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



FA Cup football is always special and tonight is no exception when we entertain Coca-Cola League One side Swindon Town in a first round replay. Our visitors have got some very talented players on show tonight, including the likes of Fallon, Roberts, Gurney and Manchester United season-long loanee Heaton.

Statistics clearly tell you that the team from a higher division normally wins the cup replays, so we will have to sway that in favour of cup upsets, if we are to progress in this season's FA Cup. Monday of this week produced another example when Nottingham Forest progressed very comfortably at Weymouth.

Midweek matches are always special at York Street and our crowd always seem to have that little extra buzz that can sometimes be the difference when you need your supporters to get behind you. I will not build our visitors up to be Real Madrid, but in my opinion, they have good players who have gone five matches unbeaten and will provide us with as difficult a task as any team will this season.

Tonight we will be missing both loanee Ian Ross and the suspended Lee Canoville, so our resources will be stretched in full, but I did make the choice back in the summer of quality over quantity when it came down to which players we signed. I believe that was the correct decision then and I still do today.

The next four or five weeks will be massive for us as we go in search of a play-off spot. At Boston United, we know that we cannot compete with the budgets available at the likes of Grimsby Town, Wycombe Wanderers, Lincoln City or Notts County but we can compete on the field because we have a group of players who have a real hunger to get into those end-ofseason play-off places. Over the next few weeks, we play the likes of Notts County, Wrexham, Wycombe and the excellent Cheltenham Town. These are all teams who will take a top seven place at the end of the season. so when you add the likes of Northampton, Leyton Orient, Lincoln City and Grimsby Town, it shows clearly just how difficult our task will be to get a play-off spot come next May. I believe the difference at the end of the season will be a fine line and I often remind the players of this.

York Street will have a great atmosphere tonight, but look around inside and outside the ground and it becomes clear just how much we need a new stadium. Memories will last forever, but our own beloved York Street has now past its best and relocation to a new purpose-built facility is the only option. The people in this town are hard working and genuine and they deserve the same as the other towns around the country; in simple terms, a little bit of comfort when you watch the team that represents our town.

The man in the middle tonight is the same referee who officiated our first match down at Swindon. I don't believe that we got much that day but I have the utmost respect for Brian Curson, who I find to be honest and professional. The referee may make the decisions, but it is my players who can influence the result.

Tonight will be difficult and we will at times need the help of the best fans around, so get behind the boys and cheer us to a memorable win.



British Universities, Huddersfield Town, Mansfield Town, Gillingham, Swindon Town, Sheffield United, Tranmere Rovers, Grimsby Town (loan), Wycombe Wanderers (loan), Gillingham (loan) Iffy Onuora took over as manager of Swindon Town in September 2005, following the departure of Andy King from the club. Onuora joined Swindon Town in October 2004 as head of youth development and quickly made a positive impression with all at the County Ground with a swift promotion into management following less than a year with the club.

As a player, Onuora scored an impressive 116 goals in 351 professional league starts. He started off his career with the British Universities and spent a season with them (1988-1989) before signing for Huddersfield Town in the summer of 1989. He enjoyed five successful seasons with the Terriers before switching to Mansfield where eight goals in starts saw Gillingham pay £25,000 for his services. While with the Gills, 23 goals in 53 starts caught the eye of Swindon Town who paid £120,000 for him, with "Aye Aye Iffy" soon ringing round the terraces and Onuora soon banged in 25 goals in 65 starts from March 1998 to January 2000. Gillingham then moved once again for their former striker, this time for an outlay of £100,000. From there a permanent move to Sheffield United saw loan spells follow with Wycombe Wanderers and Grimsby Town. Onuora's playing career came to an end with a move to Tranmere Rovers followed by a brief spell with Huddersfield Town towards the end of the 2003-2004 season.

GOALKEEPERS

Promising keeper RHYS **EVANS** joined Leyton Orient on a three-month loan deal in August 2002. He proved to be an excellent shot stopper and showed good command of his area. Rhys was unfortunate to pick up a leg injury, which cut short his period at Brisbane Road and saw him return to Chelsea. Later in that season, he made his debut for the England under-21 side against Serbia. but was eventually released by Chelsea. Town manager Andy King swooped for the young stopper in 2003 to give first choice keeper Bart Griemink more competition for the number one shirt at Swindon Town. Since then Evans has been a regular between the posts for Town and has turned in many match saving performances. Evans is currently sidelined through injury.

England under-20 international goalkeeper TOM HEATON played in 17 Barclays and 12 Pontins games last season for Manchester United and joined Town on a six-month loan in August. Tom was also in the side that defeated Charlton Athletic at The Valley to become the first official National Reserve League champions. Heaton has made the number one shirt his own with a string of impressive performances so far and could look to extend his stay in Wiltshire beyond lanuary 2006.

Current back-up keeper at the County Ground is youngster MATTHEW BULMAN, who was an unused substitute in the first game against the Pilgrims on November 5.

DEFENDERS



After impressing during an eight-game loan spell last season, Liverpoolborn SEAN

O'HANLON signed for Swindon Town in March 2004 on a permanent basis from Everton. Having come up through the youth ranks at Goodison Park, O'Hanlon left Merseyside in search of first team football and was a rock in the centre of defence towards the end of the 2003-2004 season.

Signed from Watford in the summer of 2005, JACK
SMITH adds youthful experience to the Town side and arrives with a point to prove. Due to the departure of Paul Robinson to West Bromwich Albion, he was thrust into the first-team spotlight at Watford and coped admirably, registering



two goals. Having made his debut towards the end of the 2002-2003 campaign, the 21year-old younger brother of ex-Hornet Tommy made another eight further appearances last term.



Powerful defender JEREL IFIL joined Town in the summer of 2004 after enjoying

three loan spells with Town previously from 2002 to 2004. Jerel became a fan's favourite during his brief stays in Wiltshire and signed on a permanent basis in June 2004 and put in some solid performances during the following season. Following Matt Heywood's summer defection to Bristol City, Ifil has now pinned down a regular first team berth in the Town backline.

