

Case for the Defence

Wrexham's defence has been under plenty of scrutiny in recent weeks, particularly after consecutive six goal away defeats at Bournemouth and Peterborough. The inquest has not been easy for those involved in the afore-mentioned disasters, but such tests of character will be the making of young defenders like Shaun Pejic.

Pejic has had to work to get his rhythm going as injuries have disrupted his season: he was glad to get back in the swing of things, helping to earn a clean sheet in the victory over Grimsby: "For myself, I was pleased just to get back into the team really. It was my second game back after injury, and in the first match I felt a bit rusty at first, but today I felt back in the swing of things.

"It has been a bit of a nightmare with injuries, as was last year. I've been out for a month and now I'm looking to get back into it and get my season started again."



Unwilling to duck from difficult issues, a characteristic which will certainly help him to recover from the disappointment of London Road, Pejic is keen to address the criticism which has been directed at him, and particularly his passing, in recent games.

"You get a lot of ball playing from the back the way we play, and I have to play my part in that. I'm mainly in the side to defend, and that has to be my main responsibility; passing isn't my strength, but I work on it.

"I know my confidence has been low, but I've got to forget about that now and just get into it. You've got to forget about the bad things and just think about the positives, haven't you?

"I think everyone is negative with me, picking at things. Fair enough, no-one's going to be perfect are they? But defensively, I think I'm quite a good defender and if you look at the records we've tended to do well when I've been in the side.

"I'm not sure of the exact stats, but I've got to keep being positive and forget about the negatives and work on my game."

The stats do indeed back Shaun up: Wrexham have kept a clean sheet every 2.5 games in the league this season when Shaun has played, but every 3.6 when he is absent. The average goals conceded per game are also better when Shaun is playing, although the difference between the two figures was naturally much greater before the disaster at Peterborough: Wrexham were conceding less than a goal a game when he played (0.85), compared to 1.22 when he was absent. A successful defence is based on organisation and combining the required elements to make a unit function, and the facts show how valuable Shaun's pace is in a three-at-the-back system.

Welcome Return to the Racecourse

North Wales football fans have had to make regular pilgrimages down south in the last half a decade, but with the unprecedented success of the awesome Millennium Stadium, not many of us will argue too much about that.

Indeed, it is hard to envisage when we will actually get to see a Wales competitive fixture at the Racecourse Ground again, at least in the foreseeable future.

There have been calls of late for a long overdue friendly match back at the birthplace of the game and with manager Mark Hughes having his roots in north-east Wales, born in Wrexham and brought up in Ruabon, he has no doubt been touting the FAW International to Committee to consider one of the World Cup qualifying warm-ups being staged in the north.

That wish has been granted in the form of back to back friendlies at the latter end of this season. Wales will visit Norway on Thursday, 27 May and the return home to play Canada at the Racecourse on Sunday, 30 May.

With another build-up game in Hungary on 31 March, Hughes is keen to tune the squad up for the double-header scenario in the coming qualifying campaign, as we have not fared too well in them in the past, and will need to be on song as we face back to back fixtures throughout our Group Six series.

The first matches in September, see us meeting up with Azerbaijan once again and then welcoming Northern Ireland to the Millennium a few days later. Only a month or so later we make the long trip to England and Poland will be in Cardiff before you know it!

Sparky will be hoping that not too many cry off from the build-up matches, but that is always an inevitability, as for one reason or another the names drop off his list. But if certain players want to be included for the important matches they have to be willing to take part in the preparations. Somehow, with such a high profile group, one feels the incentive will be too great not to go AWOL this time around.

While not being regular opponents by any means, Wales do have a certain affinity with the Canadians. The majority of modern fans will remember the two away games played in May 1986 – first in Toronto when we lost 2-0 and then nine days later in Vancouver when goals from Dean Saunders (2) and Malcolm Allen gave us some revenge.

The most recent contest was a 'B' international in March 1992 at the Racecourse, which ended in a 1-1 draw, when the visitors were under the title of Canadian Olympic XI.

Going back through the mists of time and into the chronicles of Welsh footballing history, we undertook our first ever overseas tour to Canada in 1929, when playing a number of matches including games against various regions. This visit to the dominions being a great success.

Between 1 June and 3 July, the FAW touring party, under the managership of the great Ted Robbins and Arthur Thomas (of Cefn) played 15 matches and were undefeated throughout. The games included victories over the likes of Calgary (10-1) and Winnipeg (7-1).

As a matter of interest, the Welsh team sailed on 24 May, 1929 and didn't reach Montreal until seven days later!

However, one has to ho back to the 19th Century and the autumn of 1981 for the very first Wales v Canada encounter. The North Americans were on a tour of Britain which included an unofficial match against Wales at the Racecourse that September.

The game was drawn 1-1, although another match was arranged for the following month, again at Wrexham and this time the hosts came out on top 2-1. The players and teams made interesting reading as the Welsh line-up was:

James Trainer (Preston), Dai Jones (Bolton), George Postle (Chirk), Williams Hughes (Bootle), John Mates (Chirk), Ben Lewis (Bolton), W.E.Pryce-Jones (Newtown), Billy Owen (Chirk), Ben Lewis (Wrexham), Richard Lewis Jones (Swindon), Billy Lewis (Crewe). Scores being Richard Lewis Jones and Billy Lewis.

Wales have been playing internationals against Scotland, England and Ireland since 1876, but although 'unofficial games' Canada were in effect the first opponents for Wales from outside

All this four years before a certain Billy Meredith put the Welsh shirt on for the first time!





Grimsby have just appointed a new manager, so we will have to wait and see what effect that has on their performance today. It usually brings an up turn in fortunes, but to be fair to the Mariners, they have won three of their last six league games and already started to lift themselves about the relegation trapdoor.



Robins take Magic Roundabout to success

Great Football Clichés Number 743: "At this point in the season, anyone who puts together a run of good results will get promoted/in the play-offs." To the delight of their fans, it is Swindon who are living the cliché.

Saturday's defeat to league leaders Plymouth Argyle brought a fine run to an end: previous to that game they had won five matches in a row, capping off an eleven match unbeaten sequence stretching back to December, nine of which were wins!

That seems to fulfil the cliche's criteria for "put together a run of good results" I reckon! As a result of that run - and Tuesday's return to form; a victory over Grimsby Town - Town arrive at The Racecourse in fourth place, with realistic hopes of an automatic promotion place.

Certainly Tommy Mooney, who added to his goal against Plymouth with both strikes against The Mariners, saw that as a realistic target when he told Swindon's official website: "At this stage of the season



'This is only the second season that I've played upfront completely and I've got 22 and 20 goals respectively. That's also 38 goals between Sam [Parkin] and I this season, so we're going a long way to having a good year between us. If its Sam's turn to score at Wrexham on Saturday, then great, I just hope if and when we go to Cardiff, it'll be my turn."

it doesn't matter about the performance. We are not trying to win over the crowd at this point, you do that by winning games. I don't care how we play...as long as we get the three points.

"We might not get a championship medal, but I think if we put the run together that we have done in the last half a dozen games then we will get that second spot, there is no doubt about that."

The defeat at Home Park was a blow though, because before that match manager Andy King had set his sights even higher:

"There are no positives out of this because we have lost the league title," King told his official website after the match. "If we had beaten them there was a mathematical possibility - but now there is

"It's schoolboy errors that cost us the game.

"I think the disappointment from the game is that a) we thought we could win down at Plymouth and b) we feel the championship may have gone now.

"The plus side is that it was probably the most difficult away game we will have this season and we matched them for the most of it. Although we lost we came out of the game with a lot of credit.

"If we can go to Plymouth and put up a good performance without being at our best, then we have very little to fear in the rest of our away games this season.

"I think second place is realistic now and very obtainable, albeit very difficult.

