PARKIN HITS THE NET - AGAIN

Swindon Town striker 'Super' Sam Parkin has found the net once again after being identified by BBC Sport Online as one of the 'players to watch' for this coming season. Parkin, who also features in this month's edition of FourFourTwo Magazine, scored 26 goals last season for Town after joining from Chelsea for £50,000 in the summer of 2002. He has been featured alongside other Second Division players including Tommy Doherty, Luke Beckett, Chris Armstrong and Kem Izzett.

AUGUST 3

VALLES SIGNS FOR HARRIERS

Kidderminster Harriers boss Ian Britton has signed former Town defender Adam Willis on a permanent deal. Willis, who signed for Town under Steve McMahon, began his career at Coventry City before moving to The County Ground in August 1998. Willis suffered last season with an ankle injury sustained at Barnsley and played twelve games last term. A popular figure during his time at The County Ground, 26-year old Willis has been taken on trial at Aggborough alongside Kyle Lightbourne, who has also spent time at Swindon, albeit on loan at the start of January 2001.

JULY 29

MILLS JOHNS THE ELITE

Town youngster Leigh Mills has joined the likes of Nick Barmby, Joe Cole and Michael Branch by earning the Player of the Tournament Award at the Milk Cup. Mills's assured displays at the centre of defence caught the eye of the tournament organisers, not to mention a host of other Clubs as he played his part in Town's 13th place finish. Mills joins former Town midfielder Scott Leitch, Daniel Nardiello (playing for Manchester United tonight), not to mention England stars Nick Barmby and Joe Cole as winners of the coveted award.

JULY 24

INVINCEBLE SKINS FOR MILITARINOCH

Australian U-23 international Gareth Edds agrees terms with First Division Bradford City. The 22-year old was signed by Town on a free transfer from Nottingham Forest last summer but despite starting the season at right-back, could not hold down

a regular place with Town Captain Andy Gurney taking up the right-back role on his return from suspension. He featured in eighteen games for Town lastseason and also played in two reserve team fixtures for Bradford City on trial.

JULY 22

TOWN GIVEN THE MOD

Swindon Town have now received verbal confirmation from the Football League that all of Andy King's summer signings can go ahead. The news now means that King and his team can move forward with the knowledge that the transfers have been finally sealed. Swindon Town Chief Executive Mark Devlin explained the situation. It is League policy that any Club subject to a CVA after coming out of Administration wishing to bring in a player, whether it be loan or permanent, must seek Football League approval before the deal can go ahead."

JULY 18

TOWN LAUNCH ONLINE SHOP

The Swindon Town Football Club Online shop was launched on July 18th. 



Thanking you in advance of what I'm sure will be a fantastic fan performance - enjoy the game and all the best for the new season.



















Igoe arrived at The County Ground having had previous spells with Portsmouth and Reading. After breaking into the first team at Fratton Park, Sammy went on to become a favourite at the south-coast club, making over 178 appearances before his performances caught the eye of Reading who tempted him to Berkshire with a £100,000 deal. He fell out of favour last season and only played twenty games for Alan Pardew's Royals - but their loss is our gain and since moving to Wiltshire over the summer, Igoe explains that he has enjoyed his time at Swindon so far. "I have been welcomed by everyone since day one and I feel that the club is going places - I certainly think that we can certainly achieve the same kind of success as Reading did. We got to the play-off final in our second season in this league and obviously the second year we went up so yes, it was a successful time - but there is no reason why we can't emulate them."

After a frustrating last season in the blue and white, Igoe is now relishing the fresh challenge that has been offered to him at the County Ground and the diminutive midfielder is hoping to become a regular fixture in what he anticipates, will be a successful side. "Any professional is in the game because they want to play every week and that is something that I want to do. I am hoping to start the season well and hold down a regular place here."

Igoe has also noticed a number of similarities between the two clubs. With Reading now in Division One, Igoe feels that there is a similar feeling held by his new employers. "When I first came to Reading they were fourth from the bottom and only had eight games left of the season - they just survived in the end. However, you could tell then that they were going places and the Manager was bringing in a type of player, and as I said they went up after the second season. I get the same vibe here at Swindon, there is certainly an air of optimism and we think we can go places."

