We were very pleased with the way we played against Doncaster Rovers last Saturday. Doncaster probably started the brighter of the two teams but then we had a great period where we scored three goals in quick succession.

You're never going to dominate a game for ninety minutes and, when you're on top, if you get chances you've got to put them away. It was a good performance against a side with a lot of qualities and I think they'll be up there around the play-off zone.

Debut

The game also saw the debut of John White and, as I have already gone on record as saying, I was very pleased with how John did. It was a big call to ask a lad to make his debut in a position that he's never played before but he did exceptionally well and confirmed what we already knew - that he is going to be a good player.

We followed that game with a trip to Hartlepool and, whilst not wanting to make too many excuses, we were down to the bare bones for this match. As well as our other injuries, we had lost Kevin Watson who, having got a cut on his ankle, picked up an infection in the wound.

Having said that, we still had chances to win the game, but I have no qualms with the way that the lads played in that match, because they rolled up their sleeves and had a real go in a game between two tired teams.

The first goal lifted Hartlepool physically and gave them something to hold onto. We found it difficult to raise the tempo of our game and, despite creating two or three good chances, we came away pointless.

No team apart from Luton picked up maximum points over the Bank Holiday weekend and it's going to be a very even division this year.

Tuesday saw us involved in some transfer activity and the deal to take Wayne Andrews to Crystal Palace has been mooted for a couple of months now. Wayne is a player that we got for nothing and, now in the last year of his contract, he could have walked away for nothing in the summer.

Delighted

Once he knew of Palace's interest, it was always going to be difficult to keep him here but, by the same token, I am delighted that we have been able to bring Gareth Williams to Layer Road.

As you will remember, he is a natural goalscorer and he has been really enthusiastic about coming to Colchester United. All in all it is an excellent bit of business for us and, with Gareth on the pitch, you always feel that there are goals in the team. When the ball goes near him, you think he is going to do something positive with it.

He has scored nine goals in fifteen games in his career so far and will get his goals in a different style to Wayne Andrews. Wayne got his goals with raw pace, but Gareth will mainly score due to intelligent movement in the box. With the players behind him, we will be creating decent opportunities to add to his tally.

We come into this afternoon's game feeling very positive. If you take five or six key players out of any squad, you would be very pleased if you could cope with that. We have managed to do just that, as we're still sat in third place in the table.

Positive

The signs are positive and once the injured lads get back, they will have to work hard to get back in the first team picture, because others have come in and taken their opportunity during the past couple of weeks.

Finally, I would like to welcome Andy King and his Swindon side to Layer Road. They had a great season last year and have had a reasonable start to the season. When you lose out in the play-offs, teams can start the next season with a bit of a hangover, but they are gradually getting into their stride and will give us a good test this afternoon.

And last week was another hectic seven days as the U's got things back on track in 2004/5 before an amazing transfer story developed...

28.08.04

After defeat to Chesterfield the previous Saturday, Colchester return to League One action in some style as they defeat Doncaster Rovers by a 4-1 scoreline. Phil Parkinson's men have to ride a storm at the start of each half, but show defensive resilience and an incisive edge up front.

A three goal blast midway through the first half from Craig Fagan, Gavin Johnson and Greg Halford put the U's into a comfortable position and, although Rovers pull one back on the stroke of half time, a Joe Keith free kick on 70 minutes eases the pressure and the win moves the U's into second place in the table.

Striker Wayne Andrews is introduced from the substitutes' bench, rested from the starting eleven after his partner gives birth to his second child. Ryan Tyler Andrews is born at the end of the week and our congratulations go to Wayne and his family.

29.08.04

After a training session on the Layer Road pitch, the U's make the long trek north in preparation for the match against Hartlepool on Bank Holiday Monday. They arrive at their hotel in Darlington early on Sunday evening and, after a brief swim, the players have their evening meal and retire to their rooms for the night.

One player who is missing is Kevin Watson who had picked up an infection in his calf. The match against Hartlepool would be the first that the former Reading man had missed in 2004/5.

30.08.04


An injury-ridden U's side fall to defeat in the north east after a hard working performance against Hartlepool. Phil Parkinson's men did everything asked of them in the first half before falling behind just before the break and, just as it looks like they are due to get back into the game, they concede a second midway through the second half.

Ben May is left wondering how he failed to score against Neale Cooper's men after a superb performance up front and it is left to Joe Keith to score a consolation goal for the U's as he sends in another of his trademark free kicks in the final minute of the game.

31.08.04

With just fifteen minutes to go before the transfer deadline expires, Wayne Andrews becomes a Premiership footballer. The striker joins Crystal Palace in a move that sees Gareth Williams come to Layer Road, as well as the U's receiving a guaranteed six figure sum and future additional clauses.





Oclohester United continued their hot form at Layer Road by defeating Doncaster Royers by a 4-1 scoreline. It was the U's seventh home win on the trot as Parky's men moved back up to second place in the table.

First half strikes from Craig Fagan Gavin Johnson and Greg Halford gave the U's a commanding lead and, although Rovers pulled one back on the stroke of half time, Joe Keith swung in a superb free kick midway through the second half to kill off the game.

From the Managers:

Phil Parkinson: "I'm very pleased with the lads. We are patching things up in one or two areas with one or two key players out injured, but I thought today we were tremendous.

"They started the brighter, but every time we went forward we looked exciting and that we could score goals.

Dave Penney: "We were a little bit naive in the first half to be honest. However, John Doolan's goal just before half time was important. It lifted us a bit and I felt we started the second half brightly.

"We made some bad mistakes. When we went a goal down, we showed some naivety in how we responded. Rather than trying to get ourselves composed, we looked for a quick goal and we raced forward and left ourselves exposed for a counter-attack and ultimately we paid the price."

IN TOWN TOPAY...

As the U's themselves well know, the addition of a loan signing to the squad can really brighten a team's fortunes and get things going on the pitch.

The addition of the likes of Graham Barrett, Gareth Williams, Liam Chilvers and Craig Fagan have all boosted the team on the pitch at a time when they needed it most.

And, after losing the first two games of the 2004/5 season, Swindon Town boss Andy King wasted no time in freshening things up at the County Ground in order to get his side's fortunes back on track.



The Robins had at least got some points on the board by the time that King made his early season additions - a win against MK Dons getting them off the mark - but the new faces have made an immediate impression since arriving in Wiltshire.

Striker Darius Henderson, a former team-mate of Phil Parkinson's at Reading, has notched four goals in three games for the Robins after penning a loan deal from Gillingham.

Two of those goals came in the West Country derby win over Bristol City, a rare triumph for Town against their near neighbours. And Henderson has quickly struck up a productive partnership with Sam Parkin up front.

King was delighted with the impact that Henderson has made, so much so that he looked to repeat the feat by adding Mark Yeates on loan from Tottenham. The midfielder immediately repaid that faith as well as he put in a sterling performance as Swindon saw off Hartlepool by a 3-0 scoreline.

After the win against Pools last Saturday, Yeates told local press: "I had to repay the faith the manager put in me when he put me in the team.

"The main thing was to get out there and play and to play my natural game. I was pleased with how it went. I can't dwell on it though. You have to look to the next game at Walsall. I think I've got six games while I'm here and I want to do progessively better in each one."

Dirappointing

That game against Walsall was a disappointing one for King's men, however, as they fell to a 3-2 defeat having been 2-0 ahead within the first half an hour. Henderson was again on target as the Robins gave it a real go up in the West Midlands.

The results that Swindon have had this season show that League One will be a tight affair this season. However, the County Ground side should be expected to be in the mix up when the table starts to take shape in the coming months, as they have one of the stronger squads in the division.

Yet there are always surprise packages in the division and King will be hoping that, in future, his team can hold onto two goal advantages away from home.

"There are loads of clichés that can be used, it's the consistency of good teams that close games when the game is won. We should have been more professional, stronger, more determined," he told the club's official website after the game.

Rhys Evans

Originally at Chelsea, Andy King swooped for the young stopper in 2003 to give first choice keeper Bart Griemink more competition for the number one shirt. Since then Evans has been a regular between the posts for Town and has turned in many match saving performances. Will relish the chance to battle it out with new keeper Steve Book.

Andy Gurney

After starting at Bristol Rovers and spending time at Reading, Andy was snapped up by Swindon on a Bosman in the summer of 2001. He made 45 appearances in all competitions last season, weighing in with a useful contribution of nine goals, including expertly taken free kicks at Plymouth and Tranmere last season. Transfered to Swansea City on deadline day.

