recently, 2001.

Vics also have a proud history in the competition. Such was their early domination – similar to Real Madrid

in the European Cup – they won the first competition in 1880 and then saw their name engraved on the trophy for the next five years.

Their overall record of 17 successes can only be bettered by Macclesfield Town, with 20.

Northwich actually played the 1971 final against the Silkmen here at Edgeley Park, one of nine occasions the showpiece game has been staged by County.

And did you know that other semi-finals and finals have been held here in Stockport? In the late 19th century Cale Green Cricket Club, then home of

Stockport Association, was used a number of times by the Cheshire FA as a neutral venue.

On the playing side, many familiar faces have worn County blue and Northwich green.

Jimmy Collier, the youngest player to play for County, moved across Cheshire when he left Edgeley Park in 1974.

And, over the next couple of years, he was joined by Les Ormrod, Bev Wilson, the late Jimmy Golder and Tony Keyes, four players who played alongside Collier when our 'A' team gloriously lifted the Lancashire League title in 1973.

Two heroes from our epic League Cup victory against West Ham United that season, Tommy Spratt and Ray Charter, also spent time at the Drill Field following their release by County.

More recently Darren Knowles, Adie Mike and Rob Matthews have all spent time with both clubs.

County fans are urged to come along on Wednesday to support the Hatters ... we don't want to be outnumbered by away fans, do we?!

With all the bar and catering facilities open in the Stockport Express Stand the club are hoping to attract the biggest gate in this season's competition.

An attendance of 1,000 is a realistic target so make sure you play your part to help Craig Madden's youngsters reach the final.

Kick off time is 7.15pm.

