## IMPORTANT PLEA - From Chairman, Keith Haslam

Dear Stags Supporter, i am writing to you to ask for your help to the Stags from facing a deduction of points for breaches of ground regulations, because as you know, we can ill afford to lose points as our fight against relegation will be undermined.

At a recent match an incidence of pitch incursion by Stags supporters was reported to the Football Association by the match referee.

Further, at recent matches, inspectors form the Football Lisencing Authority and the County Council Safety Advisory Group have visited Field Mill for match day inspections.

Their reports have highlighted the persistent standing of a group of Stags supporters in 'B' Block of the Lower West Stand, and others around the ground. The Club has been advised that these matters must be addressed, and

The Club has been advised that these matters must be addressed, and that failure to address these issues may result in parts of the ground being closed, reduction in capacity of the ground and even deduction of points.

closed, reduction in capacity of the ground and even deduction of points. Such a deduction of points may spell relegation for the Stags despite the hard word of Keith Curie and the players.

I am asking you as true supporters of the Stags to stop this persistent standing, and co-operate with requests and instructions from Police and Stewards at the ground, and to encourage your friends and fellow supporters to sit and support the Stags.

11am departure time last Saturday for the 2 coaches organised by SSA Away Travel for the huge crunch game with Cheltenham and there was a strange sense of caution in the air, the tension of the occasion was apparent even 4 hours before kick off.

Potentially this was at the very least a six pointer but despite the midweek Luton victory this was the type of game in which a launchpad for safety had to be fitted and how the fans willed the players to rise to the challenge and kill off the Robins survival hopes. 1 down 3 to go was the feeling, we were wrong !

We run a Lucky 7's Competition on Saturdays at the SSA, the aim is to forecast the result of 7 matches taking place that afternoon, one of which is the game involving the Stags. It was interesting that 99% of players forecast at worst a Stags draw so defeat was certainly not on the menu.

Having arrived at Whaddon Road you are greeted by a typical non league ground really, set in the midst of a housing estate. The away end is particularly poor and must compete with Colchester for the worst view in Division 2. The programme however was a reasonable read but priced at £2.50 was too expensive. However the hospitality awarded to supporters at this ground is 1st class. We were welcomed into the Supporters Bar area which runs alongside the pitch Executive Box style. Food is served amongst a very friendly atmosphere and the place was crackling, this was a big game for everybody. Credit Cheltenham for this set up as the fan facilities in this area were excellent and a lesson for many clubs, including the Stags.

It became rapidly apparent that a small section of seats allocated to the away fan would quickly be snapped up so we entered the ground after a considerable queue.

Cheltenham have a new stand which although small and similar to the one at Macclesfield runs along one side of the ground and is a smart addition.

Once more the following from Mansfield was superb and with the pre match news that Julian Allsop the 20ft Cheltenham Striker who causes so much havoc was missing the fact we were missing Keith Curle didn't appear to matter too much before kick off. However the atmosphere was killed stone dead after a matter of seconds when a clever one-two left SSA funded Adam Eaton exposed then a near post strike which appeared to go straight through the Stags keeper put the Robins a goal up with seconds only on the clock. The amber army was shellshocked as the following 90 minutes unfolded, no doubt you have all read the reports of the match.

The most disappointing aspect of the day for many appeared to be that for such a massive occasion which could have a huge impact on the quality of 46 days out next season, the players failed to connect together and find the gear to compete with a side with a pitiful goals tally and generally a very poor side. The red and white shirts of Cheltenham were made to look like players of Ajax which hurt the most. Of course everybody has off days but so often this season we have been so close to just needing that extra victory to get ourselves out of trouble and the wheels fall off, so close but yet so far away. The match was really over within 20 minutes although Andy White White improved the game as a spectacle offering new options up front which resulted in winning the Stags some throw ins, free kicks and time as much as anything else. It was good to see Neil McKenzie on the park also. Their 3rd goal was offside but it mattered little and the mood on the trip home was an angry one which changed into despair as rivals results came through.

All in all the real winners of the day were the Stags fans who listened to this one on 103.2, tucked up at home followed by the live Arsenal V Chelsea FA Cup tie at 5pm!!

Loyal travellers returned feeling that a golden chance was wasted but angry that had the side played to anything like their potential 3 points were there for the taking as at Colchester.

