




Matt Sparrow has completed his two match ban, and will hopefully be involved today. He's certainly had a great season so far and he's certainly been sorely missed over the last couple of games.

There's a big weekend of games this Easter, with only seven points separating us from the bottom four. MK Dons play Swindon and Hartlepool this easter, so if they're going to save themselves from relegation, they have to pick up some points from those two games.

It's an important weekend for all the bottom four if they don't start picking up points, it will be very difficult for them to escape the drop to League Two.

I still think we need another couple of points, and hopefully we will have achieved that at Yeovil on Friday. One win would do it, just to make sure that we're comfortably out of reach of the relegation battle for the last couple of weeks of the season. The quicker we get those points, the better.

We drew 2-2 against Bournemouth in our last home game. At half time I think we'd have gladly taken a point, as although we'd gone in front quite early, they played very well and put us under a lot of pressure without that being reflected in the number of chances they created. We changed one or two things around in the second half, and we had a few chances before we equalised, with their keeper making a few good saves. I was a bit disappointed that we didn't nick all three points at the end, but I suppose a draw was a fair reflection of the game.

We face Swindon in today's game; it's a massive game for both teams, even bigger for them as they need the points more than us. They played MK Dons on Saturday so if they didn't get a result against them then they're really up against it.


I'm rather surprised to see them struggling to avoid relegation this season. When you look at some of the players they've got on paper, they shouldn't be

where they are. They've got some good players that have played at Championship level, even this season, such as Peacock and Cureton. They've struggled all season which is a surprise, but then again, there are one or two other teams that are struggling down there that are also unexpected.

I'm very pleased to see that Billy Sharp has been named in the PFA Team of the Year, which is great as it's his first season of regular first team football. It was a big decision for him to leave Sheffield United to come here, with him also being a Sheffield lad. He wasn't playing at Sheffield, but they got off to a great start this season and it was still a big move for him. Since he arrived here one he's scored goals, but unfortunately he's had that period recently when he's been out injured, but to get in the PFA Team is a great achievement for him. He's a level headed lad and he's a natural goal scorer, he can get himself in the box and I think he will score at any level he gets to play at. Hopefully he'll score even more goals next season and he can only get better.

Andy Keogh may be a little unfortunate not to be included as well, although it would be unusual for two strikers from the same club to get in. Andy's had a good season with 14 or 15 goals in his first full season, so both of them have done well and set themselves a standard which they can hopefully better next season.

The Away Dugout



It's tough down at the bottom - and today's visitors Swindon Town, managed by Iffy Onuora, have been down there for most of the campaign, so they should know exactly how harsh things can be.

They struggled hugely at first but since November a new steely determination has engulfed the County Ground and the Robins have been grinding out solid, if still unspectacular, results. Their 1-1 draw with the Iron in October was the turning point in the league. Their comeback in that match (with ten men for most of the second half) proved that there is more than enough talent in the current Swindon side to get out of a relegation scrap that has involved more than half of the division until recently.

In fact Swindon looked on course for an unlikely top half finish until they were stopped in their tracks by an awful 7-1 defeat at Nottingham Forest at the end of February, that result lowered confidence at the County Ground and results have been mixed since - it is probably going to go down to the last day for Onuora's men.

"At Forest we finished the second half with a drubbing, but at least recently we have finished matches attacking sides. In terms of points we are not too far off what I had thought we would need at this stage. However, we cannot afford any more hiccups," said Onuora.

"There is now a massive challenge in front of us and we have to rise to it. The lads have to get up to speed and we have to get the confidence back in us but there will be no substitute for hard work. The confidence is a little low and we need to get positivity back into our game. A relegation fight will take its toll mentally - but we should have enough about us to get out of it."

Iffy Onuora took over as Swindon manager in late September following the departure of Andy King from the club. Onuora joined the Robins in October 2004 as Head of Youth Development in and quickly made a positive impression with all at the County Ground with a swift promotion into management following less than a year later.

Results are much improved since the turn of the year and last week's 1-1 home draw with fellow strugglers Hartlepool United, in which they came back from a goal down, personified the determination in the current Swindon set-up.

"Slowly but surely a few clubs like Tranmere, Gillingham and Bristol City have put themselves on the brink of safety, but we, like seven or eight clubs down there, don't have that luxury," he said. "We have a youngish squad, we've had a lot of change and it's taken time for us to gel, but slowly and surely we have done that and we have got a reasonable chance of staying up. We have got a lot of teams to play in and around us and there are going to be some real six-pointers between now and the end of the season. We've got one of my old clubs Huddersfield at home on the last day of the season and there could be a lot at stake for both clubs, but there is a lot of football to be played before then."

Iffy has enjoyed a great 20 years in professional football, and was a much-travelled player - he now wants to translate his on-pitch success into management. A win on this Bank Holiday Monday could go a long way to making sure he is managing in League One next season, but the Iron might have something else to say about that as they seek to finally ensure their own safety.

