On the way down to Swindon for the game against Sheffield Wednesday, at 12.15 we heard on the radio that Watford's opening home game had been postponed due to 'a fatality' - no further news was given. To postpone any opening game is a big story and we were mystified as to the reason. On arrival at the County Ground, the mood was of excitement, we expected our biggest home league game for years, it was a hot sultry day, our manager had assembled an impressive team-full of promise and the fans were full of optimism. Soon the news filtered through, at one time it was rumoured two Watford players had been killed on the M6. The realisation that last year's loan star Jimmy Davis could be involved subdued the staff and press already working at the ground.

How ironic that in our opening day programme, a fan named his favourite all time team and included Jimmy at number 8 despite only just over a dozen games played. Soon our worst fears were realised, the lone driver killed on the M40 was Jimmy Davis. The tributes in the press on Sunday and Monday confirmed the affection for this young star with the world at his feet. Sir Alex Ferguson said "You could not meet a nicer and more bubbly character, Jimmy was a player with real potential." I confess that I wrote to Sir Alex when Jimmy's loan period was up, thanking him and asking if we could have him back!

Word obviously got out as during the game, "There is only one Jimmy Davis" could be heard from the Town end. Thanks Jimmy for entertaining us on & off the pitch.

TOWN ISSUE STATEMENT

Swindon Town issue a statement in response to actions taken by certain members of the crowd attending the Swindon vs Sheffield Wednesday fixture. During the match between Swindon Town and Sheffield Wednesday, two Swindon fans ran onto the field of play. One of these attempted to assault an away player. A large number of coins were also found on the pitch at the Town End of the stadium. Mark Devlin, Chief Executive at Swindon Town FC said: The reputation of our Club, and our fans, has been tarnished by the mindless behaviour of a small minority of our supporters who ran onto the pitch and threw coins. The Club has decided to ban for life from The County Ground, those identified for committing these acts. We welcome information from our fans that will lead to the identification of any persons who threw coins onto the pitch. Any person who commits these acts or goes onto the trackside or pitch will automatically be subject to a life ban from the Club. This is in addition to any action the Courts may deem necessary'

The FA have written to the club requesting our view of the events and we have sent our response. There is clearly potential for the FA to apply penalties against the Club if they deem it necessary. It goes without saying that the actions of these individuals could cost the Club dear," said Devlin. Jim Neighbour, the Wiltshire Police Football Intelligence Officer, based at Swindon Police Station, said: "The police take a dim view of going onto the pitch, coin throwing and similar activity. All people involved in such activities will be dealt with according to the Acts covering football matches."

He was so enthusiastic and was very committed to succeeding as a footballer – his energy rubbed off on others and I will always celebrate the way he lived his young life. The day he passed away was a sad one for us all, but I can only pass on my condolences to his family. In fact, I have invited his father to be with us today and if he is here, reading these notes, he will know how much we all thought of him. May he rest in peace.

VS SHEFFIELD WEDNESDAY

Town felt the heat on the hottest weekend in history when promotion favourites Sheffield Wednesday steamed into a three goal lead in 24 blistering minutes. However new-look Swindon refused to lie down and sun bathe in 100 plus degrees pulling back two goals before time ran out on a 2-3 home defeat. The fight-back must have resulted in a cold sweat for the Wednesday supporters as Town's spirited performance nearly earned a point, writes STFC Sports Reporters Adrian Smith and Simon Cov.

A Stefani Miglioranzi header and a debut goal from a quick Sammy Igoe free-kick replied to early strikes for the Owls from Owusu and Kugi, after a Steve Robinson own goal had given the Yorkshire side the lead in front of an expectant crowd of over 10,500 basking in the sun and the early season cheer.

Disaster struck from Wednesday's first attack in the fourth minute when Bart Griemink lost control of an Evans cross and the ball crept in off Steve Robinson as Owusu wheeled away to try and claim the goal.

Duke's long throw in to Mooney resulted in a smart turn by Igoe but his return pass to Mooney was just too long. Igoe had another shot shortly afterwards which went wide and the same player had a dipping shot moments later which went just over the crossbar. Duke took a quick throw-in to Mooney but his cross just evaded Parkin.

Moments later there was controversy when Igoe seemed to be fouled just outside the Wednesday area, but the referee waved play on and from the resulting attack Kugi passed to Owusu who this time was definitely the first to the ball and he volleyed home.

Swindon came back strongly through Parkin and Igoe resulting in a corner but Robinson 's shot was charged down. However the dominant Wednesday side went further ahead when Kugi tapped home a cross by Evans in the 24th minute and the bookies favourites looked to be heading for a comfortable victory.

Robinson persistence paid off on the half hour when he tricked his way through to the right hand byeline and Miglioranzi headed home Town's first League goal of the season from Turbo's pinpoint cross.

