



The Manager's Messae

HELLO and welcome to Kenilworth Road for today's game against Swindon. Welcome also to Andy King and his staff, players, directors and supporters from the County Ground.

As a club there are few places more accommodating than Swindon. Travelling up and down the country week in, week out, to watch or play games, you will be hard pressed to find more helpful staff, and even when I was sent to the stands there back in the autumn I was met with understanding "football people."

That may be because they're used to managers losing the plot! But seriously, I think it will be more to do with employing personnel who appreciate the game, as opposed to "bouncers" or "jobsworths" and believe me we meet a lot of them

Talking of sackings, we were at Hartlepool last week, and you can imagine how disappointed I was with that result. We played some decent football, and were ahead twice, but it wasn't to

rewarded them.

These notes are written ahead of the Tranmere game, one we needed to get something out of. Easter is always a make or break stage of the season, and I think it is still in our own hands.

Having come so far with so many restrictions this season, I will not let anybody give in, or concede, or patronise us by telling us we have done better than expected.

The players will be tested in the coming week or so, but they continue to produce against the odds, and the youngsters who have been thrown in have been a revelation. We will keep going to the death, as we are sure you will.

The Town Captain's View

AS YOU may imagine, I am hoping to be selected for this afternoon's game after having to sit it out for three matches. We are at a stage of the season where every game is very important, and we need to treat them all like a cup final, because we want victories to maintain our play-off chances.

Because of the holidays I have had to write this before Saturday's match at Tranmere, when we wanted to bounce back after the disappointment at Hartlepool.

Our last home game was also a disappointment to us, when we allowed Oldham to sneak a point. At least we were not beaten, but it is strange how we seem to be affected by the opposition's standing. We had played some terrific football when we showed we were the equals of the top two teams in the division. Without being disrespectful to Oldham, they are one of those teams you expect to beat at home if you are realistic promotion contenders. Instead the game was a bit flat, with little tempo or urgency, and no-one can explain why it happens. At least we didn't lose, and we could have, because having fluked one goal Dean Crowe ought to have scored another in the last few minutes.

We suffered similarly last season: we couldn't beat Chesterfield or Mansfield, who were both relegated, and you could say our failures against them cost us a play-off place. So perhaps we should be grateful that our remaining matches are all involving teams with promotion ambitions of their own.

Give credit to Oldham for doing a decent job at Kenilworth Road, even if their goal was a pure fluke. We needed a very quick reply, and once again well done Enoch Showunmi for another well-taken goal, from a nice ball played in by Ahmet Brkovic.

Enoch is getting stronger and fitter with every game. I know from experience that when you come back for pre-season work it can make you hurt, mentally and physically, so it has been even harder for Enoch, who had to make the transition from parks football to the Second Division. We're all delighted for him.

One of the odd features of the Oldham game was that the fans seemed to be very quiet. Like the game, they were flat. I suppose they were disappointed with what they were

watching, but that's exactly the time when a team needs the supporters to be the 12th man. Our fans have been tremendous this season, and can play a

big part in our efforts for the final month of the campaign.

Well done to all those who made the long trip to Hartlepool, and we were sorry we did not give you a better result. The lads were very disappointed, especially after conceding yet another very late goal on a night when they felt all the important refereeing decisions went against them.

The early goal was exactly what we needed, another example of a player returning to score against his former club. We needed a second and then we could have been cruising, but it wasn't to be. Even so, we could well have taken a point, which would have been very valuable because it would have kept Hartlepool below us. Instead they overtook us, and it

is obviously going to be a real scrap for the play-off places. I think the season still has a few twists and turns left in it.

It was nice to welcome Michael
Leary to our score-chart, and his
progress has been another feature of a difficult season. Being in
administration forced the gaffer
to operate with a very small
squad, and recent injuries have
added to the problems, but it
has given the chance for young
lads to come through and prove
they can do a man's job.

This afternoon we will all have to stand up like men, because this is a game of huge importance to both teams. Swindon are going well, and like us scoring goals from all over the field, so hopefully there should be some excitement for the fans of both sides. Our future is in our own hands – all we need to do is beat the teams above us. And, as I said, if supporters can be the 12th man, we can do it today.