Sean O'Hanlon

After impressing during an eight-game loan spell last season, Sean signed for Swindon Town in March 2004 on a permanent basis from Everton. Having come up through the youth ranks at Goodison Park, O'Hanlon left Merseyside in search of first team football and was a rock in the centre of defence towards the end of the 2003-04 season and is surely one of Town's brightest prospects.

Jerel Ifil

Powerful defender Jerel joined Town in the summer of 2004 after enjoying three loan spells with Town

previously over the past three seasons. Jerel became a fans' favourite during his brief stays in Wiltshire and having finally signed on the dotted line, gives Andy King several options at the back.

David Duke

Last season hardly missed a game and rarely put a foot wrang on the left hand side of Town's midfield. The Scotsman arrived on a free transfer from Sunderland in 2000. He has became increasingly more effective beating players and he contributed more to the team with his hard work and endeavour.

Andrew Micholar

Andrew was a regular member of Liverpoolis U19s title winning team in 2003 and won plaudits with his consistent performances at left back. With his path into the first team at Liverpool seemingly blocked, King snapped him up in the summer of 2003. With good height, terrific pace and recovery he has made the left back slot his own during the last campaign.

Mark Yeater

Dublin born midfielder, currently on loan from Premiership side Tottenham Hotspur. It is the second time that Mark has left White Hart Lane to head out on loan, having previously spent time with Brighton & Hove Albion during their run towards the play-offs in 2003/4.

Mott Hewlett

Previously Hewlett made over 100 appearances for

Bristol City, but left them to join Town on a Bosman in the summer of 2000. He has now made well over a hundred appearances for Swindon Town and continues to be a consistent performer in the centre of midfield. He tends to be the engine room at the heart of the team.

Brian Howard

The youngster joined Town from Southampton in 2003 having playing for the Saints reserves for two years. The left sided midfielder proved to be a revelation on the flanks last season and should regularly be getting a pat on the back from the Town forwards as he continues to put chances in front of them.

Som Parkin

Young and very promising forward who joined the club from Chelsea in 2002. Whilst at the Stamford Bridge club he joined several other clubs on loan and it is with them that he built up a reputation as a lethal striker. And that has continued at Swindon, where he is nearing 50 goals.

Darlus Henderson

A burly striker signed on a month's loan from Gillingham, Darius instantly repaid Andy King's faith in his ability by scoring twice on his debut to earn a derby day win over Bristol City. Having started at Reading, he left the Madejski to sign for the Gills, but struggled to hold down a first team place. There is the possiblility that his loan switch could be converted into a permanent move.



How have the past twelve months been as a Swindon fan?
As a fan (and very minor shareholder!) I have been pleased with the steady progress made on and off the pitch despite the bitter disappointment of losing on penalties in the Play-Off semi-final.

Although we lost our first two games this season, the results have now improved and I think confidence is returning again throughout the Club and hopefully our attendances will increase again like last season.

Which of the summer signings are you most looking forward to seeing in action?

Jerel Ifil made a good impression in his previous loan spells with the Club and I am looking forward to him making a big difference to our defence this season.

On-loan Darius Henderson endeared himself to Town fans with an excellent brace on his debut which sealed a rare win at rivals Bristol City recently so I hope he'll be around for a while to help improve Town's goalscoring figures.

What are your expectations for the coming season?

I am expecting at least a top six place again and when Andy Nicholas is fit to play alongside the likes of Jerel Ifil and Sean O'Hanlon, I am expecting the goals against column to be lower than last season.

My attitude is that if you can prevent the opposition from scoring, you cannot lose the match! Off the pitch I hope that the Club can finally resolve the question of a new Stadium with help from Swindon Council.

Which team do you think poses the biggest threat in League One this year?

I was impressed by Port Vale last year who had a good second half of the season and no Town fan present at the away match last year will forget our recovery from 3-0 down to draw 3-3. I think Port Vale are capable of scoring lots of goals again this year and may pose the biggest threat this season.

What do you expect from Colchester United and what do you think this afternoon's result will be?

I am expecting a tough match against Colchester United who have made a good start to the season but I expect the result to be a narrow Swindon win by three goals to two - if we can score first!

OPPOSING WIEW

Although both Colche/ter United and Swindon Town will be looking to be challenging at the right end of the league table in 2004/5, the two teams both have plenty to look forward to in the Carling Cup.

As you will have no doubt read, Phil Parkinson's men will face West Brom in the Second Round of the competition and Swindon's draw is equally as good. For the second year in succession, Andy King's side will take on Leeds United and striker Sam Parkin is hoping that his side can go one step further than last year.

In the match against the then Premiership side, the Robins ran their opponents close, before goalkeeper Paul Robinson came up for a corner and scored an amazing header to send the Elland Road club side through to the next round.

Sam admits that that he and his team-mates were perhaps a little overawed on the day, but are going up ready to go this time around.

"We were playing a Premiership side in a Premiership stadium and I think we perhaps showed too much respect to their players," he admitted. "We did well, though, and it was only because of a great goal by their goalkeeper in the last minute that we didn't get anything more out of the game.

"It's great to draw them again - it will give the club a real financial boost and you have to say it's been a bit up and down since I've been here on the money side. Things like this will keep the directors happy!"

However, as the U's found last year with their fifteen cup outings, a run in one of the knock out competitions can perhaps distract a side from their goals of promotion.

During their flurry of matches in the FA Cup and the LDV Vans, the U's picked up just two points in the league. With that in mind, is the league a priority for Swindon?

The manager would definitely agree with that," Sam acknowledged. "Rushden gave us a chance to rest a few players because we'd already had four games and then we've get two on the Bank Holiday weekend.

"It's important for us to get off to a strong start in the league and we'll be concentrating on that, but the cups obviously do have those financial benefits."

That strong start in the league looked like it

might evade Andy King's men, after they lost their opening two fixtures against Wrexham and Swindon. However, they picked themselves up from their early setbacks and now find themselves in 11th place in the table after their next four fixtures.

23-year-old Parkin believes his side didn't get the rub of the green in those two matches, but have since come into their own, not least with the win over Bristol City in the West Country derby two weeks ago.

Morale boorter

And that 2-1 win proved to be a real morale booster for the Robins: "That game is probably the biggest one of the season for Swindon fans and it's a real confidence booster for the players. After the lows of the play-off exit last season, it

has picked us right up again and we will be looking to kick on from there," Sam confessed.

Goalscorer in the match against Bristol was Gillingham striker Darius Henderson, who had only signed on loan for the County Ground two days earlier. Having lost Tommy Mooney to Oxford United in the summer, Sam was glad to see the striking ranks bolstered as the season enters full swing.


"If we're going to be successful, it's important that we have three good strikers and with Darius here now, we have that. Hopefully we can keep him for a longer period, because he has already shown in the Bristol City game what he can offer us.

"Last year was a big season for me after my first year at Swindon and I got plenty of goals but I now have to do that again. We're going to need all of the strikers scoring regularly if we're going to achieve anything this year."

The former Chelsea forward knows that there is an apportunity there for Swindon to take the division by the scruff of the neck this year, but stresses that, like Hartlepool last year, someone unexpected could be right up at the top when the important games at the end of the season come around

He said: "It's definitely a more open division. Last season, QPR, Plymouth and Bristal City set the early pace and they were up there for most of the season. Colchester and Luton have started off brightly this year and I think there will probably be a surprise package like those two sides that will be up there as the season goes on.

"It's too early to tell just yet, but it's going to be very interesting to see how things develop!"

robins' dream team

Pootball historian LEIGH EDWARDS relects a port-war Swindon Town 'Dream Team' with the help of reveral Robins' supporters and club officials.

FRASER DIGBY: England U-21 goalkeeper who was a key figure in Swindon Town's 1992-93 First Division play-off final triumph. Signing professional for Manchester United in April 1985, he moved to Swindon in September 1986 and featured in that season's promotion success. He was ever-present in 1988-89, starring as they qualified for the play-offs in successive seasons and were Coca-Cola Cup semi-finalists in 1994-95. Also featuring in the 1995-96 Second Division title triumph, he had a testimonial in July 1997 and played 417 League games before joining Crystal Palace in August 1998, then played for Barry Town.

ROD THOMAS: Welsh international right-back who was capped 30 times while at Swindon Town. Initially with Gloucester City, he moved to the County Ground in July 1964 and was a key figure in Swindon's 1968-69 promotion and League Cup 'double' success. He also starred in their 1970 Anglo-Italian Cup final triumph and netted five goals in 296 League games prior to joining Derby County in November 1973. Featuring in their 1974-75 League Championship campaign, he moved to Cardiff City in November 1977 and subsequently had spells with Newport County and Gloucester again before becoming a publican.

