



We left it late in our last home game against Blackpool but I thought we deserved the victory. It was important to get something from the game as the visitors always looked dangerous on the break. It was a question of getting the first goal but as the game went on with no goal scored it got frustrating. It also gave Blackpool some impetus to go forward and try and nick a winner in a very open game. It was a toss of the coin who we brought off and who we brought on to change things. We didn't want to bring Tcham N?Toya off but I felt we needed fresh legs and it was a toss up between Caleb Folan and Mark Stallard.

We plumped for Caleb. He went on and was excellent and he could have got a hat-trick in the time he was on the pitch with his pace and strength. He came on at Bradford earlier in the season and won the game for us. He did the same against Blackpool by gambling in the box right at the death. The Chief had said if the keeper comes for it and doesn?t get it we could pick up the pieces. This time perhaps the Chief could have put it away but thankfully Caleb, like a good striker, followed the ball and tucked it away for three points. I felt a little sad for Blackpool manager Colin Hendry. We put them under a lot of pressure and ran them ragged at times but they worked very hard and the timing of the goal will be disappointing for him. I can understand that as I have been in that situation many times myself. As they say, that?s football.


We were very disappointed to go out at the first round stage of the FA Cup, again. It wasn't the best cup draw, because it was away from home, and that's our seventh cup tie on the trot, I think. Whilst we are undefeated at home, and we've proved what we can do at Saltergate, the results have not gone for us away, even though their have been some good performances. At Scunthorpe United it was a different story. The second half performance was passionless, and perhaps even clueless. We gave the supporters nothing to cheer about. We gave them a first half performance to offer hope that we might have got back into the game but we didn't do that because we didn't use the ball or take those chances. And in the second half we gave them nothing.

We talked about the Scunthorpe performance all the following week and the lads came up with perfect answer Bournemouth. A hard earned point, which we had to work for. The Cherries made us defend and in the last twenty minutes they worked the ball well and stretched the play but we defended tremendously well as a team. Muggs had been feeling a slight groin injury all week but we had nursed him along and he had got through that okay. In the warm up he felt his groin when kicking and, to be fair to him, he came in and said that he would play but I took responsibility and put Andy Richmond in goal. What this seemed to do was gel the team a little bit. They helped Andy out tremendously, blocking shots and crosses throughout the game and Andy did well when called upon. The players showed their true colours throughout the game. It was a collective thing as we had to get together and play with passion, unlike the previous week at Scunthorpe.

It was also Jamai's last game of his three-month loan spell with the club. After the Bournemouth game Jamai returned to Charlton to assess his own future down there. We are keeping in touch as he's made great friends with the players and supporters alike.

A massive thank you to the Chairman and the Board for backing Rico and myself in being able to extend the loans of Sammy Clingan and Mark Stallard for the full three months. I know things are tight financially so I hope that one or two of the business people will continue to chip in and help when these situations arise. The fact that the club has been able to support us in this helps makes the squad stronger, as well as provides cover. We had a few players pick up knocks but the fact that we have these loan players available also improves the overall competitiveness and quality of the squad.

COCA-COLA UPDATE WITH OLLIE PARDO

We welcome Swindon town to Saltergate this afternoon on the back of two convincing home wins for the Robins. Two weeks ago they slung Sheffield Wednesday out of the FA Cup, scoring four goals in the process, and last Saturday brought another four goals, this time against promotion hopefuls Hull City. 6348 watched what must have been a most entertaining game, with four of the goals in the last 15 minutes, and two of those, one for each side in the 90th minute. That result pushed Swindon up into seventh place whilst Hull city remained in third place.

Luton Town overcame there recent blip in form, to add to the woes of Milton Keynes Dons by hammering the team, formerly known as Wimbledon, by 4-1 at the National Hockey Stadium. It was a result that gave the Hatters a 6 point lead at the top whilst managerless Milton Keynes remain second from bottom.

Talking of Wimbledon, AFC Wimbledon, the re-incarnated Dons now playing in the Ryman League have set up a British record for undefeated League matches stretching back over two years. The Dons, of course lead their division, and one can only wonder how long it will be before AFC Wimbledon meet Milton Keynes in a League fixture. My estimation is about three years and it will be in the Conference South!

