

We had hoped for a better gate on Tuesday evening, and I'm sure that everyone who was there will agree with me that those who did not come missed a great night out (if you were a Rovers fan!). Every fan coming through the gate gives the club a boost so get all your friends to come along.



Kid promotion and I urge you to get right behind the team.



Supporters' Club coach pick up arrangements

Although the Dragons have a home match on the day we play Sheffield Wednesday away, it has been agreed that, due to the small expected Dragons' attendance, coaches WILL pick up at Belle Vue for the Sheffield Wednesday game as normal. However, fans leaving their cars in the car park MUST park well away from the sterile area in front of the main stand. They should either park behind the new office block or at the very far end (Rosso end) of the car park. On our return, if Dragons' fans have not cleared the car park by the time we reach Belle Vue, the coaches will drop fans at the bus stop opposite the car park on Bawtry Road.

However, due to the size of crowd expected for the Dragons' game against Castleford on Bank Holiday Monday (28 March), we will NOT be picking up at Belle Vue that day for the Tranmere game, nor will fans be allowed to use the car park that day.

Viking Bar opening prior to Sheffield Wednesday game

The Viking Supporters' Bar will be open at 10.30 am on the morning of the Wednesday game, to allow fans awaiting their coach pick-ups to shelter and have refreshment if they require. Coaches will depart from 11.30 am.

Sheffield Wednesday v Rovers Sunday, 6th March 2005 Safety information

You are reminded that the visit to Hillsborough on Sunday 6 March (kick-off 2.oopm) is strictly ALL-TICKET for away fans.

Tickets for visiting supporters are now available from the Doncaster Rovers ticket office and admission to the game will be by prior booking only. No away tickets will be available on the day of the match.

Turnstiles will be open from 12.3opm on the afternoon of the game, and visiting fans are urged to allow sufficient time for their journey to enable them to enter the ground by 1.45pm to avoid congestion at the turnstiles.
All supporters should be aware that South Yorkshire Police and club stewards will be acting very firmly to eject drunken supporters from the ground. Those who have consumed excessive alcohol represent a danger to the public, and will be arrested and processed through the courts.

After the match, in the interests of safety, Doncaster Rovers supporters will be asked to remain seated for a 5 to 10 minute period after the final whistle. This will give the police adequate time to clear the Leppings Lane exit area of home supporters and help all fans to get home safely.

Both clubs would be grateful if Doncaster fans would take note of the advice listed above, which has been issued to help to maximise their enjoyment of an eagerly-anticipated match.

League accepts transfer windows


The Football League has accepted defeat in its efforts to stop FIFA applying its transfer window restrictions across the board. They will join Premiership clubs in operating under the constraints from this summer onwards. Football League director of operations Andy Williamson:

"This is the third season where we've had an exemption. That will not apply any more - there's not going to be any further extended period of flexibility."

The world governing body has dug its heels in and ordered all English clubs to abide by their ruling, meaning transfers will only be permissible in the off-season and during January.

In abiding by FIFA's terms, the 72 Football League clubs will come into line with the Barclays Premiership, where the restrictions have been in place since the beginning of the 2001-02 campaign.






The sight of Barnsley supporters streaming out of Belle Vue on Tuesday night despite there being twenty minutes left for play spoke volumes for a sterling Doncaster performance that fairly eclipsed their South Yorkshire rivals. The home side thoroughly deserved this victory against a Barnsley outfit that looked desperately short on confidence and inspiration, whilst Rovers gained in confidence as the match progressed, with the final score line a more than fair reflection on the evening's events.

Blundell opened the scoring for the Rovers on sixteen minutes with a crisp right foot strike, and then doubled his tally on the half-hour, with Roberts having dispossessed a visiting defender before Blundell chipped wide of the luckless Turnbull. The match exploded five minutes before the break, when Vaughan took out Coppinger with a horrendous challenge, and a brief and ugly melee followed. Vaughan was dispatched from the field with a straight red card, and others may well have followed him on another occasion.

Barnsley began the second half in determined fashion, and the Rovers were forced to defend their lines for the first time. However, Doolan effectively closed the match out with a exquisite curling chip from thirty yards and the exodus of Barnsley fans began in earnest. With a three goal lead, the Rovers were now in almost total control, and the Barnsley goal survived a series of narrow escapes as the game drew to a close. Green crowned an excellent personal performance by tapping home McIndoe's corner with six minutes left.

