



ATTENDANCES ON THE UP

Attendances levels at matches in the Nationwide Football League have continued their upward climb during the first month of the new season, largely thanks to an increase of some 26% in Division Three.

Across the League, attendances rose by 9%, to an average of 9,298 for the 178 League matches played in August. In Division One crowds averaged 15,384 (+5%), while in Divisions Two and Three the respective average attendances were 7,235 (+4%) and 5,341 (+26%). Crowds



totalled 1,655,016 for the month as a whole. Commenting Sir Brian Mawhinney, Chairman of The Football League, said:

"This is a very encouraging start to the new season, especially when one considers that The Football League recorded its best attendances for 38 years just last season.

"This further rise in attendances is evidence that clubs throughout The League are marketing themselves very successfully and are nurturing the next generation of football supporters.

"Our clubs have made significant efforts to ensure that Football is a safe, affordable and enjoyable environment for families to spend time together and their reward has been ever greater numbers coming through the turnstiles."

TOWN ISSUE STATEMENT

Swindon Town FC issue a statement regarding the usage of the Town End stand. The players and management of STFC appreciate the vocal support that can be heard from the Town End so far this season and hope it continues as the Club believe it has a positive effect on the team. However, there are aspects of behaviour from a minority of people that causes the Club considerable concern.

These include:

Failure to sit down during matches
We understand when spectators stand-up during exciting moments but they need to sit down as all other Swindon fans in the stadium do throughout the remainder of the match.

Safety Footways

These are being obstructed to such an extent that the ambulance crews and St. Johns are being prevented from attending to any potential emergency.

Stewards

Stewards in the Town End are being abused to such an extent that they are refusing to work in this particular stand. This occurs when stewards attempt to enforce rules and regulations, such as requesting fans to sit down during the match.

There is a real threat that this stand could have to be closed and that would be a tremendous shame for the support of the team. People must sit down during the game and keep footways clear. The Club may be subject to crowd limitations imposed by the local authority and The FA.

We appeal to the fans of STFC to assist the stewards by adhering to ground regulations and ask that people sit in their seats and keep access ways clear.


Finally, I would ask you to continue the wonderful support you have shown this season and hope, and expect, the players to return the faith.

Good afternoon to everyone for today's fixture with Wrexham. On behalf of the board of directors at the County Ground, can i also offer a warm welcome to the Directors, Management, Players and Supporters who have made the long journey from North Wales.

One thing is for certain this season, that is that any game involving Swindon Town will be entertaining and full of goals. Three two-all draws on the spin is testimony to that. In fact it is 50 matches since we featured in a goalless draw. So you know what to put your money on this afternoon. The style of football on display at the County Ground this season is certainly a major reason for the very welcome increase in crowd numbers. I don't think that there have been many fans leaving the stadium this season upset at not being entertained. As i said in my last notes, this team and squad is very worthy of your support and I sincerely hope, and believe that the attendance figures will continue to grow as the season progresses. All we need now is to turn some of the draws into wins and a place in the top six is within our grasp. It shows the progress made that, this season, we can talk about being disappointed at only getting a draw away at Brighton.

The capture of James Milner on loan from Leeds United certainly grabbed the headlines. We are also

delighted that Jerel Ifil agreed to return to the club on loan, and played a full part in keeping Leon Knight under wraps last weekend. I was however very disappointed to read a disparaging article in one of last Sunday's newspapers. To be fair the article was critical of the new loan system in place which allows Premiership sides to loan players to one another. A consequence of this is that Leeds United currently have seven players on loan, and we have benefited because it has allowed Peter Reid to loan us James Milner for a month. Whilst i understand this particular journalist's point of view that young talent is not forcing its way through into the Premiership as quickly as he would like, our loan arrangement with Leeds can only be good for James, Swindon Town and Leeds United. It will assist James in his footballing education and we will have played our part in developing a future England player (we hope). In any case, there is life outside the Premiership and it is fantastic that fans of the Nationwide League will be able to see some of the country's top young talent- it is wasted in the Premiership Reserve League.

I have already mentioned your increased support this season and everyone at the club, not least the Players, are very thankful for the volume of your support. However we have one request. Can those supporters, in the Town End,

who stand throughout the match, please sit down whilst the game is on. We understand that when there are goalmouth incidents there is a natural reaction to get to your feet, but we need you to remain seated during the rest of the game. We are not trying to be killjoys, the atmosphere created by the Town End is superb, but our Stadium licence is for an all seated stadium and continual standing will give us problems with the local authorities who grant the licence. Without wishing to overstate the situation, this could lead to the club being forced to close the Town End until we can guarantee that our fans will remain seated. Your assistance is greatly appreciated.

One other matter discussed with the supporters groups recently has been the ongoing correspondence recieved about the white shirt recently worn at Bournemouth. One suggestion has been that we produce the kit, as a limited edition third shirt, and that it remains as our third kit next season. That way fans who want the shirt, and there appears to be many that do, get a chance to purchase it in time for Christmas, and we give a guarantee that it will still be current next season. I appreciate that this is a change from my previous stance, but it would be wrong not to listen to the comments we have received.