Despite the disappointment of the FA Cup exit at Scunthorpe the Spireites will be pleased to have taken a point from AFC Bournemouth at Dean Court, traditionally not a happy hunting ground for Chesterfield. The draw left us in ninth spot, one point behind Swindon and Brentford, who lost 1-2 to Bradford City at Griffin Park. The Blues need to use that cup exit in a positive way, and really put that cliché of 'concentrating on the League' into action! Tranmere's 1-0 win over Blackpool at Bloomfield Road kept them in second place, whilst the Tangerines continue to struggle. Luke Beckett's departure to Sheffield United won't help Stockport County's battle to stay in our division. They remain firmly rooted to the bottom with just 10 points whilst two places above them, Peterborough United have 17 points after last Saturday's 1-2 defeat at Walsall. Torquay, Barnsley and Oldham are the other sides in difficulty at the bottom; with the Latics triumphing 3-2 over the Reds at Boundary Park last Saturday. Torquay managed a surprising 2-I win over Port Vale at Vale Park, and the Valiants slipped a bit further down the ladder.

There are relegation battles at Oakwell today where Barnsley entertain Blackpool, and Edgeley Park, Stockport where Walsall are the visitors. High flyers Hull and Brentford meet at the KC Stadium, Luton meet Doncaster at Kenilworth Road and it's top v bottom when Tranmere Rovers take on MK Dons at Prenton Park!










THE STORY OF THE **PFA AWARDS**

1979: LIAM BRADY



to beat his man?

Originally spotted as a schoolboy by an Arsenal scout at the start of the Seventies, the Dublin-born Brady was offered a Highbury apprenticeship in 1971. "It was a great place to learn my trade," he recalled. "Arsenal had just done the Double and were the team of the moment "

He made his Gunners debut as a substitute in a 2-0 defeat by Spurs in October 1973 and scored his first Gunners goal against QPR in the last game of the i72-73 campaign. "Alan Ball had joined by then and several of the double-winning team were still there - Charlie George, Ray Kennedy, Bob Wilson, John Radford, George Armstrong ñ all smashing players."

Liam's full debut for Ireland came against the USSR in May 1975 and in the course of 72 international appearances he would be recognised everywhere as one of Ireland's finest-ever talents.

In 1977-78 the Gunners were title contenders and FA Cup finalists, but were disappointed in both competitions. Liam's contributions that season had earned him a nomination for the PFA's Young Player of the Year Award, which eventually went to Nottingham Forest's Tony Woodcock.

Brady's 1978-79 season got off to a flying start when he scored twice in Arsenal's 2-2 draw with Leeds. By the turn of the year he was the club's leading scorer with II league goals to his name. "I'd had a great run in the previous season, and that continued into '77-78. Those goals obviously helped - you get noticed a lot more if you're scoring regularly, you're remembered more easily. And it obviously helps if your team is doing well."


Arsenal had booked a table well in advance of the PFA Awards ceremony at the London Hilton on Sunday 18 March, but in the meantime their FA Cup 6th Round meeting with Southampton had been arranged for the next day and they decided not to attend the 'do'. By then Liam knew he was a Player of the Year nominee. "I asked Terry Neill to find out if I'd won. If not, I would have gone to Southampton with the team, but Terry discovered that I was the winner. So, I turned up at the Hilton with my best friend, expecting to be seated at our original table. But because of the cancellations there was only one table available at the back of the room."

It was a long and winding walk to the stage. When Liam eventually stepped up to received the trophy from The Rt Hon George Thomas MP, his legendary footwork deserted him and he accidentally nudged the table holding all the Divisional Award medals. "The whole thing was televised and you could clearly see the medals moving behind TV presenter Dickie Davis as he spoke. That little incident raised quite a laugh among my team mates in Southampton."

Still ahead in 1979 was Brady's man of the match performance in the famous 'Five Minute' FA Cup Final. He had a say in both of Arsenal's early goals and, after United dramatically levelled the score with five minutes to go, his quick thinking in the buildup to Alan Sunderland's winning strike helped rescue the result for the Gunners. It was a performance well worthy of his status as the players' own favourite.

West Brom's burly striker Cyrille Regis won the 1979 PFA Young Player of the Year Award, and the Merit Award was collected by England legend Tom Finney.





THE YEAR OF HIDEOUS NECKS

within the game-a very serious topic indeed. For some reason it started with Italians wearing vests under their shirts and looking like whimps when they exchanged shirts at the end of internationals. We then moved on to pet likes and dislikes in the ever-changing world of football fashions.

