It was a fantastic performance and an incredible atmosphere, certainly one of the best since I've been here and to be honest – everyone deserved it, it was just a great Club effort. The lads were tremendous, played with great spirit and were well worthy of the victory. And the fans as well, despite QPR bringing nearly 3,000, rose to the occasion and made for a superb spectacle – The County Ground was absolutely buzzing. I'm sure that with Cheltenham's visit tonight you'll all be well up for it again – I just hope that we can put on a similar showing and make up for what was one of the lowest moments of the season at Whaddon Road.

I think it was the nature of Saturday's win that made the result so good. QPR were on a good run and had lost just once in the last ten games. As a result lan Holloway, a manager that I have great respect for, won the Manager of the Month Award and he said to me after the game that we had deserved the three points. That to me is a signal of how well we played — it's not very often that the opposing manager comments on how well you've performed.

And despite going a goal down we got straight back into it and that was important. QPR are one of the strongest teams in the league, have a great mixture of youth and experience and we outplayed them. We were solid at the back, creative in midfield (it's not very often that we see Turbo get that far forward – I wish he'd do it more often) and up front we caused them all sorts of problems.

The fact that we restricted such a strong attacking force to only a few chances was great, but also, and especially after our last two league games which haven't been as good, to get three goals was great. It was just a superb all round team performance and I know everyone will go on about Sam's goal, but I think everyone played a part. Sam has got great feet and it was a special finish, but all over the park there were tremendous performances. David Duke, who is one of the most underated players in this side, had to chop and change again and he did a good job. Jon Beswetherick provided us with some good width on the left and Reeves, Heywood and Gurney were their usual solid selves. In midfield Miglioranzi bossed whilst Robbo and Hewlett ran their socks off and closed down, whilst Eric and Sam worked well together.

I must admit, despite saying that the dream is over, that I had a cheeky look at the top of the table after the game! You can't help but get excited after a performance like that and we're still only eight points off OPR. As long as it is possible we will work hard and you never know what could happen.

Good evening and welcome to everyone for today's local derby and the first league visit of Cheltenham to the County Ground. On behalf of the board of directors can I also extend a warm welcome to the directors, management, players and supporters who have made the short journey from Cheltenham.

Saturday's performance, especially in the second half, was probably the best of the season, and to come against a team in the thick of the play-offs made it doubly rewarding. The atmosphere inside the ground was, in my opinion, also the best of the season and I thank you all for the quality of support you gave the players during the afternoon. Even when we went a goal behind the volume didn't diminish and, as a whole, the Club got what it deserved on Saturday.

Today's opponents will offer a very different challenge. Fighting for survival in this division will ensure that the match will be a real battle, and when it's a local derby as well, there is also a matter of local pride at stake.

Cheltenham F.C. are a very well run club, which reflects the fact that not so long ago they were a non-league club run on non-league financial guidelines which normally means not spending more than you generate. Despite the excellent hospitality afforded by the Cheltenham directors at Whaddon Road earlier this season, that night remains very much the low point of my season so far. Contrast this to the atmosphere, spirit and result at the County Ground on Saturday and I believe we can safely and accurately say that progress is being made.

There has been much debate recently over players out of contract, new contracts and future playing plans. It is therefore important that I re-iterate the approach of the board. Andy King and I have already spoken at length about out-of-contract players and the Club's approach to offering new deals to the players Andy wishes to retain. I have indicated to Andy the projected playing budget for next season, which has been set at a percentage of turnover which is

The days of overspending in the sheer blind hope of playing success are over. This should not mean that we are uncompetitive or unambitious. In fact you will undoubtedly see more and more clubs run on realistic budgets and business principles, otherwise sadly, we will lose a few of our fellow league members through football's financial madness.

Nearly 8,000 packed in to the County Ground for this, an eagerly awaited fixture. QPR started the game in sixth place having not conceded a goal against Town in the previous three encounters. A win for the Robins would see them go just eight points behind the Hoops. Town started the brighter of the two sides as they attacked the Stratton Bank and their first effort came in the first minute when Sabin was played through. His shot however found the new scoreboard rather than the back of the net. Miglioranzi also started well, orchestrating proceedings and linking play well with Beswetherick on the left hand side of the field.

Eric Sabin then showed what he can do just a minute later when he knocked the ball through for himself and accelerated past Clarke Carlisle. He then cut inside and crossed for Robinson but the ball was cut out by the Rangers defence just as Town threatened. Beswetherick was then found in space by Hewlett and charged down the left hand side. He crossed into the box but Sabin's effort just fell into the arms of Culkin, the QPR goalkeeper. Former Plymouth man Beswetherick enjoyed a solid debut and would later receive a standing ovation from the home crowd. QPR took the lead on 15 minutes when a corner from Gino Padula was met by Dan Shittu who headed past Griemink for the opener. The QPR fans on the Stratton Bank celebrated their team's early lead but the Town were to reply just minutes later.