Town's inability to retain a lead surfaced again as Town paid the penalty for some slack defending which allowed Brighton to equalise twice meaning that the 3 consecutive games against seaside opposition have all ended 2-2 writes STFC Sports Reporter Adrian Smith

James Milner made his debut for Town as a straight swap for the suspended Sammy Igoe and Jerel Ifil appeared in the back 3 marking danger man Leon Knight. Rhys Evans retained his place in goal and Andy Gurney moved into midfield. Town were quickly on the attack when Parkin sent Milner clear but Brighton keeper Roberts cleared. At the other end Duke made a timely interception from the lively on-loan Reading player Darius Henderson.

Parkin, Mooney and Milner struck up a good relationship and had several good moves that resulted in Sam Parkin putting Town ahead with a calm

finish in the 13th minute. However Town's inability to hold on to a lead struck again when Gary Hart was able to fire home virtually unchallenged within a minute

At the other end Parkin almost put Town ahead within a minute after goalkeeper Roberts fumbled but he was unable to get a good connection with the ball. Town were lucky when Gurney lost the ball in midfield but Evans was on hand to snuff out the danger and Hart also went close with Evans beaten.

Leon Knight was getting more involved in the game and he almost scored when he pounced on a cross but his shot went wide. In the 37th minute Milner, Ifil and Gurney linked up in a good attacking move that resulted in a free-kick when Gurney was tripped. Despite several attacks no further goals were scored before the break.

Neither side made any substitutions at half-time and Town were again quickly on the attack through Milner. Viveash almost allowed Brighton an opportunity with a careless ball forward as the Seagulls settled quicker into the more fluent pattern of play.

However, Parkin and Mooney started to link up again with Milner and Mooney went close with a header that landed on roof of net. Milner was fouled seconds later but Mooney's free-kick was easily dealt with although Brighton keeper Roberts was having an erratic game and he again flapped at a cross but Mooney was just unable to connect.

Gurney was the first player to be cautioned in the 53rd minute for a late challenge and then Brighton player Hart was cautioned for dissent soon afterwards. Gurney had a long range free-kick which was deflected for a

corner which he took but it was cleared for a throw in. There was drama in the Town penalty area when Knight was cautioned after falling under a challenge from Ifil which incensed the home support.

Brighton made the first substitution in the 63rd minute when Daniel Harding replaced Richard Carpenter but three minutes later 'Super' Sam Parkin fired Town into the lead after a long throw by Duke which raised the noise levels of the travelling Town faithful. Seconds later Mooney was denied by the crossbar from a superb dipping shot and Milner was denied by some last ditch defending.

Brighton goalscorer Hart was replaced in the 69th minute and Brighton went close with a freekick by Rodger. However Brighton were handed a

lifeline when Knight was tripped in the penalty area and Henderson levelled from the spot with a firm low shot which sent Evans the wrong way. Miglioranzi then made a superb late tackle as Knight almost pounced again and Brighton had the ball in the net seconds later but the referee had awarded a free-kick for a push on Evans. Mooney went close with a cheeky shot and Milner also went close with two good efforts as Town seemed to get a second wind and the same player had another powerful shot which was well saved by Roberts.

In the 2 minutes of added time Parkin went close from two corners and Alan Reeves made a brief appearance replacing David Duke for the last 30 seconds of the match as Town kept their unbeaten away record this season.



Tommy Mooney grabbed his first brace for the Club with two fine headers as Town extended their unbeaten run to five games but almost paid the penalty for Sam Parkin's miss from the spot as Steve McMahon's beleaguered Blackpool snatched a point, writes STFC Sports Reporter Adrian Smith.

Town kicked off towards the Stratton Bank with Rhys Evans making his first League start in goal and they were swiftly on the attack through a Hewlett shot and free-kick by Igoe.

Town took the lead in the 8th minute when a pass by Igoe to Duke resulted in a superb downward header by Mooney for his fifth goal in as many games. However the lead only lasted two minutes when scrappy defending led to Jonathon Douglas poking the ball home from close range.

Mooney and Miglioranzi linked up

well with some neat inter passing but Miglioranzi's cross cum shot drifted out for a goal-kick and moments later Gurney tried his luck with a long range deflected shot. Mooney went close with a shot which struck the top of the cross bar just before Blackpool snatched an undeserved lead in the 27th minute through Scott Taylor when his shot just evaded the despairing dive of Evans.



A goal of high class saw Town equalise a minute later when a superb cross by Heywood resulted in a fantastic unstoppable back-header by Mooney. This spurred Town on to some sustained attacking play as they went in search of a third goal to the delight of the crowd of 6,219. Moments later Sam Parkin was fouled and from the resulting free-kick Gurney's shot was deflected for a corner which ended with a snap shot by Mooney and this was the last action of the half.

Just after half-time a surging run by Gurney was ended when he was fouled but Igoe's freekick struck the defensive wall. Mooney, Parkin and Miglioranzi were prominent in attack without being able to get clear shots on goal.

Parkin was cautioned in the 57th minute for a late challenge and Blackpool went close but Evans was quickly off his line to snuff out the challenge. Three minutes later Town were awarded a penalty when Blackpool keeper Jones pushed Mooney as Igoe took a corner but Parkin's tame shot was easily saved by Jones. Parkin tried to make amends seconds later but he was denied by a last ditch tackle and moments later super Sam had a bullet-like header saved at point-blank range by Jones.

