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# the dunn thing

IT MAY have been just a five minute run out as a substitute but Derek Asamoah's recent appearance for Ghana ensured a piece of Shrewsbury Town club history had to be re-written.

By being summoned to appear from the bench for his country in the closing stages of their 3-1 friendly victory over South Korea, Asamoah became the first Town player to be capped at full international level while playing for the club in 18 long years.

Not since Shrewsbury-born Bernard McNally won the last of his five Northern Ireland caps against Malta in 1988 had a current Town player gained a full cap.

Yes, Town have produced quite a few Wales under-21 internationals — Carl Griffiths, Paul Evans (back here today with

Swindon), Jamie Tolley, Darren Moss and David Edwards while Joe Hart was memorably selected for England under-19s last season.

Also, within the last decade, Town have had players like Sagi Burton (St Kitts), John Keister (Sierra Leone) and lain Jenkins (Northern Ireland) on their books, but none of them added to their collection of caps while they were actually wearing the blue and amber of Shrewsbury.

Burton might have done last month but he declined the chance to represent St Kitts in a Caribbean tournament.

It all only serves to underline what a great achievement it is for Asamoah to have forced his way

into the squad of such a strong, emerging nation as Ghana.

Having emerged from the group stages during last summer's World Cup finals in Germany, the jet-heeled striker thought he would have to bide his time to play for his country.

So his delight was easy to understand when Ghana's new coach Claude Le Roy selected him in his first squad for the recent minitour to Asia. Asamoah had to settle for a place on the bench as an unused sub as Japan were beaten 1-0 in Yokohama in the opening match.

But he finally received his chance when he came on for the final five minutes of Ghana's fine win over South Korea in Seoul, lining up alongside the likes of Chelsea star Michael Essien.

"It was a very proud moment for me," said the man christened 'Del Boy' by Town skipper Richard Hope.

Asamoah joins a select group of players to be capped at full international level by their countries while playing for Shrewsbury — certainly since the club entered the Football League for the first time since 1950.

It may have been before my time but older supporters have told me all about Jimmy McLaughlin and Terry Harkin, who were both called up by Northern Ireland in the 1960s.

Winger McLaughlin played five times for the Irish during his Meadow days.

When I made the 'Meadow Memories' club history video with Matthew Ashton a few years ago, I can recall former Town full back Gordon Skeech telling me how most of the Shrewsbury side of the time traveled down to Wembley to watch McLaughlin make his Irish debut against England in 1962.

The popular winger also played against Wales twice, Scotland and Greece while he was a Town man.

Derry-born striker Harkin, meanwhile, who scored 30 goals in 79 league games for Town, was capped three times for the Irish

during his Meadow days.

He lined up against Wales in 1969 and against USSR and Spain the following year.

Town fans of more recent vintage, like myself, will no doubt recall the club having to call off a division two game at Huddersfield in 1985 after both Gerry Daly and Bernard McNally received international call ups.

As a youngster watching from the Riverside, these two stylish midfielders were among my early Town favourites.

Daly may have been in the twilight of his career by the time Chic Bates signed him, but he remained a class act and he won the final four of his 48

won the final four of his caps for the Republic of Ireland while playing for Town.

He even scored a penalty against Uruguay at Landsdowne Road while Daly also played against Iceland, Czechoslovakia (that was) and Scotland during his all too brief Town career.

As for McNally, he shares with McLaughlin the accolade of Town's most capped player as he picked up five caps with Northern Ireland, strangely never adding to his tally after his £385,000 move to West Bromwich Albion.

McNally made his Irish debut in a Windsor Park friendly against Morocco in 1986 — the same night Daly was scoring for Eire against Uruguay — and he also went on to play against Turkey, Yugoslavia, Greece and finally Malta.

It can only be hoped that Derek Asamoah continues to entertain us with his skills and maintains his place in the Ghana squad for some time to come.

Then, perhaps, the record currently shared by McLaughlin and McNally may well be broken.

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

Good afternoon, my turn to do the Shrewsworld article again and it's the next age bracket up in the USA coaching world that I'm going to focus on. Last time it was the nightmare arena of the 3 to 5 year olds, now we move on to the 6 to 10 year olds. A much more enjoyable age group to coach, for a number of different reasons; the main plus point of this age group is that you get much more response out of them and you almost feel yourself enjoying the sessions.

At this age the element of serious competition is introduced and children have the choice of two different grades of soccer - Travel vs. Recreation. To play in a travel team costs a decent amount of money and it tends to attract the better standard of player, whereas recreation soccer is less competitive and attracts the casual 'just playing soccer for fun' (i.e. completely rubbish) player. Now, if you remember that the standard of soccer in the USA in general is massively lower than in the UK, it might help you picture just how bad some of the recreation coaching sessions I oversaw really were: Stevie Wonder in charge of the blind school playing eye spy would've had more success than me.

However at least the recreation soccer environment was pressure free, as long as the kids had fun then everyone was happy, there was no need for any perceptible improvement or tactical discussion. Even the parents at this level seemed resigned to the fact that their kids were rubbish and as long as their kid was smilling, they were happy too. This wasn't always the case of course; one famous occasion when I managed to spectacularly upset a child was during a tremendously fun session in Tinton Falls, New Jersey. I was coaching a group of

8 year olds, who were quite a good laugh, aside from one child (there's always one) named Todd, blond hair and glasses, looked quite a lot like the milky bar kid, Todd was a spoilt brat and moaned his way through the fun times. Being something of a Victor Meldrew wannabe myself, I didn't treat Todd any differently than any other child I coached (i.e. I pretty much ignored him).

Now we were nearing the end of another fun time getting ready for the close of session scrimmage (unbelievably this is the term for just playing normal football), Todd was standing in goal adjusting his sports goggles (protecting his milky bar glasses) and I was stood on the half way line of the mini-pitch waiting for the kids to finish putting on their bibs (recreation kids take at least ten minutes to master the task of putting your head through one hole and your arms through the other two). That's when something caught my eye, right next to the mini-centre circle was a ball, just sitting there waiting to be struck. Anyone who's ever played football will hopefully know what I mean, sometimes you see a ball and it's almost as if it is looking at you and the only solution is to thrash it goalwards and celebrate a silent glory at how great a

player you are. So, I made the rash decision to fire the ball at goal, preferably arrowing it into the top corner of the goal astounding all the watching parents into thinking I should've made it professionally.

Sadly, as you've probably guessed by now, the ball did not bullet into the net, instead it swerved up and then down and eventually (much to my horror) smashed squarely into the face of Todd, who was

> still adjusting his glasses. The milky bar kid might be tough and strong, but on this occasion he collapsed to the turf like a pack of cheap cards and looked like he might not get up again. At this point for me, the world had gone into silent slow motion mode, I couldn't help but thinking that being a child murderer probably wasn't going to look that good on my coaching CV.

> I started the slow motion jog over to the goalmouth, Todd's mother anxiously looking

on from her seat on the sidelines (although looking back, her anxiety wasn't so great that it forced her to get up). During this time, little Todd had yet to move, which led to my imagination to further paint the picture of 'child killer sent home in disgrace'. It was then that the little fella moved and praise the Lord he got up, never have I been so pleased to see his annoying little face. I decided to down-play the incident, "Good save there Todd, but next time you might want to use your hands", he nodded in agreement and amazingly did not cry or moan, so I casually waved over to his mother to let her know the boy wasn't dead and my coaching career remained intact.

### We are Sailing, we are Sailing.....

The choice last Saturday was a simple one. Go to Peterborough and support the Town or go to the seaside and play about on a boat. I know what I really wanted to do but I am a pragmatist. There may be more crucial games ahead and in order to bank a few 'Brownie' points I decided that I would do the decent thing. After all, when we left Shrewsbury on the Saturday morning, the sun was shining and the weather was going to be good for the day.