On 18 minutes Steve Robinson was played through and he coolly chested the ball down and poked the ball past Culkin from eight yards out to level the score – it was Robbo's second of the season. QPR then took somewhat of a stranglehold in the midfield, yet without threatening Bart Griemink in the Town goal. They were awarded a free-kick on 29 minutes that Richard Langley stepped up to take, but his curling right foot effort flew just over the bar. Just past the half-hour mark Town stepped up their efforts with Beswetherick's corner testing Culkin in the away goal.

A corner by Richard Langley was then headed off the line by Jon Beswetherick. The ball dropped to Dan Shittu who hit a shot on the turn at Bart Griemink, the Dutchman palmed the ball onto the bar and away for a further corner which was cleared. Langley then had another free-kick which fell almost in exactly the same position as the first, landing just over the bar. Furlong then was sent clear with minutes remaining of the half but Bart Griemink dived at his feet to make a superb stop to deny the former Chelsea man. The Town End responded by singing the praises of the former Birmingham keeper as the rain began to fall.

Stefani Miglioranzi took control of the game on 55 minutes when he made a superb run after starting the initial move. His final ball to Parkin was cut out by Shittu in the Rangers defence. As the Town End and Stratton Bank exchanged tunes, Town looked to take the lead and had an opportunity after a long throw into the box by Duke was headed out for a corner. Beswetherick took the corner and after receiving the ball back, stepped inside Shittu and unleashed a powerful drive which was deflected to safety. Town took the lead on 65 minutes when Parkin waltzed past two players on the edge of the box and clipped the ball past Culkin to put Town 2-1 up. The Town fans amongst the 7,716 rose to their feet to salute 'Super Sam' as he celebrated in front of the Arkell's Stand. The strike was Parkin's 20th goal of the season, coming against the side he supported as a boy.

Town extended the lead on 69 minutes when Jon Beswetherick curled in a teasing corner that found Matt Heywood unmarked at the back post and he headed home to take the score to 3-1. Immediately after the goal Matt Hewlett unleashed a 25-yard drive from a Miglioranzi cut back, seeing his shot fly straight at Culkin. QPR substitute Tommy Williams knocked a ball across goal which was just missed by Kevin Gallen. The resulting corner was then claimed by the confident Griemink who rose above the QPR players to take the ball.

With five minutes remaining a ball out from defence found Parkin on the half way line. He then released Sabin who outpaced his marker to create space just outside the box. Sabin's shot was palmed away by Culkin to the byline. Parkin followed up but could not score his second of the afternoon from such an acute angle.

Town were simply superb. Sam Parkin reached 20 goals for the season and Town took all three points to keep them in eleventh place ahead of the visit of Cheltenham. If you weren't here this afternoon, come down to The County Ground this Wednesday evening and get behind the team as they continue to entertain.

WHAT SOUTH STAND JINX?

Despite the fact that our idols can still refrain from sleeping with their boots on, and that we the fans can attend matches without inserting objects into our underwear, many do not seem to be ruling out the benefits of mystical powers.

A Feng Shui Doctor was recently called into the Millennium Stadium to help lift the increasingly famous 'South Stand Curse.' Chinese Astrology guru, Dr. Paul Darby was accompanied by a horse which galloped around the pitch whilst he scattered sea-salt and incense and chanted Buddhist prayers. The ceremony was arranged following 11 consecutive defeats for teams who prepared in the southern changing room. This tally included losses for teams in two FA Cup Finals and two League Cup Finals. Andrew Vicari, 1995 European Artist of the Year, was asked to paint galloping horses surrounded by reds, oranges and yellows on the changing room wall. The Doctor had recommended these images and colours as they are said to increase positive energy levels.

The 52 year old added, "This isn't about making sure that South Stand teams win. All we are trying to do is redress any imbalance of positive energy within the stadium. I'm not doing anything negative to the North End, just boosting energy levels in the South to achieve an equilibrium of positivity." That very weekend Stoke succeeded in breaking the curse by beating Brentford 2-0 in the Division Two Play-off Final after changing in the southerm dressing room!!

