


Speaking to Simon Parker **Telegraph & Argus**



A warm welcome to Iffy Onuora, his coaching staff, the players and supporters from Swindon Town for this afternoon's game.

I think we had to win at Colchester last week for us to have a chance of being in the play-offs.

It's not dead and buried, and don't take it in the wrong context, but with 15 games to go we would have to go on a great run.

It would certainly be the sort of run we have never managed while I've been at the football club. We won five on the bounce last season and to do that again would excite us and maybe give us the belief that we could go on.

But for now we have to look to winning this afternoon against Swindon because of the close proximity of the two teams.

I cannot remember a division as close as this and even though we are 11th in the table, we are still nearer to the bottom four than the top six.

At the moment we have 39 points which, at this

stage of the season, would probably give you a 12-point gap from the club fourth from bottom. But we're currently only five

together - Huddersfield have won only two of their last 12 and Swansea have had a little hiccup.

Only once this season, against Port Vale and Gillingham, did we manage to win two on the bounce which tells you



ahead of Swindon, who are in that position.

It's been that type of season all along where a lot of teams haven't shown great consistency. Even the teams up there have found it difficult to string results

It makes it very interesting in more ways than one.

Our problem, once again, is that we've had too many draws. We haven't been able to go on a run of putting wins together.

why we're not in the top six.

I thought we did extremely well up until half-time at Colchester but could not control the game in the same way in the second half.

We have to hold our hands up and say their third was a good goal. It's a move we do from a corner with Windass peeling off short and they executed it very well.

The marker got blocked off and it was a good finish.

But we were bitterly disappointed about the second which was a very poor one to concede.

Now, though, we have to dust ourselves down and show real fire in our belly. I'm not putting pressure on anybody but players know what their jobs are and they have to start performing more consistently over 90 minutes and not just 45. We've lost Richard Edghill to a bad injury. You don't want injuries at any time but it's particularly hard to accept at this stage of the season.

He's just signed a new contract with us and it's Sod's Law that this should happen.


On a positive note, I'm very pleased to see that David Wetherall has

example, he doesn't rant and rave and he's been a real professional.



SWINDON TOWN

The Boss by Colin Benson



No stranger to the city of Bradford Iffy, who was born in Glasgow on July 28, 1967, studied here at the Bradford University and first came to note as a football talent when playing representative football for the British Universities.

At six-foot-one he was a powerful runner and Huddersfield Town were well rewarded for their gamble in offering him a professional contract in July 1989.

Iffy scored 30 goals for the Terriers in 115 League starts and 50 substitute appearances before commanding a £30,000 fee when transferred to Mansfield Town in July 1994.

He struggled to impress at Field Mill scoring eight goals having been limited to making just 17 (11) League appearances for the Stags in two years.

It was somewhat of a relief when Tony Pulis came knocking at the door the Gillingham boss agreeing a fee of £25,000 for his transfer to Kent in August 1996.

It was the perfect move for both parties for Iffy soon started hitting the headlines. Hailed as one of the greatest bargain buys in the lower divisions of the Nationwide Football League Pulis played Iffy out wide to start with but when an unfortunate injury sidelined Gills ace marksman Leo Fortune West the central striking role was given to Onuora.

Iffy celebrated with a blistering hat-trick against Rotherham United on September 21, 1996 and from then on it was goals, goals, goals and more goals, many of them truly spectacular efforts, with two of them in the top-ten of Sky's best goals for many months.

The scourge of defenders throughout the land Iffy became the most feared striker in the Division his acceleration over ten-yards was deceptively deceptive and he finished that first season at Priestfield with 21 goals in 37 (3) League outings and with a couple more netted in the FA and League cup competitions.

On March 13, 1998, Swindon Town shelled out £120,000 to take him to Wiltshire and it wasn't long before the fans had taken him to their hearts the chant of 'Aye Aye Iffy' filling the County Ground to acknowledge his every move.

His form dipped at the beginning of the 1999-2000 season and struggling to get a game he

was loaned back to Gillingham leaving a legacy of 25 goals in 65 starts for Swindon which is top class shooting.

The loan was short lived Gillingham stepping in with £100,000 to make his move back to Kent a more permanent arrangement in January 2000.

He scored six goals for the Gills in the remaining part of the season including a crucial one in the second-leg of the play-off semi-final against Stoke City.

A big strong target man who is effective at holding the ball and playing in colleagues and has an eye for goal as well is always in demand and Iffy returned to Yorkshire to join Sheffield United in July 2002. It was brief partnership of one goal in seven League starts for he was badly injured and spent most of that 2002-03 campaign on the sick register.

He began 2003-04 on loan to Wycombe Wanderers where he looked a little rusty and moved on to Grimsby Town where the loan was smartly made permanent and he turned out 22 times for the Mariners but was then released and finished the season at Tranmere Rovers then, back where it had all started, at Huddersfield Town.

Alas, a freak knee injury in the warm-up following his return debut for the Terriers kept him out again but he was back in time to feature in the end of season play-offs.


Iffy returned to Swindon in October 2004

as Head of Youth Development and less than a year later took over as manager on Monday September 26 2005, following the departure of Andy King.

It has been a tough introduction to the management game and although I have only interviewed him once he made a great impression with his candid and honest assessment of the game in question.

Following last week's victory over Doncaster Rovers he said: "I didn't realise we hadn't won two games in a row for a year. We've put a lot into the last two games and we've got what we deserved. Sometimes when you work hard you don't get the rewards, but we did in this game.

"But there is a long way to go and anyone from the bottom half of the table isn't safe and no one can relax."



SWINDON TOWN



SWINDON TOWN are on the up, last week's 2-1 home win over Doncaster Rovers being their third victory in four games and following the 1-0 home win over Walsall, the first time this season they have put back-to-back wins together.

Ricky Shakes did his claims for a call-up into the Trinidad & Tobago World Cup squad for Germany no harm at all when he struck his first goal of the season against 'Donny' last Saturday. The former Bolton Wanderers rookie seized on a fumble by goalkeeper Alan Blayney to force the ball in for the opening strike.

Shakes also played a part in the build-up to the clinching second goal turned in by **Charlie Comyn-Platt** and having been told by the 'Socca Warriors' coach Leo Beenhakker that he is "in mind" for a friendly against Iceland in London later this month the 21-year-old winger is pulling out all the stops.

The Robins have been in the relegation dog-fight for most of this season following a disastrous start that produced just one win from their first five games **Rory Fallon** and **Sean O'Hanlon** scoring in a 2-1 home win over Nottingham Forest.

Beaten 2-0 at Oakwell on the opening day of the campaign they then fell short at home to Oldham Athletic winners by 3-2.

A goalless draw at Blackpool

was followed by a 4-2 home win over Yeovil Town but then The Robins hit a really sticky patch of eight consecutive defeats losing 1-0 at Tranmere Rovers and Walsall then by 2-1 at home to Southend United and away at AFC Bournemouth before our visit there on September 24.

Rory Fallon scored twice for Swindon, opening the scoring on 19-minutes but age is no barrier to the Bantams attack and Steve Claridge, at 39, opened his City account with two goals of his own that afternoon to add to 36-year-old Dean Windass's 34th minute equaliser and our 3-2 win.

Another single goal loss at Belle Vue was followed by an unexpected 3-1 defeat at Milton Keynes Dons and then Port Vale produced a 2-1 victory at the County Ground.

The dismal run was at least checked on October 15, when Swindon, against all the odds, held high flying Brentford to a 0-0 finish at Griffin Park.

The run of defeats now quelled Town followed up with three more consecutive draws in League One drawing 1-1 at Huddersfield Town in between home draws with Scunthorpe United (1-1) and Boston United (2-2) in the FA Cup.

The boys put on the style in a Friday night televised home derby against Bristol City who they beat 2-1 but hopes that they had turned the corner were dashed in the cold of Lincolnshire where they

crashed out of the FA Cup to little Boston United who won the replay 4-1.