You see, a good friend of a friend bought a motor boat in the summer. These opportunities do not come along too often and once or twice before he had already invited Jane and me to take a trip on his new boat. Whenever I go to the seaside I always look on enviously when I see people on the water messing around in boats and this was too good an opportunity to miss.

We made our way to the Mulberry Marina in Conwy. The name was lost on me initially but I later found out that parts of Churchill's Mulberry Harbour used in the D-Day landings had been built here. Concrete sections were built in the Conway Estuary and then towed out to sea and sunk out of sight of the Germans. They were re-floated later in the war and taken to France ready for the invasion of Europe.

I have to say, chugging quietly out of the harbour in this very impressive little boat, my normal Saturday afternoon preoccupation with the Town was fairly cursory. We passed big expensive boats, small insignificant dinghies some beautifully cared for but many rusting and ignored. I was aware of background chatter about water depth and the tide. I knew I had entered a new world when I heard the terms port and 'starboard' for the first time.

It was only as we left the Marina that the Captain opened the throttle a bit. But even then, the estuary speed limit limited the full impact of the boat's real capacity to go fast. It was only when we passed the estuary buoy, (I am into the language now!) that the front bit, sorry, stern, rose up out of the sea. The throttle was pulled back and for the first time we became aware of the real character and power of our boat.

They reckon the Menai Straits are potentially among the most dangerous waters around our shores. Making our way across to Puffin Island which lies off Anglesey, you were not really aware of the dangers. Something to do with wind direction, 'slack' waters and various other things to do with the sea.

On our return, this time facing into the wind and going against

the currents which force their way through the narrow straits which separate the Island from the mainland, I can only describe the way I felt as something akin to the moment Luke Rodgers missed the first penalty at Stoke.

Fear is a funny thing. The sea is marvellous to look at, but it can also be very frightening. You try to judge how things are by seeing how others are reacting. When all you see is fear etched across faces, you know that things aren't going too

When the captain enquires if we are 'leaving' Puffin Island behind yet because he is so preoccupied with negotiating the waves in front of him, and his wife, (who has also done a bit of this sort of thing), says she hasn't been in seas anything like this before, you begin to wonder if a trip to the Posh might have been a better option.

It's interesting how we all react to stress in different ways. I go quiet, others become loud. 'Are you feeling sea sick?' enquired my friend. To be honest, at that point I would have been very happy to throw up if it meant getting back in one piece. "No, no" was my reply, forcing a bit of a smile as you

In the middle of all of this I receive a text message. It is my son asking me if I know what the score is. At that moment I couldn't really have cared if we were losing 10-0 to be perfectly honest. I felt like texting him back to say "sod the score, call the Coastguard"!

Very quickly we returned to calmer waters, put down the anchor and opened a bottle of champagne. There was something very surreal and yet very agreeable about having sandwiches and champagne in a boat in the middle of the Conway Estuary. We toasted everything and everybody. We cheered our Captain who had brought us through the straits.....eventually.

The boat actually had a radio, but out of reach of Radio Shropshire we had to wait for Radio Five Live to get around to giving the Town score. It wasn't good news but the sense of relief and the knowledge that Wrexham had also lost, seemed to ease the pain a bit, especially as my companions were Wrexham supporters.

Now then Jane, on Tuesday night we have a choice. We can either pop down to see Town take on Hereford or we can go and fly a Glider on the Long Mynd. So what will it be?

### robbo writes

It's fitting that Shrewsbury Town's last season at Gay Meadow should feature a visit to the ground by Walsall for the first time in nearly ten years.

December 2, 1996 was the last time the Saddlers came to Shrewsbury, and that game ended in a 2-2 draw, with Steve Anthrobus and lan Stevens scoring our goals. Coincidentally, the game at the Bescot Stadium also finished 2-2, with Darren Currie and Dave Walton on target for the Town.

The true significance of a Walsall visit to Gay Meadow goes much further back than that - to April 26, 1961 in fact.

A ground record of 18,917 fans crammed into the Meadow that night to see Walsall snatch a 2-1 win and clinch promotion to the old Division Two (now the Championship) for the first time.

As a nine-year old lad, I was standing in my usual spot up against the wall, just to the right of what we called in those days the "Tech End". As those of you who weren't there can imagine, the atmosphere was amazing.

But it was strange to be watching a game at the Meadow where most of the crowd were supporting the visitors!

These days, with crowd segregation, it's easy enough to publish figures stafing how many "away" fans attend any given match. Not so in 1961.

It would be interesting to learn exactly how many of that 18,917 were from Walsall. I suppose it must have been about 14,000 — it certainly seemed like it.

The prolific Colin Taylor put Walsall one up after just four minutes with his 32nd goal of the season, but a penalty by Arthur Rowley levelled the scores just before the break.

Colin Askey scored the winner after the break to spark wild celebrations, which became even wilder when the Walsall tans learned that their main rivals Queens Park Rangers had lost 3-1. They were up!

Whereas most of us these days, especially those of us who live to the west of Shrewsbury, consider our main local derby to be against Wrexham, when I was a kid it was always the Walsall games we looked forward to most in a season.

This was because Wrexham were usually a division below us in the league, and we only ever played them in cups. I make no excuse at this point for mentioning yet again that brilliant 1966-67 season, when we beat them 5-1 in the FA Cup and 6-1 in the League Cup.

No, in those days the games between Shrewsbury and Walsall were

always big occasions, and I made several trips to the old Fellows Park ground.

One memorable visit came in April 1967, and that day sticks in the mind for a reason other than football. It was Grand National day, and on the Thursday before the race my brother Keith, who was then ten years of age, read something which convinced him that a rank outside called Foinavon was going to win the race.


He was going to put two shillings each way on the hopeless beast, but I persuaded him it had no chance whatsoever, and he invested his pocket money elsewhere.

Midway through the second half at Fellows Park, I noticed a man with a radio to his ear. "What's winning the National, mate?" I asked.

"There's been a massive pile-up and some 100-1 shot has gone about two fences clear," he answered. I feared the worst.

"It's not Foinavon, Is it? I inquired.
"That's the one," came the reply.
Needless to say, Foinavon held on to spring one of the greatest shocks in Grand National history, and my brother has hardly ever spoken to me since!

The result that day, as if it mattered, was again 2-2, with Trevor Meredith and Eric Brodie scoring the Town goals.

Brodie was again on target the following year, when Shrewsbury went one better and beat the Saddlers 2-1 after being a goal down at half-time. Frank Clarke got the other, and all three goals were shown on the Midlands news the following day. It was the first time I had ever seen Town on the telly.

Now for something completely different... after I had finished my column about sports headlines for Saturday's Darlington programme headlines, it occurred to me I had forgotten one classic from the Oswestry and Border Counties Advertizer.

The story concerned legendary Oswestry angler Norman "Rum Cog" Millard, who became stuck in some deep mud one day when out fishing, after he went to rescue a dog.

This made it into the Advertizer's angling column, and sports editor Stuart Laurie came up with the headline: "Cog and a dog in a bog". Beat that!

# away supporters

Today sees the visit of high-flying Swindon, and hopefully this morning the lads have played their tans' side - though, as I write these notes, nothing has yet been confirmed. I am pretty sure we have never played a Swindon fans team so it will be a first if it does go ahead.



Back to the end of September, and the team's visit to Rochdale, which ended in a first defeat of the season. Last season the ASFC enjoyed a rare win over Rochdale at our place on the opening day of the season, with no return fixture, as Rochdale couldn't find an available pitch.