Former Arsenal player NICKY



The Visitors

NICOLAU is equally at home in defence or in midfield. He signed from Southend United in the summer of 2005. although currently sidelined after undergoing a hernia repair in September 2005.

Capped by Wales on 16 occasions, STEVE JENKINS was signed at the end of November 2004 and has provided added experience to the Town backline. After beginning his career at Swansea, he has also been with Huddersfield, Birmingham, Cardiff, Notts County and Peterborough. After falling out of favour at London Road under Barry Fry, Town boss Andy King moved quickly to sign the player after impressing during his four-game loan spell.

Before joining Swindon in 1998, ALAN REEVES spent four years at Wimbledon, where he had the tough task of replacing John Scales. Reeves has also played for Gillingham, Chester and Rochdale where he is considered to be one of the best players in the club's history. He has now made well over 400 league appearances and was rewarded last season with a playing-coaching role that has seen him turn around the fortunes of Town's reserve side. He continues to back up the Swindon defence when called upon and is now the club's assistant manager. Currently out injured after breaking his leg in the home Carling Cup exit to Wycombe Wanderers in August.

ANDY NICHOLAS joined Town in the close season of 2003 following his decision to leave Liverpool, where he came through the youth system but struggled to break into the first team. He was a regular in the under-19s side at Anfield and won many plaudits with his performances at left-back, which prompted Andy King to snap up the youngster. After working his way into the manager's starting line up

with some hard work in training, Andrew seized his chance to become a regular member of the side throughout the 2003-2004 season and managed his first senior goal in a 4-2 win at Stockport in February.

A tough-tackling former Centre of Excellence player, local-based KYLE LAPHAM progressed through the ranks and has made a number of appearances for the reserve team last season before signing a professional oneyear deal in the summer. Sustained a knee injury at Cirencester Town in preseason but is now back to fitness and eager for first team action.

Having come on as a late substitute against the



Pilgrims in the FA Cup last week, CHARLIE COMYN-PLATT scored a late equaliser

after taking his place as an emergency striker. He joined the Bolton Academy in the summer of 2002 after a long association with the club. The assured defender was called into the first team for the first time in September 2003, and he was handed his debut when replacing Bruno N'Gotty for the final nine minutes of the 3-1 Carling Cup win over Walsall. After being released by Bolton in the summer of 2005 he made the switch to The County Ground on a one-year contract.

PATRICK COLLINS arrived on loan from Sheffield Wednesday in the build-up to the new season. He signed a two-year deal at Hillsborough in July 2004 after impressing during a trial spell at S6 towards the end of the 2003-2004 campaign. The former Sunderland defender gained plenty of experience in his first season at senior level, amassing a

total of 33 appearances and operating both at right-back and centre-half. He made his Wednesday debut in the opening day clash with Colchester United and started the first 25 games of the term, scoring his first professional goal in the November win at Bristol City.

MIDFIELDERS

GARETH WHALLEY signed for Swindon Town in July 2005 from Wigan Athletic on a free transfer. Originally a trainee at Crewe, Gareth made over 200 first-team appearances for them before signing for Bradford City in July 1998 for £600,000. Gareth was a regular during their twoseason spell in the top flight and in March 2002 went back to Crewe on loan for a few months. Injury kept him out from early-November 2002 until mid-April 2003 but he returned to play a significant role in the club's promotion through the play-offs. He left Cardiff in September 2004 and joined Wigan Athletic and subsequently made nine appearances for the Latics in the march to promotion to the Premiership. He signed a three-year deal at Swindon in the summer.

STEFANI MIGLIORANZI is the



product of the American College football system in which the most promising

players are drafted into Major League Soccer. Portsmouth out-jumped Liverpool in inviting him for a trial and signed him soon thereafter. Stefani is a Brazilian-born American who holds an Italian passport. As a footballer the genes don't come much better. What's more, Miglioranzi is versatile; he can play in defence or as a central midfielder and since joining the club, he has impressed in the middle of Town's midfield.



A tricky winger with plenty of pace. RICKY SHAKES signed fro Bolton Wanderen

in a deal which also saw Charlie Comyn-Platt join the club. Shakes spent time on loan with Bristol Rovers and Bury during the 2004-2005 season and impressed manager Andy King during a reserve game for Swindon.

Third year scholar MICHAEL POOK has seen first team action on a number of occasions, including the LDV Vans Trophy game at Boston United in 2003. "Pooky" signed a professional contract ahead of the 2005-2006 season and was a consistent performer for the youth team and reserves last term. Scored his first senior goal in the

home defeat by **Wycombe Wanderers** and has played in every first team game so far this

One of three Centre of Excellence players who were signed on as first year scholars in June 2004, BEN WELLS is an energetic midfielder who impressed in the under-175 last season. He was awarded a squad number in November 2004 and made the bench against Bristol City in the LDV Vans Trophy. Involved in Town's pre-season trip to Bideford in central midfield and made the bench for the opening three games of the season, coming on as a late substitute at Barnsley.

Energetic midfielder NEALE
McDERMOTT signed for Town
from Fulham in August 2005
at the close of the transfer
window. McDermott, son of
former England midfielder
Terry, joined Town to get
some Football League
experience and he made his
debut for Town in the



ANDY GURNEY rejoined
Swindon Town on loan in the
early part of the 2005-2006
season after failing to pin
down a regular place in
Swansea City's starting lineup. A versatile player, he can
operate anywhere along the
backline or in centre of
midfield. He joined Swansea
from Swindon on a free
transfer in September 2004
and lists his other clubs as
Torquay United, Bristol
Rovers and Reading.

Youngster DAVID STROUD is another of Town's team with County Ground connections, with his father Kenny starring for Swindon. A skilful winger, David joined the Centre of Excellence before signing scholarship forms. He spent time on work experience with Basingstoke last season and made his Town debut at Huddersfield Town in October 2005.