But that's gone now and today is another day, if Notts County can win at Cardiff and notch 3 on the bounce so can the Stags. They looked as if they were heading for oblivion after our derby win but within 3 weeks are sat snugly in mid table, the picture can change so guickly but the Football Post wasn't a good read on Saturday evening.

However today is the day to dust yourself down, we all need to stick together, look forward to these last 10 matches and most of all shout our heads off !!!

We didn't want a boring end of season anyway, did we ???

Stags had hit a shaky run of form, with only one win from their previous six matches, and made a nervous start, but took the lead against the run of play after 33 minutes. Paul Garner crossed from the left, Keith Cassells neatly flicked it on, and Neville Chamberlain stooped to head home from close range, despite the attentions of Swindon defender Colin Calderwood. It was Chamberlain's 19th goal of a glorious season. But ten minutes later Swindon were level. Dave Bamber mis-hit a free-kick and it fell to Leigh Barnard who drilled the ball home past Kevin Hitchcock.

Hitchcock made some vital saves in the second half to keep Stags in the game, and Stags substitute Roddy Collins came close to claiming the points with a fierce 20 yard shot that was brilliantly saved by Kenny Allen. At the end of the game the home fans gave their side a standing ovation, while the Swindon fans celebrated the championship. Afterwards Swindon boss Lou Macari claimed that it was former Stags defender Colin Calderwood that had earned the championship, telling the media: "If Colin Calderwood had stopped at Mansfield, they would have been champions and not us." Calderwood was roundly booed all afternoon! Meanwhile Stags boss Ian Greaves said: "It is one point in the right direction towards promotion."

## **SWINDON TOWN**

## The Manager - Andy King

Born in August 1956, in Luton, King made his name as a lively midfielder having joined his home town club in 1974. His next stop was Everton, the club with which most people associate him, who he signed for in 1976 for £35,000.

He made 150 appearances for The Toffees, scoring an impressive 38 goals in four seasons at Goodison before joining QPR.

One season with the Superhoops was followed by another at West Bromich Albion before a return to Everton for the 1982-83 season, where Andy played a further 43 games and added another 11 goals to his tally for the Toffees.

A short period with Dutch side Cambuur followed, before Andy returned to England with Wolves, for whom he played 28 times scoring 10 goals.

A very brief spell back at Luton in 1985 (just three appearances) precedeed Andy's final move as a player when he joined Aldershot and notched 11 goals in 36 games for the Surrey side.

Having retired as a player, he turned to coaching, and was given his first managerial appointment at Mansfield Town in 1993 following George Foster's departure.

Having been relegated from Division Two, Mansfield were low on confidence but King managed to steer them to a mid-table finish in his first season at the helm.

The following season saw The Stags in with a chance of promotion back to the Second Division, having finished in 6th place in the table, but they were beaten in the play-off semi-finals by John Duncan's Chesterfield.

The 1995-96 season saw Mansfield drop down to 19th position in Division Three and Andy was replaced at Field Mill by Steve Parkin.

Andy spent some time out of management but was still involved in the game, and was working with former Everton team-mate Peter Reid at Premiership club Sunderland as a scout when Colin Todd took him to Swindon as his assistant manager in the summer of 2000.

When Todd got the call from Jim Smith to be his assistant at Derby County, King was given the opportunity to impress chairman Terry Brady, and after four games in charge he was given the job full-time, on November 6, 2000.

Swindon struggled to keep themselves out of the relegation zone for most of the season but a win over Peterborough in the penultimate game of their league campaign, coupled with Bristol Rovers loss to Wycombe, ensured their Second Division survival.

The great escape act was not enough to ensure Andy King's survival however. Despite his efforts in keeping The Robins up he was replaced at the County Ground by former Liverpool boss Roy Evans in June 2001. But he was not gone for long. Evans left the club before the end of the year, after new owners arrived at the County Ground, and Andy King - who had taken legal action against Swindon with regard to his dismissal - was reinstated as manager on December 20 2001.