Rochdale, fiercely competitive anyway, would be well up for their first chance to gain revenge for that defeat. The task for ASFC was that much harder given that player-manager Andy Davies was missing along with fellow regulars Stuart Dunn and Tim Williams. Rochdale showed they meant business from the off hitting the outside of the post with a pile driver from thirty yards out. This positive start turned into a one-goal lead with just minutes on the clock when Ant Thomas put through his own goal attempting to clear a corner. Then defender Andy Groves survived appeals for what appeared a stonewall penalty after he handballed in the area.

After a tough opening twenty minutes the Shrews settled and built some good moves. Salop then encountered the strange rules interpretation by the referee. Tim Klekot was clattered in the area but managed to stay on his feet. The official waved play on and stated had Tim gone down he would have awarded a penalty!

Rochdale were still dangerous and Gareth Hopkins pulled off a great save, tipping a curling shot from the edge of the area around the post to keep the gap between the sides at just one as the sides went into the interval.

Town made two changes at half-time with Scott Pearson coming on in goal and Steven Price slotting into midfield. Whilst the first half had been largely Rochdale, the second was Shrewsbury. Dave Evison saw a low free kick parried by the "Dale "keeper then Ant Thomas following up was just the wrong side of the bar.

ASFC equalised when Tim Klekot headed Dave Evison's corner home. Rochdale nearly regained the lead straight from the restart when their tall centre forward saw a spectacular over-head kick smack the bar before being cleared to safety.

Salop had two great chances to take the lead in the last twenty minutes. First Dave Evison turned and shot in the area but his effort was saved at point blank range, then Mike Price went close following up a shot from Gerry Leahy that the keeper had been unable to hold. The Shrews were then turned down on another penalty appeal when Ant Thomas was pulled to the ground in the area.

But 'Dale finished strong forcing several corners at the end and right at the death converted one at the back post to win 2-1 to leave the Town lads gutted

### SHROPSHIRE LADS - DOWN MEMORY LANE This Week - Midfield (Part One)

It is often the case that those who aspire and succeed in becoming professional footballers also have several other 'sporting strings to their bow'. The demands of playing professional football, however, preclude the vast majority from pursuing a twin track professional career in another sport. If we take the case of Thierry Henry it would be interesting to know just how fast he would be in the sport of athletics. His speed off the mark and acceleration would indicate that he is quite athletic! Clearly, there are many sporting people who are multi talented but when it comes to earning a living from a sport, the dedication and commitment to realise one's full potential generally prevents the 'double professional'. But there is a window of opportunity when the seasons for sport are complementary and a classic example of this is football and cricket. Today it is becoming increasingly

difficult to undertake two separate full time sporting contracts due to the lengthening of the football season. Over the years several professional footballers have succeeded in becoming first class county cricketers. Obviously, for those readers who are old enough to remember. Denis Compton, he achieved the pinnacle of representing his country at both football and cricket. In more recent times many professional cricketers such as Chris Balderstone (Yorkshire) and more notably, lan Botham (Somerset) combined cricket and football.

Here at Shrewsbury Town there have been a number of players who have also been pretty useful with the bat and ball. Arthur Rowley himself was a very accomplished cricketer and played for Shrewsbury CC. Several goalkeepers including Ken Mulheam; Steve Ogrizovic and Bob Tooze

played to a very good standard and more recently, Joe Hart, who could have taken a place at the Worcestershire Academy were it not for his football prowess. (As an aside – at the time of writing this article – the morning of 14/10/2006 - whilst scanning Sheffield United's website I read the wonderful news that Joe Hart was to make his debut for Manchester City against the Blades. Another giant step for this remarkable young man. I often wonder just how far Joe would have progressed with his cricket were it not for his football.)

Sorry for the digression yet again. Back to the main agenda. Today's choice for memory lane is one Edward John Orton Hemsley born in 1943 in Stoke on Trent but whose family found its way to South Shropshire. 'Ted' Hemsley was to find his way to Shrewsbury Town in the late fifties to begin an apprenticeship under Arthur Rowley which would see him make his debut on the 29th April 1961 away to Bradford City. In those days his position would have been described as a wing half but were he playing today he would most certainly have been classed as an all round midfield player. So what is it about midfield

players? What qualities do they have to possess? Ideally they need to be very comfortable on the ball when in possession: they have to 'win' the ball both in the air and on the ground; they have to aid both the defence and attack and essentially need peripheral vision. In today's game the midfield can be made up of players who do not have all the skills required individually but complement one another. The likes of Duncan Edwards, Bryan Robson and Steve Gerrard who could arguably be described as outstanding midfield players possess all the qualities. Ted Hemsley possessed many of these qualities and for nine seasons the Meadow faithful witnessed an emerging all round professional sportsman. During his time at the club, I found myself looking at the Worcestershire County Cricket results because Ted was one of those remarkable individuals who combined the two sports at professional level. Two years after his Town debut at 17 he would join Worcestershire County Cricket Club where he would remain until 1982. An all round midfield player in football. Ted also

> proved his versatility in cricket both with his batting and bowling prowess. In a remarkable career he scored in excess of 13,000 runs which included 8 centuries and 70 half centuries. As a right arm medium bowler he also took over 140 wickets and weighed in with 245 catches. Meanwhile, back at the Meadow he went on to play for the Town in 234 Football League matches; he put in 43 cup appearances and hit the back of the net on 23 occasions. His departure from Shrewsbury followed hot on the heels of Arthur Rowley who was appointed as Manager of Sheffield United in 1968. I believe that the transfer fee was around £50k and Ted went on to establish himself as a firm favourite with the 'Blades' for the next eight seasons.

next eight seasons.

I came across Ted in 1994 at a Memorial Game for the late Joe Stoves — Senior

Master at the Oldbury Wells School in Bridgnorth - who had been a wonderful centre forward in his heyday with the great Hanwood United sides of the early 1950's and as a teacher, a very successful coach and mentor to many a young south Shropshire lad. Ted came over from Sheffield - bringing Len Badger and Colin Proffet - to join his brother Colin and other former Town favourities such as Peter Dolby; Tony Gregory, Frank Clarke, Dave Pountney and Colin Taylor in a charity match where the proceeds went to the MRI Scanner Appeal at the Oswestry Orthopaedic Hospital. One of Joe's former star pupils was the diminutive David Preece (Walsall; Luton and Derby) who attended though did not play due to injury. The ex pro's took on a Teachers' XI and it was wonderful occasion. Clearly, the exprofessionals put on a great display and I was particularly impressed with Ted's skills and athleticism at the age of 51. His fitness, control and passing of the ball suggested that he should still have been playing. It was a master class and an exhibition match that brings back the very best of memories.

Dennis Wise began his career with Wimbledon in 1985 where he spent five years, scoring 27 goals in 127 appearances, including an FA Cup Final win over Liverpool. Chelsea spent £1.6m for the combative midfielder in 1990, where he went on to make 322 appearances, winning the Cup Winners Cup and the FA Cup twice.

In 2001, Leicester City bought him for £1.6m Southampton as a youngster before moving to and he stayed just over a year before moving to Millwall, where he became player-manager.

> In 2005, Wise made the switch to Southampton and after six-months joined Coventry City, where he played out the 2005-6 season, scoring six goals in 11 starts. In 2005, Wise moved to Swindon after turning down a new playing contract with Coventry.

He spent time on loan with Bristol Rovers and Bury during the 2004-05 season and impressed manager Andy King during a reserve game for Swindon



He will not be in the side today after suffering a serious arm injury last Saturday against Grimsby, which could see him out for the rest of the season.