This was undoubtedly one of the Rovers best performances of the season, and, following their previous victory at Peterborough last Saturday, will serve to boost their confidence still further for what remains of the season. Whatever follows in the next two months, the Rovers have done remarkably well to adapt to yet another higher grade of football, and it is to their credit that their self imposed safety net of fifty points has been reached with so many games still to play.

The Rovers & The Robins

A Potted History by Paul Gilligan


The league record between the Rovers and this afternoon's visitors, Swindon Town, is a curious one. Indeed, the two sides have previously met on just eleven earlier occasions, with the first meeting being as recently as March 1959 in the old Third Division, when the teams met over the Easter Holiday. Two goals from



Fletcher gave the Rovers a good win over the "Robins" at Belle Vue, before the teams fought out a goalless draw at the County Ground, some three days later. The teams met next during the 1966/67 season, after the Rovers had won the Fourth Division Championship during the previous season. The 1966/67 campaign proved to be a disastrous affair with the Rovers eventually being relegated, but not before they had completed a league "double" over Swindon. Moreover, their win at the County Ground in October, 1966, proved to be their only away success in a season where they conceded seventy seven goals away from home. A single goal from Sheffield was enough to

take the points, and Coleman was on the mark for the Rovers some four months later, when they enjoyed a home victory by the same score line.

There were more league meetings during the 1980's. The first, at the County Ground in October, 1981, saw a wonder long range goal from Lister plus another, more modest effort from fellow defender, Russell, which earned the Rovers another point away from home. The return fixture ended in a goalless draw at Belle Vue. Swindon were therefore still to defeat the Rovers in a league game, but they managed to open their account two years later, after both had been relegated to the Fourth Division again, Ian Snodin's penalty was not enough on the day as two goals from the home side took the points. The Rovers exacted full revenge



later in the season however, and a comprehensive three goal defeat for the "Robins" followed in April, 1984, thanks to goals from the Snodin brothers and Russell.

There were to be only two further meetings for the teams prior to this season. Both ended in draws during the 1986/87 season, and, after a gap of some seventeen years, a draw followed in this



season's first meeting, back in December. So Swindon can boast of but one league victory in their eleven previous meetings with the Rovers, and have yet to win in six previous visits to Doncaster. For their part, the Rovers will be looking to add to their four previous league wins against the "Robins", and will be guarding that unbeaten home record with a passion. We

look forward to another close encounter.

Andy King



Andy made his name as a player, having joined Luton, his hometown, in 1974, with his lively performances in midfield eventually attracting the attention of Everton. The move to the Toffees in 1976 cost the Merseyside club £35,000, and Andy went on to make over 150 appearances for the club, also scoring 38 times before he moved to Queens Park Rangers.

Just one season at Loftus Road was followed by a year at West Bromwich Albion. A return to Goodison Park came for the 1982/83 season, where he made another 43 appearances before a short time with Dutch side Cambuur, then a 28-game spell with Wolves back in England. His final playing clubs were Luton and Aldershot, and then he turned his attention to coaching.

Andy's first managerial appointment came in 1993 when he was appointed as manager at Mansfield Town following George Foster's departure. The club had just been relegated, but King steered them to a mid-table finish after stabilising their situation. The following season saw the Stags challenging for promotion, but they fell at the play-off semi final stage. A disappointing 1995/96 season, with a 19th place finish, saw King replaced by Steve Parkin. Whilst waiting for another managerial position to turn up, Andy spent some time with former Everton team-mate Peter Reid at Sunderland, where he acted as a scout. It was 2000 by the time his next

move came, when he was invited to become Colin Todd's assistant maanger at Swindon Town. Soon after Andy had arrived at the County Ground, Todd moved to Derby County as Jim Smith's assistant manager, and King was given a short time to in charge to impress chairman Terry Brady. He did well enough in those four games to be handed the job permanently in November 2000. Swindon struggled against relegation that season, but survival was assured in the penultimate match of the season. The "late escape" was not enough to save King though, and he was replaced by Roy Evans, the former Liverpool manager. However, Evans left the club before the end of the year, and King (who had taken legal action against his former employers regarding his dismissal) was reinstated

The second spell was more successful, with his side moulded into promotion challengers, and just missed the play-off places in 2001/02 and 2002/03. A great run early in 2004 suggested a further improvement in 2003/04, with the side rising to the play-off places in Division Two – eventually finishing fifth, going out of the play-offs at the semi-final stage to Brighton.