Since the start of July, Town's players

have endured weeks of fitness training, but aside from the normal pre-season grind, the players enjoyed a three-day break in Devon where they played Bideford and Torquay United at Plainmoor. Igoe recognises the need for such trips and believes they have an important part to play in terms of team building. "Pre-season is a very important time for any player and the trips away are a great idea. It is a bonding session and everyone has to interact. At the training ground it is not quite the same as being away somewhere. You speak to certain people, but being away you are put into a totally different environment. You are together 24 hours a day and it is also a break from the training facilities back at the Club."

Town Manager Andy King has brought in a healthy blend of youth and experience this summer, with Igoe amongst the eight new faces. From Viveash and Reeves to Howard and Stevenson, Igoe explains the need for such a balance. "There is a good blend to the squad now of young and old, which you need in order to be successful. At the later stage of the season you need the experience there to maybe pick some of the younger lads up, to get things going on a cold night at Grimsby or Hartlepool for example. There is a good mix though and it is looking


The majority of Town's new signings have all highlighted the Town's training ground as a significant factor in their arrival at the Club. This is a fact that is not lost on Igoe who feels that Town have one of the best in the Football League. "The training ground has certainly impressed me. I think it is better than Reading's to be honest. It has to be up there quality wise and there are a lot of pitches which does help, especially during the winter months."

The winter months, for the time being, are a long way off and before the rain descends we've got the small matter of

Sheffield Wednesday's visit to negotiate this afternoon, "Sheffield Wednesday will be a very organised side, last time they gave me a bit of a rough time after about fifteen minutes. I ended up having stitches and all sorts so it will be a tough game no doubt. It is the first game of the season and I understand Saturday is set to be one of the hottest days of the year! With the heat, you just have to be sensible. The wife wanted to go to the beach on Wednesday, but I refused because the sun really does drain you. To compensate for the heat all you can do is eat properly and drink a lot of fluid because you will certainly sweat a lot out on the pitch. It will be a tough game but we will be ready for them. We are looking forward to it and I am sure we will win come 4.45pm Saturday afternoon."

Good afternoon and a very warm welcome to you all at the start of a brand new season. On behalf of the directors at Swindon Town, can I also offer a very warm welcome to the directors, management, players and supporters of Sheffield Wednesday.

Like all fans, I look forward with a real sense of excitement to the beginning of a new season. This season, much more so than a year ago, there is a growing feeling around the Club, the town and supporters that, as a Club, we are about to embark on a new beginning. Our new signings give us all hope that we can push on from last year's tenth-place finish.

Off the field we have got our financial situation under control. Of course, things can go awry; crowds fall off, sponsorship and marketing activity can falter, but we now operate to a strict financial budget, and there is one reality that will underpin our growth and development. That is to not spend more than we can make as a Club and business. But, as we have with our new signings, this does not mean we cannot bring quality to the Club in an effort to seek continual improvement.


I was made aware, and it made me smile, that as the new signings were announced, there was concern amongst fans that we were returning to the previous ways - signing players we couldn't afford. To put the record straight, we let seven players go at the end of the last season. We have brought in eight new signings - mostly

players with experience of playing in a higher division - and on a like-for-like basis we have been able to reduce our expenditure.

Players are incentivised to achieve play-offs and promotion, and we already have in place an agreed increase (or decrease) if we are promoted (or, god forbid, relegated) with all our players. Of course, if success on the pitch increases our income above budget through improved attendances, then we will be able to consider adding to the playing squad. At this point I must thank Trust STFC, the Supporters Club and all our supporters who have set up and contributed to the Red Army Fund. This is an initiative for supporters who can afford to contribute to a fund aimed at assisting the Club in bringing in new players when the Club has no further budget to spend on new acquisitions, be they loan signings or permanent ones.

You may also be aware that the Club has finally got itself free of the debenture held against it by the previous directors of the Club. If we had been unable to achieve this, it could well have meant that the Club would have fallen into significant financial problems again. I would like to thank everyone who has played a part in negotiating the successful outcome to this issue; they deserve the thanks of everyone associated with the Club.