I am sure supporters will give him a warm reception, and on the subject of supporters I must offer my congratulations to those who managed to get to Hartlepool on Tuesday evening. It's one of the longest journeys of the season, and it was good to see and hear nearly 300 who made the trip for a midweek evening game Again at the time of writing we are still in receivership, which I know is extremely disappointing and frustrating for everyone. I did not anticipate things taking this long when I genuinely advised you nearly a fortnight ago that I believed we would be out that week. Keep up the support, we will get there I promise you! Meanwhile our thanks also to those who have supported the buy-a-seat campaign. The response has been tremendous, and I had to include a mention of one of the name-tags requested by one of our fans. The picture says it all!

Finally, the close season is not too far away, and we are beginning to formulate plans for refurbishment and decoration of the stadium, so if you could spare a few days between June 1 and July 15 to volunteer to put on a coat of paint, etc, we would love to hear from you.

Die-Hards Clock Up The Miles

THE Town's away following passed the 28,000 mark on Tuesday, when nearly 300 die-hards managed to make the 500-mile round trip to Hartlepool – a wonderful turn-out considering the cost, time involved and the need to take time off work.

It was very nearly as many as Oldham brought to Luton for our last home game, and the biggest away crowd seen at Kenilworth Road so far this season remains that brought by QPR. However, that may change when Sheffield Wednesday complete our home season on May 1. They have been the best-supported team home and away throughout the campaign despite disappointing results which seem to have wrecked their chances of a return to Division One at the first attempt.





Welcome to Todav's Visitors

1. BART GRIEMINK - GOALKEEPER

Giant keeper signed by Colin Todd on a free transfer in the summer of 2000. Griemink is a former Dutch Under-21 international who spent a successful loan spell with The Robins (as cover for Frank Talia) before eventually joining the club. He came to English football in 1995 with Birmingham and deputised competently for the injured lan Bennett, playing in the 1995 League Cup semi-final.

Bart played every game last season and was one of the most consistent performers - he was also in contention for the Player of the Year Award.

The arrival of Under 21 goalkeeper Rhys Evans in 2003 has seen Bart with a tougher test than seasons gone by and subsequently has found himself as second choice keeper. However, the Dutchman continues to train hard and push Evans all the way for the number one shirt and is probably the best goalkeeper on the bench in Division Two.

20. RHYS EVANS - GOALKEEPER

Made his debut for the England Under 21 side against Serbia, but was eventually released by Chelsea in the summer.

Town manager Andy King swooped for the young stopper in 2003 to give first choice keeper Bart Griemink more competition for the number one shirt at Swindon Town. Since then Evans has been a regular between the posts for Town and has turned in many match saving performances.

A Town fan at heart that is glad to be playing for his local team again. He continues to work hard with goal keeping coach Fraser Digby in a bid to push him into a more prominent England spot.

3. GRANT SMITH - MIDFIELDER

Grant joined Swindon Town after being released from the Blades and was strongly recommended by Sheffield United boss, Neil Warnock amongst many others. Since joining in the summer of 2003, 'Smithy' has had little chance to impress with a host of restricted performances in the first team and a blight of niggling injuries.

However, the Scot has continued to perform excellently in the reserve side and is now regular skipper of Town's second string eleven.

4. MATTHEW HEWLETT - MIDFIELDER

All at Ashton Gate once tipped midfielder Matt for the top. The former Bristol City player was called

into the England Under 21 squad, but a number of injuries curtailed his flourishing career. In the end Hewlett made over 100 appearances for City, but left them to join Town on a Bosman in the summer

Matt captained the side last season in the absence of the suspended regular skipper Andy Gurney and has continued to deputise this season, loosing only seven of his eight games with the captain's armband. He has now made well over a hundred appearances for Swindon Town and continues to be a consistent performer in the centre of midfield. Despite some criticism, he tends to be the engine room at the heart of the team and the side never quite looks the same when he is missing.