STRIKERS



Signed from Barnsley, RORY FALLON made quite an impression against Town in the

past, scoring on many occasions and catching the eye of Town boss Andy King in doing so. He joined Barnsley as a professional in 1999 after moving up through their trainee programme. His last season there saw him score his first ever League goal against Blackpool and he quickly followed that up in a game at Stockport. He had just began to cement his place in the first team when he suffered a stress fracture of his foot and it was not until the closing stages that he rejoined the first team squad. King had become a keen admirer of the striker by that point and Town eventually agreed an undisclosed fee with Barnsley to bring him to Wiltshire. Having waited patiently for his chance, has scored a number of goals including a brilliant overhead

kick from the edge of the box to secure a point against Bristol City in early April 2004. Fallon spent a onemonth loan spell at Yeovil Town in February, scoring once in six appearances.

Striker TONY THORPE made

the switch along the M4 from Loftus Road in the summer of 2005, signing a one-year deal. The long serving Luton Town striker moved to Loftus Road for a nominal fee in the first few weeks of the 2003-2004 season. Having started as a junior at his hometown club Leicester City, Thorpe then moved to Kenilworth Road where he established himself as potent finisher, scoring 50 League goals in 120 appearances, before attracting a £800,000 transfer move to Fulham. A short spell at Craven Cottage was followed by a move to Bristol City, with Thorpe now attracting £1 million for his signature. Again the striker proved a valuable buy, scoring 51 League goals in 128 appearances for the Robins. However, his time at Bristol City was punctuated by loan spells with Reading and then again with Luton, where he later made his move permanent. QPR paid Luton Town £50,000 for his services in August 2003 and he went on to score 10 goals in 26 league starts for Rangers before making his switch to Wiltshire in June 2005. Thorpe's overall goalscoring record stands at 136 strikes in 277 starts and he also scored one goal in five appearances for Rotherham United during a loan period at the end of last season.

Cardiff-born striker
CHRISTIAN ROBERTS joined
Town in October 2004 in a
£50,000 switch from local
rivals Bristol City. Formerly
with Exeter City where he
scored 18 goals in 67 league
starts for the Grecians from
2000 to 2002, he made a
tremendous start to his Town
career, scoring the winner on
his debut against Oldham

Athletic but was then ruled out with a hernia operation. He has found the net on two occasions this term, but a toe injury sustained after the Scunthorpe United game, in which he scored a penalty, has halted his progress.

COLIN HEATH can operate up front or out wide on the right and played in the Barclays and Pontins Leagues for Manchester United's reserves last season. He joined Town in August on a six-month loan deal and made his debut for the club at Blackpool on August 20.

Pacy Frenchman HAMEUR
BOUAZZA joined Town as Iffy
Onuora's first signing since
taking over as manager at the
County Ground on a onemonth loan. Bouazza made
his first start for Swindon
against Port Vale and notched
his first goal in the LDV Vans
Trophy win over Stevenage
Borough. This loan spell has
now been extended until
January 2006.

A powerful striker, ANDY CATON joined Swindon as a first year scholar in June 2004 after spending some time with GLS Hellenic Premier Division side North Leigh. where he was a prolific scorer. Came off the bench on the opening day of the 2003-2004 season, scoring against Wrexham and made subsequent appearances for the first team against Luton Town and Stockport County. He was handed a squad number for this season in August 2005, but is now unfortunately ruled out for several months after injuring his knee ligaments in the 1-0 win over Bournemouth in September 2005.

ASHAN HOLGATE made his Swindon debut against the Pilgrims on November 5. He can operate as a striker or on the right of midfield. He scored against Millwall in preseason 2004, after coming on as a substitute.

1962/63

Swindon Town won promotion to the Second Division for the first time in 1962-63. Bert Head's young side won just one of their first six games, then top scorer Ernie Hunt netted a hattrick in a 5-1 victory over Brighton. Cliff Jackson scored three times in a 4-3 win at Millwall and Jack Smith did likewise in a 5-o victory over QPR as Swindon overcame the "Big Freeze" to maintain their promotion challenge. They hammered Colchester 6-1 and clinched promotion with a 1-0 win at home to Shrewsbury. Keith Morgan and John Trollope were everpresent, while other stars included Mike Summerbee and Bobby Woodruff.

1968/69

Don Rogers starred as Swindon Town achieved an epic League Cup and promotion "double" in 1968-69. Early pacesetters in the Third Division, they lost 1-0 at home to Watford in the title "decider" watched by 28,898 and finished runners-up on goal average. Swindon defeated Torquay 2-1. Bradford City 4-3, Blackburn 1-0, Coventry 3-o. Derby 1-o and Burnley 3-2 in the League Cup before beating Arsenal 3-1 after extra-time in the Wembley final: Peter Downsborough, Rod Thomas, John Trollope, Joe Butler, Frank Burrows, Stan Harland, Don Heath, Roger Smart, John Smith (Willie Penman), Peter Noble, Don Rogers.

1969/70

Swindon Town challenged strongly for promotion to the top-flight in 1969-70. Fred Ford replaced Danny Williams as manager and Arthur Horsfield was signed from Newcastle, starring as Swindon were among the early leaders. Peter Noble grabbed a hattrick as they beat Charlton 5-0 and maintained their promotion challenge with a 14 match unbeaten run. Swindon finished fifth in the Second Division, their highest position at the time. They also defeated Blackburn 4o, Chester 4-2 and Scunthorpe 3-1 in the FA Cup before losing 2-0 to Leeds United in the sixth round, then beat Napoli 3-o in the Anglo-Italian Cup

1979/80

Bobby Smith guided Swindon Town to the League Cup semi-finals in 1979-8o. Swindon had narrowly missed promotion the previous season and Alan Mayes scored twice in an early 4o win over Brentford. They defeated Portsmouth 3-1, Chester 2-1, Stoke City 2-1, Wimbledon 2-1 and Arsenal 4-3 in the League Cup before losing 4-3 to Wolves in the semi-finals. Andy Rowland and Alan Mayes formed an exciting partnership as Swindon gained four successive wins, then trounced Bury 8-o. They took Spurs to an FA Cup fourth round replay but finished mid-table despite signing David Peach and Glenn Cockerill.