By now Swindon were firmly rooted in 24th place not improved by a 1-1 draw at Port Vale and a 3-0 thrashing at home to Barnsley. A 1-0 win at Rotherham lifted them up one place but it was just for a week as a 2-2 draw at Oldham Athletic was not enough to sustain this position.

Having said that December proved to be an encouraging month for they remained undefeated adding further points from a 1-0 home win over Colchester United and draws at Chesterfield (1-1) and home to table topping Swansea City (0-0).

The New Year opened with another 1-1 result at Hartlepool but they crashed 3-0 at Gillingham before securing their best win of the season at home to AFC Bournemouth.


Jamie Cureton ended his Swindon goal famine with the opening strike **Stefani Miglioranzi** established a two goal lead but the Cherries hit back to level it at 2-2. Then **Rory Fallon's** 14th goal of the season boosted Town's hopes of avoiding the drop, the lanky Kiwi restoring the lead in the 79th minute and **Lee Peacock** making it 4-2 in stoppage time.

Yet again Iffy Onuora's team were unable to build on this going down 2-0 at Southend United before securing their first back-to-back wins against

Walsall and Doncaster.

The Squad:

RHYS EVANS - Goalkeeper Born in Swindon he joined Chelsea from school and was introduced to League football by Bristol Rovers while on loan in February 2000. Gained further experience on loan with Queens Park Rangers and Leyton Orient before returning

to his hometown to sign for Swindon Town on a free in July 2003. Rewarded with two England under-21 caps Rhys, who missed just one game last season, is now firmly established as Swindon's first choice goalkeeper although he missed 17 games this season following knee surgery, returning to the side against Port Vale in November. A fine shot stopper who commands his box in the air.

MATTY BULMAN - Goalkeeper

In his first season on a full contract he made his senior debut against Boston in the FA Cup when he went on as a substitute after Tom Heaton, who had been drafted in on loan from Manchester United to cover for the injured Evans, had been red carded in the 13th minute.

SEAN O'HANLON - Central Defender

Former England Youth international signed from Everton in March 2004 for £150,000 after impressing in an eight game loan spell; Sean is now skippering the Robins. Initially a right-back he has blossomed into a dominating central-defender although he was also used in midfield occasionally capping a fine performance against Bournemouth last season with a goal. Tall, quick and strong at the heart of the defence.

JACK SMITH - Defender

In his first season with Swindon following a move from Watford last summer. He made a handful of appearances in both fullback positions for Watford last season having been thrown in to fill the breach left by the departure of Paul Robinson to West Bromwich Albion. Two footed he is very adaptable and did feature prominently at centre-half for the Hornets reserves.

JEREL IFIL - Central Defender

Made a permanent move to the County Ground when a £70,000 transfer from Watford was concluded in July 2004.

Jerel had become a firm favourite with the Town fans

during three previous loan spells with the Club. He had made his League bow in March 2003 while on loan with Huddersfield Town. Strong in the tackle with impressive pace he is a very effective man-marker.

STEVE JENKINS - Defender
A Welsh international with 16 caps he started his career with Swansea City and was the subject of a £275,000 transfer to Huddersfield Town in November '95. Played four games for Birmingham City on loan before joining Cardiff City, Notts County and then Peterborough United. Lost

his place in the Posh side last season when they switched to a 3-5-2 formation, with no place for fullbacks, and he signed for Swindon in October 2004.

ANDY GURNEY - Defender
Former Bristol Rovers trainee who graduated to make 100(8) League appearances for the 'Pirates' before moving to Torquay United on a free in July 1997. His form with 'The Gulls' tempted Reading to part with £100,000 for his services in January '99 and he arrived at Swindon on a free in the summer of 2001. Andy made 132(20) League appearances in his first spell at the County Ground moving on to Swansea City on a free in September 2004 returning to Wiltshire in January 2005. against Tranmere Rovers. Went down to Wycombe Wanderers on loan in September 2004 but unable to gain a regular place at the Reebok he was released







PAUL SMITH – Midfield Experienced competitor who graduated from the trainee ranks at Southend United in March 1990 and progressed his career with Brentford making 170 League appearances for 'The Bees' before moving to Gillingham in 1997. Was voted Gillingham's Player of the Year in seven out of his eight seasons at Priestfield making 338 (4) League appearances and contributing 21 goals.

AARON BROWN – Midfield The Bristol City left-sided midfielder spent much of last season recovering from a broken leg before linking up with QPR early in the New Year playing a few games in the reserves. He subsequently made five League appearances while on loan to Torquay United. Joined Swindon in December making his debut from the bench in the 3-0 home defeat by Barnsley.

DAVID STROUD – Midfield A skilful young winger who made his bow at Huddersfield Town in September he has great pace and balance and was on the bench last week his second sub appearance this season having also made two starts in the 1-1 draw at Huddersfield (29-10-05) and the following

week against Boston United in the FAC.

ASHAN HOLGATE – Forward Tall gangly local lad who made two League appearances last season, his debut also coming at Huddersfield, from the bench, this time on April 30. Made another sub appearance last week in the home win over Doncaster Rovers.

JAMIE CURETON – Striker Signed last summer from Queens Park Rangers he started out on the professional road at Carrow Road where he made 13 starts and 16 sub appearances for Norwich City in the Premiership. Transferred to Bristol Rovers for £250,000 in September '96, after a month on loan at Bournemouth, he rattled in 72 goals in 165(9) League appearances for 'The Pirates' before moving on to

TREVOR BENJAMIN – Striker Arrived on loan from Peterborough United and made his bow from the bench on January 31st against Walsall but did not feature in last week's victory over Doncaster. Powerfully built he started his career with Cambridge United who banked £1m when he joined Leicester City in July 2000. But the Jamaican international made only 33 Premiership starts and was on loan to Crystal Palace, Norwich City, WBA Gillingham, Rushden & Diamonds and Brighton before joining Northampton on a free in December 2004. Coventry City then took him on in February 2005.

Other squad members include: Midfielders: GARETH WHALLEY and BEN WELLS and striker CHRISTIAN ROBERTS (currently in rehab).

PEACOCK'S 100 by Colin Benson

LEE PEACOCK is hoping to add colour to the Robins attack after making a scoring debut against AFC Bournemouth on January 21st.

The Scottish striker, signed on a free transfer from Sheffield Wednesday in the January transfer window, came off the bench to replace Jamie Cureton in the 75th minute and claimed his prize in stoppage-time when he disposed Stewart before side-footing into an empty net to seal the glory of Swindon's 4-2 victory.

This was a memorable baptism for the 29-year-old striker who prior to the start of this season had netted 98 goals in a career total of 346 League games.

He reached his 100 this season with the Owls with goals against Ipswich Town and Brighton & Hove Albion, the magic milestone reached at Hillsborough against 'The Seagulls' on October 24.

Born in Paisley it was at Carlisle United that he came into football graduating from the trainee ranks to be awarded his first professional contract in March 1995.

Lee was given his first introduction to League football with his one and only appearance in season 1993-94 when still only 18 and made seven further cameo appearances the following season.

A hard working powerfully structured front man who ran hard he claimed a regular slot in the 'Cumbrians' first team



in 1995-96 making his presence felt in opposing penalty areas and claiming the first of his 100 League goals and the following season finished as the club's joint second top scorer with nine strikes, including a brace against Chester City

Then a clean-shaven lad with Scotland international honours at under-18 level he had caught the eye of Mansfield Town manager Steve Parkin who parted company with £90,000 of the club's money to take him to Field Mill in October 1997.

It proved to be an exceptionally

shrewd piece of business for the Stags for not only did Lee contribute 29 League goals to the Mansfield Town record in 70 (10) appearances, and three more in cup competitions, but he also attracted the attention of the big clubs scouts and tempted Manchester City to part with a cool £500,000 for his transfer.

