

ood afternoon and welcome to the Memorial Stadium for our game against Swindon

I think that this season seems to have passed quickly, probably because we have played so many games due to our success in two cup competitions.

It took him a while to come back from that but we've seen signs, in training and in the reserves, that he's back to his best. We were very pleased with his contribution when he came off the bench against Lincoln last week, and obviously delighted for him when he scored his first league goal at Macclesfield. We feel that he has a big future and that this is just the beginning for him. Next year we are looking for him to kick on further and become a regular within the squad and, hopefully, within the team.

ineteen year old Sean Rigg couldn't have chosen a better time to score his first senior goal.

He hit the target just four minutes after going on as a substitute at Macclesfield on Tuesday night. There were just fourteen minutes remaining when Joe Jacobson crossed from the left, Richard Walker touched it on and he hit a first time shot past goalkeeper Tommy Lee.

It was a goal we really needed and I'm just pleased it was me that put it in. I'm over the moon to score my first goal for the club, it's probably the happiest day of my life.

There was a chance for a second goal in time added on, but he hit his shot straight at Lee.

The ball bobbled up at last minute and came off my shin, but I scored one and I'm really pleased.

It capped an eventful season for the youngster, who missed a chunk of the season after sustaining a fractured jaw in the First Round FA Cup tie at Barrow.

I've come further than I thought I would this season, and I'm really enjoying it. I made my debut against MK Dons earlier in the season, but unfortunately the injury set me back a little bit. If it hadn't been for the injury, perhaps I might have started a few more games than I have, but my aim

at the start of the season was to get on the bench as often as possible and maybe push for a start. I think the season has gone better than I thought it would and I'm really happy with how it's turned out.

I've got another season on my contract, so hopefully I can get more involved next year and improve my game.

It will be a very tough game, as they are a good side. However we seem to perform well against better opposition and I think if we put in the effort we know we can, we have the quality in the team to win it.

hopes following last Saturday's goalless
draw against Lincoln City.

We're hanging on is probably the way to describe it. We were a little bit fortunate today as they hit the post four times and they were better in our box than we were in theirs. That's been the situation all season, otherwise we'd be higher up the league than they are, in my opinion.

Another clean sheet brought the total to twenty in the league so far.

# If I'm being honest, if you don't get in the play offs when you keep that many clean sheets, then there's something very wrong, and we all know why we aren't in there.

We dominated the first half, yet their goalkeeper didn't have to make an outstanding save. In fact, I don't think he had to make an outstanding save all game and that sums us up, really. We pass the ball well, we get in good areas, but when we get a cross in we lack movement and you can put your finger on a few things. We shoot from 50 yards, and my nan wouldn't get beat from that distance, so decision making is probably something we could work on.

He admitted he was fortunate to keep a clean sheet after the visitors hit the woodwork so many times.

They all hit the outside of the post. If they had hit the inside, I don't know if I would have saved them or not.

However, he did well when faced by former Rovers striker Jamie Forrester in a one on one situation late in the game.

I think I did well to hold things up. If I'd sold myself, he's good enough to just nick it over me or nip round me, so I made sure I tried to hold him up as much as I could so that people could get back round me. Fortunately, we picked up another point, but the fact is that we dominated 60 or 70 minutes of the game and their keeper never made a really telling save.

The chance of a play off place remained, though.

Stockport losing is a bit of a bonus. The wheels seem to have come off there massively since we beat them, so we are looking to catch them. If we win our game in hand, we will be a point off the top seven with two games to go, so we are still in there.

That game in hand came against Macclesfield on Tuesday and he admitted it would all be over if three points weren't forthcoming from our visit to the Moss Rose.

"I've had an ear bashing from Paul already, but I've spoken to Lennie and told him I won't be doing anything stupid. If I have to walk round in three hours I'll do that, the main thing is raising the money, everything else is secondary to that.

We never really got going, and it looked like a lacklustre performance with an end-ofseason feel about it. #

Rovers took the lead from their first real attack. Cai Jin Yuan picked out Klein-Davies, and the former Bristol City youngster took a couple of touches before hitting a shot into the back of the Swindon net.

Swindon's equaliser arrived in controversial circumstances. Two Swindon players looked to be in an offside position when the ball was played down the left, but play was allowed to continue and a cross into the box evaded Green, giving Jutkiewicz the easy task of heading home unchallenged from two yards.

The winning goal came after Sahr Kabba was caught in possession on the edge of the Swindon box, and a swift break forward from the Robins eventually allowed Grimes a shot on goal from just outside the area, and he made no mistake as he drilled the ball past

#It was a very competitive game and it was pleasing to see that our young side competed well against a team with a lot more experience. We made a good game of it, and the match was played at a good tempo throughout.


We were pleased that a side containing so many triallists and young lads, who hadn't played reserve football for us before, came together and did so well.

Mike Green made two good saves in the whole game, but other than that I thought we defended well as a unit and Swindon found it very hard to penetrate us. F

It was disappointing to concede a goal late on, but we gave away possession by trying to win the game. We lost a bit of shape and perhaps too many bodies were bombing forward, but that's inexperience and something the players will learn from. #

#Their first goal was also a hard one to accept. A lot of the players stopped because they thought there was going to be an offside decision. They shouldn't have stopped, they should have reacted, but that's naivety and they will learn from that as well.

#I'd also like to have seen a bit more commitment from Tom Parrinello in an attempt to stop the ball going in, rather than just accepting that he wasn't going to get there. He might not have done, but you need to make the attempt.



Kevin acknowledged the quality of the football his young players produced.

We try to encourage players to be positive and also to be creative in the right areas. As a coach you look for perfection, and we do need to be better with the ball at times and improve in other areas of our game. But again, these are things you learn as you get more experience.

I thought we did well, and I think we deserved a point from the game. A draw would have been a fair result, and when you compare their team to ours, I think that speaks volumes for how well we did.

 traces every Bristol Rovers player
 from 60 post-war League seasons.

#### CHRIS LLEWELLYN

Welsh international midfielder Chris Llewellyn had a loan spell at Bristol Rovers during the 2002/03 campaign. A former Norwich City trainee, he signed professional in January 1997 and was given his League debut in their 5-0 defeat at Wolves a year later. He helped them qualify for the First Division play-offs in 2001/02 and was loaned to Rovers in February 2003, netting three goals in 14 Third Division outings while at Memorial Stadium. Joining Wrexham in August 2003, he featured in their 2005 LDV Vans Trophy final success and moved to Hartlepool United in July 2005. He returned to Wrexham in July 2006.



Big central defender Larry Lloyd gained four England caps after leaving Bristol Rovers. Locally born, he signed professional at Eastville Stadium in July 1967 and starred as Rovers reached the FA Cup Fitth Round in 1968/69. He scored once in 43 League games prior to joining Liverpool for £55,000 in April 1969 and featured in their 1972/73 League Championship and UEFA Cup double triumph. Sold to Coventry City for £240,000 in August 1974, he joined Nottingham

Forest in October 1976, starring in their successes under Brian Clough. He later managed Wigan Athletic and Notts County, then became a publican in Nottingham.

#### **MAURICE LOCKIER**

Outside-left Maurice Lockier briefly appeared for Bristol Rovers at the end of the 1949/50 season. Locally born, he signed professional at Eastville Stadium in July 1947 and made his League debut in Rovers' 0-0 draw at home to Northampton Town in May 1950. He retained his place for the next match, a 1-0 victory at Reading, but failed to make any further League appearances before

moving to Bath City in May 1952. Helping them reach the FA Cup Second Round in 1952/53, he joined Trowbridge Town in July 1956 and switched to full-back, partnering Ralph Jones in their defence. He resided in Bristol until his death in 2001.

#### MATT LOCKWOOD

Versatile left-back Matt Lockwood helped Bristol Rovers qualify for the Second Division play-offs in 1997/98. A former Southend United trainee, he signed professional for QPR in May 1995 and followed lan Holloway to Rovers in July 1997. He made his League debut in the following month's 1-0 victory at home to Peterborough United and scored once in 63 Second Division games while at Memorial Stadium prior to joining Leyton Orient in August 1998. Starring as they qualified for the Third Division play-offs in 1998/99 and 2000/01, he captained Orient to promotion in 2005/06 and is now their longest-serving player.

