Unfortunately I believe Sam Parkin won't be fit for the game today. His knee injury has proved a little bit more complicated and will probably need another few days up until the Chesterfield before we can make a decision on whether he will need some form of investigative surgery. This is not good news for us and losing your top goal scorer at any Club is a major issue. I have said before that him and Tommy were the best partnership in the Division. However, I am sure with your help and encouragement the lads will rally round and overcome the setbacks to continue this run.

A plus point to come out of the weekend was the inclusion of young Sebastien Ruster on the bench, although you didn't get the chance to see him in action. I felt that it was a difficult situation to put him into at 2-1 down. He is learning English and I am sure he will be an asset to this Club as well as being a player that the fans will enjoy.

We have had some wonderful news this week, Brian Howard was included in the England U20 squad that faced the Czech Republic on Thursday night. To have someone at international level once again is great news for the Club and I am pleased that the FA keep an open mind in terms of selection.




Keep up the support, you were brilliant at Bristol City last weekend and let's hope we can reward you with another home win this afternoon.

Good afternoon and welcome to you all for today's match up with Stockport County. On behalf of the board of directors can i also extend a warm welcome to the directors, management, players and supporters of Stockport County. I have met John Hollins on a couple of occasions. The last time was a few years ago at the American University in Bushey, Watford, when John was employed by the producers of Sky TV's Dream Team to assist on the football scenes for the series. I was working at Watford FC at the time and the producers were using Vicarage Road for some of the office scenes and close up football shots. I understand that they use Millwall's ground these days.

With all the controversy surrounding some of the referring decisions in

last Wednesday's match against Luton Town, it is only fair to comment upon the positive actions of the football league and match referrees. Firstly a full bloodied derby match at Ashton Gate was handled in superb fashion by Mr Webb last Saturday. He let the match flow as much as possible, and when was the last time a local derby didn't feature a vellow card. Secondly, we are grateful to Mr Clattenberg the referee from our cup tie with Leeds United, and the Football League, for taking the time to review and then rescind the decision to book Bart Griemink for handling outside the area. We can be quick to criticise referees, who have a very difficult task as it is, but is good to see that common sense can prevail in this game of ours and we should be as quick to applaud it when it happens.

As these programme notes are written, I once again find myself having to comment on an article from one of the Sunday newspapers. This time the conjecture is that the club are about to sell Sam Parkin to a Premiership club with a clutch of other clubs jostling for his signature. The truth of the matter is that we are currently negotiating with Sam's advisors over an extension to his current deal. The club are not actively looking to sell Sam, although when you score the number of goals that Sam has you are bound to create headlines. As

with any business, your best employees will be sought after by your opposition and football is no different. Every football club, bar the obvious few, will tell you every player has a price. You only have to note that Sheffield Wednesday have loaned out one of their top scorers to ease their wage bill to see that. I would hope that our revenue streams, including through the turnstiles, increases to such an effect that we are able to give Andy King additional funding for new players to maintain our push at the top of the table.

We decided to reduce some ticket prices for todays game in an extra effort to build attendances at the County Ground. To those of you here for the first time or if you are returning after a long absence from supporting the team-enjoy yourselves, make some noise and please keep coming!

As you will see on the stats page, there were over 2,600 Town fans at Ashton Gate last weekend- a threefold increase on last season and the support you gave the team was wonderful. We are only sorry that we couldn't quite produce the result we all wanted, especially in a local derby, but please keep the faith. We are only 4 points off the top place and your vocal support is crucial as we attempt to stay in the top six and beyond.



Jerel Ifil was a tower of strength in defence as Town scored twice in the last six minutes through Sam Parkin and James Milner to move into second place in the League, writes STFC Sports Reporter Adrian Smith.

Swindon kicked off with a different line-up in a 3-5-2 formation after their heroics against Leeds with David Duke missing through injury and their first attack resulted in a free-kick by Igoe after Andy Gurney's cross had been handled but the ball just evaded Sam Parkin.