Paul Gilchrist


Paul Gilchrist was born in Dartford on January 5th 1951. He joined Charlton Athletic as an amateur in March 1968, played seven games for them, two as sub, in the 1969/70 season as Charlton finished third off bottom of the second division. He had a loan spell at non-league Yeovil Town and were offered to them as a permanent transfer, but the Glovers decided against the move. After four games he returned to the Valley.

He joined Rovers in July 1971 but didn't make his debut until September 29th when he scored the only goal in a 1-0 win at Crewe. The forward was left out of the next match, a defeat at Gillingham, with Steve Briggs preferred up front. After that he kept his place for a further 21 games, scoring eight goals in his 22 Rovers appearances, including four in two games against Stockport and Barrow in early January.


On March 8th 1972, transfer deadline day, Lawrie McMenemy manager of First Division Southampton paid £30,000 to take Gilchrist (Rodney Marsh moved from QPR to Manchester City for £200,000 the same day). His first Southampton game was as substitute at home to Liverpool, with his full debut three days later at Highbury in place of the experienced Ron Davies.

His greatest moment in football came when he won an FA Cup winners medal as Second Division Southampton beat Manchester United in the 1976 competition. After 17 goals in 107 Southampton games he became one of just eight players that have played for both Southampton and Portsmouth. Three goals in 38 games was followed by a move to Swindon in August 1978, who were then managed by Bobby Smith. His record at Swindon was impressive with six goals in ten games, but after a heavy defeat he was one of a number of changes made and he made a further seven substitute appearances before joining Hereford in March 1980.

A spell non league saw followed before his retirement. He was last known working as a service advisor for BMW.

Rhys Evans (goalkeeper)

Born in Swindon, Rhys signed a 2-year deal in July 2003 after being released by Chelsea. An England under-21 international, he has plenty of belief in his own ability. He is an excellent shot-stopper with a good command of his area.

Sean O'Hanlon (defender)

A former England youth international, Sean originally signed on a month's loan from Everton last January, and eventually moved to Town as part of a transfer deal involving Leigh Mills moving in the other direction. A rock at the heart of the Swindon defence, he is strong, aggressive and quick.

Grant Smith (midfielder)

Grant is a versatile player who can play in defence, midfield or attack, but is usually found on the left of midfield. He moved to the County Ground after being released from Sheffield United during the summer of 2003.

Matthew Hewlett (midfielder)

A central midfielder, Matt was handed the captain's armband last season, and seemed to relish the responsibility, with some gritty displays in the centre of the park. He arrived at Town from Bristol City in 2000 on a "Bosman", and has been virtually ever-present since then. A hard working midfielder with good passing skills.

Jamie Slabber (striker)

Jamie joined Swindon on loan from Tottenham Hotspur in December, and will remain at the County ground until the end of the season, when his Spurs contract expires. A young centreforward who has just passed his 20th birthday.

Steve Jenkins (defender)

Much travelled Steve is currently on loan from Peterborough, having previously played for Swansea, Huddersfield, Birmingham, Cardiff and Notts County. Aged 32, he arrived at the County Ground in October 2004.

Sammy Igoe (midfielder)

Nicknamed "The Showman", Sammy began his career at Portsmouth, before moves to Reading and Luton. He brings a fresh enthusiasm to the Town side and has quickly established himself as a crowd favourite with his quick feet, sublime skills and turn of pace.

Rory Fallon (striker)

Rory signed from Barnsley in November 2003 after impressing in matches against Swindon. A big, battling, tough centre forward with superb aerial ability, with good touch for his size.

Stefani Miglioranzi (midfielder)

Brazilian-born Stefani is described by fans as the "Rolls Royce of the midfield" when he's in form, gliding across the pitch, able to pick out passes with great vision. He joined Swindon in July 2002, but is a product of the America College football system, playing for MLS team Chicago Fire before joining Portsmouth.

David Duke (midfielder)

Dukey arrived on a free transfer from Sunderland in 2000 having never appeared for the Sunderland first team, but has hardly missed a game for Swindon since. His hard work and versatility means he is now a vital cog in Andy King's midfield. Usually found on the left of midfield despite being right-footed.