#### CARLOS LOPEZ

Spanish right-back Carlos Lopez briefly appeared for Bristol Rovers during the 2001/02 relegation campaign. His full name was Carlos Sanchez-Lopez and he played for Getafe in the lower reaches of the Spanish League before moving to Memorial Stadium on a short-term contract in February 2002. He made a promising League debut in that month's 1–0 defeat at home to Hartlepool United, showing good touches and a willingness to have a shot on goal. Unfortunately he suffered with a shin problem early on, then was sidelined by a knee injury. He made six Second Division appearances before being released in May 2002.

#### RIK LOPEZ

Attacking left-back Rik Lopez played for Bristol Rovers during the 2001/02 relegation battle. A former QPR trainee, he signed professional in April 1997 but failed to secure a first-team slot and spent a year with Portuguese side Uniao Leiria before moving to Rovers in August 2001. He made his League debut in that month's 1-0 defeat at Darlington and showed early promise

but then had to undergo a calf operation that sidelined him for three months. Returning to the first-team in February 2002, he featured in the FA Cup Fourth Round tie at Gillingham and made seven Second Division appearances before leaving in May 2002.

#### JEFFERSON LOUIS

Big striker Jefferson Louis understudied Junior Agogo while at Bristol Rovers. Initially with Aylesbury United, he moved via Thame United to Oxford United in March 2002 and made his League debut in the following month's 2-1 defeat at home to Darlington. He headed their 2002/03 FA Cup Second Round winner against rivals Swindon Town, then appeared for Forest Green Rovers and Woking before moving to Bristol Rovers in May 2005. Playing nine League Two games while at Memorial Stadium, he has since had spells with Hemel Hempstead, Worthing, Lewes, Stevenage Borough, Yeading and Havant & Waterlooville.

#### JOSH LOW

Welsh U-21 winger Josh Low helped Bristol Rovers qualify for the Second Division play-offs in 1997/98. A former Rovers trainee, he signed professional in August 1996 and made his League debut in that month's 1-1 draw at home to Stockport. He regularly appeared as a substitute and played 22 Second Division games before moving to Leyton Orient in May 1999. Joining Cardiff City in November 1999, he helped them win promotion in 2000/01 and reach the Second Division play-offs in 2001/02. He moved via Oldham Athletic to Northampton Town for £165,000 in August 2003 and starred in their 2005/06 promotion success.

#### MIKE LYONS

Young centre-forward Mike Lyons briefly deputised for Geoff Bradford during the

1953/54 campaign. Signing professional for Bristol City in June 1950, he joined Rovers in July 1953 and made two Second Division appearances before moving to Bournemouth in July 1956. He switched to right-back and starred as they reached the FA Cup Sixth Round in 1956/57, then played for Swindon Town and Yeovil Town. Later Bristol Rovers' reserve team trainer/physio for 17 years while a self-employed insurance broker, he then assisted Bobby Jones at Bath City and Forest Green Rovers. He owns several properties in Bristol.

#### PHIL LYTHGOE

Versatile winger Phil Lythgoe had a loan spell at Bristol Rovers during the 1978/79 season. The son of former Bristol City winger Derrick Lythage, he turned professional with Norwich City in December 1977 and made his First Division debut at home to Manchester City a month later. He was loaned to Rovers in September 1978 and played six Second Division games while at Eastville Stadium. Sold to Oxford United for £15,000 in August 1980, he later played for Witney Town, Gorleston, Lowestoft, Poringland and Wroxham. He has settled in Norwich, since working in advertising sales for local newspapers and radio.

#### **GARY MABBUTT**

Versatile central defender Gary Mabbutt was capped 16 times by England after leaving Bristol Rovers. A son of former Rovers favourite Ray Mabbutt, he signed professional at Eastville Stadium in January 1976 and was ever-present in 1980/81. A diabetic, he netted ten goals in 131 League games for Rovers prior to joining Tottenham Hotspur for £100,000 in July 1982. He was an influential figure in their 1984 UEFA Cup final triumph, then was an FA Cup finalist in 1987 and skippered Spurs to FA Cup final glory in 1991. Awarded the MBE in the 1994 New Year's Honours list, he has since worked in corporate hospitality.

#### **RAY MABBUTT**

Long-serving wing-half Ray Mabbutt was ever-present for Bristol Rovers in 1959/60. He had spells with hometown Aylesbury, Spennymoor and Yorkshire Amateurs before moving to Eastville Stadium in August 1956. Given his League debut in Rovers' 2-1 defeat at Derby County in September 1957, he scored a hat-trick in the 5-4 win at Northampton in October 1967. He netted 27 goals in 394 League outings prior to joining Newport County in September 1969, then played for Trowbridge, Bath City, Clevedon, Frome Town, Mangotsfield, Clevedon again and Keynsham. Now a retired insurance broker, living in Winford.

#### FROM THE BOARDROOM

t this year's Annual General
Meeting (AGM) held last Monday,
the Board of Bristol Rovers 1883
Ltd. held an Extraordinary General
Meeting (EGM) to vote on a proposed
increase in share capital to raise new
investment for the football club.

There were five simple resolutions at the AGM which were all passed on a show of hands. The AGM was then closed and the EGM opened.

Chairman Ron Craig opened the EGM and explained the rationale behind the resolutions to increase the share capital of the company. Ron also explained that the normal protocol was to ask for a show of hands for voting purposes but that any member could ask for a vote based upon shareholding held.

These were the three following resolutions at the EGM:-

- 1. Increase authorised share Capital
- 2. Authorisation of Directors to allot shares
- 3. Dis-apply statutory pre-emption rights

The purpose is to increase the company share capital by 25% and to give the Directors authority to issue these shares should it require new investment to support the funding of the stadium regeneration during the redevelopment stages. The resolutions were added to this years AGM to avoid a costly EGM during the year when there may also have been insufficient time to raise the investment immediately it was required.

Resolution 1 was sought to increase the share capital from £2,000,000 to £2,250,000 by the creation of 2,500,000 additional ordinary shares of 10p each to rank pari passu in all respects with the existing Ordinary shares in the capital of the company.

Resolution 2 was sought to authorise the Directors to allot and issue these ordinary shares. These are ordinary resolutions requiring a vote of 50% + 1 share to be passed. These resolutions were passed on a simple show of hands.

Resolution 3 was sought to disapply statutory pre-emption rights. This is a special resolution requiring a vote of 75% of the shares to be passed. Resolution 3 will confer rights on the

Directors to allow share sales to anybody for whatever price without having to offer the same to existing shareholders, not withstanding their duties to the company to ensure best value. This resolution was not carried on a simple show of hands but passed on a ballot of shareholding held.

The increase in share capital has been discussed by the SCE who have agreed that this is a necessary contingency and a responsible approach, by the football club, to manage the risk during construction. The SCE have also agreed that the redevelopment of the ground is of paramount importance to the future of our club.

Strictly speaking the SCE should has a mandate from its membership on which way to vote on Resolution 3, it being a special resolution requiring 75% of the votes. The SCE had insufficient time to take legal advice, provide an executive recommendation and to organise a ballot before the EGM. However the SCE considers the ground redevelopment to be of utmost importance and therefore supported all three resolutions.





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## Alan Ball

nly one man has won a
World Cup winners' medal
and also played for Bristol
Rovers, so it is with great sadness
that we learn of the death of Alan
Ball

Having watched the Champions League semi-final between Manchester United and AC Milan the previous evening, Alan died of a heart attack in the early hours of Wednesday 25th April 2007 at the age of sixty-one. Following the death from cancer of Bobby Moore in 1993, Ball, the 'baby' of the 1966 side, is the second of England's World Cup winning side to die.

Alan Ball's reputation grew out of his good fortune to be in the England side that became World champions in 1966. At the age of twenty-one. Ball was the youngest member of the side and had only made his international debut in May 1965, in a 1-1 draw with Yugoslavia. Diminutive, red-haired and with a bubbly personality, a famously squeaky voice and an infectious sense of humour, he was in the engine-room of England's midfield, providing the box-to-box service that the national side required in the World Cup finals. In the final itself, he can be seen turning away, arm raised aloft, fully confident that Geoff Hurst's controversial goal had crossed the line. Hurst, the son of a former Rovers reserves player, completed a hat-trick as England defeated West Germany 4-2 at Wembley.