### Phil Smith - goalkeeper

Goalkeeper Phil Smith joined Swindon in late July from Crawley Town. Smith had made 74 starts for Crawley Town during a two year stay, which followed a year's spell at Margate where he made 35 starts. A dependable customer, Smith will be looking to add experience to the Town set up. He was promoted to the first team on Tuesday in the JP Trophy against Wycombe following last week's injury to Peter Brezovan

#### Jack Smith - defence

Signed from Watford in summer 2005. Smith added youthful experience to the Town side. Due to the departure of Paul Robinson to West Bromwich Albion he was thrust into the first-team spotlight at Watford and coped admirably, registering two goals - the first of which a Goal of the Season contender at Sheffield United in front of the Sky Sports cameras. He made 38 League starts for Town last season in a variety of positions including right back, left back and midfield. This term he has only missed one game and has scored two goals, both from the penalty spot.

#### Jerel Ifil - defence

Powerful defender Jerel Ifil joined Town in summer 2004 after enjoying three loan spells with Town previously from 2002-04. Jerel became a fans' favourite during his brief stays in Wiltshire and signed on a permanent basis in June 2004. He has amassed 100 appearances as a Robin. His one game missed this season was due to suspension after being sent-off at Chester and his one goal was in the unsuccessful penalty shoof-out in the League Cup against Brentford.

### Leigh Henry - defence

Son of former Swindon striker Charlie, Henry came up through the Centre of Excellence ranks at the County Ground. He progressed into the reserves last season after catching the eye with a number of dominant performances for the U18s. He was rewarded with a six month professional contract in June 2006 and will

look to impress under the new management of Wise and Poyet, taking every opportunity available with typical grit and fervour. He has yet to get his chance though in a first team shirt.

#### Jamie Vincent - defence

Jamie Vincent arrived at the County Ground and made the left-back slot his own. He began his football career as a trainee at Crystal Palace before making the switch to Bournemouth, where he made over 100 appearances between 1996 and 1999. He then made a £500,000 switch to Huddersfield Town, which was followed by an £800,000 deal which saw him move to Portsmouth in 2001. Spells at Derby County and Milwall then followed. He signed a one-year deal with Town in July 2006.

### Adv Williams - defence

Named on-field captain by manager Dennis Wise in mid-July, Ady Williams brings with him a wealth of footballing experience. Signed from Coventry City in pre-season, the former Welsh international boasts successful spells with Wolves and Reading on his CV. This season, he has forged a successful central defensive partnership with Jerel Ifil and has been a calming influence on the rest of the squad.

#### Andy Nicholas - defence

Nicho joined Town in the close season of 2003 following his decision to leave Liverpool, where he came through the youth system but struggled to break into the first team. He was a regular in the U19s side at Anfield and won many plaudits with his performances at left back, which prompted Andy King to snap up the youngster. After working his way into the starting line up with some hard work in training, Andrew seized his chance to become a regular member of the side throughout the 2003-04 season and managed his first senior goal in a 4-2 win. at Stockport in February. Despite making such a positive impression during 2003-04 season, the 2004-05 campaign saw the defender struggled with injuries and was unable to gain a regular starting berth. Nicho is now an established member of the Town squad and is approaching 100 appearances for the

### Charlie Comyn-Platt - defence

Charlie Comyn-Platt joined the Bolton Academy in summer 2002 after a long association with the club. The assured defender was called into the first team for the first time in September 2003, and he was handed his debut when replacing Bruno N'Gotty for the final nine minutes of the 3-1 League Cup win over Walsall. He

also started both the club's FA Cup games against Tranmere Rovers during the same season. He was loaned to Tony Adams' Wycombe Wanderers in mid-September 2004, making his debut in a 1-0 home defeat to Swansea City, and returned to Bolton in October, after a month with the Wanderers. After being released by Bolton in summer 2005 he made the switch to the County Ground on a one-year contract and went on to make 27 appearances in his first season in Wiltshire, scoring twice against Boston United (FA Cup) and Doncaster Rovers (League One). After a successful first campaign, he signed a new one year deal in the summer 2006 but has only made two appearances this season.

### Andy Monkhouse - midfield

A product of the youth set-up at Rotherham United, Andy Monkhouse ended an eight-year association with the Milmoor club when he made the switch to Wiltshire in summer 2006. Having made over 150 appearances for the Millers, Monkhouse adds not only youthful experience to the Robins squad, but also unpredictable flair on either flank of the midfield. He has recently found scoring form netting in the 1-1 draw against Boston and again last week in the 3-0 win over Grimsby.

### Gareth Whalley - midfield

He signed for Swindon Town in July 2005 from Wigan Athletic on a free transfer. Originally a trainee at Crewe, Gareth made over 200 first team appearances for them before signing for Bradford City in 1998 for £600,000. Gareth was a regular during their two-season spell in the top flight and in March 2002 went back to Crewe on loan for a few months. Injury kept him out from early-November 2002 until mid-April 2003 but he returned to play a significant role in the club's promotion through the play-offs. He left Cardiff in September 2004 and joined Wigan Athletic and subsequently made nine appearances for the Latics in the march to promotion to the Premiership. During his first season at Swindon, Whalley settled into the side and made 27 appearances during 2005-6. He still has two years to run on his current deal at Swindon, but had been sidelined after an ankle operation in July. He only made his first appearance this season on Tuesday in the JP Trophy defeat at Wycombe, where he picked up a yellow card.

### Michael Pook - midfield

Pooky signed a professional contract ahead of the 2005-06 season and was a consistent performer for the youth team and reserves before joining the professional ranks. An energetic box-to-box midfielder, Pook will look to benefit

from the wealth of knowledge passed to him by Dennis Wise and Gus Poyet. He scored his only goal of the season last Saturday in the 3-0 win over Grimsby.

#### Ben Wells - midfield

One of three Centre of Excellence players who were signed as first year scholars in 2004, the midfielder impressed in the U17s last season. He was rewarded a squad number in November 2004 and made the bench against Bristol City in the LDV Vans Trophy. Now signed as a professional, the energetic Wells will look to make the most of every opportunity that comes his way, and there have been none this season; the closest he has got to the first team was as an unused substitute in the League Cup tie against Brentford.

### Andy Gurney - midfield

Gurns rejoined Swindon Town on a permanent basis in January 2005 after failing to pin down a regular place in the Swans' starting line-up. A versatile player, he can operate anywhere along the backline or in centre of midfield and likes a shot on goal and is not afraid to have a go from any distance. He joined Swansea City from Swindon Town on a free transfer in 2004 and lists his other clubs as Torquay United, Bristol Rovers and Reading. He has now made over 385 senior starts and has scored 45 goals. Gurney went under the loife in the summer and is recovering from an ankle operation.

### Curtis Weston - midfield

Another summer signing, Weston joined from Millwall where he became the youngest ever FA Cup finalist ever at 17 years and 119 days, coming on to replace Dennis Wise in the 2004 final against Manchester United. A busy midfielder who likes to get among the goals, Weston impressed with combative central displays against Crystal Palace and Reading, showing pace, aggression in the tackle and awareness. He has been a regular this season despite a missed penalty that helped Brentford beat Swindon in the League Cup.

### Lee Peacock - forward

Joint top scorer this season with five – including a brace against Chester – Lee Peacock joined Swindon Town in January 2006 on a free transfer from Sheffield Wednesday. The experienced frontman started his career at Carlisle United as a trainee, but after scoring 11 goals in 52 appearances he made the switch to Mansfield Town in 1997 for £75,000. It proved to be a productive spell with the Stags with 29 goals in 80 appearances attracting Manchester City who parted with £500,000 for his services. However, his time at Maine Road was not as successful

as he would have liked due to injuries, but his next stop certainly was A £600,000 move to Bristol City in 2000 heralded the start of a successful four-year spell at Ashton Gate: 54 goals in 131 league starts was the result of his stay with the Robins. Next up was Sheffield Wednesday, who he joined on a free transfer in summer 2004. Peacock wasted no time in settling in at Town, scoring on his debut against Bournemouth after coming off the bench. However, he finished the season with just 11 starts to his name after a knee injury ruled him out of the final games of the campaign. After an end of season operation, Peacock enjoyed a solid pre-season and capped his start to the campaign with an opening-day winner at Hartlepool.

