




It's testament to the hard work of my players that we have got ourselves into a position whereby we are right behind the top half of the table. I just hope that, after four good performances in five games, that they can convince themselves that if they play to their strengths – they're a match for anyone. That has been the problem with this side ever since I joined the club, but then now is the time for them to really push on, after all they have played extremely well against four sides in the play-off positions.

With that said, we've been in a good position before and we then went on to endure a torrid run of form. Make no mistake, although we are breathing down the necks of those in the top half, we are also just seven points away from the bottom four and so relegation is always a threat. We just have to make sure that we're positive because we're capable of achieving something here.

What we have to do is not to get carried away. Yes we've played well in recent weeks but we must take one game at a time. After a winning start to the New Year the lads must ultimately be looking to win seven on the trot, whilst at the same time concentrating on the specific job in hand – they're certainly good enough to do it. Even their manager, Dave Rushbury, came up to me after the game and said how well we'd played. His exact words were that we'd murdered them and he wasn't wrong. Going forward we attacked in numbers and caused them problems with the quality of our final ball and all in all, it was a joy to watch. It just shows that on our day we can do it, we just need to do it more often!


There were some tremendous performances all over the park. Danny Invincibile worked his socks off and he was rewarded with a goal. It could have been even better for him as well, for the lad had three or four chances, but his work ethic and commitment has been tremendous. Sam's contribution to the game as a whole was excellent, as was Dean Mamey's, His contribution was tremendous and his quality on the ball was second to none. Gurney played well, as did the midfield and as for Alan Reeves, well let's just say that I'm very pleased for him. I would also like to thank Dr Nicholas, Dr Alun Davies, Mr Ivory and Mr Deo for all their help over the past few months and beyond.


Back to the business of injuries and, as has been the case for a while now, the Treatment Room has been relatively quiet in the last seven days.





In front of vocal Cardiff crowd, Town kicked off their fourth game out of five in a fortnight with Robinson sending the ball straight into touch to put Cardiff under pressure early on. Cardiff won their first corner on three minutes but Town cleared without Griemink's goal being threatened. Town struggled to find their own players early on with passing made difficult by a soggy pitch. Both teams suffered with stray passing early on and Danny Invincibile almost capitalised on an error from the Cardiff keeper Alexander, only to see Alexander make up for his slip to clear the danger. On 17 minutes the referee awarded Town a free kick right on the edge of the box. Zhiyi was adjudged to have fouled Invincibile and this presented Town with a great chance. Town Captain Andy Gurney stepped up and put his clever shot inches wide of the post and into the side netting. As the game continued the rain began to descend on Ninian Park to add to the already increasingly difficult conditions. Town won their first corner on 29 minutes with Invincibile doing well. Loan player Dean Marney took the corner but City cleared the danger as Town looked to open the scoring.

Twenty-three goal striker Robert Earnshaw showed a glimpse of his talent on the half hour as he jinked past two Town defenders. However he slipped over as he attempted his shot and sent the ball over the bar and into the crowd behind the Dutchman's goal. On 34 minutes a move involving Marney and Parkin allowed Duke some space on the left hand side. The Scot cut inside onto his right foot and unleashed a powerful shot that fizzed wide of Alexander in the Cardiff goal. On 38 minutes Thorne held the ball up well and laid it off to Jason Bowen on the left hand side. Bowen's cross found Earnshaw whose looping header beat Griemink. Fortunately Matt Heywood got back to clear the ball off the line as the Cardiff fans almost saw their side take the lead. A follow up snapshot from 33-year old Fan Zhiyi did not trouble the score line as the referee blew for half time.

On 57 minutes a ball from Kavanagh found Peter Thorne who hit a shot straight at Griemink, the Dutchman punching the ball out well as the home side began to stamp their authority on the game. Two minutes later Danny Invincibile won a corner thanks to a good covering tackle from Weston. Marney played the ball over into the box and both Heywood and Invincibile had shots blocked, as the ball seemed destined to trouble Alexander in the Cardiff goal. A minute later a low drive from Duke was well held by the City keeper Alexander.


On the hour Invincibile won another Town corner taken by Marney. The ball found Hewlett whose shot deflected out for another corner, which was cleared. With the game certainly more lively in the second period, Town were having the better of the second half possession. The Cardiff Manager Lennie Lawrence sensed his sides need for the win and replaced midfielder Bowen with the aerial presence of Leo Fortune-West. This left Cardiff with three up front. On 69 minutes a terrific half volley from Dean Marney brought a great save from Neil Alexander.