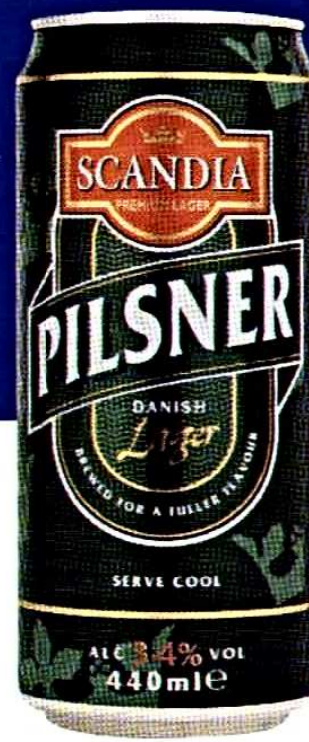

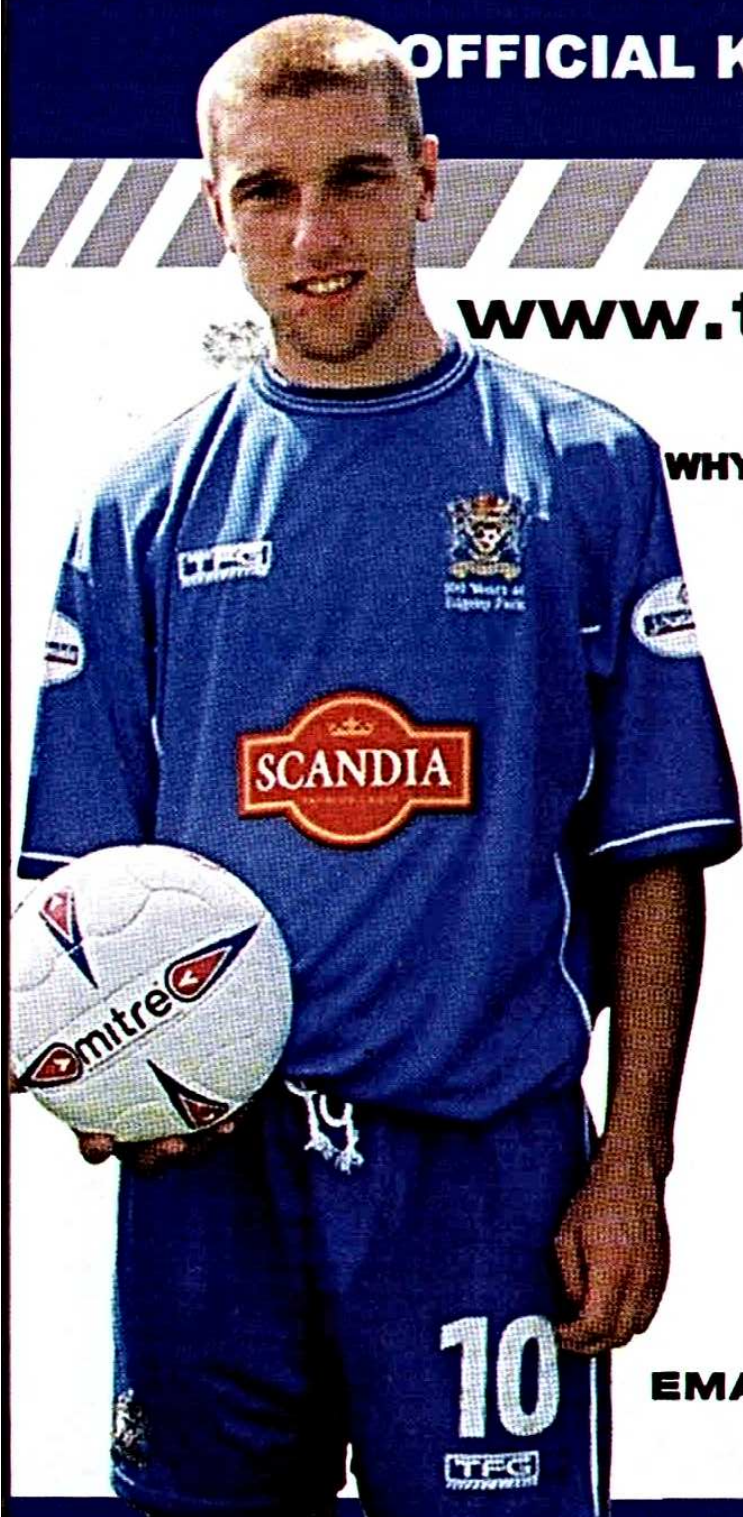

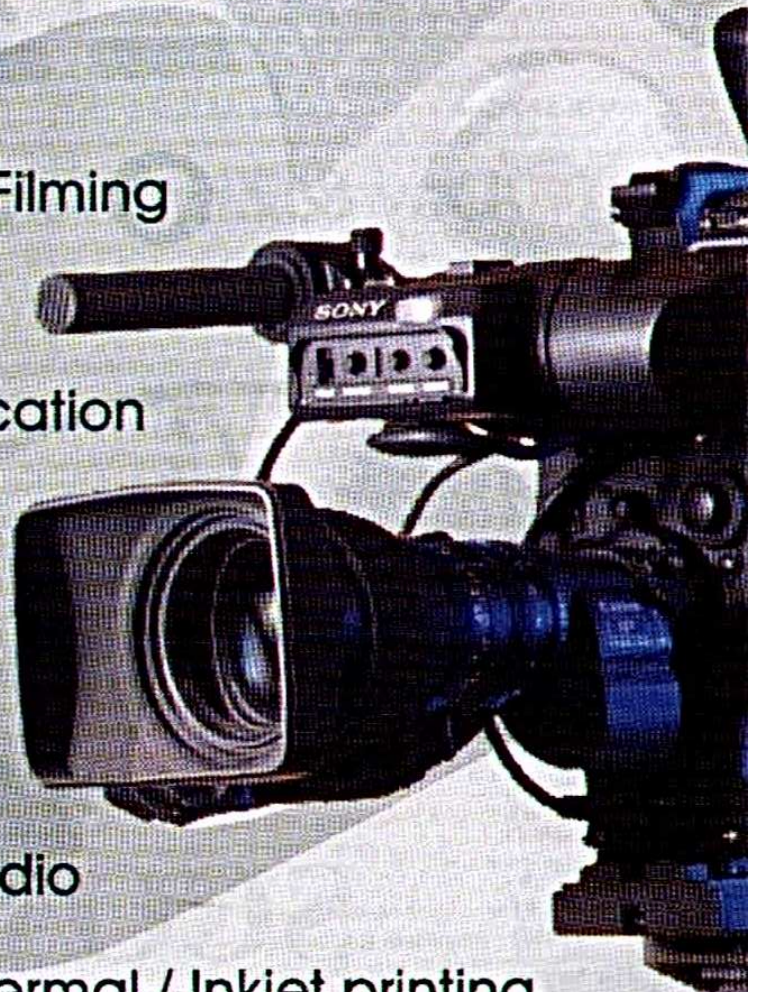

A CLOSER LOOK AT OUR VISITORS

County go into this afternoon's game unbeaten in their last nine matches against the Wiltshire club - which represents quite a turnaround in fortune.