Probably top of my current list of pet hates is this trend over the past 7 years or so of goalkeepers wearing short-sleeved shirts-it just looks wrong and offends the eyesight, particularly with a pair of gloves. Outfield players wearing gloves is another thing that offends, especially with shorts sleeves, and when Marvin Robinson did that last season at Swindon, it had to put an end to his career as a Spireite.

Another one that grates somewhat is the trend of players having their sock tops pulled above the knees in the fashion of Thierry Henry. Now if you're stylish and French and blessed with phenomenal talent, you can just about get away with it, but if you're plying your trade at grounds such as Spotland, Millmoor and Saltergate, it just doesn't go. Down-to-earth manly stuff is what's required here.

That brings me on to alice bands-what's that all about? Middlesbrough keeper Ben Roberts was the first I remember, in our cup semi-final at Old Trafford, to wear one and heis even had a certain England captain also with Old Trafford connections following suit. I know that players who like to sport girly-long locks need to do something so they can keep their hair from their eyes in a game, but couldn't they use something a bit more bloke-like such as a boot lace, like the late Trevor Hockey used to use in his days at Bramall Lane in the early 70is.

Cycle shorts-they're another thing I canit stand on the football pitch, though they did start the trend towards longer playing shorts to hide these offensive articles and I do approve of them. Their forerunners, the very short tight shorts of the 80's were not a top-notch fashion item in my book. In a similar vein, the current Italian-style tight shirts as currently worn by Wales really don't cut the mustard. The theory is fine, that they aren't easy to tug for an opponent, but as a fashion item for the fan, theyire a disaster. They just donit disguise the beer-gut, unlike the more prevalent looser-fitting shirts as favoured by most clubs these days. And, letis face it; more beer-gutted chaps wear replica footy shirts than do little kids, unlike the perception

that the media like to perpetuate.

Referees and their sidekicks not wearing black is another fashion of which I don't approve. These people should blend into the background and be anonymous, not high visibility in green or yellow. It is one of the few things I like about the FA Cup-the referees wear black. It doesn't improve their performances, of course, but it does appeal to one's sense of tradition. Tradition leads me onto another piece of fashion nonsense: the yellow ball between November and February. Can any of us ever remember complaints about not being able to see a white ball in the dark winter months? The answer, I'm sure, is a resounding 'no' and 'm convinced that the real reason for their appearance is the hand of commercialism again.

Talking of which, the recent trend of advertising on the back of shorts and shirts is a worry. Though Town's pioneering efforts in this area are tasteful, other clubs' may not be and itis a whole new area of potential degeneration in the fascinating world of football fashion. Not all current trends are bad, however. In recent years kits have improved considerably in the main, since the low days of the 80's when we saw disasters like the Arsenal birdmuck away shirt and Brighton's red and white striped away shorts. Goalie's kits have been the big winner in recent seasons with a return to plainish efforts and this season in particular we've seen many a keeper sporting a plain green jersey. It takes me back to my early days at Saltergate with John Roberts between the posts.


The new-fangled striped socks really aren't the thing though. Our current efforts with one front stripe are tolerable, but overall they're not to be encouraged and I hope they vanish soon. Another aspect to buck the trend of better outlits is the proliferation of hideous necks on shirts in the last year or so. The Manchester United thing with the lop-sided white bit and the Arsenal shirt with no edge at the back of the neck both are examples and look as if the manufacturer ran out of material to finish the shirts off properly. Even worse is the Monaco and Norwich away shirts, both of which have an odd shaped join at one shoulder instead of in the middle. This really is taking things too far! Eufa and FIFA should earn their keep and appoint a taste arbiter, though they almost did when Cameroon were fined for wearing a revolting one-piece thing more suited to Australian track sports than the football pitch.



Born in August 1956, in Luton, Andy King made his name as a lively midfielder having joined his home town club in 1974. His next stop was Everton, who he signed for in 1976 for £35,000. He made 150 appearances for The Toffees, scoring an impressive 38 goals in four seasons at Goodison before joining QPR. One season with the Superhoops was followed by another at West Bromwich Albion before a return to Everton for the 1982-83 season, where Andy played a further 43 games and added another II goals to his tally for the Toffees. A short period with Dutch side Cambuur followed. before Andy returned to England with Wolves, for whom he played 28 times scoring 10 goals. A very brief spell back at Luton in 1985 (just three appearances) preceded Andy's final move as a player when he joined Aldershot and notched 11 goals in 36 games for the Hampshire side.

