

THERE'S ONLY ONE WAY TO START AND THAT S BY WISHING EVERYONE A HAPPY CHRISTMAS'

A warm Christmas welcome to everyone here for this Boxing Day game against Swindon

There really is only way I can start these notes and that's by wishing you all a very merry Christmas and a happy New Year.

Because of the earlier-than-normal print deadlines due to the holiday period, I have had to put these notes together a little earlier than usual and so, I thought it would be an ideal opportunity to reflect on the season so

Looking at our first 20 League games, you have to say that, overall, it was disappointing. You all know by now that I like to break the season up into blocks of five matches and the statistics make stark reading.

We started off well enough when we picked up eight points from the first five games, but then we went into

Our second set of five matches earned us just one point, and we followed up by taking just four more from the next five-match sequence.

BOUNCED BACK

We bounced back and took eight points from the last set of five and I think that sort of inconsistency encapsulates our season to date.

The first and last block of matches, where we took eight points, is normally regarded as a good enough points return to make the play-offs, but the second and third blocks were massively disappointing and were relegation form, pure and simple.

It's that inconsistency that has been such a big problem and we must find a solution to it if we are going to continue our year-on-year progress.

As a manager, it's a major frustration that we can produce the form needed to make the play-offs for a spell, but then we go to the other extreme and produce a sequence of results that would end with us being relegated!

Realistically, I believe we're somewhere between the two and know that we have the players here who are good enough to avoid being dragged into the relegation mire.

But, make no mistake, there can be no hiding from the fact that we're in a relegation dogfight at the moment and we need to put together another good run to try and get into the middle eight.

Quite simply, we should be doing better than we currently are and, hopefully, in the second half of the season, we can start to climb the table.

STUMBLING BLOCKS

One of the stumbling blocks so far this season has been a lack of goals. If you look at the goals against column, at the time of writing, we have conceded fewer goals than anyone in the bottom half and I'm quite happy with that.

Unfortunately, we need to improve upon our goal tally and that's something we will be working hard on during the second half of the season and with the January transfer window opening soon, we will assess what options are open to us.

Finally, I'd like to finish back where I started, by wishing everyone a happy Christmas. Our supporters have been excellent throughout the difficult times this season and I would ask you all to stick with us and really get behind the lads as we look towards a successful 2009.

Question: The transfer window opens soon. As a manager do you like the system?

ML: "If I'm honest, I would have to say that I don't really like the window and I don't think it's a good thing for lower league clubs.

"I don't really see a need for it when you run off such a small squad like we do here at Orient.

"Of course, we can still take advantage of the loan system to help paper over the cracks between the windows, and that's all it really does. So far this season I have already brought in six players on loan, four fowards and two central defenders and if there was no transfer window, I'm sure we would not have needed to bring in so many players.

"Rather than bringing in four forwards to cover the gaps, it would have been more beneficial to try and sign a striker on a

permanent basis and cure the problem once and for all.

"When you bring in so many loan players it doesn't allow you the opportunity of having a settled squad. We have used six already and if we use as many again in the second half of the season, it will mean would have had a total of 12 and it shakes the squad up.

"Overall, I believe it's not a good system and I don't know why it was introduced for clubs at our level."

The first half of the season has left us in a disappointing League position, but we showed towards the end of the year that we are capable of pushing up the table and everyone is focused on making that happen over the next few months.

The club launched our Adopt a Player scheme ahead of the recent game against Cheltenham. The players visited local schools in the week before the game, with pupils then coming to the match against the Robins.

We've had some very positive feedback and I know both the schools and the players are looking forward to making return visits in the New Year.

We need to encourage the next generation of 0's fans and I believe this is an exciting way of doing this.

Please get behind the lads today and help them end 2008 on a high.

SWINDON TOWN will arrive here today with a new manager at the helm.

Following the departure of boss Maurice Malpas, the longrunning saga to find a replacement had not been resolved by the time the programme went to press because of early Christmas printing schedules, but Swindon were expected to unveil their man before last Saturday's League One clash with Yeovil.

If that happened, then the new man will be in charge for this afternoon's encounter and it's a game that both sides need to win to ease their relegation worries.