Then a clash of heads between Mooney and Barry-Murphy resulted in a lengthy stoppage while the Wednesday player was treated. From the restart a neat link up between Miglioranzi and Igoe resulted a good shot by Igoe which went just wide. Miglioranzi was also on the end of a move involving Duke and Parkin

Duke and Mooney linked up well but the former Birmingham man was unable to get a clear shot and although Swindon enjoyed a good period of possession including a 25 yard freekick by Mooney and a close range shot by Parkin they were unable to reduce the deficit further in the 2 minutes of injury time. The referee Mr Knight blew up to end proceedings on a very hot first half.

Wednesday kicked off and were swiftly on the attack which resulted in a corner but it was cleared by the Swindon defence. Quinn became the first player to be cautioned when he fouled Gurney. From the resulting Gurney freekick Igoe's cross was headed just over by a lively looking Parkin.

Gurney was involved in another

move with Parkin but Tidman was quickly off his line to intercept. Robinson, Igoe and Mooney linked up in a superb attack, which resulted in an Igoe corner dealt with comfortably by Tidman.

Igoe and Robinson were again working well together soon after but a Wednesday defender slid in and Tidman collected the ball. At the other end Gurney was cautioned after a difference of opinion with Owusu. As Swindon continued to push forward another good move involving Hewlett and Robinson resulted in Parkin's cross just evading Mooney's head.

Finally Town's good work paid off. Viveash and Mooney linked up well but Mooney was tripped from behind. Igoe took a very clever quick freekick that struck the post and went in for Swindon's second goal and this increased the noise levels in the County Ground, as Kuqi was booked for protesting about the kick. Swindon were quickly on the attack again striving for the equaliser. Mooney had a good shot after some further trickery by Igoe and at the other end a Wednesday freekick was headed away by Hewlett. Matt Heywood became the second Swindon player to be cautioned for dissent and Armstrong became the second Wednesday player to be cautioned. Richard Wood replaced Evans as the first substitute in the 21st minute and moments later Griemink was almost caught out when a defensive clearance ricocheted back off a Wednesday forward but the ball went just wide.

Igoe was featuring in plenty of the action and his chip over the Wednesday defence was just caught by Tidman. A Wednesday attack by Kuqi ended up with Holt being fouled and from the freekick Griemink made a smart instinctive save. Moments later Wednesday had the ball in the net through Kuqi but it was ruled out for offside and immediately Brian Howard replaced Hewlett in the Swindon midfield. Howard made an immediate impact when his goalbound freekick was tipped over by Tidman.

An Igoe corner resulted in a Gurney header which was deflected by the lively looking Howard and Parkin had a superb solo run but was unable to get a clear shot on goal. Wednesday replaced Quinn with Steve Haslam as the heat took its toll and Swindon brought on Jon Stevenson for Igoe after the influential midfield maestro picked up a knock.

Referee Barry Knight blew the final whistle with Swindon on the attack and although the result went against them the Robins can be pleased with an excellent performance after a slow start on a stifling hot afternoon.

TOWN VS SOUTHEND UNITED

Premiership big guns Leeds United await Town's visit after Mooney's winner capped off a solid Swindon second half showing at Southend writes STFC Sports Reporter Simon Coy.

Swindon's 199 travelling fans were over the moon as Tommy fired home in the 72nd minute to seal a 3:2 away win. The strike by Mooney capped a strong second half fight back by Town after another slow start left them trailing 2:1 at the break. Super Sammy Parkin began the revival levelling just after half time having already kept Town in the game with a first half goal in an opening 45 that twice saw Southend take the lead.

Southend United started the game the stronger side with Town once again slow out of the starting blocks. A quick free kick from Mark Gower was cleared by Steve Robinson for a corner in the first minute. Moments later a Kevin Maher cross was once again cleared by the alert Robinson.

Swindon's first attack came in the 6th min when a volleyed cross into the box by left wingback Grant Smith was too long for Jon Stevenson. At the other end Southend surged forward again and a sharp shot from Maher was caught by debutant keeper Rhys Evans.

After 11 minutes the pressure paid off for the Shrimpers. A corner from Jupp was played out to Gower who chipped into the box from the edge and Maher headed past the despairing Evans.

Southend continued to look the better side but a combination of the experienced Alan Reeves and the alert Evans ensured that long balls were being dealt with.

As the half continued Swindon came into the game more. A long ball forward from Evans found Robinson. He then fed Igoe who pushed the ball on to Howard but he was once again tackled by the ever alert Cort for a corner. Sammy Igoe whipped in the corner but the referee judged that Reeves was climbing on the defender and the attack came to nothing.