Having retired as a player, he turned to coaching, and was given his first managerial appointment at Mansfield Town in 1993 following George Foster's departure. After relegation from Division Two, Mansfield were low on confidence but King managed to steer them to a mid-table finish in his first season at the helm.

The following season saw The Stags in with a chance of promotion back to the Second Division, having finished in 6th place in the table, but they were

beaten in the play-off semi-finals by John Duncan's Chesterfield. Was it 5-2 here in the second leg?

The 1995-96 season saw Mansfield drop down to 19th position in Division Three and Andy was replaced at Field Mill by Steve Parkin. He spent some time out of management but was still involved in the game, and was working with former Everton team-mate Peter Reid at Premiership club Sunderland as a scout when Colin Todd took him to Swindon as his assistant manager in the summer of 2000.

When Todd got the call from lim Smith to be his assistant at Derby County, King was given the opportunity to impress then chairman Terry Brady, and after four games in charge he was given the job full-time, in November 2000. Swindon struggled to keep themselves out of the relegation zone for most of the season but a win over Peterborough in the penultimate game of their league campaign, coupled with Bristol Rovers loss to Wycombe, ensured their Second Division survival.

The great escape act was not enough to ensure King's survival however. Despite his efforts in keeping The Robins up he was replaced at the County Ground by former Liverpool boss Roy Evans in June 2001. But he was not gone for long. Evans left the club before the end of the year,

after new owners arrived at the County Ground, and Andy King - who had taken legal action against Swindon with regard to his dismissal - was reinstated as manager on in December 2001. King's second spell with Swindon has proved more fruitful. In the following two seasons the manager was able to mould his side into a team capable of challenging for promotion. Built around an enterprising midfield who create plenty of chances for the front men, in 2004, The Robins are enjoying greater success.

With the half a season that Andy King had left in 2001, the manager steered his team to a 13th place finish. In the 2002/2003 season King improved on that to finish 10th. Last season they made the play offs, losing on penalties to Brighton I the semi's after The Seagulls had equalised the aggregate scores with a goal in the last minute of injury time at the end of the second leg. Tommy Mooney and Andy were the two Gurney unsuccessful spot kick takers, both players have subsequently moved on!

King was the best performing manager of 2004 from the Premiership and Nationwide League up to March 8th, delivering better results than even Arsene Wenger! He was presented with the League Manager's Association Tissot

TODAY'S VISITORS SWINDON TOWN

Swindon Town come to Saltergate today on the crest of a wave and with Manager Andy King's words after their 4-2 victory over high riding Hull City last weekend ringing in the ears of players and fans alike. "This was a funtastic result," King said, "It was a statement about what we can do. It was the best performance of the year because we were up against a very good side. On our day we can match anybody."

Despite their success over the last couple of seasons, Swindon have operated with a smallish squad after two visits to the administrations in recent times and a current financial problem as they try to some out their ground situation for the long term, they're currently working with the Council to try and find a solution that meets everyone's requirements.

However, despite the right reigns, they have twice found some money in the pot to actually pay transfer frees for players, outside Hull, quite an unusual feature for a League One Club. Big defender Jerel Ifil cost £70,000 in the summer from Watford, he'd had three loan spells with County previously, whilst Roberts cost £20,000 from neighbours Bristol City.



KEEPER RHYS EVANS



The promising young keeper joined Leyton Orient on a three-month loan deal in August 2002. He proved to be an excellent shot stopper and showed good command of his area. Rhys was unfortunate

to then pick up a leg injury, which cur short his period at Brisbane Road and sav him return to Chelsea. Later in that season he made his debut for the England U21 lide against Serbia, though he was subsequently released by Chelsea last year. Since then Evans has been a regular between the posts for Town and has turned in many match saving performances. HOTSHOT SAM PARKIN

Strong on the ball and devastating in the box, he romped away with the majority of trophies when the clubs 'Player of the Year' awards were handed out in 2002-2003 Parkin enjoyed another good season in front of goal last campaign and will be hoping to continue his excellent scoring ratio for Swindon Town.



STOPPER MATT HEYWOOD



Last season was another consistent one for Town's most effective defender of recent seasons, he returned to the kind of form that saw him clean up in the 2001/02 Player of the Year Awards.