That was on Guy Fawkes Day, 1999, but unfortunately Lee was not to explode onto the Maine Road stage in the manner it was hoped for.

He had started the 1999-2000 campaign for Mansfield Town where he had left off the previous season (when he had scored 17 goals in 45 League games), by scoring goals. He hit a hat-trick against Peterborough United and would have had another against Shrewsbury Town a few weeks later but for a missed penalty.

Lee was the Stags top shot with eight goals in all competitions coming into the November programme and the City manager Joe Royle, who lets face it knows a striker when he sees one, had no second thoughts that Lee would not be able to do the business for the 'Blues.'

Now a Scotland under-21 international he made a promising Manchester City bow from the substitutes' bench against Queens Park Rangers at Loftus Road laying off the perfect through ball for former Swindon Town star Kevin Horlock to run onto and score the equalising goal.

Unfortunately the promise was not really given much chance to blossom for Lee's first full game was in a third round FA

Cup tie with Chester City when the whole team were below par and he struggled along with them. Following that he was given only four further League starts in the remainder of the season.

His stay at Maine Road lasted nine-months and although Lee had failed to score in his ten appearances, half of them from the bench, Manchester City were still able to make a profit on his transfer selling him to Bristol City for £600,000.

It proved a great investment for the Ashton Gate club for the Scottish striker hit a rich-vein of form with 54 goals in 144 League games during his four seasons in their colours.

In July 2004 Peacock somewhat surprisingly linked up with Sheffield Wednesday on a free transfer only to endure a miserable season with the Owls which was compounded by a series of niggling injuries. He ended up making only 18 League starts (4 goals) last season and 11 from the bench.

Swindon boss Iffy Onuora has brought Lee in to fill the attacking role vacated by leading scorer Rory Fallon who was sold to Swansea City last month.

The big fellow says: "I am a hard working player, pretty mobile, and hopefully I can contribute some goals. With Rory going there is a challenge there for me to step up to the mantle."

For Lee Peacock it's a 100 up and still counting.

THE REAL LEAGUE

The top two in the Coca-Cola Football League One both claimed comfortable victories as Southend and Colchester stole a march on their promotion rivals.

League leaders **Southend United** were too strong for **Yeovil Town** on their travels as strikes from Mark Bentley and Shaun Goater ensured a 2-0 win.

Colchester United came from going behind to a Dean Windass goal to beat us 3-1 at Layer Road. Windass struck in the 37th minute but a double from Richard Garcia (41 & 56) and one from Chris Iwelumo stole the points for Phil Parkinson's side.

Brentford were far too strong for **Walsall** as they won 5-0 at Griffin Park, Isiah Rankin and Ricky Newman giving them a two-goal advantage at the break. Paul Brooker, Sam Sodje and Kevin O'Connor all etched their name on the scoresheet in the second period to heap more misery on Saddlers boss Paul Merson.

Marc Richards (pictured right) is a man in form and his brace (27 & 81) was enough to hand **Barnsley** a 2-0 win over **Bristol City** at Oakwell.



Oldham Athletic's bid for a play-off spot has hit a slump of late and a 1-0 defeat at home to **Port Vale** will do little to improve matters, with Leon Constantine the man on target in the first half a minute before the break.

Paul Hall's strike a minute from time earned **Chesterfield** a point at Saltergate against **Gillingham**, who had earlier taken the lead through Tommy Black in the 48th minute.

Julian Bennett was another late goalscorer as his goal in the 89th minute rescued a 2-2 draw for **Nottingham Forest** at **Blackpool**. The home side took the lead through Marcus Bean, an effort levelled by Ian Breckin before David Fox looked to have handed Blackpool the points when he scored in the 47th minute.



Billy Sharp's (pictured left) exceptional campaign continued as **Scunthorpe United** beat **MK Dons** 2-0, with the young striker grabbing goals in the third and tenth minute - the second a penalty.

Swindon

Town's bid to stay up was handed a boost as Ricky Shakes and Charlie Comyn-Platt helped them to a 2-1 win over **Doncaster Rovers**, whose reply came from Ross McCormack.

Rotherham United and **Hartlepools United** played out a 0-0 stalemate.

Paul Merson (pictured right) has been sacked as manager of Coca-Cola Football League One side **Walsall**. Last Saturday's 5-0 drubbing at Brentford proved to be the final straw for The Saddlers' board with the club lying in 19th just one point clear of the relegation zone. Merson had expressed his determination to remain in charge for Saturday's Bescott clash with Scunthorpe in the aftermath of defeat at Griffin Park but, without a league win in 2006, chairman Jeff Bonser felt compelled to act. Merson was appointed full time manager in June 2004 but has been unable to halt the club's worrying slide during the past two seasons.

Chesterfield manager Roy McFarland has refused to rule himself out of the running for the vacant Derby County job, although Doncaster Rovers boss Dave Penney says he has no intention of leaving Belle Vue. Both managers have been heavily linked with the vacancy which was created when The Rams decided to part company with erstwhile manager Phil Brown. McFarland, who has emerged as the bookies' favourite to take over at Pride Park, managed the club during two spells in the 1980s and 90s, and he is not prepared to dismiss the possibility of returning for a third stint. "It's hard to make any comment because it's all speculation," he told the Derbyshire Times. "I'm very happy doing my job at Chesterfield. I'm enjoying every day. It's nice to be associated with other jobs and it's healthy for the media to speculate about such things." Meanwhile Penney,



who has also been connected to the managerial vacancy at Leicester City, has made it perfectly clear that he is not interested in either role. "I had a meeting with the chairman yesterday and he said that he would let me know if anyone made an approach," he told the Doncaster Free Press. "But I told him that it was irrelevant because I am not interested in moving anywhere. I am quite happy where I am, taking the club forward."

I have asked Steve Longbottom to look at the various suggestions you have been sending in with regard to how we can improve the atmosphere at home games and he has promised to respond to everyone who has got in touch.

We have also been working very hard on our season tickets package for next season. Again, I cannot say too much at the minute, other than to reassure you that we have some quite exciting and unusual plans in place which we are hoping will prove to be a big success.

A focus of attention over the coming months will be the club shop which I admit has been a little neglected in the recent past as we have, understandably, tried to get other parts of the club back in order. There will be a big overhaul of

the shop over the summer months which will involve a complete revamp and the launch of many new ranges, to coincide with our new home and away kits for next season. As part of this we will also be recruiting for some new staff so people interested in applying for positions should keep a look out.

Finally, I would like to take this opportunity to remind you that next Saturday's match with Bristol City is our CIS family fun day. A whole range of entertainment including face painters and live bands have been lined up and special tickets are on offer costing just £10 for an adult and two children.

Classic Campaigns by Leigh Edwards



Football historian LEIGH EDWARDS selects ten Swindon Town 'Classic Campaigns' from 60 post-war seasons.

1962/63

Swindon Town won promotion to the Second Division for the first time in 1962/63. Bert Head's young side won just one of their first six games, then top scorer Ernie Hunt netted a hat-trick in a 5-1 victory over Brighton. Cliff Jackson scored three times in a 4-3 win at Millwall and Jack Smith did likewise in a 5-0 victory over QPR as Swindon overcame the 'Big Freeze' to maintain their promotion challenge. They hammered Colchester 6-1 and clinched promotion with a 1-0 win at home to Shrewsbury. Keith Morgan and John Trollope were ever-present, while other stars included Mike Summerbee and Bobby Woodruff.

1968/69

Don Rogers starred as Swindon Town achieved an epic League Cup and promotion 'double' in 1968/69. Early pace-setters in the Third Division, they lost 1-0 at home to Watford in the title 'decider' watched

by 28,898 and finished runners-up on goal average. Swindon defeated Torquay 2-1, Bradford City 4-3, Blackburn 1-0, Coventry 3-0, Derby 1-0 and Burnley 3-2 in the League Cup before beating Arsenal 3-1 after extra-time in the Wembley final: Peter Downsborough, Rod Thomas, John Trollope, Joe Butler, Frank Burrows, Stan Harland, Don Heath, Roger Smart, John Smith (Willie Penman), Peter Noble, Don Rogers.