Ex-Town manager Andy King swooped for Evans (20) in 2003 to give then-first choice keeper Bart Griemink more competition for the number one shirt at Swindon Town. Since that time Evans has been a regular between the posts for the Robins and has turned in many match saving performances. He has now established himself as number one once

After progressing up through the youth ranks at the club. Bulman (19) fulfilled every youngsters dream when he was handed a professional contract with Swindon Town in July 2005. He made his first team debut during this season's FA Cup defeat at Boston United, coming on as a substitute after Tom Heaton had been sent off after just 13 minutes of the game.

Defenders

Regularly featuring at the heart of the Robins defence this season have been ANDY GURNEY, SEAN O'HANLON, STEVE JENKINS, CHARLIE COMYN-PLATT and JACK SMITH.

Gurney (32) rejoined Swindon from Swansea on a permanent basis in January 2005 after failing to pin down a regular place in the Swans' starting line-up. He can operate anywhere along the backline or in centre of midfield - he likes to have a shot on goal and is not afraid to have a go from any distance. He joined left the Robins for Swansea on a free transfer in September 2004 and lists his other clubs as Torquay United, Bristol Rovers and Reading.

After impressing during an eight-game loan spell in the 2002-03 season, Liverpool-born O'Hanlon (23) signed for Swindon Town in March 2004 on a permanent basis from Everton. Having come up through the youth ranks at Goodison Park, O'Hanlon left Merseyside in search of first team football and was a rock in the centre of defence towards the end of the 2003-04 season and is one of the Robins' brightest prospects.

Capped by Wales on sixteen occasions, lenkins (34) (above right) was signed at the end of November 2004 and has provided added experience to the Town backline. He has had spells at Swansea, Huddersfield, Birmingham, Cardiff, Notts County and Peterborough. A reliable performer who made the right back slot his own during the latter part of 2004-05, Steve has remained solid during this campaign.






Comyn-Platt (21) joined the Bolton Academy in the summer of 2002 after a long association with the club. The assured defender was called into the first team for the first time in September 2003, and he was handed his debut when replacing Bruno N'Gotty for the final nine minutes of the 3-1 Carling Cup win over Walsall. After being released by Bolton in the summer of 2005, he made the switch to the County Ground on a one-year contract and has since extended it for another year.

Jack Smith (22) signed from Watford in the summer of 2005; he adds youthful experience to the Town side and arrives with a point to prove. Due to the departure of Paul Robinson to West Bromwich Albion, he was thrust into the first-team spotlight at Watford and coped admirably, registering two goals.

The consistent JEREL IFIL (23) has warmed the bench in recent weeks after returning from suspension, whilst ANDY NICHOLAS (23) could be in contention

Midfielders

Poised to be in midfield are MICHAEL POOK, GARETH WHALLEY and AARON BROWN. Warming the bench in recent weeks have been loan signing TOUMANI DIAGOURAGA and the young RICKY SHAKES.

Third year scholar Pook (20) has seen first team action on a number of occasions including the LDV Vans Trophy game at Boston United in 2003. An energetic 'box-to-box' midfielder, 'Pooky' signed a professional contract ahead of the 2005-06 season and was a consistent performer for the youth team and reserves last term.


Whalley (32) signed for Swindon Town in July 2005 from Wigan Athletic on a free transfer. Originally a trainee at Crewe, Gareth made over 200 first-team appearances for them before signing for Bradford City in July 1998 for £600,000, where he was a team mate of a certain Peter Beagrie. Gareth has since had spells at Crewe (again) and Cardiff before joining Wigan Athletic and making nine appearances for the Latics in their march to promotion to the Premiership.

He joined the Robins in the summer after turning down United's rivals Grimsby Town.

Joining from QPR in January, Brown (26) (below) has proved to be a decent signing by Iffy Onuora. The Bristol-born midfielder has made over 15 appearances since and has become a mainstay of the Robins' side. Formerly of Bristol City, Exeter, Torquay and Cheltenham, he has vast experience.

Diagouraga (18) is a promising midfielder who signed for Watford after coming over from Paris with several other Academy scholars. He has impressed hugely for the youth and reserve sides and joined Swindon towards the closing of the transfer window. He made his first start in last Saturday's home draw with Hartlepool.

Shakes (21) is a tricky winger with plent of pace - he signed from Bolton in a dewhich also saw Charlie Comyn-Platt jointhe club. The midfielder spent time on loan with Bristol Rovers and Bury during the 2004-05 season prior to joining the Robins and is hoping for a place in Trinidad and Tobago's World Cup squad this summer, where he could take on England.