Originally Heywood failed to break through at Burnley's Turf Moor and, after being alerted as to his availability by former scout Shaun Reid, Andy King snapped him up on a free transfer. The tall defender signed an extension to his contract last season, much to the delight of the fans and he has showed the same strength and commitment during the course of last season. Strong in the tackle and good in the air, Heywood is proving to be a great asset to the club. It is no coincidence that Town's defensive record improved dramatically following his arrival and whilst he may not have scored as many goals as he would have liked, he can prove effective went sent forward as an extra body in the box. Featured rarely early on this season, but King's switch to three centre backs has brought him back to the fore.

After making his way up through the ranks at Portsmouth, Igoe went on to secure a first team spot at the south coast club and made his mark with some i m p r e s s i v e performances. He moved to Reading in a

£100,000 deal but found it difficult to break into the first team and spent much of his time on the substitutes bench. Sammy eventually joined Luton on loan and went straight into their starting line up. However after just two appearances a training ground accident brought his stay to a premature close and he returned to the Madeiski Stadium. After deciding he was no longer in then manager Alan Pardew's future plans, Igoe left to join Swindon in the summer of 2003. Last season he brought a fresh enthusiasm to the Town side and quickly became a crowd favourite with his quick feet, skills and turn of pace. Capable of chipping in with goals, and making decisive contributions in the middle of the park, he is always a threat to the opposition.

JOHN TROLLOPE

Long-serving left-back who holds Swindon Town's appearance record. Signing professional at the County Ground in July 1960, he made his League debut in Swindon's I-I draw at home to Halifax Town a month later and was ever-present in seven consecutive seasons including the 1962-63 promotion success. He featured in Swindon's 1968-69 promotion and League Cup 'double' campaign as well as their 1970 Anglo-Italian Cup final triumph. Scoring 21 goals in 770 League games for Swindon, he was coach before managing them between November 1980 and March 1983, then their youth-team boss

GLENN HODDLE



reached Premiership 1992-93. Signing professional for Tottenham Hotspur in April 1975, he starred they won promotion 1977-78. then won the FA Cup consecutive seasons and the UEFA Cup in 1984. He moved

to Monaco in July 1987 and helped win the French title in 1987-88, becoming Swindon's player-boss in August 1991. Scoring once in 64 League games, he left to take charge of Chelsea after the 1992-93 First Division playoff final triumph and has since managed England, Southampton and Spurs.

COLIN CALDERWOOD

Commanding central defender who was capped 36 times by Scotland after leaving Swindon Town. Signing professional for Mansfield Town in March 1982, he moved to the County Ground in July 1985 and starred as Swindon won the Fourth Division title in 1985-86. He also helped to win promotion in 1986-87, then featured in two further play-off finals including the 1993 Wembley triumph. Scoring 20 times in 330 League games for Swindon, he moved to Tottenham Hotspur in July 1993 and subsequently played for Aston Villa and Nottingham Forest. He is now managing Northampton Town.

SHAUN TAYLOR

Influential central defender who was everpresent alongside Colin Calderwood as Swindon Town reached the Premiership in 1992-93. He impressed with Bideford before

moving to Exeter City in December 1986 and starred in their 1989-90 Fourth Division title triumph. He netted 30 goals in 212 League games while at the County Ground before moving to Bristol City in September 1996 where he has become development coach.

MIKE SUMMERBEE



Brilliant winger who was capped eight times by England after leaving Swindon Town. Initially with Cheltenham Town moved to the County Ground in March 1960 and was an important figure Swindon's 1962-63 promotion

success. He netted 39 goals in 218 League games prior to joining Manchester City in August 1965, amassing a vast collection of domestic and European honours under the Joe Mercer/Malcolm Allison partnership at Maine Road. Subsequently with Burnley, Blackpool and Stockport County, he is a successful businessman and his son Nicky also starred for Swindon Town.

ERNIE HUNT

England U-23 international striker who was Swindon Town's leading marksman in four successive seasons including their 1962-63 promotion triumph. Born

locally, he signed professional at the County Ground in March 1960 and netted 82 goals in 214 League games for Swindon prior to joining Wolverhampton Wanderers September 1965. He was top scorer as they regained top-flight status in 1966-67 and subsequently played for Everton, Coventry City, Doncaster Rovers and Bristol City, featuring in their 1973-74 FA Cup run. He ran the Full Pitcher pub in Ledbury and then became a window cleaner.