JOHN TROLLOPE: Long-serving left-back who holds Swindon Town's appearance record. Signing professional at the County Ground in July 1960, he made his League debut in Swindon's 1-1 draw at home to Halifax Town a month later and was ever-present in seven consecutive seasons including the 1962-63 promotion success. He featured in Swindon's 1968-69 promotion and League Cup 'double' campaign as well as their 1970 Anglo-Italian Cup final triumph. Scoring 21 goals in 770 League games for Swindon, he was coach before managing them between November 1980 and March 1983, then their youth-team

GLENN HODDLE: Former England international midfielder who was player-manager as Swindon Town reached the Premiership in 1992-93. Signing professional for Tottenham Hotspur in April 1975, he starred as they won promotion in 1977-78, then won the FA Cup in two consecutive seasons and the UEFA Cup in 1984. He moved to Monaco in July 1987 and helped win the French title in

1987-88, becoming Swindon's player-boss in August 1991. Scoring once in 64 League games, he left to take charge of Chelsea after the 1992-93 First Division play-off final triumph and has since managed England, Southampton and Spurs.

COLIN CALDERWOOD: Commanding central defender who was capped 36 times by Scotland after leaving Swindon Town. Signing professional for Mansfield Town in March 1982, he moved to the County Ground in July 1985 and starred as Swindon won the Fourth Division title in 1985-86. He also helped to win promotion in 1986-87, then featured in two further play-off finals including the 1993 Wembley triumph. Scoring 20 times in 330 League games for Swindon, he moved to Tottenham Hotspur in July 1993 and subsequently played for Aston Villa and Nottingham Forest. He is now managing Northampton Town.

SHAUN TAYLOR: Influential central defender who was ever-present alongside Colin Calderwood as Swindon Town reached the Premiership in 1992-93. He impressed with Bideford before moving to Exeter City in December 1986 and starred in their 1989-90 Fourth Division title triumph. Joining Swindon in July 1991, he was the sole ever-present player in their 1993-94 Premiership compaign and also featured in the 1995-96 Second Division title triumph. He netted 30 goals in 212 League games while at the County Ground before moving to Bristol City in September 1996 where he has become development coach.

MIKE SUMMERBEE: Brilliant winger who was capped eight times by England after leaving Swindon Town. Initially with Cheltenham Town, he moved to the County Ground in March 1960 and was an important figure in Swindon's 1962-63 promotion success. He netted 39 goals in 218 League games prior to joining Manchester City in August 1965, amassing a vast collection of domestic and European honours under the Joe Mercer/Malcolm Allison partnership at Maine Road. Subsequently with Burnley, Blackpool and Stockport County, he is a successful businessman and his son Nicky also starred for Swindon Town.

ERNIE HUNT: England U-23 international striker who was Swindon Town's leading marksman in four successive seasons including their 1962-63 promotion triumph. Born locally, he signed professional at the County Ground in March 1960 and netted 82 goals in 214 League games for Swindon prior to joining Wolverhampton Wanderers in September 1965. He was top scorer as they regained top-flight status in 1966-67 and subsequently played for Everton, Coventry City, Doncaster Rovers and Bristol City, featuring in their 1973-74 FA Cup run. He ran the Full Pitcher pub in Ledbury and then became a window cleaner.



Glenn Hoddle - play-off success

PAUL RIDEOUT: England U-21 international striker who was Swindon Town's leading goalscorer in two consecutive seasons. He was Swindon's youngest League player at 16 years 107 days against Hull City in November 1980 and netted 38 goals in 95 League games while at the County Ground before joining Aston Villa in June 1983. Moving via Italian club Bari to Southampton in July 1988, he rejoined Swindon on loan in March 1991. He had spells with Notts County and Glasgow Rangers prior to joining Everton in August 1992 and was an FA Cup winner in 1995, then played for several clubs in China and Tranmere Rovers.

PETER NOBLE: Versatile favourite who was everpresent in Swindon Town's 1968-69 promotion and League Cup 'double' triumph. Initially with Consett, he joined Newcastle United in November 1964 and played top-flight football before moving to Swindon in January 1968. He scored twice in their 1970 Anglo-Italian Cup final success and netted 62 goals in 216 League outings prior to joining Burnley in June 1973. An FA Cup semifinalist in 1973-74, he was twice ever-present for the Clarets and leading marksman in 1978-79. He subsequently played for Blackpool and has since run a sportswear business in Burnley.

DON ROBERS: England U-23 international winger who scored twice in Swindon Town's 1969 League Cup final success. Signing professional at the County Ground in October 1962, he featured in Swindon's 1962-63 promotion campaign and was ever-present in four successive seasons. He starred as Swindon won promotion again in 1968-69 and the Anglo-Italian Cup in 1970, reuniting with Bert Head at Crystal Palace in November 1972. Moving to QPR in September 1974, he rejoined Swindon in March 1976 and netted 148 goals in 412 League games overall for the Robins. He has since run his own sports shop in Swindon.



If the stats are anything to go by, this afternoon's game is all about goals, goals and more goals. With that now having been said, it's probably going to end up a goalless draw!

However, Colchester come into today's encounter as the division's top goalscorers with fourteen, whilst Swindon's six games to date have totalled 22 goals, including two matches with five or more strikes hitting the back of the net!

It is somewhat appropriate that goals be the theme of the day after the U's transfer dealings this week. Wayne Andrews has departed for pastures new after a year of sterling service in the blue and white stripes and some memorable goals to boot.

Potency



The matches they played together saw the U's score 12 in seven games and Williams and Fagan scored seven of those. If that same ratio continues over the season, the U's fans will be more than happy!

This afternoon's visitors arrive with a striker that has had a similar impact during his own loan spell as Gareth has done when he has been here on a temporary basis. Darius



Henderson has scored four in three games since joining from Gillingham on loan and is expected to be a big threat once again alongside the prolific Sam Parkin.

Big

With two big target men up front, it's not surprising that the Robins score plenty from within close range after great play down the wings.

Some eight goals have come within the six yard area for Andy King's men and the U's

centre halves will no doubt be preparing for an ofternoon of heading the ball away and the full backs will be ready to stop the crosses getting into that area in the first place.

It should prove to be an interesting afternoon, not least around the half hour mark. The U's three goal flurry against Doncaster last Saturday takes it to five strikes in that period of the game, whilst Swindon have also scored three and conceded three in that same time period.





DEADUME DAY DRAMA

Colchester United fans had a big surprise when they woke up on Wednesday morning, with the news that Wayne Andrews had departed for Crystal Palace in a permanent move.

However, if their eyebrows were raised at that news, they would have virtually fallen off their heads when they saw that popular striker Gareth Williams had returned to Layer Road AND the U's had received a guaranteed six figure sum and future clauses if Wayno does well at Palace.

The full story unfolded on the club's website on Wednesday and here are the key points from the biggest transfer story at Layer Road since Lomana Tresor Lua's departure to Newcastle United...

TIMELINE OF THE MOVE ...

Following a number of negotiations between the U's and Crystal Palace during the summer, the sensational swap of Wayne Andrews and Gareth Williams finally came to a head on transfer deadline day.

Despite the move having been discussed for a while, it was eventually completed just fifteen minutes before the Premier League transfer window closed. Here, we outline the key points of the deal that saw the U's gain a new number eight:-

- 4.30pm After days of negotiations, a final offer from Crystal Palace is faxed to the U's prior to the Spm monetary deadline. With this in place, contractual details with the two players now needed to be fied up before midnight.
- 7.45pm Gareth Williams arrives at Layer Road, having been given permission by Crystal Palace to discuss contractual terms with the U's.
- 8.15pm In South London, Wayne Andrews drives into Crystal Palace's Selhurst Park ground to sort out his contract with the Premiership club.
- 10.30pm The U's finalise negotiations with regard to the contract to be given to Gareth Williams.
- 10.45pm Gareth Williams puts pen to paper on his new permanent contract with the U's. But the fun isn't over just yet...
- 11.15pm The transfer agreement for Gareth Williams is faxed to Crystal Palace, to be signed by the Chief Executives of both clubs.
- 11.30pm The transfer agreement to transfer Wayne Andrews registration to Palace is sent via fax to Selhurst Park.
- 11.45pm The transfer agreement, now signed by both clubs, is sent to the Premier League offices by Crystal Palace, just fifteen minutes before the midnight deadline.

Wednesday 10.00am Gareth visits Palace to sign his release forms and become a fully fledged U's player.