Other midfielders in the squad who may be in action today are the experienced former Gillingham and Walsall man PAUL SMITH (34) and the exoticallynamed STEFANI MIGLIORANZI (28) who has been a mainstay of the Robins squad for years. Both have just returned from injury lay-offs.

Strikers

In attack could be former Iron transfer target TREVOR BENJAMIN, who is likely to be partnered by Star Man Jamie Cureton. The experienced LEE PEACOCK, on-loan CHRIS McPHEE and pacy CHRISTIAN ROBERTS complete the attacking options.

Benjamin (27) is on loan from Peterborough United until the end of the season. The big powerful target man has had spells at Cambridge United (for whom he used to score often against the Iron), Leicester, West Brom, Crystal Palace, Norwich, Brighton, Rushden, Gillingham, Northampton and Coventry. He has formed a decent partnership with Jamie Cureton and will be a danger to the Iron this afternoon.

Peacock (29) signed in late January after parting company with Sheffield Wednesday, with the tall forward signing on until summer 2009. He is a player of great quality at this level and the Paisleyborn forward has commanded fees in excess of £1,175,000 during his career. His best performance against the Iron came whilst he was in Mansfield colours, in a game where he scored a brace at Field Mill to hand the Stags a 2-1 win over United in 1998. He also scored in the encounter between the two teams at Glanford Park earlier that season. He has since had spells at Manchester City, Bristol City and the Owls. Lee has just returned from injury and scored in last week's draw with Hartlepool.


On loan from Brighton, McPhee (23) is a player who has come through the ranks at the Withdean Stadium and this is his second loan spell of the season. He was at Aldershot earlier this year.

Roberts (26) is another player with decent previous pedigree against United and he netted the equaliser back in

October at the County Ground. He has performed admirably for Exeter City against the Iron in the past and he has overcome off-field problems this year to bounce back strongly - much to the pleasure of boss Iffy Onuora.

Star Man

11 Jamie Cureton

Jamie Cureton joined Swindon from QPR where he scored six goals in twenty league starts and he arrives with an

impressive overall goal scoring record of 134 strikes in 274 league starts. A frontman with plenty of pace, Cureton has earned a reputation as sharp-shooter. After completing his traineeship with Norwich City, he returned to his home town of Bristol to team up with then Rovers manager, Ian Holloway, banging in 78 goals in four seasons. In August 2000, Reading captured the services of the talented goal scorer and in three seasons at the Royals, he helped take them to the brink of promotion to the top flight. Eventually Wolves were to stake their claim in the playoff semi final last season, and Cureton was lured to Korea to play for K-League club Pusan I.cons. Despite a lucrative deal, he could not settle in Korea, and sought the counsel of Rangers manager Holloway through a tough settling in period. However, Cureton was keen to return to the competitive pressure of club football in England. After joining QPR February 2004, Cureton turned out in the majority of their games until the end of the 2003-4 season. He then found himself in favour at the start of last season, partnering Paul Furlong up front. A stunning hat-trick against Coventry saw him take home the "man of the match" award as well as the ball. However, after making 46 appearances for Rangers, 30-year old Cureton joined Swindon Town in July 2005 on a two-year deal and has now settled into the side after a fruitful loan spell with Colchester United.

The Big Match Preview



United entertain Swindon Town at Glanford Park for the first time this afternoon and will be hoping that League One safety is all but secured by five o'clock.

It has been a growing theme in recent weeks, and hopefully the Iron will have won at Yeovil Town on Friday night to earn survival and make this game purely academic - however the game is still vital for a number of reasons.

Swindon need the points as badly as Scunthorpe and have quite considerable firepower in their ranks, which makes the writer wonder why this team, which is blessed with a umber of players that most other League One sides would love to have, is struggling.

Up front the Robins can call upon Trevor Benjamin, Jamie Cureton, Christian Roberts at Peacock. All four have proved a thorn in the side of United in the past, whilst the midfield boasts the likes of Stefano Miglioranzi and Gareth Whalley. Throughout the side there is a spine of experience that suggests they are possibly one of the best equipped sides in the bottom eight to get out of trouble.

Matt Sparrow returns from a two-match suspension for the fron this alternoon before his vation vide ban and his return boosts Scunthorpe. He netted United's goal at the County Ground back in October when the two teams drew 1-1.

It promises to be an entertaining affair this afternoon and with both sides looking to go for the jugular in the quest for three vital league points - plus, hopefully, a decent-sized Easter Monday crowd - we can enjoy a great game of football.

You have to go back six months for the last fixture between these two teams. It saw United have to make do with a point at the County Ground after ten man Swindon were controversially awarded a late penalty. The opening goal came on 35 minutes when full back Marcus Williams crossed from the left and Sparrow stole in from midfield to fire a smart 15-yard volley past Robins keeper Tom Heaton. Big Swindon striker Rory Fallon (now at Swansea) was sent off for a second bookable offence after he clashed with Richard Hinds for the second time in as many minutes and the referee had no choice but to give him his marching orders. This proved to be the turning point of the match as Swindon began to rally and put pressure on the Iron defence. They were finally rewarded for their endeavour in the 78th minute when lan Baraclough handled in the box. Former Exeter forward Christian Roberts kept his cool to fire home the penalty and put the Robins level. Shakes went close to winning the game but in the end both teams had to make do with a point.