Jerel Ifil (defender)

Fans favourite Jerel, often known as the best, signed for Swindon initially on a three-month loan, and is often known to mark a number of opponents into obscurity. A central defender signed from Watford, he has good pace, is firm in the tackle and adds pace to Swindon's defence.

Matthew Bulman (goalkeeper)

Eighteen-year old Matthew is the youth team goalkeeper whose first team experience comprises of Town's pre-season trip to Devon with the first team squad.

Christian Roberts (striker)

Born in Cardiff, Christian joined Town from Bristol City in October 2004 after his first team chances were rare at Ashton Gate. He moved to Bristol impressing for Exeter City, and has plenty of pace and skill, terrorising defenders with his direct style of play.

Andrew Nicholas (defender)


"Nicho" left Liverpool in summer 2003 after struggling to make their first team squad, but was an Under-19 regular at Anfield. With good height, pace and recovery, he has made the left back slot his own, and possesses a good long throw.

Steve Robinson (defender)

Now celebrating the completion of four years at the County Ground after signing from Birmingham City, Steve's non-stop attitude and 100% work rate have proved to be an outstanding asset to the club.

Brian Howard (midfielder)

A 20-year old left sided midfielder, Brian joined from Southampton in 2003, and is an England youth international. He is good at set-pieces and corner kicks, and ha snow established himself as a first team regular.

Alan Reeves (defender/coach)

With over 500 senior appearances to his credit, Alan arrived at Swindon in June 1998 having previously turned out for Norwich, Gillingham, Chester, Rochdale and Wimbledon. His presence and willingness to throw himself into the thick of things suggests that he is not ready to hang up his boots yet, despite having taken on coaching duties and responsibility for the reserves.

Matthew Heywood (defender)

A reliable and consistent defender who relishes aerial battles, and has now accumulated well over 150 appearances for the club since joining in 2001. A former Player of the Year winner, it is no coincidence that Town's defensive record improved dramatically following his arrival.

Steve Book (goalkeeper)

Veteran keeper Steve joined Swindon last summer after being released by Cheltenham, and provides competition for first choice Rhys Evans. An agile keeper, who has played well over 200 senior games in his career, which also includes Forest Green Rovers.

Lee Holmes (midfielder)

An attacking left-sided midfielder, 17-year old Lee is currently on loan at Swindon from Derby County. An England under-17 international.

Michael Pook (midfielder)

Aged 18, Michael made his debut against Boston United in the LDV Trophy last season, but is yet to make a League appearance.

Luke Garrard (defender)

A confident young right back who figured prominently in Swindon's FA Youth campaign last season, and made his first team debut against Oldham at the end of the 2003/04 season.

Andy Caton (striker)

A former Southampton trainee who likes to play on the left side of the attack, possessing good pace. A first-year scholar, he has made an occasional first team appearance on the bench.



League One Review

With just less than a quarter of the season remaining, the division is taking shape. Luton, thanks to a penalty two minutes from time against Walsall on Tuesday extended their lead to nine points from Hull City, who could only draw at Milton Keynes Dons, and from newspaper reports they didn't deserve a point. Stuart Elliott returned to Hull's team on Saturday and they will be hoping he can revitalise their promotion push.

With Luton so far clear, the other automatic promotion spot looks to be between Hull, Tranmere, Hartlepool and Sheffield Wednesday. Tranmere beat Huddersfield 3-0 whilst Hartlepool were beating Brentford 3-1.

Both Rovers and Hull City had bids turned down recently for Colchester's Craig Fagan. Their manager Phil Parkinson has said that Fagan would only be sold in certain circumstances. With the transfer deadline day approaching and Fagan out of contract in the summer, my guess is that those circumstances would be the biggest offer on the table on deadline day. Colchester are currently six points clear of MK Dons who occupy the last relegation place, so should be able to pull clear of the drop even if Fagan was to leave. Simon Johnson, who had a loan spell at Belle Vue from Leeds earlier in the season looks likely to join Barnsley on loan for the rest of the season. Another former Leeds player, David Wetherall missed his first game after 42 consecutive games for Bradford in their defeat at Blackpool on Tuesday, due to suspension following his fifth booking of the season. Also at Bradford, Ben Muirhead has now

accepted a new contract having originally turning down Bradford's offer.

