

First away win for Iffy Onuora's battlers

LAST weekend's 1-0 victory at Rotherham United was a rare highlight for League One strugglers Swindon Town, writes the Advertiser's Carl Marsden.

That welcome win saw the Robins leapfrog Bristol City to move off the bottom of the table for the first time since September 24, when their dismal run cost former manager Andy King his job.

After finishing in 12th spot last term, King lost several prized talents during the summer including Matt Heywood and Grant Smith (Bristol City), Sammy Igoe (Millwall) and 24-goal striker Sam Parkin (Ipswich Town). To fill Parkin's boots, he recruited Bolton youngster Ricky Shakes and experienced Queens Park Rangers pair Tony Thorpe and Jamie Cureton

Inow on-loan at Colchester United).

Defenders Jack Smith (Watford),
Charlie Comyn-Platt (Bolton) plus
midfield men Nicky Nicolau
(Southend United) and Gareth Whalley
(Wigan Athletic) were also drafted in
to bolster the backbone of the side in
'keeper Rhys Evans, defender Sean
O'Hanlon and hitman Rory Fallon.
An opening-day 2-0 defeat at
Barnsley, followed by Latics' 3-2 win
at the County Ground three days later.

Despite subsequent home wins over Nottingham Forest and Yeovil, Swindon then lost seven consecutive league games prompting King's departure.

provided portents of serious trouble

ahead.

Heavily shackled by the club's continuing financial problems both he and his successor, Iffy Onuora, have placed faith in loan signings to spark a change.

Manchester United first allowed goalkeeper Tom Heaton and striker Colin Heath to sign on three-month deals and they have since been followed by defender Patrick Collins (Sheffield Wednesday), midfielders Neale McDermott (Fulham) and Aaron Brown (QPR), plus strikers Hameur Bouazza (Watford) and Petr Mikolanda (West Ham).

Improvement under Onuora was initially slow but his side had lost just one and drawn four in six league games before last weekend's gutsy win at Millmoor.

That smash-and-grab performance was Swindon's first away win and came despite four first-team regulars – Andy Gurney, Steve Jenkins, Sean O'Hanlon and Jerel Ifil – being suspended.

That necessitated drastic changes with Brazilian midfielder Stefani Miglioranzi dropping deep alongside centre-backs Patrick Collins and Charlie Comyn Platt in a 3-5-2 formation.

And thanks to several players operating out of position - plus goalkeeping heroics from Rhys Evans - Town did enough to hang on to Rory Fallon's 11th goal of the season and complete the double over the Millers. Delighted boss Onuora believes that victory could yet prove to be a turning point in their battle against the drop. "Getting off the bottom was a big incentive, but I am looking at the points more than the position," he said.

"The lads have given themselves a platform from which to build. Hopefully it will be important to our season."



Everyone builds it up as a sixpointer when you're playing a team near you in the table, but we stood up to the task well. Psychologically it was a big boost to get off the bottom of the table.

Swindon are unbeaten in four league games away from home, including draws at Brentford. Huddersfield Town and Port Vale. How do you explain that improvement?

The boys have worked hard and they believe we're better than our league position. Some of our better performances have been on the road, perhaps because there's a bit more anxiety at home.

How confident are you of staying up and why?

I'm confident because we've played most of the teams in this division and I've yet to see an outstanding team. The division is very open and anyone can beat anyone else.

> We've played okay at times without getting results.

Swindon reached the play-offs the season before last. What's gone wrong?

The team that Andy King had in the play-offs were all at the right age, with two players (Sam Parkin and Tommy Mooney] who scored 20plus goals a season.

They're not here now so that's been a big factor. It's been a little bit of a rebuilding job, with a lot of young players.

The ROBINS

Bristol City also reached the playoffs in 2003-04; Gillingham and Rotherham were Championship clubs last season. How surprised are you by their results?

I don't really pay too much attention to other clubs, but they've all changed their managers and it does take time.

How much pressure is the club under financially and how does that affect your job?

The financial constraints impact on everything you do in terms of bringing players in, staying away overnight and so on, but you know that and you get on with it. We're similar to a lot of other clubs, but the fans are probably a bit more aware of the situation because of the history of administration here.

What are you expecting from Oldham today?

I expect a tough game. They're our rivals because they're in the wrong half of the table.

And finally, what do you think of the so-called Magic Roundabout, that series of mini-roundabouts in Swindon?

As far as I'm aware, I had no say in the planning of that roundabout. It can get a bit hairy at times!

