

A Word from Mac

There is no doubt that Tuesday night's LDV Vans Trophy game against Macclesfield Town was a must win game for us. In the end we ground out a welcome victory but it certainly wasn't easy and, as the lads soon discovered, it certainly wasn't a dream. The next day everyone was able to read in the papers and see confirmation that Chesterfield had actually won a football game. Winning is a habit we want to continue in the league. Today its back to league action and I extend a warm welcome to manager Andy King and the players and officials of Swindon Town.

Although the performance against Macclesfield Town last Tuesday night was less than convincing we got a result. I reckon you could touch the tension out there on the park. But now we have overcome a significant psychological barrier, the victory should go a long way in giving us all a lift. Apart from the away game at Grimsby, which we lost four nil,

we have been in with a chance in just about all of our other games. There have been times when we have had to scratch our heads as to why we missed out on three points but there is little point in dwelling too long on the past. They say that the margin in football between success and failure is wafer thin and I think our experience over the first two months of the season has proved that to be true. We have deserved more points than we have achieved, but the league table does not lie.

It is now a case of rolling up our sleeves and looking forward to results we now know are possible, however they are achieved. There will be setbacks on the way, because that is the nature of the game. It must not distract us. We must all remain focused on accumulating more points. I am told that the last time Chesterfield had a similar poor start to the season way back in 1948/49 the side actually went on to finish in sixth position. We still have plenty of points to play for so lets hope that history can repeat itself.

Today, Chesterfield FC plays its part in football's biggest ever initiative against racism by staging an Anti-Racism Day. I fully endorse football's Kick It Out antiracism campaign and firmly believe that football grounds throughout the country should always welcome fans and players whatever the colour of their skin, ethnic origin or culture. Anyone who does not agree with these sentiments is not welcome at Saltergate.

Finally, there was a bonus with our victory over Macclesfield Town. We are now in round two of the LDV Vans Trophy with a real chance of reaching the Area Quarter finals and the financial benefits that can come from reaching the final stages of this cup competition.

Enjoy this afternoon's game.






BLATHERWICK APOLOGISES FOR SENDING OFF



A Lost Robin in Chesterfield

I have supported Swindon Town since October 1965 when my dad took me to see Swindon play the mighty Gillingham at the County Ground, and yes Swindon lost 1-0. Having moved to Chesterfield with the Post Office I have become a semi-reluctant Chesterfield supporter, and living less than two miles away from Saltergate means that on a Saturday if Swindon are not playing up north I can stroll down and enjoy watching the Spireites especially when, as I hope you do, they beat teams like Sheffield Wednesday and take points off Bristol City who both believe that their history gives them a divine right to be in a higher division.

On to today's game and a week of banter at work can now be forgotten as it will be the deeds on the park that will hopefully make the weekend and next week a good time to be a Swindonian in Chesterfield. The hoodoo of the Reeves brothers was broken, at long last in January 2003 much to the relief of all Swindon fans and Allan, so at least we know we can beat Chesterfield if the Reeves brothers are playing against each other.

The only thing that worries me is that, David Reeves always scores against Swindon (editor - don't let us down Reevesey!) just as in past years whenever Ernie Moss and Bob Newton played against Swindon, they always appeared to score. I expect Chesterfield fans will be hoping that Sam Parkin will not do the business as he did in both games last year, just as years ago the name of Don Rogers (the best player I have ever seen in a Swindon shirt, sorry Glenn) used to make Chesterfield supporters quake in their boots.

Going back over the years I remember two players who both played for Swindon and Chesterfield Colin Prophett and Ray McHale with from a Swindon point of view both were great servants to Swindon playing between them 400 plus games.

It is the people, especially ones with character that make the football club. In Swindon's case the like of Willie Carson can bring a light hearted view to football.