Peterborough pushed forward and almost punished Town for some hesitant defending but Jerel Ifil was on hand to cut out the danger from lively McKenzie. Town were beginning to find their attacking form with Mooney, Milner and Parkin prominent in several moves before Parkin had

the ball in the net but the referee had already stopped play for offside. Peterborough goalkeeper Tyler made a smart save from Gurney after he had been sent clear by Hewlett and Igoe also went close shortly afterwards, but were denied by Tyler in the 'Posh' goal. Sam Parkin went close again with two shots after good play by Igoe and Gurney.

At the other end Ifil was having a superb game at the heart of the Town defence with several important tackles on McKenzie and the powerful forward play of Clarke. Milner went close in the 20th minute after a long ball from Matt Hewlett but his shot went just wide and a minute later Parkin had a shot from close range but his weak shot was gathered by Tyler, Gurney was cautioned midway through the first half when he fell after being challenged by Legg and appealing for a free-kick.


McKenzie had a fine solo run but was denied by another outstanding tackle by Ifil and Peterborough went close from the corner but Rea's weak header did not trouble Evans. Heywood also denied the same player with a brave last-ditch tackle and Mooney was on hand to clear from the corner and moments later Milner went close with a chip which went just over the bar. Mooney almost put Town ahead but his powerful header struck the post and rebounded off Tyler for a corner that was caught by Tyler. Two minutes later Mooney's goal-bound shot was cleared off the line by Arber who needed treatment for an injury and there was time for one more Mooney attack just before Referee Mr Boyeson blew for halftime.

After the break Miglioranzi made a timely interception from Clarke resulting in a corner which was cleared before Milner went close

with two good attacks Simon Rea was cautioned for a foul on Mooney but Gurney was unable to repeat Wednesday's precision free-kick and the ball sailed over the bar.

Peterborough made early substitutions with Newton replacing Kanu and Farrell taking over from Wood and within a minute Igoe went close with a good solo run but was denied by keeper Tyler and this was his last attacking contribution before being substituted by Brian Howard.

Halfway through the second half
Heywood made a last ditch tackle on
McKenzie and the resulting corner
was cleared for an attack involving
Miglioranzi and Parkin Farrell had a
powerful shot which struck the
crossbar and McKenzie headed the
rebound wide before Town stepped
up a gear with Milner and Mooney
linking up well.

Andy King pushed Milner forward to

join the attacking duo of Parkin and Mooney to try and snatch the lead and he placed the opposing defence under heavy pressure. At the other end Viveash made a timely interception from a powerful goal-bound shot by ex Cardiff player Legg before Evans made a point blank save from McKenzie with ten minutes remaining.

Town took a deserved lead in the 84th minute when a pinpoint Gurney cross from the left wing was powerfully headed in by Parkin for his fifth goal in six games and this raised the noise levels around the County Ground.

Ifil made another towering header to deny Peterborough shortly before Evans was injured in a collision but he was able to carry on after treatment. Peterborough pushed forward in numbers but were caught out by a classic Town counterattack with James Milner sealing the three points with a smart turn and shot to

score his first goal in Town colours and send the crowd of 6,767 home very happy.

Swindon extend their unbeaten run to 10 games after battling back for a 2-2 draw after both sides are reduced to 10 men writes STFC Sports Reporter Simon Coy.

A late goal by substitute Bryan Howard grabbed a point for Town after Luton had turned the game on its head with two quick goals from McSheffrey and Forbes. This followed an early goal for Swindon through James Milner before Referee Paul Danson sent off Miglioranzi and Davis early in the second half.

Town began positively and in the 7th minute took an early lead. A determined run down the left flank by Sammy Igoe saw his pinpoint cross find James Milner in the centre of the box and the Leeds man, making his final appearance for Town, headed past Beckwith from 12 yards.

Three minutes later Pitt surged down

the left of midfield before playing the ball into the path of McSheffrey. The striker ran into the box, went down and was booked by referee Paul Danson for diving.