1969/70

Swindon Town challenged strongly for promotion to the top-flight in 1969/70. Fred Ford replaced Danny Williams as manager and Arthur Horsfield was signed from Newcastle, starring as Swindon were among the early leaders. Peter Noble grabbed a hat-trick as they beat Charlton 5-0 and maintained their promotion challenge with a 14 match unbeaten run. Swindon finished fifth in the Second Division, their highest position at the time. They also defeated Blackburn 4-0, Chester 4-2 and Scunthorpe 3-1 in the FA Cup before losing 2-0 to Leeds United in the sixth round, then beat Napoli 3-0 in the Anglo-Italian Cup final.

1979/80

Bobby Smith guided Swindon Town to the League Cup semi-finals in 1979/80. Swindon had narrowly missed promotion the previous season and Alan Mayes scored twice in an early 4-0 win over Brentford. They defeated Portsmouth 3-1, Chester 2-1, Stoke City 2-1, Wimbledon 2-1 and Arsenal 4-3 in the League Cup before losing 4-3 to Wolves in the semi-finals. Andy Rowland and Alan Mayes formed an exciting partnership as Swindon gained four successive wins, then trounced Bury 8-0. They took Spurs to an FA Cup fourth round replay but finished mid-table despite signing David Peach and Glenn Cockerill.

1985/86

Swindon Town stormed to the Fourth Division title with a record 102 points in 1985/86. Lou Macari's side made a poor start in the League but defeated Sunderland and Sheffield Wednesday en route to the Milk Cup fourth round. Kenny Allen arrived from Torquay and Dave Bamber from Portsmouth as Swindon soared to the top of the table with 14 wins in

16 matches. They set a club record of 13 consecutive home victories with a 3-1 win over Burnley and clinched the title with a 1-1 draw at Mansfield. Charlie Henry and Colin Gordon scored 35 goals between them, while skipper Colin Calderwood was ever-present.

1986/87

Lou Macari plotted Swindon Town's 1986/87 Third Division play-off final triumph. Colin Gordon was sold to Wimbledon, while newcomers included Jimmy Gilligan, Mark Jones, Fraser Digby and Bristol Rovers pair Tim Parkin and Steve White. Six victories in eight games catapulted Swindon into the promotion race, then Jimmy Quinn returned from Blackburn and Phil King arrived from Torquay. They starred as Swindon gained seven straight wins and qualified for the play-offs in third position after remaining undefeated in their last 11 matches. Swindon beat Gillingham 2-0 in the play-off final replay after a 2-2 aggregate draw.

1989/90

Swindon Town won the 1989/90 Second Division

play-off final but were denied top-flight status after an illegal payments scandal. Swindon had qualified for the play-offs the previous season and Ossie Ardiles replaced Lou Macari as manager. They soared into the promotion frame with seven wins in nine games including a 6-0 victory over Stoke and signed David Kerslake from QPR in November. Alan McLoughlin, Duncan Shearer and Steve White starred as Swindon maintained their challenge with just one defeat in 13 matches and finished in fourth position. They defeated Sunderland 1-0 in the play-off final at Wembley.

1992/93

Player-manager Glenn Hoddle was a key figure in Swindon Town's 1992/93 First Division play-off final success. Swindon were early pace-setters and new signing Craig Maskell grabbed a hat-trick in a 4-1 win over Cambridge United. They went second after a 5-1 demolition of Notts County, then overcame a lean spell with Ross McLaren's return inspiring a run of seven victories in nine games. Dave Mitchell netted

three times in a 6-4 win at Birmingham and Swindon qualified for the play-offs in fifth position. They defeated Tranmere 5-4 on aggregate, then gained a thrilling 4-3 win over Leicester in the Wembley final.

1993/94

Assistant-boss John Gorman replaced Glenn Hoddle in charge as Swindon Town prepared for the 1993/94 Premiership campaign. New signings included Jan-Aage Fjortoft, Andy Mutch, Luc Nijholt and Adrian Whitbread, with Swindon starting with a 3-1 defeat at Sheffield United. They drew 0-0 at Norwich but despite signing Terry Fenwick and Keith Scott, were already facing relegation by the time they managed their first win 1-0 at home to QPR in November. Swindon completed the double over QPR and also beat Southampton, Spurs and Coventry as well as drawing against Arsenal, Liverpool and Manchester United.

1995/96

Swindon Town stormed to the Second Division title under player-boss Steve McMahon in 1995/96. They had plummeted from the

Premiership to Second Division and newcomers included Wayne Allison, Steve Finney and Mark Seagraves. Swindon were early leaders, winning seven of their first nine games, and Kevin Horlock netted a hat-trick in a 4-1 victory at Bristol Rovers. They remained in pole position and took Southampton to an FA Cup fifth round replay. Ian Culverhouse and Mark Robinson were ever-present, while leading scorer Wayne Allison and Shaun Taylor also starred as they won the title by nine points.

The name Peter Downsborough will evoke fond memories for both sets of fans at this afternoon's game.

A League Cup winner with Swindon Town and later a legend at Valley Parade.

There are more than a few City fans who regard Peter as the best City keeper in living memory.

Halifax-born Peter was an all round sportsman,

playing cricket, rugby union and football. He also won honours for boxing and swimming. But, it was football that was to shape his life.

He began his long career as a centre forward for Halifax Boys. An injury to the regular goalkeeper saw Peter go between the posts, where he excelled to such an extent he attracted the attention of Halifax Town.

Peter made his League debut for Halifax against Bournemouth in 1960 and went onto make 148 League games for the Shaymen. In August 1965 he was transferred to Swindon Town in an exchange deal involving Bill Atkins and £3,000.

His time at the County Ground saw Swindon sensationally defeat Arsenal in the 1969

League Cup Final, gain promotion to Division Two and win the Anglo-Italian Cup, when they defeated AS Roma in the final. In all Peter made 274 League appearances for the Robins.

Peter came to Valley Parade during November 1973 initially on loan, but the deal was soon made permanent and he signed for £5,000. He made his City debut against Crewe on 22 December 1973.

It soon became apparent that City had secured an absolute bargain.

Peter became a hero among the Valley Parade crowds – he even saved four successive penalties in 1977. He was part of the famous FA Cup run of 1976 and promotion from the Fourth Division the following season.

He made 252 appearances for City – his career total of 650 was a then record for a goalkeeper. Peter retired in July 1980, but sadly injury prevented him playing in his testimonial against Huddersfield in the May of that year. He retired to his native Halifax, where he lives to this day.

Prior to the Bristol City game next Saturday, we will be opening our new exhibition – Pathways to the Palace. It celebrates the FA Cup Finals played at the Crystal Palace between 1895 – 1914 and it includes our own triumphant appearance in 1911.

The official opening takes place at 1.30pm and will be followed by a short talk on the exhibition.

CENTRES REPORT with Peter Horne

Good afternoon and welcome to the Bradford & Bingley Stadium for today's fixture against Swindon Town.

Centre of Excellence.

All the games tomorrow see the age groups up against Wrexham. This again sees a lot of young boys having to travel just a little too far in my opinion for a game of football.

I seem to go on about this quite a lot but my views are mirrored by a lot of other Centre Of Excellence manager's and staff who all feel the same. Last weeks fixtures, tomorrow's and next week's pitched us against Walsall, Wrexham and Shrewsbury Town of which all are not within an hour and a half travelling time.

This does not support the league rule that a player must live within a certain distance/travelling time to be allowed a trial with a club? Very contradicting circumstances when some boys by the time they get to Valley Parade to meet the coach and travel 2 hours to Walsall have been on the move for 3 hours or more!