On 26th January 1983, towards the end of a long and celebrated career, Ball was signed for Bristol Rovers by Bobby Gould. Aged thirty-seven, his signing was by no means a risk, for the wealth of experience and his willingness to go on running provided Rovers with greater depth and quality. 'I'm not a believer in luck', he once said, 'but I do believe you need it'. He played in Rovers' midfield in seventeen League games, including a 5-0 win at Wigan Athletic, scoring against Plymouth and Huddersfield. The latter goal, a stunning thirty-vard shot following a throw-in out on the left, proved to be the last of his career, whilst his final game for Rovers was the last League match played by any of the eleven players who had secured the Jules Rimet trophy back in 1966. For the record, Ball

was Rovers' third oldest debutant, the seventh oldest man to don a Rovers shirt in League action and the fourth oldest to score a goal.

Born in Farnworth on 12th May 1945, Alan James Ball was the son of a former Southport, Oldham Athletic and Rochdale player; Alan Ball senior had gone on to make his name as a manager. Rejected as a junior at Wolves and Bolton because of his size, 'Bally' was not yet five feet six inches when he arrived

at Blackpool in September 1961, signing as a professional on his seventeenth birthday. He played in 146 League games for Blackpool, scoring 46 goals and, having made his mark at international level, moved to Everton for £115,000 in August 1966. Merseyside was a thriving place at that time, with the worlds of music and fashion adding an atmosphere to the city; with Ball commanding the midfield. Everton were League champions in 1969/70 and he totalled 208 League appearances and 66 goals. He also played for Arsenal, who paid a British record transfer fee of £220,000 for his services in December 1971 - he was their top scorer and Player of the Year in 1973/74 - and, from Christmas 1976. Southampton, playing in 177 (45 goals) and 195 (11 goals) League matches respectively. He helped the Saints to promotion from Division Two in 1977/78. Oddly enough for a World Cup winner, he was unsuccessful in domestic cups, being a losing FA Cup finalist with Everton in 1968 and Arsenal in 1972 as well as a losing League Cup finalist in 1979 with Southampton. He did, however, score a European Cup hat-trick, when Everton defeated Keflavik 6-2 at Goodison Park in September 1970. His time at Rovers took him to a career total of 633 League games and 170 goals.

Having won eight U-23 caps, Ball went on to represent England in 72 full



internationals, scoring eight times, and captaining his country on six occasions. He also represented the Football League. He contrived to miss a penalty against Finland in 1966 and was sent off against Poland in 1973, becoming only the second England man to be dismissed in a full international. Coupled with his sending-off for the U-23 side in Vienna in 1965, he was, until David Beckham in 2006, the only man to have been sent off twice in an England shirt. Prior to his arrival at Eastville in 1983, he had also spent time in North America and in Hong Kong. 25 games and five goals for Philadelphia Fury in 1978 were followed by 31 games and ten goals in two spells with Vancouver Whitecaps. It was from the Hong Kong side Eastern United that he joined Rovers. Subsequently he was to manage Portsmouth (whom he led back to top-flight football), Stoke City, Exeter City, Southampton and Manchester City, as well as coaching at Colchester United and Minehead. At one point, from January 1992, he was coach to the England 'B' team. The death of his wife Lesley in 2004, after thirtysix years of marriage and shortly after the birth of their third grandchild, was a bitter blow and Ball sold his World Cup medal and commemorative cap in May 2005 for £140,000 in a bid to raise money for his family. He leaves a son, Jimmy, who played football for Petersfield Town, and two daughters, Mandy and Keely.

## memorial stadium regeneration

## Progress report

fter Saturday's draw with Lincoln, I anticipated that this would probably be the last Regeneration progress report of the season and that I would be advising readers to watch out for news on the club website and in the local press during the summer.

As I write, though, Sean Rigg's goal has just won the game at Macclesfield and maybe there will be the opportunity for one more programme report before the season finally draws to a close!

Talking of Riggs, those of you who walked past the Clubhouse at the Bury match may have noticed the drilling rig parked outside. This was part of the equipment being used by contractors undertaking the ground investigation work - always one of the first activities in any development project, to provide detailed information about conditions beneath the ground for the architects and structural engineers amongst others. It will also provide the information about any possible contamination in the ground to help us meet our obligations to the City Council who will want to approve our plans for dealing with any that is found.

#### Temporary Relocation:

The last programme progress report (Lincoln programme) was devoted to a questionnaire issued by the club to seek views on tans' preferences between Swindon and Cheltenham as our temporary home while the Mem is rebuilt. If you missed this and would like to register your preference you can download a copy from the club website or call in at Pirate Leisure today and get one.

#### **Current Progress:**

Before we can move anywhere we need to be ready to start demolishing the existing stadium by the end of this year and so behind the scenes work continues towards this objective. S&P Architects who produced the designs that helped secure planning permission have now been reappointed to undertake the detailed design and this should take three to four months and so be complete early next season.

The Club is also now in discussion with the different engineering contractors who will advise on various aspects of the development. These include civil engineers, structural engineers, mechanical and electrical engineers, acoustics specialists and hydrogeologists. Quotes for demolition are also being sought and we expect to appoint lawyers shortly to oversee the legal aspects of the development.

Discussions are also continuing with the various bodies I have mentioned in previous reports - the financial institutions in respect of funding and student accommodation companies in terms of the enabling development.

Finally, the wording of the formal legal agreement between the Football Club and the City Council (the so called Section 106 agreement) is now pretty much agreed and it is hoped this will be ready for signature within the next week or so by the two parties and by others who have a legal interest in the land covered by the planning permission. Once this is signed it will give legal effect to the planning permission for the Regeneration scheme.

Once the agreement has been signed we can start the next stage of consultation in earnest. Plans for this have been drawn up and the club is considering them as part of its overall communications strategy.

Amongst other things this will include the setting up of the Stadium Monitoring Group, as required under the agreement itself and greater direct contact with local residents and businesses.

very so often, football consumes your life. Today is one of those days where everything has centred around Rovers.

An overwhelming combination of anxiety and excitement ahead of this evening's game against Macclesfield have filled my thoughts all day long at work and now, at 7:48pm, I sit listening to Radio Bristol to the live commentary from Moss Rose.

When I'm not able to get to an away game, I sit transfixed to the radio. The love triangle between Brian, Siobhan and Jennifer in The Archers may be radio at it's best but not even that will leave me as totally absorbed as tonight's live game will. I can't do anything else. I'm not even

bothering to cook tonight; the Manchester United Champions
League game is on mute. Sri Lanka and New Zealand's World Cup Semi Final can wait. For now, and for the next few hours, I will be listening to every word from Richard Hoskin and co-commentator Chris Swift, wishing I could be there at Macclesfield for what could be our final chance to haul ourselves into the play off positions.

If last year we flirted with the top seven, then this year we're trying to pull them. The surreal experience that was the Johnstone's Paint Final seems a lifetime ago with the news that about 200 Gasheads are at Macclesfield tonight. Only just under the 7,000 mark were there for our match last Saturday against Lincoln: I don't ever remember a 0-0 that was so tense, so nerve wracking and so exciting. The commercialisation of Rovers that naturally and inevitably occurred due to our recent performance at the Millennium Stadium meant being a Gashead

became diluted; sharing the ultimate day a lower league football fan craves - a big day out at a cup final - with people who did not know the players from Adam was a little strange. It was like being at a big concert seeing one of your all time favourite artists with people who don't know half the songs and push past you before the end to get their car out of the car park. It was like

sharing your birthday in a pub full of strangers - fun, but not the same as sharing it with people you care about.

I have kept texts from friends and family in recent weeks that capture the different moments in the final chapter of this season: 'We are 9th, 2 points behind Shrewsbury and 3 behind Wycombe who we have a game in hand over! Only 6 off Stockport! "my brother Ed updated me after I left Field Mill on Easter Saturday after our 1-0 win there. "Macc beating Stockport! Walsall beating Notts Co. Sky said Richard Lambert scored! Who's he?!;-) " came another during the first half at Barnet when both fans at Underhill and fans listening back home were united in their confusion as to who had

got our first goal against the Bees.

Chris Swift says Rovers are nervy; join the club. My heart was just in my mouth as Lewis Haldane just shot over the cross bar no, apparently it was Rickie Lambert. Quite how those two can be confused is beyond me but in the hysteria of such a game as this, I can't blame them. That turns out to be the main effort of the half, as they wrap

things up at half time. Missed chances have been the story of our season: the difference between why we are chasing the play offs instead of sitting pretty in the automatic spots. We have, throughout the season, missed chances to go 2-0 or 3-0 and only having a slender lead has cost us sometimes. That is my only reservation in a season that has otherwise brought so much excitement and created so many treasured memories.