FORMER England U21
international Rhys Evans
remains first-choice after agreeing
a new one-year contract last
summer. Swindon-born, the 23year-old signed from Chelsea in
summer 2003 after being
released despite impressing onloan at Bristol Rovers, Queens
Park Rangers and Leyton Orient.
Tall, confident and a competent

handler of the ball, the 6ft 1in custodian remains a fine shot-stopper with undoubted potential.

On-loan Tom Heaton, 19, has joined from Manchester United until January 1, 2006 in a deal that could be yet extended for the rest of the season. After agreeing the initial switch in August, the Chester-born youngster held down the Number One slot until recently being dropped after he was sent-off in conceding a penalty at Boston United.

Former youth team 'keeper Matt Bulman, 19, was handed a chance to stake his first-team claims pre-season but has made just one substitute appearance so far.

DEFENDERS

ON-LOAN Sheffield Wednesday defender Patrick Collins, 20, was recalled to the first-team last week. The versatile player prefers the rightback position but usually operates in central defence. A former Sunderland youth product, he is highly-rated by the Hillsborough coaching staff. Full-back Jack Smith can be deployed on either flank and is predominantly right-footed. The 22-year-old made a handful of starts for Watford last term - including becoming a penalty shootout hero in the Carling Cup win over Sheffield United - before agreeing a switch to the County Ground in July. Strong and pacy centre-back Jerel Ifil is another ex-Watford trainee. The 23year-old was a £70,000 signing in August 2004 and has impressed with his tireless tackling and excellent man-marking attributes. After starting just ten league games at Vicarage Road, he was previously loaned to Huddersfield and then Swindon three times

Skipper Sean O'Hanlon was a £150,000 signing from Everton in January 2004 following a loan stint. Southport-born, the 22-year-old can operate in central defence or at right-back. A tough and uncompromising figure, he has attracted interest from several higher league clubs.

Former Bolton centre-back Charlie Comyn-Platt, 20, signed after being released from his contract this summer. Manchester-born, he had failed to make the senior squad breakthrough at the Reebok but gained first-team experience onloan at Wycombe.

Andy Gurney is back on-loan back at his former club from Swansea City. The 31-year-old is an ex-Bristol Rovers apprentice who enjoyed moves to Torquay and Reading (£100,000) before spending three years with the Robins. He joined Swansea in September 2004 before a centraldefensive crisis prompted his return. Vastly-experienced Steve Jenkins, 33, is a former Welsh international rightback, A one-time Swansea City trainee, Huddersfield Town paid £275,000 for him in 1995 and he subsequently also represented Cardiff City, Notts County and Peterborough United

Left-back Andrew Nicholas, 22, has forced himself back into the first-team scene under new boss Iffy Onuora. The 2003 capture from Liverpool endured a disappointing campaign that saw him farmed out on-loan to lan Rush's Chester City last term. A tall and pacy player, he also possesses an excellent long throw.

Defensive cover is completed by Kyle Lapham, the 19-year-old Youth Team Player of the Year, and veteran Alan Reeves, 38, who coaches the reserves.

MIDFIELDERS

SUMMER signing Nicky Nicolau, 22, has just returned to training following hernia surgery.

The left-sided midfielder, who also recently had a knee problem, has endured a nightmare time since moving from Southend United. A one-time Arsenal trainee, he has only figured once so far under new boss Iffy Onuora.

Gareth Whalley signed after his one-year deal at Wigan Athletic expired in July The 32-year-old.

one-year deal at Wigan Athletic expired in July. The 32-year-old central midfielder is a skilful player who came through the Crewe youth system. A £600,000 move to Bradford followed in 1998 before a two-year stint with Cardiff City.

Michael Pook, 19, is a strongrunning youth product able to play anywhere across the middle. After making three starts last term the local lad has stepped up to become a virtual first-team

ever-present this season.

AARON Brown is desperate to make a big impression during his one-month spell on-loan at Swindon.

The 25-year-old midfielder has temporarily joined from Queens Park Rangers and hopes to secure a permanent move after learning that his Loftus Road contract will not be renewed in January. A left winger by trade, he spent much of last term recovering from a broken leg and was sent to Torquay United on-loan to regain match fitness towards the end of the campaign. His career had started out at hometown club Bristol Rovers where he made more than 150 appearances, prompting Ian Holloway to snap him up on a free transfer in January 2004. But with first-team competition restricting him to just one league start for Rangers this term, Brown recently spent a month with Cheltenham before opting to join Town ahead of last

Ricky Shakes, 20, signed this summer from Bolton after netting twice in a four-game loan stint at Bury. Brixton-born, he can operate up front or wide on the right and uses his pace to unsettle defenders.