### David Stroud - midfield

Stroudy is another of Town's team with County Ground connections, with his father Kenny staming for Swindon. A skilful winger, he joined the Centre of Excellence before signing scholarship forms. He spent time on work experience with Basingstoke last season. Stroud made his Town debut last season at Huddersfield Town in September and is a player with great pace and balance. Stroud is one to watch from a crop of exciting youngsters in the Town ranks and has been handed a six-month professional deal in which to impress. He has yet to play this season.

#### Ashan Holgate - midfield/forward

A tall, gangly figure who can operate as a striker or in midfield, he scored on his senior debut against Milwall in pre-season 2004, after coming on as a substitute. He made his competitive first team debut last term, coming on as a late substitute in the FA Cup draw with Boston United at the County Ground. He is on loan at Newport-County after missing a penalty in the unsuccessful League Cup shoot-out, against Brentford.

### Christian Roberts - forward

Cardiff-born striker who joined Town in 2004 in a £50,000 switch from local rivals Bristol City. He is an aggressive runner and adds much needed pace to the Swindon frontline. He was formerly with Exeter City where he scored 18 goals in 67 League starts for the Grecians from 2000 to 2002. With six goals in 22 starts for the Robins so far, Roberts' appointment as vice-captain seems to have invigorated the front man. He has scored twice this season

#### Fola Onibuje - forward

Dennis Wise hanced the 198cm tall front man Fola a three-month contract in July 2006, and the former GB sprinter will be out to impress. Having had previous spells with Preston North End, Barnsley, Huddersfield Town and Peterborough United, this is a big chance for the striker. Lagos-born Onibuje spent last season with Cambridge United — scoring nine goals in 25 appearances. His one goal this season was in the 1-1 draw at Notts County.

### Alex Rhodes - midfield/forward

The versatile player joined Brentford from Newmarket in November 2003. He scored five goals in 15 league starts for the Bees. He joined Swindon on loan this month and made his first appearance coming on as a substitute in the League Two encounter with Grimsby Town last Saturday.

#### Aaron Brown - midfield

Aaron Brown is now fully focussed on his Town career after a difficult start to 2006-07. Brown requested a transfer in the summer following the club's relegation to League Two, but after interest from Brentford and an unsuccessful trial at Doncaster Rovers, he found himself back at the County Ground and he has now forced his way into the first team plans. The left-sided midfielder began his career at Bristol City, where he progressed through the ranks to make 1.35 starts. After six years at Ashton Gale, he made a move to OPR in July 2004 but after just one start for the Rs an initial loan spell at Swindon followed, before he made the move permanent in January 2006. His one goal this season was in the 2-0 win over Stockport.

### Lucas Jutkiewicz - forward

A boy in a man's frame is how manager Dennis Wise described the powerful striker, and few would disagree. Southampton-born, Jutkiewicz spent time with the Saints before joining Swindon's Centre of Excellence and won the Golden Boot Award in the Milk Cup in 2004. He then made his senior debut off the bench at Swansea City towards the end of 2005-06 and scored three goals in Town's pre-season campaign this year. He has made one start (on Tuesday in the JP Trophy against Wycombe) and five appearances from the bench this season.

#### Andy Caton - forward

A powerful striker, Andy joined Swindon Town as a first year scholar in June 2004 after spending some time with GLS Hellenic Premier Division side North Leigh where he was a prolific scorer. He has made three starts this season and three appearances from the bench but has been out since with injury problems.

#### CHRIS FREESTONE

Striker Chris Freestone was an experienced member of Kevin Ratcliffe's squad at Shrewsbury. Initially with Arnold, he joined Middlesbrough in December 1994 and featured in that season's First Division title triumph. He was loaned to Carlisle in March 1997 and helped win the Auto Windscreens Shield, joining Northampton in December 1997. A Second Division play-off finalist in 1997-98, he joined Hartlepool in March 1999 and moved to Salop in July 2000. He made 27 League appearances prior to joining Rugby United in November 2001, then played for Forest Green, Dundalk, King's Lynn, Leek and Illegator. King's Lynn, Leek and Ilkeston.

### **GRAHAM FRENCH**

England Youth winger Graham French helped Shrewsbury take top-flight Sheffield Wednesday to an FA Cup replay in 1962-63. Signing professional at Gay Meadow in November 1962, he was Town's youngest ever League player 16 years 177 days on debut versus Reading featured in Salop's 1961-62 FA' Cup run and scored once in 27 League games before moving to Swindon Town in August 1963. Had spells at Watford and Wellington prior to joining Luton in October 1965 and starred in their 1967-8 and 1969-70 promotions, with Reading, and Southport appearing under the name Graham Lafite, he now lives in Wolverhampton.

#### BENNY GALL

Danish Under 21 and Youth International goalkeeper who was signed by Fred Davies from Dutch side Dordrecht in August 1996.Competed with Paul Edwards for the place between the sticks, for two seasons, making 34 league and 6 Cup appearances, before returning to Denmark with Esbjerg. Had

started his career with Fremad Amager, before moving to KB and Bronshoj, he had a loan spell at De Graafschap. Has been with F.C. Copenhagen for 5 seasons, as cover goalkeeper, just 8 appearances, also acts as manager to their Division 2 East side KB. On the bench in this season's Champions League at Celtic and Manchester U.

### **EDDIE GARBETT**

Dawley born Eddie joined Salop as an apprentice, signing professional in July 1967. Came on as a sub in the Tow Law replay, and appeared at Highbury in Round Three. He had a thunderbolt shot and scored his first goal against Scunthorpe at the Meadow. After a dozen League games for Town moved to Barrow in July 1969 staying until they left the League. Went to Stockport in July 1972, and was part of their League Cup run that season beating West Ham, and the next year's win over Palace. After 201 League games joined Telford, lives in Ketley, worked at Sankeys before becoming director of milk delivery company.

#### **BRIAN GAYLE**

Experienced central defender Brian Gayle missed just three matches for Shrewsbury during the 1998-99 campaign. Initially with Leatherhead and Tooting & Mitcham, he joined Wimbledon in October 1984 and featured in their 1985-86 promotion campaign and 1987-88 FA Cup run. He joined Manchester City in July 1988 and was a promotion winner in 1988-89, then played for lpswich Town before moving to Sheffield United in September 1991. He had spells with Exeter, Rotherham and Bristol Rovers prior to joining Salop in December 1997 and scored once in 66 League games, later reuniting with Jake King at Telford United.

#### JOHN GAYLE

Powerful striker John Gayle was an early Kevin Ratcliffe signing for Shrewsbury. He played for various non-League clubs in the Midlands before moving from Burton Albion to Wimbledon with Steve Cotterill in March 1989. Gaining topflight experience, he joined Birmingham in November 1990 and helped win the Leyland/DAF Cup in 1990-91 and promotion in 1991-92. He had spells with Coventry, Burnley and Stoke before winning promotion with both Northampton and Scunthorpe. Moving to Salop in November 1999, he scored twice in 19 League games before joining Torquay in December 2000, then played for Moor Green. December 2000, then played for Moor Green.