1985/86

Swindon Town stormed to the Fourth Division title with a record 102 points in 1985-86. Lou Macari's side made a poor start in the League but defeated Sunderland and Sheffield Wednesday en route to the Milk Cup fourth round. Kenny Allen arrived from Torquay and Dave Bamber from Portsmouth as Swindon soared to the top of the table with 14 wins in 16 matches. They set a club record of 13 consecutive home victories with a 3-1 win over Burnley and clinched the title with a 1-1 draw at Mansfield. Charlie Henry and Colin Gordon scored 35 goals between them, while skipper Colin Calderwood was ever-present.

1986/87

Lou Macari plotted Swindon Town's 1986-87 Third Division play-off final triumph. Colin Gordon was sold to Wimbledon, while newcomers included Jimmy Gilligan, Mark Jones, Fraser Digby and Bristol Rovers pair Tim Parkin and Steve White. Six victories in eight games catapulted Swindon into the promotion race. then Jimmy Quinn returned from Blackburn and Phil King arrived from Torquay. They starred as Swindon gained seven straight wins and qualified for the play-offs in third position after remaining undefeated in their last 11 matches. Swindon beat Gillingham 2-0 in the play-off final replay after a 2-2 aggregate draw.

1989/90


Swindon Town won the 1989-90 Second Division play-off final but were denied top-flight status after an illegal payments scandal. Swindon had qualified for the play-offs the previous season and Ossie Ardiles replaced Lou Macari as manager. They soared into the promotion frame with seven wins in nine games including a 6-o victory over Stoke and signed David Kerslake from QPR in November. Alan McLoughlin, Duncan Shearer and Steve White starred as Swindon maintained their challenge with just one defeat in 13 matches and finished in fourth position. They defeated Sunderland 1-0 in the play off final at Wembley.

1992/93

Player-manager Glenn Hoddle was key figure in Swindon Town's 1992-First Division play-off final success. Swindon were early pacesetters and new signing Craig Maskell grabbed hat-trick in a 4-1 win over Cambridg United. They went second after a 5demolition of Notts County, then overcame a lean spell with Ross MacLaren's return inspiring a run of seven victories in nine games. Dave Mitchell netted three times in a 6-4 win at Birmingham and Swindon qualified for the play-offs in fifth position. They defeated Tranmere 5-4 on aggregate, then gained a thrilling 4-3 win over Leicester in the Wembley final.

1993/94

Assistant-boss John Gorman replaced Glenn Hoddle in charge as Swindon Town prepared for the 1993-94 Premiership campaign. New signings included Jan-Aage Fjortoft, Andy Mutch, Luc Nijholt and Adrian Whitbread, with Swindon starting with a 3-1 defeat at Sheffield United. They drew o o at Norwich but despite signing Terry Fenwick and Keith Scott, were already facing relegation by the time they managed their first win 1-0 at home to QPR in November. Swindon completed the double over OPR and also beat Southampton. Spurs and Coventry as well as drawing against Arsenal, Liverpool and Manchester United.




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
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












Following Lee Taylor's departure from York Street, I have been appointed interim first team physio, although it's not a new role for me, having worked at Luton Town, Northampton Town and Kettering Town in the past.

I joined Boston United in the summer as Centre of Excellence physio, but I've been involved a fair bit with the first team since I arrived at the club, so the step-up wasn't a problem. I actually succeeded LT as physio when he left Luton too.

On the current injures front, we don't have any major problems, touch wood. Noel Whelan has resumed training this week, only three weeks after undergoing surgery on his hernia problem and he's progressing nicely.

On the youth team front, Richard Chinn has unfortunately suffered another injury blow. He broke his fifth metatarsal on his left foot in August, but recently returned to action. However, he's opened the wound up once again in last week's FA Youth Cup match at Cogenhoe, so he's likely to miss another six weeks.

Rob Norris suffered a dead leg at Cogenhoe and missed Saturday's youth team match at Grimsby, but he's been back in training this week.

Seldom could the value of home advantage be more critical to a team cause. But given the intense-looking nature of Boston United's impending fixture list, there's every prospect that the next three weeks could be a pivotal time.

If tonight's FA Cup rematch against Swindon ends in success similar to that enjoyed by the Pilgrims the last time the sides met here (LDV Vans Trophy in 2003), it would set up an unprecedented five successive York Street fixtures. Obviously it would create a bit of a strain on United's groundstaff and probably stretch supporters' purse strings. But potentially, there could be massive gains and team progress out on the field.

The tight confines of this stadium have, down the years, worked to good effect for the Pilgrims. And although everyone accepts the tough nature of the games in prospect, the string of outings now beckoning looks mouthwatering — tonight's replay, next Wednesday's chance of LDV Vans Trophy progress (against Kidderminster), two critical League Two outings and then hopefully an FA Cup second round tie against Doncaster. What more exciting way could there be to approach the run-up to the festive period?

Of course, the worst thing United and their fans could do is simply expect home advantage to equate to guaranteed positive results. Football, I'm afraid, just doesn't work like that. Otherwise those who regularly "invest" on fixed odds coupons would be basking in the Bahamas or somewhere similar by now!

Instead, it's fingers crossed that the Pilgrims' players — who have done so well of late — can keep up their good work. A run of 12 unbeaten matches speaks volumes for itself.

Unfortunately, it wasn't loud enough for the manager of the month judges to hear when assessing the top boss accolade for October.

Traditionally, the man in charge of the club with the best statistical record, generally gets the prize. And bearing in mind Boston United had the best monthly record of all 72 Football League clubs (five wins and a draw), it beggars belief that Steve Evans hasn't got his mits on the prize.

Apparently, the award went to Leyton Orient (four wins, two draws) because the deciding factor was their win at Grimsby. Look at the Mariners' home record, though, and you'll see that only six of the division's 24 clubs have worse home territory stats and no-one has lost more times in front of their own fans! Surely, if tie-break was necessary, it should have been that the Pilgrims had also been unbeaten in the previous calendar month.

Suspicions of a hidden agenda are, needless to say, doing the rounds. At least, though, there has been recognition for one Boston connection with loanee midfielder lan Ross being voted player of the month. Well merited, indeed.