Richard Hoskin and Chris Swift are describing Rovers' bright start to the second half. I've eaten a pizza without tasting it, and my heart is in my mouth just listening to the game. The cheers and bursts of Irene that are coming from the away support is the

soundtrack to their narrative. It's 0-0 between Wrexham and Shrewsbury, just to make me even more nervy. This whole evening, as jittery as it's making me, is a testament to how great this season has been.

So many of the players have had their best season ever in their Rovers career and many have exceeded all expectations some people had of them. Not least our captain marvel Stuart Campbell, who gets my vote for Player of the Season.

Fifteen minutes left. I can't cope with this. Come ON Rovers! They go over to Ashton Gate again for a rugby update and I switch off momentarily... my mind, not the radio... but as they return to Moss Rose, Richard Hoskin tells us there's been a goal:

- "Macclesfield nil Rovers one! Sean Rigg!! Yessss!! Irene goodnight Irene, Irene goodnight". The sweetest song ever can be heard over the commentators. I could never imagine that the two words
- Macclesfield nil could sound so wonderful. And apparently Wrexham are beating Shrewsbury!

Ten minutes left. How many times have we had to cling to a 1-0 this season? Trust Rovers to stamp such a vital game with their trademark scoreline! Four minutes of injury time... where has that come from... oh my god... Final whistle! We've done it! Rovers live to fight another day! Wrexham have beaten Shrewsbury!

Bring on Swindon!

## born on this day Les Berry

Should you glance through any cricketing book of the inter-war period, the name of the Rovers goalkeeper Les Berry, who was born in Dorking on 28th April 1906, is likely to appear.

Les Berry was a distinguished captain of Leicestershire (1946-48) who, as a right-handed batsman, scored 30,143 runs and took ten first-class wickets in 605 matches between 1924 and 1951. His highest score was 232 against Sussex at Leicester in 1930 and, in the summer of 1933 alone, he contributed 1,971 runs. Canynge Caple's 'Cricketers' Who's Who' from 1934 records that he 'has rendered his side good service' and mentions a particularly poignant score of 156 at The Oval against Surrey, the county of his birth. Yet, he was also a tall, reliable goalkeeper for Rovers and today's visitors Swindon Town, whose family had moved from Surrey to Market Harborough and it was from his home-town club, following trials with Leicester City in 1926, when on the books of Symington's FC, that

George Leslie Berry joined Sheffield Wednesday as a professional goalkeeper in March 1929. Understudy at Hillsborough to the England international keeper Jack Brown, Berry had to wait for his League debut until he had signed for Rovers on 13th June 1930. That first game was a heavy defeat at the hands of Northampton, for whom the future Bristol City forward Ted Bowen scored a hat-trick but, undeterred, Berry played in 39 consecutive League and Cup matches for Rovers, filling the rather large shoes of the recently retired legendary guardian Jesse Whatley. Unfortunately, Rovers conceded four or more goals in eleven of the 34 League matches, no fewer than eight opponents scoring hat-tricks during this run. He was only left out of the side, though, after breaking a bone in his wrist in training. In May 1932, he moved to Swindon Town, where his 22 League matches were to include a 1-0 defeat at Eastville in November of that year, George McNestry scoring Rovers' goal. Thereafter, whilst able to focus on his exceptional cricket career. Berry played for Nuneaton Town from October 1933, Anstey Primitives from October 1935 and Leicestershire Nomads as playercoach from September 1934. Between 1952 and 1980 he was cricket coach at Uppingham School in Rutland, where he coached the future England bowler and television and radio commentator Jonathan Agnew. Les Berry died on 15th February 1985, at the age of seventy-eight, at his home in High Street, Great Glen in Leicestershire.

## 28th april 1987 Bristol Rovers 3 Chester City 2

A series of postponements through a wet winter meant that Rovers had to squeeze eight home games and three away fixtures into the final weeks of a tough 1986/87 season.

What was more, the threat of relegation to the basement division for the first time in Rovers' history hung over the club and the side languished in the relegation zone when Chester visited Twerton Park on this day twenty years ago for a Third Division match. Optimism was vanishing fast and there were just 2,323 hardy souls in the Bath ground for this tie. Despite a home defeat at the hands of Gillingham, Rovers fielded an unchanged side for the visit of Chester City and the tired side soon fell behind when Ricky Greenhough took advantage of

hesitant defending to fire home past Rovers' unsighted goalkeeper Tim Carter. After fifteen minutes, with a goal pictured in Mike Jay's excellent 'Complete Record, 1883-1987', Jeff Meacham casually back-heeled Rovers level. However, from a header from Graham Barrow, Stuart Rimmer, looking offside, put Chester back in front. This controversial goal caused tensions to mount and Barrow was sent off just before half-time following a late challenge on John Scales. After half-time, with a one-man advantage, Rovers scored twice to secure a valuable victory. First, after fifty-eight minutes, Meacham scored his second of the game after good work by Phil Purnell; then, with eighteen minutes left to play, Scales seized on to Rob Turner's lay-off and volleyed home from twentyfive yards for a spectacular winner. John Scales was to score only twice in his time with Rovers, before playing three times for England in a career that took in

Wimbledon, Liverpool, Spurs and Ipswich.

Victory over Darlington forty-eight hours later gave Rovers a hint of space in the battle against relegation, though the ensuing three defeats set up a tense finish. As it was, Phil Purnell's goal at Newport on the final day ensured that Rovers survived in Division Three, a league that the club was to leave as champions just three years later. The drop into the basement division, for the first time in the club's history, was to arrive in 2001, more than eighty years after Rovers had first become members of the Football League.

On the same day in 1987, our visitors today Swindon Town, with former Rovers Steve White and Tim Parkin in their starting line-up, won 3-2 at Notts County in the same Third Division. Recalling Leigh Barnard and Bryan Wade, the Robins trailed to a David Hunt goal at half-time, before rallying to record a victory before a crowd of 6,354 at Meadow Lane. Darren Davis scored an own goal and Colin Calderwood and Wade a goal each, with lan McParland replying for County.




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## something for our visitors... A funny old game

immy Greaves' famous saying might just strike a chord with First Team Coach Paul Trollope, who started his career with the Robins before making his League debut for Torquay.

Less than two years ago it looked as if the midfielder, son of County Ground legend John, was heading for the exit door of the Mem after lan Atkins suggested that he was surplus to requirements. Trollope, who has now been in charge for a longer period than his predecessor, became Atkins' coach before replacing him, in association with Director of Football Lennie Lawrence.

Sammy Igoe has a more recent Swindon connection, having spent two seasons with Town before an ill-fated move to Millwall in the summer of 2005. His three goals so far this season included the equaliser against Doncaster in the JPT Final. With the central midfield positions being filled by skipper Stuart Campbell, signed from Grimsby in the summer of 2004, and Craig Disley, formerly with Mansfield, Igoe has been employed on the right wing with Lewis Haldane or Andy Sandell on the left flank. Sandell joined Rovers from Bath City at the start of the season. Joe Jacobson, on loan from Cardiff City, gives the Pirates another option on the left and provided the cross for Sean Rigg's vital goal on Tuesday evening, Jacobson was the Bluebirds' reserve team skipper last term and made his senior debut in their last home game of the season against Norwich. He played for Accrington Stanley on loan in their 4-0 defeat here at the Mem last December. 19 year old Rigg, who sustained a double jaw fracture at Barrow in the FA Cup last November, replaced Haldane from the bench three minutes before scoring his first senior goal at Macclesfield. Bristol boy Chris Lines proved a capable deputy during Campbell's absence through suspension last month. Another local lad. Darren Mullings, has had a loan spell at Clevedon, whilst James Palmer is one of five Filton College youngsters in this season's squad.

Stuart Nicholson, who has been on loan from West Brom, missed last Tuesday's



game through illness. Richard Walker and Rickie Lambert are the preferred partnership up front, although Nicholson's pace has often been employed to good effect in the later stages of games. Walker, our leading marksman, scored in our meeting at the County Ground last December. He joined Rovers from Oxford in August 2004, after beginning his career as a trainee at Aston Villa, and playing for Cambridge, Blackpool, Wycombe and Northampton. He is out of contract at the end of the season and has rejected a new offer. Reports have suggested that he may be a target for Leyton Orient. Lambert, whose goal against Bristol City sealed the Pirates' passage to the JPT Final, spent the best part of two years at Stockport after his £300,000 move from Macclesfield in April 2003. He scored 22 for Rochdale last season, the best a Dale striker had managed for 20 years, and Rovers' invested around £200,000 to bring him to the Mem at the end of August last year. Lewis Powell, 19, has been on loan at Mangotsfield but has yet to make a senior appearance.