"What it means is that mathematically we have a better chance of catching second place now with the amount of games we have left, especially with one in hand. If you don't strive for it then you won't

get anywhere.

"If we go for it and just fall short then we are in the play offs, which is just as important for us at this stage of the season."

Any Wrexham fan who managed to negotiate the Magic
Roundabout (Great Swindon Cliché Number One, by the way) to see
Town's performance against the Dragons in September, will not be
surprised by their rise to the top of the table. With on-loan Jamie
Milner outstanding behind the potent pairing of Mooney and Sam

Parkin, Town were kept at bay by a fine performance by Andy Dibble and certainly looked the genuine article. However, things fell apart in October: seven games and no wins, with a run of five consecutive defeats wedged in the middle, saw Town slump from second to fourteenth in the table, but they have certainly return to their fine form now!

A further blow from the defeat at Plymouth, apart from the result, is the suspension incurred by skipper Andy Gurney, who scored the only goal in that defeat of Wrexham, after a sending off which King contests:

'Gurney will undoubtedly be suspended for at least one game, so I need to start thinking about what I am going to do for a lot of the other games.

"I will probably look into a loan situation next week but it depends on what becomes available.

The only players available at this time of year are the ones that are not being used, so it is difficult to pick one that could come in and improve your own squad.

"A lot of players don't want to come into the second division and sit on the bench, so whoever does come in has to be good enough to go straight in and play.

"Some clubs won't even let you have a player if you can't guarantee them a starting place, which is totally naive of them to

underestimate the quality of this division.
"I think we need it with the injuries and the size of the squad.
"Where, what and how I don't really know the answer at the

moment.
"I have sixteen to choose from...and that is with Ben Martin, Jon

Stevenson, and Grant Smith in the squad, who have not had too much first team action."

Despite the depth of his squad, King has certainly put together a side capable of cutting through this rather mediocre division. If injuries and suspensions hold off, expect them to be up where they belong at the end of the season.

On the eve of Wednesday night's clash with Grimsby at the County Ground, Swindon boss Andy King received his Tissot Managers' Performance Award. Not to be confused with the monthly Nationwide gong, this award is presented every quarter to the top manager from all four divisions based on a points system.

"I'm delighted with this Tissot League Trophy – but the real winners are the team, the coaching staff and the Board. We're all working hard here at Swindon, and its great to get recognition for what we are al achieving. It's a little strange receiving the trophy from Paul [Sturrock]. Only a few weeks ago, I was envious of him being Second Quarter winner. Now it's me – and he's manager of Southampton!"

The award actually proved a good omen as King's Swindon chalked up a 2-0 victory later that day against the battling Mariners. "I didn't think it was that great a performance, but it seemed comfortable for us," said King. "At times I thought the game was becoming a little bit dull and it was without a high tempo throughout the whole ninety minutes. The game was not going that well and it wasn't really going either way, but then [Tommy] Mooney pops up and scores that goal [after 34 minutes].

"The second goal came thanks to the quality of [Brian] Howard going forward, he threads the ball through to Mooney and he slotted it away for 2-0 [on the stroke of half-time]. I thought at that point that the game was then in a comfortable position for us," continued a satisfied King, before expressing concerns over the attacking nature of his side.

"What we do have is goals in the side and maybe sometimes we entertain that little bit too much. We have Brian Howard who is always looking to go forward and Sammy Igoe likes to get into holes and play. [Sam] Parkin and Mooney are always looking for that goal, so maybe sometimes we need to focus on the job of closing games out and being that little bit negative. At times we cause ourselves problems and teams counteract it and it leaves us vulnerable at the back. At the moment we are getting through it because we always look like scoring at the right time."

Summing up the victory, the Swindon boss concluded; "It's another fantastic night in the sense of the result, hopefully the crowd have gone home happy and it's another step in the right direction. I don't think they [the players] are going to throw it away now. I think there is too much spirit, too much desire and too much quality in that dressing room, so I am hoping they are going to continue this wonderful season. [The victory] keeps the automatic dream alive for us which is still a mathematical proposition and if we don't get that then I will settle for second best and try to get through the play offs."

A key member of King's team is midfielder Sammy Igoe who remains focussed on the club's goal of winning promotion despite being charged by the FA with bringing the game into disrepute. After the 2-2 draw with Blackpool in January, Igoe reportedly admitted feigning injury in an incident, which saw Blackpool's Richie Wellens sent off.

With the FA hearing imminent you could understand if Igoe lost some concentration but the 28-year-old has reassured supporters this won't be the case. "I'm just focused on the next three points and then the next three points after that. We'll deal with the other situation when we have to. But it won't affect my game in any way."

If Igoe plays today keep an eye out for his new hairstyle. After Swindon's unbeaten run came to an end after last Saturday's 2-1 defeat at Plymouth, Igoe decided on a new look. The red streak has gone and I've decided to shave my hair off for the new cut. How long it stays that way might depend on what sort of run we put together from this point."

Meanwhile, Swindon has some big games coming up — none bigger that the Easter Saturday encounter with rivals Bristol City. The club has already confirmed that the Town End of their ground is a complete sell-out and ticket office manager Stuart Pike said: "It's the first time it has sold out in advance during in my time here. The middle of the Nationwide Stand is also sold out and there aren't too many tickets left in the same area in the Arkells Stand. I don't think I'd be too far wrong in looking at a crowd of 14,000."



IN CHARGE

ANDY KING In his second spell at the County Ground, Andy was originally put his charge during 2000, but later found himself replaced by former Liverpool boss Roy Evans. When Evans moved on, King was back at the helm in January 2002, following a short spell when Malcolm Crosby was in temporary charge, as he was still on the club's payroll and it was deemed to be the best value for money at that Since then the 47-year-old has built steadily with a 13th place finish in 2001/2002 bettered by three places last term,

with a 13th place finish in 2001/2002 bettered by three places last term, and this time around the Robins arrive at the Racecourse on the back of an excellent run which sees automatic promotion a realistic aim.

Luton-born, as a player he was a midfielder who gained two caps for England at under-21 level but surprisingly never played a full international. Club wise, he will be remembered by most supporters for his two spells on Merseyside with Everton but he actually served no less than seven clubs. The others being Luton (twice), Queens Park Rangers, West Bromwich Albion, Wolves, Cambuur (Holland) and finally Aldershot.

1 BART GRIEMINK

A custodian with considerable experience in the Football League, Bart has been on the bench recently as back up to current first choice Rhys Evans. A Dutchman, he celebrates his 32nd birthday in just nine days times and came to these shores in 1995 to join Birmingham City on a free transfers from WK Emmen. Followed Barry Fry to Peterborough just a year later and made 67 appearances between the posts for the Posh, prior to moving to the County Ground in the summer of 2000 following a loan spell.

20 RHYS EVANS

Currently the first choice stopper for the Robins, Rhys was given an excellent grounding in the professional game during his time at Chelsea, where he previously worked under the tutelage of former Reds keeper Eddie Niedzwiecki. Swindon-born, despite sounding Welsh the 22-year-old has actually been capped by England at schoolboy, youth and under-21 level and he will be hoping that his time at the County Ground is a steppingstone on his way to a full cap. Released by the Stamford Bridge outfit during the summer, he had previously pulled on the gloves for Bristol Rovers, Queens Park Rangers and Leyton Orient.

defenders

D2 SEAN O'HANLON

A recent arrival at the County Ground, Sean joined up on loan from Everton in January, has since been a regular in the Robins defence and netted his first senior goal in the defeat of struggling Chesterfield. Southport-born, the 21-year-old is a former England youth and under-20 international who turned professional in August 2002. Having come through the Toffee's academy set up at Bellefield, he is yet to appear in the first team for the Merseysiders.