Parky pleased by Palace swap

With the Andrews/Williams swap deal happening late on Tuesday night, Colchester United's internet TV station U's World caught up with the Layer Road boss on Wednesday morning and this is what Parky had to say...

This transfer has been rumbling on behind the scenes for a while but what are your thoughts on completing the swap with Wayne Andrews and Gareth Williams?

Ever since the Dowies have moved to Crystal Palace, obviously their connection with Wayne at Oldham has meant that they have been very keen on him. Initially they wanted to do a straight swap with Gareth but we held out and we managed to get a very good fee and a quality striker as well.

It is a big step up for Wayne, how do you think he will fare in the Premiership?

They have got faith in him to do it for them, he has been excellent for us. He is a player who we got for nothing and we have sold him for a large profit. How well he will do I am not sure, he showed against Charlton in pre-season that he is capable of those moments of inspiration and I think Palace are thinking he could come off the bench and score the odd goal which might help them stay in the Premiership.

This transfer seems like a good deal for everyone involved on the face of it?

I am happy because if you stand in a player's way of going to the Premiership we would have been bringing Wayne Andrews back here when he doesn't want to be here. That would not have done the dressing room or the club any favours and now we have got Gareth Williams who is desperate to play for us.

Gareth really wants to be here, he really wants to score goals for us and he wants to keep us at the top end of the table so if you weigh up all of those things and the fee I think it is a good deal for us.

Gareth already has some history at Colchester United, having had two loan spells here. Is he a player you were looking to sign on a permanent basis anyway?

Oh yeah, Gareth scored a hat trick in my first game in charge. Not this summer but last summer we tried to sign him on a permanent basis and we nearly did get him back. He came on loan again at the back end of last season when he was a bit slow to get started because he had been out of first team football for so long.

He played little bits at Cambridge and Bournemouth last season but I don't really need to tell the supporters about Gareth. He is a natural goal scorer and I compare him with Jamie Cureton who was at Reading and is now at QPR. Gareth needs to work at other aspects of his game and I have told him in no uncertain terms that he is coming here to work. He's not coming here to train each day and put the ball in the back of the net, he has got to work on the other side of his game. He has got to improve his fitness and I expect him to roll up his sleeves and give it a good go and prove that Gareth Williams can be a player not only in this division but also the division above.

Gareth has struggled to get into the Crystal Palace team but this is chance to show what he can do isn't it?

If you look at Gareth's record he has got nine goals from 15 starts in his career and from what I have seen of him I don't think that ratio will diminish as time goes on because he is one of the best finishers I have seen. To keep getting into those positions he is going to have to work hard at other aspects of his game in terms of his fitness and his speed etcetera. But if the ball is in front of goal there are not many other players that you would




want to be on it than Gareth Williams because he is a top finisher and I think all teams need those sorts of players.

He is a natural goal scorer, he is a different kind of player to Wayne Andrews in terms of how he is going to get his chances. Gareth will get his chances through intelligent movement in the box, drifting off players' shoulders whereas Wayne Andrews was all about pure pace but I think overall, over the season, Gareth will score more goals.

He showed last season in brief glimpses that his partnership with Craig Fagan could be very effective?

That partnership was our best goal scoring spree of last season with two clever forwards. One thing that is important is that you don't want to lose the pace out of the team and while we have lost that with Wayne, we have got Craig who is very quick, Cadey is quick and Ben May is a strong runner who can get in behind. We've still got that pace up front but what we have also got is that natural goal scorer in Gareth Williams.

Board ready to back Parky's transfers

Following the club's dramatic transfer dealings late on Tuesday night, Chief Executive, Marie Partner, confirmed that the Colchester United Board will continue to make funds available to Parky, should he find a player to take the club forward.

After revealing the Wayne Andrews and Gareth Williams swap deal also involved a six-figure cash sum, the immediate question on many fans' lips was 'Will Parky get to spend the money?'

And Marie was quick to reassure supporters that Parky will be backed in the market, not least because of his previous record at bringing players in.

She told the club's official website, CU-FC.com: "Where the money's concerned you have to, as always, think of the business first. The business is that which goes on the pitch and, although there is never the promise of what money comes into the club via transfer fees will go straight back out again, the Board of Directors feel that they always have a priority to help produce a squad that can do the job.

"If the manager feels that there is a player there that will continue to take the club forward I don't think there would be any hesitation from the board that, if it's the right signing, money would be made available."

Substantial

So far in the transfer market, Parky's record has been quite impressive. Although the U's boss did not want to lose Andrews, securing a very substantial sum of money for a player he paid nothing for must be seen as good business.

Add to that the fact that he simultaneously secured the services of a striker who has represented his country at U21 level, with an impressive strike rate on loan with the U's then you would expect Parky to be smiling like the cat who got the cream.

That is not to mention his other notable successes in the transfer market. Craig Fagan, Kevin Watson, Liam Chilvers, Wayne Brown and Aidan Davison have all made impressive starts to the current campaign and cost Colchester United the grand sum of nil in transfer fees.

That record to date has boosted the Colchester manager's reputation at selecting the right players for the U's and has given him a stronger hand to continue to bring in fresh talent.

"There is an element of trust with Phil now," Marie admitted. "He doesn't just go into the market looking for the next player that will be available, he looks for players who can benefit Colchester in the long term, that is to say beyond this season.

"You have to therefore be sure that if you're going to pay money for a player, that value is going to be realised within that longer term period."

"We feel confident now that Phil has got a good network out there and knows what he is looking for. The board have the trust and faith in him after what he has done in the transfer market so far."

DEADUME DAY DRAMA

Wayno moves on

"It's like the first day of school all over again," Wayne Andrews told U's Review from Crystal Palace's training ground on Wednesday morning.

Less than ten hours after the deal between the U's and the Eagles was finalised, Wayne was arriving at his new Premiership workplace.

"Last night was a bit crazy," he admitted. "I got a phone call in the morning saying that the deal might happen but you never know until it is signed and sealed. It came out of the blue realty and I think sometimes it is better if transfers happen that way because you don't have time to dwell on what might or might not happen."

Rumours had surfaced not long after Iain Dowie took over the managerial reigns at Palace that Wayne could be swapped with former U's loanee Gareth Williams. Obviously Wayne knew Dowie well from his time at Oldham but did he have an inkling that he may be reunited with his previous boss?

"It had been spoken about but it was something out of my hands and I think the way I played at the beginning of this season showed that I was committed to Colchester whatever happened," Wayne insisted. "Some of the lads had been talking about it in the changing room so there was no point in me trying to pretend nothing was going on but you can't get carried away with these things."

"I left all of my boots at the training ground (at Colchester United) too so that shows just how little I knew about what was going on I would have taken some boots if I thought I wasn't going to be at Colchester this week and I have struggled to find some for training this morning!"

Impressive

After an impressive start to the season, the fast forward did not make the journey to Hartlepool over the Bank Holiday. But it had nothing to do with sorting out a move to his new club.

"Once I realised this move definitely was going to happen it completed what has been a great week for me all in all. I have got the full set now really, I've got a girl and a boy and I am very happy." Wayne said.

And, looking around his new top flight surroundings, the former Watford trainee could barely contain his excitement

"I am buzzing, it is better to be chasing than to be chased in many ways when it comes to getting into the first team. I know I am going to have a lot of work to get into the side at Crystal Palace but I am prepared to work hard in order to get my chance."

He continued: "It is going to take a while to settle in but I know Fitz Hall who is here from our time at Oldham and a couple of the other players but I am still a bit wary to be honest."

"Obviously I will be struggling a bit to get into the team at first but I will work hard and hopefully I will get a few games and be able to take it from there. I am 27 in November so I am getting towards my prime and feel this is the right time for me to make this step. Having spent three years out of League football in some ways I feel that I am 23 or 24 so I think I can go on from here."

With the two clubs involved finalising the transfer less than an hour before Tuesday's midnight deadline, Wayne had not told many of his team mates that he would not be around Layer Road anymore.

"None of the other players knew it was going ahead and I have only spoken to Craig (Fagan) and Bobby (Bowry) about it so far. I will speak to the other players when I get a chance but I thought it was only fair that I phoned Craig because I have been playing up front with him.

"I didn't want him to think I had left him in the lurch. He was pleased for me but also a bit shocked and I think he may have been concerned if I had gone to another. League One or a Championship team but I have gone straight to the top really.

"The main reason I phoned Bobby was to get direction to the training ground but I think he was happy for me because he is a bit of a Crystal Palace fan at heart."