Just after quarter of an hour a corner taken by Courtney Pitt was met by Coyne's header but Evans was equal to it. A minute later Milner ran onto a long ball over the top but Beckwith racing off his line just beat the young forward to the ball and cleared the danger.

Luton had an excellent chance to equalise in the 21st minute when they won a free kick in the centre 28 yards from goal. The shot by Pitt whistled just over the bar, but Rhys almost certainly had it covered.

Town were awarded a free-kick after 28 minutes after Paul Hughes fouled Matt Hewlett and was booked. Hatter's manager Mike Newell was incensed

by the decision and made his feelings known to the fourth official. Referee Danson backed up his official by sending Newell into the stand.

In the 42nd minute Luton had one of their rare chances of the half when a good ball through midfield from **Hughes found Emmerson Boyce** making an excellent run into the box but his powerful shot was straight into the arms of a grateful Evans.

With a minute of the first half left a foul on Pitt by Miglioranzi earned the Town midfielder a yellow card.

The second half started disastrously for Swindon when a minute after the restart Miglioranzi was given a second yellow card for dribbling the ball away when Luton had been awarded a free kick.

In the 48th minute a good cross found Forbes clear at the far post but his

point blank goalbound shot was brilliantly saved by Evans. Three minutes later a McSheffrey shot flew wide of the right hand post from 18 yards.

After 54 minutes even numbers were restored when Mr Danson sent off ex-Town defender Sol Davis for use of an elbow after consulting with his linesman.

In the 63rd minute Luton were awarded a penalty when McSheffrey was bundled over by Viveash. The spotkick was well saved to his right by Evans but the referees attention was drawn by his assistant who had seen Rhys come forward off his line and he ordered the kick to be retaken. Evans protested and found his way into the book for arguing with the assistant referee. The second

kickwas confidently put away by McSheffrey.

After 67 minutes Luton were ahead through an excellent individual goal. The lively Forbes ghosted into the right of the box and shimmied left and right before sending a well placed shot into the far corner past Evans. Two goals in four minutes had changed the game on its head.

Town surged forward looking looking for an equaliser as they attempted to maintain the unbeaten run. A Milner cross from the left came out to Hewlett on edge of box but his longrange first time shot was gathered by the Beckwith after 72 minutes.

Swindon nearly got back on level terms with 15 minutes left when a trademark Milner run into box ended when he fired a shot which was cleared off the line at the near post by the alert Coyne.

With ten minutes left Andy King tried to alter the course of the game with a double substitution bringing on Brian Howard for Sammy Igoe and Steve Robinson, back from injury, for Hewlett. Two minutes later the manager made one last throw of the dice when he brought Alan Reeves on as a makeshift striker replacing Duke.

Luton had a chance to increase their lead after 82 minutes. McSheffrey pulled the ball back to Forbes on the edge of the box. His determined run evaded the first tackle before firing a shot just wide of the left hand post.



4.45PM -


At the end of the game I organise the Man of the Match award, then go to see the player involved and act as host for the presentations between the player and sponsors.





VINTAGE RED

Today's picture shows Paul Batty celebrating scoring the first goal in Swindon's 4-0 victory over Stockport County on 27th October 1984. In the background can be the Old Stand that had once stood on the Aldershot military tattoo ground. The crowd for the match was only 2,465 and lack of numbers had led to the closure of all but blocks C and B of the top deck (hence the rows of empty seats). It was the last season the upper tier seats were in use as concern over the narrow exit and steep wooden steps led to its closure on health and safety grounds. Another interesting point in this picture is the large advertising board for Lowndes Lambert David Alderton, one of their directors had joined the Board, and they had become Town's main sponsors at the start of the season financing the acquisition of Lou Macari as manager. Lou notched a second half goal for Town after Paul Batty and Peter Coyne had given Swindon a 2-0 half time lead and Alan Mayes completed the scoring.