Ex-England B international striker David Geddis helped Shrewsbury avoid relegation in 1987-88. Signing professional for Ipswich Town in August 1975, he starred in their 1978 FA Cup final success and joined Aston Villa for £300,000 in September 1979. He featured in their 1980-81 League Championship campaign and moved via Burnley to Birmingham City in December 1984. Helping them win promotion that season, he joined Salop in February 1987 and netted ten goals in 39 League games before joining Swindon Town in October 1988, then Darlington. He coached at Middlesbrough and is now Leeds United's reserve team boss.

#### MIKE GIBSON

Signed from Nuneaton in March 1960, Mike was a dangerously brave goalkeeper who competed with the ill fated

Paul Miller for the first team spot. An England Youth international, he made 76 appearances for Town before being sold to Bristol City in April 1963. Married a Shrewsbury girl, they settled in Bristol where Mike has for many years been a scout for the club and part of City's Academy set up. He made 332 starts for City, earning promotion in 1965, and League Cup Semi Final in 1971 before going to Gillingham in July 1972. He spent two seasons there, before he returned to Bristol and became a postman.

#### TED GORIN

Centre-forward Ted Gorin played for Shrewsbury during the 1950-51 Football League debut campaign. Initially with Grange Albion, he joined Cardiff City in October 1948 but failed to secure a regular first-team slot and moved to Scunthorpe United in July 1950. He scored their first-ever goal in the Football League and was leading marksman in 1950-51 despite joining fellow new-boys Salop in January 1951. Netting three times in 18 League outings while at Gay Meadow before moving to Lovell's Athletic, he still lives in Cardiff where he was a lathe operator, then a publican for 26 years and latterly a security officer.

#### PAUL GORMAN

Dublin born Paul started his career as an apprentice at Highbury as a teenager. He won an Irish under 21 cap before being transferred to Birmingham City in June 1984. He moved to Carlisle the following March and made 148 appearances for the Cumbrian side. Originally a midfield player he proved his versatility by playing left back, particularly during his spell with Salop which began in November 1989. Returned to Carlisle in December 1991, going on to Gretna the following year. Lives opposite Brunton Park and played

some Sunday football, recently came out of retirement for a pub charity match. Works for his father in law.

### JOHN GRANT

Was a trainee at Crewe Alexandra before signing professional in 1999, made 6 League appearances. Before linking up with Jimmy Quinn at Northwich Victoria in 2001. Graham Turner took him to Hereford United in July 2002 and he joined Telford United in the Shaw spending spree of 2003. He played 40 games scoring 8 before Jimmy Quinn brought him to the Meadow in August 2004, playing 19 games, 2 goals. A hardworking striker just short of league class, he went on to Halifax and had his most prolific spell netting 14 in 54 games. Scored in the play off final against Hereford, but linked up with Aldershot for this season.



#### RICHARD GREEN

A Youth Trainee at Shrewsbury in the same youth team as Mickey Brown, they made a colourful attac. Although Richard started as a striker the majority of his Football League career was as a defender. He had signed professional forms for Town in July 1986, his debut at home to Barnsley saw the lowest crowd of the season 2435, in September. Was a regular member of the side who reached the Quarter Finals of the League Cup in 1987. Left for Swindon in 1990, joined Gillingham in March 1992 played over 200 games for the Kent side. Moving to Walsall, Rochdale and Northampton before retiring to the West Midlands.

### **RON GREEN**

Big goalkeeper Ron Green had two spells at Shrewsbury. Initially with Alvechurch, he joined Walsall in June 1977 and starred in their 1979-80 promotion success and 1983-84 Milk Cup run. He moved to Salop in June 1984 and joined Bristol Rovers in March 1985, then played for Scunthorpe and Wimbledon before returning to Shrewsbury on loan in September 1988, making 36 League appearances overall. Rejoining Walsall in March 1989, he later played for Alvechurch again, Kidderminster Harriers, Colchester United, Bromsgrove, Redditch, Moor Green and Oldbury before becoming Coventry City's community officer.

Old boy delivers 'stab to the heart' By Neil Sambrook

Amid the joyous scenes of celebration at Gay Meadow on Saturday heralding Shrewsbury Town's promotion to Division Two, it was impossible to do anything but acclaim their achievement.

Yet when the initial euphoria began to quieten and time came to reflect on last Saturday's 2-1 victory over Northampton, it became difficult not to find a degree of sympathy for John Barnwells' team, who made a big contribution to a fine football match - one far better than anyone had a right to expect considering what was at stake.

Beaten by a superbly executed goal by one of his former



proteges, Barnwell called Wayne Clarke's 80th minute winner a "stab in the heart". Indeed, they were cut down by a superb piece of swordsmanship from Clarke.

By not adopting a sweeper and the stiffing tactics that most visitors to Gay Meadow this season have utilised. Northampton lived by the sword - but ten minutes from time they perished by it as well.

Standing one off the bottom, so enterprising was their approach play, particularly in the 20 minutes before half-time, that had they been one place behind Shrewsbury few would have been any the wiser. Northampton displayed more originality and flair than Chesterfield, Preston, Scunthorpe and Mansfield put together and look in the falsest of positions.

Northampton may not have felt much sorrow for Shrewsbury on the closing day of last season when their 3-2 success at Gay

Meadow prevented Town from reaching the play-offs, but in truth Shrewsbury did not deserve anything from that game. While they just about deserved to win last Saturday, Northampton could count themselves slightly unfortunate not to depart with a point.

Much fairer would have been a Shrewsbury victory over ultranegative Chesterfield a fortnight ago and a draw last Saturday. So much for fortune favouring the brave.

After a nervous opening quarter-hour, Shrewsbury went ahead with their first significant attack. Ray Woods drilling a low shot beneath Barry Richardson after the Northampton defence had failed to clear a Mike Brown centre.




At this point Northampton had already distinguished themselves from the third division's rank and file, as aside from Crewe's Mark Smith and Alan Judge of Hereford - who even tossed the ball to the referee at half-time - visiting goalkeepers to Gav Meadow always elect to kick downfield. So when Richardson bowled the ball out during the early stages, this observer for one nearly fell off his seat.

Despite taking a 16th minute lead, Shrewsbury never appeared happy with their progress and were pegged back ten minutes later when Kevin Wilkin steered a left-wing cross past Paul Edwards at the Station End. Busy and inventive Northampton had the better of exchanges leading up to half-time and it has been a long time since Shrewsbury's midfield have been forced so deep in a home match.

They were, however, able to generate enough momentum to mount a lengthy spell of second half pressure, during which Dean Spink became the principal difference between the sides. In their captain, Shrewsbury had a focal point on which to mount attacks, while Northampton cleared the ball upfield only for it to return into their territory without much delay.

Even so it still seemed likely they would escape with a draw, and for the novelty value of a team coming to Gay Meadow with ambitions higher than a goalless draw they were deserving of some reward. But that was taken from them when Dave Hockaday advanced into the penalty area and delivered a low cross which Clarke, who played under Barnwell at Wolves, turned exquisitely into the net, beating Richardson at the near post.

Thus victory was assured and Shrewsbury Town, by far and away the best team in Division Three, had clinched promotion. On this evidence, Northampton are due a bit of luck and few at Gay Meadow would begrudge them a large slice on Saturday when they receive second-placed Chester, the only team with a realistic chance of preventing Town from becoming champions.

There was no shortage of celebration last Saturday as Shrewsbury managed a 2-1 home win over Northampton to clinch promotion and this week has been a time to take stock on what Shrewsbury have achieved so far this season.

"The lads have had a couple of days off this week to take in what's happened," said manager Fred Davies yesterday. "After the way results went last Tuesday when it became clear that a win against Northampton would mean promotion, I think one or two of the players got a bit overexcited and consequently there was a bit of tension in our play last Saturday.