Last Saturday's game saw changes in the Pirates' back four as Ryan Green and Byron Anthony, a Welsh U-21 international signed from Cardiff, came in for Aaron Lescott and

Craig Hinton at right back and in central defence respectively. Green, a close season recruit from Hereford, needed an operation on a lacerated ankle and his return coincided with a four match ban for former Stockport midfielder Lescott after his dismissal at Barnet a fortnight ago. Anthony had been absent with a knee injury after being stretchered off at Walsall just after Christmas and finally had an outing when he replaced Haldane during the second half at Underhill, Hinton, who ioined Rovers from Kidderminster in July 2004, is likely to miss the rest of the campaign after suffering a groin injury at Underhill. Central defender Steve Elliott scored his fifth goal of the campaign in our win at Mansfield three weeks ago. After missing three games with an Achilles injury, Elliott scored on his return at Wycombe last month, a few days before making his second visit to the Millennium

Stadium. His earlier trip to Cardiff, in the LDV Vans Trophy for Blackpool against Southend in March 2004, ended in a 2-0 win for the Seasiders. In January he faced his first club, Derby County, in the 4th round of the FA Cup. Ex-England youth international Chris Carruthers, formerly with Northampton, has started every game since the end of October at left back, leaving 17 year old former Filton College scholar Tom Parinello, who has been on the bench five times, waiting to make his first senior appearance, Last summer Parrinello secured his first professional contract twelve months earlier than expected. 6'3" youngster Ollie Barnes, who had a spell on loan at Gloucester City, has yet to make a League appearance. He signed a professional contract last summer after his release by Bristol City.

Former Bristol City keeper Steve Phillips has proved to be a valuable acquisition since joining Rovers last summer, replacing ex-Coventry custodian Scott Shearer, who is on loan at Shrewsbury. 18 year old scholar Mike Green, who was recalled from a loan spell at Mangotsfield to provide cover after Shearer's departure, is likely to be on the bench.





#### The Gaffer - Paul Sturrock

Paul Sturrock was a striker who played his entire career in Scotland, but has earned most of his success as a manager south of the border.

He joined Dundee United from Bankfoot Juniors in 1973 and stayed at Tannadice for 20 glorious years. In that time he played 576 games, scored 171 goals, won the Scottish League Championship in 1983 and the League Cup in 1979 and 1980 and played in the 1987 UEFA Cup Final defeat by Gothenberg.

After 9 games for the U-21's he won his first full international cap in 1981and the following year was selected by the Scottish sportswriters as Player of the Year. He won 20 caps, scored 3 international goals and played in the 1986 World Cup Finals in Mexico. Paul finished playing in 1989 and stayed at Tannadice as a coach until his first managerial appointment at St Johnstone.

He returned to Dundee United as boss in September 1998 but left 2 years later to begin his adventures in the Football League with Plymouth Argyle. In his second season he stormed to the Division Three title with a record 102 points. In March 2004, with Argyle on the brink of another promotion, he replaced Gordon Strachan as manager of Southampton. Unfortunately it did not work out at St Mary's and Paul left after just five months and took charge of Sheffield Wednesday. He won promotion for the Owls in 2005 but was dismissed in October 2006 and replaced Dennis Wise at Swindon a few weeks later.


he Robins may have practically clinched the third automatic promotion place but they have much more to play for this afternoon.

Our visitors are peaking at the right time. An unbeaten run of seven games including five wins has been achieved following an inspired reshuffle of the team that lost narrowly at Grimsby on St Patrick's Day. Leading marksmen Christian Roberts and Lee Peacock were pulled back into midfield with Barry Corr brought in to make his Town debut alongside teenager Lukas Jutkiewicz and the result was a 3-2 rout of promotion rivals Lincoln City at Sincil Bank. Corr scored on his debut and since then the goals have been shared between him, Jutkiewicz and Blair Sturrock.

Corr is on loan from Sheffield Wednesday where his first team appearances have been limited to just one game this season. The former Leeds United trainee did gain some exposure during one month on loan with Bristol City. He played four times and in November scored his first ever senior goal at Leyton Orient after charging down their keeper's clearance and stabbing the ball into an empty net. Jutkiewicz was born in Southampton but although he spent some time as a junior with Saints he joined the Swindon Town Centre of Excellence and made his senior debut for the Robins in April 2006 while still a trainee. Now he has 40 appearances and 5 goals to his name including the equaliser against the Gas in December and winners against Torquay and Bury earlier this month. The Swindon fans would love to see his career develop before their eyes but it is not to be. Lucas has signed a pre-contract agreement with Everton and will officially join the Toffees in the summer.

Sturrock, the son of the manager, was born in Dundee and joined Dundee United before going out on loan to Brechin City in August 2000, He played 33 games for them before following his father to Devon and Plymouth Argyle in October 2001. He made his debut in the green and white two months






later in a Second Round FA Cup tie against the Gas at Home Park. In December 2004 he moved to Kidderminster Harriers and three months later scored against us in a 1-1 draw at Aggborough. Last term he joined Rochdale after a successful pre-season trial and scored again against the Gas when Dale pinched a 2-1 victory at the Mem in November 2005. He moved to Swindon before Christmas. A further striking option is provided by Ashley Grimes recruited on loan from Manchester City in March. The youngster has already scored once at the Mem this week firing in the winner as the reserves beat the Gas on Monday afternoon.


Roberts and Peacock are likely to be joined in midfield by Michael Pook and Sofiane Zaaboub leaving Aaron Brown, Michael Timlin, Ricky Shakes, Curtis Weston and Kevin James contesting the places on the bench.

Roberts was a trainee with home town club Cardiff City making half a dozen League starts before leaving in July 2000 for Exeter City. Once he had established a regular place and won the hearts of the Grecian supporters with his direct running he



transferred to Bristol City on transfer deadline day 2002. Over 100 games later he moved along the M4 to Swindon and scored on his debut against Oldham in October 2004. Peacock was a Carlisle trainee who made over 80 appearances for the Cumbrians until transferring to Mansfield Town in October 1997. Two years and 100

games later he moved to Manchester City where he could not command a regular place and made just 4 starts before moving to Bristol City in August 2000 and immediately becoming part of the furniture. Lee played 175 games for City and scored 63 goals before moving to Sheffield Wednesday in July 2004 then to Swindon in

January 2006. As he approaches his 500th career game he has been transformed from striker to midfielder with remarkable effect.

Pook is a local boy who came through the Swindon youth system to make his debut at Boston United in October 2003. He has established a regular place in the Town engine room since Christmas following the ankle injury to Welsh international Paul Evans. French-Algerian Zaaboub was Paul Sturrock's first signing as Town manager and will probably play on the left. He has previously played in France for Montereau and Saint-Étienne, In Italy for Modena, in the Andalucia region of Spain with Real Jaén and in Belgium for FC Brussels.

Brown is Bristol born and joined Bristol City as a junior becoming a trainee then a professional and making close to 200 appearances despite a serious leg injury before departing for Queens Park Rangers in July 2004. His time in Shepherds Bush was plaqued by injuries and after loan spells with Torquay United and Cheltenham Town he joined Swindon in November 2005 initially on a loan that became permanent in January 2006. Timlin is a young Fulham player who has yet to make his League debut for the London club but has gained experience through loan deals with Scunthorpe United, Doncaster Rovers and currently Swindon. Shakes had a similar problem after graduating from trainee at Bolton. He scored on his debut for Wanderers in an FA Cup tie against Tranmere Rovers in January 2004 but could not get a sniff of the Premier League squad. He came on loan to the Gas in February 2005 and made two substitute appearances. both away from home, then joined Bury where he scored twice in four starts. He moved to Swindon in July 2005 and has made over 70 appearances and earned one international cap for Trinidad & Tobago. Weston scored the winner in the reverse fixture. He was a Millwall trainee released to join our visitors in August 2006. James is on loan from Nottingham Forest where he has been since transferring from Gillingham in May 2004. His appearances on loan with Boston United, Walsall, Yeovil and Grimsby Town far outweigh the eight appearances he has made for Forest.