Right-sided forward Junior Mendes, joined from Mansfield Town in summer 2004 and prefers cutting in from wide positions After a slow start to his career, he suddenly hit form with six goals in as many games last term before falling behind Pawel Abbott in the pecking order. Pacy and a natural finisher, he has also played for Carlisle, Dunfermline, Plymouth, Rushden and Diamonds, and St Mirren. Also capped by Montserrat at international level, he celebrates his 29th birthday next Thursday.

CZECH U21 international striker Petr Mikolanda recently signed a one-month loan deal. The 21-year joined West Ham United this summer from Viktoria Zizkow after a successful trial but is yet to make a start for the Hammers. He recently also had a spell with Northampton, playing against Macclesfield, Norwich and Cheltenham, before injury curtailed his stay.

Frenchman Hameur Bouazza, 20, is on-loan from Watford. Pacy, skilful and strong he can operate down the left or as an out-and-out striker. A dislocated shoulder hampered his opportunities last term but he has already made 16 first-team starts at Vicarage Road. Although sometimes criticised for his reluctance to shoot, he netted a smart equaliser at Port Vale last month. Colin Heath is on a three-month loan deal from Manchester United. The 21year-old spent last term developing in the reserves after a stint with Belgian club Royal Antwerp. A five-game loan spell with Cambridge United then ended goalless but he has netted twice for Swindon to date.

Experienced Tony Thorpe struggled to hit QPR's first-team last term and opted to move to Wiltshire this summer. The 31-year-old ex-Luton trainee has bagged more than 160 goals in spells with Fulham (£800,000), Bristol City (£1 million), Reading and Rotherham (both loan).

Striker

CHRISTIAN Roberts marked his Swindon Town debut last season by scoring his first goal for his new club in their 1-0 defeat of the Latics at the County Ground. A former Welsh U21 international, the player had ironically been linked with a move to Boundary Park just days before as Brian Talbot looked to bolster his firepower.

After starting out as a trainee with hometown club Cardiff City in 1997, Roberts made just six first-team starts for the Bluebirds before being allowed to join Exeter City on a free transfer in July 2000. His subsequent tally of 18 goals in 67 appearances at St James' Park then prompted Bristol City to make their move in March 2002. In his first full season at Ashton Gate, the player twice hit the net against his boyhood favourites Cardiff in the league but couldn't repeat the feat against them in the play-off semi-final.

Although mainly used from the substitutes' bench the following term, Roberts again came good when it mattered: netting a late goal to take City through to the play-off final but costing himself the chance of a full Welsh cap in the process.



That promotion bid ultimately failed again and, following the dismissal of manager Danny Wilson, Roberts opted to join Swindon in October 2004. A pacy and direct front-man, only a lack of awareness and fitness problems have prevented him from fulfilling his true potential.

LEADING scorer Rory Fallon's current tally of eleven strikes is no mean feat given Swindon's woes this term.

Fallon had signed from Barnsley in November 2003 for a £60,000 fee after putting in several impressive performances against the Robins The 23-year-old started out as an Dakwell trainee and was just breaking into the first-team picture after a loan spell with Shrewsbury Town when a foot injury pushed him back down the pecking order. A bustling centre forward, with a good touch on the deck, he causes defenders problems with his physical

Did You Know?

Swindon remains one of the fastest growing UK towns and has relatively low unemployment in its population of about 180,000.

The Domesday Book refers to the original Saxon settlement of Swindon as Suindune, which literally means 'pig hill' as it sits atop a limestone hill.

The Wiltshire & Berkshire, and the North Wiltshire canals accelerated growth in the 19th century but the most significant impact came in 1840 when Isambard Kingdom Brunel chose Swindon to house a major railway works for the Great Western Railway. That industry remained the major local employers around the late 1970s when Honda swept in.

Local landmarks include the 'Magic Roundabout' (subject of a song by local group XTC), The 'Oasis' Leisure Centre (which inspired Noel Gallagher to use the name for his band),

use the name for his band), Broome Manor Golf Complex, and the National Monuments Record Centre.



SIX OF THE BEST...

Football historian LEIGH EDWARDS selects Six Swindon Town 'Classic Campaigns' from 60 post-war seasons.