The subsequent corner from Miglioranzi found Super Sam Parkin who put Town into a deserved lead at the near post. Minutes after the goal Town Manager Andy King replaced Danny Invincibile with Eric Sabin to inject some fresh legs into the Town frontline and the Frenchman had a chance to put Town 2-0 up following up a great ball through the middle from Parkin. Having turned well, Sabin could only shoot straight at Neil Alexander.

Town were looking good for their lead but with moments remaining, the home side laid siege on Griemink's goal. The pressure soon told and in the 89th minute, a free-kick from Kavanagh was driven into the back of the net by Robert Earnshaw from just a yard out as the final whistle approached to level the scores.

At times sublime, others majestic – Town were simply superb last Saturday. With Reeves in fine form, Marney dangerous on the wing, Miglioranzi orchestrating the middle and Invincibile in devastating mood – Chesterfield had no answer as Town threatened to run riot.

In the end the 4,544-strong crowd had to settle for three, but it could have been so many more and on the whole – it's been a good period of form for Town. King fielded an unchanged side for the visit of Chesterfield and with a deserved draw against Cardiff behind them – Town looked to build on what was a decent festive period.

However, both sides seemed to be suffering from a New Year hangover in the opening exchanges: Duke, Miglioranzi and Hewlett all seeing speculative shots go wide of Chesterfield's goal and into the packed and vociferous Town End. However, as the first half progressed Town began to exert their authority on the game with prolonged spells of possession.

On 14 minutes Stefani Miglioranzi came close from 30 yards out before Duke shot over again from closer range soon after. On 21 minutes, after good work from Invincibile, Heywood seized a loose ball and fired a shot straight at the Spirerites' defence. Four minutes later and Miglioranzi came close once again, the New Yorkan shooting straight at the Spireites' defence from long range.

Town kept up the pressure and for long periods, played some attractive football in the visitors' half; the Chesterfield defence struggling to clear their line on numerous occasions. However, it looked as though it could have been one of those afternoons with Town seemingly unable to put the ball in the back of the net.

Thankfully on the half-hour mark Town made the crucial breakthrough. Invincibile, in fine form, broke forward once again and supplied Dean Marney who's cross was deflected to Robinson on the edge of the area. Robinson sent a deep cross to Duke who headed back across the face of goal for Parkin to nonchalantly kick the ball over his head for his 17th of the season. A minute later and Reeves, inspirational at the back against his brother (and who was boosted by

some fantastic support from all corners of the ground), headed just wide on the first of three occasions following a Town corner. Chesterfield rarely threatened (and to be honest looked very poor), but on 41 minutes they made a rare foray into Town's box and Hurst headed over from a cross from the right hand side before the referee signalled the end of the half.

Town started the second half as they'd finished the first and on 52 minutes Town had made it 2-0, Invincibile grabbing a deserved goal. Danny latched on to a superb through-ball and, with the keeper advancing; the Australian slotted the ball underneath his body. Five minutes later and Danny could have made it three. A defence-splitting pass from Hewlett found Robinson on the right and his low cross was met by Invincibile. Unfortunately, from close range, Invincibile could only send his shot straight at the keeper's legs.

Marney then edged forward with a clever mazy run before Gurney sent a trademark free kick inches wide of the Chesterfield goal. On 72 minutes Invincibile missed from four yards again. Duke's cross found Parkin unmarked in the box and his flick found Danny who, from close range, volleyed the ball against the keeper's legs. At the other Reeves, having uncharacteristically given the ball away, blocked Hurst's shot from eight yards. It got better for Reeves moments later when his brother was substituted, much to the delight of the Town End once again.

On 80 minutes came a piece of brilliance from Invincibile. The Australian controlled a long ball on his head before racing away from his marker. Two touches on and with just the keeper to beat, Invincibile fired a powerful shot straight at the keeper who turned the ball away for a corner. Six minutes later and Parkin found himself through on goal. Having beaten one man Parkin nudged a shot towards goal only for the keeper to turn the ball round the near post.

The icing on the cake came on 87 minutes and no one deserved the third goal more than Reeves. From a Town corner Reeves was on hand to head home at the far post and the former Wimbledon defender raced towards the Nationwide Stand in delight.



IT'S BEEN A FRUSTRATING PERIOD FOR TOWN'S SECOND STRING AND AFTER A NUMBER OF POSTPONEMENTS TOWARDS THE BACK END OF LAST YEAR, 2003 STARTED WITH ANOTHER CANCELLATION.

Unfortunately for Malcolm Crosby and his reserve side, the pitch fell foul to the freezing conditions. As a result Town will be hoping to continue their campaign at home to Cardiff next Tuesday at 2.00pm, but with nothing to report this week we thought we'd take a look at the season so far.