Swindon finally came back into the game in the 34th minute. A long ball from Viveash was controlled well by Stevenson. He drew the keeper and then slipped the ball out to his left to Parkin who had ghosted into the box in support. Super Sam hit the ball first time across the goal into the opposite corner of the net and Town were level.

However Swindon only managed to stay on equal terms for 4 minutes. After 38 minutes Southend produced another quick fire attack. Gower crossed into the feet of Husbands who tricked past Hewlett in centre of box. He sent a short pass over to Broughton whose shot went past Evans from 10 yards.

A clearly revitalised Swindon had the perfect start to the second half with an

early goal from super Sam Parkin. In the 48th minute Igoe dribbled forwards and played the ball into Robinson. He took ball to bye line before cutting it back for Sam Parkin who swept home from 6 yards.

Soon after another good Swindon build up saw the ball break again to Parkin but he was pulled up for pushing McSweeney and the move broke down.

Smith's deep angled cross in the 54th minute was just beyond the diving Mooney on the far side of the six yard box. Half time substitute Stefani Miglioranzi exchanged passes with Igoe skipped round two players and then shot low from 12 yards but the Southend keeper was equal to it.

In the 59th minute Southend showed that

they were still not ruling out winning the tie as they once again tested Evans. The England U21 keeper was equal to it as he made a great save down to his left from a powerful Jupp downward header.

On 68 minutes a great passing move involving Igoe and Miglioranzi created space just inside the box only for the United defence to foil yet another Town attack. Matt Hewlett was then booked for kicking the ball away. The resulting free-kick saw the ball crossed into the box, deceiving Viveash and falling at the feet of Drewe Broughton at the back post. The big striker controlled neatly before firing the ball fiercely towards goal only to be foiled by the athletic Evans.

On 72 minutes Town went ahead for the first time in the game. A free-kick MAN OF THE MATCH (AS VOTED FOR BY FANS ON



from Grant Smith floated over to Parkin whose header found Viveash at the back post. Viveash's header deflected off the post to the feet of Mooney who hammered his shot across goal into the far corner of the net. The popular striker then celebrated in front of the ecstatic 199 travelling fans behind the goal. Both players and supporters knew that Town had earned the winner with an impressive second half performance.

In the remaining quarter of the game Town continued their attacking play with some neat one-touch football but Southend did not give up the cause. United Boss Steve Wignall introduced Tes Bramble on 78 minutes and the big striker was soon in the thick of the action as he was booked for taking down Evans eight yards out. The referee Mr D Crick consulted his linesman before producing a yellow card.

In the closing stages Tommy Mooney saw his 25-yard effort easily gathered and Parkin missed out on a hat-trick after being foiled inside the box by the United backline. Overall it was a game of contrasting fortunes as Town showed their class in the second period.

We're all over the Mooney!

TOMMY MOONEY HAS CERTAINLY BECOME THE FAN'S FAVOURITE SINCE HIS SWITCH FROM BIRMINGHAM CITY - AND FOLLOWING ON FROM HIS PRE-SEASON OPTIMISM, MIKE JUDD SPOKE TO 'THE MOON' AT THE TRAINING GROUND.

Tommy explained that since he joined us in the second week of June, he has been disappointed that injury kept him out for three weeks. "The foot injury has affected my return to full fitness, but a combination of rest and the training helps, but it's games that give you the fitness and three matches in six days obviously has been useful. I'm now a bit quicker, but there's a fine line between getting your fitness back and resting enough so that you are 100% again for the next game, especially when they are only two or three days apart. The Friday night game against Colchester didn't help because a Saturday game would have given me a bit more time, but you just have to get on with it and not worry about it. If you worry about it then that's probably when you're not going to perform to your maximum level and at this stage in the season all you want to do is get maximum points on the board. After the disappointment of the game against Sheffield Wednesday we just wanted to play the next league game. It was a great win against Southend (in the Carling Cup), but it's the points we need to concentrate on. So it was great to get the points against a good Colchester side and we can certainly build on that result. I was pleased to get on the scoresheet again!"

Mooney's reputation upon joining us was as a goal scorer and he got his first goal for the Town at Roots Hall, "It was great to get on the score sheet in the first week, having said that I always score against my old clubs! I knew that it was only a matter of time. Things were not going well for us at half time so we had to change it around to make sure we got in the hat for the next round. We did that and I thought we played really well in the second half. If we can continue to take that 45 minute performance into our league form then we should be OK.

"We have had two bad starts, it couldn't have been any worse on the opening day, 0-3 down against the Owls after 15 minutes, I think we showed an awful lot of character to come back from that. It could have gone either way, we could have crumbled and then could have been five or six down. (Things started better against Colchester, with some changes to the line up). I'd like to thank the supporters for their loud support, they appreciated that we rolled our sleeves up and dug in a little bit, in the end we just didn't have enough to draw level at the County Ground."