06 ANDY GURNEY

The club captain and a vital member of the County Ground defence, Andy is a versatile player who is usually to be found at full-back but is equally at home when operating in the midfield. A Bristolian by birth, the 30-year-old turned professional in his home city with Rovers in 1992 and went onto play well over 100 times in the blue-and-white quarters. Always dangerous when delivering his trademark free-kicks, he joined Reading for a fee of £100,000 in 1999 following a period on the English Riviera with Torquay United.

15 ANDREW NICHOLAS

Has really impressed in recent months since gaining a regular starting spot, Andrew made his first team debut in the LDV meeting with Boston earlier this season. Locally-born, the 20-year-old is a tall and commanding defender who looks to have a promising future in the game and must be in the running for the clubs Young Player of the Year award. Having come through the academy set up at Liverpool, he spent a season as a professional at Anfield but failed to register a first team appearance and moved to the County Ground last summer.

19 MATT HEYWARD

Now into this fourth season in the West Country, Matt has been one of the mainstays of the Robins rearguard and is a strapping central defender who likes to dominate the opposition forwards. Chatham-

born, he is still just 24-years-old and was an ever present for the club last term, a quite rare occurrence for a defender in modern times. Signed from Burnley in January 2001, he played just 13 times in all competitions for the Clarets but since his move south has played around 150 times for Swindon.

22 ALAN REEVES

The brother of former Preston and Chesterfield striker David Reeves, Alan has made a big impression on the County Ground faithful during the six seasons he has spent with the club and came close to clinching the Player of the Year trophy last term. Birkenhead-born, the 35-year-old started out with Norwich City, from whom he joined Gillingham on loan, but it was following a £10,000 move to Chester that he first started to get noticed. Now at the veteran stage of his career, the wholehearted defender moved to Rochdale before playing 27 times for Wimbledon in the Premier League during a four-year spell.

midfielders

03 GRANT SMITH

A well travelled midfielder who is now at the ninth club of his career, Grant was signed from Sheffield United in the summer after failing to make his mark during the two-years that he spent at Bramall Lane, although he had impressed while on loan at both Halifax and Plymouth. Irvine-born, the 23-year-old started out with Wycombe Wanderers and then Reading but failed to register a first team appearance for either. Returned to his native Scotland to pull on the colours of Hearts, Livingston and Clydebank before moving to the Steel City in July 2001.

04 MATT HEWLETT

Another to have previously pulled on the shirt of one of the Bristol clubs, Matt came through the junior ranks at Ashton Gate and went onto amass 153 senior appearances for the Robins after turning pro in 1993. Bristol-born, the 28-year-old made waves in his teenage years and was soon marked out as one to keep an eye on, indeed his reward was a call-up for the England youth side. A former teammate of Matt Heywood while on loan at Burnley in 1998, he has a good engine and gives his all in the centre of midfield

07 SAMMY IGOE

Currently in his first season in Wiltshire, Sammy has visited the Racecourse on numerous occasions previously with his former club Reading where he earned a reputation as a hardworking wide man. Born in Staines, the 28-year-old may be short in height but he more than makes up for this with some towering performances on the right wing, where he always shows great enthusiasm. Came through the ranks at Fratton Park and played 177 times for Portsmouth prior to his £100,000 sale to the Royals in March 2000.

10 STEFANI MIGLIORANZI

Having originally joined Swindon on a short-term contract at the start of last term, Stefani has made a big impression and is now one of the first names on the team sheet. Born in Pocos de Caldas, Brazil, the 26-year-old arrived at the club with a question mark over his fitness, but this has since been more than dispelled as his creative midfield play has made him a firm favourite. Originally joined Portsmouth from St John's University in New York in 1999 and went on to play 42 times for Pompey before heading to the County Ground on a free transfer.







1 1 DAVID DUKE

Likely to feature on the left-hand side of midfield this afternoon, David is usually used in a wing-back role although his natural attacking tendencies do tend to mean that he spends a lot of time pushing forward. Inverness-born, the 25-year-old was spotted by Sunderland in 1997, when turning out for Redby CA, and signed on a free transfer. Despite his versatility, he failed to make the breakthrough at the Stadium of Light but has been a consistent performer in his time at the County Ground.

17 BRIAN HOWARD

A former team-mate and midfield companion of our own Matty Crowell during their time on the South Coast with Southampton, Brian failed to register a first team appearance at St Mary's Stadium. Winchester-born, the 21-year-old was capped by England at both youth and under-20 level during his formative years. Having spent two-years as a professional with the Saints, he was allowed to leave during the summer and took up the offer of a contract with Swindon.

attackers

D8 TOMMY MOONEY

A vastly experienced striker who has seen it all in the professional game, Tommy is proving to be an ideal partner for top scorer Sam Parkin and the duo are forming a dynamic understanding. Billingham-born, the 32-year-old has played in the top flight with both Watford and Birmingham but surprisingly his only medal to date was a Second Division championship winners accolade with the Hornets in 1998. Swindon are his ninth professional club and he made over 500 senior appearances to date, for, amongst others, Scarborough, Southend and Derby.

OS SAM PARKIN

One of the most feared strikers in the lower divisions this season, Sam has scored no less than 18 times already this term and is one of the main reasons that the Robins are pushing for a return to First Division football. Roehampton-born, he celebrated his 22nd birthday just last Sunday and the Wrexham defence will have to be at it's best to ensure that the former Chelsea youngster does not celebrate with a goal. Millwall, Wycombe, Oldham and Northampton have all benefited from having him on loan but he eventually joined Swindon at the start of last season, when he came in with a bang scoring 26 times in all competitions.

14 JON STEVENSON

Another player in his first year with the club, Jon is an inexperienced forward who is trying to make his name in the professional game. Leicester-born, the 21-year-old came through the ranks at his home city club, turned professional in March 2001 but made just fourteen appearances for the Foxes in a little over two-years all from the subs bench. A quick and skilful striker, he was released last summer but was then recommended to the Robins by Leicester Director of Football Dave Bassett.

16 RORY FALLON

Has already played against Wrexham this season with his former club Barnsley, Rory was brought on from the subs bench in the 31st minute of our defeat at Oakwell back in October, to replace top scorer Dean Gorre. Born in Gisbourne, New Zealand, today is his 22nd birthday today but hopefully, he will not be returning south with a win bonus to help his celebrations. Moved from Yorkshire last November but has been a regular in the referee's notebook since, including a red-card in the match against Rushden and Diamonds.

from anglo italian cup to zenith

A is for ANGLIO Italian Cup

Swindon were the inaugural winners of the Anglo-Italian Cup in 1970, beating Napoli 3-0 in the final held in the Stadio San Paolo, Naples. The tournament consisted of six English and six Italian teams split into three groups - two from each country, with each team playing both teams from the other country home and away. Strangely, one extra point was awarded for each goal scored and it was this rule that ultimately sent Swindon through to the final. Swindon beat Jüventus 4-0 at home but lost at home to Napoli. Against all odds, they won 1-0 in Juventus and 1-0 in Napoli to progress to the final stage at the expense of Middlesbrough and Wolves. Napoli also qualified, helped by a 5-1 home win over Sheffield Wednesday. Peter Noble and Arthur Horsfield scored the goals that incensed the Italian fans enough to riot! They ripped seats from the ground and hurled them onto the pitch. Though the match was abandoned after 79 minutes, the trophy was awarded to Swindon!