6. ADI VIVEASH - DEFENDER

Viveash started his career here at Swindon and spent two separate brief spells on loan with the Royals in the 1992/3 and 1994/5 seasons. Joined Reading on a permanent deal in 2000/01 and started as the first choice centre back. Last season his first team involvement at Reading was restricted to a handful of games as a non-playing substitute until the final part of the campaign. Adi chose against signing a new one year deal with the Royals and departed for Wiltshire in the hope of a final few seasons with regular first team action. After starting the season as a regular choice on the left side of three centre backs, he found himself back on the bench following a poor run of games for Town in the winter. Has since struggled to return to the side for personal reasons but is now back in training and pushing for a first team start.

6. ANDY GURNEY - DEFENDER (CAPT)

Andy started his career at hometown club Bristol Rovers, where he spent four seasons before moving to Torquay for one year and impressing during their surge to the play-offs. He then joined Reading in January 1999 for £100,000 as an attack-minded, right-sided defender that could also play in midfield. He soon established a regular starting place with Reading in 1999/00 and figured in the Royals' promotion push last year.


Was keen to join Town after their impressive performance against Reading and King snapped him up on a Bosman in the summer of 2001. Crowned an impressive home debut performance against Tottenham with a long-range goal and proved to

be one of King's best buys. Comfortable on the ball, he is a versatile defender who can appear at right back or in midfield if required.



7. SAMMY IGOE -MIDFIELDER

After making his way up through the ranks at Portsmouth, where he began as a trainee, Igoe went on to secure a first team spot at the south coast club and made his mark with some impressive performances. He moved to Reading in a £100,000

deal but found it difficult to break into the first team and spent much of his time on the substitutes bench. Sammy eventually joined Luton on loan on transfer deadline day and went straight into their starting line up. However after just two appearances a training ground accident brought his stay to a premature close and he returned to the Madejski Stadium. Igoe left to join Swindon in the summer of 2003. This season he has brought a fresh enthusiasm to the Town side and has quickly become a crowd favourite with his quick feet, skills and turn of pace.

8. TOMMY MOONEY - STRIKER

Tommy joined Town from Birmingham in July this year. He joined previous club Birmingham from Watford and, over the course of his career, he has spanned the highest and lowest levels of English football. He is one of few current players in the Town squad to have Premiership experience thanks to his time with the Hornets. Over seven seasons at Vicarage Road, Tommy's goal average was an impressive one in every four games with 63 goals in 279 appearances in all competitions.

Late on in the summer of 2003 he decided to join Andy King's revolution at Swindon Town and has quickly become a fans favourite in Wiltshire. His grit and determination made him a cult hero, and after a fantastic start to the season he is now well into double figures along with strike partner Sam Parkin. On regular occasions King has referred publicly to the strike pairing as the best in Division Two and with a work rate and character as strong

as Mooney's, he looks set to fire the team further up the table and into the play off's.

9. SAM PARKIN -STRIKER

Young and very promising forward who joined the club from Chelsea in 2002. The transfer followed a mass of speculation, with Andy King, a huge fan of the player, tracking him for several months. Parkin joined the club

Parkin joined the club from Stamford



Bridge where his development was hindered by a glut of international stars. However, whilst at the club he joined several other clubs on loan and it is with them that he built up a reputation as a lethal striker.

He joined Millwall in September 2000 and made his Football League debut for the Lions in a 5-0 demolition of Oxford United. He then went on loan to Wycombe Wanderers in November 2000 after having a trial with Queens Park Rangers. Scored twice in 13 games for the Chairboys, but eventually went on loan once again to Oldham Athletic before joining Northampton, again on loan, in 2001.

'Super Sammy Parkin' more than repaid Andy King's faith in his ability by netting 26 goals during the 2002-03 campaign, including a devastating hattrick against Barnsley on the opening day of the season. Strong on the ball and devastating in the box, he then went on to finish third in the Division's goal charts.

Understandably he romped away with the majority of trophies when the clubs 'Player of the Year' awards were handed out. So far this season, the striker has picked up where he left off last term and in tandem with Tommy Mooney, has begun to terrorise defences and fire Town further up the league.

A true legend already, Town fans will be hoping the club can hang on to their hero before he attracts any major interest.