#### **Bart Griemink**

Giant keeper signed by Colin Todd on a free transfer in the summer of 2000. Griemink is a former Dutch Under-21 international who spent a successful loan spell with The Robins (as cover for Frank Talia) before eventually joining the club. He came to English football in 1995 with Birmingham and deputised competently for the injured Ian Bennett, playing in the 1995 League Cup semi-final. He then followed Barry Fry to Peterborough United but lost his place to Mark Tyler. Griemink started the 2000-01 season as first choice goalkeeper and even deputised as captain, but ended up on the bench as Steve Mildenhall took his place in goal following Griemink's two dismissals and subsequent lengthy suspension. However, following Mildenhall's departure to Notts County Bart played every game last season and was one of the most consistent performers - he was also in contention for the Player of the Year Award. Having stalled on signing a new contract in the summer, Bart has taken his place between the sticks once again this time around.

#### **Gareth Edds**

21-year old Australian who, having joined us on a month's loan from Nottingham Forest, has now signed for a year. Played nearly 40 games at Forest before joining Town and has been excellent in the right-back role. Was a consistent performer at the start of the season but has since had to fight for his place with Andy Gurney. Played for Australia's under 23 side against Leverkusen.

## Matthew Hewlett

An attacking central midfielder, Matt Hewlett was once tipped for the top by all at Ashton Gate. The former Bristol City player was called into the England Under 21 squad, but a number of injuries curtailed his flourishing career. In the end Hewlett made over 100 appearances for City, but left them to join Town on a Bosman in the summer of 2000. He was a regular for Colin Todd until being hit by injury once again and went on to play just 26 league games. Matty was a regular last season until a reoccurrence of his knee injury kept him out for the majority of December and January - other than that he was pretty consistent and even managed to bag his first goal for the club, a close range effort during Town's 2-0 victory away at Port Vale in September. Has been the midfield general this time around and Town sorely miss his presence when he's injured.

#### Adam Willis

Centre back who was revitalised under Colin Todd. Willis arrived at the County Ground in 1998 on a free transfer from Coventry and was Steve McMahon's last signing for The Robins. He scarcely figured for Jimmy Quinn and was allowed to go on loan to Mansfield after being told he could leave Swindon. Fortunately Todd liked the tall defender and gave him a new contract. Willis was a regular in the first half of the following season and scored his first goal for Swindon in the 4-1 win against likeston in the FA Cup. A trainee at Coventry, Willis never made the break through to the Sky Blue's first but has made the centre-back position his own in Andy King's back four - did enough at the back end of last season with some magnificent displays to warrant an extension to his contract. Has been superb again this season, that despite a lack of sleep due to the birth of his baby!

#### Andy Gurney

Andy joined Reading from Torquay in January 1999 for £100,000 as an attack-minded, rightsided defender that could also play in midfield. He started his career at hometown club Bristol Rovers, where he spent four seasons before moving to Torguay for one year and impressing during their surge to the play-offs. Established a regular starting place with Reading in 1999/2000 and figured in the Royals' promotion push last year. Was keen to join Town after their impressive performance against Reading and King snapped him up on a Bosman in the summer of 2001. Crowned an impressive home debut performance against Tottenham with a long-range goal and proved to be one of King's best buys. Gurney missed just four games last year through suspension and is set to miss the first three this time around for a misdemeanour against Reading on Valentines Day. Will be an integral part of King's squad this season and is set to continue as club captain.

#### Keith O'Halloran

Irish midfielder who was one of several Bosman signings Colin Todd made in the summer of 2000. O'Halloran is a talented right-sided player who became first choice on the right of midfield, a position Swindon struggled to fill in 1999/00. O'Halloran started life as a trainee at Middlesbrough, but only made six appearances for Boro before moving to Scotland in 1997. He was a success at St Johnstone, and was offered a new contract but preferred to try his luck in Division Two. A good striker of the ball,

## Sam Parkin

Very young and very promising forward who joined the club from Chelsea on Thursday August 1, 2002. The transfer followed months of speculation, with Andy King, a huge fan of the player, tracking him for several months. Parkin joined the club from Stamford Bridge where his development was hindered by a glut of international stars. However, whilst at the club he joined several other clubs on loan and it is with them that he built up a reputation as a lethal striker. Joined Millwall in September 2000 and made his debut in

Joined Millwall in September 2000 and made his debut in the Football League for the Lions in a 5-0 demolition of Oxford United. Netted a brace on his first ever appearance and made it three in two with another against Peterborough at London Road. He then went on loan to Wycombe Wanderers in November 2000 after having a trial with Queens Park Rangers. He also had the option of a temporary move to Luton but decided to join the Adams Park outfit. Scored twice in 13 games for the Chairboys. Went on loan once again to Oldham Athletic before joining Northampton last season. Scored three goals in pre-season and five goals in the league - is set to be suspended following his sending off against Cheltenham.