There are very few connections between Scunthorpe United and Swindon Town, but one name that does stand out is that of FRANK BURROWS who joined the Iron as a 21 year old from Raith Rovers in June 1965.








He had to wait until the following January before making his debut, but then quickly established his place at the centre of defence making 19 appearances and

scoring his one goal of the campaign in the 2-1 win at Bournemouth. During the 1966-67 season he missed only five league games and formed a regular defensive partnership alongside Keith Burkinshaw, although he did have a spell as a makeshift centre-forward when goals were scarce. He was ever-present throughout 1967-68, scoring twice, but United were relegated to Division Four and Swindon stepped in for his signature to keep him at Third Division level. His first season at the County Ground was an immediate success. He missed just two of the 46 league games as the Robins won promotion and he played in the League Cup Final at Wembley where Arsenal were beaten 3-1. Burrows remained with Swindon for nine seasons, suffering relegation during 1973-74 when he also had a spell on loan at Mansfield which saw him play against Scunthorpe in the April of that season. The Scot called a halt to his playing career at the end of 1976-77 after 297 appearances for the Robins.



In July 1978. Swindon signed former Doncaster winger IAN MILLER who spent three seasons at the County Ground totting up 127 appearances. He

then had eight years in the Second Division with Blackburn, playing 268

times, before joining Port Vale in July 1989. A year later Mick Buxton brought the 35 year old to Glanford Park, presumably for his experience, but after starting the season as first choice, he spent most the campaign on the bench. By the summer he had featured in only 12 games and decided to retire from professional football.

Other players to appear for both clubs include ALAN SPROATES, a fullback or midfielder, BOBBY BARNES and KEITH O'HALLORAN. Sproates, a former Sunderland junior, joined Swindon in August 1963 but played just three games over two seasons. He fared better at Darlington, making 315 appearances during his nine years at Feethams until moving to Scunthorpe for the 1974-75 season, but he was in-andout of a poor United team that finished bottom of the League and he played just 24 games.

Barnes came to the Old Show Ground in November 1985 on loan from West Ham and played six times. He eventually signed for Swindon in October 1987 and scored 13 goals from 45 appearances over two seasons. Midfield man

O'Halloran was on loan to the Iron from Middlesbrough in March 1996 and played seven times. He signed for Swindon in July 2000 taking two seasons to clock up 46 games.



A name from the past is that of TONY McSHANE. (left) who was United's manager for the 1958-59 season. the club's first in the old Second Division.

Born in Belfast in February 1927, his Football League career kicked off with Plymouth during 1949-50. A wing-half, he played 85 times for the Devon club and enjoyed their Third Division (South) title-winning season of 1951-52. In June 1955 he joined Swindon, but in two seasons there, the club finished in the bottom two places of Division Three (South) each time. Before taking charge at Scunthorpe he had been manager of Midland League side Goole Town. Upon leaving United he took a job away from football, but returned to the game when becoming boss at Chesterfield from 1962 to 1967.

The Next Match

Matt Blanchard takes a look at the next two League One fixtures, against Rotherham United and Blackpool.

Rotherham United v Scunthorpe United

The Iron travel to Rotherham knowing three points will almost certainly guarantee League One football next year, but with Rotherham scrapping for their lives, it's not going to be easy.

In goal for the Millers will be the much travelled 29-year-old Neil Cutler. Cutler started his career at Chester in 1995, before moving to Premiership side Aston Villa. He then went on loan to Oxford in 2000 before joining Stoke City. He helped the Potters win promotion to the Championship before switching sides again, this time to Swansea. Then he rejoined Stoke and had a spell at Stockport before signing for the Millers.

In defence the Irish right-back David Worrell and centre-backs Shaun Barker and Colin Murdock will be joined by Paul Hurst, who will be slotting into left back.

A midfield quartet of John Mullin, Lee Williamson, Stephen Quinn (who is currently on loan from Sheffield United) and Republic of Ireland star Michael Keane are likely to pose United threats from every angle.

In attack for Rotherham will be Martin Butler, who has netted just seven times this season due to injury. His partner will most likely be Paul Shaw, who has a worse scoring record, only managing three goals so far. Jonathan Forte also gives the Millers another attacking option; he scored for Doncaster against United earlier in the season whilst on loan at Belle Vue.

In goal for Pool will be Lee Jones. The Welsh stopper has made 26 appearances so far and at 6ft 3ins, he is Simon Grayson's first choice keeper. Jones is in his third season with Blackpool, and has made 83 appearances in total.