10. STEFANI MIGLIORANZI - MIDFIELDER

Miglioranzi is the product of the American College

football system in which the most promising players are drafted into Major League Soccer. Stefani helped St John's University win the 1996 NCAA Division I Championship and played for MLS team Chicago Fire before joining Everton on trial.

They were keen to sign him but no deal came about. Portsmouth then out jumped Liverpool in inviting him for a trial and signed him soon thereafter. The 22-year-old is a Brazilian born American but holds an Italian passport. As a footballer the genes don't come much better. What's more, Miglioranzi is versatile; he can play in defence or as a central midfielder and since joining the club in July, has impressed in the middle of Town's midfield. This campaign has seen the midfielder go from strength to strength at the heart of Town's midfield and after chipping in with his fair share of spectacular goals; he has quickly become the heartbeat of Andy King's team.

11. DAVID DUKE - DEFENDER/MIDFIELDER

'Dukey' will feel slightly aggrieved with the tag of 'Most Improved Player' last season – but he hardly missed a game and rarely put a foot wrong on the left hand side of Town's midfield. The Scotsman arrived on a free transfer from Sunderland in 2000 having never managed a start for the Black Cat's first team. Duke appeared regularly in his first season with the Robins. He combined well with Sol Davis down the Robins' left and is a good crosser of the ball – last year he became more affective beating players and he contributed more to the team with his hard work and endeavour.

14. JON STEVENSON - FORWARD

Live-wire young striking prospect signed his first professional forms in February 2001 with Leicester City. He was involved regularly from the bench during that season, scoring in their drubbing at Portman Road, and continues to have the making of a fine future player.

Although he looked a fine prospect, he was released by the club in preparation for their return to the Premiership.

He then signed for Swindon Town after a recommendation from Foxes Director of Football, Dave Basset. With bags of pace and skill, he has proved to be a good summer addition to the squad and despite very few first team chances, he continues to develop into a hot prospect for the future.

15. ANDREW NICHOLAS - DEFENDER

Andrew was a regular member of Liverpool's under-19 winning team in 2003 and won plaudits with his consistent performances at left back, resulting in a flattering comparison to Anfield legend Sami Hyypia.

At the time, his path into the first team at Liverpool seemed blocked and upon his decision to leave, King snapped him up in the summer of 2003. After working his way into the manager's starting line up with some hard work in training, the left sided defender has never looked back and has given a number of solid performances so far.

With good height, terrific pace and recovery he has proved to be a valuable asset to the defensive line up this season. He also possesses a Dave Challinor-style long throw, which he claims to be one of the longest in the division.

16. RORY FALLON - STRIKER

A recent signing from Barnsley, the big striker made quite an impression against Swindon in the past two seasons, scoring on many occasions and catching the eye of Town boss Andy King.

He had just began to cement his place in the first team when he suffered a stress fracture of his foot at the end of February and it was not until the closing stages that he rejoined the first team squad.

King had become a keen admirer of the striker by that point and Town eventually agreed a disclosed fee with Barnsley to bring him down to Wiltshire. However, with Parkin and Mooney in such good form, he has found it difficult to gain many first team chances but looks a superb prospect for the future. Has so far came of the bench to good effect and managed his first goal for the club against Plymouth in December.

17. BRIAN HOWARD - MIDFIELDER

The youngster joined Town from Southampton in 2003 having playing for the Saints reserves for two years. The 20-year old left-sided midfielder even turned down a late move to go to Chelsea, choosing instead to opt for some first team football under Andy King.

He has been a regular member of the England youth set up and was unlucky to not be included in the Under 20's side that went to the FIFA World Youth Championships.

The left sided midfielder has proved to be a reve-

lation on the flanks this season and should regularly be getting a pat on the back from the Town forwards as he continues to put chances in front of them.

19. MATTHEW HEYWOOD - DEFENDER

It has been another consistent year for Town's most effective defender and after a slow start, he returned to the kind of form that saw him clean up in the 2001/02 Player of the Year Awards.

Originally, Heywood failed to break through at Burnley's Turf Moor and, after being alerted as to his availability by former scout Shaun Reid, Andy King snapped him up on a free transfer.