I have extended our scouting network recently by building some excellent links in the North East and I am currently in discussion with a couple of big junior clubs in Ireland. I feel that this is something we can't neglect in our progression as

locally a lot of young players (and their parents) are still being attracted by the lure of the 'Big' clubs and the glamour attached to them!

I am not in a position (at the moment...) to negotiate on a facility aspect when trying to persuade players to chose us above 'Real Madrid' who incidentally must be the only European club not sending scouts into West Yorkshire at the moment, but it still disappoints me that particularly young boys at the ages of 8 and 9 are driven all round the North of England to be at one of these 'big' clubs?

A quote I get often from a parents is " Well, my Tommy is training with Blackburn, Liverpool, Leeds, Manchester United, Chelsea and Barcelona so he won't have time to fit Bradford in, even though he lives in Wibsey! " I'm not surprised!!! And what's more Tommy's only 8 years old!

I know that this will change because I know where we are going as a club and more importantly believe in everything we are doing, so

watch out Barcelona!

Has there ever been a division as tight as this one?

The picture seems to change every week. Not just for City, but the majority of clubs who are log-jammed between seventh and 21st in the table.

After the win at Yeovil, the talk around Valley Parade was once again about mounting a play-off push. Two games later and the mood has changed to making sure the Bantams do not get dragged into a dog-fight at the other end.

City go into this afternoon's match in 11th spot but still closer to the bottom four than top six. They are one of five clubs on 39 points - five ahead of today's visitors Swindon.

A win today and by stretching that advantage to a healthy eight, City can once more look upwards. Anything less and nails will start to get bitten.

Breaking 50 points is usually seen as a pretty safe guarantee from making the drop. Torquay went down on goal difference with 51 last season, Grimsby on 50 the year before and Cheltenham (48) in 2003.

But given the topsy-turvy nature of the current League One, you could be looking at the fourth relegation spot

finishing with a higher total than any of those.

Tranmere boss Brian Little reckons clubs could need as many as 53 points for survival. The biggest tally for 12 years since Fulham went down on 52.

By the way, where are Fulham these days?

It may sound over-pessimistic to be talking about staying up when the Bantams occupy a top-half berth. But you can guarantee that similar conversations are taking place at most of their rivals.


City will want to nail any premature fears quickly, especially with Deano about to start his five-game suspension after next week's home clash with Bristol City - another side stuck in the basement mix.

The whys and wherefores of the Windass suspension have been a topic of conversation since the draconian ban was announced.

But the biggest irony is that he was only punished because of a rule change during the summer to extend the referee's jurisdiction beyond the pitch. The reason that was altered? The after-whistle controversy involving Deano and Joe Ross

at Luton last season.

With Windass sitting out the whole of March, the onus will be on the other strikers to get in on the scoring act.



They are yet to hit the net in 2006. In fact you have to go back to Andy Cooke's last-minute winner against Gillingham at the end of October for the last time one of the other City front men scored in the league.

Now would be the perfect moment for those up front to give everyone a reason to look forwards again.

Colchester greeted the final whistle as if they had won the FA Cup.

And why not? They had just notched a ninth straight win - and set a new club record. Life just keeps getting better for the Us with promotion and two cups still to play for.

Contrast that with the gloomy picture in the away dressing room at poky Layer Road. If City are going to have anything to fight for in the rest of the season, survival will be the name of the game.

The play-offs continue to look as far away as ever. But it is the bottom end of the table that needs a full focus.

David Wetherall had warned after the Tranmere stalemate about the risk of City being caught unawares by teams coming up behind them.

A week on and the skipper's wise words have been underlined. Lowly Swindon's visit to Valley Parade on Saturday has now taken on serious proportions.

To make matters worse, Richard Edghill is unlikely to kick another ball this season. If the initial diagnosis that he has broken his ankle proves correct, do not expect to see him again.

Hot on the heels of the Dean Windass ban, it has been a horrible few days for Colin Todd.

Losing at Colchester is no disgrace - most teams in this division do. The Us have won the last 11 games there since Bournemouth came and conquered in mid-October,

way before the Essex side were considered as title contenders.

Colchester are very direct, very mobile, and very good at what they do. With players like the gangly Greg Halford, Neil Danns and Chris Iwelumo, they are a real handful for anyone.

Then Halford easily brushed him away and delivered a perfect cross for the stooping Garcia to head. Damion Stewart and turn it beyond Donovan Ricketts. Bower appealed for hand ball but nobody was listening.

City could have restored their advantage with a free-flowing move from one end of the pitch to the other. Tom Penford surged out of defence, Schumacher took it on in full flow and flicked the ball through the retreating blue-and-white shirts into the path of Windass. But he opted to try to chip the on-rushing Davison rather than slide the ball beneath him and the former Bantam got a strong enough hand on the shot to bat it away.

Not to be outdone, Ricketts responded with a fine tumbling save to turn away a low curler from Yeates which had kicked awkwardly just in front of the diving Jamaican.

City deserved to go in on level terms. Could this be the afternoon when the Colchester dream ran came to an abrupt end?

Er, no. The second half showed just why Phil Parkinson's team keep marching on - and why City are not up there challenging with them. The tone was set when Halford charged past Wright and drilled in a fierce effort which had Ricketts stretching again. Then the keeper had to use his full height to hang on to a flick header from Iwelumo, who was giving Wetherall more problems than any opposing targetman this season.

Colchester were pushing for a second goal and it came gift-wrapped after 56 minutes.

Andy Cooke, back in the side for Steve Claridge, was the culprit after City won a drop ball inside their own half. The striker coughed up possession to Garry Richards and

his floated through ball was nodded home by Garcia.

It was a poor goal to concede and straight away Colchester were knocking at the door again with Ricketts flinging himself at a ferocious shot on the turn to deny Garcia a hat-trick.

City's escape was only temporary as the home side cashed in from the corner. The marking looked slack as Iwelumo was allowed to crash home a side-foot volley into the bottom corner.

The second half was not even midway through but the points were in the bag. City did not look like a team capable of mounting a comeback from 3-1 down as they had done against Brentford at Valley Parade a month ago.

In the same way they had surrendered the upper hand to Tranmere after the break last week, the Bantams were once again playing second fiddle.

Penford kept pushing on to his credit but Davison's goal was hardly under seige. Todd switched his strikers, bringing on Claridge and Danny Cadamarteri, but it changed nothing.

City won two late corners but both were gobbled up by the keeper under no pressure whatsoever.

At least Davison was called upon in stoppage time and he responded well to hang on to a jab from Windass on the line after Cadamarteri's initial drive had fallen into his path.

A goal would have added some gloss to a disappointing afternoon for the Bantams. But it doesn't alter the fact that next weekend's home game has suddenly become a very, very big one.

Given the choice, mid-table nothingness sounds quite appealing compared with the shocking alternative.

PROFILE ON.....

Most teams would love to have one free-kick specialist in their ranks. City are very fortunate to have two.

We always knew that Dean Windass was a bit of a wizard when it came to dead-ball opportunities. And this season, Marc Bridge-Wilkinson has emerged as just as capable a threat from range.

The influential midfielder served notice of his intentions in pre-season with a bending effort in a friendly at Halifax. And he has since proved that was no one off with stunning free-kicks against Walsall and Brentford.

The two goals at Valley Parade were from virtually the same spot five yards outside the penalty area. And he bent both over the wall and into the top corner.

Brentford keeper Stuart Nelson must have known where Bridge-Wilkinson was going to put the ball. But he still had absolutely no chance

of preventing the goal.

Like anything, practice makes perfect although Bridge-Wilkinson admits he has not been able to hone his free-kick skills too much lately because of the difficult conditions at the training ground.



He said: "I used to practise quite a lot but it's got to the stage now where the training ground is a little bit worse for wear. It's too slippy to do it properly.