The back four will consist of Marc Joseph, Peter Clarke, Welsh star Robert Edwards and former Leeds defender Jason Wilcox.

There's a new book coming out soon that should interest fans of Scunthorpe United.



It's a biography about the Iron's club record goal scorer Steve Cammack. He reigned supreme at the Old Show Ground from 1979 until 1986 - apart from one season spent down the road at Lincoln City.

Cammy is still the only player ever to score 100 league goals for the Iron and was a larger than life character who served under four different managers.

It was Ron Ashman who first signed him for £25,000 from Chesterfield - as a former England youth international who had played up front in the same side for his country as a young Trevor Francis. But whereas Francis went on to win fame and fortune with Nottingham Forest and England at full international level, Cammack had to plough through the 'real world' of professional football at its lower levels.

The former Sheffield United youngster had a real talent not only for scoring goals, but also making them. I remember one of his old Bramall Lane bosses Ken Furphy once telling me that Cammy was only a whisker away from making the big time himself. He did play in the old First Division for Sheffield before falling out of favour after a change of management.

Not that he always saw eye to eye with his bosses here at Scunthorpe. He had a difficult relationship with John Duncan, the man who laid the foundations for Scunthorpe's promotion success back in 1982/83 before Allan Clarke was brought controversially in towards the end of the season when Duncan himself was axed.

It was during Duncan's reign that Cammy was exiled to Lincoln City where he struggled to make his mark.

He has a good story to tell about how he came to be brought back to the Old Show Ground - as a favourite of the then chairman David Wraith, Wraith was right, Cammy produced the goods and his 25 goals in his first season back steered United to promotion.

Cammy frightened the life out of Leeds United in an epic FA Cup third round struggle which Scunthorpe eventually won 4-2 in a second replay. He then rattled the crossbar in a 1-0 defeat at First Division West Brom in the following round.

Yet though he regularly plundered the goals, until being forced to retire early due to a groin injury, Cammack never got the chance to try his luck again back at a higher level.

His name will live long though in Scunthorpe folklore and his book should prove an interesting read. It has been compiled by Sheffield student Julian MacKenzie - and should be on sale soon. Keep an eye out for it to help while away the summer.

It is not long now before we reach the end of season break. There is just one more home game left after this, against Blackpool a week on Saturday. That will be chance to reflect on what has been a good season for the Iron in League One.

Time too to start thinking of the player of the season. Two young men who will spring to most people's minds will

inevitably be strikers Billy Sharp and Andy Keogh.

Both have had a fantastic first full season in League football, plundering a bagful of

Andy too has sparkled alongside him, winning a call-up for the Eire Under-21 squad.

Another big success this season has been the versatile Richard Hinds who joined the club last summer from Hull. He has proved a key man both in defence and midfield - and has also shown a happy knack of coming up with vital goals.

There have been many other plusses this season for United too as they have proved their worth at League One level. It has been much better hasn't it, to have been playing the likes of Huddersfield, Bradford and Rotherham rather than Lincoln, Boston and Co.

Promotion twelve months ago was a great step for the club - and they've come a long way since that too.




Boss backs Billy for Golden Boot

Iron manager Brian Laws has backed top scorer Billy Sharp to get amongst the goals again and finish top scorer in League One.

The forward has just come back from a six-week injury lay-off and made 30 minute appearances in the games with Bradford City and Bournemouth, and has five games left to overtake Lee Trundle, James Hayter and Freddy Eastwood to finish top of the scoring charts.

"Billy was absolutely gutted that he hasn't got a goal, but I'm sure he'll make up for it on Friday against Yeovil." said Laws, speaking on Iron World, referring to Saturday's 2-2 draw with Bournemouth.



"I'm delighted with the way he has performed since he's come back. We've had a plan to see him progress in the right manner and not just throw him in for the sake of it. He's not played any games other than the 30 minutes he had on Saturday and at Bradford and normally you have to play a couple of reserve matches.

"He won't be sticking on that 19 goals for long. He'll definitely get back to scoring goals and hopefully it will be sooner rather than later because when he's scoring, we're winning games."

Duo ruled out for season

Midfield pair Neil MacKenzie and Ashley Allanson (pictured) will miss the rest of the campaign after picking up injuries in the reserves 2-1 win at Grimsby Town.

MacKenzie will sit out the rest of the season with ankle ligament damage - similar to the injury that team mate Billy Sharp picked up in February.

Boss Brian Laws told the club's website: "It's a blow for Neil and comes at a time when he was getting himself back in the frame."

The 29-year-old initially moved to Glanford Park on loan from League Two side Macclesfield in November, and signed permanently until the end of the season in the January transfer window.