1968/69

Don Rogers starred as Swindon Town achieved an epic League Cup and promotion 'double' in 1968/69, Early pace-setters in the Third Division, they lost 1-0 at home to Watford in the title 'decider' watched by 28,898 and finished runners-up on goal average. Swindon defeated Torquay 2-1, Bradford City 4-3, Blackburn 1-0, Coventry 3-0, Derby 1-0 and Burnley 3-2 in the League Cup before beating Arsenal 3-1 after extra-time in the Wembley final: Peter Downsborough, Rod Thomas, John Trollope, Joe Butler, Frank Burrows, Stan Harland, Don Heath, Roger Smart, John Smith (Willie Penman), Peter Noble, Don Rogers.

1985/86

Swindon Town stormed to the Fourth Division title with a record 102 points in 1985/86. Lou Macari's side made a poor start in the League but defeated Sunderland and Sheffield Wednesday en route to the Milk Cup fourth round. Kenny Allen arrived from Torquay and Dave Bamber from Portsmouth as Swindon soared to the top of the table with 14 wins in 16 matches. They set a club record of 13 consecutive home victories with a 3-1 win over Burnley and clinched the title with a 1-1 draw at Mansfield. Charlie Henry and Colin Gordon scored 35 goals between them, while skipper Colin Calderwood was ever-present.

1986/87

Lou Macari plotted Swindon Town's 1986/87 Third Division play-off final triumph, Colin Gordon was sold to Wimbledon, while newcomers included Jimmy Gilligan, Mark Jones, Fraser Digby and Bristol Rovers pair Tim Parkin and Steve White. Six victories in eight games catapulted Swindon into the promotion race, then Jimmy Quinn returned from Blackburn and Phil King arrived from Torquay. They starred as Swindon gained seven straight wins and qualified for the play-offs in third position after remaining undefeated in their last 11 matches. Swindon beat Gillingham 2-0 in the play-off final replay after a 2-2 aggregate draw.

1989/90

Swindon Town won the 1989/90 Second Division play-off final but were denied top-flight status after an illegal payments scandal. Swindon had qualified for the play-offs the previous season and Ossie Ardiles replaced Lou Macari as manager. They soared into the promotion frame with seven wins in nine games including a 6-0 victory over Stoke and signed David Kerstake from QPR in November, Alan McLoughlin, Duncan Shearer and Steve White starred as Swindon maintained their challenge with just one defeat in 13 matches and finished in Jourth position. They defeated Sunderland 1-0 in the play-off final at Wembley.


1992/93

Player-manager Glenn Hoddle was a key figure in Swindon Town's 1992/93 First Division play-off final success. Swindon were early pace-setters and new signing Craig Maskell grabbed a hat-trick in a 4-1 win over Cambridge United. They went second after a 5-1 demolition of Notts County, then overcame a lean spell with Ross MacLaren's return inspiring a run of seven victories in nine games. Dave Mitchell netted three times in a 6-4 win at Birmingham and Swindon qualified for the play-offs in fifth position. They defeated Tranmere 5-4 on aggregate, then gained a thrilling 4-3 win over Leicester in the Wembley final.

1995/94

Swindon Town stormed to the Second Division title under player-boss Steve McMahon in 1995/96. They had plummeted from the Premiership to Second Division and newcomers included Wayne Allison, Steve Finney and Mark Seagraves. Swindon were early leaders, winning seven of their first nine games, and Kevin Hortock netted a hat-trick in a 4-1 victory at Bristol Rovers. They remained in pole position and took Southampton to an FA Cup lifth round reptay, Ian Culverhouse and Mark Robinson were ever-present, while leading scorer Wayne Allison and Shaun Taylor also starred as they won the title by nine points.



"I have been reasonably pleased with the way I have done and hopefully I can stay in the team and keep improving as I learn my trade.

"I haven't escaped the injury curse when I had stitches in my knee and missed a few matches, but I am grateful to be playing every week and to the manager for having the faith in keeping picking me." And Paolo Maldini is one of my favourite players and to achieve what he has done in 21 years at the club is fantastic as well as appearing in four finals of the World Cup. I like Italian football and it is probably the best defensive league in the

9 TELEVISION PROGRAMME - It was Max and Paddy's Road to nowhere which was hitarious and I couldn't stop laughing. I also like Only Fools and Horses and even though they have been re-run many times I still find them as amusing as ever.







The missus goes on at me about it, but I'm afraid I'm not very big on housework.







Luke BECKETT

Luke Beckett missed the first eight games of the season and is currently confined to the bench but he still roared out the defiant message: Don't write me off.

The 28-year-old striker insisted: "I will wait for my chance – and take it when it comes." Beckett's capture on a season-long loan from Sheffield United was hailed as a masterstroke by boss Ronnie Moore.