Stewart Talbot Talbot's Tales death, with no time to mount a comeback.





Simon Rusk



Swindon Town might not have known too much about Simon Rusk before the FA Cup first round fixture 10 days ago, but you can bet they were aware of him as the Pilgrims spectacularly marched into a 1-0 lead at the County Ground.

Rusk cracked home a tremendous 30yarder to give United an early lead, in a match they eventually drew 2-2, and his all-action display was one of the reasons why the Pilgrims were able to claim a replay against the League One outfit, winning many plaudits for his display along the way.

The likeable United stalwart has been impressive for the Pilgrims this season and played a key role in the 12-match run that Boston enjoyed throughout September, October and into November. United's long unbeaten run came to an end last Friday as the Pilgrims succumbed to an injury time goal against Rushden, but Rusk is backing Boston to recover quickly. He said: "It was hugely disappointing on Friday. We didn't play particularly well, although having said that, I don't feel that Rushden were great either. There was very little to choose between the sides. although Rushden perhaps did have a few more shots on goal.

"In the end though, it was just one lapse from us. We didn't close the cross down quickly enough, before the lad got a free header in on goal. It was a preventable goal, but we win as a team and lose as a team, so there was no finger-pointing in the dressing room afterwards.

"There's no time to sit and dwell on this result. We've got to get ourselves back on track tonight and there's no better competition in which to get a good result than the FA Cup. We did well to

get Hartlepool back to York Street for a replay last season, and there was very little in that replay. In fact it was Adam Boyd's deflected effort that separated the sides.

"Swindon will pose us with another tough test tonight and it's all to play for to see who will face Doncaster in round two. Doncaster are a club who've kicked on rapidly over recent years and if we can progress, that could possibly bring a sell-out to York Street, which would be fantastic."

Incidentally, Rusk made his Pilgrims' debut at Doncaster in March 2001, since going on to become the club's longestserving player with his committed and whole-hearted performances in a variety of positions. However, a place in the centre of midfield is one that suits Rusk the most and he's been delighted to appear there recently.


On the subject of personal form, the 23year-old has been pleased with his recent displays, although he admitted that a niggling injury was most unwelcome in mid-October. He added: "I don't want to harp on about it, but I always asked people to judge me when I'm playing in my favoured position, which is the middle of the park. I've been really happy with my performances since I got back into the side and I think I've held my own in midfield. Without blowing my own trumpet too much, I think this is a decent achievement. because we have an abundance of

quality in midfield at York Street, so I must be doing something right.

"I was bitterly disappointed not to start the season in the team and I told the Gaffer what I thought. In fairness though, he picks the team and I knew I had to continue working hard for my chance. Since I've been in the side, I think I've done well and I'm keen for that to continue over the remainder of the season."

Once tonight's replay has been negotiated, the Pilgrims will switch their attentions to Saturday's League Two fixture against Notts County, with United looking to seal an early "double" following their success in Nottingham on October 7. Rusk continued: "Saturday's match will be a tough game. No matter what the outcome is tonight, our last result in the league is a defeat, so we've got to get ourselves back on the winning trail. Notts County will be coming here looking to avenge their defeat against us a few weeks ago, so we must be on our guard.

"Looking back on it now, it was a bizarre night I suppose. We got two early goals, with Jockey scoring inside a minute and then County gifting us an own goal. Then we had two players sent off to set up a really nervy ending, but eventually held on to win 2-1. A repeat scoreline would do nicely on Saturday, although hopefully I won't end up in goal this time! We'll leave that sort of thing to Nathan with a bit of luck!"



Welcome to this evening's FA Cup replay against Swindon Town.

With this column being my first set of programme notes, I think I should first of all comment on our elimination from the FA Youth Cup against Cogenhoe United last week, in levelling conditions at Compton Park. I was disappointed, but the positive point for me was that an under-16s player, Prajwal Adhikari, stepped up and acquitted himself with credit.

I would like to introduce Neil Thorpe, who has been appointed to look after the youth team, initially until the end of the season. He's an ex-Aston Villa trainee and I've known Neil for a while, so therefore I'm confident that he is well-qualified to do a good job here at York Street. Neil will be working day-to-day with the scholars and I look forward to working very closely with him in the Centre of Excellence set-up.

We have short, medium and long-term aims for the Centre in the hope of developing homegrown players, who have an affinity to their team and football club. The Gaffer has been very supportive and is keen to encourage the development of youth and has given us a wide, yet challenging remit to bring through players for this football club.

Meanwhile, we're currently looking at appointing an under-16s coach and we've approached a couple of prospective candidates. In the meantime, I will carry on looking after this age group until I find a suitable replacement. The under-16s in

particular, is an important age group and these players need to be handled carefully.

The Football League inspectors were with us last week and the feedback was positive. We hope to continue fostering good relations with the Football League and the FA and the Football League actually visit quarterly, so let's hope for another good report next time around.

I would also like to thank Boston Grammar School and in particular head of PE Nigel Wainwright for their support since I've taken the job. We have used their facilities on a number of occasions and I thank BGS for their continued backing of the youth development policy here at York Street.

Another addition to our staff recently has been physio Richie Barnes, who has joined us with Julie Frost currently acting as interim first team physio. Richie will provide physio cover for the youth team and Centre of Excellence age groups. He's with us for initially one month and I welcome him aboard.

On a final note, I would like to thank our youth administrator Emma Rayner, who has been a huge help to me since I was given the job permanently. Her help on the admin side has been invaluable.



Boston United were knocked off the FA Youth Cup trail last night on Thursday, courtesy of a disappointing 2-1 defeat at the hands of non-league side Cogenhoe United.

The Pilgrims scored first through Miles Hunter on 35 minutes, but the home side clawed back the deficit and eventually when on to lead 2-1 at half-time, in a game of few chances. There was indeed some debate as to whether Cogenhoe's second goal had crossed the line, but the assistant referee awarded it, despite struggling to see through a group of bodies at the far post.

In the dying moments, Tom Hurst had a header heroically cleared off the line, while substitute James Needham blasted an effort just wide from 20 yards. However, the Pilgrims could have no complaints about their defeat and Cogenhoe booked a second round tie against Southport in round two.