B is for BADGE

The current badge of Swindon Town F.C. is the club's third and was introduced in time for the 1991-92 season following the club's well advertised financial problems. The idea behind the new badge was to give the club a 'brand new' and 'fresh' image following a difficult period. The 'travelling' football represents the club looking to the future with successful progress. The diamond shape clearly has the letter 'S' (for Swindon) running through it, while a green section was also introduced to match a 'green trim' on the team's home (red and white) shirts.

c is for COUNTY Ground

Following their formation, Swindon played on a field in the Old Town area, next to a quarry which is now part of Bradford Road and Avenue Road. The club later moved to Globe Field, now Brunswick Street, and Lansdowne Road. In 1884 they moved to the Croft, home of Swindon Rangers Rugby Club. They remained there until 1895 when they moved to the Country Ground, playing on a pitch where the cricket ground is now situated. They eventually moved the playing surface the short distance to its present situation.

is for DUBONNET Cup

On 5 May, 1910 Swindon won the Dubonnet Cup which was contested for by the two losing FA Cup semi-finalists. The game was played in Paris, where the 'Robins' met Barnsley, who had lost to Everton in their FA Cup semi-final. With both sides at full strength, Swindon went on to win the impressive trophy with a 2-1 victory, both goals being scored by the legendary Harold Fleming. During the match, the cup was guarded by soldiers on either side, both with rifles and fixed bayonet. Team captain Charlie Bannister collected the trophy and after the game the Swindon players celebrated at a theatre performance before the Town director, Mr. H.W. Thomas, sang the old tune 'Sally in our Alley'!

E is for Re-ELECTED

The 'Robins' have suffered the indignation of having to seek reelection to the Football League on three separate occasions. The first time was in 1933 when they finished bottom of the Third Division (South) on goal average from Newport County and Clapton Orient. They then had to seek re-election two years on the trot in 1956 and 1957. In 1956 they finished bottom of Division Three (South) four points adrift from their closest rivals, Crystal Palace. The following season they finished second from bottom, five points ahead of Norwich City. On each occasion the 'Robins' were comfortably reelected.

F is for FA Cup Semi-finalists

Swindon Town have twice reached the semi-finals of the FA Cup and on both occasions they were still a Southern League side! The first was in 1910 when they lost to the eventual cup winners Newcastle United (2-00, having beaten Crystal Palace (3-1), Burnley (2-0), Spurs (3-2), and Manchester City (2-0). They repeated the feat two years later when they again lost to the eventual cup winners Barnsley (1-0)

G is for GLENN Hoddle

Glenn Hoddle was the man who led Swindon to the FA Premier League in 1993 – the first time that the Robins' had ever played in the top division of English football. Having played for Tottenham and Monaco, he joined the Robins' in April 1991 and his first job was to rescue to them from relegation with eight games left. He succeeded with a 5-2 home win over Leicester confirming their safety. He quickly become a shrewd tactician and his first full season in charge saw Swindon narrowly missed out on a play-off place. The 1992-93 campaign saw them first first goal in the 4-3 Play-Off final victory over Leicester to clinch promotion to the top flight. However, following the Wembley triumph, he resigned to take charge at Chelsea. He later managed England, Southampton and Tottenham.

after a replay having beaten Sutton Junction (5-0), Notts County (2-0), West Ham United (1-1, 4-0) and Everton (2-1).

H is for HARRY Morris

No one has scored more goals for Swindon Town than Harry Morris, who netted 216 league goals for the club between 1926 and 1933. He also holds the club record of having scored the most league goals in a season when he netted 47 Third Division (South) goals in 1926-27. Morris still holds the club record of having scored the most goals in one match, scoring five twice, once against QPR in December 1926, and once against Norwich City in April 1930. Only Keith East has equalled that record.

J is for JOHN Trollope

No player has made more league appearances for Swindon than John Trollope. He joined the club in July 1960 as a junior and made his debut for the club on 20 August, 1960 in a 1-1 draw with Halifax aged just seventeen. In total, he played in 770 Football League games for the Robins before hanging up his boots in 1980, an achievement which saw him receive the MBE. During his time at the County Ground, he played in a League Cup Final, Italian Cup final, and played in two promotion winning sides in 1963 and 1969. He even managed Swindon for three years, until he was replaced by Ken Beamish near the end of the 1982-83 season. He later worked under Lou Macari, Ossie Ardiles, Glenn Hoddle, John Gorman and Steve McMahon, whilst his son Paul, now with Northampton, also began his career with the Witshire club before going on to gain full international honours for Wales.

K is for KEVIN Horlock

Released by West Ham United, Horlock arrived at the County Ground in August 1992. Originally a left-sided defender, he made his debut as a substitute in a 3-1 defeat at Portsmouth in the October. He eventually progressed to a central midfield role and it was from here that 'Super Kev' played a major part in Swindon's 1996 Second Division Championship season, scoring a magnificent 12 league goals which saw him gain international honours with Northern Ireland. In January 1997, he became Swindon's record transfer departure when he was sold to Manchester City for £1.5 million. He scored 22 goals in 163 league appearances for the 'Robins'.

L is for LEAGUE Cup winners

One of Swindon Town's greatest ever achievements came in 1969 when they won the Football League Cup, beating Arsenal 3-1 in the final at Wembley with two extra-time goals from Don Rogers; Roger Smart had given the 'Robins' a first half lead before Bobby Gould levelled with four minutes to go. The 'Robins' had beaten Torquay (2-1), Bradford City (1-1, 4-3), Blackburn (1-0), Coventry (3-0), Derby (0-0, 1-0) and Burnley (2-1, 1-2 & 3-2 in a replay) in the semi-finals. M is for Lou MACARI

Having enjoyed a distinguished playing career with Celtic and Manchester United, Lou Macari went into management with Swindon in the summer of 1984 and he quickly set about building a promotion winning side. He duly achieved that feat in 1985-86, winning four Manager of the Month awards as Swindon walked away with the Fourth Division championship - breaking fourteen club records, as well as the league record for the

number of points gained in a season. The following season saw him lead the 'Robins' to promotion to Division Two after a play-off final victory over Gillingham at Selhurst Park. He then led the side to the Second Division play-offs in 1988-89. His success had not gone unnoticed and in the summer of 1989 he took charge at West Ham United. He later managed Birmingham City, Stoke City, Glasgow Celtic, Stoke City and Huddersfield Town.

N is for Promoted NOT!

Swindon's second visit to Wembley came in May 1990 when they reached the final of the Second Division play-offs where they met Sunderland. Ossie Ardiles' side secured a 1-0 victory with an Alan McLoughlin goal. The side that memorable day was: Frazer Digby, David Kerslake, Paul Bodin, Alan McLoughlin, Colin Calderwood, Jon Gittens, Tom Jones, Duncan Shearer, Steve White, Ross MacLaren & Steve Foley. However, ten days later the celebrations turned sour as Swindon were relegated by two divisions after being found guilty of making illegal payments. This was subsequently reduced to one division on appeal, thus effectively remaining in the Second Division.

is for OSSIE Ardiles
The little Argentinean World Cup winner, who had played for Huracan, Tottenham, Blackburn (loan) and QPR, was appointed Swindon manager following Lou Macari's departure in July, 1989. It was his first managerial post and he proved to be a more than capable replacement. Ardiles transformed the side from playing the load by the the load long ball, to a new 'Samba style'. After just ten months in charge, he led the 'Robins' to a play-off final win over Sunderland. However, the club were denied promotion ten days later due to irregular payments having been made to the players. The following season saw Ardiles leave to take charge of Newcastle United.

P is for PRISONER Of War Camp
Swindon Town were placed in mothballs during the Second World
War after just one season in the South-West Regional League. This
was due to the fact that the County Ground was requisitioned by the
War Office and used as a Prisoner of War camp!

is for QUALITY

The 1985-86 season was one of sheer quality for Swindon fans as the club embarked on record after record to finish as Fourth Division champions with a Football League record 102 points. Lou Macari's side beat or equalled seventeen records which included eight straight wins, 22 games unbeaten from 12 January, 1986 to 23 August, 1986, and just eight defeats in a Football League season. That side included the likes of Kenny Allen, Chris Ramsey, Dave Hockaday, Leigh Barnard, David Cole, Chris Kamara, Charlie Henry, Colin Calderwood, David Moss, Dave Bamber, Bryan Wade, Steve White, Peter Coyne & Colin Gordon.