The match programme cost 45 pence and although there was an attractive aerial picture of the County Ground in colour on the cover, the black and white photos inside seemed poorly reproduced. Among the articles inside were one by Scott Endersby the Town keeper and an informative piece by Dave King on the Stockport squad who also wrote about the Ups and Downs of Football and a Focus on Division Four. There was an article on the Junior Robins at this stage in the first season of their existence and an informative page by Mike Skinner called Flashback which gave information on previous clashes between the two sides.

Although Stockport lost the match at the County Ground they gained revenge the following March when goals by Clive Evans and John Kerr gave County a 2-1 win in which Dave Hockaday got the Swindon goal. It was one of 11 homes victories but with only two wins away Stockport

finished in 22nd position and had to apply for re-election. Former Bishop Auckland player, Tommy Sword with 12 goals (8 from the penalty spot) was leading scorer and John Kerr a £2,000 signing from Bristol City, with 10 were the only players to reach double figures in goals scored. Goalkeeper Mike Salmon was the only ever present player in the County line up that season.

Swindon finished in 8th position a better position than had seemed likely at one stage in the season but a huge disappointment given the history of the club now enduring its first, and so far, only spell in Division Four. Colin Gordon who got a hat trick in the home match with Northampton with 17 was the leading scorer. Statistics indicating things have been far worse for both sides than they are today is shown by the average gates for the season. Town's was 3,024 while Stockport's was an even more dismal 1.895.





THE GAFFER JOHN HOLLINS

As a midfielder, John Hollins, MBE, now 57, had a very good career, spanning 20 years during which time he appeared in more than 700 League games for three London clubs: Arsenal, Chelsea and QPR, having two spells with the Gunners and at Stamford bridge. Capped by his country at youth, 'B' Under-23 and senior levels: he also represented the Football

League and collected medals for triumphs in the FA Cup, League Cup, European Cupwinner's Cup and Second Division. He managed Chelsea (1985-88) and Swansea City (1998-2001) has since been in charge of while also acting as coach to several clubs. He took over as caretakermanager at Stockport earlier this season following the sacking of Carlton Palmer.

LUKE BECKETT


Striker LUKE BECKETT, out injured during September/early October, is a key player in the County side. Aged 26, and a native of Sheffield, he played initially for Barnsley (1995-98) and after spells with Chester City (32 goals), chesterfield (26 goals in only 74 games) he signed for Stockport for £100,000 in December 2001. He's now netted over 40 times for the Hatters and had an excellent 2002-03 season when he top-scored with 29 goals. He would have certainly pushed leading striker Robert Earnshaw (Cardiff City) close for the Second Division's 'Golden Boot' award had he not missed the last two games of the campaign. He collected all of County's 'Player of the Year' prizes and at the same time grabbed his first senior hat-trick, against Northampton Town . Sharp and decisive, eager and active, he could well be a handful his afternoon.

DID YOU KNOW?

Internationals Asa Hartford, Mike Summerbee and Jimmy Melia all managed County between 1979-89 and since then Dave Jones (now Wolves) and Gary Megson (WBA) have also been in charge at Edgeley Park.

LAST MEETING

Last season (on 31 August 2002) the Hatters beat the Robins 1-0 in a Second Division League game in front of 5,456 spectators, Luke Beckett scoring the all-important goal just before the hour mark.

JAMES SPENCER


6ft. 5in goalkeeper, a professional for 18 months, who started this season with only four first team outings behind him.

BRIAN HOWARD JOINED SWINDON TOWN ON 16TH JULY 2003 FROM SOUTHAMPTON AND HAVING BEEN WITH THE SAINTS FOR TWO SEASONS, IS NOW FIRMLY PART OF ANDY KING'S FUTURE PLANS AT THE COUNTY GROUND.

Having been involved with the England U20 squad this week as they faced the Czech Republic at Stevenage, attentions now turn to this afternoons Division Two clash with Stockport County. Brian started last Saturday's local derby at Bristol City and the Winchester born midfielder has appeared in nine of Town's fourteen games so far this campaign.

Firstly Brian, for those of you who don't know your background, where did you start playing football?