Here was a player with a reputation for scoring goals for fun with 20 a season well within his capabilities. But he picked up a knee injury and didn't have the pre-season he wanted. He has since had six starts but the hitman who has a goal ratio of almost one very other game could only once find the target. Beckett admitted: "To say I am disappointed is an understatement.

"But there have been better players than me on the bench and I will just have to live with it." I have never been in this position before and I don't like it, not one bit.

"For the last seven or eight years I have been a first-choice striker and have always been consistent.

"It has just not worked out this time."

By the time Beckett was ready for his comeback Moore had looked at other options and has settled for a three-man strike force of Paul Warne, Chris Porter and Andy Liddle who have bagged 24 goals between them. His patience is going to be tested as he waits for the call Beckett, who scored six goals in nine games at the end of last season to help save Latics from the humiliation of relegation, said: "It is bad enough being on the bench but it is horrible when you don't even get on the pitch, it is worse than being injured. The manager made the right decision when he left me out of

When I have gone through a lean spell I have always had a few goals under bell and it has

been difficult to drop me. "This time I haven't got that to fall back on.

These things can happen in football and I really haven't been able to get into my usual stride. "It's nearly two months since I started a game and it is even more difficult with the lads in the side doing so well.

"I am vying for a place with Chris Porter but he has scored six goals in five games, including a hat-trick." But I am determined to fight for my place and once I get back I will be looking to score the goals that will keep me in there.

"I don't wish it on anybody, but I might have to wait until someone gets injured.

"That's how I got my first chance. "I have no divine right to play but I would just love to come off the bench more and get on the end of some chances."

Beckett believes Latics should be looking for automatic promotion but there is still no reason why they can't hit the play-offs. He explained. "We need to get a good run, not one or two wins but seven or eight." "Other teams have done and shot straight of the top of the table."

You can be down on the floor one week with everything going well the next.


"But it is vital we beat teams below us and we must make sure we get three points this afternoon." Beckett blames his injury for failing to establish a regular place in the side. He added: "I have never missed a start before, but you don't lose something overnight. "I know I still have goals in me and I have to make sure I am ready when I get the call."

The word of the moment around Boundary Park is 'consistency'. The team overall is desperate to find that much talked about level of consistency during the December matches. If it can be found, the club will be in a good position to start concentrating on the promotion fight in the New Year.



One squad member who is pleased with his own personal consistency so far this season is Guy Branston. The 26-year-old defender has performed well in his matches and is doing a good job of providing some steely determination at the back.

However, Guy's level-headedness was rocked at the beginning of the month when the FA charged him with a breach of rule E3: using abusive and/or insulting behaviour. He has since returned his no guilty plea back to the FA and is looking to appear personally at the hearing to prove his innocence. Guy gave Blue Pride his version of events that led to the FA charge following the Latics 4-2 defeat to Scunthorpe United:

"The police pulled me at half time and accused me of being foul and abusive. I

did not swear at the crowd or make any insulting gestures – the only thing I indicated was that I had found it easy to get past one of their players. It was by no means meant to be abusive and I feel I have done nothing wrong: I want to clear my name."

Guy has also made it clear that the team's performance in the League is the main thing he wants to concentrate on. The six League matches in December, four of which will be played at Boundary Park, will be the perfect opportunity for Ronnie Moore's men to group together and get the 18 points available and Tuesday's win over Walsall was a good start. Originally from Leicester, Guy now lives in Sheffield with his girlfriend Fay and their dog Frankie. Fay went to Nottingham University to study for a degree in psychology, sociology, english and media and now works for Nottingham radio station Heart. Blue Pride caught up with the couple this week as Guy looked forward to today's match against Swindon.

How did you meet each other?

Guy: "We met at my brother's birthday party nearly five years ago. She claims we had never met, but I had noticed her before."

Fay: "He was being a bit of a nuisance and caught my eye! I worked in a bar in Leicester and he said he had seen me before. It was nice to see a bit of new talent in Leicester!"

Is Fay a typical footballer's partner?

G: "No, she has a degree."

F: "I wish - I wish I could go out and spend his money every day!"

How do you spend your time together?

G: "Taking the dog for a walk or relaxing around the house – I'm a very calm person now."

F: "We also like to go travelling and see new places – whether that be in England or abroad. The best trip so far was when we went to Australia and Singapore. When we're not travelling we just do the usual stuff like go for meals or watch dvds. We also go to the gym and go running together."

What is the best thing about Guy being a footballer?

G: "It's nice having some spare time and being able to play as many computer games as I want! No, seriously, being a footballer is even better than I expected it to be and sometimes I have days when I still can't believe it is my job."