In the 69th minute Robinson was tripped from behind and from the resulting Mooney free-kick Parkin went close with a header and within

seconds Grant Smith replaced the limping Miglioranzi. Shortly after Steve Robinson was carried off the pitch after catching his studs in the turf and was replaced by Brian Howard. Andy King will have been watching anxiously as two key players had left the field with injuries and with Sammy Igoe suspended a different look midfield will be lining up for Town in the next couple of weeks.

Mike Sheron almost scored for Blackpool just before he was replaced by the lively Martin Bullock who quickly tested the alert goalkeeping of Evans. Duke became the second Town player to be booked for a late challenge and Evans made two smart saves in quick succession.

Although Mooney pressed hard to try and complete his hat-trick and Parkin went close, Swindon had to settle for

another 2-2 draw but will be aiming to go one better against Brighton who are Town's third seaside opposition in as many weeks!



JAMES SPARKS

WHILE THE LIKES OF DAVID MOYES, HARRY REDKNAPP AND CLAUDIO RANIERI WERE DIPPING DEEP INTO THEIR POCKETS TO CONCLUDE FINAL DAY TRANSFERS, OUR VERY OWN MANAGER, ANDY KING, WAS BUSY BRINGING IN ANOTHER TWO EXCITING FACES TO ADD TO THE ALREADY IMPRESSIVE TOWN SQUAD LIST.



Whilst Ifil returns for his second spell at the club, it seems the signing of James Milner on a months loan has hit the headlines and already the expectation for the young Leeds starlet is sky high.

One would have to imagine that most of that pressure comes from making his first team debut at just sixteen, when he appeared as a substitute for Leeds United at West Ham in November 2002. That appearance made him the second youngest ever player to play in the Premiership behind Coventry's Gary McSheffrey, who was 168 days younger when turning out for Aston Villa in February 1999.

The records don't stop there for the seventeen year old. Not only is he the second youngest ever player at Elland Road, behind Leeds legend Peter Lorimer, who first appeared for Leeds aged just fifteen. He also went on to break Wayne Rooney's record as the youngest ever Premiership goalscorer by four days when, aged just 16 and 357 days, he secured a win for United at the Stadium of Light in December 2002. Despite those expectations, it seems as though the Horsforth teenager has already taken it all in his stride.

"There are expectations, but I just have to do my best every time I step on the pitch. I know quite a bit about Swindon already, they are a decent side and play good

football. I am looking to develop my game further and this will be good experience for me, I am sure of that."

Back in Lancashire, the arrival of Peter Reid as manager has seen Milner's path into the first team somewhat blocked. Although, Reid is still full of praise for the England U-17 international and has assured him that he is still very much part of his first team plans, both player and manager felt that some League experience would develop him further.

"It is a good squad up at Leeds and they have signed a few players on loan, such as Jermaine Pennant, so it has been hard to try and break into the side. I got a call from Kevin Blackwell (Leeds reserve team coach) and he asked me if I would be interested in a month away and to be honest, I jumped at the chance. I need to get a few more first team games under my belt and it is a step up from the reserves at Elland Road. It will just good to be playing some first team football again."

His performance at the Withdean Stadium showed great promise and his comments following the 2-2 draw with Brighton indicates that the youngster has the maturity on and off the pitch to succeed and is still just finding his feet at this level.

"I enjoyed it to be honest. It was a quick game and we were playing one of the top teams in the Division. It was



certainly different from the reserves and I think it will take me a couple of games to get adjusted to the League. I got a few knocks, but I think whenever a tackle comes in, you just have to get back up, dust yourself down and get on with the game. You can't afford to give the opposition the upper hand and by getting back up straight away, shows that you are up for the challenge."

The subject of knocks, bruises and tackles are no stranger to an already familiar face, Jerel Ifil, who alongside Milner has joined us for an initial months loan. The return of the 'Beast' to the County Ground comes after he appeared in nine games for Town last season and he is once again looking forward to pulling on a Swindon shirt.

"It was a good experience for me last year and hopefully I can become more consistent through playing regularly. I feel a better player from last time and I am now more than ready to play my part for Swindon. There are a few new faces about the place but most of the squad is the same, so it is a case of a quick welcome back and getting down to business".

The arrival of the no-nonsense centre half has been somewhat over-shadowed by the hysteria surrounding Milner, although he did go straight into the line up and returned in excellent form by marking young Chelsea forward, Leon Knight, out of the game at the Withead.

"Before I went into the game, I knew quite a lot of Leon having played with him on loan at Huddersfield a few seasons ago. He is quick, but I thought we coped quite well and were unlucky to not take all three points from the game."

Since his return to Vicarage Road last season, Ifil has found himself in a similar position to Milner at Leeds. He has been a regular member of Watford's first team squad, but has been forced to settle with a couple of games on the bench and a string of appearances in the reserves.

Despite the initial setback of not yet making the grade at Watford, Ifil is more than happy to go out on loan and gain some more first team experience. He knew that a return to Swindon, albeit for the second time, was another opportunity not to be missed.