This was not the only stadium that seemed to benefit from mystical forces last season. After Southampton's move from 'The Dell' to 'The St Mary's Stadium,' Gordon Strachan's team simply could not win. This was until they invited a Pagan Witch to sit in the stands. She claimed that the stadium had been built on a medieval burial ground meaning she could use her powers to protect the Southampton goal-line from opposing shots. Indeed The Saints' went on to record two victories on the trot during which they scored six goals whilst conceding none. Gordon Strachan later admitted it was a last desperate attempt to change the fortunes of the team as everything else he had tried had tailed. Leyton Onent and Oxford United also used similar tactics this season when struggling for form. A druid was called into Brisbane Road whilst United called upon the Bisbop of Oxford to lift the apparent curse on their new Kassam. Stadium.

Pre-match rituals can also be rather amusing. The smooth shiny head of Fabien Barthez receiving a gentle kiss from Laurent Blanc was an eye-brow raising image and one which United fans were sad to miss out on last season. Maybe this lack of pre-kick-off bonding contributed to United's trophyless campaign? Unfortunately this was not something which we could look forward to in the World Cup due to Blanc's retirement from the international stage. This could have presented the perfect opening for a totally bald show of affection. Frank Leboeuf replaced the rock of the French defence, yet sadly we were not treated to a shiny show of solidarity in Japan.

Another episode involving a Nationwide League superstition occurred when West Brom boss, Gary Megson controversially refused to accept his 'Manager of the Month' Award. He justified his decision, stating, "I'm delighted to have worn the award, but a defeat always seems to follow whenever a manager wins, so I don't even want to touch it." Fortunately sponsors 'Nationwide' agreed to let the club put the award up for auction.

To reach the utterly ndiculous rituals, however, we need to travel further afield. The 1995 African Football Champions Cup was the stage and the team involved was Orlando Pirates of South Africa who faced the rampant and firm favourite ASEC Mimosa of the Ivory Coast. For several days before this cupfinal, the players had bathed in a special potion prepared by their faith healer. Once at the stadium they followed this man out of the changing rooms keeping to the left hand side of the passageway in order to avoid bewitchment As expected it was one of the most one-sided matches in the history of African football, but amazingly, shot after shot from Mimosa went wide, hit the post, hit the bar or was spectacularly saved. In the final minutes of the match, the only South African (who wasn't in defence) latched onto a long clearance from his keeper to mishit the ball into the bottom corner of the tvorian goal and clinch the title in the most ridiculous manner. There seemed to be no other explanation for it, the lucky potion must have worked.

There was however a ritual in Argentina which would surely fail to go unnoticed no matter how many times it occurred. The famous Argentinian goalkeeper Sergio Goycochea struck the back pages of South American newspapers when he began urinating on the penalty spots before kick-off. He experimented with his theory before a cup final in which the opposing team missed two penalties. Following this it seemed toolish to remove 'The Latin Leak' from his match-day preparation and so he continued the ritual throughout his career. Unsurprisingly it became a nationally celebrated, (if somewhat controversial) ceremony, but one which was popular with police as it aided congestion outside the ground due to fans from both sides arriving at stadia earlier than usual to catch a glimpse of one of the great sporting rituals.

This ritual was later adopted and modified in 1994 by Birmingham City manager, Barry Fry after he became aware of its success in South America. Fry now openly admits to leaking a small amount of his bodily fluids onto the four corners of the pitch before kick-off in an attempt to save City from relegation. He later explained, "It's a pretty difficult exercise to squint a little by the corner flag, walk sixty yards to the next corner and do it again four times in succession - it didn't work. We were relegated and I was later sacked!"

City finally drew level when Darren Hawkins headed home from Liam Ross's cross from the right hand side on 37 minutes before Leroy Lita made it 2-1 just before the break. And so far it seems to be going well for both Club and manager, with the signs of recovery evident in a four-game unbeaten run since Steve Whitton's sacking -Parkinson puts it down to his experience from previous managers. "I have learned a lot from Alan Pardew at Reading this season and you naturally pick things up from previous managers you have played under. Mark McGhee was very influential on my own thinking. Alan has raised the professionalism of Reading Football Club to right up there with Premiership clubs."

CHELTENHAM TOWN

Following a string of successful seasons taking them from the Dr Marten's League to Division Three play-off glory, England's second flock of Robins have disappointed in Division Two.

In no less than five years Steve Cotterill, now Sunderland's number two, developed his Southern League side into the Third strongest team in Division Three, whilst achieving a great FA Cup run in the 2001/02 season before succumbing to West Brom in Round Five. A thrilling 3-1 victory over Rushden & Diamonds at the Millennium Stadium secured a place in Division Two, leaving fans wondering if yet another promotion was possible.

However, with Cotterill's move to Stoke City, before joining Howard Wilkinson at the Stadium of Light, the step up has proved to be a real challenge for Cheltenham, and they currently lie at the foot of the table.