Since the first-ever meeting between the teams in 1958 here at Edgeley Park, to the 1995-96 season, honours were fairly even with County winning four and Town three.

Our record at the County Ground over

the corresponding period, though, was X-rated. Seven games played, no points and just one goal scored!

We didn't manage to score in our eighth game in Wiltshire, either, but at least we returned home with a point from a goalless draw on the final day of the 1995-96 season when the Robins were presented with the Second Division championship trophy. The next three games, all in the First Division, saw a win and two draws, and the record was improved further back in August when a Luke Beckett goal gave us a 1-0 victory thanks, in the main, to a tremendous defensive performance and some terrific saves from Lee Jones.

Back in Stockport, a 1-1 draw in 1995, was followed by three wins at First Division level.

There's no doubt that the main threat to our unbeaten run will come from Sam Parkin. The former Chelsea striker has already scored 16 times - half of the Robins 32-goal total.

The promising forward spent the whole of last season on loan at Northampton Town from Chelsea before signing for Swindon during the summer.

Although he failed to break into the first team at Stamford Bridge he has also scored goals during loan spells with Millwall,

Wycombe

Wanderers and Oldham Athletic.

The fantastically named Danny

Invincible is likely to partner Parkin. The

Australian signed

for Town on a free transfer in August 2000 after West Ham manager Harry Redknapp had recommended him to then-Robins boss Colin Todd.

After a slow start at the County Ground he went on to finish the 2000-01 campaign as top scorer with ten goals including a 90th minute equaliser against Peterborough in the last home game of the season - a goal that some fans say kept the club in Division Two. He finished last season with eight goals, attracting interest from a whole host of clubs.

Eric Sabin also provides boss Andy King with striking options. The Paris-born hitman - who King has compared with Thierry Henry - joined Swindon in July 2001 from French Second Division club Wasquehal. His electrifying pace and ability to run at defenders with the ball causes problems for defenders and he looks a terrific acquisition.