"I haven't been playing regularly at Watford, so I am pleased to be back really. I am looking forward to playing regularly in the first team again. I knew Andy was after me and it will be another tremendous opportunity to show everyone what I am capable of."

A good set of appearances last season, a stirring return against Brighton, lightning pace, strength and a more than ambitious attitude can only be Watford's loss and surely Swindon's gain.....

Dick Mattick's VINTAGE RED

Today's picture is taken from a collection that came into my possession in the mid eighties. "If there is anything in there you want take it everything in that room is going in the skip tomorrow." Among the things I rescued were photographs taken and used in club programmes and this was one of them. It shows Wrexham goalkeeper Eddie Niedzwiecki and Roy Carter of Swindon just failing to get to a cross by David Moss. It led me to search out the programme for the match that took place in March 1978. The programme cost 15p and was probably the biggest if not the thickest programme the club had ever produced. Among the interesting "Bits and Pieces" article it contained was the fact that Swindon had been the visitors on September 30th 1959 when Wrexham switched on floodlights at the Race Course. Among the pen pictures in the Souvenir programme for the match at Wrexham were Ken Jones a Welsh Youth international who was later to play for Swindon and a youngster described as slightly built

but having a great future in the game this was Arfon Griffiths who after nearly 600 appearances for the North Wales club was manager at the time of the 1978 match.

The match resulted in a 2-1 victory for the visitors. Two goals by John Lyon put Wrexham in a commanding position at half time and although Dave Moss pulled one back for Town, Wrexham completed their League double for the season over Swindon. This was as a result of their having won 2-1 at the Race Course ground earlier in the season when legendary goalscorer Dixie McNeil and Graham Whittle, the Liverpool born striker who made over 350 appearances for Wrexham got the goals in another 2-1 victory. Predictably Town's goal had come from David Moss who was the season's leading scorer for the Robins with 22 in all competitions. Swindon finished the season in 10th position with an average crowd of 7,162. As so often a good home record

with 12 matches won and only 4 lost could not make up for disappointing form away from home where 38 goals were conceded and only four matches won. It was a season of triumph for Wrexham however. They finished as champions with 61 points, three clear of Cambridge United in second place losing only once at home in a local derby with Chester.

Wrexham and Swindon also met in the League Cup during the 1977-8 season The Fourth Round tie was played at the Race Course. A quirk of the draw has seen Swindon defeat both the other Welsh League sides Swansea and Cardiff as well as Portsmouth as they fought their way to Round Four. The tie against the Cardiff team at the County Ground was particularly memorable as it resulted in a 5-1 win for Town with a brace of goals from Trevor Anderson. A crowd of just over 10,000 saw goals from Lyons and Whittle earn a lucrative home tie against Liverpool which they lost 3-1


Managed by the former Stoke City defender Denis Smith, the Welsh club has already beaten Sheffield Wednesday (3-2) and Notts County and according to the Pools panel, they would have defeated Blackpool at Bloomfield Road last weekend - having recently had their run of 18 undefeated League games ended by Bournemouth.

Last season Wrexham gained automatic promotion from the Third Division by finishing in third place behind Rushden & Diamonds and Hartlepool United, and it was, without doubt, their superb away form which certainly paved the way for success... 11 wins and eight draws on the road for a total of 41 points (out of a seasonal tally of 84).

They also scored plenty of goals - 84 in 46 games - and their haul of 36 away from Their racecourse Ground was the best in their Division and only bettered by Arsenal, Portsmouth, Wolves, Wimbledon and Crewe Alexandra in the whole country.

Defensively Wrexham were pretty mean, conceding 26 goals at home and 24 away, ending up with a goal-difference of plus 34 (again the best in their section). And manager Smith has demanded more of the same on both fronts - and he's getting some reward already.

Wrexham, a Football League club since 1921 (original members of the Third Division North) have had a bit of a yo-yo spell over the last five years, finishing 17th, 11th, 10th and 23rd in Division 2 from 1998-99 to 2001-02 inclusive and then 3rd in Division Three last term. Consolidation is Smith's wishes this time round, anything else would certainly be a massive bonus - but the players, and indeed the fans of Wrexham believe they can certainly make the play-offs...and who knows after that! We shall see.



THE GAFFER DENIS SMITH

DENIS SMITH (born, Meir, Stoke-on-Trent, November 1947) was one of the greatest defenders ever to play for Stoke City. He was certainly a fine servant to the Potters whom he served for 17 years during which time he amassed 493 appearances and scored 41 goals while overcoming countless injuries. He joined Stoke as a junior in 1965, turned 'pro' in 1966, but it was not until he was almost 21 that he made his debut v. Arsenal in a First Division match (1968). He won Football League XI honours, but never a full England cap and helped Stoke win the League Cup in 1972 before retiring in 1982. He then managed York City for five years to 1987, bossed Sunderland for four seasons and in 1992 was put in charge of Bristol City. He left Ashton Gate for Oxford United in 1993 and in December 1997 became boss of West Brom.

He left The Hawthorns in 1999 and later returned to hard-up Oxford United (2000) before taking over the reins of struggling Wrexham in season 2001-02.