Despite encouraging wins against full strength Norwich and Oldham sides in the Worthington and FA Cup, frequent injuries leading to multiple loan signings meant that they gained little momentum in the league and failed to make an impression in the first half of the season - that despite a 2-0 win over Swindon. New manager Graham Allner was sacked in mid-January and was replaced by former West Brom, Coventry and Wales manager, Bobby Gould.

A win against promotion chasing Tranmere Rovers, and the signing of Grant McCann from West Ham for a club record fee of £50,000 gave fans hope. But inconsistency has since continued leaving the Robins deep in relegation trouble and home crowds gradually shrinking – a far cry from when they turned over Andy King's side in emphatic fashion in front of a packed Whaddon Road earlier in September.

Some sections of the home support have criticised the players' commitment and after a recent 3-1 defeat at the hands of Barnsley, the board apologised to fans and expressed their disappointment with regards to the manner of the defeat. Matters were not helped when current top scorer, Julian Alsop, spoke to the press about his desire to find another club on the eve of the fixture.

However, The Robins still have time to avoid the relegation trap door and an upturn in fortunes would see them catch their fellow strugglers. A narrow defeat against high-flyers Bristol City will have given Gould's side hope – but with just one league win their last ten away from home, it doesn't look good for the Cheltenham side.

The extension to loan signing Marvin Brown's contract will come as a timely boost for the Robin's however - it's kind of player that is required to lift them away from the drop zone.

THE GAFFER



Born in Coventry, Bobby began his playing career as a young striker with Coventry City in 1962 and helped the Sky Blues win the Division Two Championship in 1966-67. He then signed for Arsenal and spent two and a half years at Highbury before moving on to Wolves, where he enjoyed two spells, West Bromwich Albion, Bristol City, West Ham, Bristol Rovers and Hereford United. Following his retirement, Bobby moved into coaching and held posts at Charlton, Wimbledon, Aldershot and Chelsea before landing his first management job at Bristol Rovers in 1981. After two years with Rovers he was given the top job at his home club Coventry City, then in the old first division, and it was during this period he gained a reputation as a spotter of talent in the lower divisions. Following another spell with Bristol Rovers, Bobby returned to the First Division to replace Dave Bassett at Wimbledon, in 1987. There he achieved his greatest triumph as a manager when the 'Crazy Gang' team won the FA Cup in 1988. beating Liverpool 1-0 in the final. Spells at Bristol Rovers, WBA and Coventry followed before his most high profile as he took charge of the Welsh national team.

STEVE BOOK

Long-serving goalkeeper who joined Cheltenham Town at the start of their rise through the leagues in 1997. A confident, bubbly character and an agile goalkeeper with excellent reflexes. Steve has fought off competition from the other goalkeepers at the club to remain virtually ever-present for the past five seasons. Steve began his career in non-league football with Welton Rovers and Weston-super-Mare. He enjoyed brief spells with Brighton & Hove Albion and Lincoln City before joining Forest Green Rovers.

THE SQUAD

JAMIE VICTORY

One of Cheltenham Town's most highly-rated players, Jamie reestablished himself last season as one of the best left-backs in the lower divisions after missing much of the 2000/01 campaign through injury. Jamie began his career as a trainee with West Ham but was then released to join AFC Bournemouth in 1995. He made a number of appearances for the South Coast club before joining Cheltenham Town in 1996 and winning the supporter's Player of the Year Award in his first season at Whaddon Road.

MICHAEL DUFF

Michael became the first Cheltenham player to gain full international honours when he lined up for Northern Ireland against Poland in a friendly last season. His rise to prominence coincided with a move to the centre of defence after spending the early part of his career at either right-back or in midfield. A tall, athletic defender who continues to make excellent progress, Michael joined Cheltenham Town as a youth team player in 1996. YOUNG GUN SHANE DUFF

The younger brother of Michael Duff, Shane is also a central defender who joined the club straight from school. He spent a year in the youth team before being offered a professional contract and spending the following two seasons in the reserves. He spent time on loan with Evesham United last season, where he earned rave reviews for his performances in the Dr Martens League.



Without doubt the Cheltenham Town success story of season 2001/02, 'Big Jules' ended the season as top scorer with 26 goals in all competitions and was named supporter's Player-of-the-Year. Cheltenham beat off interest from several other clubs to capture the 6ft 5ins target man on a 'Bosman' free transfer in the summer of 2000. A powerful physical presence and good finisher in the opposition box, he is also a very useful player to have when defending set piece situations.