It is good to see that both Swindon and Chesterfield are surviving despite set backs in the past. Let us hope that both sets of directors enable both teams to grow and progress within sensible financial boundaries, as Russian oil billionaires can't be found in Sherwood / Savernake Forests. This leads me to ponder "Do I miss seeing Swindon in the Premiership?". I would be lying if I said no, but realistically it was fantasy football and a pleasant but unreal xperience whereas watching Swindon today is more like the "life and death" experience that I'm used to.

We hear administrators, football managers and soccer pundits appealing for consistency but with so much money being invested there appears to be one rule for the rich and one for the poor. The example I am thinking of is Luke Beckett (ex Chesterfield striker) who was booked for taking off his shirt whilst celebrating scoring for Stockport, yet Thierry Henry does the same for Arsenal and nothing is done. Come on, FA follow your own rules be consistent. Footballers today are role models whether we like it or not and our children have a tendency to follow the actions that footballers perform so why don't the FA clamp down on

misdeameanors? Today we have the technology to look at incidents from matches and my suggestion that every Monday after a weekends Premiership's games that all the Premiership games are reviewed and any footballer like Sol Campbell who lashed out at Djembe would be automatically charged with violent conduct with a hearing set for the Friday of the week thus resolving incidents far quicker than currently.

Also the referees (at all levels) shouldn't be exempt from review - their performance needs analysing with the appropriate action being taken (and shown to be taken either by the press or the TV media). Referee improvement programmes should be put in place and if that doesn't work well they should be relegated to look after games that will inevitably test them even more (It would be fun to watch the top guiys officiating in either the Swindon or Chesterfield Sunday League).

On a lighter note, with both sides having been pilloried in the press over many years, I hope Cheaterfield Town and Swindle Town, as we both became known, serve up a good afternoons entertainment today and please Swindon ensure that I can hold my head up high as you did last year, if not I will have to wait until the meeting in February 2004 at the County Ground where all Chesterfield fans can enjoy going round and round the Magic Roundabout which is just outside the County Ground whilst Swindon fans can consider climbing the crooked spire before returning to the West Country.

Finally may I hope that both teams have an excellent year with both teams pushing for promotion, be it automatic or via the play-off's.

May your football be good, but more importantly lucky.



In Town **Today**



It's been tough for The Robins over the last few years, two trips into administration, a transfer embargo only recently lifted allowing French winger Sebastien Ruster to join the Club and, this afternoon at least, they're without goal getter supreme San Parkin, who has ligament problems, and midfield magician Stefani Miglioranzi, suspended after a red card against Luton Town.

Despite their problems though, mid table finishes have been in evidence in the last three campaigns, four season ago they just escaped relegation after dropping down from Division One the previous season. However it's less than 10 years ago that the Wiltshire side were in the Premiership, a place denied them a few years earlier after off the field shenanigans. Their only ever

season in the top flight was punctuated with a few drubbings, 7-1 at Newcastle United and 6-2 at Everton in particular spring to mind, but we'd all give our eye teeth to be there, if only for a one season spell.

This season, Andy King's men started with a home defeat against Sheffield Wednesday but, with Parkin and Tommy Mooney forming a great front pairing, good results started to come and a couple of weeks ago, Swindon were perched in second spot. However Leeds starlet James Milner and Watford tough man Jerel Ifil were both on loan then, they've both gone back to their respective Clubs now and King is having to delve a bit deeper into his squad, though it's not a bad one on paper. However, they have lost their last two games in Division Two, both by 2-1 scorelines.

In the squad and also doing a bit of coaching this season is of course Alan Reeves, twin brother of David (pictured). Last season's battles were memorable ones (if you don't support Chesterfield!) with Swindon coming out on top both times with Alan actually scoring the third in a 3-0 win at The County Ground. It was 4-2 to the visitors here early on last season of course.





In Charge - Andy King

Born in 1956, King made his name as a lively midfielder with his home town club, Luton. His next stop was Everton, whom he signed for in 1976 for £35,000. He made 150 appearances for The Toffees, scoring 38 goals in four seasons before joining QPR. Then on to WBA before a return to Everton, where Andy played a further 43 games and added another 11 goals. A short period with Dutch side Cambuur followed before Andy returned to England with Wolves. A brief spell back at Luton in 1985 preceded Andy's final move as a player when he joined Aldershot.