Before last weekend's game with Yeovil, the Robins had gone nine matches in all competitions without a win, and that had seen them slip down the League One table.

DISAPPOINTING

All in all, it's been a disappointing season so far for Swindon, who kicked off the campaign full of optimism with a 3-1 home success against Tranmere Rovers.

However, the Robins lost their next three games, as they went out of the Carling Cup 3-2 at home to Queens Park Rangers before suffering successive League One defeats against Cheltenham Town and Colchester.

Swindon bounced back with a win against MK Dons at the end of August and September started well enough for Malpas, as his side beat Aldershot Town in the Johnstone's Paint Trophy after a penalty shoot-out.

But, that was their only win of the month as they picked up just

two points from their next four games as they drew at Hereford United, lost at home to Leeds, drew at Stockport County and then suffered another home reverse, at the hands of Millwall.

DROPPED

That result dropped Swindon down into 17th position and October did not start too brightly either for the Robins, as they drew at Hartlepool and then suffered their fifth successive home reverse, going down 3-1 to Huddersfield Town. That was followed by a defeat at Southend, which dropped them down to 20th.

They did manage a Johnstone's Paint Trophy win at Hereford, and it looked as if they had started to turn the corner. They ended their dismal home record with a 2-1 win against Northampton, and followed it up with another County Ground success against Oldham.

Swindon then drew at Scunthorpe to climb into 17th position, but then the Robins crashed out of the FA Cup at non-league Histon before bowing out of the Johnstone's Paint Trophy at Brighton a few days later - and that signalled the end of Malpas, as Swindon parted company with the manager on Friday November 14.

Assistant David Byrne took charge for the game against Leicester, which Swindon drew 2-2, the first of three identical results as they took points against Bristol Rovers (away) and Peterborough at home.

But a 2-1 defeat at Walsall, a 1-1 draw with Carlisle and a 1-0 reverse at Crewe left them still seeking their first success under Byrne as the search for a successor to Malpas dragged on.

PHIL SMITH

Harrow-born goalkeeper Phil Smith was a July 2006 signing from Blue Square Premier side Crawley Town. He began his career with Millwall. but was released in 2001 and dropped into nonleague. Stints with Folkestone Invicta, Dover Athletic, Margate and Crawley followed before Swindon took him back into the League.

IACK SMITH

Born: 14,10,1983 08/09 apps: 25 Goals: 3



Versatile defender Jack Smith is in his fourth season as a Swindon Town player following his July 2005 transfer from Watford. Jack has featured at right back, left back and in midfield for the Robins and he has been a regular fixture in their side, playing 135 games since arriving.

Swindon-born midfielder Michael Pook came through the ranks at the County Ground to make his first team debut at Boston United in September 2003. He has made a steady progression with the Robins and played his part in the 2006/07 promotion season. He now has over 100 senior appearances to his name.

LEE PEACOCK

Experienced midfielder Lee Peacock signed for Swindon on a free transfer from Sheffield Wednesday in January 2006. Made his name as a striker at Carlisle, Mansfield, Manchester City and Bristol City and has scored 119 career League goals, but now operates in a deeper, midfield role.

ANTHONY MCNAMEE

Born: 13.07.1984 08/09 apps: 23 Goals: 0



Anthony made the move west from Watford for an undisclosed fee in January 2008. A quick, tricky winger, Anthony helped the Hornets to promotion to the Premier League in 2006 but fell down the pecking order at Vicarage Road and signed for Swindon, where he has scored twice in 42 appearances.

CRAIG **EASTON**

Born: 26.02.1979 08/09 apps: 17 Goals: 2



29-year-old Scotsman Craig makes his second return to Brisbane Road this afternoon following his 2007 transfer from the O's to Swindon. A member of Orient's 2005/06 promotion side, the former Dundee United and Livingston man made 81 appearances for the O's before deciding to head to the County Ground.

PATRICK KANYUKA

Born: 19.07.1987 08/09 apps: 8 Goals: 1



Former O's trainee Pat Kanyuka signed for Swindon Town on a free transfer in January 2008 following his release by Queens Park Rangers. The Congolese defender played 12 Championship games for the R's before joining Swindon, but niggling injuries disrupted his first season in Wiltshire.