MARK YATES

Another player to have won the supporter's player of the season award in the past, Mark is a central midfielder with a non-stop work rate,

whose tackling, passing and box-tobox running have been a key feature of the Cheltenham side for the past three and a half seasons. He began his career as a striker with Birmingham City but had dropped back to midfield by the time he joined Burnley. A brief spell with Doncaster Rovers followed before spending a number of years in the Conference with Kidderminster Harriers, making over 250 appearances, many of them as captain. He joined Cheltenham for £25,000 in early 1999 and has missed only a handful of matches since then.

HUGH MCAULEY

Starting life as a trainee at Anfield, Hugh played in the Conference for Northwich Victoria and in the League of Wales and UEFA Intertoto Cup for Conwy United before settling at Leek Town. Hugh was a striker in those days and scored 33 goals in two seasons in the Conference for Leek before joining Cheltenham for a £20,000 fee in July 1999. An intelligent player and good passer of the ball, he now operates either wide or in the centre of midfield after making the successful transition two seasons ago.

MARTIN DEVANEY

An exciting young striker or wide player now in his fourth season with Cheltenham Town, Martin scored the club's first ever Football League hattrick in the 5-2 defeat of Plymouth Argyle in 2000. Born in Cheltenham of Irish parents, Martin trained with the Republic of Ireland at under-16 level and began his career as a schoolboy with Birmingham City. He switched to Coventry City and spent two years at Highfield Road, one as a professional, before joining Cheltenham following a pre-season trial in 1999. A tricky front runner with pace and an eye for goal, Martin has scored some spectacular goals for the club but was unable to break into the team on a regular basis last season.

GRANT MCCANN midt

Grant became Cheltenham Town's

club record signing when he joined the Robins from West Ham United for a £50,000 fee in January 2003. A young Northern Ireland international, Grant began his career with West Ham and had brief loan spells with Livingston in Scotland and Notts County before his first loan spell with Cheltenham Town. He joined the Robins on a long term loan during season 2000/01 and made a great impression with the club's supporters operating either at left-back or in midfield.

TONY NAYLOR

A diminutive but skilful and intelligent player who makes and scores goals, Tony joined Cheltenham Town in the summer of 2001. His signing proved an inspiration as the Robins, who had struggled to score goals in their first two seasons as a Football League club, began to find the net regularly. Tony helped himself to 18 goals in all competitions but his influence on the team, particularly in bringing out the best in the players around him, was huge.

THEM AND US

Born in Southall in December 1963, Ray Baverstock was to make his influence on many clubs west of the capital. Initially an apprentice here at the County Ground, Ray signed professional forms for Town manager John Trollope on his eighteenth birthday and made 17 Division Four appearances, mostly at right-back.

Making his debut in an away loss at Blackpool in September 1982, his leftback partner was future Cheltenham tearmate Kevin Baddeley while the team also provided another Swindon/Cheltenham connection in Brian Hughes. Season 1982/83 was to be a microcosm of Baverstock's career, as the games that featured his name on the team sheet were to comprise his entire appearance total in the Football League. With Swindon finishing in eighth place and with worse finishes yet

towt

to come, Baverstock may not have taken to much persuasion to drop to the Southern League when in July 1983 a free transfer took Ray to Whaddon Road.

He was to make 283 appearances scoring 22 goals as Cheltenham laid the foundation for League football. The Cheltenhamshire Robins (don't mention old rivals and now inconsequential Gloucester) claimed the Southern League championship in 1984/85 and entered the Gola League, now the Conference, as a result. Playing alongside Kevin Baddeley, Brian Hughes and another ex-Swindon man Steve Abbely, the four had made over 200 appearances for Swindon in the 1980's.

In 1990 Ray made the diplomatically tricky move to Gloucester City and them moved quickly on to Worcester in July 1991. Equally speedy moves to Bath, Moreton Town and back to Gloucester led Baverstock back to Wiltshire and Trowbridge in July 1993 and then to Forest Green Rovers twelve months later.

Briefly drawing breath, Ray made the move into management a mere three months after that when he joined the Centurians of Cirencester in October 1994, staying for almost ten years. Transferring on to lead Devizes Town last summer, Ray recently moved back into Swindon to take charge of Swindon Supermarine where he now occupies the managerial chair vacated by another ex-Swindon Town player, Tom Jones.

Winger Mike Summerbee was one of the original Bert's Babes who took Swindon Town to the uncharted territory of the Second Division in the early

1960's. Signed by Bert Head, Mike was learning his wingmanship in Cheltenham for a YMCA club called Baker Street when he was invited to step into the Football League. Cheltenham Town themselves had been under the stewardship of Mike's father, George, between the summers of 1950 and 1952 indicating that the Summerbee's were a footballing family. George played for Aldershot, Preston, Chester and Barrow and Mike's uncle Gordon appearing for Aldershot before the war.