PAUL RIDEOUT

England U-21 international striker who was Swindon Town's leading goalscorer in two consecutive seasons. He was Swindon's youngest League player at 16 years 107 days against Hull City in November 1980 and netted 38 goals in 95 League games while at the County Ground before joining Aston Villa in June 1983. Moving via Italian club Bari to Southampton in July 1988, he rejoined Swindon on loan in March 1991. He had spells with Notts County and Glasgow Rangers prior to joining Everton in August 1992 and was an FA Cup winner in 1995, then played for several clubs in China and Tranmere Rovers.

PETER NOBLE

Versatile favourite who was everpresent in Swindon Town's 1968-69 promotion and League Cup 'double' triumph. Initially with Consett, he joined Newcastle United in November 1964 and played top-flight football before moving to Swindon in January 1968. He scored twice in their 1970 Anglo-Italian Cup final success and netted 62 goals in 216 League outings prior to joining Burnley in June 1973. 





International football is still played, in a recognisable form, 132 years after it was launched when Scotland met England at Hamilton Crescent in Glasgow in 1872. In a changing world, new countries have been formed, and compete in UEFA and FIFA competitions; the home international tournament has gone; and the European Championships and the World Cup are now major features in the football calendar. In essence, however, countries still pick the best of their native players, and pit them against the selections of other nations.

Schools football is still played at International level, as are professional youth matches and Under 21 games (although they have evolved from Under 23). The one casualty in the modernisation of representative football has been the Inter League tournament.

This were played on an annual basis, in a mirror image of the Home International tournament. In the season in which England played Scotland at Wembley, the interleague match would be played in Scotland, and vice versa, although there was a welcome policy of staging the matches at various club grounds throughout England.

The (Northern) Irish League and League of Ireland (headquartered in

Dublin) also took part in this round of fixtures, and from a programme point of view the interesting aspect was that the host clubs produced some very individual and idiosyncratic programmes.

When the Football League entertained the Irish League in 1960, the chosen venue was Blackpool's Bloomfield Road. The host club produced the programme, stripping out the usual advertising (thus reducing it to eight pages) but leaving the usual cover design in place. A further concession to the representative fixture was that the programme was printed in green ink.

Most of the time, the International team managers were invited to pick the League selects, and they were used as virtual trial matches for the real thing. At Blackpool in 1960, however, we find a Football League team which included Manchester Cityis German goalkeeper Bert Trautmann, Scots Dave Mackay and John White of Spurs and Denis Law of Manchester City, Irishman Danny Blanchflower of Spurs and his club team mate, Welshman Cliff Jones.

Not to be out-done, the Irish League included former Liverpool centre half Geoff Twentyman and that very English centre forward, lackie Milburn, then with Linfield.

Occasionally, matches were arranged outwith the familiar quartet. The Italian Football League played a series of fixtures in




Football League v Irish League at Blackpool 1960

Britain in the early 1960s, and Denis Law made an early appearance at Old Trafford in the green and red shirts of the Italian select when they met a Football League team in Manchester in November 1961. Apart from Law, then in a brief spell with Torino, the Italians included the Dane Fleming Nielsen, Swedenis Kurt Hamrun and Englishman Gerry Hitchens. The 12 page, very familiar looking Manchester United programme (although once again devoid of the usual adverts) disclosed a strong English League side of current or potential full caps, all resolutely English by birth.

Trust, is trying to broker a deal to takeover the Club, believed to be £3m in debt and losing £100,000 per month after a series of failed takeovers. United, still without a League win this season, seem set for a drop into League One next season and with very few players out of contract in the summer, they seem set for hard times. CFU. Cambridge Fans United, recently voted Trust of the Year by Supporters Direct, has its hardest battle ahead. With no huge reserves of cash, the Club needs to find over £500,000 by Christmas to pay wages and a loan, which is reported as being "non-negotiable". A Club Director has offered to buy the ground for around £1.9m and lease it back for 50 years at a rental of £200,000 per annum, a deal the Trust feels doesn't maximise the value of its prize asset. They are busily putting together alternative strategy, but with an extraordinary general meeting due next week to vote on the sale & leaseback, time is precious. Good luck to all of the Trusts in their quests to ensure good governance and survival at their Clubs.