His first managerial appointment was at Mansfield Town in 1993. Having been relegated from Div 2, Mansfield were low on confidence but King managed to steer them to a mid-table finish in his first season. The following season saw The Stags in with a chance of promotion back Div 2, having finished in 6th place in the table, but they lost in the play-off semi-finals to Chesterfield. 5-2 in Leg Two rings a bell! The 1995-96 season saw Mansfield drop down to 19th position in Division Three and Andy was replaced by Steve Parkin.

He spent some time out of management but was still involved in the game, working with Peter Reid at Sunderland as a scout when Colin Todd took him to Swindon as his assistant in the summer of 2000. When Todd got the call from Jim Smith to become his assistant at Derby, King was given the opportunity to impress and after four games in temporary charge he was given the job full-time.

Swindon struggled to keep themselves out of the relegation zone for most of the season but a win over Peterborough in the penultimate game of their league campaign, ensured their Second Division survival. The great escape act was not enough to ensure King's survival however, despite his efforts in keeping The Robins up he was replaced by former Liverpool boss Roy Evans in June 2001. However, Evans left the club before the end of that year, after new owners arrived at the County Ground, he was reinstated as manager in December 2001. He guided them to tenth spot last season.


Introducing our Opponents

BART GRIEMINK (31)

Giant keeper signed by Colin Todd on a free transfer in the summer of 2000 from Peterborough. Griemink is a former Dutch U21 international who spent a successful loan spell with The Robins before joining the club permanently. He came to English football in 1995 with Birmingham and deputised competently for the injured lan Bennett, playing in the 1995 League Cup semi-final. He then followed Barry Fry to Peterborough United but lost his place to Mark Tyler.

3. GRANT SMITH (23)

Grant Smith joined Swindon having been strongly recommended by



Sheffield United boss Neil Warnock. Many at Bramall Lane were surprised that he didn't appear in the United first team more often last season. He has pace, is very good in the air and at set pieces and following a loan spell at Plymouth last season, will know what's required in Division Two.

6. ADI VIVEASH (34)

Dominant central defender who signed for local rivals Reading in 2000 on a free transfer from Walsall. Captain at the Bescot stadium for two seasons and a vital member of the team that won promotion from Division Two in 1998/99. Two-time player of the year during his time with the Saddlers. Viveash started his career with Swindon and spent two separate spells on loan with the Royals. Started 2000/01 as the first choice centre back at Reading and


was excellent throughout and showed similar consistency at the start of the following season before suffering a groin injury. Came back into the Royals side by the end of the season and took the free kick that led to Jamie Cureton's Promotion winning goal at Brentford. Had a loan spell at Oxford before returning to The County Ground.

6. ANDY GURNEY (29)

Andy joined Reading from Torquay in January 1999 for £100,000 as an attackminded, right-sided defender who could also play in midfield. He started his career at Bristol Rovers, before moving to Torquay for one year and impressing during their surge to the play-offs. Andy King snapped him up in 2001 and Gurney missed just four games in his first season and last season he made 45 appearances in all competitions. He also finished the campaign as the Club's second highest goal scorer with eight goals and he is particularly dangerous from free-kicks.

7. SAMMY IGOE (28)


After making his way up through the ranks at Portsmouth, where he began



as a trainee, Igoe went on to secure a first team spot at the south coast club and made his mark with some solid and impressive performances. Scored with a free-kick on his league debut against Sheffield Wednesday. A good passer, he moved to Reading in a £100,000 deal but found it difficult to break into the first team and spent much of his time on the substitutes bench. Capable of chipping in with goals and making decisive contributions in the middle of the park.

11. DAVID DUKE (24)

The Scotsman arrived on a free transfer from Sunderland in 2000 having never managed a start for the Black Cat's first



team. Duke appeared regularly in his first season with the Robins. He combined well with Sol Davis down the Robins' left and is a good crosser of the ball. Last year he became more effective at beating players and he contributed more to the team with his hard work and endeayour.