"But I've had a pretty good ratio with free-kicks so far. I scored the one at Halifax in pre-season, then hit the bar with another against Southend before getting

two the other week almost from the same spot."

Windass notched City's last free-kick with a 30-yardstunner at Yeovil last month - which Bridge-Wilkinson missed because he was getting treatment on a bruised foot.

"I saw it on the telly on Sunday and it was a great free-kick. We'll have to wait and see who takes the next one now!"

Unfortunately there has been nothing given with range in the Tranmere and Colchester games so fans will have to wait to discover who has the job.

But with Windass soon to start his five-match suspension, the onus will fall on Bridge-Wilkinson to chip in with a few goals.

Having set himself a pre-season target of double figures, he is currently halfway there to be second top scorer behind Deano.


That is not a bad tally considering he missed more than two months with a knee injury.

Long-distance City fans at the Yeovil game must have feared another lay-off with the sight of Bridge-Wilkinson leaving the pitch on a stretcher. But that was only at the insistence of referee Jarnail Singh.

"That was a bit embarrassing really," added Bridge-Wilkinson. "I wanted to walk off but the ref said he would book me if I didn't go on the stretcher!"

"I wasn't happy but once he's called the stretcher on you have to use it.

"It was annoying to get injured because my fitness levels have been getting back to where I'd like to be. But luckily nothing was fractured and it was just bruising which soon went down."

City Reserves were strengthened by the inclusion of Andy Cooke and Tom Kearney but they found themselves with a mountain to climb after going two down within just ten minutes at Oakwell.

In the first few seconds, the Tykes soon made their intentions clear when Craig Bentham had to be on the ball to clear with Michael Coulson threatening to put the home side in front storming into the area.

City were one down after six minutes when Anthony McParland's corner reached Thomas Harban who lost his marker Patrick McGuire and he powered in a header into the top of the net.





THEIR FAVOURITE YEARS

The editor of "Programme Monthly" magazine describes the most memorable season in the history of a famous football club, and the programmes which record it.

As power becomes concentrated within a group of three or four clubs in English football, it becomes increasingly unlikely that a club such as Burnley could even contemplate winning the League Championship; but that unlikely scenario unfolded in 1959/60, when the Lancashire club held off the Chelsea of that era, Wolves, and the up and coming power, Spurs, to win the title.

Burnley's timing was as impeccable as the midfield play of Jimmy McIlroy. They kept in touch with the League leaders throughout the campaign, and in the second half of the season signalled their intentions by taking second place for some weeks. As the fiercely competitive League season reached its end, Burnley required five points from their last three games (when two points were awarded for a victory) to overtake FA Cup winners Wolves and deprive them of the much-coveted League and Cup double.

A win at Birmingham and a draw at home to Fulham left the Clarets requiring a victory at Maine Road in the last (re-arranged) match of the season, to win the title with a squad of home-reared players, but for two. Those who required a transfer fee both came from Glentoran,

full back Alex Elder and the superb Jimmy McIlroy. Burnley's triumph was one of the last manifestations of the days of the maximum wage in English football, when locally-reared players could be retained at a club whose lack of resources would only be felt in the absence of transfer activity.


Right back John Angus and wing half Brian Miller, who replaced Bobby Seith at left half, were England Under 23 players and blended with the experience of captain Jimmy Adamson and centre half Tommy Cummings.

The Turf Moor club's reputation as a conveyor belt of young talent was strengthened in the final matches of the season, when they lost Connelly to injury. The decisive goal at Manchester City was scored by young reserve Trevor Meredith.

Throughout their Championship winning season, Burnley issued a 16 page programme, printed throughout in blue ink on white semi gloss paper. The front cover also had claret and green. Manager Harry Potts' notes extended over two pages and were the only narrative in the programme, the non-advertising pages containing plenty of statistics, fixtures, results and the half time scoreboard.

Rather like the Championship winning, home-grown Burnley team, this modest 3d programme is representative of a bygone era in English football.

Burnley's years as an established First Division club were founded on a strong, and settled, defence, but for the championship season they were able to add goal-scoring flair in attack, which transformed draws into victories. England winger John Connelly was joined in the national squad by his team-mate Ray Pointer, and between them they scored 40 of Burnley's 85 League goals. Jimmy Robson added another 17, five of them scored in one match against Newcastle. Winger Brian Pilkington, scored nine goals.



A couple of weeks ago Richard Edghill was a bit bewildered as to what was going on. He had been in negotiations with Bradford City over a new contract and yet those talks seemed to be leading nowhere.

Edghill is a rarity in football, in that he's an experienced player who does all his own deals himself. Not for him an agent. He'd rather talk face to face with the club and shake hands on a new contract, or if not, walk away and ring round for other 'interested parties'.

It happened that City did do a deal with the player for eighteen months, and how thankful must Edghill be now, after his injury at Colchester last Saturday.

It is one of the nastier sides of the game, when you see a player frantically gesturing to the bench the minute he goes down. You know that the signs are not good and that the player in question is in agony. So it proved to be for Edghill, who's only reward for a goal saving tackle on the edge of the City box in the first half, was a broken right ankle.


Have a heart also for Barry Wood, who was on physio duty that day in place of the suspended Steve Redmond. Barry is fully qualified and more than capable of filling Steve's shoes, but it's typical that a serious injury should happen on the one day

Bradford are 'Redmond-less'.

Now Richard Edghill faces the prospect of a lengthy recovery period but he does so with the comfort of a contract to cushion the blow. Imagine if he had been playing on a month-by-month basis?

Edghill's misfortune gave the travelling Bradford fans a chance to see Jake Wright for the first time, albeit in an unfamiliar position. The game also gave Tom Penford another chance to show what he can do in midfield. I do like his attitude. He's never afraid to go forward, always looks to do something with the ball and always wants the ball. He told me recently, after one false dawn under Bryan Robson, he's determined to make it happen this time.

I, for one, hope that Tom does.

We travelled to Doncaster anticipating a difficult game against a strong Rovers side that have been performing well in the league this season. We were not disappointed as this turned out to be one of our hardest and most competitive games of the season.

From minute one Rovers played a high tempo game pressing us all over the pitch. We adopted a 3-5-2 formation for the first time this season that coincided with a similar system the first team played on the same day against Tranmere Rovers. With the game being played at such a ferocious pace there were a number of mistimed challenges from both sides that went unpunished by the referee early on the game, and this set the tone for the rest of the game where both sides totally committed themselves into this physical encounter.

Ben Saynor made a great one handed save early on in the game and carried this good form on for the remainder of the game. Patrece Liburd returned to the side following a cartilage operation and operated as a left sided centre back alongside Simon Ainge and Paul Denvers. In the first half we were adapting to the unfamiliar system and

Doncaster dominated and dictated the majority of this period. At half time we had chance to reassure the players of their roles and responsibilities and came out a lot stronger and more organised. Tom Butorins was introduced shortly after half-time to try and compete physically with Rovers strong centre halves and this allowed Joe Colbeck to have more space and freedom to get in behind the Rovers defence. Luke O'Brien was then brought on in the left wing-back area and we got stronger and stronger as the game wore on.

The game was end-to-end, with passion and commitment from and very little to separate both sides. After 80 minutes the winner finally came from Paul Denvers who scrambled the ball over the line from a Joe Colbeck corner after a number of attempted efforts were blocked on the line. The game continued to swing from end-to-end and Rovers final chance to equalise fortunately hit the post with two minutes to go. The players were delighted with the win, as they knew they had to work extremely hard for the three points.

From a coach's point of view it was pleasing to see the players performance improve as their understanding of a new system developed as the game progressed. The easiest thing would have been to return the familiar 4-4-2 system at half time, but what

would the players have gained from that? Taking young players out of their comfort zone can help them develop their understanding further, and hopefully they will take confidence from this game and help in their development.