He continued: "We've had a bit of a break this week and went for a game of golf on Tuesday when we had a great time, but on Thursday we'll be back working hard because there's still a bit to do with two tough away games coming

Shrewsbury are likely to be unchanged from the side that overcame Northampton when they take the field at Glandford Park - and although they have never lost at that venue, recording 1-1 draws there last term and earlier this season in the Coca Cola Cup. Shrewsbury have yet to win on Scunthorpe soil in seven attempts.

Shrewsbury suffered three defeats and two goalless draws at Scunthorpe's previous home, the Old Showground, where they never scored a goal - all of which makes Saturday's visit the most significant Town have made to Scunthorpe since their first-ever Football League match which took place at the Old Showground on August 19,

Although Scunthorpe aim to block Shrewsbury's path to the third division title on Saturday, without them Shrewsbury Town might not have joined the Football League as early as they did. It was Scunthorpe who initiated the move to extend Division Three North and South by two clubs in 1950 and as a consequence both clubs were elected to the third division north on June 6. 1950.

Reflecting on more recent history, Davies commented: "If somebody would have come on the coach after the Preston game in August and offered us promotion with three games to go, I think we'd have taken it. And to have it, and now have a chance of winning the title, shows just how much the players have achieved.

"The nice thing about these lads is they stick at things and never give up.


There's a great spirit in the dressing room and it would be great to have everything rapped up by the time Wigan come here on May 7.

During this memorable season. Shrewsbury have become most adept at doing just that.

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
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

I don't make all of the Town away games for reasons, which I will not divulge (in an effort to seem more enigmatic). Owing to a lack of Sky wanting to cover any of Town's away games and me not wanting to give Sky any more of my money, I find myself in the wonderful position of being able to listen to the Peterborough match on the radio at my own birthday party. I have a noisy family and with "but it is my birthday" not being extenuating circumstances, I ended up sitting in my car with Stuart Dunn. I wouldn't have it any other way either, I have always preferred football on the radio to its televisual counterpart. It's hardly surprising when I look at my earliest sporting memories.

I was nine years old when Shrewsbury played Wolves in the quarter finals of the F.A. cup against Wolverhampton Wanderers. Graham Turner's blue and amber heroes had gone on a

memorable cup run and taken Manchester City's scalp and forced Wolves into to a replay. The Manchester City game was a turning point for me. I was at my brother's birthday party having a rare old time with jelly and cake and the like. My mum came into the hall where the party was being held and told me that there was great news. Shrewsbury Town had beaten Manchester City. I remember thinking that this was indeed

great news, Shrewsbury had a football team!

A few weeks later, at school, I was told by a much more connected and older boy that Shrewsbury had drawn in the next round against Wolverhampton wanderers and would be playing a replay soon. He knew this because he had listened to it on the radio. This was another revelation to me, not only did Shrewsbury have a football team but they also put football on the radio! So I started to plan a way to hear this match. The actual mechanics of the plan were quite easy, I had been given a small red transistor radio for my birthday. The main problem with the plan was that in enquiring about the game, I had inadvertently let my mum know that I planned to listen in. My mum was a bit of a stickler for sleep and bedtime for children and on the night of the game she was on patrol until I convinced her I was asleep. Once convinced all was safe and I switched on to hear that the Town were not doing so well and that there were not many minutes left to play.

The commentator that night was the legendary Peter Jones. Mr. Jones was the BBC's main commentator at that time and although the Town were going out of the cup, he was skilled enough to make me remember the game. I don't remember much of the commentary, but I do remember that Mr. Jones had a sorrowful intonation in his voice and this sorrow transferred itself to me. I ended up crying that we had lost but didn't think any more about the football until I had my radio on again and heard the same voice. I couldn't help listening, and from then I was hooked on football on the radio. It didn't matter what game was on so long as Mr. Jones was commentating and I would lose interest if it were not he.

There was nobody like him and has not been since, his ability to paint pictures in the minds of his listeners, made you feel that you were almost there will not be replicated by today's five live commentators. The likes of Alan Green with his whining about the standards of modern footballers couldn't hold a candle to

Peter Jones, Jonathon Pearce and his forced excitement seems more at home with robot wars than along side such a broadcasting legend and would not be fit to lace his broadcasting boots.

Commentators these days don't seem to possess anywhere near the quality and enthusiasm that Peter Jones exhibited in his career. Maybe these are more cynical times that we live in but radio commentators seem more interested in

homing in on the controversial rather than the beautiful. This is possibly as a result of the tabloid culture that exists today or maybe they like the sound of their own voices being repeated every half hour in sport bulletins as they drive home. It would be unfair to paint all commentators with the same brush and the aforementioned Mr. Dunn is more enjoyable than most as his enthusiasm always shows through.

Unfortunately, Peter Jones collapsed whilst commentating on the boat race in 1990 and died in hospital the following day but the good he has done for football remains to this day. If he had not commentated with such feeling and drama, I would not be here today enjoying the football and I suspect that this is the case for many other football fans. There is much written about the almost musical quality to his voice, but for me it was the fact that his excitement was genuine that involved me in listening to football for a full year before I had even seen a live game.

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
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

Chris Smith takes a look at the places he's travelled to over the years.

Cobblers. Of course that is Northampton Town's nickname. My first visit to the County Ground was on the 16th September 1989, Town lost 2 – 1 in front of only 3,131 fans. I have got vivid memories of getting soaking wet at this stadium and this may have been the day when that happened.

Memories of visits to Northampton do not come flooding back, as most of you fans will recall the Cobblers moved to the Sixfields Stadium some years ago and my first trip was during lan Atkins's managerial reign and on a day when Town were not playing

I organised another of those trips just to enable me and other fans of a similar mind to visit the stadium. Naturally Town were not playing in the same league then, it was quite a good day out, we all had a meal in the restaurant before the game and Ian Atkins was kind enough to take us on a brief tour of the stadium before resuming his managerial duties.

I have of course visited the stadium on a couple of occasions since with the Town, it is not a happy hunting ground and with the Cobblers being promoted last year who knows when we will play them again.

The today's visitors Swindon Town MET PREVIOUSLY

meet us in Football League action for the first time in seventeen years. Our last encounters were back in the old second division in 88/89 season ended in a single goal victories for our visitors, home and away,

Of the forty-two League encounters thus far played, Town have won just eleven to Swindon's nineteen, with twelve games ending all-square. Twice in those eleven victories we managed to score seven goals, the first time in 54/55 season when Weigh (4), O'Donnell (2) and McQue were our marksmen in the 7-0 rout on the final day of the season here at the Meadow. Two seasons later in 56/57 we again tilt seven, Weigh, Russell (2), Whitaker (2), Price and an own goal securing a seven goals to three victory.

Town have scored fifty-eight times to Swindon's sixty-three. Only twice have meetings between the two in the League produced no goals, 65/66 at the County Ground and 78/79 at the Meadow. The best attendance for a match between the two was 20,471 who witnessed Swindon's single goal home win in 62/63.

Our last outing on this date resulted in a 2-5 home reversal at the hands of Bristol Rovers back in 2002, something of a worrying trend since we have conceded a nap-hand on three previous occasions too, again versus Bristol Rovers (1-5) in 1972, by the same scoreline away to Coventry City reserves in 1905 and at Gillingham (0-5) in 1964, the match that represents our worst result ever on this date.

Of our eight wins on the 21st October one of two scorelines dominates, one goal to nil victories on four occasions, three goals to two on three, the sole game to buck this trend being the 2-1 away win at Worcester in 1933, we have only twice in twenty-two previous games on this date failed to score, the 1964 game at Gillingham mentioned previously, and the 0-1 defeat at Chesterfield in 1995. Thus far we have scored twenty-nine times to our opponents forty-seven.