When you're so passionate about something, being dropped from the team or losing matches can hit you hard, especially when you just can't figure out why it is happening. You're always thriving to be better and you can start to judge yourself harshly."

F: "Putting up with the bad moods, but Guy tends to take things in his stride. He

G: "I have been pleased so far. I have played in regular matches and have really enjoyed it. It has been a good season for me so far and feel I have played more good matches than bad ones."

F: "Whenever I have seen the team play they have always looked good to me, so I think they will be fine."


And what are your hopes for the rest of the season?



"I know I am only skipper until Chris Swailes regains his fitness, but I have really enjoyed my spell leading the team," Liddell explained.

He was put in temporary charge when the campaign kicked off in August never for one moment envisaging that he would still be wearing the captain's armband four months later.

Liddell, who has previously played for Barnsley, Wigan and Sheffield United, has already scored nine goals and so is half way to matching his best-ever total of 18 in one season which was for Wigan in 2001/02.

The versatile Liddell prefers to play as a striker and has done for much of the season in 3-4-3 and 3-5-2 systems, but he has also played wide right in a 4-4-2. Liddell had been close to joining Championship club Stoke City in the close season until the deal collapsed following the dismissal of manager Tony Pulis, and this enabled Latics to step in. On life with Latics, Liddell said: "I have been reasonably pleased with the way things have gone for me personally, and I have managed to score a few goals. "It would be ever better if we were higher up the league and playing more consistently. But it is an incredibly tight division with little separating the playoff and relegation places.

"An important period is coming up and it is important we do well over Christmas and New Year and it is a great opportunity to put together a decent run and make a move up League One." Here Liddell, whose father Gary played for Leeds, Grimsby, Doncaster and Hearts, reflects on his early life in a footballing family.

eried is the Well lew Year Where were you born and brought up, and which schools did you attend? I was born in Leeds when my father was playing for Leeds United and spent most of my childhood growing up in the city. My first school was The Leas when my father was at Grimsby, but we returned to Leeds and I went to Swarcliffe Middle School and Temple Moor.



Did any of your schools have any famous old boys? I am good friends with my former Sheffield United team mate Nick Montgomery who was also a pupil at Temple Moor, though he is eight years younger than me. Another former Temple Moor old boy was Andrew Morton, the author who wrote the controversial books on Princess Diana.

What exams did you pass, and what were the subjects you liked/disliked? I passed seven GCSE's with grades of 'C' and above. I started doing my 'A' Levels, but packed them in when the chance came to join Barnsley. I was decent at English, French and PE, but was bad at maths and had to sit that twice before I passed that. I was also not that clever at the sciences.

What was the first football team you starred for, and what position did you play? I played for Swarcliffe Middle School when I was 9/10 years of age. I have been always been a striker, though I had a spell in the centre of midfield while I was at Temple Moor.

Can you remember your first footballing honour? When I played for Oulton and Woodlesford Juniors we were unbeaten for three years and we won everything in the Leeds area as well as the Yorkshire Cup. We reached the final of a national tournament and also played abroad. Dean West, who played at Lincoln, Boston and Burnley, was in our team and two or three others became first-year professionals at Leeds United.

Did you play any representative football? I had trials for Leeds City Boys and West Yorkshire Schools, but I was told at both I was too small which was upsetting as my mates were playing and I felt I deserved to be doing as well. Not long ago I came across the man who managed Leeds City Boys when I had my trial, and you could say we had a polite chat when I got a few things off my chest!

Which team did you support as a child, and who were your favourite players? I have always supported Leeds United who are my local team, and I still watch them when I can. I was brought up in the era when John Sheridan, Gary McAllister, Gordon Strachan and Gary Speed played, and I admired them all.

Would you liked to have played for Leeds United? It has always been an ambition, and I could have done so many years ago. Not long after I went to Barnsley, Leeds watched me playing for Barnsley in a youth-team match and would have liked me to join them. Barnsley had been good enough to offer me a trial and I wanted to show loyalty to them. Looking back I am glad I stayed with them.

Did you watch your first professional match at Elland Road? It will have been at Leeds when my mother took me to see my father playing, though I have no recollections of that. I can vaguely remember him playing for Grimsby who had quite a good team at that time.

How did you get your big break? I had started taking my 'A' Levels but was frustrated as I felt I was as good as friends who were being taken on. I decided to write to all 92 League clubs, but only Huddersfield and Barnsley were the only two to reply offering me trials. And Barnsley offered me a one-year YTS which is how I started.