Slovakian goalkeeper Peter Brezovan has been with the club since making a summer 2006 move from Czech side FC Brno. Standing 6'7" tall, Peter is an imposing figure between the posts and has made seven League appearances this term. 17-year-old stopper Mark Scott provides further backup for the number one position.

In defence, Jamie Vincent once cost Portsmouth a £800,000 transfer fee when signing from Huddersfield Town. The 33-year-old joined Swindon in the summer of 2006 and has played 66 League games for the club, but has been hampered by injury this term. Former Bristol City and Yeovil man Kevin Amankwaah signed for Swindon in June 2008 from Swansea City and he gives the Robins another defensive option, as does youngster Sean Morrison, who has already made 11 League appearances at the age of 17. Kasali Casal came to Swindon on a two-year deal from Dutch side Cambuur before the start of this season.

Veteran midfielder Lilian Nalis was another close season arrival as he made the switch from Plymouth. A 37-year-old Frenchman, Nalis has played for the likes of Bastia, Chievo Verona, Leicester and Sheffield United. Mark Marshall, 22, left non-league Eastleigh to sign for Swindon in the summer of 2008, while Chris Allen made eight first team appearances last term. 19-year-old striker Ben Joyce completes the Robins squad.

DAVID BYRNE

Born: 05.06.1961

Appointed: Caretaker manager

Hammersmith-born David Byrne took over the role of caretaker manager at Swindon Town in November after Maurice Malpas left the club.

A winger who began his career with Gillingham, David also played for Millwall, Plymouth Argyle and Watford before moving north of the border with St Johnstone. Spells with Partick Thistle, St Mirren, Ayr United and Albion Rovers followed before he moved into coaching.

Byme coached the Plymouth Argyle youth team for a stage and was later appointed Director of Football at Plymouth College of Further Education. He left this post in 2006 to become youth team manager at Swindon Town, moving up to assistant manager when Maurice Malpas took up the reigns.

Malpas departed on November 14 2008, with Byrne taking over first team duties on a temporary



OPPOSITEVIEW...



THIS afternoon's crunch Boxing Day match between Swindon and the O's will carry special significance for Robins midfielder Craig Easton.

The 29-year-old Scotsman moved south of the border to join the O's from Livingston in 2005 and helped Martin Ling's men win promotion from League One in his first season in English football.

Easton also played a key role as Orient kept their place in the higher division but opted to leave for Wiltshire at the end of that campaign.

Bellshill-born Easton has played 18 games for Swindon this term and he is determined to help them start to move away from the relegation zone with three points at Brisbane Road this afternoon.

We caught up with the former O's man earlier this week.

Last week's defeat to Yeovil left Swindon just above the relegation zone - how important is today's game for both teams?

It's a massive one really. We've been disappointed with how this season has gone so far and we need to climb away from the position we're in. After last year, finishing mid table in our first season back in League One, we really felt we could kick on, but we started the season poorly and haven't got going. The division is so tight that a couple of wins would lift you up into mid-table, but we need to do that sooner rather than later and it would be great if we could get a run going by picking up a result today.

This will be your second return to Brisbane Road since your move to Swindon, are you looking forward to it?

Yes, you always look forward to going back to your old clubs and today will be no different. I have very fond memories of my time at Orient and it will go down as a special time in my career.

We won promotion in my first season, had that FA Cup run and then stayed up in League One and I made many friends at the club, so it will be good to go back and see them too.

Swindon have been without a permanent manager since Maurice Malpas left the club in November - has the fact it's taken so long to find a replacement been a hindrance?

I don't think it has helped, but we can't use that as an excuse for the reason we've gone a while without a win. It's always an uncertain time when a club is looking for a manager, but, as players, we've all got jobs to do and the results show we haven't done that well enough.

What sort of test are you expecting from the 0's?

A tough one. Martin Ling and Dean Smith will have them well organised and playing good football and they've been on a good run recently, except for the defeat to Cheltenham. So I'm sure they will have a bit of confidence behind them and it is a big game because they're in the same position as us.

Both teams would have expected better from this season and will be hoping for better in the New Year, and if we perform to our best I'm sure we can go home with a result today.

Will you be speaking to any of the O's players before the game?