The Football League computer has given us a wonderful fixture to start



the season, with a visit from many pundits' favourites for promotion to Division One. There should be a big crowd and a fantastic atmosphere in the County Ground today, please play your part and raise the roof with the volume of your support, helping the players to an opening day win.

Enjoy the game and thanks for your support.

VINTAGE RED

We've all got one, a collection of footballing items that we've kept in the attic for a rainy day. Dick Mattick's is bigger than most, especially when it comes to Swindon Town and each week he'll be delving into his box of tricks to find something relating to the opposition of the day.

Today's item is a picture of the Wednesday squad of the season 1979/80. Most notable is the unmistakeable figure of Jack Charlton, the manager at the time, and Maurice Setters (Man Utd wing half and later to be part of Jack Charlton's coaching team with Ireland).

The squad was a successful one for Wednesday won promotion by finishing in Third position in Division Three. They were undoubtedly helped by the huge gates at Hillsborough - the average for League matches was 18,288, over 6,000 more than any club in the Division except local rivals Sheffield United. Wednesday's promotion was also probably due to the ability to

pick up points away from home as they lost only four games on their travels. Ten matches were drawn and nine won.

What of Swindon at this time? The gate average was 8,683. Andy Rowland with 20 goals and Alan Mayes with 19 made sure that scoring goals in the League was not a problem, but a suspect defence (which leaked 63 goals) and a poor away record, with only four matches won and four drawn, meant Town finished a mid-table tenth. Cup endeavours may also have distracted Town from promotion. Town reached the League Cup semifinal before losing to Wolves and in the FA Cup overcame Brentford. Torquay and Luton before losing in a Fourth Round replay to a Tottenham team featuring Ossie Ardiles and Glenn Hoddle, both who would later become managers at the County Ground.

What of the matches between Swindon and Wednesday that season? In late September Town travelled to Yorkshire and lost out in

a high scoring game 4-2, with Alan Mayes and Ray McHale with a penalty contributing the Town goals. The return fixture at the County Ground was played on February 9 and attracted the highest League crowd of the season at the County Ground: 16,417. Town manager, Bobby Smith, had just collected a Manager of the Month Award and the match was seen as a clash of two promotion contenders, for whilst Town were six points behind leaders Grimsby Town, the Reds had five games in hand! Johnson gave the visitors the lead with a 25 yard shot after 14 minutes - Alan Mayes had a number of chances to equalise, but his finishing was uncharacteristically wayward. A slightly harsh penalty when Grant climbed on Kamara's shoulders allowed McHale to convert his second penalty of the season and he might have had a third when Mike Pickering appeared to catch Rowland's leg with a sliding tackle in the box. Five minutes from time a speedy burst down the left by Curran set up 18 year old Taylor for what proved to be the winning goal.


SHEFFIELD WEDNESDAY

SHEFFIELD WEDNESDAY - WELCOME VISITORS TO THE COUNTY GROUND FOR THE OPENING LEAGUE GAME OF THE 2003/04 SEASON, ARE PLAYING SECOND DIVISION FOOTBALL FOR THE FIRST TIME SINCE 1980.

And for such a big club (they were in the Premiership just three years ago), their recent history has been encapsulated by under-achievement and a revolving door of both players and managers alike. But as they say, life must go on and 13,000 season ticket sales (at the time of writing) suggest that the fans are doing their bit in an effort to take Wednesday back to the big time.

After a rather dismal 2001/02 season, when they huffed and puffed at the wrong end of the Division and eventually finished in a moderate 20th position (just two points clear of relegation), the Owls were hoping for a much better campaign last term. Unfortunately it never happened and an horrendous start to the campaign left them with a mountain to climb after Christmas. Things simply didn't go according to plan and manager Terry Yorath was replaced in the hot seat by Chris Turner, still in charge, and he knows full well that it's going to be a tough campaign between now and May - no less than six sides (currently in Division Two) have come down from the top flight and have failed to negotiate their way out of Division Two.

During the summer recess, after eight players departed, Turner has introduced a handful of new faces to the club (including Graeme Lee and Paul Smith from Hartlepool, Ola Tidman from Stockport and Robbie Mustoe from Charlton) and he's anticipating that things will improve, especially in front of their own supporters (their average home gate is expected to reach at least 15,000). They say in football, win two thirds of your home games and a quarter of your away fixtures and you have a chance of finishing in the top three. Only time will tell.....