"After the optimism of pre-season we are still the same, but we need to improve our team play. We struggled in certain areas in our opening games and those need to be taken care of. The sooner we can get into the system that we know can we play the better, we seem to have no problems going forward, but when you do have an attacking set up we do need to get back and defend a lot of the time. We need to adapt that attacking system to something we are comfortable with. where we can hold on to a lead, not concede goals. The sooner the team can do that the better it will be, we don't want to have to score two or three goals to have to win a game. Mind you, it has only been three games so far and

so we have time to get it right. This team WILL score goals and hopefully there will be plenty for Sam & I! The midfielders also offer us scoring options, so we will be a good side going forward, now we have to adapt that into a team performance."

And how is Tommy getting on with 'Super Sam'? "The problem is that we only played 45 minutes together at home pre-season against Wolves, so Sheffield Wednesday became our first game, ideally we would have liked three or four games together before the start of the season. As I've already said there really is no substitute for real games. and the quicker we get on together on the pitch then the better it will be for the team. However I stress that we are part of the team. Between Sam & I it is an us, you need to have a pairing. Sam has said that he has not had a pairing before and the better your front pairing works invariably the better the team performs. It's a challenge because there is a lot of pressure on Sam to repeat his goals from last season and there is an obvious pressure on me because I've come in and I'm expected to score goals too. So it's put pressure on both of us, but we are both people that perhaps thrive on that pressure situation. It's a nice part of the game for me because if you are not under pressure then you may as well go and play on a Sunday morning. I like that responsibility and I know Sam does too. So that and the expectation is the reason I came here "

We wish Tom and Sam success in the season ahead, may they find the net aplenty!!!









Dick Mattick's VINTAGE RED

This week I dipped in to my programme collection to find one of a match between Swindon and Notts County in December 1962 It was the first season Swindon had gone to a small pocket size programme and in amongst the adverts could be found Club Notes, Supporters Club notes and brief pen pictures of the visitors. Among these were J Astle described as "a promising inside forward and useful goal scorer and T Hateley "One of the finest headers of a ball in the game today." Hateley did not play in the game but Astle featured at outside left. The fear of pitch invasions was indicated by a cartoon which requested that whether you were 'mad, sad or glad" 'Please keep of the pitch'. A list of appearances showed Wollen, Trollope, Morgan, Woodruff, Smith and Jackson as ever present in all 20 League matches played to that point while Cliff Jackson with 11 was just ahead of Ernie Hunt and Jack Smith with 10 in the scoring stakes A centre stand seat could be had for just 6/6 or about 33p in today's currency. Swindon took the lead in the 39th minute. The move was started by Don Rogers, making just his second League appearance and moved on through Bobby Woodruff and Jack Smith before inside left Cliff Jackson cracked home a shot. RCE's Football pink Report stated that "If ever a side deserved a goal then Swindon did that one. He went on to



describe how Swindon's scintillating football was leaving County outplayed which was surprising in view of the fact that earlier in the season they had hammered Town 5-0 in the League Cup.

Swindon went further ahead in the second half when Ernie Hunt dribbled through. Although George Smith, a keeper who had been with County since 1953, advanced quickly and blocked Hunt's shot the ball broke loose to Jackson who calmly dribbled it to create a clear view of the now vacant goal into which he now slotted home. The saddest moment of the match and indeed of the whole season for Swindon came in the 65th minute. John Sheridan of County tackled Terry Wollen the town right back. I was sitting in the old stand and heard the crack which signalled a broken leg that to all intents and purposes ended Terry's

career, for although he returned to play a few matches he was never the same player again. Sheridan was sent off and ten minutes later Don Rogers wrapped things up dribbling through to beat the off side trap. A minute later Smith pulled a goal back for County and that completed the scoring. The victory brought Swindon level on points with County and QPR and left them just four points behind League leaders Peterborough

Although Notts County won the return match 2-0 in April the season ended in promotion for Swindon, who finished as runners up to Northampton, while Notts County had to be contented with a seventh place finish. The difference between County's form at home and away was marked with 15 games won at home but only four away.

In fact the nation's oldest Club has had a tendency to under-achieve for a number of years and since the days in which Darren Caskey and Mark Stallard were brought in order to fire them up the leagues, it's been a case of one disappointment after another in Division Two.

County themselves have an illustrious history. As well as being the oldest Club in the world, County also boast the distinction of having an Italian base their kit on the black and white striped number. However, that is where the similarities finish and in recent years – it's been very much a similar situation to our own. Desperate to climb out of the division County have tried spending money – leaving them enshrouded in financial uncertainty, as well as making do with what they've got. Their current squad includes just 21 players and so should they encounter any injuries – then they could come unstuck.