## Stefani Miglioranzi

Miglioranzi is the product of the American College football system in which the most promising players are drafted into Major League Soccer. Stefani helped St John's University win the 1996 NCAA Division I Championship and played for MLS team Chicago Fire before joining Everton on trial. They were keen to sign him but no deal came about. Portsmouth then outjumped Liverpool in inviting him for a trial and signed him soon thereafter. The 22-year-old is a Brazilian born American but holds an Italian passport. As a footballer the genes don't come much better. What's more. Miglioranzi is versatile; he can play in defence or as a central midfielder and since joining the club in July, has impressed in the middle of Town's midfield.

#### **David Duke**

Left-sided midfielder that arrived on a free transfer from Sunderland in 2000. Unfortunately, Duke never managed a start for the Black Cat's first team. Duke appeared regularly in his first season with the Robins. He combined well with Sol Davis down the Robins' left and is a good crosser of the ball. Duke can also play at wing-back and will want to build on a decent start for Swindon. Consistency is the key for the Scotsman who has shown glimpses of what he is capable of, especially when running at defenders with the ball. Was in and out of the side last season but with a bit of consistency, can make the left side his own following the departure of Sol Davis.

Few had heard of the young Frenchman when he joined the club last summer, but with Andy King comparing him to Thierry Henry he brought a lot of flair and excitement to Town's front line. Sabin joined Town from French Second Division club

Wasquehall who finished 18th in season 2000/01. Sabin contributed with seven goals in 58 starts in France and last season, he didn't get the goals he deserved scoring just five in total. However, in terms of hard work Sabin brings much more to the team and in the first few games alone he earned four penalties. Sabin looks particularly dangerous when the ball is played behind the opposing defence for he has blistering pace. With a bit more confidence in front of goal, Sabin could prove to be a great acquisition.

### **Darren Dykes**

Darren is somewhat of an unknown quantity having signed from Buckingham Town. However, the youngster made a huge impression when facing Didcot Town in a pre-season friendly and he was subsequently snapped up in a matter of weeks. The central midfielder has had trials with Spurs and Leyton Orient, but after failing to secure a contract had been helping out with his father's business before he landed the deal at Town. Will be a couple of weeks before he reaches match fitness, but Dykes could be one for the future.

### **Danny Invincibile**

Australian midfielder who endeared himself to the fans having been recommended to Colin Todd by Harry Redknapp at West Ham. Danny subsequently joined the Robins on a free transfer when Todd watched him in a trial game. After a slow start (although he did score on his debut against West Brom), Danny showed the club what he was capable of with five goals in four games in October/November in season 2000/01. The former Marconi Stallion and Aussie Under-21 star would later become Town's top scorer with ten goals, arguably his most important coming in the last home game of that season against Peterborough in the ninetieth minute - a goal that some say kept the club up. Danny is at his most dangerous when he is running at defenders and he was ever present again last season with eight goals to his name, attracting a lot of interest from a number of clubs. A crowd favourite, fans will be pinning the sides hopes on his shoulders this season.

### Matthew Heywood

Heywood failed to break through at Burnley's Turf Moor and, after being alerted as to his availability by former scout, Shaun Reid, Andy King snapped him up on a free transfer. What a signing he's proved to be, ever-present in the latter half of 2000/01 and missing just four games last year, it is no surprise that he swept the board in last year's Player of the Year Awards. The tall defender has signed an extension to his contract, much to the delight of the tans and he will be looking to show the same strength and commitment as he did last year. Strong in the tackle and good in the air, Heywood could prove to be a great asset to the club - if they can hang on to him. It is no coincidence Town's defensive record improved dramatically following his arrival and he can also play up front if need be too (scoring four goals in total last season)!

#### **David Bampton**

Swindon manager, Andy King, has handed promising Town scholar, David Bampton, the No. 21 shirt in his first team squad. 17-year-old Bampton has been added to the Swindon squad following several impressive displays during Town's reserves unbeaten start to the campaign. Bampton has proven that he is a dependable 'battler' and will further bolster King's options in midfield. Town's Youth Development Officer, Jim Fraser, said: "David has done well in his first two years with the Club and it's fantastic news that it has been rewarded and he will be part of the first team squad. "He is a local lad from Stratton and has featured in all of the reserve games this season. He can play in either central midfield or defence and has a good range of passing."