Was an ever-present in the latter half of 2000/01 and has now missed just four games since. The tall defender signed an extension to his contract, much to the delight of the fans and he has shown the same strength and commitment this season.

Strong in the tackle and good in the air, Heywood is proving to be a great asset to the club. It is no coincidence that Town's defensive record improved dramatically following his arrival and whilst he may not have scored as many goals as he would have liked, he can prove effective went sent forward as an extra body in the box.

21. BEN MARTIN - DEFENDER

Manager Andy King signed Martin, a massive 6'7 centre-back, in August 2003. After impressing King during a scouting mission last season, he trained with the squad towards the end of last term and signed a one-year deal with the Club.

He has so far had a loan spell at Lincoln City where he didn't manage to get into the first team action and recently decided to join Farnborough Town on loan in a bid to get more football under his belt and will hope to figure in manager Andy King's future plans.

22. ALAN REEVES - DEFENDER

Before joining Swindon in 1998, he spent four years at Wimbledon, where he had the tough task of replacing John Scales. Reeves has also played for Gillingham, Chester and Rochdale where he is considered to be one of the best players in the club's history.

Town's veteran defender enjoyed another fine season in 2002-03. His sheer presence and a willingness to throw himself into the thick of the action were evident throughout that season and he thoroughly deserved his runner up spot in the clubs 'Player of the Season' award.

He has now made well over 400 league appearances and was rewarded last season with a playing/coaching role that has seen him turn around the



fortunes of Town's reserve side. He continues to back up the Swindon defence when called upon and has so far continued with some sterling performances this season.

25. STEVE ROBINSON - MIDFIELDER

Tough-tackling and energetic right-footed midfield terrier signed from Birmingham City for £50,000 in February 2001, he was an automatic choice for the Robins for the remainder of that season and more recently, signed a two-year extension to his contract.

A former Birmingham trainee, he broke into the Blues team under Barry Fry but has constantly been dogged by injuries that have limited his first team chances. He made over 50 league starts for the Blues, but almost joined Sheffield United in 1999 only to fail the medical.

He was involved at the start of the 2000-01 season, but was transfer-listed by Trevor Francis in November after failing to hold down a regular place in the first team squad. He duly left for Wiltshire in the hope of first team football and has proved to be a shrewd signing for the club ever since.

His non stop attitude and one hundred per cent work rate for the team has proved to be an outstanding asset and despite never really hitting the net on a regular occasion, his goals have come at important times; including a memorable double against local rivals Oxford United not too long ago in the memory of many a Town fan.



Blast From The Past

Although we had met up with Swindon on many occasions in the Southern League from our earliest times the story really starts when both clubs became founder

members of Football League Division Three in 1920. Our first opponents at this new level were old friends Swindon and on 28th August 1920 we travelled to the County Ground with high hopes only to return with our tails between our legs having suffered a 1-9 thrashing! Reports would indicate that the Hatters were worse than poor that day and even the reliable Ireland international Alan Mathieson caught the malaise that had spread through the side when he lobbed a spectacular 30 yard own goal to complete the scoring.

The return game was played the following week and, quite understandably, there was a massive shake-up in the side with only five players retaining their places. The changes had the desired effect with the

new-look Hatters winning through 2-0 with Sid Hoar and the prolific Ernie Simms on the scoresheet.

In the following season we had enjoyed a ten game unbeaten run leading up to Christmas with the result that the holiday fixture with Swindon attracted a record league crowd of 15,671 to Kenilworth Road, a figure which was not bettered for 14 years. Although we beat the Robins that day we failed to keep up the momentum and finally finished fourth.

For the rest of the 1920's and 1930's, leading up to our eventual promotion in 1937, results tended to go with the home side and it was not until 1933/34 that either side achieved the 'double'. Swindon gained that honour during that campaign but we returned the compliment the following year.

The final pre-war meetings took place in 1936/37 towards the end of a season that brought eventual promotion for the Hatters. In the game at Swindon on 3rd April, a last minute goal from George Stephenson secured a point in a 2-2 draw, but in the return three weeks later we were rampant scoring three times in fifteen minutes. Record goalscorer Joe Payne went on to hit a hat-trick in that game which finished 5-1 with his third goal bringing his personal tally for the season to 50.