I was playing for Eastleigh Vikings when I was eight years old, my local team. From there I then got signed on by Southampton and progressed through the youth ranks. I was in the reserves for three seasons but I never actually made a competitive first team appearance. However, I was involved in around seven first team squads under Glenn Hoddle and Stuart Gray when they were in charge.

Having come from a Premiership environment, what are the differences between the top flight and Division Two?

I would say it is a lot more physical in Division Two.

There are a lot of differences but the squad is a lot smaller here at Swindon. We used to do more gym work as a team at Southampton but I players here tend to go to the gym individually.

The training methods are more enjoyable as a player here because there are more game situations, such as small-sided games. This I think benefits you as a player, there was a lot of general training done at Southampton.

What was it like under Gordon Strachan at St.Marys?

Hard work to say the least! We had to endure three long running sessions a week and then just as many sessions in the gym. He liked his sides to be as fit and strong as possible. Sometimes it wasn't all about ability with Gordon, just hard guts and determination.

He was a bit of a nutcase at times though, you certainly wouldn't want to be on his side and give the ball away in training, he would let you know about it if you did!

What position do you prefer to play?


Centre midfield or in behind the strikers.

How did it feel to score against Luton Town recently?

It was unbelievable, what a buzz! It made he game all the more exciting with the penalties and sending-off as well. To keep our unbeaten record going with a late goal, being my first in senior football was fantastic.

I was confident I could hit the ball well when it came to me and I was ecstatic after it went in. It was one of the biggest midweek crowds we have had in a few years so I have been told and to score in front of the Town End made it all the more special.

I got booked for my celebration but had the referee known that it was my first goal in senior football maybe he wouldn't have shown me the card, we will never know. It was a bit harsh I thought but these things happen.





There is a blend of youth and experience here at The County Ground, what do you think of the balance of the squad?

It is good because of that mix we have. As a young player, you look at people like Tommy Mooney, Adi Viveash and Alan Reeves, they have great experience and you can learn a lot off them.

Tommy has a go at me now and then in training but it is all part of the learning curve and they are great to have around the Club.

What are your aims for the next few months?

To establish a regular first team place and hopefully to score more goals.

Do you feel a little frustrated at the lack of first team opportunities?

Frustrated yes, as all I want to do is play first

team football. I have had a taste for it having started last week at Bristol City but I know I have to be patient. The players that have been in the side have been playing very well. It is not a big squad but we have quality.

What is it like having been involved in the England U20 set-up this week?

It is a totally different set-up to the one here at Swindon. There is a lot more technical football and it is about playing the ball out from the back. League football is about getting results first and foremost. The most technically gifted young players from across the country were in the squad and it was a great experience. I have now got around 35 caps for my country at youth levels.

How will England do against Turkey this afternoon?

We have to win don't we, so I will go for a 1-0 England win, with Michael Owen on the scoresheet.





They called him "Fridge" and strikers would shiver in his very presence. Cool as ice yet as hard as nails, Colin Calderwood was the very epitome of the model professional. Solid, dependable, loyal...I could go on; the list is almost endless.

Colin, a true Town legend, made 330 appearances in eight years for Swindon before going on to play at the highest level with 163 appearances for Spurs. There also followed 36 caps for Scotland, which is more than Lou Macari or Brian McClair and 10 more than Alan Hansen.

Simon Coy spoke to the Spurs Reserve Team Manager last week about how fitness paid off, watching the highs and lows of the Town faithful at Wembley and Paul Bodin's amazing run of important goals. He began by remembering his view of the Town masses as the game at the home of football swung one way and then the other.

"I remember being stood at the far end of the pitch at Wembley looking at the other goal and us going two nothing ahead and then three nothing ahead, and looking at all the red and white bouncing about. And then in the next twenty minutes watching less and less movement in them and almost being stood still when it went to three all, and then again the change when we got the penalty. The joy you could see when we scored the penalty was the thing that sticks in my mind, the different emotions that the fans went through"

Colin went on to explain why the never say die attitude of Hoddle's men brought out the best in the face of adversity.