He has since gone on to score two goals for United - including the Coca-Cola league's 2000th goal of the season at Barnsley in December and a scorcher of a strike at Walsall back in February. He had made 16 starts and two substitute appearances.


MacKenzie is also the top scorer for the reserves side this season with three goals. Before joining Scunthorpe he had spells at Stoke, Cambridge, Kidderminster, Blackpool and Mansfield, and has made over 200 league appearances in total.

Allanson will miss the remainder of the campaign with a broken cheekbone. He moved to Glanford Park earlier in the season after being released by Championship side, and local rivals, Hull City.

His only first-team appearance was as a late substitute in the 3-1 home defeat to Brentford in November, but he has gone on to appear regularly for the reserves and youth side in a number of different positions.




Bantams manager Colin Todd:

"This was a tremendous victory - one we wanted. The game was not about Dean Windass but it was his birthday and he has come up with a hat-trick. That is just what you want."











longer the case. The 1995 Act, specifically drafted to end discrimination towards disabled people, has been the catalyst for a re-invigorated effort from football authorities and clubs alike to make disabled people integral to the culture unique to this phenomenon that grips us all:

The campaign focuses on two main areas:

- a) Virtually every club now has a "Football in the Community" programme and central to that programme is "inclusion". To the uninitiated, this means attracting disabled people to participate as team members in their own right.
- b) I don't know of a single club that doesn't have at least one disabled supporter and I don't know of a single club that hasn't provided disabled supporter facilities. However, it's often the case that little is known - by disabled people themselves or fans in general about the facilities offered.

With this campaign we want to highlight the positive way in which disabled supporters' issues are being addressed. The remainder of this article will illustrate how your own club has engaged with disabled supporters - so keep your eye open for the 2007 campaign update!

First half goals from Danny Thomas and Peter Till were enough for Boston, despite Ritchie Ryan pulling a goal back.

Boston were quick out the blocks and raced into a 2-0 lead inside the opening 22 minutes.

Danny Thomas put the home side ahead on five minutes when he drilled home a 16-yard angled shot past young debutant Josh Lillis after Steve Melton and Till had combined to free the striker down United's left.

Till was on target himself when he fired unmarked past Lillis from David Galbraith's cross after 22 minutes.

The Iron reduced the deficit on 33 minutes when Ritchie Ryan glanced home a header from close-range after Joe Wilcox had whipped over a cross from the right.

In the final moments of the match United hit the bar, but Boston held on to claim their first Lincs Cup victory since 1989. That means that United will have to wait another year to claim their 17th Lincolnshire Cup title.


The home side named seven firstteam players in their side, while Cliff Byrne, Andy Parton and Jim Goodwin were the only players in the Iron line-up with senior experience.



Flashback


Looking back at the relatively short history of this afternoon's fixture, Swindon Town have one more win than the Iron.







Directions By Car:

It is easier to reach Millmoor if you don't come off the M18 at junction I (A631) but instead carry onto the M1 (north) and leave at junction 34. Turn right (away from Sheffield), then turn left at the next roundabout (A631). You will reach another roundabout after about half a mile – turn right, and then continue straight on at subsequent roundabouts. You will see notices for away car parking on this road – at this stage you will see a large scrap yard on your left – Millmoor is behind this. Turn left at the next roundabout to get to the ground. The ground will be on your left.

By Train:

Rotherham Central station is on the line from Scunthorpe to Sheffield. Turn left out of the station and follow the small blue pedestrian signs to the ground. There are also buses; both the 11 and 12 (heading to Meadowhall) stop outside Millmoor and run every 10 minutes.

Parking:

There is a car park at the ground which costs £2 per car, or there is some street parking available further down Masbrough Street (just across the railway bridge). Alternatively, there is an unofficial car park off Main Street (right at the roundabout on the A630 if following the directions above). This is clearly signed, behind the Zone nightclub.

Ground Information:

Millmoor is an old-fashioned ground, not a stadium by any means.

Redevelopment work is underway on the Main Stand, which means that the capacity of the ground is reduced to 7,500. Opposite this, on the Millmoor Lane side of the ground, are three small stands that are a mixture of covered and uncovered seating, whilst the two ends of the ground were terraces that have now been converted to seating.

What's it like for Visiting Supporters?

The Railway End, behind one goal, has room for up to 2,000 away fans, although your view is likely to be spoilt at some stage by one of the many pillars across the front. The last time the Iron played the Millers in Rotherham, this stand was a terrace but it was converted into seats due to the rule that requires all stadia in the top two divisions to be all-seated.

Ticket Prices:

Adults: £17
Concessions: £11
Tickets cost £2 less if purchased in advance.

Food & Drink:

The Butchers Arms, on Midland Road (parallel with Masbrough Street) near the railway line, is usually a friendly pub with a mix of home and away fans. The Tivoli Club at the ground is the Supporters' Club and normally allows away fans in, while the Millmoor Pub on the corner of Millmoor Lane is also popular with visiting supporters.