After last year's bottom place finish in the Avon Insurance Combination League it's been a season of success so far. In fact, Town have been top of the league on more than one occasion and to date, 'Crozzer's' side have lost just four times. Town began the season with a four-game unbeaten run. A comfortable 3-0 away win against Wycombe was followed by another victory against Millwall at home – Andy Gurney bagging the winner upon his return to action. A 1-1 draw with Cambridge followed before Town registered their third win of the season against Peterborough – Dykes, Young and Draycott registering on the score sheet in a 3-2 win.

Town's first defeat came in emphatic fashion when a rampant Luton side won 4-0 here at the County Ground and Brighton made it two defeats in two a week later when they emerged 2-0 victors. However, Edds and Herring were on hand to return Town to winning ways against local rivals, Bristol Rovers before an impressive Norwich side turned us over by the odd goal.

Since then it's been a fairly inconsistent run for the reserves, with a draw against Reading (Young the goalscorer) preceding a 3-2 victory against Barnet (Young and Draycott scoring again) and a 4-0 reverse against Plymouth.

Which takes us up to the present day and next Tuesday's encounter with Cardiff City. It looks set to be another tough game for Town, but Malcolm Crosby is confident that Town's young stars are capable of obtaining three points. He said, "It's been a good season so far — the young lads have stepped up a level and have been tremendous. Obviously ours is not the biggest squad and so many of the youth lads have found themselves in the reserve side, which is great for them and the club. If they can continue in a similar vein this year then there's no reason why we can't go on and build on what has been a good start to the season."

BLACKPOOL

This season marks 25 years outside the top two divisions for a club rich in heritage and laden with honours from a bygone age.

And yet the signs are now there that a return to a better quality of football life may not be beyond their reach. The Tangerines can now boast a revamped stadium, a young, former international player in the managerial hot seat (who we all know quite well) and, most importantly of all, a decent team which could yet challenge for promotion this season including loan star and Scottish international, Colin Hendry.

Steve McMahon has moulded a unit which has become not only difficult to beat (our 0-0 draw earlier in the season testament to that), but also one capable of pushing those in the top half of the table – Pool currently just four points off the play-offs.


Blackpool's fortuitous league position owes largely to their early league form in which they went seven games without defeat after a 2-0 opening day loss against Bristol City. A win against early pre-season favourites Luton was followed by more victories against Northampton, Tranmere and Wycombe and it wasn't until the 17th of September that Barnsley ended the Tangerines' run with a 2-1 reverse at Oakwell.

The success so far this year follows one of mid-table consolidation last time around in which the Tangerines finished 15th. Last season followed McMahon's sides' promotion from Division Three a year earlier in which a play-off victory at Cardiff against Leyton Orient saw them climb out of the bottom rung.

The result at Cardiff went some way to erasing memories of the 1995/96 season in which Blackpool blew promotion to Division One. Having spent almost the entire season in the top two, they fell away at the death and then after winning the first leg of the play-off semi-final 2-0 at Bradford, lost the return leg 3-0 at home. Four seasons later they were relegated and dropped down to the Third Division for the first time in eight seasons, only to bounce back at the first attempt thanks to that Cardiff triumph.

That near miss in 1996 prevented Blackpool from playing in the second tier of English football for the first time since 1978. Relegation that year saw them drop out of the top two divisions for the first time in their 90-year history - a remarkable statistic, particularly for younger fans who have subsequently grown up on a diet of Tangerine underachievement.

However, such is the club's current state that it can now realistically dream of a return back to the day in which it proudly sat in the top division. Preston and Burnley are great examples of what can be what achieved – Blackpool are certainly heading in the right direction.

Steve was appointed manager on January 7 2000 to replace Nigel Worthington who had resigned just before Christmas 1999. Steve gained managerial experience with Swindon Town and in his four years here he won the Second Division Championship title. He ended his time at Swindon in September 1999 and worked with the media until being appointed by Blackpool.

As a player he will be remembered for his very competitive attitude in midfield where he made over 600 appearances for Everton, Aston Villa, Liverpool, Manchester City and Swindon Town. Added to these he picked up 17 appearances for England during an illustrious career in top-flight English soccer.

In February 2001 he pledged his future to the club by signing a two-year extension to his contract and now looks to continue his rebuilding programme with success in Division Two.

PHIL BARNES

Now the club's number one 'keeper who continued to improve last season and has signed an extension to his contract until 2004. Blackpool paid Rotherham United £100,000 for his services in 1997. At the end of the 2001/02 season he had made 99 appearances for the club.