Following Swindon's League Cup win in 1969, they were denied entry to the Fairs' (now UEFA) Cup due to them being a Third Division club. In order to compensate for this, the Football League arranged a new competition, the Anglo-Italian League Cup Winners' Cup versus the winners of the Coppa Italia, AS Roma. A two-legged tie was played which Swindon won 5-2 on aggregate, having lost 2-1 in Rome. The 'Robins' squad for the two legs was: Peter Downsborough, Rod Thomas, John Trollope, Joe Butler, Frank Burrows, Stan Harland, John Smith, Arthur Horsfield, Roger Smart, Peter Noble, Don Rogers, Chris Jones, Mick Blick and Fred Ford. Noble scored in Rome, whilst a Horsfield hat-trick and a Don Rogers goal secured victory in the a Horsfield hat-trick and a Don Rogers goal secured victory in the return lea.

S is for SOUTHERN League
It was in 1894 that Swindon Town began to engage professional
players and in doing so they became founder members of then
Southern League Division One. With only two divisions of
professional football in England, and no automatic promotion
between the league and the sour league the Southern League. between the league and the non-league, the Southern League was one of, if not the best amateur football competition in the country. However, it was not until 1911 that the 'Robins' won their first championship and three years later they promptly won it for a second time. Harold Fleming played in both season, winning 11 caps for England in the process, scoring nine goals. A statue of Fleming currently stands in the club's toyer and he has a street in the town named after him, namely Fleming Way.



is for INTERNATIONALS

Rod Thomas is the Robins' most capped player having gained 30 of his 50 Welsh International caps whilst playing for Swindon. The gangling defender had joined the club from non-league Gloucester City in July 1964 for £500. Still then a youth player, it was almost two years before he made his first team debut in 0-0 draw with Scunthorpe in May, 1966. He went on to establish himself as the club's first choice right back, soon being capped by Wales at Under-23level. Recognised as one of the best defenders outside of Division One, Thomas made his full international debut in a 0-0 draw with Northern Ireland in 1967 and, despite interest from bigger clubs, he remained at the County Ground making almost 300 league appearances, including playing in the 1969 League Cup final victory. He eventually moved to **Derby in November** 1973, when former 'Robins' manager Dave Mackay paid £100,000 to secure his services. Thomas later played for Cardiff City and Newport

T is for THIRD Division

It was in 1920 that Swindon Town were elected to the Football League's Third Division, and they celebrated their Football League League's Third Division, and they celebrated their roughless status in style beating Luton Town 9-1 in their very first match. Played on 28 August, 1920, the 'Robins' side that day, with goalscorers in brackets, was: Ted Nash, Harry Kay, John Macconachie, Tom Langford, Fred Hawley, Billy Wareing, Bob Jefferson (1), Harry Fleming (4), Dave Rogers, Billy Batty (2) & Bertie Davies (1), with the goal tally being made up with an own goal.

is for UTOPIA

Swindon fans were in utopia when the club won its first ever Swindon rans were in utopia when the club won its first ever promotion in 1963 after 43 years of being a Football League club. Manager Bert Head had instigated a youth policy at the club which eventually saw 'Bert's Babies' bring success to the County Ground when they finished Third Division runners-up to Northampton Town. They clinched promotion with a 1-0 win over Shrewsbury on 4 May, with Roger Smart scoring the goal. The side that day west Mike. with Roger Smart scoring the goal. V is for Record VICTORY

Swindon Town's record victory since becoming a Football League club is 10-1, when they beat non-league side, Farnham United Breweries, in an FA Cup first round replay on 28 November, 1925. The Swindon side that day, with goalscorers in brackets was: Ted Nash, Wally Dickenson, Albert Weston, Bob Archer, Danny Bew, Tommy Adey, Bertie Denyer (2), Alec Wall (1), Frank Richardson (4), Sam Johnson (3) & Bertie Davies. The club's biggest victory is a 10-0 win over Ilford in a Southern League game on 14 March, 1896.

W is for Reverend WILLIAM Pitt

It is by and large accepted that Swindon Town came into being in 1881, although 1879 has also been suggested. However, there is no firm evidence that the club's founder, the Reverend William Pitt, who was captain of the Spartans (an off shoot of a cricket club) changed his club's name to Swindon Town before 1883, when the Spartans amalgamated with St.Mark's Young Men's Friendly Society.

X is for X-WreXham

Current Wrexham wing-back Paul Edwards and current Swindon assistant-manager Malcolm Crosby are the most recent connections between the 'Dragons' and the 'Robins'. Edwards made twenty appearances for the Wiltshire club before joining the Dragons, whilst Crosby had a loan spell at the Racecourse in September 1984. Others to have played league football for both clubs include Mike Carter, Kevin Dearden, Stuart Elliott, Gordon Gunson, Ken Jones and Billy Weale.

Y is for YOUNGEST


Paul Rideout is the youngest ever player to have played in the red shirt of Swindon. He was handed his debut in a Third Division game against Hull City on 29 November, 1980 just a few weeks after against Hull City on 29 November, 1980 just a few weeks after bagging a hat-trick for England schoolboys. He was just 16 years and 107 days old when he made his league bow and scored in a 3-1 win over the 'Tigers'. Rideout scored 39 goals in 104 league games for the 'Robins' before signing for Aston Villa in a £250,000 deal in May 1983. He later played for Bari (Italy), Southampton, Notts County, Glasgow Rangers, Everton, Kansas City Wizards, Shenzhen Pingan (China) and Tranmere Rovers. He also scored the only goal for Everton in their 1995 F.A. Cup Final triumph over Manchester United

Z is for ZENITH

Swindon's zenith was in 1993-94 when they played their one and only season in the top flight in England. The previous camapign had seen them win promotion by beating Leicester City in an epic First Division Play-Off final at Wembley, which saw the 'Robins' come back from being 3-0 down to win 4-3, with goals from Hoddle, Maskell, Taylor & a Bodin penalty. The side that day was: Fraser Digby, Nicky Summerbee, Paul Bodin, Glenn Hoddle, Colin Calderwood, Shaun Taylor, John Moncur (Mickey Hazard), Ross McLaren, David Mitchell, Martin Ling & Craig Maskell (Steve White). However, Swindon's one and only season in the Premier League saw themstruggle from the off and it was no surprise when they were duly relegated.

The Dragons completed a 'double' over the Mariners amid a strange Racecourse atmosphere. Press reports before the game concentrated on revelations of financial difficulties, the late payment of wages and more speculation surrounding the future of the club.

What it all meant was that pre- and post-match talk centred more on off-field happenings than events on the field, despite once again being within two points of the play-off's.

And with four of our main play-off rivals still to visit the Racecourse maybe there should be a little more optimism on the terraces and, it must be said, in the town itself. A pitifully small crowd of just over 3,000 won't help Denis Smith's cause, and the fact that the attendance was down for the third home game running must be of concern to everyone at the club.

As for the game, the Dragons thoroughly deserved their comfortable victory but perhaps the fact that all three goals were crammed into a sensational 3-minute spell in the first half contributed somewhat to the lacklustre atmosphere around the ground for much of the game.

Maybe there was also the disappointment that the Dragons didn't go on and win the game by an even bigger margin after the break. But nothing should detract from a good victory against a side that changed their manager in the midweek leading up to the game - and we all know what an effect that can often have on a club!

In all honesty, this game could have been over long before that devastating 3-minute spell as several good chances went begging in the opening 20 minutes or so.