Having scored 16 goals in just over a year at Layer Road, Wayne insists he will miss the friends he has made in Colchester, and he will keep good memories of his days playing in blue and white stripes.

"I have enjoyed it at Colchester a hell of a lot and it has been great the way the fans have related to me," he enthused. "It was hard when I initially came down from Oldham but the more time went on the more I enjoyed playing for Colchester and I am sad to leave but this is the start of another chapter in my life.

"It may have taken a while for things to get sorted out but it was important to get it right. I could have left for nothing in the summer but the club have been nice to me and I think the deal looks good on them."

Wayne also insisted that he is unlikely to be the last player demanding interest from a Premiership club from the current U's squad.

"If you look at the players there, I am not the only one who can make this sort of step up, there's Greg (Holford), Craig, Whitey (John White) when he plays in the team, who can all go on to play at a higher level and I think a lot of clubs might start watching them," Wayne suggested.

Back for good

Having spent two loan spells at layer Road in the past two seasons, Gareth Williams was delighted to secure a permanent deal with Colchester United this week.

The Wales U21 striker was looking forward to his next career move for a number of reasons, but most of all he was looking forward to reinstating his strike partnership with Craig Fagan.

"I am looking forward to playing in front of the Colchester supporters again, I'm looking forward to seeing the boys and I am particularly looking forward to playing up front with Craig Fagan again," Gareth said.

"I felt that we had a very good partnership even though we hadn't really trained together or played together before. The Notts County game is the one that springs to mind because we both scored goals and I am sure we can repeat that if we play up front together."

Gareth and Craig only played three matches together before a bizarre stomach strain forced the former Birmingham trainee out of the remainder of the season. But the U's scored nine goals in those three matches, Craig netting four and Gareth two. The 4-1 win over Notts County showed that Gareth's intelligent movement created a lot of space for Craig to exploit and the Welshman also reminded the Colchester faithful of his deadly finishing.

Relief

"I am just looking forward to coming and playing for Colchester because up until now I have not had much first team football, apart from a few loan spells," he told U's Review on Wednesday. "I was at Colchester until I Ipm last night and didn't get home till half past midnight so it was quite a relief to get the deal finalised in some ways.

"I definitely think I can score goals consistently for Colchester and I have every belief in my goal scoring ability. If I was to set myself a target, realistically I would be looking to score 15 goals from this point in the season, I think that is fair and anything over that would be a bonus. Obviously I have got a bit of catching up to do because Craig has already got four goals this season."

"It has been a bit frustrating at Palace but it has been the only club that I have known and I have not been in any other position than that so far. In my heart I was reluctant to leave in a lot of ways but my head was saying that it was the right thing to do."


While Gareth has moved away from the Premiership club for whom he made just one appearance last

season, the cool finisher has high ambitions for his time with Cokhester United.



The U's did not get their noses in front on Saturday, August 28, 1999, until the 88th minute against the big-money nomes of Reading, but it was to prove conclusive.



"I want to stay and get another contract. We have to stick together as a group of lads. I think we can make the play-offs this season," said a rather optimistic Aspinall.

10 YEARS AGO

It was as if a huge weight had been lifted from manager George Burley's shoulders when Tony Dennis nipped in to sweep home Colchester United's winner at Scarborough on Saturday, September 3, 1994.

Dennis' strike, which came after 70 minutes, left Burley beaming and saw the U's rise off the foot of the Football League table. A depressing run of six straight defeats, at the start of the season, had finally been ended.

Furthermore, a barren spell of 598 minutes without a goal was also ended, leaving Burley able to cherish his first victory since taking over the managerial reins at Layer Road.

Colchester did not play like a basement side. Trevor Putney dictated the midfield and Steve Whitton, despite a nasty head wound, led the front-line with cunning and determination. But it was the welcome return of Peter Cawley at the heart of defence, after injury, that did more than anything to turn the tide for the floundering U's.

The U's winner, which was only their second goal of the season, was set up by Putney, who fed Mark Kinsella on the right. Whitton exchanged a one-two with Steve Brown before unleashing a shot that keeper Gavin Kelly could only block, and Dennis was the first to react by stabbing the ball home from six yards out.

It was Dennis' first goal for the club since his arrival from Chesterfield during the close season.

Managerial Merry Go Round... Again!





For loonee Ben May, a number of factors have combined to see him line up alongside Craig Fagan in the U's starting eleven.

Firstly, when Phil Parkinson's quest to bring in a striker on a permanent deal hit a brick wall, Ben was called upon by a manager who had seen him work hard for the team during the final few games of a roller coaster 2002/3 season.

Then, having penned a two month loan deal at Layer Road, Ben has seen himself elevated into the first team after impressing in training and the U's loss of Wayne Andrews due to the birth of his second child at the end of last week.

The 20-year-old has sparkled in his appearances to date, culminating in two excellent ninety minute displays over the Bank Holiday weekend.

Ben had come off the bench on the first day of the season to play a part in all three goals against Sheffield Wednesday and repeated his feat against Doncaster Rovers last week as he played an instrumental part in two of the U's four strikes.

And his display at Hartlepool was even better. The big front man not only won the vast majority of his headers, but also showed superb footwork in and around the box to be the U's most creative player of the day as they fell to defeat up in the north east.

The Millwall loanee was pleased with how he has been performing and told the matchday magazine:
"I'm happy to have played the last couple of games because the more games you get under your belt, the better. I think I've been playing well and hopefully I will have done enough to keep my place for next Saturday."

Ben has now played twelve games in a U's shirt without notching but has hit the bar twice during that time as well as creating a number of opportunities at Victoria Park on Monday.

Although the front man is keen to break his duck before his loan spell is up, he was at pains to point out that his role in the team is not solely about hitting the back of the net. Eager to be a real team player, Ben is ready to keep working hard for the cause.

He continued: "I haven't actually scored a league goal for Colchester yet - I've only got the one against Charlton to my name so far. I have to keep working hard for the team and try my best to help get the best result that we can and, if I score, then it's a house.

Hard

"I was really disappointed not to score against Hartlepool as I felt I'd done really well in that match. I want to score goals for Colchester United - and I feel that perhaps I'm trying a bit too hard at the moment. Hopefully, when I get the first one, then they'll keep on comina."

Ben spent a season on loon at the U's divisional rivals Brentford last season and has clearly developed his game as a result of a prolonged spell at Griffin Park. The 2003/4 campaign may have largely been one of struggle for the Bees, but Ben admits that he learned a lot from the experience.

"I think I've matured a lot," he confessed.
"Confidence is higher and, as the number of appearances you've made continues to grow, you can only get better. Those games have taught me a lot on

how to hold the ball up and bring other people into play and, once I've got a few goals, I can then say my finishing has improved as well!"

It was just over a year between Ben's two spells here at Layer Road and during that time, the U's have changed dramatically, not only in terms of playing personnel, but also in the way that the club is run.

As someone who saw the early days of Parky's tenure at the club, Ben is well equipped to see how the U's have changed during that time.

"The club seems more professional now and they appear to be a club that wants to go places. The fans are really behind what is going on on the pitch and, under Phil Parkinson, things are only going to keep getting better," he soid.

And, as well as praise for his manager, Ben also had positive words to say for his strike partner, Craig Fagan. The duo played together for the matches against Doncaster and Hartlepool last week and quickly struck up an understanding.

Ben's height compliments the guile that Craig shows on the ball and the U's number twenty admits that he enjoys playing alongside the former Birmingham City striker.


"Craig's a natural forward, a natural finisher. He's probably the best forward I've worked with so far," Ben acknowledged.







Although Robbie and Jamie did not get on the bench on Monday it was good to know that George Elokobi and Garry Richards were substitutes. Having second and third year boys make up the squad is fantastic for the club and should act as an extra incentive for the rest of the boys.

As I have told you before, Craig Johnston is currently on loan at Halstead Town for a month. I have seen Craig play for Holstead a couple of times and he has done very well. Hopefully Craig can benefit from playing men's football week-in, week-out and use it as a springboard to pushing for a first team place here. I am sure there will be other appartunities for more of our young players to go out on loan as this season progresses.

Those of you who were here last weekend will have seen John White make his full debut against Doncaster Rovers. We have spoken about our young players being able to show that they can adapt to play in different positions and John illustrated that very well. He can play at full back, centre back or in midfield, and that can be said of a lot of our youngsters coming through. Versatility is very important in lootball and shows our players are able to dip their biscuit - now that's saved me a tenner this week!

Our pre-reason has now concluded and we're getting ready as I write this for our first set of fixtures this weekend.