Outstanding Slovakian goalkeeper Peter Brezovan broke his arm against Grimsby Town in October and Phil Smith stepped up to the challenge and has been number one ever since. He was with Millwall as a youngster then moved out of the League with Folkestone Invicta, Dover Athletic, Margate and Crawley Town. In the 2006 close season all the Crawley players were made available for transfer when the club went into administration and Paul was snapped up by Swindon.

Another long term injury has robbed the Robins of defender and club captain Ady Williams but the squad was initially strong enough to cover and has since been boosted by loan signings Ashley Westwood and David Partridge. Jack Smith will be available this afternoon after completing a two match suspension but Paul Sturrock may stick with Westwood, Jerel Ifil, Jamie Vincent and Andy Nicholas. Claude Gnapka was on the bench last week.

Former Reading, Wolves and Coventry stopper Williams is recovering from knee surgery but the temporary acquisition of Westwood has proved a reliable deputy. The former Manchester United trainee played over 300 games for Crewe, Bradford, Sheffield Wednesday, Northampton and Chester City whom he joined in the summer. Partridge remains on Bristol City's books. He has made just one appearance for the Reds this term as an extra time substitute in the FA Cup replay at Middlesbrough but otherwise has relied on







Playing, and beating, teams near the bottom of the league has been a



# Swindon stalemate

ontinuing our series of photos looking back at our ten year stint at the Memorial Stadium, we go back to Saturday 24th March 2001, when Swindon Town visited the Mem.

In the build up to this West country clash, Rovers had been busy in the transfer market. Striker Micky Evans had returned to Plymouth Argyle, whilst manager Garry Thompson had been busy signing Richie Partridge, on loan from Liverpool, Kevin Gall from Newcastle, Christian Lee from Gillingham and goalkeeper Alex O'Reilly from West Ham.

All of the new boys were included in the squad for the visit of Swindon, with Partridge and Lee in the starting lineup and Gall and O'Reilly on the bench.

The visitors included future Rovers player Giuliano Grazioli in their starting eleven, along with former Bristol City midfielder Matt Hewlett

A crowd of 8,114 were treated to a goalless draw and saw Rovers finish

with ten men after Simon Bryant received his marching orders in the second half for picking up a second yellow card.

The first save of the game was made by Rovers keeper Nick Culkin, who saved an angled drive from Grazioli, but with Partridge showing good form down the right, it wasn't too long before the home side threatened the Swindon goal.

The Liverpool youngster got in a number of telling crosses but his new team mates were unable to take advantage.

lan Woan shot straight into Rovers defensive wall, from a free kick some thirty yards out and Culkin saved a volley from Gary Alexander.

Nathan Ellington saw a shot charged down before Bryant picked up his first booking of the afternoon for a challenge which left Hewlett on the floor.

Scott Jones made a goal line clearance from Matt Heywood to deny the visitors a goal before the break, but neither side was able to break the deadlock.

Dwayne Plummer shot high over the bar at the start of the second half and Bryant went close to scoring when he took a pass from Plummer and hit a fierce 25 yard drive which only just cleared the bar.

The young midfielder was sent off with 73 minutes on the clock, when he picked up another yellow card for a late challenge on Woan just outside the Swindon box.

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
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# The best so far



A scan, undertaken earlier this week, will have determined whether or not Craig Hinton's season is over.

The central defender picked up a groin injury in the game against Barnet two weeks ago and has been unable to train since.

Hopefully, it's just a muscle tear, though the scan will determine if it's anything more serious. I realised I had a problem about ten minutes before I came off and told Craig Disley and Byron Anthony that my groin was sore, but we were down to ten men and I felt I had to try to carry on. Then I started to run and felt a massive pain and hit the floor. I tried to get up and felt the pain again and knew that something was wrong.

The injury meant that he faced the prospect of missing the final run in to the season.

It's terrible, and I feel a little bit gutted that it happened with four games left. We'd given ourselves a massive chance of reaching the play offs and it's very disappointing that I'm not going to be involved in it.

It's one of those things, though, and there's not much point getting depressed over it. I can't do any more, and have to get on with things and try and get fit as soon as possible.

Having reclaimed his pace in the starting lineup at the beginning of the year following the injury sustained by Byron Anthony, his own misfortune has seen Byron come back into the side in his place.

"That's football. You never know what's round the corner. It just makes the game what it is and, if you are in the team, you have to keep your place because if you do get a slight knock there's always someone to come in and take your place so you do as much as you can to stay fit."

He feels that the Johnstone's Paint Trophy Final may have been a turning point in a season that appeared as though it was going to end with a great day out in Cardiff.

I think we played well before the final, just to get there. We were doing reasonably well in the league, but the game at the Millennium Stadium was one where we didn't have to think about picking up points. It was a one off game and then, when we returned to league action, we started picking up points and results elsewhere went for us.

Maybe everyone thought that we had no chance of a top seven finish and many had written us off, thinking that the final would be the highlight of the season. I think the disappointment of going to Cardiff and losing, the day itself, and the number of fans we took there, made everyone start to think that we had another chance of another massive day out. We wanted to do well in the league for the fans, because they have been brilliant this season, and everyone is digging in now to try and get there.

This is his third season at the club and

has, he says, been the best so far. Had it not been for the poor start to the campaign it's quite likely that a play off spot, at the very least, would have been confirmed by now.

After the defeat by Walsall, last
September, we were fourth from bottom and
if we had picked up more points early on

I was there for six years and have a lot of friends there and retain a great deal of affection for the club. When I left Birmingham, I wondered what would happen next. Kiddy came along, and the way they played suited me down to the ground and I thoroughly enjoyed my time there. 

# End of the lines!

oday marks the end of Pete Prior's time as groundsman at the Memorial Stadium.

The sixty year old, a popular and well known figure around the stadium will be marking out the pitch for the last, or possibly penultimate, game of his tenure. Naturally, there will be one more if we should make the play offs.

Keeping the pitch in shape for both football and rugby has been quite a challenge.

I'd go as far as to say that every game has been just that. For the first four years Rovers were here, it was still a rugby pitch made into a football pitch every other week. The grass was kept at the same length for football and rugby, but over the years I think I've found what I consider to be a reasonable length between the two codes.

I've always discussed the pitch with the managers who have come and gone whilst Rovers have been here, just to make sure they are happy with what I produce. Sometimes I'm not very happy with the pitch myself, but that's just the way things have been here.

The Directors have given me financial support to improve the pitch over the years, and there has been a noticeable improvement because in the early years that Rovers were here, we always worked in wellington boots from October through to February, not because we were pushing divots back but because we were pushing great swathes of mud around to make the pitch level!

Different managers have, of course, held differing views on how they would like the pitch to be prepared.

My first boss told
me that the managers are in control and to
always let them believe it. But he also told
me that, at the end of the day, it was me
preparing the pitches their teams played on
so it's often been a case of listening to what
they wanted and then preparing things in my
own way!

Essentially a rugby fan, he's almost been 'converted', if you'll excuse the pun, to the round ball game.

I've supported Bedford Rugby club all my life and remember my father, whose uncle lived just up the road from the Mem, bringing me here as a youngster to see Bedford play Bristol. Whilst I've always been interested in rugby, though, I've never played the game. Because of my work here I've developed a tremendous affinity for Rovers, so much so that I was even singing 'Irene' at the Millennium Stadium a few weeks ago!

He says he's retiring, but that's not strictly true.

I'm 60 and have a pension coming out in the next few weeks, which is one reason I'm finishing. The other reason is that this is a very physically demanding job and one for a younger man. The hours involved, because of the dual role of the stadium, means working long hours to get things spot on.

and I would like to spend more time with my family.

I guess you could say that I'm reluctant to leave, but we have a new groundsman starting and I'll oversee things until Rovers leave the Mem at the end of December. I'll also be looking after the pitches at Filton College, which will become Rovers training ground, and that will be a big challenge.

So I'm not actually retiring, but I can work fewer hours and make sure the training facilities are right for the club.

He admits it will be a sad occasion if this is to be his final game.

\*Of course it will, as I enjoy seeing the players out on the pitch. I've seen the highs and the lows since I've been doing the job and seen a number of managers, and even more players, come and go. The current squad are a great bunch of lads, and I've thoroughly enjoyed working for Paul Trollope and Lennie Lawrence.