CHRIS CLARKE

A very promising young central defender who signed from Halifax Town for £100,000 on a contract until June 2004. He was born in Leeds and was a trainee at Wolverhampton Wanderers. He is a tall, powerful player who reads the game well. His twin brother Mathew still plays for Halifax Town.




The much travelled ex-Scotland captain joined the Seasiders on loan from Bolton just before Christmas, his presence and experience are already proving to be vital in the Seasiders push for the play-offs.

LEAM RICHARDSON

The talented full-back arrived along with Colin Hendry on a month's loan from Bolton. Having impressed the manager in his first three games, his loan move to the Seasiders was extended for the season. Tough tackling Leam last season was on loan at Notts County where he was instrumental in their relegation fight.

SIMON GRAYSON


Simon became Steve McMahon's first pre-season signing ahead of the 2002/03 campaign. Aged 33, Simon is a vastly experienced player who can play in either defence or midfield. Simon was released by Blackburn at the end of last season having spent most of last term out on loan at Notts. County and Bradford.



Young defender/midfielder from Liverpool who, having broke into the side in 1999/00, has held down a place ever since. He is a product of the club's successful youth policy. Danny likes to get forward at every opportunity and possesses a powerful shot. To date he has made 105 full and 14 substitute appearances with five goals.

JOHN HILLS

Left sided defender/midfielder who started as a YTS at Blackpool before being transferred to Everton before making a first team appearance. He returned to Blackpool in February 1998 when he had failed to hold down a place with the Premiership outfit. He is a local lad who played his youth football for the YMCA club. He is a real crowd pleaser who always gives 100% and had his best season to



date in 2001/02.

IAN HUGHES

lan signed from Bury in the deal that took Tony Ellis in the opposite direction in December 1997. This former Welsh U-21 International has settled into a central defensive role after initially being employed as a midfielder. He has signed a contract keeping him at the club until June 2003.

JOHN MURPHY

Big striker signed from Chester City for an initial £50,000 fee on the eve of the 1999/00 season. He has blossomed to become a very important part of the side. Was the subject of transfer talk linking him with other clubs including former manager Nigel Worthington at Norwich City before finally putting pen to paper and signing a new contract keeping him at the club until June 2004.

BEN THORNLEY

Ben became Steve McMahon's first signing of 2003. The former Huddersfield and Manchester United winger joined the Seasiders from Aberdeen when the transfer window re-opened on January 1. The former England Under 21 can operate down either flank and is sure to add the quality of the 'Pool squad.

KEITH SOUTHERN

Keith has also joined the club from Everton on a month's loan. Southern (21) last season captained The Toffee's second string. The skilful, battling midfielder has impressed manager Steve McMahon with both his ability and tremendous work rate and has slotted well into the midfield.

RICHARD WALKER

Striker who signed for an initial fee of £50,000 from Aston Villa on December 20 2001 on a contract to

the end of the 2003/04 season. He had previously been at the club on three-month loan during the back end of the Third Division promotion season in 2000/01. He endeared himself to Blackpool fans with a last minute wonder header against Plymouth Argyle at Bloomfield Road.

RICHARD WELLENS

Young tigerish midfielder signed from Manchester United in March 2000 who has settled well into the side. Made some impressive performances and has cemented a central midfield roll but could benefit from scoring a few more goals.






Born a scouser in 1961, Steve McMahon was one of those brave, perhaps foolhardy players who chose to play for both the blue and red teams of Merseyside. Starting his career with Everton where he had been an apprentice, Macca played 100 League games before moving to the Midlands on May 20 1983 in return for £175,000. Aston Villa had taken the League Championship as recently as 1981 and added the European Cup the following year but the club were on the descent at a time when Merseyside in general was in the ascendancy. With seven consecutive eighties Championships ending up at either Everton or Liverpool McMahon may have regretted his move south, and after 75 League appearances at Villa Park he completed the round trip by joining Liverpool in September 1985.

Villa collected a return of £375,000 from the deal and McMahon accepted the opportunity to establish himself as a medal winner and an England international. Grabbing Championship medals in 1986, 88 and 90, and FA Cup winner's medals in 1986 and 89. Steve became recognised as a fearless and feared midfielder. Rewarded for his endeavour with a total of 17 England caps, Steve travelled to Italy to partake in the World Cup of 1990. Boxing Day 1991 brought a move to Manchester City where he took to the field in excess of 80 occasions including both Premiership games against Swindon in 1993/94.