Just returning from injury is former Town favourite Steve Mildenhall. 'Mildy' picked up an injury in pre-season and subsequently missed the first game of the season. However, a 5-0 defeat at the hands of high-flyers Bristol City has seen him return between the sticks – he'll be hoping for a more pleasant afternoon than the one he endured last season when Swindon put five past him!

County then achieved an impressive draw away at Preston in the Carling Cup, beating the First Division Club on penalties to sail into the next round. However, their league form didn't improve when the Robins of Wrexham were the visitors last Saturday, with Hector Sam scoring the winning goal that left the Magpies without a point or a goal.

THE GAFFER BILL DEARDEN

Billy Dearden was appointed manager of Notts County on January 7 2002, a day after resigning from his post at Mansfield Town to take up the position at Meadow Lane. He replaced Gary Brazil as Magpies manager, with his predecessor continuing at the Club as coach and Director of Youth Football.

Bill started his playing career at Oldham Athletic part-time and in 1964 at the age of 21, he began playing full-time. He left Oldham in 1966 and went to Crewe Alexandra and during that time the club gained promotion from the Fourth to the Third Division. 18 months later he signed for Chester City, but his big break came in 1970 when he signed for Sheffield United and played there for six years. In 1976 due to bad knee injuries he left The Blades and went back to Chester. In his time at Bramall Lane Bill played over 160 games and scored 70 goals.

He continued at Chester City for 12 months but when Arthur Cox left to go to Chesterfield, Bill followed and became player/coach at Saltergate before being appointed Assistant Manager in 1981. He stayed at Chesterfield until 1983 when he left to join Mansfield Town where he was later offered the post of First Team Coach (under a certain Mr King). He left the club in 1994 and went to take a position at Port Vale as Assistant Manager to John Rudge. In June 1999 he was invited to return to Field Mill and was offered the job as Mansfield Town Manager, before he joined Notts County three years later.

DANGERMAN MARK STALLARD

After a hernia problem wrecked Mark's 2001/02 season, he was back to his best last time around, hitting a career-best 25 goals during the course of the campaign and firing County to Division Two safety.

"Stall" hit 11 goals by Christmas, and hit top form during the early part of the year netting a number of vital goals throughout the season including a brace against Cardiff City in the 2-0 win at Ninian Park. He also proved to be 'Mr Cool' from the penalty spot on a number of occasions, not least against Huddersfield when he converted two pressure penalties late on in the game.

He was rewarded for his fantastic efforts by being named the club's Player of the Season. Mark is a huge favourite with the Magpies fans and will once more be the key player for the year ahead.

Two weeks ago today, Swindon Town learned the sad news that Jimmy Davis, just 21 years of age, had been killed in a motorway crash. The Manchester United player, on loan at Swindon for three months last season - died in an accident on the M40 in Oxfordshire during the early hours of Saturday 9th August.

Tributes have poured in through various methods for the extremely popular youngster - the reaction of the footballing world just going to show how highly regarded he was held, both as a footballer and a young man. Yet whilst there are no words that can explain the events of a fortnight ago there are many that can illustrate and celebrate all that he achieved in his short career.

Joining Town at the beginning of last season - few had heard of the youngster from Manchester United. However, Davis had already made his United debut, played for Royal Antwerp in Belgium and collated a number of international caps at different age groups - and so he was well equipped for what Division Two had to offer. His exciting style of attacking play was evident as soon as he took to the pitch in Swindon's red and white. His low centre of gravity awarded him with the enviable ability of being able to take players on and he rarely failed when attempting to beat a defender. During Town's 3-1 defeat at Brentford he stole the show. Orchestrating the proceedings from the right hand side of midfield - Davis proved a useful link between midfield and attack and on one occasion - a mazy run involving the beating of most of Brentford's starting line up - he shaded the post with a clever shot. That Davis didn't score more goals in his 15 appearances (two as a substitute) was surprising - such was



his direct and dynamic style, but his overall contribution was unquestionable.

But it was his bubbly demeanour and pleasant nature off the field that really encapsulated Jimmy Davis, Always willing to chat to anyone that took an interest, Jimmy appreciated his position as a role model and public figure and over the course of three months, his affections for our little Club grew and grew. Jimmy cherished all that being a footballer encompassed and whilst he was often the first on the training ground - he was always the last off it. No matter

how good he was, he felt there was room for improvement and his work ethic rubbed off on many people. It spake volumes for how much he felt for Swindon when, after his last game, he shed a tear as he left the pitch to a standing ovation.