DID YOU KNOW?

Eddie Tunney spent 15 years as a player with Wrexham, serving the club before, during and after WW2. In fact he was an ever-present in 11938-39 and again in 1947-48, making a total of 222 League appearances in all.

LAST VISIT HERE




DANGERMAN PAUL EDWARDS

Wrexham midfielder Paul Edwards will be back on familiar ground if he takes to the pitch for today's game. Born on 1st January 1980 in Manchester, he was signed by Andy King from Altrincham in 2001. Paul made 20 League appearances in a Town shirt, first appearing as a substitute at home to Tranmere Rovers on 15th September.

Never making the scoresheet, there was some disappointment in Swindon when he chose to leave the County Ground in the summer of 2002 when he declined Town's offer of a new contract in favour of a move to the Racecourse Ground. Paul had made an impressive start to his Swindon career when, starting his first home match on 25th September 2001 against Brentford, he had dazzled the crowd with a display of fast and direct running at the heart of the visitors' defence.

Perhaps preferring to move closer to his Manchester roots, 5ft 11in Paul settled in quickly in Wales as Wrexham clinched the third automatic promotion spot from Division Three last season. Playing in 38 of the 46 League matches, Paul scored on four occasions and having found his scoring touch he will be keen to add to that total.





ANDY DIBBLE (Goalkeeper)

A detail history of Andy's career would fill a programme on its own, but safe to say that the South Walian has not missed on much in the last 20 years. Starting with Cardiff City, he made his name with Luton Town and won a League Cup medal with them. There were numerous ports of call during loan spells throughout the Football League and Scotland, but he also enjoyed a lengthy spell with Manchester City. Rangers signed him and he made his debut against Celtic, while also seeing service with non-league and League of Wales teams. After two seasons with Stockport County, Denis Smith saw him as the man to come to Wrexham and help bring through our young keepers, as coaching is another avenue of the game that Andy would like to pursue.

PAUL BARRETT (Midfield)

Signed just prior to the transfer deadline in March 1999 on a free from Newcastle United. It was his performances in the Pontin's League, which alerted Wrexham to his talents and the Newcastle born player signed a three-year deal at the Racecourse. Paul was a schoolboy signing with his hometown team and progressed through their ranks before going professional at St James Park. Back in the first team squad after pulling a hamstring in a reserve match in mid January, he was offered a new one-year deal over the summer.

BRIAN CAREY (Centre-Half)

A case of third time lucky for Wrexham, as the big Republic of Ireland international finally joined the Reds on a permanent transfer in 1996. Twice the Cork born centre-half had been on loan at the Racecourse, but on both previous occasions Wrexham could not raise the cash needed to buy him from Manchester United. He eventually joined Leicester City in 1993, but after three seasons at Filbert Street the Reds finally got their man. Injuries and suspensions have blighted Brian's season in 2001/02, but he is back to full fitness and ready to play a captain's role in the year ahead.

CARLOS EDWARDS (Winger)

Joined the club three years ago from Defence Force FC, Trinidad, when signed along with Hector Sam. A current international player for his

country, Carlos was involved in their epic World Cup victories over Canada, Panama and Mexico last season, which saw T&T through to the last round of qualification for 2002 finals. A tricky winger, who can operate on either flank, he has added considerably to the manager's attacking options. Made the PFA Third Division Team of the Season in 2002/03 and was a virtual ever-present in Wrexham's promotion winning side. Away in midweek with T&T, for an international friendly in Morocco.



CHRIS ARMSTRONG (Forward)
Returned in the summer to the club that first introduced him to the professional game. Born in Newcastle, but brought up locally, Chris was soon on his way to Millwall, Crystal Palace and then Spurs, before injury saw his career come to an abrupt halt. A season with Bolton did little to get him back on the road to first team football, something he will be hoping happens quickly at the Racecourse.

PAUL EDWARDS (Winger)
Manchester born, he was on City's books as a teenager, before being released and joining Doncaster Rovers as they struggled to stay in the Football League. After experience with several lower non-league clubs around the area, it was Altrincham that gave him his chance and there followed a rapid rise back into professional football. After only six games at Moss Road, Conference club Leigh RMI took him on loan and before he played a competitive match for them, Swindon Town offered him a trial. That was a successful one in August 2001 and within a few months he was an established member of the County Ground team, becoming a firm favourite with the local supporters. Looking to get closed to his northern home, Paul accepted an offer from Wrexham and became one of Denis Smith's three summer signings in 2002.



DARREN FERGUSON (Midfield)
Initially signed on a short term contract following his return from a spell in Dutch football with Sparta Rotterdam, Darren later committed himself to a two year deal at the Racecourse, one which was extended last season. Born in Glasgow, he joined Manchester United as a youngster and progressed through their system to eventually turn professional in 1990. After several years and five caps for the Scotland Under-21 side, Darren moved for £250,000 to Wolverhampton Wanderers in January 1994. A regular in the Wolves team for five seasons, he did have one spell out due to injury. In February 1999, Darren took up an option to play in Holland, but decided against extending his stay after helping Sparta avoid relegation. His first goal for Wrexham was the winner against Middlesbrough in the 1999 FA Cup third round victory. Signed an extended contract in 2001, after turning down an approach from big spending Wigan Athletic.