The departure of John Gorman as Town manager heralded the search for a replacement and McMahon was recruited to the County Ground on December 1 1994, a deal which cost Town £100,00 for the playing registration of their new player/manager. While immediate relegation to Division Two was not avoided Town were led to the divisional championship the following season, nine points clear of rivals and second placed Oxford United. Blackpool finished third but the last promotional place eventually went to Bradford City through the play-offs. Joining Third Division Blackpool in January 2000 where he replaced Nigel Worthington, McMahon took the club to promotion via the play-offs just four months later. Steve is remembered at Swindon for a variety of reasons not least his self fulfilling prophecy that Town would pick up more red and yellow cards under his leadership.

Granted, he's not been here long — however his strike rate is such that he earned enough votes to make it into the top ten. 'Super' Sam has been a revelation since he joined the club in July earlier in the year and, on average, has scored 0.5 goals per game. You can argue which is his best so far, but I'd argue, purely for contextual reasons that his second against Wycombe was the most important. And his debut hat-trick wasn't bad either....



PETER NOBLE

APPS 246 GOALS 80

Peter Noble arrived on the soccer scene with Newcastle United in 1964. Seven goals in 22 matches forced Danny Williams to part with £8,000 for his services. And what services they were too, with 0.3 goals per game Noble proved to be a fantastic buy for the club. Even on his debut, when he started the game as

substitute (against Bury) he bagged two goals and in the following season – he played a vital role in Town's League Cup run and promotion campaign.



MAURICE OWEN APPS 601 GOALS 166


Like Parkin, Owen is another to have bagged a hat-trick on his debut as Town crushed Watford 5-0 at the County Ground. His early success with the club continued and in his first 17 games he scored no less than 16 goals including four in one match against Mansfield. His form attracted the attention of other clubs and after a bid of £6,000 was turned down, Town finally decided to let him go to Norwich for £14,000, but the deal fell through because he wanted to stay in the area.



HAROLD FLEMING APPS 299 GOALS 161205

Described as a 'great footballer and a gentleman' – Harold Fleming is a true







legend and played for Town for 17 years. He was also capped nine times

by England and when he first started playing for Town, he trekked for 30

miles from Andover to play. Harold enjoyed numerous success, but arguably the pinnacle of his career was a hat-trick for England against Ireland in 1912. Had it not been for the First World War he would have probably scored more too.



PETER EASTOE

APPS 108 GOALS 50

Peter Eastoe is probably best described by one Town fan who, when voting for the prolific marksman, explained, "Peter Eastoe was my childhood hero and he is the one who sticks in my mind for banging in the goals with the pitch in any condition. In those days Swindon's pitch was a mud bath in the winter. Yet it didn't seem to affect him." Eastoe first joined Town on loan from Wolves in 1973 and on his home debut, despite Town going two down in ten minutes, he scored twice to earn a dramatic point.

APPS 312 GOALS 107


Steve 'Chalkie' White will, forever be many people's favourite, not surprising with an average of a goal every three games. 'Chalkie' was one of football's happy wanderers and he played for a whole host of clubs including Hereford and Bristol Rovers.

His first season with Town saw him top the goal charts with 21 goals including a hat-trick against Mansfield and a goal in the play-off decider that saw Town go up from Division Two. He also earned the penalty that saw Bodin score the winner against Leicester at Wembley.



DON ROGERS APPS 489 GOALS 179

In joint third place is arguably one of Town's most famous names from the past, Don Rogers. Don was born is Paulton, Somerset in October 1945. In 1966/67 Rogers was top scorer with 24 goals, whilst in the cup he added a further seven in a cup run that took Town to the Fifth Round. In 1969/70 Rogers was so feared throughout the game that when Town faced Leeds in the Quarter Finals of the FA Cup, Don Revie changed his sides' line-up to cope with him. His greatest hour came in the League Cup Final of 1969 against Arsenal when, famously, he bagged all three goals in the 3-1 win.


JAN AAGE FJORTOFT APPS 87 GOALS 39

Admittedly more my era - Jan Aage Fjortoft is a personal favourite having signed from Rapid Vienna for £500,000 in 1993. With 41 caps for Norway he seemed like the sort of signing that could keep us in the Premiership, however he failed to net in his opening appearances. In season 1994/95 'Jan the Man' netted 25 goals, many of which came in the Coca Cola Cup run that saw us get to the semi-finals against Bolton Wanderers. Unfortunately he was sold to Middlesborough after just 87 appearances, yet in that time he had done (with his signature celebration), enough to endear himself to the County Ground faithful.