Bradford are probably very thankful for their early season form. When they beat Sheffield Wednesday on October 23rd last year it took them to second in the table with 28 points from 15 games. They have since added 20 points from the last 19 games and have dropped to 11th in the table.

Today's games see Brentford entertain Sheffield Wednesday and Bournemouth host Tranmere. This may play into the hands of Bristol City to move closer to the top six if they can overcome Blackpool. It could also tell us if Brentford are more interested in their cup run.


He admits to having been a keen follower for several years without attending games all that regularly but, having served his "supporters' apprenticeship" the old "Belle Vue adrenalin" kicked in and he's been hooked on the club ever since.

His favourite Rovers' games are the more recent ones - mainly this season's home clash with Hull City. He says "I was particularly looking forward to that game - when Hull were full of confidence, on an unbeaten run and fully expecting to come here and simply roll us over. To beat the Tigers was so satisfying." Mark also admits to eagerly looking forward to the home game with Sheffield Wednesday just before last Christmas - but not surprisingly wanted to say little more about a performance on the day that robbed Rovers' fans of bragging rights and is perhaps best forgotten very quickly. Looking back over the wider picture Mark, like many other Rovers' supporters, is absolutely amazed at the progress the club has made since the dark days in the Conference. He was quick to point out, "This is due in no small way to John Ryan, Dave Penney and Mickey Walker behind the scenes and the efforts of

those players on the park itself." When questioned about players, Mark lists Paul Green and Neil Roberts of the current squad as his favourites with Ricky Ravenhill running a close third. He has strong views about the ex-Wigan Athletic man, "For his size I am amazed how Robbo wins the majority of aerial battles and his intelligent work off the ball is top class." He was, however, disappointed not to see Simon Johnson's loan at Belle Vue either extended or turned into a permanent deal..."I thought he was settling into the squad and would have probably been a first choice striker" he added. Perhaps four days after the home defeat against Chesterfield was the wrong time to ask Mark if he thought that Rovers would gain a third consecutive promotion - his reply "it looks doubtful now". He did recognise, however, that should Rovers be fortunate enough to secure a place in next season's Championship, there would have to be some considerable transfer market dealings during the coming summer.

THE STORY OF DONCASTER ROVERS

This is the twentieth part of our series which traces the history of Doncaster Rovers since 1879 to this season, the 125th anniversary its formation. This week, Colin Harker looks at the beginning of the 1980's, with the arrival of a youngster called lan Snodin, and a "Rovers hero" - Colin Douglas - in the Rovers side.

Part twenty: The Bremner Years

The 1980/1981 season saw promotion for the first time since 1968/1969, although three defeats in the opening four games did not bode well in a stop/start season. A 5-1 demolition of Hereford sparked a run of six straight wins before a run of one win in the next six with only one goal scored, and that an Alan Warboys' penalty.



lan Snodin was given a run in the side with Alan Little as his "minder". Warboys was used in defence and Nimmo was scoring goals alongside another young


Pugh on one flank and Glynn

Only one signing was made in the summer of 1981. Colin Douglas was a youngster who had been an apprentice at Glasgow Celtic. Douglas was to epitomise Bremner's "never give up" style of play. After seven games they topped Division Three after four 1o wins on the trot. Terry Cooper, the former England international was signed but he left soon afterwards to take the manager's iob at Bristol City. Unfortunately, the previous season's top scorer lan Nimmo broke his leg in training, then the influential

Warboys got injured and Rovers' form suffered. One win in fifteen games saw a dramatic slide down the table. Ian Snodin was given the captain's armband and grew in the role. The team recovered towards the end of the season and relegation was avoided by just three points despite Rovers being unbeaten in the last eight games. Goals had been hard to come by with only 55 scored in 46 games, Richard Dawson top scoring with just eight goals.




Before the 82/83 season, Dawson left along with Pat Lally, David Harle (for the first time) and Steve Humphries (the goalkeeping brother of Glenn). Dennis Peacock returned from Bolton, to compete with Willie Boyd for the goalkeeping jersey. A tough season was to follow. After three games Rovers had one point and had failed to score when Exeter visited Belle Vue for a Friday night game.