But once Matty Crowell had superbly curled a 25-yarder past Andrew Pettinger for his first League goal any anxiety on and off the pitch seemed to be lifted; a fact borne out by two more goals in almost James Hayter-like time.

First Armstrong latched onto a superb Darren Ferguson pass and coolly lifted the ball past Pettinger from the edge of the area and then, within seconds, he met Llewellyn's right wing centre to tuck the ball beyond the keeper's despairing dive.

Thoughts of beating Hayter's treble time briefly drifted around the Racecourse - what a story that would have made - but it wasn't to be, although the former Tottenham striker did waste a great chance to grab his first hat-trick for the club after the break.

The damage had well and truly been done before the break and there was to be no way back for the beleaguered Mariners, though Stuart Campbell was unlucky to see a rasping effort thump against the bar with Andy Dibble a mere spectator.

So a job well done, especially given the difficult week the club had experienced leading up to the game.



If the thumping at Bournemouth was described as "an awful day at the office" then just what do you say about this humiliation at a side with just two home wins all season and occupying 20th place entering the game.

For this was markedly worse than what happened at the Fitness First Stadium. The 6-0 defeat on the Dorset coast wasn't a true reflection of the game, with the sending-off of Steve Roberts at 2-0 not helping our cause and, of course, James Hayter's recordbreaking feat can be considered something of a 'freak' event.

But this was different, and despite some mitigating circumstances (i.e. the deeply unfortunate injury to Andy Dibble, and the absence through suspension of both Roberts and Brian Carey) this was still a real 'horror show'. The horrific arm-break suffered by Dibble in an innocuous looking collision with Calum Willock will undoubtedly have played on some players' minds, but that's no excuse for what followed - particularly in the second half.

Okay so we took the lead through an error from Posh keeper Mark Tyler, who let a Chris Llewellyn cross slip under his body and into the net, and were possibly a trifle unlucky to be behind at the interval - but what followed was simply unacceptable.

Strangely though, in a pub after the game home fans were still in a downbeat mood - still fearing relegation for their side and gladly prepared to swap positions with us. They also felt that they were fortunate to be ahead at half time, even suggesting that the Dragons should have been a couple of goals ahead!

You could sort of see where they were coming from. After all, Chris Llewellyn forced a smart save from Tyler early on, a Paul Edwards shot struck a post and Carlos Edwards appeared to dally when put clear seconds before half time.

But those incidents apart the rest of the game was pretty much one-way traffic, with the outfield Dragons doing little by way of stemming the tide towards substitute Paul Whitfield's goal.

I won't bother describing the Peterborough goals - in fact I've done my best to forget each and every one of them!

The last couple of away games have been a shock to the system - even for Denis Smith - who had never had a side he managed concede six goals until recently, only to now have had it happen twice inside three weeks!

As expected, the Dragons' boss was his usual forthright self after the game.

"We've got too many players who think negative, rather than positive," he said. "There were possibly players out there like that. They shouldn't be out there if they are not mentally strong enough to handle it when the pressure comes, when they are two or three down

'That's when you find the people who still want the ball, who don't hide, the people who still chase and work. Then you find out about people. Unfortunately we didn't have too many of those today

*On these occasions you find out about certain players. Certain players were out of their depth."

Strong words indeed - as there were on the terraces.

But don't forget to spare a thought for Andy Dibble. All the best mate!

What an improvement on Saturday's debacle at London Road! Okay, so the vast improvement still yielded the same return i.e. a defeat, but the home supporters that had clearly expected three points as something of a formality beforehand were looking decidedly edgy for much of this game.

It's tempting just to say that the four changes to the starting eleven from Saturday made all the difference, but the commitment, work rate and passion were all there in much more abundance - a fact appreciated by Dragons' travelling fans at the end of the game.

But the bottom line is still that we suffered a second successive defeat (a fourth successive away defeat), and we can ill afford such a run as we enter the business end of the season

Remarkably we remained sat in tenth place after this defeat, but with games running out, and several of the sides in the playoff places having games in hand, it's results rather than performances that are required.

Here we got the performance - especially in the opening period when we were clearly the better side - but ultimately not the result

In fact I'm sure everyone connected with the club will look back on the opening forty-five minutes as a chance wasted to put the home side, and their vociferous fans, under a lot of pressure in the second period.

With the solid foundation set by the returning Steve Roberts and Brian Carey in the heart of the defence, and the confidence exuded by the on-loan Michael Ingham in goal, all the chances in the first half came the Dragons' way. In fact I can only recall Ingham having to make one save in the first half, an easy gathering of a long-range effort.

At the other end Chris Armstrong was only a foot or so wide with a spectacular overhead kick after good work down the right by Chris Llewellyn, and Rangers' on-loan keeper Lee Camp smartly saved a near post Jim Whitley effort. Armstrong and Dennis Lawrence could possibly have done better with headed chances, and Steve Thomas forced another save from Camp as halftime approached.

Unfortunately the home side were a different proposition after the break but still found the Dragons in resolute mood and again didn't force any meaningful save out of Ingham, while at the other end Clarke Carlisle came within inches of heading a Llewellyn cross past his own keeper.

But Rangers' pressure continued to build as the half wore on and they made the breakthrough on 67 minutes - much to the visible relief of the expectant home support - albeit in a fashion that will disappoint Denis Smith.

Steve Roberts had done well to turn a dangerous cross behind but when the corner was delivered, Carlisle headed past Ingham in a manner, which form the opposite end of the pitch at least, looked all too easy.

That solitary goal would have probably represented a fair reflection of the home side's second half domination and it was somewhat undeserving of the Dragons' efforts that Kevin McLeod raced clear to add a second late on.


But a vastly improved display, and something to build-on when Swindon visit the Racecourse, in what could still end up being a play-off showdown. Let's hope so!

Arsenal are gunned down!

This is the one. The giant killing of all time - whatever any outsider would have you believe! The reigning Football League Champions being "turned over" by Fourth Division Wrexham - the outfit that finished bottom of the whole Football League the previous season. This term (1991-92) the Reds were showing a little better but, no way were they being tipped to even hold Arsenal.

Indeed, in rounds one and two, Wrexham were the Football League representatives (certainly not giants) being tipped for a possible early exit at the hands of non-league opposition - despite having the benefit of home advantage in both rounds. In Round One, Winsford United of the H.F.S. Loans League Division One were eventually beaten 5-2. But, it was only in the latter stages that Wrexham made sure of their Second Round place where they met a strong Vauxhall Conference outfit - Telford United. This game was too close for comfort and only Steve Watkin's second half strike finally separated the teams, thus earning our Third Round Racecourse encounter against the "Gunners".

It was almost 14 years earlier that these sides had met in an epic F. A. Cup Quarter Final tie on the Racecourse. The Londoners won that one 3-2, but there had always been the feeling of injustice (thank you for nothing, referee Tommy Reynolds of Swansea) about that result. Now, that "ghost" was soon to be laid to rest and revenge exacted in the most dramatic fashion.

However, the game began with Arsenal, as expected, running the show. David Rocastle was spraying the ball about to good

effect but his forwards were showing profligacy in front of goal as numerous chances were wasted Mike Thomas tried his hest to keep the Reds going and Wrexham goalkeeper Vince O'Keefe made vital saves from Kevin Campbell and Nigel Winterburn.

Then, Gareth Owen hit a half chance just wide before "lady luck" deserted us. Owen lost out

in midfield to Rocastle and he got Paul Merson away down the left - Merson had been a thorn in Wrexham's flank throughout the first half. Merson zipped away and played the ball back perfectly for Alan Smith to turn the ball home. In first half stoppage time, Gordon Davies nearly got Steve Watkin through - but it was all still to play for.