DUNCAN SHEARER APPS 199 GOALS 98

Shearer was signed from Hudderfsield Town for a then record of £250,000 by Lou Macari and in



nearly 200 appearances he bagged 98 goals. Duncan, like Jan struggled in his first few games and failed to score. However, despite this he still bagged 14 goals in his first year. He was influential in the Sunderland victory at Wembley and in the following season, bagged four goals in one game as Town demolished

Plymouth. Despite being sold in the same season he had done enough to end the campaign as Town's top scorer — an accolade that was to be his fourth in a row. He currently sits eighth in Town's list of leading scorers — but he did enough to convince those that voted to make him top of the pile.


HOLLOWAY AIMS TO KEEP DUO

Dave Mackay's first match in charge of the Town was at Blackpool in 1971. Town went down 4-1 and our scorer on that day was Don Rogers. He had scored twice in the corresponding fixture the previous year and both his goals were penalties. Unfortunately they were not enough to stop Town going down by three goals to two.

Today's featured match took place towards the end of the 1969/70 season. It had been a great season for Swindon as they had reached the Sixth Round of the F.A. Cup and if they could beat Blackpool, would be in with a real chance of winning promotion for the second season in a row (and featuring in the First division for the first time in their history). Blackpool were formidable opposition having taken 21 points out of a possible 36 on their travels and were three points ahead of Town in the table. They had the former England international Jimmy Armfield as their captain and other big name stars such as Fred Pickering and Tommy Hutchinson. Goalkeeper Peter Downsborough had recovered from an injury sustained in Town's previous match at Milwall and so Swindon were at full strength. The Robins had a dream start. Less than five minutes had been played when a snap shot by Joe Butler was spilled by Harry Thompson - the Seasiders goalkeeper. Arthur Horsfield seized on the loose ball to give Town

the lead. Town might have increased their lead when a fierce shot by Don Rogers was kept out by a fine save from Thompson. After 35 minutes Blackpool drew level - a lobbed pass by Alan Suddick over the Town defence led to a race between Micky Burns and Downsborough which the former just won nodding the ball over the keeper into the vacant net.

The second half saw Thomson in the Blackpool goal pull out a string of fine saves, perhaps the best of them coming in the 56th minute when Stan Harland ran on to Peter Noble's path, only for Thompson to advance from goal to block his shot. The crucial moment of the match and indeed Swindon's season came after. Welsh rugby followers often complain about Irish referees, but after this game it was Welsh ones which tended to raise the wrath of Swindon fans as it was Mr Reynolds of Swansea who denied Town an all important goal. A comer was taken by Don Rogers, and met by Arthur Horsfield. "The King of the all", as he was dubbed by the Town End. Town's joy was short fived however as the referee signalled for a free kick despite the protests of the Town players that the linesman had not flagged for any infringement. Rogers was honest enough to admit that from where he was standing (which was near the referee), it did look as though the Blackpool

goalkeeper had been impeded, but Harland, the Town captain, Fred ford the manager and most of the crowd could see nothing wrong. It may have been a classic example of depending on which angle you view an incident from as Mr Reynolds was standing at a similar angle to the incident to Rogers. The 1-1 result meant Blackpool were still three points clear with just two games to play and they duly went on to clinch promotion behind champions Huddersfield while Swindon finished in their highest ever League position at that time of fifth.




"Bowyer's gone to West Ham!" was screamed into my 'shell-like' office at a full 5,000 decibels! The laughter that followed came from practically all of those sat around me. Surely this was some sort of wind up I thought? But no! In fact I'll be poked with a pitchfork! Further investigation proved that, subject to agreeing personal terms, not a truer word could be said! I am surprised to say the least. What does this say about Lee Bowyer and his career? Is the move (A) a huge signal that, despite their woeful Premiership form, West Ham and Glen Roeder's credentials still attract such England hopefuls as Bowyer (don't forget the David James signing)? Or (B) a signal that Bowyer has all but dropped off the shopping lists of not just the top five or six clubs in England but practically all of the Premiership elite? The South Londoner has after all spent a substantial part of the last three seasons ably filling the role of the contract rebel, no stranger to controversy off the pitch. Some sections of the media suggest that the fact Sven Goran Eriksson has yet to recall him to the England squad despite his encouraging debut against Portugal is at very least a further source

for debate. Either way, the deal could see Bowyer sign for the Hammers until the end of this current season, lifting the burden of his reported £30,000-a-week salary from Terry Venables restricted transfer coffers (which will be boosted further by the news Olivier Dacourt has agreed terms to move to Roma). Due to publishing deadlines whether Bowver actually signs on the dotted line at West Ham I have yet to see. I'm certainly shocked enough to not be committing either way. I have after all spent the few months reading that an end of season move to Tottenham was all but a done deal and having seen a similar move to Liverpool fall through after a last minute change of mind by Gerard Houllier. Speaking of controversial transfer dealings involving Merseyside clubs, Everton moved quickly this week to reject claims from Spanish giants Real Madrid that they are looking to negotiate first option on the transfer of teenage sensation Wayne Rooney. Reports from Spain suggest that Real entered into talks with Everton's directors offering a base minimum transfer fee of £20m when the Toffees decide to sell. Rooney is yet to sign his first pro contract that would cement his position in

the Everton ranks. However, lan Ross Everton's head of corporate affairs and PR
- states "Stories which surfaced over the
weekend suggesting that the Everton
board of directors had entered into
negotiations with Real Madrid about a
future deal involving Wayne Rooney are
inaccurate and spurious.