It was to see a remarkable set of results for Doncaster. A 6-1 win was followed the following



weekend with a 3-2 defeat at Southend. Then on September 25th Reading were beaten 7-5 at Belle Vue, with Kerry Dixon scoring four goals for the visitors and still being on the losing side! lan Snodin scored three for Rovers in the same game. This was followed by a 3-6 home defeat at the hands of Wigan. The run stopped with a 0-1 defeat at Orient, but then Lincoln beat Rovers 5-1 at Sincil Bank and Rovers then played out a 4-4 draw at home to Brentford in gale force conditions. Forty-eight goals had been seen in seven games, an average of 6.85 per game. The season seemed to change when surprisingly Alan Little left for Torquay United in a deal that saw defender Clive Wiggington move to Belle Vue. In another exchange, Daral Pugh, who had gained Welsh under 21 caps whilst with Rovers, was swapped with Huddersfield's striker Terry Austin.



Rovers' home form kept them going until January, but from February to the end of the season the team managed just two wins,

one at Plymouth and the other at home to Sheffield United. As a result Rovers were relegated; a big disappointment after the season had begun with such optimism. With Chesterfield below them Rovers were thirteen points adrift of third bottom Wrexham, and Fourth Division football was to return to Belle Vue.

Bremner's response was to go for experience. Bill Green, Ernie Moss, John Breckin and Andy Kowalski had amassed over 1,500 league appearances between them. Dowd, Liddell, Cawthorne, Robertson, Mell and the disappointing Austin all left as Rovers again planned for Division Four. The newcomers were to blend well with the young players that were developing nicely as first team regulars (Russell, Lister, the returning Harle, Douglas, Humphries and the Snodins). Moss hit the ground running and scored in each of his first four matches. It got better as Rovers lost just once in 25 games between October 1st and March 10th.

It was a typical Bremner team. Everyone was strong in the tackle with a willingness, personified in the young Scot, Douglas, to chase every ball. The team had attacking flair and possessed a secret weapon in the free kicks of Glynn Snodin, who had power, accuracy and swerve all within his armoury at dead ball situations. Snodin was to score 13 goals, two less than both Moss and Douglas as the team scored 82 goals in finishing second behind local rivals York City.

Crowds remained poor however, with just 3,879 watching the last home game of a promotion season. Peter Wetzel, a local businessman, had joined the board during the season and had given Bremner backing financially, allowing the big signings of Scottish youth internationals, lim Dobbin for £25,000 from Celtic and a record buy of John Philliben, a defender from Bremner's first club Stirling Albion for £60,000. Towards the end of the season, Alan Brown a proven striker was recruited from Shrewsbury for £35,000.

Considering the method used the previous summer of signing experience, Breckin and Green both suffered through injury and managed just 27 games between them before leaving. Moss was released at the end of the season despite being top scorer and Kowalski was to become more of a squad player going forward.

February half-term course

On a very cold and frosty morning, our Community Coaching Team began the February half-term football course. The staff began their preparation by setting up several small-sided pitches, and attaching netting to the wooden goal frames for shooting exercises. Whilst all this was going on, Community Officer Richard Bailey and coach Wayne Galloway began checking in procedures. This is very in depth these days, as every single youngster has to be signed in by a parent or guardian, have any medical problems noted and have all names and addresses taken down in exact detail, and all this is before the course starts!

Once the first group of youngsters have fully checked in (ages 8 to 14), they are separated into



Overall, the course ran very smoothly, with an average of over 70 youngsters attending every single day. The kids have gained confidence, met new friends and had a great time, and we can't ask for more than that!






The Recruit - Robert Muchamore



Despite some recent departures from the club, Rovers were still able to turn out a strong team for this reserve league fixture, with on-loan keeper Ross Flitney making his first appearance in Rovers colours. However, the substitutes bench comprised youth team players.

Grimsby started the match brightly, with a good move down the right wing by Reeve ended with Lewisham shooting, but Flitney saved the shot comfortably. The home side only held the lead for three minute though -Rovers won a free kick on the left, with McSporran's kick into the centre being headed on by Campbell for Priet to fire the ball into the roof of the net for the equalizer. Despite the home side having the majority of the play for the rest of the first period, the score at half time was 1-1.