"Throughout my time at Swindon we scored a number of goals, especially in the early years, late on which won games for us. We were renowned in the lower leagues for being fitter than every other team. This is something that is important throughout the leagues. There were a core of players that had been with the club through from divisions four, three and two, into one and then into the play-off final so when you look back at the games on video you can see that there was a bit of resolve in the team. We were always a team that people didn't like coming to and when you speak to people in the game today they say that we were remembered as being a very good side."

When we got into the play-offs what sticks in my mind now is the run that we had getting there and the goals scored by Paul Bodin. I think he had a spell where he scored something like 9 or 10 goals in just over the same number of games."

"The Newcastle game was a big game because Glenn Hoddle was injured and I think Paul Hunt played, so we ended up not having the people who had played the majority of the season. It was good for the local boys, for Paul and the others, to come in and do well. In terms of that season, when people look back at the records and they look quite closely, the achievement of it all looks greater and greater".

"Fridge" and Shaun Taylor were both ever present in the 1992/93 promotion season, which in itself was testimony to the consistency and professionalism of the partnership.

"Being on the coaching side now I would say that playing every game together lends itself to very good stability at the back. We had a sense of partnership that had grown over the two years that we played together. We were helped by having Glenn playing either just between us or slightly in front of us."

Being in charge of the reserves at White Hart Lane is the perfect start for Colin in the coaching side of the game, and he would one day like the chance to step up into the top job.

"At some point I want to become a manager. The opportunities are few and far between but if I do get the opportunity at some time along the line its something in my career on the coaching side that I definitely want to have a pop at."

Finally, Calderwood has fond memories of his Swindon days and feels Andy King is doing a good job with the present Town squad.

"Swindon are doing fine at the minute and its one of the results that I always look for. I spoke to Andy three or four times last year and I've spoken to him a couple of times this year already. He's a good fella and he's good company."








WE MEET AGAIN...

DAVE WALLIS DELVES INTO HIS ARCHIVES TO PROVIDE US TWO PLAYERS WHO HAVE PLAYED FOR BOTH CLUBS.

Mike Summerbee

Winger Mike Summerbee was one of the original Bert's Babes who took Swindon Town to the uncharted territory of the Second Division in the early 1960's. Signed by Bert Head, Mike was learning his wingmanship in Cheltenham for a YMCA club called Baker Street when he was invited to step into the Football League with Swindon Cheltenham Town themselves had been under the stewardship of Mike's father, George, between the summers of 1950 and 1952 indicating that the Summerbee's were a footballing family. George played for Aldershot, Preston, Chester and Barrow and Mike's uncle Gordon appearing for Aldershot before the

Initially signing as an amateur in 1958, Buzzer actually made his League debut against Bournemouth in 1959 some months before he signed his first professional contract, and he played a big part in securing Town's promotion to the Second Division in 1962/63.

When relegation came in 1964/65, top scorer Summerbee chose to further his career with a move to Second Division Manchester City in exchange for £30,000, a change that brought great success. The Second Division championship was claimed in Mike's first season and such was City's prominence in the late sixties and early seventies that he gained a 1969 FA Cup winners medal, but Mike missed the European Cup Winners Cup final the following season. The European Cup and the UEFA cup stages would also witness Summerbee's skills

England honours were forthcoming, although Alf Ramsey's lack of penchant for wingers limited Mike's international cap haul to eight, but perhaps City's most celebrated success occurred when they pipped local rivals United to the First Division Championship by two points in 1967/68.

After nine eventful seasons and over 350 appearances he left City in June 1975 for Burnley, where he made another 50 appearances before moving on to Blackpool eighteen months later. Just three matches at Bloomfield Road meant a further departure, this time back to the Manchester area and today's visitors Stockport County in the summer of 1977. If this was to be a swansong it was a fruitful one, as Mike clocked up another 87 games before winding up his career with 716 League appearances to his name.