This summer Town were desperately trying to secure his services for another season. Instead Sir Alex Ferguson decided that he'd be better off plying his trade in Division One with Watford. Had he been given the chance - I am sure he would have succeeded. In fact I am certain that Jimmy would have gone on to

succeed at the highest level. And yet despite his move to Hertfordshire Jimmy never forgot his roots and he was often a spectator at the County Ground - most recently during the Manchester United friendly,

Unfortunately we will never get the chance to see just what Jimmy could have achieved. However, we must be grateful for the opportunity to have seen his skills illuminate our County Ground pitch and appreciate what he did for this Club. For someone at Swindon for such a short time, his presence will never be forgotten and his legacy will be never-ending

WHAT CAN YOU REMEMBER OF THE TWO PLAY-OFF GAMES WITH TRANMERE ROVERS?

We got off to a good start and Dave Mitchell scored a couple of good goals. We knew we would have to hold them at their place and we knew what was at stake. Getting to Wembley was perhaps the hardest part.

WHAT WAS THE ATMOSPHERE LIKE BUILDING UP TO THE GAME?

The key thing for us was that we had played at Wembley only three years before. Leicester has been there three times before and lost all three games so we were quite confident going into the game. The team had played fantastic football, taking over from Ossie's era where we played some great attacking football. Then under Glenn Hoddle we played more tactically astute football. We were more confident on the day and we had a great build-up to the game. We played some very good football that season, with some great strikers in the team, so we scored lots of goals and we were looking for a positive result.

CAN YOU DESCRIBE THE MOOD IN THE DRESSING ROOM BEFORE KICK-OFF?

Before every game you are nervous. However, when you are playing at Wembley – the home of football – it is hard not to get excited about it. To get into the Premier League was a massive thing for the Club and players and we had the desire to get there before the game.

CAN YOU PUT INTO WORDS THE DIFFERENCE BETWEEN PLAYING AT THE COUNTY GROUND & AT WEMBLEY?

The build-up to games like that are special. The play-offs are always special and you know what is at stake. Perhaps you don't actually realise how much is at stake there is until you move on into coaching. They were fantastic days. We were 3-0 up on the day and even when they came back to 3-31 always felt that we were in control of the game. It was simply a great game and 1 am pleased to have been a part of such a special era.

HOW DID YOU FEEL ABOUT TAKING PENALTIES?

It was something that I had done throughout my time at The County Ground and if I didn't feel confident I wouldn't have taken them. I didn't realise how late it was until I looked at the clock in the 83rd minute, then I knew we were closing in on the Premiership.

HOW DIFFICULT IS IT TO BLOCK OUT THE CROWD WHEN TAKING A PENALTY?

A lot of people said they couldn't watch me take the penalty. Fortunately it was in front of the Town fans. Sometimes the away supporters jump up and down and swing their arms to make things difficult. Confidence is the key though and you have to believe you are going to score every time.

THERE WAS A TREMENDOUS TEAM SPIRIT THAT SEASON. WHAT WAS THE KEY?

There was a great spine to the team such as 'the rock' Shaun Taylor and Colin Calderwood. We had supreme confidence in each other's ability and we were good friends off the field too. All the wives got on well and we used to go and have a meal or a drink together socially after games. The spirit off the pitch was certainly evident on it. We had a collective belief that we could reach the Premier League.

THERE MUST HAVE BEEN A HUGE RELIEF AT THE FINAL WHISTLE?

We knew everything was done and dusted and there were no thoughts of what happened in 1990. We knew if we did our part in winning the game we would definitely go up. There were a lot of players still at the Club from 1990 and having that second chance gave us the opportunity to get into the top division.

WHAT WAS THE MOOD AFTER THE GAME?

We came back to Swindon and went to the De Vere hotel. I was up early the next morning to join up with the Welsh squad as we were playing the Faroes, so it wasn't too much of a celebration. The Welsh squad saw the game on TV and everyone was talking about it. It was a wonderful time and it is something I remember to this day.

AND THE CIVIC RECEPTION AFTER THE GAME?

The main bone of contention was whether Glenn was going to stay. There was a bit of unease with that and unfortunately we lost him to Chelsea. We lost a few players and the new signings took their time to settle. They key was losing the mainstay of the team and it didn't quite work out. However, many people have great memories from that season and you cannot take those memories away from anyone.

DO YOU STILL KEEP IN TOUCH WITH MANY OF THE PLAYERS FROM 1993?

I keep in touch with quite a few of the lads. Martin Ling and Steve 'Chalky' White were with me when I was Manager at Bath and I still see Shaun Taylor around. I have been living in Swindon since 1988 and my kids have grown up here and I am well settled. I run the U12's and enjoy my commitment to the Club still.

AND WHAT OF THE SEASON AHEAD FOR SWINDON TOWN?

Football has a habit of going in circles and although times have not been the best lately, I am sure the good times are just around the corner. I think the side have got off to a reasonable start and hopefully we can have a good cup run and I am quite optimistic for this season and beyond.