12. IAN HERRING (19)

"Spud" was on his way out of the Club before King thrust him into the First Team towards the end of last season. The local lad had become a favourite at the Club amongst the staff having risen through the youth ranks and everyone was proud to see him impress, firstly against Crewe before performing admirably against Plymouth too. A no-nonsense defender who rarely loses a tackle.

Live-wire young striking prospect that signed professional forms in 2001 for Leicester City. Was involved regularly from the Foxes bench during the last couple of seasons. Moved to Swindon in the summer. Only 5'6" tall. Started his first game for Swindon last weekend.

15. ANDREW NICHOLAS (20)

Andrew is a skilful, right footed player, who's versatility allows him to play on the wing and up front, as well as in his usual left back position. His looks and style have drawn comparisons with Sami Hyypia, and he possesses a Dave Challinor style long throw. A regular member the U19 team last season, he could prove to be very useful for the future. Joined this summer from Liverpool.

17. BRYAN HOWARD (20)

The youngster joined Town from Southampton having playing for the Saints reserves for two years. The 20year old left-sided midfielder has featured in England's youth set up and this year, set up Nathan Tyson for his first against Germany at the Madejski Stadium.

18. SEBASTIAN RUSTER (21)

French flanker signed recently after Town had their transfer embargo lifted. A former Cannes player, he had a pre season trial with Leeds United. Manager Andy King described him as the Clubs best triallist for ages. Came on as sub v Stockport last week for his debut.

22. ALAN REEVES (35)

Experienced centre back who is particularly strong in the air, Reevesy's efforts have been awarded with a playing/coaching role. Reeves has had an incredible season and had it not been for Parkin's goals, he would have won the Player of the Year Award. It's all a far cry from the previous season when the former Wimbledon defender had his doubters (Colin Todd even told him he was surplus to requirements in 2000) but he has since brought them round with some tough and tenacious performances at the heart of Town's defence and Andy King's faith in him has paid off. Before joining Swindon in 1998, he spent four years at Wimbledon, and has also played for Gillingham, Chester and Rochdale. Twin brother of our very own David. Started his first game of the season last Saturday.

The Keeper

20. RHYS EVANS (21)

The big, tall and strong Swindon-born young goalkeeper has been involved at several England youth levels and has been in the England U21 squad. Loan spells (from previous Club Chelsea) at Bristol Rovers, QPR and, most recently, Leyton Orient have provided him the first team experience he needs ahead of his move to Swindon. Has played the majprity of games this season, keeping out Bart Griemink, despite the giant Dutchman recently having a sending off rescinded after the event.


19. MATTHEW HEYWOOD (24)

Next came

Birmingham City from where he's been on loan with Stoke, Sheffield United and Derby. Faced with an abundance of talent ahead of him in the pecking order at St Andrews the experienced striker chose to move down the Leagues to get more first team action. With Sam Parkin out with a medial ligament problem, much will rest on Mooney's shoulders this afternoon. Missed a penalty before scoring with a volley in the home defeat against Stockport last week, his 9th goal of the season.





On 83 minutes we finally scored when Wade curled in a left foot shot past the keeper to make the score 3-1. Most pleasing was the way we let our football do the talking and kept our discipline to win the game the right way.

v Notts County

In our last game against Notts County we were reduced to a very young team after injuries to Wharton,

Cressey, Lancaster and Mitchell and Smith being called into the first team squad. Again we started the



game very slowly and were punished on 5 minutes when a cross from the right was knocked in at the near post to put County 1-0 up. Donnelly then had a good chance from a cross from Wade but the keeper made a good save.

We continued to play poorly and allowed County to go further in front when a shot from 30 yards beat Lockwood over his head. We then lost good possession on the halfway line to concede another goal on 30 minutes, the first shot was saved but the rebound was tapped in to make the score 0-3 to County. Five minutes later a long ball from Lowry was kicked past the County keeper by Francis to make the score 1-3. Shortly after Donnelly was through after some good play 1 on 1 with the keeper and shot just past the post. Half time 1-3.