Midfielder Richard Chinn was a first half casualty with a foot injury, and his substitution necessitated a reshuffle, with Hunter joining Rob Norris up front and Stuart King reverting to midfield. After the break, under-16s striker Prajwal Adhikari was introduced into the action and was a shining light on an otherwise dull night for the Pilgrims in Northamptonshire.

A few days earlier, Hull City had proved too strong for United's youth team on at RAF Cranwell. The Pilgrims were beaten 4-2, despite late goals from Norris and King as they began the post-Neil Richardson era with another defeat. United began badly and found themselves trailing 2-0 at half-time, thanks to a brace of own goals.

Captain Hurst sliced a miscued clearance into his own net, before King doubled the lead with another wayward defensive header from 18 yards. The Pilgrims' woes were compounded when midfielder James Bennett added two second half goals. However, United rallied and Norris cut the deficit with a fine goal, before King produced a good closerange finish following extended Boston pressure on the visitors' goal. But it was far too little, too late as the Pilgrims slipped to a fifth straight Youth Alliance defeat.

And five successive defeats became six when an under-strength United lost 6-1 at Grimsby Town on Saturday morning. An own goal accounted for the Pilgrims' strike, with Norris, Chinn, Jamie Stevens and Lewis Brooks all missing from the squad.

The Pilgrims are scheduled to return to action on Saturday when they travel to face Mansfield Town in a rearranged fixture at Highfields in Nottingham. It will be the first time that the sides have met in competitive action, as they were in different divisions last season. New under-18s manager Neil Thorpe will be hoping to halt the losing run and record his first victory as youth team boss.









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




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


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
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Inside View

Why do some football fans leave matches early? It is a question that always baffles me and dawned on me again at Hillsborough a week ago.

I had travelled to watch Sheffield Wednesday play Cardiff City in the Championship and with 10 minutes to go, thousands of Wednesday fans started to filter out of the ground as their side trailed 3-1.


It was hard to believe that so many fans deserted the ground with the home side pressing hard for a route back into the match, although admittedly still two goals behind. It set my mind back to some classic Pilgrims' encounters, with two particular matches standing out.

The Conference-winning season of 2001-2002 witnessed two such encounters. The Pilgrims trailed Doncaster Rovers 2-0 at York Street going into stoppage time in September 2001. But Daryl Clare popped up with two late, late goals to seal an unlikely comeback for United and demonstrate in the process that a match isn't over until the full-time whistle has blown.

This fact was illustrated even further when the Pilgrims travelled to Southport in April 2002. Trailing 2-0 just after half-time, United rallied and got the game back to 2-1. The equaliser duly arrived in stoppage time, before Shaun Teale memorably headed into his own net to cap another great comeback and prove that miracles can happen.

On the flipside, United's 2-1 debut at AFC Bournemouth in the club's debut Football League season saw a role reversal for United. Leading thanks to Mark Angel's 25-yard stunner, the Pilgrims conceded twice in added time to lose a game they should have won.

Tonight's encounter provides the Pilgrims with another chance to progress to round two of this season's FA Cup and a potentially mouth-watering tie against Doncaster Rovers. The first match against Swindon was not a classic, but one which I believe we should



have

won. Unfortunately the late equaliser denied the Pilgrims an outright passage into round two, but if a 2-2 scoreline had been offered beforehand, we would have taken it.

The magic of the cup is still very much alive and the game between Chasetown and Oldham was the proverbial "David v Goliath" match-up. Former Pilgrim Andy Turner is now assistant manager at Chasetown and he emerged as a second half substitute as the non-league minnows held the Football League big-boys to a draw and subsequent replay.

Elsewhere, tonight signals the start of four home games in 10 days, and possibly five in 17 if victory is secured for the Pilgrims this evening. It promises to be a hugely important spell of action, so keep up your excellent support. And remember, if your team is losing tonight with 10 minutes to go, stick with it, because you never know what might happen!



The 21-year-old striker capped a superb debut performance by grabbing the Pilgrims' giant-killing winner in the dying seconds of an entertaining LDV Vans Trophy first round tie against Second Division promotion chasers Swindon Town.

Visitors' boss Andy King made several alterations to his regular squad which he admitted in post-match interviews probably played a part in the overall result. But that was of no consequence to Neil Thompson and his resilient Pilgrims' squad. Minus the services of numerous regulars for genuine reasons, Thommo had little option other than naming the side which took to the field. But the players did him — and the club — proud with an all-action display and an ultimately deserved victory.


It was a lively encounter, but surprisingly took the best part of 15 minutes to spark into action with Akinfenwa's pass finding Simon Weatherstone who fired just too high. However, in the 16th minute, United broke through when Mark Angel (again in purposeful form all night) delivered a fine free-kick and Lee BEEVERS headed in unmarked. Swindon battled hard to try and find a way back with lively strikers Jon Stevenson and Brian Howard frequently testing the home rearguard. But Boston hit back and it was only the agility of Town keeper Bart Griemink that prevented Weatherstone from doubling the home lead.

However, Swindon made full use of that escape by netting a 31st minute equaliser when Steve ROBINSON stabbed home through a crowded six-yard box following a cutback from the promising Seb Ruster after the Boston defence had failed to fully clear their lines.

Once again the Pilgrims replied with close calls for Angel, Weatherstone and Akinfenwa while at the other end. Swindon also missed out when openings arrived for Robinson and Stevenson, Early in the second half Weatherstone and Ruster exchanged further untaken chances and then in the 60th minute Ruster created space down the right and crossed for Stevenson to head straight at Paul Bastock, It nearly proved a costly miss as, from an ensuing breakaway, Angel's cross from the left split the Town rearguard and fell for Weatherstone eight yards out. But Griemink somehow threw himself full length to deflect away the United man's snapshot.

Remarkably, Griemink almost turned scorer moments later when a huge punt down field took a wicked bounce just outside the United box and forced Bastock to back-pedal and tip over at the expense of a corner. Once again in an ebb-and-flow encounter, Boston hit back and Griemink saved well from an Angel free-kick and then Adrian Viveash had to hack away from a dangerous centre by lively home substitute Scott Brough.