A dominant second half by Town at Layer Road saw Tommy Mooney open his Nationwide account scoring Swindon's first away league goal of the season to claim all three points in a hard fought 1:0 win.

The robins swept forward relentlessly after the break in search of a winner following another slow start. The goal in the 86th minute followed wave after wave of Swindon pressure with the hard working Mooney deserving his excellent strike

Swindon kept a clean sheet in the opening 45 minutes for the first time this season. A scrappy half saw Colchester have the better of the possession but Town also had chances to take the lead. Swindon began with 5 changes from the previous visit to Essex 4 days earlier. Rhys Evans found himself back on the

bench with Bart Griemink reclaiming his place between the sticks. Skipper Andy Gurney came into the back three for Reeves with David Duke and Stefani Miglioranzi shoring up the midfield. Up front the partnership of Super Sammy Parkin and Tommy Mooney was restored.

After 5 minutes a foul on Swindon goal machine Sammy Parkin led to a town free kick from the right hand side of midfield. Steve Robinson stepped up and floated the ball into the U's box to be met by Stefani Miglioranzi's header, which sailed wide of the far post. Moments later looe played the ball into Robinson whose cutback for Parkin was cleared by Sam Stockley.

Swindon did well to keep Colchester out during the opening period having once again starting at a canter. The 3339 crowd were treated to a scrappy start to the game as both teams cancelled each other out and passes went astray but

Colchester continued to have the better of the possession and looked the sharper team. Just before the half hour they should have gone ahead. Joe Keith was put through by Craig Fagan and was gifted a chance as Andy Gurney slipped as he went to challenge, but the U's man put the ball wide of the post.

Whatever Town manager Andy King said during the break had an immediate effect as the team looked a different outfit as they came out fighting. Three minutes into the half Swindon hit the woodwork. The bright Sammy looe played the ball in towards Mooney whose sharp turn and shot rebounded off the Colchester bar. Stockley reacted guickest to clear the danger.

The home side were not out of the game and a run by Andy Myers down the left flank ended when his cross was easily claimed by Bart Griemink in the 55th minute. Soon after a low Rowan Vine cross from the right found Anationwide

Fagan but he fluffed his shot and a relieved Griemink claimed the ball. Quarter of an hour into the second half an excellent Town move saw the eager Igoe chip a ball into the centre of the box towards Parkin. The big number nine nodded the ball back into the path of Mooney whose fierce drive went just wide of the right hand post.

The lively number nine again went close midway through the second half when a long pass by Mooney found Parkin in the danger area once again. He feigned to

go left, played the ball to the right and having created the space drilled a shot goalwards from 6 yards bringing a good save low to his left by Brown. Swindon continued to dominate and had all the pressure. All that was missing was that vital goal. Tommy Mooney went close in the 73rd minute from a Sammy Igoe free kick. The midfield maestro upended 20 yards out on the right of the box sent in an accurate ball which almost paid dividends.

Colchester had only sporadic possession. With fifteen minutes to go they won a rare corner. The ball in was cleared by a strong Bart Griemink punch and when it was returned again to the danger area it was easily dealt with by a solid Town backline.

With the game looking like it was going to remain goal-less, despite all the best efforts of an ever improving Swindon display, Town conjured up the winner. In the 86th minute Adrian Viveash played a long ball forward from defence and found Mooney on the left hand side of the U's box. Mooney controlled well with his chest, shielding the ball from the United centre back, let the ball drop and volleyed home from 12 yards. The ball flashed across the keeper into the far corner and town were deservedly ahead.

The way Town were playing there was no time for Colchester to come back into the game and sure enough Swindon hung on for an excellent well deserved away victory.

WE MEET

DAVE WALLIS RETURNS FROM HIS SUMMER BREAK REFRESHED AND READY TO DELVE INTO HIS ARCHIVES TO PROVIDE US WITH TWO PLAYERS, ONE FAMILIAR AND ANOTHER NOT SO FAMILIAR, THAT HAVE PLAYED FOR BOTH CLUBS.

Eric Weaver

Winger Eric Weaver signed for Swindon from Trowbridge in December 1961. Born in Rhymney in South Wales on July 1943, Eric was to stay at the County Ground for six seasons but despite ten games in his first year it would be five seasons before Eric forced his way into regular first team contention.

Weaver could consider himself unlucky that he found himself in competition with Mike Summerbee for the right wing spot and Eric's appearances in 1961/62 were made on the opposite wing. With promotion to Division Two gained the following season, Weaver had to content himself with just three outings when he replaced almost ever present Cliff Jackson on the left hand side of the pitch and things didn't get better when the young talent of Don Rogers came through the ranks. combination of Rogers and Summerbee was understandably difficult to displace and Weaver managed just one appearance throughout the two campaigns.