Degrigorio replaced Lockwood at half time and again we failed to dominate any area of the field, after 15 minutes Thorpe replaced Wade and Morton came on for Jubb. From this point we played a lot better and had a good chance when Thorpe was through but his shot lacked power. Jenkinson then had a good shot saved.

A poor first half but did a lot better in the second half.

European Cup Final Wembley 29th May 1968

The Match

The first European Cup success for an English club, and an emotional occasion for the Manchester United Manager Matt Busby, and two of his players, Bobby Charlton and Bill Foulkes, who had all survived the Munich Tragedy ten years earlier when United were competing in one of the earliest European Cup competitions.

The match was a fitting climax to a golden era at Old Trafford, epitomised by their three stars, Charlton, Best and Law (who missed the game through injury), but United were up against a strong Benfica side which featured the Continent's answer to Pele in Eusabio.

Bobby Charlton opened the scoring with a rare header in 54 minutes and Grace deservedly equalised 12 minutes from time. United hung on until extra time, when they managed to go

up a gear. George Best showed his class by scoring from a difficult position 3 minutes into extra time, and then teenager Brian Kidd scored one and made one for Charlton, to set up emotional scenes on the final whistle.

The Programme

Wembley Stadium issued a very ordinary and somewhat nondescript small-page programme for the Final. Only 16 pages, for which 1/- was charged, the cover had the club crests in two red pennants, with writing in blue and black on a grey background. The President of UEFA had a message in three languages and each team had an introductory article, a full page squad photo, and pen pictures. There was a list of previous finals, all the results in that season's competition, and a page of facts and figures. the team lists were restricted to one page, in probably the poorest-ever European Cup Final programme. The familiar advertisers were present -Radio Times, Double Diamond and Boyril.

The 1999 Champions League victory by Manchester United has resulted in an explosion in interest for the 1968 Final programme, which for many years has been readily available. A year ago, the price range was between £2.50 and £5, but that is moving upwards. Buy soon, and if you get the opportunity, try to seek out the first edition of the programme, printed before the game and available at the stadium. There is a reprint, in which photographs are darker than the original.

Thoughts from the AGM from Howard Borrell


AGM's are never expected to be exciting but the recent one managed to stir quite a bit of emotion and I left sad at the discord that still exists. The ollowing comments are my personal views but I'd like to share them.

Some postings on message boards are suggesting CFSS has no value any more. I strongly believe CFSS is useful in maintaining the information flow (and while things might not be perfect, when in previous regimes did as much come out?) and keeping predatory persons from stealing our club again. Think of CFSS as a no-mans land that some crook would have to crawl across to get to the prize. Whether we like it or not we need people with money to keep the club alive. Supporters Trusts are here to stay, supported by the government and the FA, and CFSS (as the major shareholders) has to work as harmoniously as possible with the CFC board if we are to keep our club going. York and Lincoln adopt a similarly realistic stance.

No one is in anyone's pocket. It's a case of adopting a pragmatic approach. Neither CFSS nor the CFC board are perfect but everyone is trying hard to keep the club alive. It's hard to see how the constant griping helps!

Rule changes. The rules were sent to us by Supporters Direct and a few tweaks made before we formed the Society. At that time there was no expectation of taking over a football club. The rules no more reflect reality than I can play golf.

Wheeldon Mill. As far as I'm aware the costs that Frank Sissons and other persons will incur on surveys are their problem and always have been. The club has always wanted a package price and that's what they'll get. Nothing has changed. As for the business plans,



CFSS were threatened with legal action if they didn't withdraw them from the public domain. The vote had already been arranged and most people had, by then, read the information so the information issued had to be restricted.