Then just as the tie seemed destined for extra time, up popped the forceful presence of **AKINFENWA** to jubilantly net Boston's winner with the clock ticking into stoppage time. He managed to hook the ball home from six yards after Brough had fired over a low cross after running on to a neatly threaded pass by Angel.



WHAT'S THE GROUND LIKE?

On one side of the ground is the impressive looking Frank Adams Stand, opened in 1996. This was named in memory of the man who originally donated to the club their previous ground at Loakes Park. It is a large two-tiered stand, complete with a row of executive boxes and it dwarfs the rest of the stadium. The other three stands are smaller affairs, but are at least all covered. Only the Valley Stand at the home end remains as terracing. Opposite is the Dreams Stand, housing away supporters, a medium sized single tiered stand, with windshields to either side. Along the other side of the ground is the Seymour Taylor Main Stand. This single liered stand has a raised seating area, meaning that fans access it by (limbing a small set of stairs in front of

Ion Wood adds: "As the local council have stipulated that the capacity of the Causeway Stadium cannot rise above to.ooo, the additional seats have meant that certain areas of terracing, such as the paddock area of the Seymour Taylor Stand, have been made "out of bounds" to fans." The ground is currently shared with Wasps Rugby Club.

WHAT IS IT LIKE FOR VISITING SUPPORTERS?

Away fans are mostly located at one end of the ground in the Dreams Stand, where just over 2,000 supporters can be accommodated. I personally had an enjoyable day at Wycombe. The club has a relaxed triendly feel about it. The ground is situated in a nice setting with a wooded hill overlooking the ground (this normally has a small contingent of supporters watching the game for nothing) and with green fields surrounding the other sides. The

standard football ground fare of burgers (£2,30), pies (£2), pasties and hot dogs are available from the refreshments area.

David Abbott a visiting Northampton
Town supporter informs me: "I have to
say what an excellent ground the
Causeway Stadium is. Good
signposting around the ground, good
organisation, good atmosphere,
excellent view from the away end and
friendly fans. It was a very pleasant
visit and if all grounds and supporters
were as welcoming and well-behaved
as Wycombe the game would be all the
better for it."

Toby Hillier a visiting Brentford fan adds: "The ground is absolutely splendid and set in wonderful surroundings. Although the atmosphere was pretty flat on my visit. the beating of a drum in the home end often rallied the home fans behind the team. The home fans are a friendly bunch and all of the staff that we encountered were also very friendly. You can park at the ground itself. however it is a nightmare trying to get out at the end of the game. It took us 50 minutes to do the two miles back to the motorway. My suggestion would be to park a mile or so away from the ground and walk. This should provide you with a quicker route away from the

WHERE TO DRINK?

As the ground is on the edge of an industrial estate, there aren't many pubs around. Neil Young informs me: "The nearest pub to the Causeway Stadium, is the Hourglass in Sands (about a 15-minute walk, from the end of the road up to the ground). Away fans are normally okay in small groups except for big games or local derbies." Martin Redfern a visiting Scunthorpe United informs me: "we arrived early

at the ground and were able to go into the Supporters Club at the ground, which cost £2 to enter. The club is one of the suites at the far end of the Main Stand. It was a spacious room with two bars and food. The atmosphere was extremely relaxed and friendly with both home and away supporters." Joe McKenna adds: "A marquee has been erected behind the away end, which contains a bar serving draught beers. It has been specifically provided for away supporters."

HOW TO GET THERE BY CAR AND WHERE TO PARK

The stadium is located on the outskirts of Wycombe on the Sands Industrial Estate. Leave the M40 at Junction four and take the A4010 towards Aylesbury. Turn left at the fourth roundabout into Lane End Road and then continue straight down this road. Cross another roundabout and into Hillbottom Road. The ground is down at the very bottom of this road. On my last visit, I noticed that there were a number of AA road signs labelled "London Wasps" which were helpful in pointing the way to the ground.

There is a fair sized car park located at the ground which costs £3 per car, or some of the industrial units provide match day parking (also at around £3). As there is only one road that leads from the stadium, I have heard that it can be a nightmare leaving the official car park at full-time. I would recommend therefore, parking in one of the industrial units that line Hillbottom Road towards the ground. I did this and got away all right.







FA Cup: 125 years old

This is a very special year for The FA Cup — the competition has reached its 125th anniversary in better health than ever.

The FA has recognised this unique achievement by giving the competition a new logo incorporating the 125 figure which will be used throughout the season. The magic and heritage of The Cup remains a fantastic and attractive prospect to millions across the globe. Each year minnows are pitted against giants; there are shock wins and high drama.

And the tournament will return to its spiritual home in 2006. The final is set to open the magnificent new 90,000-seat Wembley Stadium. The FA Cup is the oldest and most prestigious domestic cup competition in the world. The first competition in 1871-72 had 15 entries with Wanderers beating Royal Engineers 1-0 at Kennington Oval. Last year Arsenal beat Manchester United in a dramatic penalty shootout.

Domestically, The FA Cup is prospering — last year's television figures were some of the best ever and 674 teams this year entered the competition, a new record. Internationally it remains huge — last year's final was watched by over 300 million people worldwide and this year the global interest will be even higher with 169 countries receiving the match for broadcasting.

Already records have been broken. As well as the record 674 entries there was an extraordinary 31 penalty kick shootouts in the preliminary round, the first all-Asian teams played in the competition and a father and son officiated in the same match.

There have been great final moments throughout the history of the competition from the 1923 White Horse Final through to Jimmy Montgomery's double save for Sunderland in 1973 and the fastest ever goal scored by Roberto Di Matteo in 1997. A special ceremony will commence before the Final this season with great players

from past and present in attendance as well as an amazing array of dignitaries and VIPs. The FA's new honorary president Prince William is expected to attend as guest of honour.

FA chief executive Brian Barwick has attended almost every round of The Cup since August and is looking forward to the first round proper. "I've had a fantastic time visiting all manner of different grounds this season and I'm looking forward to it continuing in November," he said.