The second half began with Wrexham playing the ball in to feet, rather than lofting high balls into the box for David O'Leary and Tony Adams to easily clear. Arsenal showed again and Merson played a neat reverse pass to Winterburn whose effort hit the bar and came down on the goal line.

The Reds wouldn't lie down and frustrated their visitors who had both Lee Dixon and Winterburn booked, with others arguing among themselves. The crowd of 13,343 got behind Wrexham and Arsenal's England International goalkeeper, David Seaman, saved well from Andy Thackeray's blistering shot. Then, at the other end. O'Keefe denied Campbell after a swift counter attack.


Into the final ten minutes and Wrexham won a free kick 20 yards out. O'Leary protested that Gordon Davies had backed into him, but the award was ours. Up stepped Mickey Thomas and crashed a left footer into the top of Seaman's goal. Thomas took off on a run and the ground just took off!

Two minutes later, Davies made ground down the right wing and centered low into the box. Steve Watkin reacted quicker than Tony Adams and steered the cross low into the far corner of the net, past another despairing dive by Seaman - Wrexham were unbelievably ahead and the din was deafening.

Arsenal's Jimmy Carter had an effort disallowed for offside in stoppage time - cue more arguing by the visitors, but there was no arguing about Wrexham's place in Round Four.

There were extraordinary scenes at the end. The ground became a seething mass of red and white with youngsters swarming onto the pitch to mob their players - it was like the "old days". 2-1, WE BEAT THE ARSENAL 2-1 - altogether everyone----!





A new era dawns

Saturday, 23 August, 1958 was a momentous day for both Wrexham and Swindon as they met at the County Ground in the first ever Third Division fixture for both sides

The introduction of a new national Third and Fourth Division meant that supporters now had the opportunity to see teams at first hand that they could only previously have been drawn against in the F.A. Cup and over 15,000 turned out to see this historic encounter.

Sadly for Wrexham, the match ended in a 1-0 defeat but the programme issued for the match is still quite easy to obtain some 46 years on. The 12 small-sized pages contain a limited amount of reading material including the ubiquitous one-line pen-pictures of the visiting Wrexham players. The cover features a superb aerial photograph of the County Ground whilst the teams are featured in 2-3-5 format on the centre pages.

reserves & youths

From Strength To Strength

There's plenty of catching up to do in this issue with both the reserves and youth sides in action over the past few weeks, but we'll begin with a Pontin's Holidays League Division 1 (West) meeting with Macclesfield Town, at the Racecourse, on Wednesday 3 March.

The Dragons were looking to build on the surprise 4-3 victory at League leaders Wigan Athletic a couple of weeks earlier and did so with a hard fought 3-2 victory to earn three points that lifted us two places up the table.

The opening goal arrived on 16 minutes when Mark Jones slipped a lovely ball through the centre of the Silkmen's defence for Lee Jones to race onto before slotting the ball past keeper David Miskelly from a yard or so inside the penalty area.

Back came the visitors and the experienced Martin Carruthers should have done better with a 29th minute header that struck the outside of the goal's stanchion.

The same combination that brought the Dragons' first goal then combined again, but this time Lee Jones' angled shot drifted just wide. A second goal did arrive on 38 minutes - though via rather fortunate circumstances.

It all came about because of a sloppy pass by Andrew Smart that Lee Jones latched onto at the right hand side of the penalty area. He tried to pick out striking partner Hector Sam with a low cross. But, the ball instead struck Michael Welch and deflected past a helpless Miskelly.

However, the Silkmen weren't consigning themselves to defeat and responded with a good spell of pressure as the minutes ticked away to the interval, culminating in Carruthers scoring on 43 minutes after a Smart header had been headed off the line by Steve Thomas.

The second half began with Joe Feeney on as a replacement for Lee Jones who'd been taken off as a precautionary measure with a hamstring problem, but the change did little to disrupt the Dragons as they restored the two-goal cushion on 57 minutes.

It was Paul Barrett that initiated the move with a ball over the Macclesfield back line for Sam to chase. The Trinidadian nodded the ball past a defender and continued on an angled run towards the left-hand corner of the six-yard box. He cut back inside and picked out Mark Jones ghosting into the penalty area, and the young midfielder coolly slotted the ball past Miskelly from 10 yards.

You'd have thought at that stage that the Dragons would be able to see the rest of the game out to a comfortable conclusion. But the visitors had other ideas and halved the deficit almost immediately, when former Liverpool trainee John Miles emphatically found the net at the far post after a left-wing cross had evaded Carruthers at the near post.

Only the width of the crossbar denied Stephen Brackenridge an 84th minute equaliser, as the Dragons were forced onto the defensive in the closing stages. But hold on they did, to make it a profitable couple of weeks for Joey Jones' side.

Next up was a Youth Alliance League Cup Semi-Final clash with Preston North End at Colliers Park a fortnight ago, a game that saw the Dragons' run in the competition end in disappointing fashion with a 4-1 defeat.

"They are an under-19 side, and a good one as well, while we are a younger side," explained Steve Weaver.

'They were stronger than us - not better than us. We've got to match it when playing a good under-19 side. We had four under-16s on the field at the end.

"It was never a 4-1 game. In terms of keeping the ball we were the better side. But they had four or five chances, whereas we had six or seven but didn't take them. That was the difference!

"We needed to take our chances, but on the day we didn't

"But overall I was pleased with the performance and couldn't have asked much more from them."

Unfortunately, the Dragons got off to the worst possible start as Preston took the lead inside three minutes, but several chances to equalise weren't taken and the missed chances were rued as Preston doubled their lead from close range after half-an-hour.

But the Dragons kept plugging away and Feeney was unlucky with a shot from the left that squeezed under the keeper's body but a defender raced back to clear from near his own goal line with Duffy closing in. Feeney then forced the keeper to parry away a powerful 20-yard effort just before the break.

Preston extended their lead further early in the second half, which was the signal for Joey and Steve to urge against caution and go for broke, and this bold approach should have yielded a penalty when a Duffy cross was blocked by a defender's arm. But the referee gave a corner not a penalty!

"We went a bit gung-ho then," added Steve. "We asked the full backs to bomb on.

"But the second half went the same way as the first, with us not taking our chances. We may as well lose by 4 as 2 and, in gong for it, that's where our problems came."

A passing movement comprising something in the region of 20 passes starting with Jones in the Dragons' goal, involving two-touch football, ended with Duffy putting Mike Williams in and the full back lifted the ball over the advancing keeper.

"We're disappointed not to win it because we thought before the game that we had a great chance to win. Not doing so was a blow for us," said Steve.

"But we've done alright since October, and this was the first game we've lost this year.

"The Cup was nice while it lasted - but it's gone now."

Finally we cast our minds back ten days to when the Dragons earned a home Pontin's League Cup Semi-Final clash with Sheffield Wednesday with an extra-time victory over a Grimsby Town side that finished the Racecourse encounter with only nine men.

Kirk Wheeler saw red on 25 minutes when, as last man, he brought Hector Sam down a yard or so outside the penalty area, and Tony Crane followed him for an early bath for pulling Lee Jones back for the crucial match winning penalty in the first extra-time period.

It shouldn't have gone that far though - far from it in fact - as the Dragons wasted a whole catalogue of chances to have won the game comfortably in the 90 minutes. But a combination of poor finishing, good goalkeeping and some hard luck - notably when a second half Sam effort struck a post - saw the game head into an additional 30 minutes play.

What would ultimately prove to be the deciding goal came in the last minute of the opening period when, as mentioned earlier, Lee Jones was pulled back inside the penalty area and composed himself before sending Richardson the wrong way from the spot.

Thomas struck a post in the second period but the Dragons were quite content to play keep ball against their nine-man opponents, though Lee Jones did have a 'goal' ruled out for offside late on.

A job well done - though it should have been done a lot earlier than it was!