Chris had stepped into the hot-seat at Victoria Park at the end of February 1999, his first solo managerial post in the league after a successful spell as manager of Wolverhampton Wanderers youth team under Mark McGhee. Formerly joint manager of Leyton Orient during troubled times alongside John Sutton, Turner had a distinguished playing career between the posts, most notably with Manchester United, Sunderland and Sheffield Wednesday, but also with spells at Lincoln and Leeds.

His first task at Hartlepool was to preserve the club's league status, which he was just able to achieve with a strong finish to the 1998/99 season.

He then began to look towards building a team capable of achieving promotion to Division Two and came close in each of the following three seasons. Looking to avoid further heartache, Chris hoped to gain automatic promotion and got off to a fantastic start in 2002-03, taking his team to the top of the table in the first quarter of the campaign. The former Owls keeper always seemed destined to manage at a higher level and was linked with several vacancies during his four-year tenure with Hartlepool. However, it was the lure of a return to his home-town and the chance to manage the club he supported as a boy that tempted him away from Victoria Park.





Although it took a little time to settle into his new surroundings, Kuqi's goals kept County in Division One and it wasn't long before he was attracting the attention of a number of scouts, who had become regular visitors to Edgeley Park.

Blackburn Rovers boss Graeme Souness tried to sign him but when that move fell through, Sheffield Wednesday boss Terry Yorath was waiting in the wings and signed the 25-year-old for £1million in December 2001. 15 goals in nearly 60 starts hasn't been a bad return and he finished last season as the Club's top scorer with eight.

Jon Stevenson, signed in the summer from Leicester City, added Town's third just before the interval. Alan Reeves' men continued their rich vein of scoring when Stevenson made it 4-0 just past the hour before Mark Draycott hit Town's fifth to seal a comfortable win for Town.

The 17s and 19s started off with a friendly against Tranmere Rovers, as they do every year, and they travelled up to Merseyside to play the whites at the Club's training ground. "It's always a good experience for the boys to play a good side like Tranmere. It's a good benchmark of how we're getting on because Tranmere are in a higher league. We have a good relationship with them, although we've not beaten them before and unfortunately a mixture of 17s and 19s lost 3-1."

The under 17s then travelled to face Tottenham at Bisham Abbey. As a measure of the difference between the two clubs, Spurs were using the training centre as a base for five days and after three thirty minute periods, they drew 4-4 (scorers were Hulgate, Lewis, Valentine and Pook). "Again it was a good measure to see how we got one," explained Busby. "There was some good football played from both sides and it's just good to see how clubs of Tottenham's size are getting on in comparison to purselyes."

Since then many of the third year scholars have played for the reserves whilst more recently games against Southampton and Brighton for both the 17s and 19s have seen some positive results. The 17s went down to the odd goal against Southampton whilst the 19s, thanks to goals from Kyle Lapham and Mark Draycott - defeated the Premiership side 2-1. Last week the 17s overturned Brighton 2-1 (with goals from Lewis and Salter) and the 19s 1-0, with Mark Draycott securing the winner. These games prove that we can compete with the top sides on no budget whatsoever. I'm sure that following the defeat, Southampton will now go out and buy the odd player we just don't have that luxury. All we can do is try and nurture our own youngsters from the area and get them as close to the First Team as possible. Last year four or five lads experienced First Team action (Luke Garrard, Dave Bampton, Ian Herring, Chris Taylor and Mark Draycott) and we want more to get that chance. For those that have already played for the professional squad, it is up to them to try and prove that they can do it on a regular basis to both myself and 'the gaffer' because a decision will have to be made on them by Christmas."




"Before we even got to Wembley we enjoyed some fantastic games in the semi-finals. The two matches against Tranmere were some of the most memorable from my time at the Club and they will always stick with me. The first game was phenominal - we got off to a great start and when we walked away from the game 3-1 up - I think we all made the mistake of thinking that the tie was over. But the atmosphere on that particular day absolutely phenominal. We then travelled up to their place and all we had to do was keep it tight. There were a few scary moments and it was such a tight game, all I remember is pulling off a save that had I not got it, would have made the score about 3-1 and we would have been all square. It was a strike from John Aldridge and he was that desperate to score, he tried to claim that it was over the line!