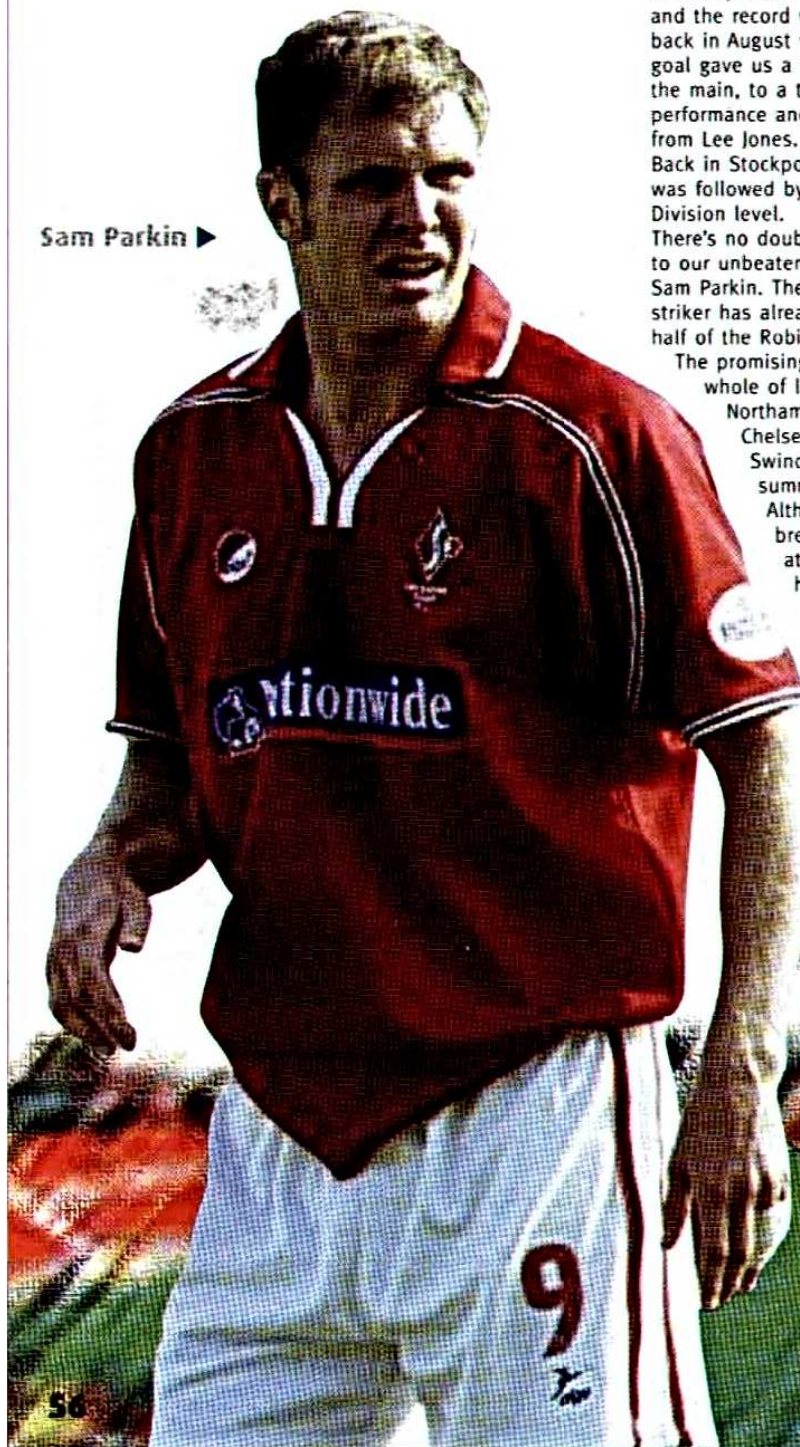
Whilst both Invincible and Sabin provide plenty of potential, a combined total of just six goals between them is a worry to King who was linked earlier in the week with a loan move for Chelsea striker Robert Wolleaston.

King started the season with an adventurous 4-3-3 formation but has, in recent weeks, reverted to a more conservative 4-4-2.

Dean Marney, a youngster on loan from Spurs, Stefani Miglioranza, Matthew Hewlett and Steve Robinson occupied the midfield places in the 3-0 victory over Chesterfield - the Robins last game.

Miglioranza is a product of the American College football system in which the best players are drafted into Major League Soccer. The midfielder played for Chicago Fire before a trial with Everton who were

interested in signing him although nothing came of it. Portsmouth then beat off competition from Liverpool to take him on trial and signed him shortly afterwards. He has impressed in the centre of Swindon's midfield since joining at the start of this season. Hewlett began his career at hometown club Bristol City where he was tipped to reach the top by the coaching staff at Ashton Gate. A catalogue of injuries, though, curtailed his flourishing career following his selection to the England Under-21 squad.

After more than 100 appearances for City he joined Swindon on a Bosman free in the summer of 2000. He played just 26 League games in his first season at the County Ground before injury struck once again. He played more regularly last season and scored his first goal for the club in their 2-0 victory at Port Vale in September 2001.

Robinson is a tough-tackling midfielder who started his career at Birmingham City. Although Barry Fry handed him a first-team debut at St. Andrew's in 1995, injury limited his Blues' appearances to 50 and, after a potential move to Sheffield United fell through on medical grounds, Swindon took him to the County Ground in February 2001 for £50,000. Since then he has become a virtual automatic choice in the starting line-up with his tireless displays and never-say-die attitude. Adam Willis, a centre-back, replaced Robinson against the Spireites. The defender started his career with Coventry City but, after he failed to make an appearance at Highfield Road, he became Steve McMahon's final signing when he took him to Swindon on a free transfer in April 1998.

He was loaned out to Mansfield Town after Jimmy Quinn told him he could leave the club but, when Colin Todd took over, he handed him a new contract. He impressed last season and scored his first League goal for the Robins in their 3-0 victory against Port Vale in March.