Grimsby started the second half on the attack, with Flitney doing well to push a shot from Lewisham round the post for a corner. After that, Rovers took over the game, with Rigoglioso being instrumental in directing Rovers attacks from midfield. A poor clearance by Grimsby was then only cleared as far as Jackson, who attempted to lob the keeper,



but the home custodian just managed to scramble back to save the shot. A header from Fenton then went wide, then Campbell miscued in front of goal from a McSporran cross a minute later. Grimsby were mounting the occasional foray into Rovers territory, but Flitney was able to cope with anything that they threw at him. Back went Rovers on the attack, with Rigoglioso shooting over from 25 yards.

The winning goal came in the 73rd minute, and again, it came from a set piece. A free kick on the left was chipped into the goalmouth by Rigoglioso, and McSporran cheekily flicked the ball with the inside of his right foot to divert it past a static goalkeeper for Rovers' second goal. Rovers should have gone 3-1 up two minutes later when Jackson, in a one-on-one with their keeper, fired wide. The match duly drifted to a close with Rovers in control and leaving Blundell Park with all three points.







Blackpool v Doncaster Rovers Saturday, 19th March 2005 Kick-off 2pm

Our next away game in the Coca Cola League One is against Sheffield Wednesday on Sunday, 6th March. Directions to that game were given in the Barnsley programme on Tuesday. The next away game after that is when Rovers visit Blackpool for a League One fixture on Saturday, 19th March. The Supporters Club are running coaches to the game - please check their details on page 59 of this programme.

For those of you who may want to make your own way to the match, the following information may be useful to you.

Leave Doncaster on the A1(M) northbound. keeping on this road until the M62 junction at Ferrybridge. Take the westbound carriageway towards Manchester and Leeds, continuing for just short of fifty miles until you reach the M6o intersection, Join the M6o, joining the M61 in due course, (signposted to Preston, Wigan and Bolton, and North via M6). You then need to join the M6 northbound at junction 30, staying on the M6 for just one junction before turning onto the M55 (signed Fleetwood, (M55) Blackpool, Preston (North). Keep on the M55 until the end of the motorway (junction 4), then go straight ahead onto the A583 (Preston New Road). Keep on the A583 and you will eventually see the football ground on your right. The ground is situated about quarter of a mile from the sea front, and is about half way between the Pleasure Beach amusement park and Blackpool Tower.

There is some street parking in the vicinity of the ground, but there are several large pay and display car parks just across the road from the

There are two railway stations in Blackpool, cunningly called Blackpool South (a ten minute walk from Bloomfield Road) and Blackpool North (about half an hour's walk). However, most trains go to Blackpool North, so you either have a longer walk, or you could get a taxi from outside the station...

From the town centre the services 5 and 11 go near the football ground.

The stadium:

In 2000, Blackpool FC announced ambitious plans to redevelop Bloomfield Road, with designs being published for a new 16,000 allseater stadium. Phase one of the project was completed in February 2002, with the new North and West Stands being opened. Sadly, the second phase, involving the South and East Stands, is yet to be built.

The north-west corner of the ground has also been filled in, making an impressive sight - a pity the same can't be said for the other two

The East side of the ground has a temporary stand to house the away supporters, with the south end still awaiting construction of the new stand. It is anticipated by the club that work may begin some time in 2006.

With away supporters being accommodated in a temporary stand, facilities are very basic, and there is no roof, so hope it doesn't rain! If it looks like it might be wet, fans from other clubs have recommended stout footwear, as the walkway quickly turns into a quagmire! The portakabin toilets are described as "inadequate" by previous visitors, and service at the small refreshment but is rather slow.

On the positive side, you do get a good view, and there is a good amount of leg room.

Tickets for this fixture will be available in advance, or on the day of the match, with Rovers fans being housed in the uncovered, seated East Stand.

Admission prices for this match are as follows:

Adults: £14.00 Over-60's: E10.00 Under-18's: £7.00

Blackpool's official web site indicates that a sop discount is available on tickets bought prior to match day.

Food and drink:

Unsurprisingly there is a wide choice of places for you to eat, with plenty of pubs also available. Some recommended by fans include the Auctioneer on Lytham Road (near Blackpool South station), and the Dunes pub on Lytham

Near the ground is The Swift Hound (Rigby Road). The Manchester and The Foxhall (Promenade). There is a McDonalds and a Frankie & Benny's just over the car park from the football ground.