WE DON T WANT TO BE WHERE WE ARE NOW AT THE END OF THE SEASON'

WELCOME back to Brisbane Road for today's game against Swindon Town. On behalf of all the players, I'd like to take this opportunity of wishing all our supporters a very merry Christmas and a happy New Year.

It's a busy time with the games coming thick and fast, so it seems the perfect time to look back at the season to date and see where it will take us in the New Year.

I suppose the one thing that hits you is that we have struggled to find any sort of consistency so far and have been very much up and down.

We started well enough, then had an awful run going 10 games without a win, before we bounced back and went seven unbeaten before the recent defeat by Cheltenham Town.

Looking at the League table, there are a lot of teams in a similar position to us and apart from the sides at the top, everyone else is in the same boat.

I think we have learned a little more about ourselves this season. During our disappointing run, we knew what was going wrong and did our best to sort it out. We didn't shirk away from the challenge as we tried to put it right.

STRUGGLING

Sometimes, when you are struggling, you don't get the rub of the green, things go against you, and our confidence was really put to the test.

But we showed a lot of character to turn things around. It's strange how things go, there were times during our poor run when we were playing better than we had done at the start of the season, but we just weren't picking up the results.

If you're looking for some high spots for the first half of the season, it has to be the recent seven-match unbeaten run.

At Crewe we showed what we were about and there were spells when the home side didn't really get a kick as we were so much in control.

Then, at Huddersfield, we showed the other side of the game, when we had a couple of chances, put one of them away and then put our bodies on the line to protect our lead. They were two very different types of performances.

UPSETTING

As for disappointments, I wish we had a better home record, having only won twice here this season is upsetting, even though we have played most of the top teams.

Although, it seems to be something of a trend at the moment. I'm not comparing us with Liverpool or Chelsea, but they have had problems winning at home this season too.

We have picked up more points away from home and it's something that a lot of sides have experienced.

If I had to pick out one side that impressed me in the first half of the campaign, it would be Peterborough United.

Everything they did when we played them was good. They looked sharp and really taught us a lesson that we won't forget.

They have come into the league this season and are really buzzing. They were the better team on the day when we played them and I would expect them to do well.

CURRENT

Looking ahead, we're not comfortable in our current league position and the rule of thought is that we will be trying to climb as high as we can during the New Year and aim to embark on a similar run to the one we started in November.

We certainly don't want to be where we are now at the end of the season, so the aim is to dig in and go for it.

SP: "It's something you get used to and it's a price well worth paying as a professional footballer.


"I have been at some clubs

ONE man looking forward to this afternoon's meeting with Swindon Town more than most is O's striker Sam Parkin.

The 27-year-old forward, who is on loan at Brisbane Road from Luton Town, enjoyed a hugely successful spell at the County Ground between 2002 and 2005, scoring 73 goals in 142 games

Parkin's goals helped fire the Robins to the League One play-

offs in the 2003/04 season and he is relishing the chance to line up against his old employers.

"It's always nice to play against one of your former teams," he said. "There's been a complete turnaround at that club since I was there, and barring a couple of the young players that have come through, I don't know any of the lads there anymore.

goalscoring time of my career, and it was the most enjoyable time for me as well.

"I had a wonderful three years and I'll always look back at that time with fond memories. I made a lot of friends in the area and at the club, and I stay in touch with the majority of the players that I played with during that spell."

That 2003/04 play-off campaign was ultimately to end with a semi-final penalty shootout defeat to Brighton & Hove Albion, but Parkin believes Swindon were unlucky to miss out on promotion and he would love to make up for that at the O's.

He continued: "I'm sure the playing budget is pretty similar at Swindon as it is at Orient, and we had some success during the time I was there.

"We relied heavily on getting loan players from the Premier League clubs and players who didn't quite make it at the top level – someone like myself who started at a big club and had to go down the footballing ladder to earn their right as a professional footballer.

"That's what we did at Swindon – free transfers and loanees and we built a team that I thought was good enough to get us into the Championship. We were unfortunate to lose in the play-offs in 2004.

"There's no reason why something like that can't happen at Orient.

"It'll be tough for us to get up there this season, but certainly a club like this, with their structure, can build a good enough squad to challenge."