PREVIOUS ENCOUNTERS



Good afternoon and a warm welcome to our friends from Wiltshire. Swindon are enduring a tough season and at the time of writing they occupy a bottom four place in the league table. They have achieved some better results of late and will be keen to continue so as to avoid relegation, with the extra stigma of being the first team to have competed in the Premier League, to be relegated to the bottom division of the Football League. Let's hope that after this afternoon they can gather sufficient points to avoid that fate. Players with connections between our two clubs include, Peter Downsborough, Stan Harland and David 'Bronco' Layne to name just three, whilst our beloved club secretary Jon Pollard has also served at both clubs.

Looking back to the 1987-88 season we actually met Swindon three times in the league competition. Swindon were on the back of successive promotions from Division Four. In 1986-87 they had beaten Gillingham in play off replay to secure promotion to Division Two. Their opening day fixture on Saturday 15 August 1987 was here at Valley

Parade. We had suffered a difficult season in 1986 losing manager Trevor Cherry in the process, but come 1987 with new manager Terry Dolan in charge, plus a return to the rebuilt Valley Parade just before Christmas, the team pulled out all the stops and ensured a



superb second half of the season which culminated in a run which saw only one defeat in the last ten matches. As a consequence City ended the season in tenth place instead of one of the relegation places they had occupied up till the beginning of April. Two major signings were made during the summer, Paul Tomlinson arrived from Sheffield United for £47,000 and defender Lee Sinnott signed for the first time from Watford for a fee of £137,000. Swindon who


had also been busy in the transfer market included former City players, Jimmy Quinn, Steve Foley and Chris Kamara in their squad. The club had invited comedian Jimmy Cricket to kick off the season. The match as expected proved to be a tough start for City. Swindon generally had the best of the first half. City seemed to up the ante in the second half attacking the Kop end and Swindon goalkeeper Fraser Digby was prominent. Ten minutes into the second half Stuart McCall found himself in the clear following a long pass from Savage, the City skipper rounded Digby and scored from close range. The Swindon defence desperately tried to keep the score to one as Ellis and Sinnott both had shots charged down in the six yard box. In the 67th minute City extended the lead when McCall played the ball through to Ron Futcher, the striker then slid it past the advancing Digby to complete the scoring. A good result for City then, incidentally the only caution on the day went to Chris Kamara! The match was handled by David Allison another much respected referee who was a welcome visitor to Valley Parade. The

teams for this match were.

Bradford City: Paul Tomlinson, Brian Mitchell, Karl Goddard, Stuart McCall, Gavin Oliver, Robbie Savage, John Hendrie, Lee Sinnott, Ron Futcher, Greg Abbott and Mark Ellis. Substitutes were Mark Leonard who replaced Futcher and Ian Ormondroyd.

Swindon Town: Fraser Digby, Dave Hockaday, Phil King, Peter Coyne, Tim Parkin, Colin Calderwood, Dave Bamber, Jon Gittins, Jimmy Quinn, John Kelly and Chris Kamara. Substitutes were Leigh Barnard and Charlie Henry who replaced Kelly.

The return fixture was due to be played on Saturday 16 January 1988. In fact it very nearly was, the match was abandoned due to fog after 72 minutes. City got off very lightly as they were in disarray, they were losing by three goals and had had full back Brian Mitchell dismissed after 53 minutes for two yellow cards. The match official David Elleray, who was not my favourite referee had little choice but to

abandon the game with eighteen minutes to go. For the record the Swindon 'goals' were scored by Jimmy Quinn, King and Calderwood. Quinn also had a penalty saved by Tomlinson. This match should have marked the debut of Mick Kennedy following his £250,000 move from Portsmouth. He was one of four City players to fall foul of the referee.

So the match was actually replayed on Wednesday 30 March 1988 and it should be said that City were a little fortunate. City were fifth in the table and occupied a play off place whilst Swindon were in 12th place. With the same match official in charge the first half ended goalless. City keeper Tomlinson kept the score sheet blank with some fine saves in the first half. Within ten minutes of the restart Swindon had established a two goal lead. First of all Wegerle on loan from Chelsea weaved his way past two defenders before shooting past Tomlinson, then after 52 minutes Bamber headed home from close range following a throw in by Hockaday, Evans slipped whilst in the process of clearing. Terry Dolan rang the changes and made two bold substitutions


bringing on Futcher and Leonard to replace Abbott and Goddard. Within ten minutes of the changes City had a goal back. A free kick from Mitchell was headed to the back post by Ormondroyd, where Futcher slid the ball into the net with the Swindon defenders appealing in vain for offside. Thereafter City swarmed forward

a close call. The season ended in

disappointment for City, with the play off defeat by Middlesbrough, whilst Swindon could look back on another successful season as they finished 12th. The teams for the County Ground encounter were.



Surely toiling away against Championship defences was not what a player often compared to Jimmy Greaves in his youth was supposed to be doing by the age of 30.

Even when one or two Premiership clubs began to be mentioned it seemed the most he could look forward to was a relegation battle with the likes of Middlesbrough or Portsmouth.

There was good reason for it. After all, over the past four years Fowler had fought a constant battle for fitness in the face of almost constant injury problems. Five years ago he would have commanded a king's ransom but those days seemed a long time ago.

His signing for the European champions Liverpool therefore came as a bolt from the blue. There have been rumours that Bolton, Everton or Wigan might have been interested but none of the big clubs

had even considered signing the often overweight, worn-out striker with little recent goalscoring pedigree.

Liverpool, of course, know him better than that. Fowler's performances for the club in the eight years before 2001 were little short of genius and have not been forgotten despite all that has followed since. There was much disgruntlement when he was sold to Leeds for £11million and although his subsequent form has shown he may have been no great loss, his return has been greeted with much enthusiasm. Liverpool boss Rafael Benitez cannot lose. He has gained a fired-up striker at little cost and if things go wrong he can soon get rid of him.

They say in football that you should never go back to where you have been successful in the past. There are endless examples of players who have gone back and flopped, but it doesn't always end in tears. Stuart McCall is a fantastic example as he was hugely successful during his second spell here at the Bradford & Bingley Stadium

So who knows if Fowler's return to Anfield will be a success? He may try and fail in his second spell on Merseyside but his signing could also prove to be a masterstroke. It seems like a deal where both parties have everything to gain and nothing to lose. And if Fowler can find his form again at Liverpool he may just prove to be the missing piece in the Anfield jigsaw.

STADIUM SAFETY

STADIUM SAFETY POLICY

Safety for spectators attending events at the Stadium is of paramount importance and with this in mind we make public our Safety Policy which is as follows:

1. Provide an organisational structure for the implementation of safety on matchdays.
2. Provide training for matchday staff.
3. Comply fully with the Stadium Safety Certificate.
4. Undertake to carry out emergency procedure practices during events.
5. Arrange for emergency contingency plans.
6. Maintain records of all events held at the Stadium.
7. Continually monitor and improve Club Safety Systems.
8. Liaise with all other agencies on matters relating to safety and crowd control.
9. Positively encourage spectators to communicate safety issues to the Club.
10. Ensure that spectators are aware of the Stadium emergency procedures.

If you have any queries or suggestions regarding any safety issues please do not hesitate to contact the Club's Safety Officer - Chris Patzelt.

GROUND REGULATIONS

Notice: Entry to the Ground is expressly subject to acceptance by the visitor of these Ground Regulations and the rules and regulations of FIFA, UEFA, The Football Association, The F.A. Premier League and The Football League in respect of the relevant competition. The Ground Regulations incorporate the Club's Customer Charter (if any). Entry to the Ground shall constitute acceptance of the Ground Regulations.

"Ground" means this football stadium and all locations owned, occupied or utilised by the Club.

"Club" means this football club.

"Match" means any association football match taking place at the Ground.

1 Permission to enter or to remain within the Ground (notwithstanding possession of any ticket) is at the absolute discretion of the Club, any police officer or authorised steward. On no account will admission be granted to a person who is the subject of a current Banning Order.