Who were the early influences on your career? There was nobody until I went to Barnsley where youth-team manager Eric Winstanley was a big help, though he was hard and uncompromising and stood no messing, and you never spoke out of turn to him. When I was younger I had no special coaching and simply wanted to play game. Unlike today, when

kids are restricted as to how much they can play, I had matches on Saturday morning, Saturday afternoon, Sunday morning and Sunday afternoon.

Did your father offer much guidance?

He would come to watch me play, but was laid back and never tell me what I was doing right or wrong. Though he knew football inside out, he wanted me to find out things for myself and he put no pressure on me. There is nothing worse than seeing parents trying to live their lives through their kids. They shout from the touchline when they are playing which only succeeds in putting them off.

What would you have done had you not become a professional? I haven't a clue, as I always wanted to be a footballer. I stayed on at school to take my 'A' Levels and I would probably have gone on to university. When I was 16/17 and nobody was interested in me, that is what pushed me into writing letters to all 92 League clubs. My father told me I needed something to fall back on, but luckily things worked out for me.

Have you any advice for youngsters dreaming to become a professional?

was told several times I was too small so I would say don't always listen to what others say. You need luck as I had when Barnsley offered me a trial, but I believe if you are good enough you will get picked up. I would also say practice but, above all, enjoy playing.

The team, which only regained its Football League status in 2003, has won through to the quarterfinals of the Carling Cup.

And they proved the earlier victory against Manchester City was no fluke by claiming a second Premiership scalp, that of Aston Villa.

David O'Leary had been trumpeting the Carling Cup as a chance to kick start a disappointing season and duly fielded his strongest line up.

But it all went pear shaped for Villa as they were handed a comprehensive 3-0 defeat to reach the last eight in the League Cup for the first time in 30 years.

Rovers are the only team outside the Premiership still in the knockout and their exploits have captured the hearts of the nation

And it has helped revive interest in the competition which has been much maligned and open to ridicule in recent years with the big clubs fielding weakened teams. It offers a route into Europe and, by and large, the remainder of the clubs continue to take it seriously as it offers an additional source of

revenue. And Coors Brewers Ltd must still

value it commercially as they recently struck a new three-year sponsorship extension for it to remain the Carling Cup until 2009. The magic of the FA Cup remains and the second round saw Conference club Tamworth cause the major upset winning at League One

armed and caused him serious injury. Four fans were arrested as a result of the trouble and the FA could order games to be played behind closed doors at the Britannia Stadium as a punishment. Stevenage goalkeeping coach Lionel Perez is also in a spot of bother, though this time he appears to be the guilty party after an attack on his opposing number during the FA Cup, second-round tie against Northampton Town.

Perez, once Sunderland's extrovert French keeper, was seen by millions jabbing two fingers into the eyes of David Watson who had a spell as Latics' goalkeeping coach some time ago.

Former Latics manager Neil Warnock has rejected the chance to become manager of Portsmouth in favour of staying with Sheffield United.

Warnock was in charge of the Blades with a 1-0 victory against Wednesday in the steel city derby in a week in which he celebrated his 57th birthday and six years in charge at Bramall Lane. And finally congratulations to Alan Quinn who became the first player in the 112-year history of the steel city derby to score for both Sheffield club, Quinn and Leigh Bromby both joining the Blades in the summer from their arch rivals.

Hartlepool. After winning at Bournemouth, also from League One, in the first round, Mark Cooper's side repeated the feat to earn a trip to Championship club Stoke City. And Nigel Clough's Burton Albion have landed a home match against Manchester United after overcoming Burscough in the second round. The first-round draw was performed by Peter Osgood and Jim Montgomery, who had both played in finals, and it threw up fairytale ties for other remaining non-league teams as Sunderland play hosts to Woking/Northwich Victoria while Nuneaton/Histon entertain Middlesbrough. Ten-man Huddersfield, who conquered Worcester City in round two, hit the financial jackpot with a third-round match at Premiership champions Chelsea; Torquay, 92nd in the Football League, play hosts to Birmingham City; League Tow strugglers Mansfield Town head for Newcastle while League One Scunthorpe United are away to Manchester City.

And with all 20 of the Premiership teams kept apart there is plenty of scope for cup upsets on the first weekend of 2006.