The midfield maestro that has inspired Swiss club FC Basle's meteoric rise to prominence in this season's Champions League could soon be winging his way to the UK. Former Celtic ace Tosh McKinley, who is himself working as a consultant to Yakin, has suggested that the player could be plying his trade on these shores before this month's transfer window closes. Speaking to the BBC, McKinley stated, "Celtic are interested in Yakin but there has been no official move for him. I've been talking to the general manager at Basle and there are a couple of clubs sniffing around but no concrete bids as yet. I'm working with Yakin's brother and agent, Ertan, on this and I'm pretty sure he won't be at Basle at the end of this month. Yakin is currently rated in the £3-4 million pound bracket. Having failed in a £10 million

pound bid for Leeds centre-back Jonathon Woodgate, Newcastle boss Bobby Robson has turned his attention to highly rated Belgian international defender Daniel van Buyton. However, the 24-year-old's representative, whilst admitting his client might be tempted by a move to St James', believes the French outfit would prevent a move, despite the £8m figure being suggested. "I have talked to Sir Bobby Robson in the past but my son spoke to Newcastle just a few days ago about Daniel and they now seem very interested," said Henrotay. "But I don't think Marseille want to sell him. "They want to keep him because they need him. At the moment they are leading the French league and qualifying for the Champions League would be so valuable for them. "I have spoken to Daniel and he said Newcastle are a good club and an interesting proposition," added the agent. "But the problem is that he has three years on his contract so Marseille are in charge of the situation." OK, I suppose it should get a token mention although seeing as I (like you I'm sure) could not give two hoots about the FA Cup anymore (ahem!). I was oblivious to the goings-on of FA Cup Round 3 day honest! Yes, I did not give Nationwide Conference Farnborough Town a second thought as they knocked Darlington out in a 3-2 thriller. Likewise, as former Swindon Town player of the season George Ndah inspired his Wolves colleagues to a 3-2 win over Bobby Robson's Newcastle I did not bat an eyelid - could not give a monkeys. CLASSIC DERBIES



The derby between Al-Ahly and Zamelek takes place between the dusty streets and muddy river banks of Cairo, a city renowned in Europe for things entirely separate to football.

Home to the pyramids, the sphinx and the river Nile that sprawls its way through the heart of Egypt, Cairo is known as the polluted, congested and crowded capital of Egypt, a country with a history that stems way, way back, a long way further than football. Although in Europe there is a distinct lack of awareness of the two clubs Al-Ahly and Zamelek, in Africa the situation is entirely different. It is without doubt the most intense rivalry in any

professional or semi-professional league in Africa, and home to possibly the most passionate fans and network of supporters. There is a deep interest and severe history in any encounter between the two teams and on match-day entire cities have been known to shut down, both in and out of Cairo.

The rivalry has been known to be as fierce and violent as many witnessed in Europe. Security precautions are planned weeks before the game, roads are blocked, shops are closed and certain sections of the city are designated either Ahly or Zamelek. The games themselves are played away from the stadiums

belonging to the two clubs and performed within the overbearing walls of the Cairo Stadium, a stadium with a capacity of 120,000, enough to satisfy the huge demand for tickets to the games. Needless to say that inside the stadium, the supporters themselves are segregated, Ahly fans on one side, Zamelek fans on the other.

The games between these two teams are monumental in the carnivalesque approach to them. The matches are generally played on Friday, the official day-off in Egypt and the day is pretty much dedicated to the two teams. The stadium gates are opened in the early

hours of the morning, allowing the merry supporters to slowly make their way into the stadium. Inside and outside the stadium, the fans begin to congregate and the carnival atmosphere begins: Men shout, sing, dance, drink and eat, even indulging in their own musical renditions of the teams song, all played out on Oriental instruments.