The night before the final itself we stayed at the Marriot hotel in Slough. To be honest it hadn't really sunk in what

we were doing and we spent the night just walking around, wasting time. It wasn't until the drive in on the coach the next day that we started to realise what we were doing and the butterflies certainly started going in the stomach. You start off with the drive down Wembley Way and you can then see the Twin Towers. After that it's the see of blue and red as you get to see all the fans before you then make your way underneath the stand - that's when the nerves hit you, that's when you think about the task in hand. But to see that many Town fans in our end of the ground was awe-inspiring.

The game itself was a close affair, 'the gaffer' gave us the lead with a superbly curled shot and at half time he was just telling us to keep it together. We looked tight at the back and so we thought if we could hold them off, especially at the start of the half, then we might be able to knick another. We certainly did that, and then added a third




and I think even the players thought that the job was done there and then. The rest, as they say, is history - and when it got to three-all I honestly thought we'd lose. We were all so shocked and we could feel the disappointment on the terraces - it was awful. We went from being absolutely ecstatic to being in the depths of despair. To be fair, I thought one of their goals was a foul which was never given, but you just have to get on with the task in hand and luckily 'Chalkie' got us out of jail by earning a penalty. Paul Bodin was the brave man that stepped to take it, as he had done all season - but just think of the pressure he must have been under on the run-up?! People always ask me if I think it was a penalty and Chalkie is, to this day, adamant that it was a penalty - so I'll take his word for it!

"To be honest, the celebrations kind of passed me by, it was a big 'do' in the De Vere Hotel and the relief was just incredible. I think to have won it in the way that we did

made us even more appreciative of what we'd done. But the memory that will always stick with me, more than the game itself and the celebrations that night - was the drive home. Seeing the people lining up on the bridges and the sea of red that just engulfed Swindon on our return was absolutely incredible."

When asked if he still keeps in touch the lads, Fraser said that unfortunately, it's been a while since he spoke to any of them.

Football is a funny old game - at the time a lot of my friends were outside of football and so when we all went our seperate ways - I didn't keep in touch with them. I still speak to Shaun Taylor now and again and I was on the phone to Paul Bodin last week - other than that we've all kind of moved on, but no doubt the events from 1993 will live long in all of our minds?"





WE MEET AGAIN...

DAVE WALLIS RETURNS FROM HIS SUMMER BREAK REFRESHED AND READY TO DELVE INTO HIS ARCHIVES TO PROVIDE US WITH TWO PLAYERS, ONE FAMILIAR AND ANOTHER NOT SO FAMILIAR, THAT HAVE PLAYED FOR BOTH CLUBS.

Born in Bristol on December 28th 1967, leftback Phil started his career with 27 appearances for Exeter, signing as a professional after completing an apprenticeship in January 1985.

In July of 1986 Torquay offered the Grecians £3,000 and Phil made the short trip to the coast. With Exeter finishing the previous season fourth from bottom of Division Four, he had 'upgraded' his career by joining the club that had finished bottom in consecutive seasons and he immediately contributed to the 'improvement' that lifted the Gulls one place in 1986/87. By the end of that season however, Phil had become upwardly mobile by moving to Wiltshire after 24 League outings in Devon.

King joined a club that were sitting in their highest League position in years. Promoted as Fourth Division champions the previous season, Town were competing for a top six place in the first year that play-off places were up for grabs. Fast forward to May and he was cracking the champagne at Selhurst Park as Swindon clinched promotion to the Second Division with a win over Gillingham in the final. Phil King had become a Second Division player after just three months in the Third.

After 116 League matches the arrival of Paul Bodin in March 1988 put pressure on King's place and in November 1989 £400,000 was accepted to take Phil to Hillsborough in the top division. By now he was used to rapid divisional changes so he wouldn't have been surprised that Wednesday dropped back into the Second Division six months after his move to Sheffield, or that they should go straight back up again the following year.