#### Alan Reeves

Experienced centre back who is particularly strong in the air. Reeves always causes problems from set pieces and for a brief period in season 2000/01 he was the club's top goalscorer. At the beginning of the season he was told by Colin Todd that he could leave the club, but persuaded the manager to reconsider with some fine preseason performances. Reeves went on to be a permanent fixture and even ended up captaining Swindon in Mark Robinson's absence. Before joining Swindon in 1998, he spent four years at Wimbledon, where he had the tough task of replacing John Scales. Reeves has also played for Gillingham, Chester and Rochdale where he was considered one of the best players in the club's history. Reeves signed a new one-year deal in the summer of 2001 and has done the same this time around. Will have to be at the top of his game if he's going to challenge Heywood and Willis.

#### Steve Robinson

Tough-tackling and energetic right-footed midfield terrier signed from Birmingham City for £50,000 in February 2001, he was an automatic choice for the Robins for the remainder of the season. Found in the centre or right of midfielder, Robinson likes to win the ball and pass it on quickly. A former Birmingham trainee, he broke into the Blues team under Barry Fry but has constantly been dogged by injuries that have limited his first team chances. Looks set to be a part of King's plans once again this season and he will be eager to add to the two goals he scored against Oxford in 2000/01., not to mention improve his disciplinary record!

#### Alan Young

Swindon Town

At 19 years of age, Young is one of Swindon's brightest hopes for the future. Having already played for England's Youth team, Young has risen from Town's youth set up to the fringe of the first team squad via the Reserves. Scoring goals for fun with the youth side, Young more than held his own in the club's second string and marked his first team debut in the FA Cup by scoring against non-league likeston Town in 2000/01. Unfortunately he was unable to command a place due before an ankle injury sidelined the youngster. King has made his admiration for the youngster very clear and he could well figure in his plans this year after a growing influence on the first team last year; he made seven appearances in total in scored the winner in Town's 1-0 win over Blackpool.

#### Nathan Edwards

Nathan is just one of three players to have signed progressional contracts last summer having impressed in Town's successful youth team. The midfielder was ever-present in Viv Busby's under 19's side and was evebtually drafted into Andy King's squad, making his debut against Colchester in the LDV Vans Trophy. Edwards also figured in Town's 0-2 trip to Stoke as well as their last game of the season against Wycombe and he could well become even more influential this season - King has high hopes of the youngster.

## Kevin Halliday

Another youngster to have qualified from Town's youth ranks, Kevin is one of Town's more experienced youngsters. Having captained the under 19's to considerable success, Kevin made his debut in season 2000/01 when he played against Millwall in the LDV Vans Trophy. He came on as a substitute in the same competition last season and appeared on the bench a number of times, but as yet is yet to make his full league debut.

#### **Craig Farr**

Goalkeeper who was an unused substitute for the Robins in the 2000-01 season and will hope the departure of Steve Mildenhall gives him more of a chance. Has impressed greatly when given the chance in Town's second string and could become Bart Griemink's understudy this season. Andy King is a huge admirer of Farr and his display between the sticks against Wimbledon in pre-season is testament to the lad's ability.

he early days in 1894 Swindon Town tootball Club, tounded by Rev. Williams Pitt, n 1894 Swindon Town tootball Club, tounded by Her, Williams Htt, took on professionals and became a founder member of the Southern League Division One. The team struggied in the early part of the 18th century and subsequently finished fourth. Financial problems would dictate the direction of the club from an early stage.

Before World War I the club enjoyed prosperous tin the Southern League Championship twice and reaching the FA Cup i-final on two separate occasions. Swindon Town moved into the Football League Div 3 (S) in 1920

and achieved their first league victory against Luton Town. Town, having earned their league status, nearly lost it in 1933.

1956 and 1957 and had to apply for re-election to the league. World War II brought more troubled times for the club and during the war the County Ground was used by the war office as a POW cap After the conflict the cub slowly got back on its feet although finances were hard. October 1956 saw the arrival of Bert Head. The

following season saw a change in fortunes as the club frished in the top half of Division 3 (S), earning entrance to the national Third Division. Head developed the side and young taient began to come through.