It must have been with some relief then that as 1965/66 approached and with Mike Summerbee now at Manchester City, Weaver was given a long overdue run in the first team. Playing the first five months of the season at right wing, Weaver made 19 appearances before losing his place to Tommy Henderson and finished the season with a commendable 33 showings. Eric must have thought he had finally established himself.

Not so. Starting the first five games of 1966/67 on the right wing, another twist saw Don Rogers switched from left to right and Eric was out again as Bruce Walker grabbed the place vacated by Rogers. As the season ended, Weaver had made just three more appearances and perhaps his patience and expectations had expired.

In August 1967 Eric moved on to our

visitors today Notts County. County had just avoided a re-election place in Division Four in 1966/67 and another below mid table finish awaited the Meadow Lane club the following season. Eric settled in well and played in 17 games, scoring a goal in every fourth one, but when in December the opportunity arose to play on the Third Division stage once more, Eric accepted the chance to join Northampton Town.

Finally he was to have the most stable part of his career as he took to the League pitch on 64 occasions for the club, calling a halt to his playing days at the end of season 1968/69.

Eric's career took him to two different County Grounds and one County as he played in three of the four divisions in a little over 130 appearances. Not perhaps the most auspicious footballing career, but Eric must have felt particularly unlucky at the quality of the opposition he had to displace in order to gain a first team shirt.

During the next two seasons, a wing

Ken McPherson

Born in Hartlepool on 25th March 1927, Ken McPherson was to have a career which would see him make major contributions at both ends of the pitch.

After joining Second Division Notts County on Aug 1950, Ken played his first 24 League games for the Meadow Lane club but failed to make the score sheet and it was three years later that he moved on to Middlesbrough for £15,000. It was a move that took him upwards both geographically and professionally as it was at Ayresome Park that he stuck away 15 goals in 33 Division One matches.

For a northern lad successfully plying

his trade as a striker close to home and at the top of the ladder, it seems strange that his next move took him down to the Midlands and down to Division Three (South). Coventry City were still ten years away from a Jimmy Hill-inspired climb to Division One but in November 1955, McPherson was Highfield Road bound where 36 goals came in 89 outings.

In the summer of 1958, City were bound for the basement league when the regional Third Divisions were reconfigured into Division Three and Four. To avoid becoming a Fourth Division player, Ken McPherson signed for Newport County (who were to join the new Third Division) in June where he went on to make almost 130 League appearances before joining the ranks at the County Ground in August of 1961.

With a consistent record of one goal every two or three games, he was originally signed as a centre forward and despite clocking up a couple of goals in eight appearances up front, the form of Jack Smith who had signed the same summer forced McPherson to drop to defence in search of a regular shirt. In November 1962, stalwart and legend Maurice Owen was the man to lose his place as Ken made a smooth transition to centre half. The move proved an instant success when at the end of the season Town finished runners-up to Northampton and gained the club's first ever promotion into Division Two.

1. PETER DOWNSBOROUGH

Hero of the win v Arsenal at Wembley and a very consistent keeper during his 274 matches for the Town.

2. ROD THOMAS

His telescopic legs always seemed to see him get the better of opposing attackers, and quality player endorsed by his 50 Welsh Caps.

3. PAUL BODIN

Another Welsh international, 23 caps, who could excite the crowd with fine overlapping runs, netted 37 goals, a good return for a full back.

4. FRANK BURROWS

The Scotsman was a hard, uncompromising defender, needed in the backbone of any team, a super fit performer.

5. COLIN CALDERWOOD

Another Scotsman and brilliant defender, who would have added the culture alongside Burrows. Won 36 Caps after leaving Swindon

6. RAY MCHALE

The sort of midfield player needed in any team, always looking for the ball, always available to accept the ball, an excellent passer with a fine shot, scorer of 33 in 173 appearances.

7. GLENN HODDLE

The most complete footballer I have witnessed in a Town shirt. His skills were outstanding, frightening to think what he must have been like in his prime at Spurs or Monaco, worth the admission money alone.

8. MIKE SUMMERBEE

One of Bert Head's original youngsters in 1959, a fast attacking winger and scorer and creator of goals, later winner of 8 England Caps.

9. PETER EASTOE

Scorer of 43 goals in just 91 appearances, a truly excellent ratio, a real goal "sniffer" who could put away just half a chance with ease.

10. ALAN MAYES

Another goal "sniffer", a very skilful player, who netted regularly in two spells with the Town, could always make something happen in the box.

11. DON ROGERS

Again someone who was worth the entrance money alone, fast and skilful winger, with an amazing goal scoring record. One who you could really call a Swindon legend.