The last time:

Back in March 1999, the Iron travelled to Millmoor for a 0-0 draw, which kept Scunthorpe on course for promotion while Rotherham narrowly missed out a repeat fixture in the play-off final when they were beaten on penalties by Leyton Orient after two goalless semifinals. Both teams have suffered promotion and relegation since then, although United's record of one move in each direction is tame compared to the Millers who won promotion in 2000 and again in 2001. They then spent five seasons in what is now the Championship before being relegated last May. Of the Rotherham team from the 1999 meeting, goalkeeper Mike Pollitt is now with Wigan, whilst winger Chris Sedgwick is a regular at Preston and Leo Fortune-West is still leading the line for Doncaster Rovers.

Recent Record:

There have been some cracking games between the two sides at Millmoor over the past few years. Back in November 1997, two goals from John Eyre and one from Jamie Forrester saw Scunthorpe record a 3-1 win. Two seasons prior to that, the Iron held a 4-I lead in the first leg of a League Cup tie. However, Rotherham secured a 3-0 win in normal time and went on to win 5-0 after extra time to completely turn around the tie. It was the second 5-0 defeat for Scunthorpe in consecutive trips to Rotherham, following a defeat in March 1992. Earlier in the same season, following a 3-3 draw during normal time, Scunthorpe became the first club in the history of the FA Cup to lose in a penalty shoot-out.

Southend United





A late leveller from Richard Hinds handed United a vital point at home to struggling Bournemouth in our last fixture at Glanford Park.



Up stepped Peter Beagrie to rifle home his second penalty within a week.

However Scunthorpe failed to build on the early breakthrough and the visitors began to get a grip on the game, showing some fine passing football - though at times they were guilty of overplaying. However target man Steve Fletcher went close before they eventually equalised through James Hayter.


A curling cross from Steven Foley reached the head of Bournemouth's top scorer six yards from goal, he then diverted the ball past Musselwhite into his top left-hand corner. It was his 19th goal of the season and the fourth consecutive game in which he has netted against the Iron.

United upped the pace in the second half and went close through Beagrie and Baraclough before Bournemouth took a shock lead. James O'Connor, who hit the post minutes earlier, let fly with his left foot to guide an unstoppable 25-yard strike into Paul Musselwhite's top right-hand corner.



Ian Tremayne lives at Harlow in Essex where he is planning consultant and director of Latton Planning Services Limited.

"Scunthorpe is where I was brought up and, although I live down south, I still consider it home. There is a United pennant in my youngest son Liam's bedroom window. Although he was born in Essex he is a big Iron fan, as is my other son Calum, and every time I see the pennant it makes me proud of the Iron and them.

I've supported the Iron for forty years and last season I got to about ten home games and twelve aways. I am fairly sure that my first game was at home to Swansea in April 1966 on Ray Clemence's debut and we drew I-I. My first away game was the following season at Grimsby and we got smacked 7-I!"

So which players stick in the memory from the last forty years?

"Kevin Keegan, not just because he was a great player but a thoroughly nice bloke. He actually introduced me to Bill Shankly when he had just gone to Liverpool. Amongst the current squad, it's very difficult as I think we have some really good players at present, possibly the best we have had for a long time. I think the best footballer we have, with the exception of Peter Beagrie and you can't vote for a 40 year old, is Andy Keogh. Amongst the more amusing memories is watching Angus Davidson play in a night game and getting back to the Desert Rat after it, only to see him already propping the bar up!

I have been involved in the Scunthorpe United London and South East Supporters Club for sixteen years, currently as its Chairman. Our aim is to try to get people supporting and travelling to watch United and to raise a few quid for the club. We sponsored the Yeovil game this season. We have 97 members at present - 80% are from London and the south-east although we do have members in Singapore, Canada, USA and Australia. The main benefit is keeping in touch with like-minded fools who love United. We have close links with the football club itself and are in touch with Irish Iron regularly. We are hoping all the external supporters clubs will be meeting for a pint in The Honest Lawyer after the last home game against Blackpool."

Next I ask Ian what, if anything, he would like to see change at SUFC. "I think the players and management could communicate and mix much more with the fans and make us feel a bit more valued. And then give Glanford Park some character and better bar facilities.

After the Iron, I have always looked for Liverpool's result second. Originally I think it was because, when I was really little, everything Merseyside was trendy and then it was reinforced with both Ray Clemence and Kevin Keegan going there, not forgetting Richard Money. One of my best memories is being at Wembley to see Kenny Dalglish score the winning goal in the European Cup Final against Bruges."

Finally, today's game brings back mixed memories for lan: "I can recall travelling down there on an old Lincs. Road Car bus for the fifth round in 1970, to see us lose 3-1 in the FA cup on a glue pot that should never have had football played on it. But today I am hopeful for a 3-1 win."