ALBERT HOLMES

Apprenticed as a fitter with the East Midlands Gas Board. Albert turned down an offer from Rotherham in order to finish his studies. Having played for a local gas board team, Albert joined the Spireites on a semi-pro basis in 1960 before signing full-time the following year. Blessed with excellent balance, Albert was consistent, hard-working and skilful, with sound positional play, and adopted a nononsense attitude to the game.

Off the field, he was well-known for an infectious sense of humour. He made his name as a defender but was sometimes thrust into the forward line when the forwards were suffering a lean spell; he scored a few goals under such circumstances, his best being a twenty-yarder against Cambridge United in 1974. Fans will remember him more for his trademark sliding tackle, though, where he usually came away with the ball, on his feet, ready to launch another attack.

After a long and distinguished career that saw him rise to the status of one of the all-time greats of Saltergate, he was freed by Jim McGuigan in 1974. He went to Scunthorpe for talks, and was offered terms, which he

verbally accepted. Days later, McGuigan left for Rotherham, Chesterfield offered the manager's job to the man who had tempted him to Scunthorpe, Alan Ashman, and offered Albert a deal for the new season. Albert then went on holiday, uncertain of who he might have to play for next season: he returned to find that Ashman was the new manager of Grimsby and that he was clear to re-sign for Chesterfield.

Albert turned down a testimonial in 1976, feeling that, with the club doing indifferently at the time, there was no point in having one: in Albert's estimation, the fans had paid enough to watch him, over the years. He was ever-present in three of his sixteen years at the club, often missing games with niggling injuries: the most curious of these was the F.A. Cup tie with Bradford City in November, 1975. Albert sat the match out after hurting his ankle while parking his car. His son Paul was a professional footballer with Doncaster, Torquay, Birmingham and Everton. finishing with football Albert returned to his former trade in the gas industry.



The Leagues first committee meeting took place in March 1966 at the Sun Inn, Chesterfield, with Roly Hutson acting as secretary, a role, along with several others, including League President, he held until his death in 1999. He was an avid fan of the game and he was always keen to encourage people to play the game and he is one of the reasons the League has achieved the stature it has today. Roly's memory will live on, his name being given to one of the Leagues cup competitions the Hutson Cup, the current holders being Claycross and Danesmoor Miners Welfare pictured opposite.

Another man who was on the Leagues original committee in those days, giving loyal service to the league for many years was Geoff Thompson, who of course these days has moved up the soccer ladder somewhat to hold the position of current Chairman of the Football Association.

In the Leagues early days high scoring games were the norm and in the inaugural season New Whittington beat Chesterfield Mace FC 22-0, a record which stood until November the 25th 2001 when B and B Landscapes F C beat CS2 23-1. These days the games played are usually much more closely

contested affairs although the 2004/5 season has seen an upward trend in goal scoring feats with Hartington Wanderers hitting the back of the net on no fewer than twenty occasions as recently as September the 26th as they thrashed Shuttlewood 20-1.

The current leaders of the Leagues First Division are last years Alma Cup winners Shirebrook Northern who have made a fantastic start to the season winning all five of their opening games.

good progress and recovered enough to take his place in the starting line up at Bournemouth last Saturday.



STEVE BLATHERWICK

Last season, after a dreadful opening run, 13 games without a League win, we began to pick up a few points in October and November, eventually blossoming into an effective points gathering machine pre Christmas. One of the changes that took place in those Autumnal days was the switching of lan Evatt from midfield to centre back alongside Steve Blatherwick. Previously, our back four had been permed from Gus Uhlenbeek, Kevin Dawson, Steve Payne, Gareth Davies, Alan O'Hare, Stuart Howson and of course, Blathers.

However Payney got injured, Kev's illness and injuries too their toll, Gus appeared more often in midfield and Howson became a back up player meaning that, to fill the centre half berth, Evatt was drafted in, he'd played there many times for Derby, and the Blatherwick-Evatt partnership was born.

There were of course some hairy moments, Plymouth Argyle and Bristol City away spring to mind, but with the new backbone in place, we won or drew around two thirds of our games and edged to safety and a new, solid looking partnership was the cornerstone of our success. Ian bagged the Player of the Year awards, something that's no stranger to Steve in the past, though with Steve out of contract in the summer and offered a deal which was worth significantly less, many of us felt we'd not see the duo in action after the Luton Town thriller.