#### 1966/67

Town's excitement for the season came in the FA Cup, an away draw at West Ham gave Town's fans the opportunity to see World Cup stars such as Hurst. Moore and Peters, whilst also giving them a day out in Londor

Town managed to come away with a fantastic 3-3 draw earning town manages to come away with a tartastic 3-3 draw earning them a money-spinning replay at home. However, the financial rewards were not the only benefit. With the replay looking to be heading for a 1-1 draw (John Sissons canceled out Wille Penmans long range effort). Don Rogers and their Wille Penman applied a double blow. Round four sale fowd displatch of Bury, a neat header by Keth Morgan and a darting includial goal by Don Rogers enough to he use a NH brown draw with Mcthoente Ferner at the Clo. Centure tee up a fifth round draw with Nottingham Forest at the City Ground. Town proved that the West Ham result was no fluke earning a 0-0 Now proved that the vess half resolt was no how earning a u-o draw, unfortunately they could not repeat the home success and a late strike by Bruce Walker took the tie to a second replay. The second replay was played at Ville Park and unfortunately many supporters missed the first half but artived in time to see three goals in the last half-hour end Swindon's cup hopes.

It was remarkable that the team had performed so well in the Cup because they were struggling against relegation in the league. The team contained four heroes of Town's previous promotion season in 1962-63 in Trollope, Morgan, Rogers and Smart along with Thomas, Harland, Penman and Butier who would appear in the team that triumphed in the League Cup in 1969. Ken Skeen and Bruce Walker, goalscoring heroes in the cup run had lost their places to new signings Pat Terry and Bobby Jones. The new signings and the boost of confidence of the cup run saw Swindon climb well clear of danger and finish in eighth spot with 50 points from 46 matches, five positions above Colchester who had 44 points.

#### 1958/69

Town could have endured an ignominious exit in Round Two when town could have ensured an grownmacus exit in Hound and when they trailed Fourth Division Bradford City at the County Ground, only to come back and win 4-3. In Round Four, Town were four minutes away from a 2-0 victory against Coverty: Oity came back to earn a replay that saw them defeated 3-0 at the County Ground with first half goals from Don Rogers, Roger Strart and Wille Penman. The toughest opposition came from Derby County. After a hundred and eighty minutes of football against Brian Clough's team, the two sides were separated by a single goal that followed a cruel deflection. The semi-final saw both Town and their opponents make a

However, with just 25 seconds of normal binne remaining, a free kick found David Thomas who sidestepped the packed Swindon detence to fire home. Many Town fails were convinced that their Wembley dream was over when Burnley's Casper found the ball at his feet and made no mistake. Swindon recovered from the double blow and increasing pressure caused Bellamy to put through his own goal. Minutes into the second period of extra time Noble met a headed clearance to finish what was to be the goal that took Town to Wembley. In the final, Roger Smart's first half goal had given Town a narrow lead that, thanks to the billiance of Downsborrough in goal, they held multistics to be bolliance of Downsborrough in goal, they held multistics from time. Then the Town keeper hacked clear only for the ball to rebound over his head from the chest of Bobby Gould who followed up to score. Don Rogers finished ended game with two brilliant goals, the first following a corner, the second saw his dramatic run from the half way rounded off when he took the ball round Wilson in the Arsenal goal

#### 1986 87

Lou Macari refused to be complacent despite having seen his side achieve a record points total in Division Four the previous season. He active a record points boar in Unsolin Fund at a previous season, m realised that some expensioner would be needed to add to the fitness and endeavour that characterised his side the previous season. Shrewdy, the sale of Colin Gordon to Winhibedon financed three new signings. Although Jimmy Gilligan tailed to establish a regular place, central defender, Tim Parkin, and striker, Steve White, were to play major roles in another season of success. When goalkeeper, Kenny