In 1991/92, a magnificent season at Hillsborough saw Wednesday finish third behind champions Leeds and their fellow United from Manchester, against whom Phil also gained a League Cup winners medal. Adding a similar, but differently coloured

medal in the same competition twelve months later, King had made almost 130 League appearances for Wednesday and featured in a loan spell at Notts County when he completed a move to Aston Villa in August 1994 for a fee of £250,000.

When a player's records show that he had a 15-year career but that he failed to make an appearance for eight of them, you can be sure that there is a bigger story to tell! David Layne (known as Bronco) was born in Sheffield in July 1939 and began his career with Rotherham whom he joined in the summer of 1957. After four goals in eleven appearances, centre-forward Layne made his way south to Swindon in June 1959, dropping from second to third division as a result, and the goals started to flow.

20 goals in 27 League appearances followed in 1959/60 as Layne finished top goal scorer ahead of Jimmy Gauld. With another eight before Christmas the following season, including a hat-trick against Bristol City, Layne was drawing attention to himself and a move back north took him to Bradford City in December 1960. The goals continued with another 44 in just 65 League outings and in February 1962 with City now in Division Four, Sheffield Wednesday, runners-up in Division One in 1960/61, took Layne from the bottom to the top division of the Football League.

The goals kept coming. 52 of them in 74
League matches as Wednesday set about finishing sixth in Division One three seasons on the trot, but one match in particular was to have an important bearing on Layne's career. A December 1962 defeat against Ipswich at Portman Road hardly raised an eyebrow at the time but it later emerged that Layne, in cahoots with former teammate Jimmy Gauld, had conspired to arrange the result to assist a fixed odds betting coup. Altogether ten players were implicated and Gauld was sentenced to four years in jail while Layne received a fourmonth sentence and a life ban from football.

It's been a quiet summer in terms of new signings around the division - but here's what everyone else is up to ahead of today's big kick-off...



OLDHAM ATHLETIC manager lain Dowie has urged his chairman Barry Chaytow to give his team a fighting chance by quickly resolving the Boundary Park's cashflow problems. The Latics took a giant step towards fending off liquidation recently when owner Chris Moore agreed, perhaps reluctantly, to sell his 95% shareholding and to write-off the club's debt of £4.5 million. Commercial manager Sean Jarvis and the club's accountant Neil Joy, who both helped mastermind the financial deal, have both been installed as new directors to join local businessman Chaytow on the board. Even former Latics' striker and manager Andy Ritchie has urged the supporters to rally round and turn up in their thousands to help inject some more money into the club.



Brian Talbot, boss of newlypromoted RUSHDEN & DIAMONDS, who wrote another chapter in his amazingly short managerial career by bringing the Northamptonshire club up a Division, has already stated publicly that he will be hoping for more of the same this season with promotion firmly in his and his player's minds. He believes his former non-League outfit can cause a massive surprise. There are some especially good players at Nene Park and he has some financial clout to boost his squad even more if need be. A play-off place is certainly on the cards whether or not automatic promotion can be gained is a different story however.



Wilson is another who thinks his side is good enough to win promotion, likewise lan Holloway's unpredictable **QUEEN'S PARK RANGERS** who missed out in last season's Play-off final to Cardiff City. Both Wilson and Holloway have seen it (and done it) all before but they are experienced campaigners and are confident of having a good season as against a disappointing one. However, the Hoops are facing a cash crisis after Brisbane-based businessman David Thorne withdrew his offer to invest £2million in the club in return for shares. QPR chief executive David Davies described the news as "a hammer blow for the club." He added: "My priority now is to discuss the situation with both the chairman of the Plc (Ross Jones) and the chairman of the club (Nick Blackburn) before making any further statements."