SHAUN HOLMES (Full-back)
Signed in the summer of 2001 from Manchester City. This current Northern Ireland international defender missed out on his senior debut at Maine Road and decided to move on, despite still having a year left on his contract. Then manager Brian Flynn finally captured Shaun's signature at Manchester Airport, as the player was returning from international duty in the Czech Republic. Originally signed by City from a Boys Club in his hometown of Derry, he was a youth player before turning professional at Maine Road.

LEE JONES (Forward)
Now in his fourth spell of some description at the Racecourse. Originally spotted playing local football in the Wrexham area, he was given his chance at the Racecourse and proved such a hit that Liverpool quickly took him to Anfield a decade ago. While seeing limited first team action, Lee gained valuable experience on Merseyside before switching to First Division Tranmere Rovers and then Barnsley. He left Oakwell last March, after cutting

short his deal with the Tykes and moving back to Wrexham on non-contract terms. The scorer of a club record equalling five league goals against Cambridge United, on the day the club was relegated, he had a number of offers over the summer, but quickly decided on an extended stay with his hometown team.

MARK JONES (Midfield)
Locally born youngster, who was recently promoted to the first team squad. Mark was called up by Jimmy Shoulder to be part of his U21 squad for the opening match in their qualifying group away to Finland and his has been with most Wales games since. There followed a place on the bench for Wrexham against Bradford City in the Worthington Cup and professional contract this summer.

DENNIS LAWRENCE (Centre-Half)
Signed in March 2001 from the Defence Force club in Trinidad, Dennis stands at 6'7" and will not be hard to spot if selected. So far he has made only a handful of appearances, although his period here has been interrupted due to serving his country in their World Cup qualifying campaign. A seasoned performer on the international stage, Dennis had trials with both Newcastle United and Bolton Wanderers, before settling on Wrexham and joining up with our other two T&T signings. After taking a little time to settle, he forced his way into the team and his now a permanent feature of Wrexham's three-man defence.



CHRIS LLEWELLYN (Forward)
Gave up the final part of his contract with Norwich to try his luck with Wrexham, in his quest for first team football. Brought up in South Wales, he was spotted by scouts from Carrow Road and soon joined the East Anglian club as a youngster. A regular with the Wales U21 squad, which he also captained, Chris later gained a full international cap for his country. Injury slowed his progress with Norwich, but he's looking to make fresh start at the Racecourse.

SWINDON TOWN CRUISED TO VICTORY PAST A YOUNG BRENTFORD SIDE AT A MILD GRIFFIN PARK ON WEDNESDAY NIGHT, WITH THE BEES OLDEST PLAYER IN MARK PETERS - A SHADE UNDER TWENTY - THE ROBINS WENT ABOUT THEIR BUSINESS IN METHODOICAL FASHION, MAKING THE GAME A NON-EVENT AT HALF-TIME.

After five minutes, Bees goalkeeper Josh Lennie - making only his second reserve-team outing - superbly tipped away a fierce shot from Dave Bampton from the edge of the box. It took the visitors just three minutes later to open the scoring, Brian Howard supplying Jon Stevenson, who made no mistake from three yards out. Fifteen minutes in, their lead was doubled after Referee Whitestone had penalised Dean Wells for shoving Grant Smith in the back. Smith picked himself up to slam home the free-kick.

Six minutes later Mark Peters hit the post from Jay Tabb's through ball that caught Steven Smith and Luke Garrard in a muddle. It was the closest he got to scoring on a disappointing night for the young striker. Andy Nicholas spurned his chance to get on the scoresheet in the 27th minute - Jon Stevenson the supplier, but The Bees' Sean Hillier did enough to put the Robins left-back off and he shot wide with just Lennie to beat.

However, Town effectively wrapped the contest up two minutes before half-time. Grant Smith's cross was headed away by Wells, but he did not bargain for the on-rushing Dave Bampton, who struck a peach of a shot from twenty yards out to make it 3-0. If Brentford thought there were to be any respite in the second half, they were proved wrong, as within two minutes of the restart, Grant Smith supplied Brian Howard - with the England U20 midfielder's left-foot shot rifled into the net from 20 yards.

Matt Harrold's header from a Hillier right-wing cross in the 57th minute was Brentford's best opportunity before Swindon scored a fifth. Jon Stevenson's cross from the right was met by the head of captain Grant Smith, Howard gratefully receiving the knock-down to flick the ball up and volley home spectacularly from six yards.

Brentford began to forget about the score-line and pass the ball around neatly. They got their reward in the 72nd minute, Stephen Hughes rifling a twenty-five yard shot past Robins' goalkeeper Steven Smith following good play from Bobby Traynor and Matt Harrold.



Rhys Evans

Having returned to Wiltshire in mid-July, Rhys Evans has now broken into the first team fold at Swindon Town. Evans started the 2003-2004 campaign on the bench behind Dutchman Bart Griemink but after a solid display against Southend United in the Carling Cup First Round, was handed his chance against Blackpool two weeks ago today.