Our build up to the new campaign has included a number of training sessions and match play, where we have taken on the likes of West Ham and Ipswich Town.

Looking back at what we've done to prepare the lads, I don't know whether we might change things next year. The teams that we played were nearer match fitness and so perhaps next year, we might do more training before we get into the friendly match programme.

Because the lads are all school boys - several of them are still under 15 years old at the moment - it is trying to get the balance right. The conditioning side of things is important and some of them are still going through their growth spurts, so we have to be careful.

The games we have played have been a great opportunity to line ourselves up against the Academy sides, which is something we don't always get the chance to do in the regular season.

At the early ages, the younger players are probably better at the bigger clubs than here, as you might expect. But, as you go through the age groups, we've found that we're able to compete with the things that we do to develop the lads and, in fact, you would be hard pressed to tell which is the Centre of Excellence side and which is the Academy team.

We have had some great results at Ipswich, West Ham and Norwich and so it balances itself out. I have had players come in from these sorts of teams when they have been released at U15s level and they're not as good as those that we have.

The longer the lads are with us in the system, the more they develop and the more they know what we're looking for. And, with players coming out of the older age groups and into the youth team, the system is certainly bearing fruit.

With the first team having had two games in three days over the weekend, the majority of the U's older players were rested for the trip to Milton Keynes Dons.

However, it was two of the U's professionals that shone in the game at the National Hockey Stadium as the visitors ran out 1-0.

The game was one that was not plentiful in terms of chances, but Brian was pleased with how the U's performed on the night against very competitive opposition.

"This was a very good team performance and that was something the manager was very pleased with," he admitted. "It was an excellent defensive display and Garry Richards was probably the man of the match at centre half - he was outstanding.

"We had to soak up a lot of pressure, but Garry and the rest of the defenders did their jobs very well and kept the home team at bay."

With a number of first team injuries at the moment, the time is ripe for the fringe players to make impressions in games such as these and Brian was pleased with how the U's younger players staked their claim against the Dons.


"When you consider this was a very young side, they acquitted themselves very well. The younger lads have been given their chance in recent matches and they need to remain ready if called upon."

FREE-KICK TRICKED SWINDON

MOVE USED BY BEN FENTON AT THE VALLEY US 5 SWINDON TOWN 0

FROM THE COLCHESTER GAZETTE, TUESDAY MARCH 6, 1956

A SURPRISE free-kick move, which Benny Fenton used at times when he captained Charlton, on Saturday produced one of the smartest goals seen at Layer Road this season. No sooner had he slipped the ball forward into the penalty area than Bob Dale came racing from behind him at full speed to slam it into the net.

This piece of strategy worked like a charm. Fenton's pass was beautifully judged and the Swindon defence were taken completely by surprise as Dale ran on to it. Fast, open football, with Fenton and Dale exploiting to the full the speed of Grice and Wright on the wings and Plant giving his third three-goal display of the season, enabled the U's to register their biggest win this League campaign.

Boosted

They also put their 'goals for' total ahead of those scored against them. Plant has now boosted his personal bag of goals for the League side to 15, although he was playing for the reserves in the early part of the season.

McCurley, who heads the United's goalscorers with 22, did not have a good match against Hudson, Swindon's big centre-half. No player, however, can be on top form all the time and the United centre-forward has led the

attack in dashing style this season.

Dale's goal - his second in successive matches - came in the 20th minute and was only one of three that resulted from free-kicks. The first was in the 12th minute and on this occasion Plant scored with a hook shot after Fenton had slipped the ball forward.

Left-back Fisher is not likely to forget his first goal for the Colchester club - or the crowd his reaction to it. Taking a free-kick from about 35 yards range just before half-time, he obviously had no thoughts of putting himself on the scoresheet. But goalkeeper Sam Burton lost sight of the ball for a split second as Plant went down to try to head it.

Amazed

The inside-left missed and when Burton dived he was nowhere near enough to prevent the ball entering the net. Fisher was so amazed that he turned his back on the goal, got down on his knees and paid homage to the soccer gods.

Although Swindon were well and truly licked in this match - sweet revenge for the 3-1 defeat at the County Ground earlier in the season - they showed some neat approach play. The Town also tried hard to beat a United defence which forced them to shoot from outside the penalty area and

Percy Ames made two saves which rank with the best seen at Layer Road this season.

In the 40th minute he leapt across the goal to bring off a great onehanded save from Andy Micklewright. And in the 50th minute he clutched cleanly, in the middle of a dive, a fast shot from Bob Edwards.

But the hardest shot of the match came in the 33rd minute when Fenton hit the ball on the half-volley and it crashed against the near post. This was a full blooded effort which Burton never saw and which made the spectators shout with surprise at its speed and power.

Wide

Miss of the match arrived in the 24th minute when Edwards, Swindon's inside-left, was clean through with only Ames to beat. The goalkeeper advanced to try and narrow the angle and Edwards drove the ball just wide of the far post.

Grice and Fox were injured in a collision in the first half and had to go off with facial injuries. Both resumed, Grice with stitches in a gashed cheek. But his play certainly did not suffer and time and again he left Fox floundering hopelessly by speed and feinting.

Goals just had to come from the




right-winger's pulled back crosses. Rightback George Hunt made the mistake of delaying clearing in front of goal in the 84th minute and Plant pounced on the ball to score. Two minutes from the end he added number five from a Dale through pass.

Both Fenton and Dale were outstanding in this match. Not only were they strong in defence, but they were quick to back up their colleagues in front with a good service of the ball. This wing-half strength, plus the speed of Grice and Wright on the wings, opened up the Swindon defence.


The United's attack plan worked to perfection with Plant increasingly in the goal-getting picture and he is seizing his chances smartly.

GOAL MACHINE!

After his goal flourish at the end of last reason, Colchester United supporters would not have been surprised to see Craig Fagan start the new campaign in goalscoring form in the U's early games.

A few more eyebrows might have been raised if, after the final home game of 2003/4 against Rushden & Diamonds, you'd have predicted that one of the goalscorers that day, Gavin Johnson, would be equally prolific in the first month of the new season.

And the 33-year-old midfielder admits that his potency in front of goal has been a pleasant surprise and that he is eager to keep hitting the back of the net as the season develops.

A run of three in three games has got the winger off to a flying start and he told the matchday magazine: "Yeah, things have been going really well.

"I've had a bit of a problem with my back, which is now getting better. It had been causing me a few problems but I'm over the worst of it and I think my performance picked up on Saturday against Doncaster. Hopefully, that will continue. "I had a scoring run like this quite a few years agowell over ten years probably - when I scored four goals in four games, but this is something a bit different for me. I had quite a few chances at the end of last season, which I didn't put away. I got one at the end against Rushden but, in truth, I should have had three or four more.

"This season, it's been much better, chances have landed at my feet and I've managed to put them away."

Last season saw the goalscoring burden shouldered by four players as Scott McGleish, Craig Fagan, Rowan Vine and Wayne Andrews all hit double figures in what was a memorable season.

However, it took until February and Greg Halford's goal against Hartlepool United that a defender added to the 'Goals For' tally. This season has been somewhat different with Halford one of a number of players behind the front two getting on the scoresheet.

As a result, the U's are amongst the top scorers in League One - and the Football League as a whole - and Gavin agrees that that could be the factor that lifts the Layer Road club from their mid-table position last year to a play-off spot or more this time around.

"The team are creating plenty of chances and, whilst the forwards are scoring goals, there are opportunities all around with Joe Keith getting a couple, Greg Halford and Sam Stockley also getting on the scoresheet," he "We had three or four players scoring goals last year and we need the guarantee of three again this year if we are to keep pushing up the league this season. Goals have got to come from midfields and forwards if we're then going to take that extra leap."

With the summer departures of Scott McGleish, Alan White and Simon Brown, Gavin stands alongside Karl Duguid and Joe Keith as one of the longest serving members of the current Colchester United squad.

He admits that there has been something of a dramatic turn around in fortunes and, under Phil Parkinson's tutelage, the U's are now real contenders to be involved at the right end of the League One table.

"Things have turned around in a big way," Gavin admitted. "Steve Whitton did a superb job keeping Colchester in the Second Division, and then the new manager has stepped it up another level.

"The whole set up is more professional now and the club is moving forward."

The fact that the U's are up at the right end of the table is positive news enough, but that they have done it without the likes of Karl Duguid, Kem Izzet and Bob Bowry is a real credit to those who have been involved.

Without their more experienced players they have picked up some good results both at home and on the road. And whilst Gavin admits that the squad will benefit from their senior players being back in contention, there is no guarantee that they will walk straight back into the team.