Willis will probably have to settle for a place on the bench again today, though. The vastly experienced Alan Reeves looks certain to partner Matthew Heywood in the middle with Andrew Gurney and David Duke providing support from the flanks. Birkenhead-born Reeves had spells with Norwich City, Gillingham, Chester City, Rochdale and Wimbledon before joining Swindon on a free transfer in June 1998. The Robins' team captain put in his usual battling performances last season although he picked up three red cards along the way. Alan, now 35 and twin brother of Chesterfield striker David Reeves, is quickly approaching the impressive landmark of 400 League appearances. Heywood started his career with Burnley but struggled to make any real impact in the Clarets' first team. He was snapped up by Swindon in January 2001 and failed to miss a game in the latter half of the season. He only missed four games last campaign and walked away with an incredible six Player of the Season awards. The tough centre back adapted to play in every position along the back line last season and even played as an emergency striker in the Robins' 2-0 defeat at Stoke City on April Fools Day.

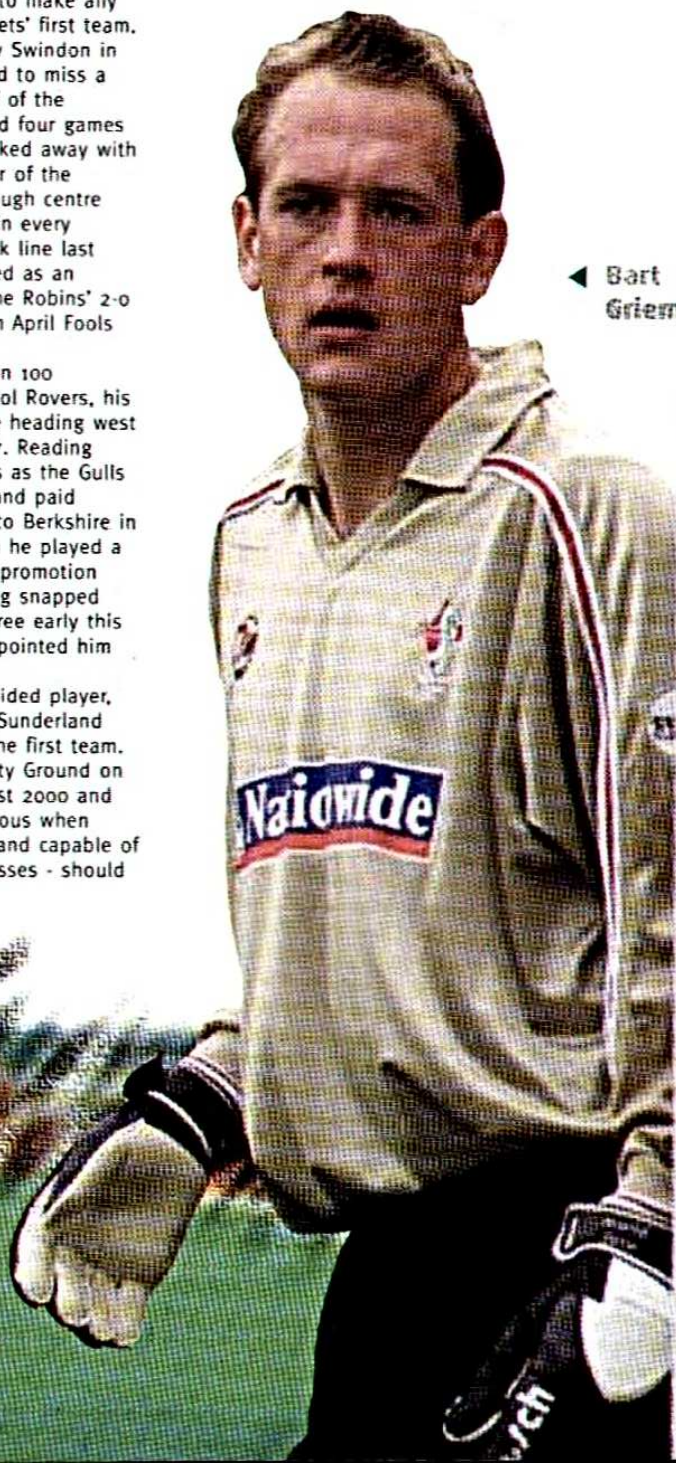
Gurney made more than 100 appearances with Bristol Rovers, his hometown club, before heading west to Torquay in July 1997. Reading monitored his progress as the Gulls reached the play-offs and paid £100,000 to take him to Berkshire in January 1999. Although he played a key role in the Royals promotion campaign last year King snapped him up on a Bosman-free early this season and quickly appointed him club captain.