Initially signing as an amateur in 1958, Buzzer actually made his League debut against Bournemouth in 1959 some months before he signed his first professional contract, and he played a big part in securing Town's promotion to the Second Division in 1962/63. When relegation came in 1964/65, top scorer Summerbee chose to further his career with a move to Second Division Manchester City in exchange for £30,000, a change that brought great success. The Second Division championship was claimed in Mike's first season and such was City's prominence in the late sixties and early seventies that he gained a 1969 FA Cup winners medal, but Mike missed the European Cup Winners Cup final the following season. The European Cup and the UEFA cup stages would also witness Summerbee's skills

England honours were forthcoming, although Alf Ramsey's lack of penchant for wingers limited Mike's international cap haul to eight, but perhaps City's most celebrated success occurred when they pipped local rivals United to the First Division Championship by two points in 1967/68. After nine eventful seasons and over 350 appearances he left City in June 1975 for Burnley, where he made another 50 appearances before moving on to Blackpool eighteen months later. Just three matches at Bloomfield Road meant a further departure, this time back to the Manchester area and Stockport County in the summer of 1977. If this was to be a swansong it was a fruitful one, as Mike clocked up another 87 games before winding up his career with 716 League appearances to his name. Of course Mike's son Nick was to bring about the rare feat of representing the third generation of tootballers from the same family. In an interesting twist, all but Nick made their Footbal League debuts at the County Ground, Mike for Swindon and George and Gordon in a match in 1934 while representing Aldershot. Nick's debut came in an away match at Hull in 1990.

PLACE YOUR BETS!

ROBBO AND MATTY HEYWOOD ARE NECK AND NECK OVER A BET MADE AT THE START OF THE SEASON – BUT WHO WILL WIN?! NICK JUDD INVESTIGATES...

When describing both Steve Robinson and Matt Heywood – the words goal and scorer wouldn't be the first to spring into mind.

Which is perhaps why the two made a bel at the beginning of the season – the duo putting a wager on who would score the most goals by the season's end. Steve Robinson edged ahead of his colleague with Town's first when he found himself in the opposing box to equalise before Heywood bagged the side's third with a header in the second half.

That made it 2-2 so far and as Heywood explains, the bet is hotting up – especially as the end of the season is drawing closer! "Yeah, we're both hot on the heels of Sam now with two each and to be fair, once he'd scored (and I was pleased to see him score, honest) I thought I might as well chip in with one myself! But seriously, it doesn't matter who scores as long as the side wins – especially at this stage of the season. That and as long as I'm ahead of 'Robbo'..."

Steve Robinson will be the first to admit that he's not the most prolific attacking force in the world. Mind you, shortly after his arrival at the Club at the back end of season 2000/01 he pitched in with a dramatic brace against Oxford – thus prompting many Town fans into thinking he was capable of adding more to the goals for tally. "That was a one off, I can't remember having scored two in a season let alone in a game! And to be fair when I do get a shout at having a shot they normally hit row z. But this time around I set myself a target of ten goals and whilst I may not be there yet, there's still time to go! Admittedly it's a bit high but if you don't set yourselves targets you have nothing to aspire to."

One has to admire Turbo's optimism – yet whilst he may not have set the goalscoring charts alight, it seems as though King's advice could be paying off. "The gaffer's always trying to get me to go forward because he feels that the midfield don't support the front two or three enough. To be fair it's easier when we play with the two upfront, I mean you try keeping up with Eric and Danny! Seriously, when we had the three it was difficult to get forward in time to support but with the two it seems to work better.

"I don't know why I was as far forward as I was against QPR but when I saw the opportunity I just gambled off Sabin's header and



managed to poke the ball past their keeper. It was a great flick from Eric and whilst I thought I'd messed up my first touch, I managed to get on the end of it in time. I think the important thing was that we got back into the game quickly because the longer you go chasing the game, the more desperate you become."

Heywood's effort was what you might call more of a defender's goal with the former Burnley man unmarked in the Hoops box to head home from a Beswetherick corner. "I couldn't believe I was unmarked. They seemed to have so many bodies in the box, but thankfully none of them were marking me! It was a simple goal really, 'Bes' found his range after a few corners and it was a good delivery - all I had to do was get my head on it and thankfully it went in." Heywood by trade isn't normally expected to get forward as much as perhaps Robinson is. With that said, he managed to find the net a few times last season and although he hasn't found the 'onion bag' with as much regularity he's certainly returned to the kind of form that saw him

pick up almost every award going last season. "I was surprised by last year. I am not complaining, it's nice to get loads of awards but it put a bit of pressure on me this time around. That and I've got less space in my house! I didn't start too well either this year. For whatever reason I thought that I wasn't playing as well as I know I can do – but thankfully now that seems to have worked itself out and to be honest, the whole of the back three are playing to a high standard. I can't really explain why we're playing well – we're just confident in ourselves and enjoying every game."