The history between the two teams is neither impressive nor exceptional. Al-Ahly (the recent winners of the CAF Century Club trophy, given to the greatest football team of the century) have reigned supreme, having won 29 league titles and 32 Cups. Zamelek on the other

hand have won just nine league titles and 31 Cups. Although the history between them is nothing exceptional, it is important to note that it is specifically a history of animosity. Al-Ahly's recent selection as African Club of the Century for example provoked more enmity and anger than mutual appreciation. Zamelek accused the CAF of being biased, a term that is particularly loaded when we look at the current political situation in Egypt. As each club boasts a number of high-ranking government officials as supporters who are regularly seen as 'promoters' of the club the corruption within the Egyptian government explains the accusation

made by Zamelek against the CAF.
Despite the political and cultural elements behind the running of the teams, the important thing about these two teams and the rivalry between them is the prestige attached to it by so many African fans of football. To them it is the one game in Africa that competes with the derbies of Europe and South America.


It is the game that allows them to believe that they are in a country in which tootball is financed and backed by the government and is treated as the important and meaningful thing that they believe it to be. A stick of partly scrunched rock sits on a shelf in my kitchen to serve as a reminder of our visit to Bloomfield Road in August.

Actually, it was a present for my girlfriend. Being an Australian she was curious about rock and was most insistent that I bring some back with me. She then adopted the post-rock tradition of chucking the thing into a corner having taken one bite and discovering that there are less painful ways of losing your teeth! Anyway, enough of the sweet stuff and on to the business at hand. The Seasiders arrive in town handily placed in the Second Division and if previous encounters are anything to go by, it should be a tight affair. Steve Robinson came agonisingly close to scoring a rare goal up at Bloomfield Road, only to be denied by the crossbar, And I also recall Blackpool coming close to a late winner on that glorious summer afternoon.

But this fixture means only one thing to supporters - Steve McMahon. Now the Scouser's tenure here was before my time but it is quite clear he has left a lasting impression. A mere mention of his name in the office this week sparked a furious debate. Anyway, it is points that matter today and victory would see us close the gap on Blackpool and bring the top half of the table a little closer.

Whatever the views about McMahon's time in Wiltshire, he has certainly assembled a competitive squad at Bloomfield Road, and one that cannot be taken lightly.

Confidence should be high following the impressive 3-0 win over Chesterfield last week. Super Sammy made it 17 for the season (to celebrate his PFA award), Danny ended his goal drought and 'Reevesy' opened his account for the season. It was great to see and hear him finally getting some support. He has had to put up with some dreadful stick this season. He seemed to be getting the blame for everything. Lottery numbers didn't come up or your horse didn't win? Blame 'Reevesy' it seemed.



TODAY'S MASCOTS







On January 7 1978 Town faced Nottingham Forest in the Third Round of the FA Cup. Forest were sitting top of the old First Division and were to win both the Championship and the League Cup that year.

Their team comprised of a host of star names including Peter Shilton, Viv Anderson and Tony Woodcock. Defender Russell Lewis was called into the squad the day before the match and strangely replaced Chris Guthrie as a striker after 53 minutes. David Moss scored for Town after 85 minutes but two goals from Woodcock and further strikes from Withe and Robertson had already inflicted defeat on Swindon.

On January 14, Swindon travelled north to Sheffield to take on Wednesday, then languishing bottom of Division Three. Managed by Jack Charlton the home team were on the end of two penalties, both tucked away by Ray McHale who had also successfully converted from the spot in the previous League match against Tranmere. With Wednesday scoring a penalty of their own through Rushbury and another strike from Mullen, Town returned to Wiltshire with a point.

THE NAKED CHEF

With Christmas out of the way it's time to burn all the extra food you've eaten and this week – a healthy pasta option!

NO. 15 TURBO'S TAGLIATELLE

- 1. You'll need 15 oz Tagliatelle, 3 oz Butter, 2 Egg yolks, 2 T Parmesan, grated, 6 T Double cream, 4 oz Bacon (chopped), Salt, Pepper, freshly-milled
- 2 Bring a large saucepan of water to the boil, add some salt and a few drops of oil and cook the tagliatelle for 8 minutes.
- Meanwhile, melt about 1 oz of butter in a small pan and cook the chopped bacon for 3-4 minutes.
- Let Beat the egg yolks together with the remainder of the butter, the Parmesan cheese, the cream and some freshly-milled black pepper. Drain the tagliatelle and put it back in the pan quickly so as not to lose heat.
- Add the bacon and its juices to the pasta, pour in the egg and cream mixture and toss well (If you've done this quickly enough, the heat from the pasta will cook the egg yolks to a creamy sauce).
- Season with salt and pepper if desired, then serve with more Parmesan. Serve accompanied with green vegetables such as courgettes [zucchini] or leeks, or with a green salad.