Duke, a naturally left-sided player, began his career with Sunderland but never broke into the first team. He moved to the County Ground on a free transfer in August 2000 and the Scotsman - dangerous when running at opponents and capable of delivering accurate crosses - should

pass 100 League appearances for the Robins later this season.

Grongingen-born goalkeeper Bart Griemink is an ever-present this season. The former Dutch Under-21 International enjoyed a successful loan spell with Swindon before signing for them prior to the 2000-01 season. On his arrival in England he joined Barry Fry's Birmingham City and then followed the extrovert manager to Peterborough United in October 1996 where he lost his place to Mark Tyler.

He has since made the goalkeeper's jersey his own at the County Ground with some consistent performances but although the 30-year-old has improved his confidence and handling, his kicking is still somewhat questionable at times.

CHRIS LAPHAM GIVES US THE LOW-DOWN ON FOLLOWING SWINDON TOWN

How is the season going?

A bit mixed. It's much better than I expected. In previous seasons we have been battling against relegation. Andy King was not the most popular appointment as manager. Parkin is banging in the goals, which has helped a lot. The worrying thing is what happens if he is not there. Our next top scorer is defender Andy Gurney.

What is the financial state of the club?

Previous directors of the club were owed money and this left us in the lurch. The good news is that the embargo has been lifted. We are now able to sign players on loan. This has certainly helped our league position.

Do away fans turn up at the County Ground?

There are a lot of complaints about the cost of getting into the ground. Rightly so. For the cost of getting into Swindon you could get into any First Division club and even some Premiership grounds. It really is crazy money. I think Brentford are a good role model. They have got the kid for a quid scheme. Get the fans

in and encourage the future supporters of the club.

Were you glad to see the back of Neil Ruddock?

What a character. He was idolised by the young players at the club. It was a crippling contract from our point of view. We do miss the man but we had to buy out his contract, as we could not afford it. He is now a free agent. A few fans were calling for him to be the next manager

What is the must win game?

In the league this season it's Bristol City. Our traditional rivals are Oxford United. We got drawn against them in the FA Cup this season. Unfortunately we lost to them. It was made worse by the fact that it was live on television.

Best ever Swindon kit?

The away kit in the Premiership was a Brazil kit. Did it make us play like Brazil? No jokes about Alan Brazil please!

Worst Ever Kit?

Before we got promoted into the top flight we have a horrible green and white flecked kit. It made us

look as if we had been dive bombed by seagulls. I think there should also be a special mention for this season's home kit. The numbers are on the front of the shirts. This is to make it look as if we are attacking all the time (The old ones are the best!)

Who always gets a rough reception at Swindon?

Steve McMahon. There was a very sour taste for the last few months when he was in charge here. Some fans have long memories when it comes to things like that. Still, Blackpool seem to be doing OK under him.

Worst own goal?

Nicky Hammond. Well it was as good as an own goal. All the worse for being a goalkeeper. It was in our Premier League season in an FA Cup tie. The ball was passed back to him and he missed the ball completely. Check your Danny Baker videos it's in there somewhere.

Who are the real Robins: Swindon, Bristol City or Cheltenham?

There is a fourth one out there as well. Can't think who it is. Anyway we are the real Robins, make no mistake!

Chris will be here with his son Jordan today and the rest of Swindon juniors visiting the County juniors. We hope they enjoy the day.





This afternoon County look to get back to winning ways and record a double over our visitors from Wiltshire, Swindon Town. A Luke Beckett strike and a stout defensive display, with Lee Jones in inspirational form, earned County maximum points at the County

Ground on the final day of August. Furthermore, victory for the Hatters today would see us overtake our visitors who are three points above us and whose negative goal difference is currently just one goal better off.