Parkin's goals for the Robins earned a move to the Championship with Ipswich Town in 2005, but just as his career looked set for the top, injury struck.

A similarly frustrating time with Luton followed, but having regained his fitness with the Kenilworth Road club last season, he feels ready to kick on again now.

He said: "I had a bad injury at that, thankfully, we managed to put an end to at the start of last season. It was an ankle injury that went on and on – I had to have various surgery carried out on it and there were times when there was a question mark over whether I'd play again.

"Thankfully, I've managed to get back to a place now where I have to have a little bit of treatment and the odd bit of specialist training, but I feel really fit and good again.

BIGINTERVIEW...

"I'm keen to make up for lost time. Up until the age of 24 I hadn't had any injuries at all – people forget that and think I've been injured all my career, but I played 200 games before I had any kind of injury.

"It's nice to be back playing again and hopefully I'll be able to be involved in near on 40 games this season."

Orient's last home outing ended with a disappointing 2-1 loss to struggling Cheltenham Town and Parkin is determined to put that right against Swindon today.

"It was frustrating to lose to Cheltenham in our last home game," he said. "The conditions were awful – it was really, really wet and the ball was getting held up, but we still had enough chances to win two or three games.

"We had something like 20 attempts on goal and they had two or three. It was a game we should have won, but we didn't and it's important that we bounce back over the next couple of matches.

"We can't get too disheartened because we've been on a good run and sometimes football has a habit of kicking you in the teeth like that.


"The Cheltenham game did feel like a

missed opportunity because we'd won games that were more difficult on paper in recent weeks. The four away wins at Crewe, Huddersfield, Colchester and Bradford were huge for us and the Cheltenham one was a really winnable game for us.

"We could have given ourselves a little bit of breathing space over the teams at the bottom, but unfortunately it wasn't to be and we have to make up for that with a good points return over Christmas.

"It's a good squad we have here. I don't think there are many better at this level and we showed the ability we have in the recent good run. Hopefully Cheltenham was a little blip and we can continue with the good form that we've shown since I came into the club.

"Christmas is always an important time of the season. It's not as congested this year as in the past, but today's game is followed quickly by Colchester and if we could get a positive result at Oldham and take six or seven points from that time



we'd be absolutely delighted."


Parkin's loan is set to expire after the January 10 trip to Leicester City, but he is keen to make the transfer to Brisbane Road a permanent one and he knows breaking his goal duck would help with that.

"I am hopeful of extending my stay here," he said. "The last thing I want to be doing is to have my career up in the air in January and looking for new employers.

"It would be nice to get something sorted at Orient. I've enjoyed it and I've been happy with my form, even if I would have liked to add a few goals to that. The lads have been on a good run, I feel at home here and I'd be keen to stay longer.

"It's always a concern as a striker when you're not scoring goals. This is probably the longest I've been throughout my career without one – all forwards go through that at some point in their careers and unfortunately I'm going through that now.

"If that goal at Crewe had stood earlier in the run, who's to say what would have happened by now? I need to get one to start the ball rolling, but as long as we're picking up wins that's the most important thing."

NOW back at the O's in the important role of Youth team coach, KEVIN NUGENT first joined the O's on YTS forms before signing professional terms back in 1987 and scored on his League debut against Scarborough that year.



He spent five years with the club before playing for Plymouth Argyle, Bristol City and Cardiff City with whom he gained promotion to Division Two. He rejoined Orient on a free transfer in January 2002 along with Matthew Brazier but a year later, he went back to Wales to play for

Swansea City where he finished his playing career before returning to his roots here at Brisbane Road in June 2007 to take charge of the youth team. Kevin now selects his best team from players he played alongside during his career

"Peter Shilton is in goal, I was his first signing when he was appointed

player/manager with Plymouth Argyle. He put a really good side together and we were very unfortunate not to get promoted. We played attacking football that attracted good crowds - 17,000 or so would regularly turn up - and he was still at the top of his game. He offered the team a huge presence

as the last line of the defence and he was still a very influential keeper even though he was in the latter days of what was an outstanding playing career.