I was offered by pure chance a slot on an Army Referees course, it being free and involving time off work I jumped at the

I qualified as a Class 3 Referee and was sent out into the big bad world issued with my first whistle, ready to take on the forces of evil and defend the righteous.

Then of course life changes, from being one of the lads you are now firmly on the dark side. You begin to notice things about people, managers would be your best mate prior to the game asking how you were and "how's the family". Then after it one of them would normally be threatening to murder you and your kin

for failing to give Fat Bob that obvious penalty at the death, or for missing the mass karate attack on their keeper prior to the winning goal.

It quickly became apparent that players so innocent when viewed from the touchline would suddenly turn out to bend the rules to gain unfair advantage, in short they cheat. to take an early bath after telling me to do something nasty with my mother, his father of course later offered to help me move house by threatening to set light to my present one.

Pub/local league football is even worse sadly physical violence to opposition players and officials is common place, with swearing and threatening behaviour universally accepted. Players and managers demand respect but so often fail to give any or understand its value.

So just why do people referee, well it isn't because they like upsetting the oh so old sages on the Wakeman End or giving the Riversiders a chance to utter little words they are not allowed to use in front of their

parents. They do it as we all do to try and put something back in the game. Its not for reward or personal gain, it takes a special kind of person to deal with the complexities involved and yet still perform. To shoulder the burden because managers and football commentators never will, and yet still turn out next week and be both professional and impartial.

Referees in most cases see more and certainly understand more than any fan on the terraces, they

take abuse from warm up to warm down. Yes they may make mistakes who doesn't but they remain impartial and are genuinely trying to maintain fair play, and look after the safety of the players whilst also ensuring all abide by the rules.

Finally, the game would benefit immensely and the officials job I assure you would be a great deal easier if players, managers and us the fans would learn a little about words such as "sportsmanship" and "respect". And to the fans that constantly berate I'll quote a saying from a friend "so many are moaners, so few are doers".

Then again will I be baying for blood this watching Town on Saturday... you can bet on it. Oi Ref!

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

Peacock strike.



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

Directions — Get to the M5 so either use the M54, M6 and M5 or the sneaky cut through via Kidderminster and Worcester. Follow the M5 to the A38 and then A380 as far as Kingskerwell. Take the first exit at the roundabout and after a mile turn left following Babbacombe (A3022) signs. After one mile turn left into Westhill Road for Warbro Road.

Pubs - Torquay is good for a couple of drinks but if you go into the town centre or seatront the ground is a 30 minutes walk or a cab ride.

At the ground, the Boots & Laces is a great social club and is always packed and friendly. If you take the short walk down the hill, then there are several good pubs on the main road, and a couple with beer gardens if the sun is out. The Union on St Marychurch Road does a good pint of Courage Best and has a no-smoking room.

Ground Plainmoor was wrecked by fire in 1985 and the ground had that temporary feel to it for a number of years, with offices and changing rooms being port cabins.

Redevelopment has happened over recent years and it's now a bdy little ground in the middle of sets of residential streets.

Favorite recent memory - Neville Southall getting stick from Town fans for 45 minutes. When he walked off a half-time, he smiled and then flicked a quick gesture to them. The Town fans reported him to the stewards. Also, the shot that hit the light at the back of the away end and knocked it off.

Food - There is a McDonalds and Burger King a couple of minutes walk away behind the North Stand. There are also burger vans around the ground.

The Ground - We've been to a rugby ground at Bristol, football grounds elsewhere, and now a hockey ground at Milton Keynes. We get an uncovered stand, which could be a bit bleak given that the game is being played in November. In Milton Keynes, Apparently, umbrelias are also barred.

Note that you will need to purchase a ticket before you go into the ground.

Favourite recent memory - I enjoyed both Wimbledon FC winning the 1988 FA Cup final and MK Dons suffering a second successive relegation, equally heartening.

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



The next problem relates to what I mentioned earlier when I

referred to the technology being "in one form or another". True,

there is the technology to show replays at all the Premiership

FA Cup when Arsenal versus Chelsea will have to use the technology but AFC Telford versus Kidderminster Harriers will not,

The thorny issue of the use of technology to assist referees has been in the news again thanks to a few high-profile incidents such as the Tottenham penalty that wasn't against Portsmouth and the Brazilian referee who missed that the goal scorer was in fact a ball boy.

Portsmouth manager Harry Redknapp correctly pointed out that he could see that the penalty should not have been given within ten seconds on his monitor in the dugout and there was thus no reason why the fourth official should not have been able to do the same. And there is no doubt that at that game the technology was available for that to have taken place - if it was allowed -

and I suspect that it is also available in one form or another (please note this wording for later - it is deliberate) at all the arounds in the Premiership.

It would therefore be possible for the football authorities to pass a rule that would allow the referee to use such

There are some things that technology can't help the refs with!

technology. Doing so at this stage though raises more questions that it answers. Will the rule only apply to the Premiership? What about the Championship? How about League One? And League Two? I know Darlington has that technology, but I am not sure about the rest; maybe it will be a feature of the New Meadow next season. Then there is the Conference, and the Unibond League, and the thousands of other leagues up and down the country. Will Wern Town have it available next time they play Whitchurch Alport? And what about schools? And Shrewsbury's Away Supporters team?

Now you are being silly, I can hear you say. Well, am I? After all, other rules that directly affect the game are universal. Wayne Rooney and Co play to same rules as Ant Thomas and the rest of the Away Supporters team. And rightly so. If the technology is brought into the rules then we will have a core of the elite in football playing to different criteria than everyone else.

This also brings with it the problem of how you decide which clubs and which games should be obliged to use such

grounds, but I'd be very surprised if it is the same technology. It might do the same thing, but probably in different ways with equipment from different companies. How are the authorities going to decide if such a wide range of equipment is all acceptable? Are there

going to be technical standards laid down? Will there be a list of approved suppliers? What about clubs that have spend thousands of pounds installing equipment from a supplier not on the approved list? Will they have to rip it all out and out in new

equipment? Who will pay?

Then, as can happen with any equipment, it could break down on match day. If the floodlights fail during an evening game, the match has to be abandoned. If the rules say replay technology has to be available and that breaks down, then surely the same should apply. This would create the ludicrous situation of a game being abandoned for something that doesn't affect the players' ability to play or the fans' ability to watch.

No, I believe the problems are far too many at present even to consider bringing replay technology into the fold of the regulations governing games. I have to add though that I do think we will see it one day, maybe trialled at some one-off set-piece match, rolled out at a future World Cup, and then maybe trickling down into national leagues, maybe initially as an option rather than a requirement.

Until then we will just have to satisfy ourselves with shouting: "You don't know what you're doing!"





### life in america

First of all I don't think I had the opportunity to publicly thank everyone at Shrewsbury Town FC for two great seasons I had with the club. lain Sankey, Fiona Hodgson, Nigel Vaughan and all the staff were a pleasure to work with. In my time at STFC I was 9-12 years of age coordinator and then Assistant Centre of Excellence Director, I don't think one day went by when I didn't learn something new about the game.



Like anything in life, all good things come to end eventually but most of the time for the better. Back in March I got offered the chance of a life time to work in America for Major League Soccer Camps - my initial job would involve working at an elite club with their youth programme. Pittsburgh is lovely city but their main passion is American football so it's hard getting soccor noticed. The Pittsburgh Steelers is their team and they are Super Bowl Champions - whenever they play the whole city shuts down. Typical games start at 4pm on



Sundays and people will be on the car park at 10:00am in the morning drinking and having Barbeques (imagine that 10am at Gay Meadow on a match day).