Allen twisted an ankle in a Littlewoods Cup match at Southampton Lou returned to his former club Manchester United to borrow Frase Digby. The signing was later made permanent and the young 'keeps was to prove his worth in this, and many other seasons. Although the season began brightly with a 2-1 win at Bolton, Town suffered two home defeats in quick succession. The second saw an absolute bing at the hands of Blackpool. Despite this the fans did their best to raise spirits by chariting "Lou Macari's red and white army" which was to be the war cry of the period. Mark Jones was another player who came on loan and when he scored twice in a 3-1 win at York his signing was made permanent. As a second successive promotion became a real possibility the Board came up with £60,000 to allow Digby's signing to be made permanent and also for Jimmy Quinn to be brought back to the County Ground. A home be against Leeds United ended in defeat in the F A Cup but the run to the Fourth Round generated much needed finance. A 3-0 home win over Newport County was to spark a run of 10 games in which the only points Swindon dropped were in a 1-1 draw at Blackpool. On April 11 a 4-3 win at Ashton Gate against Bristol Rovers (they were playing on City's ground at the time) lifted Town to second spot in the table. ever, by the season's end they dropped back to third and would have to battle for the final promotion place with Wigan and Gillingham, who both finished below them and Sunderland from Division Two.

The first leg of the Play-off semi-final at Wigan saw the home side get off to a flying start. A goal in only the second minute was sub get of the entrying such a good in only the second limited was followed by a second thirteen minutes itset: the ball bouncing of the body of Fraser Digby to allow Bobby Campbell to score. With just 20 minutes remaining it looked as though Swindon would be facing an uphil task in the second leg. Then Peter Coyne's pass found Jimmy Duinn and although his shot was blocked, it broke loose to Dave Bamber who made no mistake. Quinn himself got on the score sheet with a header as Town's fitness (a hailmark of the Macari era) began to tell. Then Coyne, rejected by Wigan as a teenager, put Swindon 3-2 up in the closing minutes, heading in a mark Jones cross A 0-0 draw in the second leg saw Swindon through to the final. At this sime the final was not played at Wembley but over two

legs instead and Town faced Gillingham in the final. Swindon's third place finish meant that the first leg was played at Gillingham and the only goal of the game came from the home side with just eight minutes remaining. A debatable free kick was awarded against Mark Jones for handball and David Smith drove the resultant shot through the Town wall. One goal is not too much to pull back but when Karl Eistrey volleyed home in the 17th minute of the second leg; Swindon's task began to look daunting. When a Steve White header struck the bar with Kite beaten, it began to seem as though it would not be Town's night. However, after 61 minutes, Peter Coyne wriggled through to shoot home and with just 10 minutes remaining, a left footer from 20 yards by Charlie Henry took the tie to a decider at Seihurst Park. Two goals by 'Chaikie' White were to take Town back to Division Two after 13 years. Steve's first came after just two minutes when he raced on to Phil King's free kick. The second came just after the hour; a looping ball from Dave Bamber was chested down by White who rode two tackles before striking a beautiful reverse angle shot. In the words of the Adver, "White lightning sends Town up."

At the beginning of the season, optimism was at best, tempered. That close call in the last match of the previous campaign against Peterborough was all too close for comfort, and the Danny Invicible Precouldury was an iou case to control, and the damy invicting strik which saved the day deep into injury time was only as important as Bristol Rovers' campaign to keep Town in Division Two. The bookies were making us one of the favourites to go down at the end of 2001/102 and the limited funds available to boister the squad suggested that as usual they might be on the mark. It seemed that here would have to be an overall improvement in team performances if the worst was to be avoided again. I confess to being pessimistic. Andy King had done well in

turning our fortunes around to beat the orong. but it seemed a fail order to ask him to achieve it again with little greater resource. Eric Sabin had won penalty after penalty with his runs into the box, and it didn't go un-noticed that they were often as a result of excellent through bails played by O'Halloran. A 2-0 win at Port Vale on 18th and a 1-1 draw mpton on 29th were the only points collected away from home, but a 2-0 home win against previously un-beaten Brentford was very encouraging. The match was particularly notable for the performance of Paul Edwards, on his home debut. Making an instant impression his speed and enthusiasm offered new alternatives on the left hand side of the pitch. Elimination from the Worthington Cup came at The Hawthorns on the 12th as WBA eased into round three with a 2-0 win