Why move? Personally I'd rather stay at Saltergate and if emotion and location were the only things that mattered I'd have voted that way. However I really believe that the only way we'll take the club forward is to work at maximising our income streams and only at WM have we that opportunity. Brian Burgess, of Brentford's Bees United, spoke of the community initiatives taking place now and planned for at Brentford. Macclesfield, with lower gates than us, have managed to rent out huge spaces in their recently built stand and are building another stand on the same basis. We haven't averaged 5,000 spectators for 23 years so, I believe looking to involve community partners (who will all pay good commercial rents) is the only way to give CFC a fighting chance of becoming financially stable. Hence it's not can we afford to build a new ground its can we afford not to? We must work hard with both councils and appropriate groups to ensure the project works and understand that the issues such as

transport and current lack of pubs will be overcome in good time.

Everyone is entitled to be critical and, of course, it's more fun than being supportive but this club needs all of us to pull together if we are to still be here in a couple of years time.


Howard Borrell Elected CFSS Board Member

A lively debate took place at the meeting, there were many different perspectives and views discussed, indeed the meeting got quite emotional and heated at times, but democracy allows for debate and such discussions could never have taken place in previous regimes at Saltergate and indeed at virtually every other Club in the UK.







Harry Cousins:

For Robins & Spireites

Born in Pilsley on September 25th 1907, Harry was one of the first young players to join Chesterfield's newly-created "A" team set-up in 1926, and appeared for that side with players who, between them, would go un to make over 1000 Football League appearances. After 86 Football League starts for the Spireites in the halfback division he was surprisingly freed. Even more surprisingly, perhaps, he joined a Division Three (South) team. Swindon Town, and found the place where he would come t spend not only the rest of his career but the rest of his life.

Harry appeared pleasant and mild-mannered but was deceptively hard, in a fair sense, and determined; so much so that he apparently played through one whole season with a broken bone in his foot. Harry played 273 times for Swindon from August 1932 until the season after World War Two. He would have edged a lot closer to 500 appearances for the Wiltshiremen without the


distraction of war. He scored one goal in his entire career, in a 4-2 win over Torquay.

After a vear as trainer to Swindon's reserves he stepped up to become

first-team trainer in 1949 and remained in that position until after the Robins famous League Cup Final victory in 1969. After another six years of the Swindon backroom staff Harry retired, and died in the town on October 21st, 1981.





1988-1989 Division Three



At the end of the 88-89 season the Spireites were relegated to Division Four, finishing third from the bottom, six points short of safety.

- Their worst defeat was 6-0 at Preston, their highest scoring win was 4-0 at home to Cardiff.
- The best performance was the double over Sheffield United winning 3-1 away and 2-1 at home.
- In the 88-89 season after 12 games the Spireites had 7 points, 7 goals for and 32 against. Compared to this season 2003-2004 after 12 games 6 points, 7 goals for and 19 against. The terrible start continued, gaining only nine points in the first 19 games, in the last 27 games the Spireites gained 40 points, a much improved tally, finishing on 49 points.
- Notable departures were Coyle,
 Caldwell, Benjamin and Jim Brown who
 left in November for Kettering. 26
 players were involved during the
 season including 11 new arrivals, the
 most notable being Astbury (Chester),
 Cherry on loan from Plymouth and
 Leonard costing €20,000 from Notts
 County, all goalkeepers, Brien, centre
 half costing €90,000 and Prindiville free
 -both from Leicester and Shaw from
 Halifax.
- Top scorer was Waller with 18 goals in 36 games, scoring 9 goals in 8 successive games. No player was ever present but Bloomer played in 44 out of 46.



- The average home gate was 3,700 and away 5,100.
- Spireites great stalwart Kevin Randall vacated the managers post in October and Paul Hart took over in November, Mick Henderson was caretaker Manager in the interim. Dave Rushbury was appointed Physio.
- In the FA Cup the Spireites lost to Bolton in Round 1, knocked out by Port Vale in the Littlewoods Cup.and in the Sherpa Van Trophy disposed of Notts County, Mansfield and Cambridge, losing to Brentford.








Profile On...

#3 Alan O'Hare

Born in Drogheda, Ireland, it's easy to forget that Alan O'Hare is still only 21 years old, he's gone well past fifty first team appearances for The Spireites after his initial loan spell from Bolton Wanderers and subsequent permanent contract, signed in October last year.