The current campaign could hardly have started any better for Town and in particular striker Sam Parkin who netted an opening day treble as Swindon saw off Barnsley 3-1 at home. Their first away fixture saw Parkin again on the mark, his goal allied to one from Eric Sabin and a brace from Danny Invincible earned Town a 4-2 away win at Chesterfield. Their third fixture was again on the road and neither Swindon nor their hosts Blackpool could muster a goal at Bloomfield Road. The impressive start to the campaign was soon forgotten as their next six fixtures failed to muster a point. This horror run seeing home defeats at the hands of Cardiff City (0-1), County (0-1) and Port Vale (1-2), whilst they endured fruitless away days at Brentford (1-3), QPR (0-2) and Cheltenham Town (0-2). The run of defeats was brought to an end with a 2-0 success at home to Northampton Town but further defeats came away at Luton Town (0-3) and at home to Oldham Athletic (0-1).

Since early October Swindon have been picking up

points on a more consistent and regular basis. Overall, they have picked up 18 of their 31 points on home soil and boast a won 5, drawn 3, lost 5 record. Other home victories have come against Mansfield Town (2-1), Brentford (2-1) and in the last home game which saw a relatively easy 3-0 win over Chesterfield thanks to goals from Parkin, Invincible and Reeves. Since their poor sequence of results covering late August to early October, the Robins certainly have rectified their home form as only Crewe Alexandra have picked up maximum points, the Railwaymen winning 3-1, whilst only Tranmere Rovers and Peterborough United have shared the spoils with Town, both by 1-1 scorelines. On their travels Swindon visit County with a won 3, drawn 4, lost 6 record. All their away wins have been high scoring affairs since. In addition to their 4-2 win away at Chesterfield their other two wins have been by 3-2 scorelines at Wycombe Wanderers and Huddersfield Town. The draws picked up by Swindon on enemy territory have certainly been meritorious particularly their 1-1 draw at Ninian Park in their last away fixture, indeed only a late Earnshaw effort stopped Town returning to Wiltshire with all three points. The other two draws of late have also been by 1-1 scores at Notts County and Plymouth Argyle. Since early October Town have only lost two away League games and these were at the current Division Two form teams, Bristol City and Wigan Athletic - both by 2-0 margins.

In cup action Swindon have had limited success. Despite having ex-jockey Willie Carson's chairman they fell at the first hurdle in the Worthington Cup going down 2-1 at home to Wycombe Wanderers

after extra time, the regulation ninety minutes having failed to produce a goal. The LDV saw Southend thrashed 6-1 at the County Ground in the Southern Section First Round game. Extra time was again to prove the undoing of the Robins in Round Two away at Kidderminster Harriers. After 90 minutes Swindon had squandered a 2-0 lead and allowed their hosts to pull level, Kiddy scoring the decisive golden goal winner. In the FA Cup Swindon went down in a televised Second Round tie at Oxford United in a game which it would be fair to say hardly had the nation gripped to the edge of their seats. Their passage to this financially lucrative televised tie had been earned with a 1-0 First Round win away at Huddersfield Town.

A glance at the Division Two goalscoring charts shows that two of the division's leading lights meet up today. County fans will be hoping that the goal scoring prowess of Luke Beckett will prevail over Sam Parkin.

Famous Fans - The Jockey Club

There's a huge racing connection at the County Ground with Willie Carson, Jenny Pitman, John Francombe and Julian Wilson all listed as Robins fans. Swindon's most famous son (although he's really from the village of Purton just outside) is Sir Desmond Morris and he counts himself amongst the Swindon Town faithful.

Other Swindon Glitterati

Swindon can be held responsible for a number of top celebs who may or may not be your cup of tea. Blonde bombshells Diana Dors and Melinda Messenger are both from the town along with Julian Clary and pop quizmeister general Mark Lamarr. In the world of popular music recording artists, Swindon can boast the eclectic mix of Billie Piper, XTC and Gilbert O'Sullivan.

Beware! Low Bridge

Swindon is officially home to Britain's most battered bridge. Whitehouse Bridge carries the railway over a Whitehouse Road in Swindon with a mere 10ft clearance, not enough for a coach to pass under. Yet apparently numerous double decker bus drivers have tried their luck. In the 1990's alone, the bridge was hit 130 times by all manner of vehicles!! Magic Roundabout

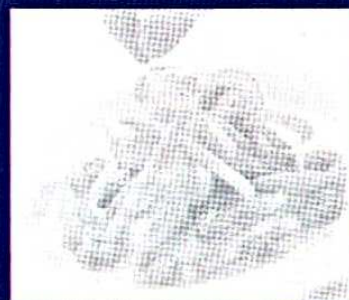