Heywood's upturn in form coincides with talk of new contracts as we reach the end of the season. Turbo's is also up for renewal and as they explain, all they can do is play as well as possible. "It's a difficult time of year, not only because we're still trying to finish as high as possible in the league, but also because some of us are playing for a new contract. All we can do is play as well as we can do and help the team to finish as high as possible – at the end of the day there is nothing else we can do because it isn't our decision and by thinking about it you put more pressure on yourself."

Heywood agreed. "I don't really think you can think about it too much. At the moment we've got ourselves back in the play-off hunt. We're now just eight points away again and there's still a few points to be won, anything can happen. It's a case of work hard now and think about everything else later."

Which brings us on to tonight's encounter. Both Robbo and Heywood endured a torrid evening at Whaddon Road. Both are looking forward to putting things right. Heywood even had to endure a 'spat' with some of the fans – with everyone's frustrations seemingly reaching boiling point. "I think that night has been well publicised what with us losing heavily and the arguments that followed – it wasn't nice at all and it's certainly one of the worst games I've ever had to play in. The most frustrating thing was that whilst we could




hear the fans annoyance, there was nothing we could do about it because too many of us were playing poorly. We played like a pub team and were all off our game. But we've learned from that and come a long way – just look at how we played against QPR. Instead of looking back at what happened that night we need to build on what we've achieved over the last 20 games or so" Robbo agreed, "It's a good opportunity to make amends for that night. Cheltenham are scrapping and it won't be easy, but if we play to our strengths then we can beat anyone – it's just a case of being professional and doing a job. That game was the start of our bad run and we've come through that. It'll be interesting to see how we perform on Wednesday – especially after the win against QPR."

There's no question that should Town repeat

the form that saw them ease past lan Holloway's side on Saturday, they will have enough in their locker to turn over Bobby Gould's struggling team. However, should you see either Robbo or Heywood venture past the half way line then be warned that either could be prepared to shoot! Mind you, a repeat of their efforts wouldn't go amiss – in the meantime I'm afraid my money's on a certain Mr Parkin. Sorry lads!

As they go into this evening's match, Cheltenham Town can boast a record denied to both Arsenal and Manchester United. That is 100% success in League matches against Swindon Town. The 100% record is represented by the victory in the only clash in the Football League that took place on September 17 last year. It was one of the low points of Swindon's season with angry confrontations between fans and players after a very disappointing display.

Swindon fielded a 4-4-2 formation. Danny Invincibile returned to the side but injuries ruled out Adam Willis, Alan Reeves and Stefani Miglioranzi. The Swindon goal was threatened as early as the third minute when a free kick by Hugh McAuley struck Matt Heywood and Bart Griemink reacted smartly to save. The first 20 minutes were dominated by Cheltenham and Griemink had to scramble a shot from Richard Walker round the post and could only watch as Tony Naylor failed to hit the target when well placed. The folly of protesting against the referee's decision was shown when Andy Gurney argued about his tackle on Russell Milton being adjudged a foul. It allowed Milton to take his free kick from 10 yards closer to the Town goal and his crack at goal found the Town net via the head of Matt Hewlett. This goal proved to be the only goal of a disappointing first 45 minutes.

Early in the second half came a moment of farce that was to ruin Town's changes, not only in this match, but in those that followed too. Sam Parkin slid into Steve Book in the Cheltenham goal and was red carded. What gave the incident its comical nature was that referee Mr Robinson had had to scramble up from having slid into the two players himself before flourishing the red card. The Whaddon Road pitch was extremely slippery especially in the goal mouths and Parkin's challenge seemed to owe more to a loss of footing than a loss of temper. It seemed that being reduced to 10 men might give Swindon the sour they needed and the five minutes that followed saw Town produce some of their best football of the match, with Gareth Edds forcing a save from a free kick and Eric Sabin shooting

wide after a speedy break. After 65 minutes Naylor put Milton through and he gave Griemink no chance with a carefully placed shot to make it 2-0.

It was an indication of the thinness of Swindon's squad at this time that, despite the fact that Town hardly looked like scoring between this goal and an Invincibile effort in the last minute, none of the visiting side subs were used. It was the seventh defeat in a row for Swindon whose players Andy King described as nervous wrecks.