PLYMOUTH ARGYLE, fresh from an eventful pre-season tour to Austria where they took on three Second Division clubs and struggled, as well as having a player sent-off (Paul Connolly), did well in a home friendly against premiership side Charlton Athletic (drawing 2-2). Manager Paul Sturrock, obviously delighted with the result, has insisted that his players need to be more committed and believe in themselves. It may be another season of consolidation for the Pilgrims whose form at Home Park may well decide their fate whether they finish above halfway or in the bottom half dozen. One summer signing by Argyle was that of 19 year-old left-back Peter Gilbert from Birmingham City



LUTON TOWN, who could be a danger if they can string together some important runs, are chasing Dean Holdsworth, Coventry City's 34 year-old former Wimbledon and Bolton striker. Indeed, they may well have secured his signature by the time you read these notes. Meanwhile Hatters' chairman John Gurney is having a showdown soon with the Football League regarding his consortium control of the Kenilworth Road club that took effect last May.



BARNSLEY have sold Chris Morgan to neighbours Sheffield United. The 25 yearold served notice that he would cancel his own contract after the Tykes had refused to pay him three months wages! Meanwhile, **BRIGHTON** have invited former Manchester United winger Andrei Kanchelskis to train with them. The 34-yearold is keeping his fitness up after returning from Saudi Arabia club Al-Hilal last season. Assistant boss Bob Booker said: "He's here just to do fitness work. We are convenient for him, and he asked us if he could come and train, so we said that was fine," he told the club's website.



PETERBOROUGH manager Barry Fry was hoping to clinch a loan move for Birmingham midfielder Curtis Woodhouse by the end of last week. Woodhouse joined the Second Division side for preseason training last week, but Fry must wait until Blues boss Steve Bruce returns from Malaysia to begin negotiations. "He was (Bruce) due back on Wednesday or Thursday so I had to wait until then to speak to him," Woodhouse was tipped as an England midfielder of the future while at Sheffield United but has struggled since moving to the Blues for £1m in 2001. He was left out of the 20man Blues squad taking part in the FA Premier League Asia Cup in Malaysia.

The experience gained by the players and staff has been fantastic, as we can test our players against those from top Premier League Academies and Foreign Clubs. The NI Milk Cup was again a superb tournament, with the actual tournament celebrating it's 21st Anniversary. Over 15,000 people greeted 56 teams through the streets of Coleraine and into it's main show ground, this in itself is something our players have never experienced before. To qualify for the Milk Cup finals we had to finish top of our group or as a best runner up, we finished our group in second place with the following record: P3 W2 L1 F3 A2 Pts 6.

We beat Kilmarnock 2-1 in the opening game with two goals from Joe Arnold.

In our second game we were beaten 0-1 against Racing Club Argentina and in our final game against County Antrim we won 1-0, Leigh Mills scoring the goal. This was only good enough to finish second and we lost out on goal difference in qualifying for the Milk Cup, so we entered the BT Trophy Final.

In our first game we played Kaizer Chiefs from South Africa, we had enough chances to win the game but we

couldn't apply the finishing touch. This meant the game finished 0-0 and the game had to be decided on penalties. We lost on pens 7-8 which was disappointing, but as I told the players afterwards, it was our lack of conviction in front of goal that proved to be our downfall. This put us into a place game against Norwich City a game where we produced a 'Jekyl and Hyde' performance. We were 0-1 down at half time, but went on to win the game 2-1 thanks to two great setpiece goals from Leigh Mills, with two great balls from Ben Well. This set us up nicely for our final game against NK Factor from Slovenia which we won 1-0, our goal scored by Joe Arnold.

To finish 13th out of 24 teams is a fantastic achievement, but the coaches and I did feel the lads could of performed even better although our tournament record was very good, P6 W4 D1 L1, and the team we lost to, Racing Club, actually won the tournament.

One thing we did win was Player Of The Tournament, our centre half Lee Mills deservedly won the award and he joins the likes of Scott Leitch (ex STFC) Nick Barmby, Keith Gillespie and Joe Cole twice to have won this award. For a player from STFC to win such an award is fantastic and as a youth department and a club it's a massive achievement, but the players deserves all the credit he gets as he is the player who has done it. Leigh could not have done this with out his teammates and everyone involved in the trip was a credit to themselves, their families and STFC.

So from me I'd like to thank my staff Roger Reeves, Nick Gorman and Martin Allen but especially the players. Well done lads. In next weeks notes I will write about our trip to the lan Rush tournament. At half time today our four teams that went on tour will parade around the pitch, please give them a massive cheer as they all deserve one.