"It is important to remember that the road to Wembley does not just start in November but at the extra-preliminary round back in August. Hundreds of teams turned out and those still in the competition at this stage have now played six games and earned themselves over £20,000.

"I've met many members of the football family through The FA Cup and witnessed some excellent games. As last year and this season so far have showed, it has lost none of its sparkle and neither has the trophy!"

The original trophy, much smaller than the present one, was made by Messrs Martin, Hall and Co and cost £20. In 1895, after Aston Villa had won the competition, The Cup was stolen from the window of a firm of football outfitters in Birmingham where it had been placed on display. It has never been recovered.

The present trophy, played for since 1992, is the competition's fourth and an exact replica of the third.

Manchester United have won The Cup the most times (10), followed by Arsenal and Tottenham Hotspur (eight). In all, 42 different clubs have won it.




Also short-listed for the October award were David Challinor of Bury, Rickie Lambert of Rochdale and Wycombe Wanderers's Kevin Betsy.

The Powerade Awards panel, chaired by Sky Sports pundit and Coca-Cola ambassador Chris Kamara, made the decision. The panel also includes Jack Taylor from the Football League, who refereed the 1974 World Cup final, Paul Hetherington, chairman of the Football Writers Association and Malcolm Clarke, chairman of the Football Supporters Federation.

Pilgrims' manager Steve Evans was delighted to hear the news. He added: "From the first minute we saw Ian Ross play, we knew if we got him on loan, he could prove to be a more than useful acquisition. Each and every one of the players in the dressing room loves to have him around and what a superb accolade this is for Boston United at such an early stage of this club's Football League life."



Coca Cola LEAGUE 2 News

Bristol Rovers have named Paul Trollope as first-team coach and Lennie Lawrence as their new director of football in a managerial shake-up at the Memorial Stadium. The 33-year-old Trollope has been caretaker boss since Ian Atkins was sacked in September and in that time has guided Rovers to four league and cup wins.



Former Welsh international Trollope (above) told BBC Radio Bristol he was relishing the chance to team up with Lawrence, commenting: "It's a great opportunity. It's going to be perfect to work with someone with such vast experience. I'm not the finished article by any means but I feel I have got something to give and it feels natural to me."

Lawrence was equally upbeat about his new role, insisting he was there to advise his younger colleague, and not interfere in team selection. He added: "Paul has the makings of a good coach and possibly a manager too. I've backed myself to bring the best out of him. Paul will pick the team, and be responsible for tactics the matchday stuff. I'd like to do some of the coaching, but he will have the final say on things.'

Lawrence's director of football role will see him evaluate the entire football structure of the club. including contracts, scouting, the centre of excellence and the youth and first-team squads. The former Charlton and Cardiff boss was convinced the new set-up will give Rovers the best possible chance of climbing out of League Two. "This is a League One club that's in League Two and if we got everything right it could get to the Championship and stay there," he said. "But it's going to take a while to do that. This club has potential but we've got to realise it sooner rather than later. I believe in directors of football, and I think half the clubs in the Football League should have one."

Rovers chairman Geoff Dunford was thrilled with the double appointment. He added: "When we spoke to Lennie he had grasped the situation at this club and told us what we needed. He'd taken time to find out about Paul and his career too and Paul has showed he is very mature and professional and is a first rate coach. You've got to get the right people together because a director of football hasn't worked at some clubs, but both men are comfortable with their positions. I'm sure they will be a great team. We have a three to five year plan to get into the Championship."

Mansfield Town have appointed Peter Shirtliff as their manager on a permanent basis.

Former assistant boss Shirtliff, 44, was initially appointed caretaker manager following Carlton Palmer's resignation in September and Mansfield slipped to the foot of the table with only one win in five matches after Palmer's departure. However, a massive upturn in fortunes has seen the Stags climb away from the foot of the table and enjoy good victories in the Carling Cup and FA Cup.

Elsewhere in League Two. Wycombe Wanderers have signed Everton goalkeeper lain Turner on a month's loan. The Scottish under-21 international player, who joined Everton from Stirling Albion in January 2003, should stay at the Causeway until December 10, meaning he could play against the Pilgrims on December 6. He had a loan spell at Chester last season, helping them win promotion back to the Football League, which earned him a long-term deal at Goodison Park.

Meanwhile, Wycombe have signed Bristol City defender Richard Keogh on a month's loan. The 19-year-old former Stoke City defender was released by the Potters before becoming City's lifth summer signing. However, the Republic of Ireland under-21 player has been restricted to mostly reserve team appearances.

























Bury boss Chris Casper has recruited teenage Sheffield Wednesday striker Danny Reet on a month's loan. The 18-year-old clinched a temporary move to Gigg Lane after scoring for the Shakers' reserves. On the outgoings front, Burton Albion have signed Bury utility man Jake Sedgemore on a month's loan. The 27-year-old has started just four games for the Shakers since Joining from Shrewsbury in the summer, scoring just once in an LDV Vans Trophy match at Halifax Town.

Lincoln City's appeal over Dean Keates' sending-off against Milton Keynes Dons in the FA Cup has been rejected by the Football Association. The 27-year-old midfielder was dismissed by referee Michael Jones in the closing stages of the 1-1 draw. Jones deemed that Keates' challenge on Dons' substitute Gary Smith was worthy of a straight red card. Keates, who joined the Imps from Kidderminster in the summer, will now serve a three-match ban.

And goalkeeper Andy Woodman is expected to be on the sidelines for two to three months with a torn Achilles tendon. Woodman suffered the injury in the 2-1 defeat against Barnet. The 34-year-old fell awkwardly under a challenge from striker Liam Hatch after just seven minutes.

In a final piece of news from Nene Park, Rushden boss Barry Hunter hopes to sign on-loan midfielder Ashley Nicholls (below) on a permanent basis when the transfer window re-opens. Nicholls has completed a three-month loan spell at Nene Park and goes back to Cambridge United. However, Hunter is keen to bring back the 24-year-old as soon as possible.