The manager-of-the-month awards for November went to Reading's Steve Coppell; Dave Penney, of Doncaster Rovers and Cheltenham's John Ward with Premiership not making their announcement until this weekend. Coppell's Royals are unbeaten in The Championship since the opening day of the season, a sequence of 21 league matches following their 3-0 home victory against Luton Town. Despite their exploits in defeating Blackpool in the FA Cup and Aston Villa in the Carling Cup, Rover also won all three League One fixtures in November, And what a dramatic turnabout in the fortunes of Cheltenham who lost four out of five league matches in miserable October, but had a 100per-cent record in November which also included wins against Carlisle in the FA Cup and Woking in the LDV Vans Trophy. Stoke City are in serious trouble with the Football Association following their home defeat by QPR. The FA are investigating an incident in which QPR keeper Simon Royce was allegedly attacked by a home fan at the final whistle. Royce was stunned later explaining the attacker could easily have been

view.



Originally he had plans to become a PE teacher, but changed his mind and took a job on his local weekly paper. After a few years working for both the weekly and evening paper, he started working for BBC radio in Blackburn.

Despite being an expert in all sporting matters, Peter's journalist career began with him covering news items. From Blackburn, he progressed to Manchester BBC TV, but when the Premiership began in 1992 he was given the option to switch to covering sport and he has never looked back

What many people may not know about Peter is that he had a day's trial with Blackburn Rovers when he was 16, and still plays football every week for his local club. "It's good to still be playing football and working within it also," he said.

Peter's affinity with Oldham Athletic remains strong to this day and he hopes that the team will make it to a play-off position this season. He said: It feels very strange for me to look down the tables and see Oldham Athletic half way down the League One table. There has been lots of toing and fro-ing this year and the bonding process does take a while, but I'm sure they will be up there by the New Year.


Peter points to his own home team of Burnley to show how tight the Coca-Cola leagues can be. At the beginning of the season, the Clarets were

"Clubs have to show a lot of patience with their squad and see how the players bond together. December is a busy time and the supporters should see the team strike it lucky soon."



We all know there were lots of new arrivals at Boundary Park over the summer, but a number of players have also departed from Latics since the tail end of last season. Here, concluding a two-part special, Blue Pride reveals whatever happened to . .



RODNEY JACK

The St Vincent star had a somewhat controversial career with Latics as it was affected by international call-ups.

Ex manager Brian Talbot was not impressed by Jack missing games, and even less impressed when he picked up a serious injury against Mexico.

Damaged knee ligaments kept him out for much of last season and Jack was released. He had a pre-season trial with Wrexham but later moved to Ireland to sign for Waterford United.



JERMAINE JOHNSON

Affectionately known as JJ, the Jamaican forward ended last season on non-contract forms. He had

been released and re-signed but was free to leave again after failing to earn a permanent deal. The last we knew at Boundary Park, Johnson had returned to Jamaica.

STEVE MILDENHALL

Big goalkeeper Mildenhall spent six months at Latics after negotiating his release from Notts County.



He arrived as number two to Les Pogliacomi but eventually took over in goal after his Aussie rival was dropped. Sadly for

Mildenhall, a broken hand spelled the end of his Oldham Athletic career and he left as a free agent. Grimsby moved in with a contract and Mildenhall is now first choice for the League Two Mariners.

LES POGLIACOMI

A loss of form and confidence near the end of last season meant keeper Les Pogliacomi began the new campaign in reserve.



He was behind new signing Chris Day in the Latics pecking order and admitted he would prefer to leave in search of first-team football.

Blackpool obliged, and Latics allowed their Aussie stopper to move on after three years of service. Pogliacomi went straight into the Blackpool team, but he recently lost his place.

AMADOU SANOKHO



The big French midfield player joined Latics on non-contract terms in March. Formerly with Burnley, he was named on the bench four times but only made one appearance, for

eight minutes, at home to

Sheffield Wednesday. He was then released and is now playing in Turkey.

SCOTT VERNON

It could be a fascinating clash between Latics and Blackpool at the end of this month as both sides could come up against former players.



Mark Bonner is out injured, but the Boundary Park squad includes Paul Edwards and Richie Wellens while Blackpool can choose both Les Pogliacomi

and Scott Vernon.

Striker Vernon came through the Latics youth system and scored a total of 27 senior goals, but like Pogliacomi he fell from favour. A summer move to Bloomfield Road was the result, with Wellens coming in the opposite direction, but Vernon has so far struggled to hold down a place.

WES WILKINSON

The pacy forward looked a real find for Latics when he was signed from Nantwich Town. Wilkinson soon gained a place in



the squad after his arrival in March 2004, but he then picked up a knee injury. Though he was retained last season, he

made very little impact before being told he had no future at Boundary Park. Wilkinson is now back in non-league, playing for Woodley Sports in the Unibond first division.