Alan Patrick James O'Hare came into the World on 31st July 1982 and as a youngster was very keen on participating in sport, "I used to play two games of soccer on a Saturday and two games of Gaelic Football on a Sunday". His soccer experience started with a local side called Rangers, he then got picked up for County honours and played in the Milk Cup in Coleraine where he was spotted by no less than Manchester United. Aged 16. he came over for a trial with them for a couple of months and then Bolton offered a three year scholarship contract. "I'm glad I chose soccer. there are some nutters in Gaelic and you get really hurt! I totally whimped out of hurling though."

"Stuart Pearce was my footballing hero," says Alan, "I supported Nottingham Forest as a kid. I once came over for a pre season match and was a ball boy when Pearce played. He's still my hero. If I become half as good as him and I have half the career he had I'll be very happy."

As for his time at The Reebok Stadium, "It was a kick start to my career, I've played around some very good players, Jay Jay Okocha, Youri Djorkaeff, so you learn a lot, I learned a lot from Mike Whitlow, who's now at Sheffield United. I looked up to the pro's, watched the football, watched how they played and tried myself to emulate them, copy them as best I could." He played for the Academy, reserves and got into the first team squad but didn't make any first team appearances before he was spotted by




Dave Rushbury. "It was after a game against Aston Villa when I was marking another hero of mine, Steve Stone, who used to be at Forest, I was Captain, played really well. Rush watched another couple of games and asked me to come down on loan."

Alan's Spireites debut was at Tranmere Rovers' Prenton Park on February 2nd last year, he recalls, "I came down on the Thursday and Dave said I was playing on the Friday alongside Ian Breckin and Steve Payne in a back three. It was 0-0, I marked Paul Rideout and Wayne Allison, so I was nervous but I feel everyone has a good debut, they're so pumped up for it, the hard bit is doing it every week. I played well at Tranmere and we got a result which was the main thing."

Alan played every game between then and the end of the season and went back to Bolton with glowing reports from Rush and Lee Richardson who said they'd keep in contact. "My last loan game was against Blackpool at Saltergate, I went back to Bolton and the following Wednesday I played in their reserves at Sunderland on a cold night and my aim immediately became a spot in the Bolton first team. I featured in the pre season build up but when the chance to come back here permanently arose I chose to return to Chesterfield. It was a hard decision but the right one."

At Bolton, his target had been individual performances in the reserves to hope he got the first team nod, result were less important, but as a Spireites first teamer, the pressures were different, "I was now part of a first team, winning games becomes the most important thing, this is the real thing, I'm playing and earning my keep now and I wouldn't change playing for Chesterfield for the World. I'm learning my trade here and I hope I can be with Chesterfield for another few years, gain experience and help the Club stay in this Division. We've a small squad and have struggled with injuries this season but we've a good team spirit which will show through in the end and I think we'll survive, no problem!"


He did of course grab our first goal (and his first senior goal) of the season in the 1-1 draw with Bristol City, "I thought it was a cracker. I waited for the ball to come in and with my predatory instincts, I hit it as low and as hard as I could, it hit the back of the net, there's no feeling like it! It's as good as it gets in football, especially in front of your home crowd."



Alan has of course played as a centre half, as one of three defenders and at left back and wing back, but what is his favoured role? "I'll play anywhere if asked, it's an honour to play, that's first and foremost, to stay in the team. I'm comfortable at left back but in a couple of years I see myself as a centre half, I did well there last year, but I'll do

whatever I'm asked to do on the left hand side, no problem."

His aspirations for this year, "first and foremost, survival, you're only as good as your last game and as a footballer, you only look to your next game. Long term though, I'd like to be in the game as long as I can and obviously I'd like to play in the Premiership one day, I'd even like International recognition in the future, but playing at Chesterfield right now is where I'm happy."






We have started to take names for the week-end away at Bournemouth. For those of you who are interested we are looking at travelling