The Swindon-born stopper arrived at The County Ground from Stamford Bridge in the summer having suffered from the Claudio Ranieri revolution. Despite never making a first team start, worked with some world-renowned stars in the early days of his career in the capital.

"I signed for Chelsea when I was seventeen as an apprentice before signing two professional contracts that took me up to the end of last season.

"It is a bit different now, but I was hoovering rooms and cleaning boots then. I think they have taken a lot of those jobs away now at Chelsea. I was cleaning Gianluca Vialli's boots that was a bit of an honour. That was a nice little earner, I earned about £500 one Christmas just in tips!"

Evans is meticulously minded and has worked with several goalkeeping coaches during his playing career so far. Times were not easy on Town's current number one, having encountered a several stumbling blocks whilst part of the Italian regime.

"At Chelsea I worked with Eddie Niedzwiecki, who is now Reserve Team coach at Arsenal. Eddie left when Vialli was sacked and then Ranieri came in. I didn't see eye to eye with the new goalkeeping coach he brought in and I ended up asking

Claudio Ranieri if I could do my keeper training with Mark Beeney (ex-Leeds) who was coaching a few of the younger lads at Chelsea. Ranieri took exception to that and I wasn't allowed to work with the Italian goalkeeping coach.

"I then went off to QPR on loan and that was where I first worked with Fraser Digby. When I signed for Swindon I knew there wasn't a specific goalkeeping coach but I spoke to Fraser over the summer about the options available to me. It is great to have him as a coach now because he has not long finished playing so is aware of how the game is played now. It is not like working with a keeper who finished playing twenty years ago. He still appreciates the demands of the modern game and that is a big benefit to me.

"I am quite picky over what I want. I get some stick for it from the Manager but I like things to be done a certain way. I don't feel that I should treat life any differently because it is Division Two and I want to keep those standards up."

During his time at Stamford Bridge Evans accelerated into the England Schoolboys side and having started out playing for Highworth Town's youth set-up, has collated a number of caps for his country of which he is extremely proud.

"I have played right from the age of U15 and have played at every age group right through to U16's level. Someone told me recently that I am the most capped young England goalkeeper - I have played about 46 games for my country. I think I have played more international games

than I have in the league!"

Attentions now turn to today's game with Division Two high-flyers Wrexham and Evans is delighted to have put a run of games together.


"People have got to appreciate that the most games I have played in a row is eleven, and that was two years ago at QPR. I feel that I am improving every game and need to settle into the side. I had a decent game against Southend but in the last two games I haven't had a lot to do."

Pre-match routines play a big part for most professional sportsman. It is a hazy world that is often discussed up and down the country. So what does the pre-match routine hold for Rhys Evans?

"I have a very strict diet that I do stick to, eating specific foods on different nights building up to a game. I get up early on matchdays, clean my boots but try not let my equipment go out of my sight. Mental preparation plays a big part for me. You won't find me talking much as I just try and get ready for the ninety minutes ahead. I do think about my performances in depth, but I can't make saves from nothing.


"Immediately before kick-off I put a towel over my head and compose myself. The fans won't see me out on the field throwing myself around before a game because it is just about calming myself down, I am already hyped up for the game enough.

So, as we look for three points today against Wrexham, Town fans rest assured that Rhys Evans is more than prepared for the challenge ahead.



Craig Maskell arrived at The County Ground in July 1992 in a £225,000 move from neighbours Reading.

The slightly built hitman scored forty goals in just twenty-two games for Town after joining from The Royals but injury did stop him from playing a full part during his time at The County Ground. Prior to the 6-4 victory at Birmingham, where Maskell notched two goals to take his seasons tally to 21, the striker had missed the previous 14 games with injury. Having never spent more than 10 days on the sidelines, Maskell explained that missing such a high number of games had become frustrating.

"That was not a nice experience, being away from the lads especially as the lads had been away in Spain so it was disappointing to miss that one. From that point on my main aim was to get fit as quickly as possible. I then made a comeback but hadn't played enough reserve games so that proved to be a problem as my hamstring didn't hold up - which meant a few months more on the sidelines."

Thankfully for Town the Aldershot born striker did make a comeback that season, going onto play at Wembley. The

lively striker was to become a crucial member of Town's promotion winning squad of the 1992/1993 season with his strike at Wembley still fresh in many a Town fans mind. Remember the thud as the ball hit the post?

"It was a tremendous day and great game. To play at Wembley is the pinnacle of any players career but to score there was special. I remember it well and a lot of fans still comment on the ball hitting the post. It was the second goal of the game and we then went 3-0 up. Leicester got it back to 3-3 but thankfully Paul(Bodin) tucked his penalty away superbly and we were on our way to the Premier League."

After leaving Town, Maskell returned to Southampton in a £250,000 move but only made eight starts in his second stint at The Dell. He was then loaned out to Bristol City before opting for switching for Brighton & Hove Albion for more happier times. He scored 20 goals in just 63 games for The Seagulls but left in December 1997 to join Leyton Orient. He has since gone on to play for Aylesbury United and is now Assistant Manager at Staines.



WE MEET AGAIN...

DAVE WALLIS DELVES INTO HIS ARCHIVES TO PROVIDE US WITH A PLAYER WHO HAS PLAYED FOR BOTH CLUBS.