The History of Football

1977/78

Forest rival Liverpool's dominance

Those of us old enough to have enjoyed watching Jimmy Greaves in his prime may be surprised to learn that he was sometimes a naughty boy. However, in the twilight of his career as a player in the Eastern League, he was part of a needle match between Barnet and Chelmsford. Unfortunately, Mr Greaves fell foul of the referee and was invited to test the temperature of the bath water before quarter to five. He stoutly refused to leave the park and so the referee blew abandoned the match. Jim was found guilty of bringing the game into disrepute and banned for four games.

Meanwhile, one of the country's top goalkeepers, Pat Jennings, decided to quit his post (or posts) at Tottenham and move to neighbours Arsenal. danced round his Brazilian defence to score for the Americans. Then at half time, he swapped round and wore the number ten with pride for his beloved Santos.

Another famous name was back in harness for the 1977/78 season. England's 1966 World Cup winning manager, Alf Ramsey, took charge of Birmingham City in a caretaker capacity and eased them to a comfortable midtable cushion. However, he resigned after the City board put their jewel in the crown, Trevor Francis, on the transfer list.

The 1977/78 season was to be dominated, in the main, by two clubs - the red of Liverpool versus the red of Nottingham Forest.

Liverpool had ruled the roost for a

Another farewell came in 1977 when Pele, the Black Pearl, another gentleman of the game, decided to call it a day. His swansong came before 70,000 spectators when his old club, Santos, met his last club, New York Cosmos. In the first half, this wizard of soccer


decade or more, but unfashionable
Nottingham Forest and their brash
manager Brian Clough were out to show
the football world a thing or two.
Brian Clough's achievement at
Nottingham Forest was incredible. He
inherited a poor side and immediately



won promotion back to the First
Division. Within two short years, the
club that crawled out of the Second
Division in third place was now
confident to take on all comers, and in
the 1977/78 season, they swept all
before them.

Forest would go on to top the league by seven points, well ahead of Liverpool in the runners-up place, themselves a brilliant eleven. Perhaps the best example of Forest's superiority came on "Match of the Day" when they went to Old Trafford and ripped United to shreds. A crowd of 54,375 watched open mouthed as Forest cruised to a 4-0 victory, thus completing the league double.

Liverpool, on the other hand, were the reigning league champions, and drew both league fixtures with Clough's men. However, the two teams also met in the Football League Cup final. A goalless Wembley final was followed by a replay at Old Trafford, with a penalty, converted by John Robertson, deciding



the tie. However, despite the foul being one described as "professional", it was proved by television replays to have taken place outside of the box. Perhaps there had been some kind of poetic justice.

Liverpool were hoping for another season of success in Europe as they competed in the European Cup as reigning champions. Liverpool entered the cup at the second round stage, and promptly crushed Dynamo Dresden 6-3 on aggregate.

At the quarter final stage, Liverpool had a much tougher task when drawn to play the mighty Benfica, but the Reds had little respect for past tradition, winning 6-2 on aggregate.

Liverpool faced Borussia Moenchengladbach in the semi final. The Germans won 2-1 in their home leg but a one goal advantage was not going to be enough against Liverpool. At Anfield, another carnival night saw Liverpool dominate the game and win 3-0 through goals by Kennedy, Dalglish and Case.

The European Cup final was like a home game to the Pool, because Wembley had been selected to stage the showcase game. In the other semi-final, FC Brugge had surprised a lot of the pundits by beating Juventus 2-1 on aggregate, but they were expected to go down in the final. On May 10th 1978, 92,000 packed the north west London arena and sat back to watch the inevitable. Liverpool won by a narrower margin than many anticipated, with a 1-0 victory achieved thanks to Kenny Dalglish's strike.

The remaining climax to the season was the FA Cup final, which actually was staged four days before its European counterpart. This time the contestants were Arsenal, no strangers to winning the Bradford made trophy, and Ipswich Town, in the final for the first time. Although the match had little in the way of goals, it was a showpiece to savour for the fans, many in short sleeves taking in the rays of the warm shafts of sunlight. Finally, deadlock was broken by a goal from Roger Osborne, but the excitement of scoring the only goal drained him, and he had to be substituted. After ninety minutes it was the Ipswich supporters who celebrated the moment as their team put its name on the FA Cup for the

All that remains is for us to congratulate Bolton Wanderers, champions of Division Two, Southampton and Tottenham who also won promotion from that league. They were promoted to Division One to take the place of the relegated West Ham, Newcastle and Leicester. In Division Three, Wrexham topped the pile, and in Division Four, Watford, with Elton John in the boardroom, won the basement league championship. As a footnote, there was joy for supporters of Wigan Athletic who gained entry to the league at the expense of Southport after a second ballot gave them victory by 29 votes to 20.