2 The Club excludes to the maximum extent permitted by law any liability for loss, injury or damage to persons/property in or around the Ground.

3 No guarantees can be given by the Club that a Match will take place at a particular time or on a particular date and the Club reserves the right to reschedule the Match without notice and without any liability whatsoever.

4 In the event of the postponement or abandonment of the Match, refunds (if any) will be made in accordance with the Club's Customer Charter. The Club will have no further liability whatsoever, including (but not limited to) any indirect or consequential loss or damage, such as (but not limited to) loss of enjoyment or travel costs.

5 All persons seeking entrance to the Ground acknowledge the Club's right to search any person entering the Ground and to refuse entry to or eject from the Ground any person refusing to submit to such a search.

6 The following articles must not be brought within the Ground - knives, fireworks, smoke canisters, air-horns, flares, weapons, dangerous or hazardous items, laser devices, bottles, glass vessels, cans, poles and any article that might be used as a weapon and/or compromise public safety. Any person in possession of such items will be refused entry to the Ground.

7 The use of threatening behaviour, foul or abusive language is strictly forbidden and will result in arrest and/or ejection from the Ground. The Club may impose a ban for one or more Matches.
7.1 Racial abuse, chanting or harassment is strictly forbidden and will result in arrest and/or ejection from the Ground. The Club may impose a ban for one or more Matches.

7.2 The following acts are arrestable offences under the Football (Offences) Act 1991, as amended:

7.2.1 The throwing of any object within the Ground without lawful authority or excuse.

7.2.2 The chanting of anything of an indecent or racialist nature.

7.2.3 The entry onto the playing area or any adjacent area to which spectators are not generally admitted without lawful authority or excuse.

Conviction may result in a Banning Order being made.

8 All persons entering the Ground may only occupy the seat allocated to them by their ticket and must not move from any one part of the Ground to another without the express permission or instruction of any steward, officer of the Club and/or any police officer.

9 Nobody may stand in any seating area whilst play is in progress. Persistent standing in seated areas whilst play is in progress is strictly forbidden and may result in ejection from the Ground.

10 The obstruction of gangways, access ways, exits and entrances, stairways and like places is strictly forbidden. Nobody entering the Ground shall be permitted to climb any structures within the Ground.

10.1 Smoking in No-Smoking areas is strictly forbidden.

11 Mobile telephones are permitted within the Ground, provided that they are used for personal and private use only.

12 Under the Sporting Events (Control of Alcohol etc) Act 1985, the following are offences for which a person can be arrested by a police officer and conviction could result in a Banning Order being made:

12.1 Attempting to enter the Ground or being inside the Ground whilst drunk;

12.2 Being in possession of any intoxicating liquor, or bottle, can or other portable container and which could cause damage or personal injury, when entering the Ground or in a public area of the Ground from which the event can be directly viewed.

13 Any individual who has entered any part of the Ground designated for the use of any group of supporters to which he does not belong may be ejected from the Ground either for the purposes of his own safety or for any other reason.

14 No person (other than a person who holds an appropriate licence) may bring into the Ground or use within the Ground any equipment, which is capable of recording or transmitting (by digital or other means) any audio, visual or audio-visual material or any information or data in relation to the Match or the Ground. Copyright in any unauthorised recording or transmission is assigned (by way of present assignment of future copyright pursuant to section 91 of the Copyright, Designs and Patents Act 1988) to the Club.

15 No goods (including literature) of any nature may be offered either free or for sale by any person within the Ground without the express written permission of the Club.

15.1 Tickets are not transferable and may not be offered for sale without the prior written permission of the Club. Any ticket offered for sale may be confiscated by any steward, officer of the Club or any police officer.

16 CCTV cameras are in use around and in the Ground and the Club may itself use or pass to the police or any Football Authority, any recordings for use in any proceedings.

17 At all times whilst present in the Ground, persons must comply with any and all instructions of any steward or officer of the Club and/or any police officer. Failure to comply with any instruction may lead to immediate ejection from the Ground.

18 The Club reserves absolutely the right to eject from the Ground any person failing to comply with any of the Ground Regulations or whose presence within the Ground is, or could, reasonably be construed as constituting a source of danger, nuisance or annoyance to any other person. This could lead to further action by the Club including, but not limited to, the withdrawal of any season ticket (without reimbursement) and other benefits.

18.1 Entry to the Ground shall constitute acceptance of the Ground Regulations.

World of Football

WE all know how Chelsea has become the top team in English football over these past two years. Roman Abramovich's huge investment of £440 million is surely more than enough to win any title.

The Blues last month revealed a staggering operating loss of £140 million over the past trading year - by far the highest deficit ever recorded in the history of football. Yet unlike the worried souls who have the interests of clubs such as Bradford City, Cambridge United, Wrexham, AFC Bournemouth and Brighton - all of whom at one time or another have been teetering on the brink of extinction - at heart there is no sense of financial doom or gloom hanging over the offices at Stamford Bridge.

It must seem cruelly unfair to those clubs whose survival is threatened by overdrafts that would be merely small change to Mr Abramovich but then this is life. In all walks there are those that have and those that have not.

The scale of the Russian billionaire's input would seem to be infinite and accordingly Chelsea should be able

to dominate the domestic scene, if not Europe as well, for many years to come.

It is a shattering thought for if not checked the Premiership is going to go the same way that Formula 1 racing went when the sport was completely dominated by the wealth of Ferrari and became boring and somewhat sterile when at the start of every season you knew there was only going to be one winner.

Motor sport had to change a lot of its regulations to make the track a more competitive platform but it is very difficult to see how football could change its ways to adjust the balance.

Maybe a cap on wage ceilings would be a start. While a restriction on the number of foreign players that could be fielded in any one match would also benefit our overall game. But both these options would no doubt trigger objections from sources protecting the rights of the individual.

One saving grace about the Blues regime at The Bridge is manager Jose Mourinho's recognition of the quality of English players. His success has been achieved with a team that is based on a nucleus of British stock who provide the grit and determination that is needed to cope with the rigours of a Premiership season.

Frank Lampard, Joe Cole, John Terry and Glen Johnson have proved that the best of British still rings true.

Former Arsenal and West Ham legend Nigel Winterburn told me

before the derby game at Highbury last week: "West Ham has not got a bad record against Arsenal over the years. I know they have taken some poundings in recent times but they have thrown up a few surprises as well."

He can say that again and surely none better than this one on their last ever visit to Highbury. I'm only peeved that I didn't take Nigel's advice and put a fiver on it.

Incredibly West Ham are the first team to score three goals against the Gunners on their own patch this season and Manchester United, Sparta Prague and Ajax, have all failed to score a single goal between them on their visits.

And there was no fluke about it all three Hammers strikes were quality goals. There is no doubt that the performances of West Ham and Wigan Athletic in the Premiership this season have given hope to all clubs outside that hallowed Division.

In the past teams that have gone up from the Nationwide League, or Coca-Cola Championship as it is now labelled, have struggled desperately, Swindon Town and the Bantams for example. So how refreshing to see two moderate sized clubs with basically British players hold their own with the elite.

Paul Jewel and Alan Pardew have led the way and for the likes of Steve Coppell at Reading and Neil Warnock at Sheffield United their success must be a great incentive.

ITS SWANS AND ROBINS

IT is a busy week coming up with a long trip down to South Wales for Tuesday night's game at Swansea City and Bristol City here at the Bradford & Bingley Stadium next Saturday.



The Swans of course had emerged as one of the strong runners for promotion this season and at one stage were flying away at the top of the table leaving all in their wake. Then just one week into December and it all started to go wrong.

Manager Kenny Jackett tried to revive his ailing team in the January transfer window by buying Swindon Town's leading scorer, Rory Fallon, who went there with 15 goals to his name and seemingly destined to make the Swans

Today they are home to Brentford and have a midweek trip to Scunthorpe on St Valentine's Day before appearing here.