Of course Mike's son Nick was to bring about the rare feat of representing the third generation of footballers from the same family. In an interesting twist, all but Nick made their Football League debuts at the County Ground, Mike for Swindon and George and Gordon in a match in 1934 while representing Aldershot. Nick's debut came in an away match at Hull in 1990.

John Thomas

Finding players who have played for both clubs sometimes isn't easy. John Thomas was a Liverpool born winger who started his career with the team representing the blue half of Merseyside, signing as a professional in December 1948. Born 48 hours before Christmas Day 1926 John would have been around 22 when he joined Everton, and it's fair to assume that his professional career was somewhat hampered by the away European fixture that was World War Two. He appears to have been given very little chance to impress manager George Martin because as 1949 entered it's second month and without making a League appearance at Goodison, John was on his way to the County Ground to sign for Louis Page.

He had to wait until the 1950/51

before making his debut for Town, in a 2-0 defeat at Norwich in September 1950 when he filled in for Willie Millar on the right wing, then played the last three games in place of Jimmy Bain on the left. With a little over 50 League appearances in a career spanning seven seasons, John Thomas perhaps didn't have the most successful career a professional footballer has ever experienced.

NAME: Ian "Digger" Banks

QUALIFICATIONS: "Digger" has been following Swindon Town for over 30 years having first watched Town play in 1973 when a family friend (a Hereford United supporter then and now) took him to see Swindon vs Maidstone United in the Cup. Town won the game 3-1 though it remains a distant memory and he has no idea who the players or goalscorers were. He remembers sitting in the North Stand blue seats on a not so warm afternoon with a rather sparse crowd.

It was only in the early 80's that "Digger" started watching Swindon on a regular basis. Back in those days the Club had very few resources available and the manager tended to be an explayer or relatively unknown name such as John Trollope or Ken Beamish. The team consisted of ageing players or young players coming through the ranks who weren't quite good enough (Paul Rideout apart). The team were struggling along at the wrong end of the old Division Three and this never looked like changing.

Since then "Digger", along with thousands of other fans, has followed Swindon through the roller coaster years from the Lou Macari era until the present day.

- 1. Fraser Digby: Very consistent goalkeeper with great handling skills and fine shot stopper who made the position his own over a period of 12 years.
- Nicky Summerbee: Very quick winger who adapted to the wing back position. Great dribbler at pace who had an amazing ability to swing in telling crosses from seemingly impossible positions.
- 3. Phil King: Solid full back with a sweet left foot who liked to overlap and curl in great crosses for the forwards.
- **4. Tim Parkin:** Big stopper who was good in the air. Wholehearted player who always gave 100%.



- Colin Calderwood: Rock solid defender, hard as nails who never allowed a striker any space. He was strong in the tackle with good positional sense.
- Shaun Taylor: Big defender who was also good in the air.
 A real battler who chased everything and made numerous last ditch tackles to save the day.
- 7. Chris Kamara: High energy player with a crunching tackle who covered a lot of ground. When you saw him steaming across the pitch after a ball you would wait for both the ball and the man to end up in the stand. He would probably get sent off every game nowadays.
- 8. Glenn Hoddle: Midfield general who was equally good as sweeper or in midfield with the ability to control a match. A player with great vision with passing skills to match. Great trickster and a goal scorer. What else can you say about Glenn the player world class?
- Duncan Shearer: Big strong striker with a powerful shot who wasn't afraid to stick his head in where it hurt. Scored lots of goals including a number of spectacular ones.
- 10. Dave Bamber: Big, awkward, gangly player who could play in midfield or as a striker with quick feet. He could dribble past defenders for fun and score goals. Worth the admission money alone with his mesmerising skills which could light up the place.
- 11. Mark Walters: Pacey winger with quick feet and great dribbling ability. Everyone in the ground including the opposition knew he was going to do the step-over, but the trick always worked. Good crosser of the ball with either foot and great at free-kicks.

Town lost their unbeaten run in a 2-1 derby defeat at the hands of Bristol City after taking the lead writes STFC Sports Reporters Simon Coy and Adrian Smith.