"Mark Delaney who I played with at Cardiff City is my choice for right-back. He came from a non-league side in Wales and the rate of his progression was quite fantastic. Within a week or so, he'd really caught everyone's attention particularly when we started to play our pre-season games. It wasn't long before you could see that he was going to progress to the topflight which he did do. He was one of the fittest players I've ever worked with, he

was a fantastic fellow and a really good professional and it was no surprise when he went on to do so well for Aston Villa. Dean Smith and Garry Monk are the two central defenders. I really noticed how good Dean was when playing against him, he was a really solid player and a thinking centre-half and he could adjust his game according to

whoever was playing alongside him. I believe he was a very under-rated defender. I played with Garry Monk at Swansea after he'd been released by Southampton but he's proved an outstanding defender - he was unfortunate because he got an injury but he's got himself fit and has come back to captain

Swansea at Championship level. He's a really good player who is still progressing and although I played alongside him a little bit, I also spent time with him as a coach and he was a joy to work with. He's decent on the ball but he loves defending and like Smudge, had more in his locker than just defending.

"Left back is Darren Barnard who was in the side I played with at Bristol City. He had previously been with Chelsea and City paid a lot of money for him but it was money well spent. He was one of the most talented players I played alongside. He had a superb ability to run with the ball down the flank and overlap with Brian Tinnion and he could also deliver a wonderful free-kick and also came up with a few goals from set-pieces and longrange volleys. Darren eventually went on to play for Barnsley when they went into the Premiership.

"On the right of midfield is Leon Britton who is a dynamo and never stops working. He initially joined Swansea on loan from West Ham but he made such an impression that they signed him on a permanent deal a few months later. Although small in stature, he boasts great work rate with superb attacking qualities, is a good creator and has the ability to pop up with goals.

"The two players I've selected in centre midfield are Steve Castle and Richard Carpenter. Orient fans are aware of just how good Stevie was as a player, I played with Richard Carpenter at Cardiff and he was a good solid player, knew the game inside out, led in the middle of the park and was totally reliable. He and the bighearted Stevie would make a good pair

with Chippie (Carpenter), as he was known, sitting in whilst Stevie would get forward a lot and also pop up with so many goals. Often, when you think a game was going to be 0-0 or you may be a goal down, Stevie would get forward and attack the ball in the box and save the game for you. He was probably the bravest player I've ever known for attacking the ball in the box, he'd put his head in without fear. He'd regularly score around 20 goals a season from midfield which is a fabulous achievement and record. He was inspirational by example although you could say that about virtually everyone in this team.

"On the left side of midfield I've chosen Steve McCall who again I played with at Plymouth although his versatility meant that he was also an effective left back. He joined Plymouth from Sheffield Wednesday towards the end of the 1991/92 season and proved to be a terrific signing for the club .He had an

excellent left foot, was very influential and his level of consistency was superb, and he won the club's player of the season award two years in a row which shows how good he was.

"Shaun Goater and Lee Trundle are my two choices up front. I played with Shaun at Bristol City and Lee at Swansea and both of them loved to have me around because I took all the knocks and bruises and left them to score the goals! Shaun was an excellent striker, good technique and had a fantastic scoring record when we were at Bristol City before he was sold


onto Manchester City.

"Lee Trundle is a real crowd-pleaser thanks to his trickery and showboating skills but he is a superbly talented striker who scores goals on a regular basis and is always a problem for defenders.

"Obviously there are a lot of other talented players who I've left out that could have played in this team and performed well. Too many to mention really but I will choose one player from my time as a player with Orient who I really enjoyed playing alongside and that was Danny Carter. He was a great guy and a superb crosser of the ball and we seemed to complement each other well.

"I thoroughly enjoyed my playing career, I loved my time with Orient but I must admit that perhaps the most satisfying aspect in my playing career came at Swansea. When I joined them, it looked like they were going out of the Football League but by the end of the season, we'd managed to stay up and from thereon, the club's fortunes improved greatly. Wherever I played though, I loved the camaraderie amongst the players both training and on matchdays but now I'm dealing with the youngsters and that's a new venture for me and one that again, I'm relishing.