MARK HANRAHAN RETURNS THIS WEEK, ALBEIT A LITTLE BIT CONCUSSED! STILL, THE FOURFOURTWO BIG MAN STILL HAD ENOUGH TIME TO TELL US WHAT IS GOING ON IN THE WORLD OF FOOTBALL.

Talk of new stadia seems to be en-vogue at the moment. However, whilst the gossip mongers have once again been speculating our mighty reds relocating to a sparkling new construction, Everton's lingering hopes of moving to a new stadium at the King's Dock site in the centre of Liverpool have all but disappeared down the swanny! Regeneration company Liverpool Vision have announced a waterfront redevelopment is still planning to go ahead, although sadly for the Toffees this will be minus the proposed football stadium, such was the alleged insecurity of Everton's financial proposal.

Massimo Maccarone has, according to his agent vowed to put his frustration behind him and stay and fight for the Middlesbrough center-forward's shirt. The bald-headed Italian striker has been missing from Steve McClaren's line-up in recent weeks as new forwards Michael Ricketts and Malcolm Christie have formed a new-look Boro strike partnership. Stories in Italy have linked the young front man to an early return home with Juventus, Milan and Inter all having Maccarone watched. However, whilst speculation that Maccarone's first season in a Boro shirt will also be his last Paulo Fabri, the player's agent, insists that will not be the case. "Massimo is not happy at the moment - no player is happy on the bench," he said. "But he is going nowhere - he has a will to succeed. I know clubs like Juve and Milan, where he began his career, are keen on him and that he is flattered by such talk, but he wants to stay and show the Middlesbrough fans what he can do."

The Intertoto Cup may disrupt the summer holidays of players and coaches but it does offer places in the Uefa Cup, which could prove lucrative as the season progresses. However, it appears English clubs have finally delivered the competitions first high-profile snub. Indeed, this week it was revealed that Bobby Robson's Newcastle United were the only Premiership club to express an interest. With Robson's team almost certain to qualify for Europe again thanks to their lofty league position it looks highly likely that the Geordies will not need to utilise the competition this time around. Leeds United, Aston Villa and Fulham have all turned the opportunity down after worries about players getting tired later on in the season. This despite Fulham winning the competition last summer and subsequently qualifying for the UEFA Cup.

I hope you were as shocked as me to learn that Queens Park Rangers boss lan Holloway took the Division Two award. Ok, so his side have won two and drawn two games during the last month and have lost only two of their last 10 league games. Now, far be it from me to begrudge anyone success, but let's be honest here. Combine the problems our own Guv'nor has overcome this season with only a single defeat in 2003, capped most recently with a comprehensive defeat of a very ordinary QPR and I'm sure you'll agree that something seems to be amiss here! Ah well, at least we'll have the chance of stuffing QPR in the play-offs to even the score - right Andy?

For what it's worth, Reading boss Alan Pardew has won the Nationwide Division One Manager of the Month Award for February after the Royals won all five of their games during the month, beating Burnley, Gillingham, Millwall, Sheffield United and Rotherham. Reading are tucked-in behind Leicester and Portsmouth sitting third in the table 11 points off the top two The Division Three award went to Bournemouth's Sean O'Driscoll after they collected 13 points from a run of six games. Neil Warnock's resurgent Sheffield United have confirmed they are in talks with Blackburn to sign defender John Curtis. The former England U21 defender left Alex Ferguson and Old Trafford behind for a crack at first team football with the Ewood Park outfit nearly three years ago after failing to establish himself with the Red Devils. Curtis has since made over 70 appearances but has lost his place under Graeme Souness, playing just seven times this term. The £1.5m signing appears to be heading out of the Barclaycard Premiership club with a Sheffield United spokesman saying, "We're talking to him this morning about a possible deal. There's no truth in the stories that a deal has been agreed, but we are hoping to sign him."

NO. 19 PASTA CARBONARA

 You will need the following: 100 grms pasta of choice (spaghetti, tagliatelle, penne), 2-3 rashers of bacon, 1 small onion, 1 clove of garlic, 1 egg, 2oz cheese

 Boil pasta as packet instructions (4-8 mins).

While pasta is cooking, chop onion, garlic, bacon, mushrooms and pepper and fry gently in a tablespoon of oil.

Drain water from pasta and mix fried bacon & veg into pasta. Turn heat off.

Mix grated cheese into beaten egg and stir this mixture into savoury pasta in saucepan.

The retaining heat will immediately cook the egg and cheese but keep stirring until the pasta is coated with the mixture. Serve immediately.