However, as we all know, Steve signed on the dotted line and was happy to publicly proclaim he'd taken a 50% cut in his wages. So why did he sign under those circumstances? "I don't think that I'm a player that likes change to be honest," says the Nottingham born 31 year old, "I like the Club and I'm happy here. I get on well with the Gaffer, with Rico and I get on well with all of the lads and I'm at a time in my career when


it's not right to move. I'm a home boy, I want to stay in Nottingham and I want to stay at Chesterfield." We're all delighted he made that decision.

So what about his link with Evatt, who endeared himself even more to the faithful by signing extended terms himself earlier this season. "I enjoy playing alongside lan, he's a great young player and we seem to understand each other now. We know what each of us is going to do and it seems to be working." Four clean sheets in the last five League One games is testimony to that and the title of the Division's most miserly defence of the season to date is another great achievement, the stalemate at Bournemouth last week perhaps the zenith of the rearguard's achievements to date. With young Andy Richmond drafted in for a rare appearance in goal just before the kick off after Carl Muggleton's groin injury and Bournemouth having scored in every home game this season, any shut out was always going to be welcome. "I was really pleased for Andy, he's only played a few games in the last few years and he wants to keep a clean sheet and I'm glad that we helped him do that. Shane Nicholson's been fantastic, he's got an old head, he's very experienced and the balance in the side just seems to be very good."

But why the change this season? After three seasons of struggle, why are we suddenly a feared force in the section, defying the bookies and most experts with a top ten slot? "I think the players the gaffer's brought in are great, he's done very well for us, they've been brilliant. Alex Bailey's a superb young player, Jamal, Tcham and the other new lads are all doing it, everyone's chipping in. We seem to be a little bit more experienced having learned from the last two or three seasons having been in a relegation battle, we seem to be stronger mentally and

everything's just coming together and we've got a good spirit. Everyone gets on at this Club."

Blathers has now been at the Club for six years, our longest serving player. Having joined us, initially on loan, from Burnley, he's gone on to establish himself, injuries apart, as a first choice pick for almost all of that time, this afternoon will be his 177th League appearance for The Spireites, add in Cup appearances at it means that it's milestone time today, 200 games in Chesterfield colours, so he's in a good position to be able to assess whether the quality of player at this level has improved or not. "Definitely, without a doubt, the quality has improved. There are a lot of players coming down from top flight clubs who've got good pedigree and you also have to be fit these days, the drinking culture's gone out of the game, players are really fit and technically very good. We went to Bournemouth on Saturday and I thought they were a superb footballing side, it was a tough game for us but we got a point. Most teams seem to be able to beat each other on the day and I think that proves that the quality of football is getting better."

And it doesn't get much better that Swindon Town's strike force this afternoon, Sam Parkin, with a goal every other game record, and Christian Roberts, an equally dangerous frontman recently recruited by The Robins. "They'll be a real handful again! There've been some games where we've had a real handful this year, Dele Adebola and Dean Windass at Bradford City were really tricky, Windass, I think, is a great player, Adebola's big, and it's the same with Sam Parkin, he's got great

feet. Roberts is really quick so it's going to be tough but we're one of the best defending sides in the Division, in goals conceded terms, the best which is brilliant, I'm really proud of that fact, so hopefully we can shut them out."

It's II unbeaten games at Saltergate now and the crowd, often fickle over the times Steve's been here, are now rock solid in their support for Roy's youngsters and style of football. Steve's view recognises this fact, "The crowd is understanding in that we've got some good young talent at this Club and they're missing out if they don't come, and they are coming. On our day we can play a lot of teams off the park, we did it against Stockport. If you look at our away record, it looks bad, but in the games we've played we've actually played well. Huddersfield should've been three points, Hull should've been three points, we just look a really strong outfit and I think teams are beginning to fear us, no-one's beaten us by more than one goal except, ironically, a lower league Club, Scunthorpe, in the Cup. Any teams that plays us, especially at home, will be more scared of us than we are of them."

So, having played as a youngster for Notts County, moved across the river to Forest, who lent him to Wycombe Wanderers, Hereford United and Reading before, in 1997 moving to Burnley and, a year later, to Chesterfield, does Blathers want to see out the rest of his playing days at Saltergate (or wherever we may play!), "Definitely, yes, without a shadow of a doubt. That's my aim and it's something I'll be working hard to do." There'll be few who don't want that to happen.