"To be able to work with young players at the start of their careers and help them develop and move onto another level is an exciting responsibility. Whilst results for the youth teams are important, the main thinking is to get players progressing from the side and challenging for a place in the first team squad and the players know that they will always been given every encouragement here at Orient to make first team level."







STEVE FINNEY


Finney joined the O's on a free transfer from Carlisle United on March 25 1999 as a replacement for Carl Griffiths, who had been transferred to Port Vale, but the 5'10" striker was never able to fill the goals void left by the O's crowd favourite.

Born in Hexham, he started his career as a trainee at Preston North End but it was at Swindon Town that he enjoyed his most productive spell, having made a real impact at the County Ground following his transfer from Deepdale in 1995 when scoring 16 goals in his first full season with the Robins.

Whilst with the Wiltshire club, he played in the side that featured Martin Ling and picked up a Division Two championship medal but injury struck to halt his career when he broke a leg at Burnley. He was unable to regain his previous goalscoring form and after a brief loan spell at Cambridge United, he returned to Swindon before moving onto Carlisle in July 1998.

Having scored six goals in 33 League games for the Cumbrians, he joined Orient and made his debut for the club against Southend United on April 4 1999 in a 3-0 defeat but was substituted in the following game with Exeter City and was left out of the squad before being recalled to the substitute's bench for three matches.

Unhappy at being denied starting opportunities and without a goal to his name, he was released by manager Tommy Taylor the following month and then joined Exeter City before moving quickly onto Gretna. He was later seen in action for Barrow and Chester City and then Altrincham.





The tall forward moved down south to link up with Orient on a three-month loan from Dundee but failed to last the course and returned to the Scottish club after just one month.

He started his career north of the border with Queens Park before moving onto Stirling Albion where he scored eight goals in 29 starts. After being loaned out to Arbroath, he then joined Dundee for £25,000 in December 1997 and played his part in helping the club win the First Division with five goals in six starts and nine sub appearances.

However, he didn't feature the following season and was again put on the loan trail joining Morton then Airdrieonians and then East Fife. He made his first appearance for the O's as a substitute in the 1-1 home draw with Mansfield Town on September 8 1998 and almost marked his debut with a goal only to be denied by a desperate save from the visiting keeper.

However, he only made three starting appearances, which included both legs of the Worthington Cup clash with Notts Forest, and two further substitute appearances before being released following the 2-1 defeat at Rochdale on September

Tony was a regular visitor to Brisbane Road until he moved from Harlow to Paignton in Devon in 1987. He was still a keen 0's fan and came to home matches when visiting Harlow, and cheered the lads on whenever they played in the West Country.

In recent years he kept up to date with all the O's news through Orient World on

He was an excellent footballer in his younger days, playing for a number of senior amateur teams including Harlow Town and Bishop's Stortford.

Tony leaves a wife, Annette, and two daughters, and will be sorely missed by all his family and many friends.

On this Day December 26

ORIENT have been involved in 75
Boxing Day fixtures starting with a
3-0 defeat at Bradford City in our
inaugural season as members of
the Football League back in 1905.
Since then, we have achieved 27
victories and 14 draws from the
subsequent games that have
produced 93 goals for the 0's
whilst 118 have been conceded.

Our best victory on this day came in 2005 when we beat Rushden & Diamonds 5-1 at Brisbane Road but we have also been on the wrong end of a number of heavy scorelines. We lost 6-2 at Reading in 1947, 4-0 at Liverpool in 1956 and 5-1 at Leicester City in 1962.

There have also been a number of highly entertaining contests involving the 0's on this festival date with a 4-2 defeat of Charlton Athletic in 1962 and 21 years later, the Millwall faithful were treated to a seven-goal thriller at Cold Blow Lane where the Lions recorded a 4-3 success.

Today's two teams have met twice on this corresponding day. The first occurred in 1929 when they played out a goalless draw at the County Ground and then in 1968 when Peter Allen notched the only goal of the game at Brisbane Road to the delight of the O's fans amongst the 7,101 attendance.

Unfortunately our recent record of results on this particular date has not been an outstanding success with just one win and a draw from the last seven matches.

1911

Bradford Park Avenue made the long trip down to Millfields Road but left empty-handed with goals from Bob Dalrymple giving the 0's a 2-0 revenge win for their 2-1 reverse at the hands of the same opponents just 24 hours earlier.