October was almost half way through before the first game brought a great victory in the derby game with Reading. The Roy were to have a season in which reversals were few and far betwee e Royals and the 3-1 win at the Madejski Stadium pleased Town supporters no end. Less welcome was the 3-0 home defeat by Cardiff City, a game that saw the return of Peter Thorne and the presence of the live cameras. Town did themselves few favours, always being second best to the Weish team and failing to create a good impression for the watching masses. Exiting the LDV Vans Trophy at the hands of Colchester, four points gained from matches against Cambridge and today's visitors Wycombe rounded off the month, with loan signing Wayne Carlisle contributing the goal that claimed a point at Adams

Eight goals were conceded and none scored in the first three League games in November with losses to Stoke, Blackpool and QPR, and the problems at both ends of the team were beginning to cause real concern as they inflicted damage on Town's League position. A 3-1 victory against Hartlepool in the FA Cup lightened the mood and the month concluded with four points from six against Brighton and Wrexha

As the end of 2001 drew near. December will probably be remembered as being the month that tresh turnoil struck the club, and the problems associated with the EGM have been well documented. With the departures of Danny Donegan and Ian Biatchley in favour of the present Wille Carson leadership, manager Boy Evans left on the 20th. The return of one of the three Kings on the 22nd was particularly applicable for the time of year, so i suppose it would have been little surprise if ex left back Phil King had also made a re-appearance. There can't be too many clubs that have reappointed a manager so soon after releasing him, but fown have now done so twice in Andy King and Lou Macari. Each time it has been successful and long may that continue to be the case.

Further progress was made in the FA Cup with a 3-2 home win against Hereford, but again results on the pitch were sporadic. The only League win of the month came on 29th when Bury were seen off 3-1, and flown finished the month only four points better off than when they started it.

The New Year saw Town in 13th position and more inclined to look worryingly over the shoulder at the looming relegation places than to look skywards to the play-off zone. The trip 'oop north' to take on Manchester City in the FA Cup was a welcome break from the League and a weicome boost to the coffers, although the gate of 21.581 was to prove to be one of the lower gates to attend Maine Road this season and may not have been as lucrative as we'd have Next A 2-0 elimination from the cup was the 'no quibbles' out-come. A second defeat of the season by Bristol City wasn't too gratefully received in Wiltshire but after losing 2-0 at Oktham, Town embarked on a five-match unbeaten run which cemented the League position at

If things were beginning to look a little comfortable Town became In usings with beginning to look a rule control table town became their consistently inconsistent selves by taiing to register a win or a goal in the next four attempts, although if the 0-0 draw against new table toppers Reading was a good performance, a repeat of the earlier 3-0 defeat against Cardiff was the opposite. Consecutive home wins against Chesterfield and Port Vale brought February to a close and commenced March, and it was the three points produced from the match with Vale that took Town to the 50 point mark and perceived Division Two survival. The, by now, traditional mid month slump saw Town record two defeats and a draw before collecting the customary and of month win in the keenly awaited home game against Steve McMahon's Blackpool. There weren't too many people in Witshire who were disappointed with that result, into the last month of the season and a trip to Stoke failed to yield points as did the visit of OPR, but already relegated Cambridge were despatched 2-1 at the Abbey Stadium. Squad shuffling was the order of Andy King's day as he used the last games of the season to formulate his plans for 2002/03. Town looked to have placed the Brighton championship party on ice with an excellent 0-0 draw at Withdean, but Reading's ure to win at home to Peterborough presented Brighton with the vswyne vrtoort

Follow "Huddersfield A62' signs through several sets of lights for 2.9 miles and then turn left (s/p Sheffield A629, Wakefield A642, McAlpine Stadium) into St Andrews Road. At lights after 0.2 miles (by Ford Cowie) turn left to OF Octoord

Within easy reach of the ground is a copious choice of pubs and restaurants. The nearest pubs to Niman Park include 'The Cornwall', 'The Cottage' and 'Legends'. The Cornwall is a friendly pub, which serves both hot, and cold snacks; to get there go to the end of Sloper Road towards Penarth Road, turn left after the Gulf petrol station The Cottage and the Legends Pub are both in St Mary Street both of which offer food. In this part of Cardiff you will be spollt for choice due to it being on the doorstep of the Millennium Stadium, where the area is well geared for catering for sporting events. Please do not encroach onto the playing surface. This is a criminal offence and all offenders will be arrested by the police, and prosecuted possibly resulting in a ban from all football stadia in the UK.

- Obsence chanting, obscene gestures, racist remarks, racist gestures, throwing of missiles, drunkenness or violent behaviour.