Clashes With The Robins

Paths did not cross again in the league until 1968/69 with both sides in the old Division Three. In the home clash that season the Luton players were heavily criticized for 'rough play' after leaving Swindon goalkeeper Peter Downsborough limping following a series of heavy challenges. Having said that, the Swindon defenders of the time took no prisoners and gave goalscorers Laurie Sheffield and Brian Lewis a good buffeting.

Swindon were promoted at the end of that season but we joined them twelve months later for a four season run which ended with our promotion to the top flight in 1974 and Swindon's relegation. During that promotion season we achieved the 'double' over the Robins, winning 2-1 at Kenilworth Road in our first ever sponsored match and 2-0 at the County Ground where only 2.791 turned up for an afternoon fixture at the height of the 'three day week' and electricity power cuts.

We had to wait nearly twenty years before paths crossed again and following our relegation from the old Division One in 1992 we had to endure a turgid 0-0 draw at Kenilworth Road and a 0-1 defeat at Swindon with Paul Bodin netting the winner late on. Swindon were promoted at the season's end but only lasted a year before rejoining us in 1994/95. Again we achieved the double with our 2-1 victory at Swindon in November 1994 coming at the end of an eight game unbeaten away record which included six wins. Unfortunately our home record was

nowhere near as impressive that season and our 3-0 victory over the Robins at Kenilworth Road was a shining light in a sea of gloom.

We next met up in 2000/01 in Division Two and our miserable 2-3 home defeat at the hands of the Robins was typical of the displays put on by the Hatters at the time. Only three players (Emmerson Boyce, Peter Holmes and Matthew Spring) remain at the club from the team that turned out that day.


By the time of the return we had a new manager in charge. Joe Kinnear had overseen three straight wins at the start of his Luton career, had seen the Hatters lose at Walsall in game four and then take on the Robins at the County Ground for a 'must win' match.

The players did him and the supporters proud in winning 3-1 and I, for one, thought while driving home that we would escape the drop. Unfortunately, it was not to be and we had to miss out on clashes with Swindon for twelve months with matters resuming last season.

In the game at Kenilworth Road last term we were slowly recovering from a poor start to the campaign and our 3-0 win over the Robins pushed us several places up the table. Goals from Steve Howard, Andrew Fotiadis (after missing a couple of sitters) and Steve Robinson from the spot sent the crowd of 6,393 home happy. It would be nice for a repeat this afternoon!

Right up until Easter we had been amongst the front runners but had slipped up big time over the holiday period losing all three games. For the record we drew 1-1 with Swindon that May afternoon on a dry, bumpy pitch in a game that had 'anticlimax' written all over it.

Instant Response Earns A Point

Luton Town 1 Oldham Athletic 1

A THIRD consecutive 1-1 draw kept the Town in the play-off hunt, with Enoch Showunmi heading a valuable equaliser less than a minute after Oldham had taken a shock league with a fluke goal. The visitors, fighting to avoid being dragged into the relegation scrap, were much happier than the Town with the result. They should have been – they were lucky to go home with a point, and manager Brian Talbot admitted: "If we had been offered the draw before kick-off I would have taken it."

Mike Newell was not so pleased. But he pointed out that it was inevitable Oldham would battle, and that the Town's preparations have for weeks been bedevilled by injuries and suspensions.

Four changes were made to the starting line-up that did so well at QPR, with three enforced: Paul Hughes and Paul Underwood injured and Kevin Nicholls suspended.

So when he was asked why the Town looked so good against the top two teams in their previous two games, but not so convincing against lowly visitors, the boss said: "We were not at our best, but it's difficult to be so when you have to chop and change every week. And we are throwing players back in who are not 100 per cent, with little or no match practice.

"We haven't got great resources, but all we ask is for them to keep their minds right, keep believing in themselves, and we believe we can still do it.