Today's featured photograph takes us back to the glory days of the 1977-78 season when Wrexham virtually swept all before them in both League and Cup.

The Third Division Championship was deservedly clinched with a 1-1 draw at Hereford United, with some 8,500 Reds fans somehow squeezing into Edgar Street. Promotion itself had been secured seven days earlier with a 7-1 demolition of Rotherham United, Graham Whittle scoring a hat-trick on what was a truly memorable day for everyone connected with the club.

The Reds also reached the quarter-finals of both the F.A. Cup and League Cup, falling to Arsenal and Liverpool respectively after two titanic struggles at the Racecourse.

In the F.A. Cup, Wrexham had crushed Bristol City and Newcastle United, both top flight sides, before facing the minnows of Blyth Spartans in the fifth road. On a bitterly cold day, the pitch was very icy and there was much debate as to whether the game itself would be played.

With the BBC Match of the Day cameras in attendance, referee Mr A. Gray gave the game the go ahead much to the delight of the 20,000 spectators crammed into the Racecourse. In a dour encounter, the conditions negated much of Wrexham's free-flowing football and a shock looked on the cards when Terry Johnson capitalised on Alan Hill's back pass to give Blyth an early lead.

Wrexham laid siege to the visitors' goal but it took a last gasp equaliser from none other than Dixie McNeil to force the tie into a replay. Les Cartwright, resplendent in his white boots, took a corner from the edge of the Mold Road Stand. The flag itself would not stand up but despite this, the referee allowed him to continue and so McNeil's was able to force home what proved to be a highly controversial goal.

Our picture features an incident during the first half when Graham Whittle sent a glancing header just wide of the post, with the old Turf viewing room evident in the background.

nationwide division 2 round-up

Don't Panic Captain Mainwaring!

Managerial changes, new signings, clubs in crisis, we have it all here in Division Two. At this stage of the season we are seeing those clubs who are ambitious, those who are resigned to relegation and those who are prepared to fight to get out of trouble or into the play-offs.

It's certainly a strange time to change your manager - I've always thought. Barely ten games left and any new man only has a chance of just a few games to get the blend right for the challenge ahead. On the other hand, a change now allows the fresh face to see who he wants to keep and who he will dispense with in the summer.

This month has seen changes at Oldham and Rushden, the latter appointing former Wrexham centre back Barry Hunter until the end of the season. These are times of change at Nene Park, where the Griggs empire that created the club looks a little more uncertain. The fact that former manager Brian Talbot was not allowed to strengthen the side, obviously played a large part in his decision to walk out on the Irthlingborough club, after seven years, and move to Oldham as their new boss. He gave many a disgruntled press conference after a number of games this season and it must have come as no surprise to the fans that he upped and left.

That he has gone to Oldham is a strange one, as he has of course been promised a pot of gold clearly, but how the fortunes of the Latics have changed over the course of this season.

Talbot has already made his intentions clear in signing a couple of players soon, after last Saturday's goalless draw at Boundary Park against Colchester.

They did not look like scoring and to be honest we did not either, we had a few chances and I can see why it's been a difficult season here and I know there is work to do. The first job is to keep us up and we still need to reach my target of 50 points, sooner rather than later. I will be working with the players and perhaps having a word with the owners here and asking about the chances of bringing in one or two others."

So what then of Brentford's decision to sack Wally Downes. Mixed views have abounded the internet since his departure on Sunday. The supporters' body 'BIAS' campaigned prior to the weekend for his departure, and all seemed on track following Sunday's announcement, but it appears to have backfired for the Bees' fans after his departure, with a twist in the tale.

BIAS wrote on the Beesotted.com website: "With regret we feel it necessary to write as a body to register grave concern that the BIAS committee harbours regarding the prospects of the club avoiding relegation this season under the managership of Wally Downes.

"At the time of writing, with one win from our last seventeen games, the degree of improvement required as a matter of urgency, greatly exceeds that which it is credible to believe Mr Downes is capable of inspiring.

"We do not wish to question Wally's character or dedication in any way. We are certain that he has striven to the best of his ability to turn our fortunes around, and it is truly unfortunate for all concerned that such an overwhelming number of fans must concede that he has failed."

No punches pulled there and that after this assurance by club director John McGlashan, during the previous week: "Wally's position is not even on the agenda, it's not even an issue. We will do whatever we have to do and will back Wally to get it right. We will give him whatever needs, and we will try to find money from somewhere."

However, fans pressure and a defeat at home to Stockport, despite pulverising the Hatters goal, tipped the balance against Downes.

The club issued a statement that: "It was with regret that the board felt they had to make the decision to relieve Wally Downes of his responsibility as manager of Brentford Football Club."

Quite a turnaround and with just ten games left the gamble had been taken - but then the twist.

Just as supporters were digesting the news that they had wished for, the club revealed that Downes would be receiving compensation.

Chairman Eddie Rogers revealed after the sacking that, part of the considerable fee that Brentford received from Southampton in January for the transfer of keeper Paul Smith, would have to be forfeited to pay off

This has incensed the fans, but it surely emphasises the perils of decisions to sack your manager, without considering the financial

considerations. In Brentford's case, the reaction was not in any way knee-jerk, as the club had experienced five straight defeats as well as being locked in the bottom four for much of the campaign.

They then appointed Garry Thompson, Downes' assistant, until the end of the season. So with a six figure sum in Downes pocket and Brentford left with no cash to spend, can Thompson stop the rot? Well if the form guide is anything to go by then he has a thankless task, the goals for column has been the Bees problem this term, averaging just one a game.

On Tuesday, Thomson rallied the side to a 1-1 draw at Blackpool, but that may still not be enough as it is only wins that will keep the club in Division Two. But the glimmer of hope is there and with just three top half sides to play until the end of the season they do have a chance, albeit a slim one.

Fellow strugglers and battlers Stockport are also fighting, with seven points gained from their last three games. They managed an excellent 2-2 draw at Hartlepool on Tuesday and it is an indication of how far they have come in recent times under Sammy McIlroy. County also have just three games against top half sides in their run in, and my spies at Edgeley Park report that since the speculation of Aaron Wilbraham coming to the Racecourse in a swap deal with Hector Sam, which was aborted, his form has been sublime. Transfer talk looks to have had a very positive effect on the Knutsford born striker, who has been at the club since his schooldays.

Wycombe cannot buy a win at the moment, they drew for the 15th time this term at Colchester on Tuesday, the Essex side themselves now just four points from safety. Notts County received a setback in their fight for survival, losing 2-1 at Nene Park and, in doing so, handing Diamonds manager Barry Hunter his first win. County have a tough run in and it would be a miracle if they did stay up, given the fact that they began the season in administration.

Chesterfield have to be careful, especially after Tuesday's home defeat by Brighton, a result that also keeps the Seagulls in the play-off hunt.

Those play-offs are now within Bournemouth's reach following a fine 2-0 victory at Sheffield Wednesday three days ago, that result being the Owls' fifth at Hillsborough this term and only Bournemouth's fifth on the road, which takes them level on points with Luton Town in sixth place.

Swindon's promotion push also continued on Wednesday evening and a 2-0 success over Grimsby keeps the east coast side deep in trouble, just above the relegation zone.

Plymouth are not interested in the play-offs, as they remain clear at the top thanks to a midweek win over Peterborough, which was Posh's first defeat in four games. Without Paul Sturrock now, who left the Pilgrims to take over at Southampton, but his legacy clearly lives on at Home Park.

So the final run in has begun, and it was at this stage last season that we started a run that ended in promotion. Twenty eight goals scored and just nine conceded in eight wins and two draws, catapulted us into Division Two. I'm dreaming, are you?



Speaking to the Western



Persons convicted of criminal offences will become subject of Exclusion Orders banning them from all Football League grounds.