Lee Peacock's header cancelled out Tommy Mooney's 8th goal of the season before Aaron Brown's unstoppable drive won the game for City in an excellent second half comeback. A competitive derby game was played in a good spirit with referee Webb making no bookings before a crowd of 14294.

Town made a number of enforced changes following the end of the loan spells with Bryan Howard and Ian Herring coming into the starting line up and new signing Sebastien Ruster on the bench.

The game began slowly with the first significant action being a dipping shot by Brian Tinnion in the second minute, which flew just over the bar. Andy King was forced into an early change for Swindon when Stefani Miglioranzi picked up an injury and was replaced by Grant Smith in the ninth minute.

A minute later Town were awarded a free kick in a central position 30 yards from goal. Mooney and Gurney stood over the ball but it was left to the skipper to fire a powerful curling shot into the side netting.

After quarter of an hour a good move involving Howard and Mooney ended with a dipping shot by the big number 8 just over the bar. Five minutes later a long throw by Duke caused panic in the City defence before the ball was scrambled clear.


In the 22nd minute City came within inches of taking the lead. A corner swung in from the left was met by a powerful Tony Butler header which rattled the crossbar. Seconds later a

good cross from Wilkshire reached Peacock, but his header brought an excellent double save from Rhys Evans as Miller swooped on the loose ball.


Just after the half-hour Town were ahead. Grant Smith flicked on an Adi Viveash free kick from the left and Mooney was on hand to slot home left footed from 10 yards for his 8th goal of the season in the 34th minute.

Five minutes after the goal Bristol City threatened through captain Tinnion whose powerful shot flew across the area. Any sort of touch could have ended in a goal but the closest City player was Peacock and the ball went behind him.

In the 43rd minute Town had a free kick on the right hand of midfield which Grant Smith took. His ball in was pushed behind for a corner by keeper Phillips under pressure from Mooney. As the corner was delivered referee

Webb blew for a City free kick after spotting a push in the box.

In added time at the end of the half a mistake by the City defence released Mooney who bore down on goal but Butler was on hand to tackle back and clear the danger.

Seven minutes into the second half
City were level when a first time cross
from the left by Brown was met by
Peacock's header beating Evans to the
ball at his near post.

Just after quarter of an hour of the second half Grant Smith was hurt when he raced through in a 50:50 ball against keeper Phillips and collided with City man. After treatment he was unable to continue and the substitute for Miglioranzi was himself substituted as Alan Reeves came on to replace him.

On the hour a quick free kick was taken by Tinnion which was threaded

through to Brown. The City player skipped past a tackle before shooting from the edge of the area but his effort went inches wide of the left post. A minute later City made a double substitution with Hill coming on for Bell and Roberts on for Burnell.

Swindon were looking to play long balls up towards Mooney who was missing his normal strike partner Sam Parkin out with a knee injury.

With just over twenty minutes left Andy King made his final change with Jon Stevenson replacing the quiet Sammy Igoe.

In the 74th minute City took the lead.

Ex-Middlesbrough midfielder Luke
Wilkshire threaded a pinpoint pass
through midfield to the onrushing
Brown who, taking the ball in his
stride, had one touch past Herring
before letting fly from 18 yards with an
unstoppable drive into the top corner
past the despairing dive of Evans.



Peacock came close to grabbing another half chance when a chip forward was miscontrolled by Heywood but the striker only had a second to shoot and sent the ball high into the stand.

Following the goal Swindon tried desperately to come back on level terms. City made their final change in the 84th minute with Leroy Lita replacing Lee Miller.

In the final minute as Town pressed for the equaliser the ball fell to Duke in the centre of the box and he found Mooney but the striker was crowded out and the danger cleared as the 2,684 travelling fans roared the team forward.

In added time City began to exploit the space at the back as Swindon pushed forward. A quick break down the left by Brown ended with a last ditch clearance by Viveash as he did well to get between Lita and Wilkshire.

Time finally ran out for Swindon as they made one last push forward through Stevenson and after 10 consecutive games without defeat finally succumbed to their local rivals.