"Their goal looked like a cross to me, but these things happen. But we created clearer and better chances and their keeper made some very good saves, particularly two or three before we scored and another one in the second half against Enoch." It was probably inevitable that the Oldham goal came from Dean Crowe, on his full debut ten days after being released by the Town. It was his first goal since August 2002 when he contributed the last in a

3-0 win over Chesterfield at Kenilworth Road, although a broken leg interrupted his career after that. He celebrated wildly, but few doubted it was pure fluke, an attempted right-wing cross that sailed into the far top corner, the sort of goal that has been known to embarrass David Seaman.

It was Oldham's first on-target shot, if shot it was, and they managed only one other in the rest of the game.

To their credit the Town responded to that 33rdminute blow by going onto the attack from the restart, and Ahmet Brkovic played in a tantalising left wing cross for Showunmi to head his eighth goal of the season.

Oldham were concentrating their efforts on defence, having worked all week on the training ground on ways to keep the Town at bay. That policy, said Brian Talbot, was needed after his side had allowed bottom club Wycombe to chalk up their first away win of the season at Boundary Park seven days earlier. Even so they were grateful to Les Poglicomi for several good saves, notably from Showunmi and Steve Robinson in the first half, and from Showunmi again just before the end. Those saves almost cost the Town dear, because with four minutes to go, and attack on everybody's mind, they were caught on the break, and sub Jermaine Johnson, who had been dropped to make way for Crowe, set up the former Town man for the best chance of the game. With Morten Hyldgaard exposed, Crowe shot wide of the far post. "His first touch wasn't good enough," said a disappointed Talbot.

He added: "We could have won it then, but overall I can't complain about the result. We worked hard on defence in training, and if our defensive performance in the remaining seven games is as solid as this one we should be all right."





Last-minute Penalty Settles It At 'Pool

Hartlepool Utd 4 Luton Town 3

THE locals were delighted with what they called a seven-goal thriller. We would have been if the result had been the other way round, but instead there was huge disappointment as once more a very late goal cost the Town the point that seemed to be theirs.

The winner was from a penalty, and while the trip by Curtis Davies on Eifion Williams was not disputed, questions were asked about whether the attacker was offside. Seconds later, Enoch Showunmi had the ball in the net at the other end, only for that effort to be ruled out, leaving Mike Newell to comment that it was one of those games where the officials seemed to give less and less to his men the longer the game went on. Emmerson Boyce and Alan Neilson were the latest to be struck down by injury, leading to the recall of 19-year-old Davies at the back and 20-year-old Michael Leary in midfield.

Hartlepool were up for it, knowing a home win would enable them to leapfrog the Town and Port Vale, but their early enthusiasm was doused when Steve Howard confirmed the tradition of players scoring against their former clubs in the third minute. A Sol Davis free kick led to Enoch Showunmi's goal-bound effort being tipped over the bar, and Howard converted the corner by Steve Robinson.

A corner at the other end led to Antony Sweeney equalising on 14 minutes, but Leary regained the lead with a goal to remember, a 30-yard piledriver in the 31st minute for his first league goal.

The Town were fairly comfortable for the rest of the first half, and the result might have been different had Ahmet Brkovic converted a 44thminute chance. He broke through down the middle, got beyond the Hartlepool defence, but shot against the bar, with the goalkeeper beaten.

The second half was a different story, with not much to choose between the sides except for Pool's ability to take chances. Adam Boyd headed them level from a right wing cross on 52 minutes, and that raised the tempo and the crowd, and three minutes later Hugh Robertson lashed in a goal as good as Leary's to give his side the lead for the first time.

Back came the Town, and it took only four minutes to restore parity when Chris Coyne's header from a corner by Robinson came back off the bar and Leary pounced to convert the rebound.

The draw looked set until the 90th minute when Hartlepool enjoyed the rub of the green and the chance to end it with Boyd's second, from the penalty spot.

"We should have got something out of it," said the Town manager. "At half time we felt that if we continued to play as we had done there would be more goals in it for us. We certainly never expected to concede three in the second half.

"We are not complaining about the trip for the penalty, but my impression was that the player was offside, and I don't know why Enoch's last-minute header was disallowed. We got very little from the referee, and less and less as the game went on.

"We are very disappointed, but we are still in a reasonable position, with another 21 points to play for."


EVACUATION PROCEDURE






Matt Spring is still out of contention after surgery, and needs at least another fortnight or so recovery time