He said: "We are a very young squad at the manual A number of the senior players are out with injury and whilst it's good to have youth in your side, you do not to have that experience as well.

"They'd be pushing for places, but you can't say whether they'd be playing or not as the team has don well in pre-season and the early games. Obviously, they'd be hoping to be in the team, but whilst people have got the shirts on, they have the advantage and they need to keep doing the right things."


With the hast of injuries in the U's midfield, Gavin was switched to a central midfield role for the trip to Hartlepool on Bank Holiday Monday. Chances are he'll return to his left wing role in the longer term, though, and it's a position that he has relished in his time out wide.


"I'm enjoying it out on the left wing," he confessed.
"Sam and I have a bit of an understanding developing between us now and he does a lot of the work down the flank which lets me come inside and get on the ball.

"Working on that partnership does take time - it started to work at the end of last season and, after the summer break, we had to start again. But, with a lot of talking and a bit of understanding a partnership goes a long way."

So, as he nestles in amongst the top scorers in the U's squad, is Gavin aiming for any particular number of goals?

"I'm not setting myself any targets. I didn't think I'd have three after live or six games - but hopefully I'll get a few more!" he said.

in the box that the U's luck looked to change, debutante Kirsty Cammell bravely stepped up to convert, only to see her blasted penalty saved.





What war your first reaction when you were given a scholarship?


Well I was delighted really, you know when it come through the door yeah!


The brand new "Colchester Schools Football
League" will be kicking off in the new school term as
part of the already highly successful "Primary Schools
Coaching And Education Programme" run by the
Community Sports Trust in over 60 participating

schools in Colchester and the surrounding districts.

As a leading provider of "Education Through Sport" in Essex, the new league was the brainchild of the Sean Hillier, who is the Schools Liaison and Development Officer at the Trust.

Startling

He explained how the league came about after some startling statistics were revealed following a monitoring exercise: "Over the last few years, we had noticed a major decline in participation levels in competitive football by pupils in the Colchester Borough Schools.

"After I had conducted some research, it became obvious that schools were actually really interested in addressing this issue and setting up a proper league for the children play in."

The Community Sports Trust are already running a flourishing Coaching and Education programme in primary schools delivering 100 sessions every week, where the children benefit from professional coaching in football and other sports during their usual curriculum time P.E. lessons, and it was from here that the idea of a competitive schools league first raised some interest.

Pantartic

Sean continued: "We had such a fantastic response to the survey that there are now 22 schools who want to be involved and with the Sports Trust as the organising body, we are able to set up an independent partnership and obtain the appropriate





funding to run the league."

The league is set to commence in September and has been split into four mini leagues containing mixed teams of boys and girls, with the F.A. Mini Soccer Centre in Clairmont Road, Colchester as the designated central venue for all of the matches which will take place on pre-set dates once each month.

Encouraged

Schools across the country are actively encouraged to increase the number of Physical Education Lessons within their Curriculum as part of the Government's "Schools Boards Coordinator Programme", and this new league will help to build upon the Sports Trust's existing programme and enhance the sporting opportunities available to pupils in primary school education.

Sean added: "We are really looking forward to the first games and we will publish all the results on our website, so that the pupils can see how they are doing."

However, Sean urged that although the league is due to start, it is not too late to take part, adding: "We can still accommodate more schools, it is simply a matter of deciding upon the best day for your whool to take part and we will do the rest for you."

Brian's adventures in football

As Brian Owen looks back over his several decades in faatball, today we focus on his time with the England set-up

Brian was involved in coaching our national team at various levels and he also reveals that his first meeting with today's visiting manages Andy King was during an England coaching

It has been impossible to miss some of the negative press surrounding current England manager Sven Goran Erikson recently and I must admit that my meeting with Sven many years ago did not do too much for my marital re at the time

Sven's first coaching job was as manager of a team called Degerfors who were then in the Swedish third division. I had been asked to ga out to Scandinavia to be his guest coach but, as it happened, I was offered a post coaching with the England B squad, who were heading out to the Far East and it was an opportunity I could not turn down.

Obviously, at that time, I never expected Sven would become England manager all these years later. He had been to college with Anders Nyberg, a Swedish coach who was a friend of mine, and a few years later, when he was in charge of IFK Gothenburg he came over to watch

a lot of Ipswich Town games and I met up with him again at Portman Road.

Sven was always very studious in his approach to football and often came over to England to watch Liverpool and Ipswich as well as watching Hamburg in Germany. It was on these trips to the UK that I re-acquainted myself with him and, having seen him at Ipswich, I invited him for a meal at my house.

He stayed at the Copdock Hotel so I went over there to pick him up and we quickly got chatting about football. Anyone who knows me will know that this is something that I am very good at and it didn't seem like Sven and I had been talking for long when I realised we were two hours late for the meal my wife, Carol, was cooking.

She had been expecting us for a long time and to say she was not too happy when we arrived home two hours late to a burnt dinner is something of an understatement. I think Carol was more upset with the meal than Sven but he has never been to our house for dinner since.

Sven didn't give me any tips on style when I met him but I did end up wearing a Swedish hat in the 1970s. The photo on this page is of me with England B at the Olympic Stadium in Munich. I am wearing an ice hockey hat given to me by the manager of Leksand Ice Hockey Club. I wore that hat all the time and took a lot of stick for it as you can imagine. You could only get oway with wearing something like that in the 70s and 1 must admit 1 don't have it anymore.

Coaching with England was a great experience for me though and it was something I was involved with for around 18 years in total from the early 1970s. I had just started the job when I came to Colchester United as a player and the first game England played after we had beaten Leeds in the FA Cup in 1971 was out in

Danny Lydon had refereed that Leeds match and by coincidence he flew out with us as an official for the international. On the plane I spoke to Danny and he told me that he physically had to pinch himself when the U's had gone 3-0 up because he just couldn't believe it!

My initial duties with the England B squad were coaching and physio work. I had experienced a few injury problems towards the end of my time at Watford, I had done my coaching badges and a treatment of injuries course at Lilleshall so I suppose it was handy for the FA to have someone with a dual role. Ken Firth, my manager at Watford, probably put my


name forward for the job but it came out of the blue when I received a letter asking me to work for England and I was delighted.

In 1972 I was writing a book with Nigel Clark who was at the Daily Mirror then. Nigel had Joined our training camp out in Spain where we were playing a tournament. He was typing the first chapter out by the side of the pool with me and just as we finished an unexpected gust of wind picked all the paper up and dumped it in the pool much to all the lads' amusement.

I was just 26 when I started working with England and I came off the staff in the 1982/83 season, having been involved with the youth side, U18s, U21s, and the 'B' squad. Alf Ramsey was the England manager when I first started, and I went on to work under Don Revie, Ron Greenwood and Bobby Robson. I also know all the managers of the national team since then including Terry Venables, Graham Taylor and Glenn Hoddle, who I coached from U16 level through to the U21s.

It was physio with the England U21s when I first came into contact with Andy King, who played in the team at the time. He was a very skilful player and a cheeky chappy around the changing room. Of course I have been bumping into Andy for a few years now and we often see each other at games and have a chat. Let's just hope he's not too cheerful after this afternoon's game! All the best

PLAYING AWAY...

...with reev tovey

Bill Shankly once said something along the lines of football not just being a matter of life and death, but something more important.

While this appears true of all those professionals in the game, with the exception of Kieron Dyer who can only be called professional in that he gets paid for playing football, for us supporters that simply can't always be the case.

I Don't like Monday....

Nor should we be expected to be any other way, and Hartlepool away on a Bank Holiday Monday was just a couple of hundred of miles and a public holiday too far in my case. Whoever comes up with the fixture list had obviously indulged in one too many complimentary caffeine-filled soft drinks from a certain sponsor when they devised that one...

I don't really understand why we have a full league programme on Bank Holiday anyway. It's as if we are expected to give up every spare day in our calendar for our beloved game.

Well, I'm sorry Mr Mowhinney, Choirmon of the Football League, who sent me and millions of others a lovely email explaining why the "Championship" had been re-branded (the original engraving on the Division One trophy apparently, not a cheap marketing stunt, honest), but it's too much to ask for us all to turn out twice in one weekend.

In Mr Mawhinney's email he states: "The supporters are central to these plans. Last season 16m supporters attended League games; the most for 40 years. We

are looking to build on this to attract 21m supporters to League games by 2010. To achieve this goal we as a League must ensure that the next generation of football supporters follow their local club."

If the Football League is looking to increase gates by six million attendees, all I'm saying is, the calendar needs to be a bit more supporter friendly, and without a five hour away trip on a Bank Holiday.