Seeing Rovers at the Millennium
Stadium was undoubtedly the highlight of working for the club and I hope that it's not too long before we can gain promotion to League One. The new stadium will, hopefully, be the start of good times for the club and we will have a side competing at a much higher level than now.

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

# Beating the Robins

We reach the final home league match of the season against old West Country rivals Swindon Town, who have all but clinched promotion back to League One.

Interestingly enough, Rovers could possibly be ground sharing with the Robins at the County Ground from January 2008. The journey by train, or by car or coach, will put a strain on the funds of many supporters as well as extra time to enable the majority of loyal, dedicated fans to make the average 90 mile round trip for a 90 minute home match.

Our recent home record against Swindon is poor, just one win in the last seven meetings. The last home victory was recorded on 21st March 1991, a 2-1 win at Twerton Park, with goals from Carl Saunders and Tony Sealy.

The previous home win was another 2-1 victory, at Eastville Stadium, on 21st September 1968 when Rovers goals were scored by Wayne Jones and Ray Graydon with Shaun Taylor replying for Swindon.

I came across a very interesting press match report of a Southern League match between the clubs which took place at Eastville, just over 95 years ago, on 6th April 1912.

Although they had to call upon five or six reserves, Swindon did not expect to be beaten by three clear goals at Bristol. On the previous day the Rovers, with practically the same eleven, failed to score against Leyton

The lethargy which then characterised their work was entirely absent in their game with the Champions. To begin with, when they had to face a gusty wind they did not show too much advantage in attack. The spoiling tactics of their backs and half backs however, proved so effective that Roney was rarely troubled. When the first half was completed neither side could claim a goal although Jones had twice gone very near to beating Skiller.

Immediately ends were changed Peplow raced clear and dropped the ball into the mouth of the Swindon goal. Before it could be got away Jones scored. Swindon were often hard pressed, but at the end of half an hour they rallied and Bown, McCulloch and Jefferson all had chances which they were unable to turn to account.

At this stage the Rovers backs showed unwanted slowness, but getting into their stride again Peplow was plied with the ball and from centres by him first Brogan and then Hoggard registered goals. Swindon were unable to make any response.

Before the end arrived it was very apparent that more than one member of the team was very leg weary, and no wonder, for the ground was very hard and the wind developed. Quite the best feature of the match was the judgement exhibited by the home team against the wind. They kept the ball close, and though there were spells when it was frequently in touch these tactics paid. When the wind favoured them they opened out the play, and were able to reap a full reward from the tactics they employed.

Hoggard, the coloured forward they recently obtained from Cardiff gave Peplow splendid support. His passes were generally low and well directed and he was full of dash near goal. The right wing was far more effective than the left, where Hughes was by no means comfortable. Jones was far more active than usual in the centre. It is a long time since they have given such a wholehearted display. No fault could be found with the tackling of the half backs, but they could not always judge the strength of the wind when kicking. There was little to choose between the three. The backs were reliable and Bennett was particularly useful. Roney had an easy time. Not so Skiller who did not show his customary keenness in taking the ball or getting rid of it.


To begin with, Walker generally mastered Peplow, but in the second half he was often beaten. Hill, without being conspicuous made few mistakes. Handley was the cleverest of the half backs though Lockhead did not give Jones much latitude. Jefferson was the pick of the forwards, who after combining smartly at the onset fell off considerably. The least successful part of their play was shooting. They had chances but failed to utilise them. There was every excuse for their defeat considering how hard they have worked of late.

# Past Pirate STEVENAGE BOROUGH club by club

ST MATHIAS

We played just one game against St Mathias, a home friendly in November 1886 which was played at the Three Acres ground.

#### ST PAULS

In October of 1893, we entertained St Pauls in a Bristol and District League game. Two years later both teams had moved up to the Western League and fixtures resumed, though at the end of the 1897/98 season. St Pauls disappeared off the football map. We also met in the Gloucester Cup in January 1897, winning through to the next round courtesy of a 1-0 win.

#### ST SIMONS

During 1891/92, two friendly fixtures were played against St Simons, the home game being played at the Schoolmasters Cricket Ground in December 1892.

#### STALYBRIDGE CELTIC

It is thought that the club was formed in 1909. They played for two seasons in the Lancashire & Cheshire Amateur League before turning professional and joining the Lancashire Combination.

Time was spent in the Central league and the Southern league before the outbreak of the First World War, though they rejoined the Central league in 1921/22 before becoming founder members of the Third Division (North).

After two seasons, and lacking local support, the club voluntarily resigned their place in the Football league and rejoined the Cheshire County league, where they remained for sixty years until the formation of the Bass North West Counties League.

They currently play in the Conference North, two tiers below the level they aspire to reach.

Our two games against them came in the Fifth Qualifying Round of the FA Cup, in December 1922. After a goalless draw at the Bower Field, Stalybridge won the replay 2-1 at Eastville.

#### STAPLETON

We played a friendy fixture against Stapleton in July 1984, when a programme was produced.

We travelled up to Broadhall way for a pre season friendly in August 1998, and a single sheet programme was issued for the game.

Currently playing in the Conference, Stevenage have a date at the new Wembley Stadium next month, when they take on Kidderminster Harriers in the FA Trophy Final, and I would like to wish them the best of luck for their big day out.

#### STOCKPORT COUNTY

Given that Stockport became a Football league Club as long ago as 1900, I was surprised to discover that we haven't played that many games against the team that plays at Edgeley Park. It was November 1967 before The Hatters paid their first visit to Eastville for a Third Division fixture. We played against each other for three seasons, until County were relegated to the Fourth Division in May 1970.

It was 1993/94 before we met in the league again. We had been relegated to the Second Division, while Stockport were already playing at that level. They provided the opposition for our first ever league game at the Memorial Stadium, a match that ended 1-1, at the start of the 1996/97 campaign, and were promoted to the First Division at the end of that season.

It was to be 2005/06 before our paths crossed again, and we have already played each other twice this season, the last occasion being at the Memorial Stadium in March of this year. Currently sitting in the final play off spot, they will be hoping to gain promotion this season.

Cup competitions have seen us play each other just twice. A Second Round FA Cup game in December 1930, at Eastville, saw us run out 4-2 winners, while 19,000 fans saw County gain their revenge in January 1965 when they won a Third Round replay 3-2, after a 0-0 draw at Eastville. That replay saw a simple single sheet programme issued.

I very much hope that this won't be our last home game of the season but, if the worst happens, then see you all in August.

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


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write this article before our match with Macclesfield on Tuesday so it could be that today's encounter with Swindon still affords us the opportunity to creep into a top seven position on the final whistle depending on the result at Stockport where the hosts entertain Bury.

It may yet go down to the wire with the outcome of our visit to Hartlepool proving crucial. However we faired at Macclesfield in mid-week there is no doubting that our task would have been made a little easier if we had managed to claim all three points against Lincoln last week. For a view from the Lincoln perspective I paid a visit to the official Lincoln City website to read the report by John Vickers. He had this to say:

For the third successive season, the Imps and Bristol Rovers drew 0-0 at the Memorial Stadium, although City can count themselves unlucky not to have emerged with a maximum haul, having hit the woodwork on no less than four occasions. City had the better of the chances in a game that was played mainly in the middle third of the field, with the four efforts against the woodwork being the main talking point at the final whistle.

Paul Mayo with a thunderbolt of a shot from 30 yards was the first to rattle the frame whilst a second effort in the opening period from Junior Mendes saw him follow suit. Scott Kerr and substitute Lee Frecklington got into the act in the second period whilst a poor late backpass from Sammy Igoe let in Jamie Forrester only for the former Bristol Rovers man to be dragged wide of the target by 'keeper Steve Phillips."

At the other end, City's defence stood firm with the centre-back pairing of Paul Morgan and Paul Mayo superb in front of Alan Marriott, who equalled the Club's Football League 'clean sheet' record with his 97th shut out in Imps' colours.

The game was just 30 seconds old

when the first half chance came along, with Jeff Hughes and Paul Green linking up well down the left before the former's ball into the box was hooked across the face of the goal by Jamie Forrester, who counts Rovers amongst his former clubs.

City continued to press during the opening stages with Forrester curling an effort over the bar in the sixth minute after he cut in from the left whilst Rovers' first foray forward, five minutes later, saw Stuart Campbell go down under Green's challenge but referee McDermid waved play-on.