John Neal

Born in Silksworth, Tyne and Wear in April 1932, John Neal was a full back who started at Silksworth Juniors before dipping his toe in the professional waters of League football with Second Division Hull City in August 1949. Despite completing 60 League games for the Tigers, John was allowed to leave for non-League football and joined Swindon from Kings Lynn in July 1957.

Stepping straight into the first team he was to stay at the County Ground for two seasons during which he missed just one League game. 1957/58 was the last season of the Third Division South and Neal's contribution helped Town to secure a top half finish and a place in the newly formed national Third Division for 1958/59. John

could be found at right back in 41 of the 46 League matches in his first season, with a further four outings taking place in the left back shirt, while in 1958/59 he made the right sided shirt his own with an ever present campaign.


A move to Aston Villa followed in the summer of 1959 and John remained consistent with 112 outings during which he claimed a Division Two championship medal in 1960 and a League Cup winners medal the following year in the competition's inaugural season.

A drop to Division Three with Southend saw him top 100 appearances once more and in 1968 Neal took over the manager's reins at Wrexham where he was to stay for nine seasons. Guiding the club to promotion to Division Three in 1970, Wrexham were to win the Welsh Cup in 1972 and 1975, a feat

which came with the added honour of representing the country in the European Cup Winners Cup. A charge to the Quarter Finals in 1976 brought glory North Wales before elimination from the competition by Anderlecht.

Accepting the challenge of the leadership of Chelsea in 1981, John led the club back to the top with the Second Division championship in 1984 and was rewarded with a Directorship in 1986.

As a player John Neal was consistent and reliable over a career spanning more than 350 League games, during which he won silverware on several occasions. As a manager he led his teams to further trophies and was responsible for some of Wrexham's most memorable nights as they competed effectively on the European stage.



DUKEY'S COLUMN

Here we are now six games into the new season and find ourselves tenth in a very tight Second Division table. Still only five points from a top spot, it has been a little bit frustrating. 
hard to score goals (five in six league games so far).

THOSE WERE THE DAYS!

FC: MAGAZINE INVITES SWINDON FANS YOUNG AND OLD TO REMEMBER THE GOOD OLD DAYS AND NAME THEIR FAVOURITE SWINDON XI.

NAME: Simon Coy

QUALIFICATIONS: I discovered the highs and lows of life at the County Ground in 1982 when my best friend took me to see Town's victory over Second Division Carlisle in the third round of the FA Cup. The following season I began supporting in earnest and soon discovered that I was about to take a ride on one of football's greatest roller coasters.

There was never a dull moment over the next 20 years as I visited 80 other clubs in the pursuit of glory. Finally, the ultimate day came at Wembley Stadium on 31st May 1993 when, with 40,000 other Swindon supporters, I held my breath as Paul Bodin converted from the spot and the impromptu street party began.

I'm now starting a new life as the Club's Sports Reporter (together with Adrian Smith) and can, at last, give something back to the place that has given me so many great memories over the last two decades.

Here is his favourite team comprising of players from his era.

1. FRASER DIGBY

A Swindon team chosen from the last 20 years without Fraser in goal would be an injustice as the former England U21 keeper was Mr Consistent.

2. NICKY SUMMERBEE

One of the most prolific goalscorers in recent years anywhere. His record of goals per game in his career is better than Lineker and they went in from anywhere.


10. STEFANI MIGLIORANZI





PETERBOROUGH UNITED ARE THE VISITORS TO THE COUNTY GROUND ON 27TH SEPTEMBER WHEN BARRY FRY BRINGS HIS TEAM TO TOWN.

An 11th position finish in Division Two last season saw United finish one place below Town, and like Swindon, Peterborough endured a season of contrasts. In dire relegation trouble in March, Posh rallied to remain unbeaten in the last nine games, collecting 19 points in the process.

This term, Peterborough's fortunes away from home have contrasted sharply with their results at London Road. Losing all three opening matches at home they remain unbeaten on their travels,

recording wins at bottom two Brentford and Notts County. A 1-1 draw last week at Grimsby maintained the good travelling start and saw Adam Newton record a first half opener. The point gained ultimately leaves Boro on seven, four places below Swindon.

Andy Clarke was last season's top goal scorer in the League with 16 and he remains the man Town's defence will have to be wary of with four strikes to his credit this season, while the goal conceded at Grimsby is the first that the away defence have allowed in 2003/04. Perhaps worryingly for Barry Fry, last year's second top scorer was Leon McKenzie with just five goals, which suggests that if Town can keep Clarke shackled, Posh may struggle to hit the net.

Andy King will be hoping that his team will offer stiffer opposition than Peterborough have thus far encountered.

Keeper Mark Tyler began with the club as a trainee and made 29 of almost 200 appearances last season. Now in his tenth season with the club, Tyler has started this season as the regular custodian.

It was of course from Peterborough that Swindon signed Bart Griemink, but with Rhys Evans currently in charge of the first team keeper's jersey the big Dutchman may not get the chance to perform against his old club.

Last year saw Town draw 1-1 in both encounters with Peterborough. Both managers will be hoping for at least the same from next week's encounter.