No-one ate all the pies ...

As I've said, I'm of the opinion there shouldn't be a full league programme on Bank Holidays. I just don't think there's any need for it, when you come down to it... OK, on one hand, you can argue a captive audience, I mean, most of the country's work force is on leave, and what better to do than head down the footie, yeah? Also, it's tradition!

As long as there have been chicken balti pies on sale in football grounds, there have been full programmes on Bank Holidays. And you can't mess with tradition, right?

For me, my main beef with using public holidays for football is part laziness, and part my own preference for using these extra days for going out, doing something different, even if that means family stuff. I mean, there aren't actually that many days all in where people can get together.

At the weekends, there's the U's on a Saturday, Premiership (and in my case, Sunday League) football on Sundays, and enough midweek games to keep you going, and your calendar busy, so why is it you can be left to miss out on seeing your team because you make the selfish choice to actually do something other than football on a public holiday.

And if Mr Mawhinney and his cohorts are looking to boost attendances, they are going to have to look at how the fixtures are laid out (If you give a hoot, if it were down to me, I'd go for five leagues of 18, with the bottom two regionalized as for as possible, and reduce the fixtures while increasing the competitiveness of the leagues as each game means a little more - 46 games is way too much)

Down with the Wednerday

Colchester's match against Hartlepool attracted 800 spectators less than the previous match at Victoria Park, and over 1,500 less than the match before that. Now, that could just be Colchester's not so massive fan base not filling up the away end due to a long distance haul, but reduced attendances on Bank Holidays is a common theme.

While Parky's old boys Reading played on Tuesday night and drew an average 15,000 attendance, in League Two 'the gaffer's' other previous side, Bury, were 12% down on previous gates this season, while the U's first away opponents of the season Sheffield

Wednesday were down a fifth on their previous home match. Simply, on public holidays, there are other things to do.

However, the Premiership, admittedly with one eye on this weekends' England games, offered only two matches, one of which featured Portsmouth and Fulham, teams that hadn't played on the previous Saturday, while Manchester United's goal-less draw with Everton was a rearranged fixture following United's Champions League qualifier against Bucharest the following week... and it's not as if either team or their supporters actually had to travel far.

Wayne Rooney didn't even bother going back.

Added to the dip in people actually attending games is the physical impact on the players, having to travel and play within forty-eight hours of their normal Saturday fully competitive match, and a break from the usual training routine. Even with a Tuesday game there is time for a rest day and an assessment of injuries, before the preparations for the following game.

The effects for Colchester were the absence of Kevin Watson for the trip to the North-East, and in a thin squad also missing Bob Bowry and Kem Izzet, it was to prove a big loss.

Opinions are like...

I'm sure you'll all have your opinions on this, but mine is, and always has been, this sport that we give so much time, dedication, money and love to can give a bit back every now and then and not demand so much from it's supporters.

I already willingly and enthusiastically give a large amount of myself to football, and in accordance with Mr Mawhinney's wishes I already support my local team, I'd even have followed them to Hartlepool if it hadn't been on Monday. Just let me have my holidays, my days off, without being expected to miss out on seeing my team if I actually chose to do something on a day off work.

Bank Holidays are few and closely packed in over the Summer, and with 31st August being the last real day of the summer, (and it was sunny!) the Football League should consider whether it really is worth putting on a full league programme two days after the last round of matches, when the impact all round and on attendances is obvious.

And don't even get me started on the Christmas/New Year break idea.

Quite why we play three matches in five days while the country is on holiday, why players are forced to train on Christmas Day and supporters expected to travel around the country on Baxing Day (ok, it's alright when we're at home, but Boxing Day is for sitting in front of the TV complaining about the pap on the box)...[rant til fade...]

WHAT IS THE GROUND LIKE?

Anyone who visited the old Dean Court will not recognise the completely re-developed ground. In a matter of months the old ground was completely demolished and a new stadium built. This currently comprises three new stands, which are of roughly the same design and height and are quite smart looking, with the Main Stand having a row of executive boxes to its rear.

Each is a covered single tiered stand, with good views of the playing action, with perspex wind shields at each side. The stand roofs have perspex panels, helping get more light to the pitch. They sit at each side of the pitch and at one end, which means that the South End of the ground is open.

WHERE WILL THE U'S PANS BE SITTING? Away fans are located on one side of the East Stand, at one side of the pitch. The normal allocation for this area is 1,500 fans, but this can be increased to 2,000 if required.

The stand is shared with home supporters, offers a good view of the playing action and generates a good atmosphere. The facilities are okay and beer is served on the concourse as well as such delights as the delicious 'Football's Famous Chicken Balti Pie'.

FANCY A PRE-MATCH PINT?

There is a bar behind the Main Stand, called the Cherry Tree, but this is for home supporters only.

There is one pub by the dual carriageway. called the Queens Park, that is popular with both home and away fans. The pub shows SKY Sports and serves Ringwood real ale.

To find this pub, simply walk away from the ground, on the road going from the main entrance to the stadium. At the end of the road turn left and the pub is a little way up on the left.

HOW TO GET THERE BY CAR:

Follow the A338 towards Bournemouth. The ground is situated on the left of the A338 in the outskirts of Bournemouth. If you keep looking up to the left as you go into Bournemouth you will eventually see the tops of the ground

At this point take the next exit off the A338 and turn left towards the ground. There is a large car park located at the ground. Alternatively, there is a council run car park, on the opposite side of the dual carriageway, which is handy for getting away quickly after the

HOW TO GET THERE BY TRAIN:

The nearest train station is Pokesdown which is roughly a mile from the ground and is around a 15 minute walk away. However, most trains arrive at Bournemouth Central, which is around

a half an hour walk to the ground. Either try to get a train to Pokesdown or grab a cab (£7-£8).

If you do arrive at Pokesdown Station (which is served by trains from London Waterloo), then exit the station (there is only one exit) and turn right down the main Christchurch Road (A35). Proceed for about 400 metres and then turn right into Gloucester Road. Dean Court is located down the bottom of this road.

If you arrive at Bournemouth Central, then leave the station by the South exit, thereby facing an Asda Supermarket. Turn left and walk down to the main Holdenhurst Road. Turn left (going away from the town centre) and then keep straight on along Holdenhurst Road for around 25 minutes, reaching the Queens Park

Continue straight on past the pub until you reach a roundabout at which you turn right into Kings Park Drive. The ground is down the bottom of this road on the left. Alternatively you can catch a Yellow Number 33 bus to the ground, normally a half hourly service.





Stuart Murdoch - dissatisfied with start

life for the newly named Donz har been less from easy in the newly named Coca Cola league One.

Formerly known as Wimbledon of course, the club's move to Milton Keynes has been a difficult one, as the club has endeavoured to secure a new supporter base in a new hometown while being relegated from Division One last season and having to deal with the constraints of administration.

Escaping relegation from Division One would have required something near a miracle for Stuart Murdoch's side last season, with so many young, inexperienced players having such a large deficit to make up in terms of points halfway through the season.

And while there are some impressive young prospects at the club, transfer targets were difficult to secure during the summer with the club still in administration. Some of the pressure may have eased when the club emerged from that period with a new name but early results in League One soon made life difficult again.

Having drawn their opening match of the season against Barnsley, the Dons went on to record four straight defeats in the League, conceding three goals on three of those outings (at Port Vale, Oldham, and against Bournemouth).

Future

This string of results saw manager,
Murdoch publicly questioning his future with
the club. "I'm disappointed with the way
things are going - and if I find I cannot
motivate a team, maybe I am better off
walking away from it," he said.

"There are important moments in games and we are not capitalising on them. We go 1-0 down in every game so we have got no confidence. It is not a question of bringing people in to strengthen - I do not think one

player can wave a magic wand. It is a question of people doing their jobs properly.

"It's very difficult to name a player who is playing to their ability level at the moment. Perhaps they need a new manager," Murdoch conceded.

Impressive

But the Dons responded to that statement of dissatisfaction in impressive style with a 3-0 Carling Cup first round victory over Barry Fry's Peterborough United. And that was followed by a first League win of the season against fellow slow starters Torquay United on Bank Holiday Monday.

Jason Puncheon's first half strike was enough to give the Dons a 1-0 win and the Milton Keynes based team could have extended their lead on several occasions at the National Hockey Stadium.

However, that result still left Murdoch's men with just four points from their opening six matches, and in the bottom three of what has already proved to be a very competitive division. It looks like MK Dons could be in with a very tough battle on their hands in their first season in League One.