Chances were at a premium and it took until the 20th minute before the first corner of the game came along. This flag-kick immediately led to another on the opposite side and when this was played back in, Haldane blazed well over from 20 yards. The spell of pressure from the home side continued with Joe Jacobson firing wide whilst Morgan was forced to clear a dangerous Ryan Green centre behind for another corner.

At the other end a well-worked free-kick from the Imps, given for a push on Mendes who had switched to the left, ended up with Paul Mayo blasting in a thunderbolt from fully 30 yards only for the ball to crash into the upright before bouncing to safety. Rovers' quick response saw Richard Walker see his net-bound drive from 15 yards go straight at Alan Marriott whilst a 42nd minute free-kick led to the hosts' seventh corner of the game. After this was half-cleared, Marriott did well to save low to his right from Walker.

Passing move involving a number of players ended with Mendes and Stallard exchanging passes before Mendes saw his low shot, which was slightly mis-hit, clip the outside of the post before going behind for a goal kick.

Despite further efforts from both sides half time arrived with no clear cut chances being created.

With neither side making any changes during the break, it was as you were as the home side got the second period underway and they were the first to press following the restart with Alan Marriott at full stretch to claim a low drive from Ryan Green less than a minute in.

If the opening quarter of an hour of the second half followed on in a similar fashion to the opening stages of the game in that it was a relatively quiet affair in terms of attempts at goal but that changed in the 63rd minute when a clever pass from Stallard saw him release Mendes on the left. Mendes cut inside before laying the ball into the path of the advancing Scott Kerr who was then left holding his head in his hands as his low shot came back off the woodwork before being hacked behind for a corner.

Sean Rigg replaced Joe Jacobson for the hosts as the clock showed 77 minutes played and two minutes later the Imps came within inches of breaking the deadlock again when they rattled the woodwork for a fourth time; substitute Frecklington the man coming close on this occasion, with his crisp right-footed drive from just inside the box crashing into the post.

Shortly afterwards, Nicky Eaden saw yellow for a foul on Chris Carruthers and as the clock continued to tick on, a clash of heads between Rovers' Steve Elliott and Byron Anthony saw the former receive treatment off the pitch.

With Elliott off, Forrester was gifted the ball from a poor backpass from Igoe but, after being dragged wide of the target by keeper Steve Phillips, his eventual drag back to Hughes saw the ball run in Bristol's favour and they were able to clear their lines.

At the other end some great defending by Mayo saw him clear a low Rigg centre behind for a corner whilst some more sturdy defending saw City's back line block a couple of shots from the edge of the box as the hosts looked for a late goal. The last half-chance saw Rigg blaze well over but in the end City were forced to settle for a share of the spoils. Saying that, the point could prove to be a valuable one as the Imps look to book a play-off place for a fifth successive season.

So we had to settle for a point apiece, probably a fair result, but one that would have been more useful to Lincoln than ourselves. If a win today keeps us in with a shout then a packed stadium getting behind the lads could make all the difference. Lets cheer the Gas on to three points!





# football obituary

Stephen Byrne

## TOMMY CAVANAGH

Though much better known today as the assistant manager and coach at Manchester United, where he served under Tommy Docherty, and Newcastle United, Tommy Cavanagh, who died in Driffield on Thursday 15th March 2007, aged seventy-eight, was also a widely-respected lower-league wing-half through the 1950's.

He leaves a widow. Doris, three

daughters, Leslie, Deb and Christine, and two sons, Tom and Robert. Tommy Cavanagh played in five League matches against Rovers, three for Doncaster Rovers and two in the colours of Bristol City. His three such games for Donny all ended in a Rovers victory, the Boxing Day game at Eastville in 1956 ending 6-1 in Rovers' favour, Dai Ward scoring a hat-trick, whilst both Bristol sides won one game apiece in the 1959/60 season.

Thomas Cavanagh, born in Liverpool on 29th June 1928, joined Preston North End as a wing-half in August 1949 and, unable to make a First Division breakthrough, left for Third Division (North) Stockport County in January 1950. The following month he made his debut in a 1-0 win at home to Hartlepool and he scored twice, goals at Darlington and at Workington, in his 32 League appearances for Stockport. In May 1952 he moved to Huddersfield Town in time for their 1952/53 promotion season to

Division One. Though he missed the FA Cup-tie against Rovers in January 1953, Cavanagh scored a hat-trick in the same calendar month, as his side won 4-2 at Barnsley. After 93 League matches and 29 goals, the relegation campaign of 1955/56 prompted a May 1956 transfer to Doncaster Rovers, where he was appointed captain. An ever-present in 1956/57, his side was relegated to the newly-created Division Three in the spring of 1958 and he played in 119 League fixtures for Doncaster, scoring sixteen times.

July 1959 saw a move to Bristol City, his 24 League games and six goals not proving enough to prevent relegation from Division Two and, in June 1960, he joined Carlisle United. 34 game and four goals followed, Cavanagh's farewell appearance, prior to thirteen years at Old Trafford, being at Accrington Stanley in a Fourth Division game in March 1961.

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# Regrets, I've had a few, but then again, too few to mention!

eturning to his first club, as Community Officer, was like coming home for Peter.

I've never lost my love and affection for this football club, no matter where I've been. My first taste of what I call real football was with Bristol Rovers, when I was 12 years of age, and I played first team football for the club in eight consecutive seasons.

I was never the kind of player who wanted to move every three years or so simply to get more money. My philosophy has always been that I would like to take something, build it, and make it better and stronger until I could do no more.

#That's still my feeling now, with the club as it is today. It's a difficult time for everyone and we are all wondering if we are going to turn the corner. I've always said that whoever comes in and turns this club around will be revered by everyone and I still believe that to be the case.

We have been languishing in this division now for six years and I don't think we can afford to spend too much longer at this level and we need more than just a new stadium for things to change.

I think the greatest effect on any football club is the team and Paul Trollope is a young man in his early days as a manager and learning as he goes, but if he could lead the team out of this division it would be marvellous.

'I really do hope that something will change, somewhere along the line, because I think there is a terrific passion for this football club in Bristol and I would love us to turn the corner. I don't think we realise how much support there is out there. These days, though, people are very careful how they spend their money and when they spend it they want some kind of reward for it. So, if they are going to spend their money to come and watch Rovers, they want to know it's going to be good.

Maybe, if things had worked out

differently, we could be talking about Peter Aitken the coach or the manager.

I was very keen on going into coaching or management in the latter part of my career but when I finished playing, a lot of people I knew drifted out of the game as well. In football, it's often a case of who you know if you want to get a job, it's a very close knit community.

There's always Golf in the Community!

As it was. I was out of the game for three or four years and things moved on. I had a young family and didn't want to move around the country, something you always have to be prepared to do. so I just got on with family life and I accepted that I wasn't going to go into management or coaching. I'd been through the experience of being at a club that almost went out of business and that had changed my outlook on life, in that I wanted to know what I was going to be doing and not face an uncertain future.

He currently gets a great deal of job

satisfaction from his role as Community Officer.

I love my work. It's the tough end of the club, in that I have to generate income, keep the interest amongst the youngsters and motivate them. We want these young people in the club and for them to take an interest in the club from a young age, and hopefully that will stay with them for the rest of their

life.

#I'm sure there will come a stage when I feel that I can't do the job any more, and that someone with new ideas and a fresh approach is needed. but that time hasn't come for me yet. I'll know when it has, though, and I'll be the first to say I've had enough. After that, I don't really know what I'll do. I always wanted to be involved in football and have been fortunate to do that. This job takes up a great deal of my time, but I've learned so many skills that I didn't have before and the job has changed dramatically since I was first appointed. I do feel that it takes a special person to deal with young people, on a regular basis, and to be able to work with them you have to understand them. Football in the Community has encouraged many young people to come to football and has an important role to play in the

Whilst there are many fond memories of his time in the game, there are also some regrets.

I regret that I never played for Bristol Rovers in the First Division. There was a time when I thought we had enough, in terms of talent, to do it and maybe if there had been a little bit more investment in the team we might have made it. To have helped the club into the top flight would have been something else, but it didn't happen.

On a personal level, I was disappointed that I didn't play a lot more games than I did. Perhaps if I'd stayed with Rovers I might have played many more games, who knows? In spite of that, though, I have enjoyed, and continue to enjoy, my life in football.