Writing his column in the Orient programme, the editor referred to the Christmas holiday schedule noting that the club had been given the task of three away matches amongst their four holiday fixtures.

"Away games at Barnsley, Bradford and Derby County and a Boxing Day home match with Bradford represents a tough fixture list and is hardly likely to yield a full crop of points," he wrote. "Yet no doubt, if we do not secure at least six points (only two points for a win in those days) we shall hear the usual confirmed croaker's voice propheysising the downgrade of the club. Anyway, the boys are out for eight points but if they get four from such a hot handful, we ought to be quite satisfied.

Orient had started the quartet of holiday games in sixth position in Division Two trailing leaders Burnley by just four points with two matches in hand on the Lancashire side but the Yuletide exchanges proved unrewarding.









In the event, the only points we achieved were from the Boxing Day match, suffering a 2-1 reverse at Barnsley and a 5-1 thrashing at Derby County to add to the setback at Bradford. However we were destined to complete the season in fourth place, our best campaign since entering the Football League. 1975

Chelsea travelled across London to provide the opposition at Brisbane Road and there was a competitive edge to the encounter as the 0's gained a 3-1 win in front of an attendance of 15,509.

Derek Possee gave us a half-time lead before additional goals from Peter Bennett and the exciting and emerging winger Laurie Cunningham sealed the points with the visitors, who included the likes of Peter Bonetti, Ray Wilkins, Ron Harris and Charlie Cooke, netting a consolation goal through Teddy Maybank.

It was the seventh successive time that the 0's had conceded a single goal in a match but the victory left manager George Petchey highly satisfied. "Our performances over Christmas, including the fine win against Chelsea, have given us a promising start to the second half of the season," he said. "It justifies the club's optimism for the new year and encouragingly, throughout the

League, the holiday period saw increased attendances and let us hope that this trend continues and the extra thousands who watched us and other clubs will keep coming and be rewarded with entertaining football." Keeper John Jackson was in magnificent form twice denying Bryan Robson and then Paul Brush to maintain his clean sheet whilst he and his defensive cohorts also dealt effectively with 19 corners.

Manager Jimmy Bloomfield commented that he felt each member of the defence deserved medals for their performances whilst Hammers boss John Lyall suggested that a team so difficult to beat as Orient must be reckoned to be in the promotion issue!

Not that our display exclusively concentrated on defence. The presence of four strikers in our line-up allowed us to take full advantage of the chances when they came with Joe Mayo on 18 minutes and John Chiedozie on 85

claiming the goals that ensured a particularly pleasing Christmas success.

However, Orient responded positively by completely dominating the remainder of the match against a side who had John Dempster sent off 20 minutes from time.

Orient had lost their previous two home matches by a single goal margin and the alarm bells were again sounding when Drewe Broughton slotted the ball past Glyn Garner and into the corner of the net.

But within four minutes,
Orient found themselves 2-1
ahead. John Mackie levelled
after latching onto a header
from Lee Steele and then
Steele put us in front from 12
yards. The home side
continued to dominate and
soon added a third goal after
a Wayne Carlisle corner that
Mackie nodded on for Steele
to fire home his second goal
of the game.

A rare attack by the Diamonds produced a fine save from Garner who was also involved when Dempster crashed into the Orient shot-stopper and was shown a red card by referee Ray Olivier.

Four minutes later, the 0's notched their fourth goal after Daryl McMahon set up Jabo Ibehre to net from close range. 

This afternoon's two clubs have met on 68 previous occasions including a number of cup clashes. The 0's, who have prevailed in 23 matches whilst 21 contests have been drawn, have netted 80 goals in contrast to the Robins 95 in total.

The first meeting was back in on January 14 1927 when the teams were paired in a Third Round FA Cup clash that saw Swindon progress with a 2-1 home win whilst the first League meetings occurred two seasons later when the O's recorded a 2-1 Christmas Day success before the teams returned to Wiltshire for a goalless encounter on Boxing Day.

The next seven matches between the two teams though provided a goal fest for the supporters as 39 goals were scored including a 5-1 victory for Swindon in 1930/31 and a 4-2 win for Orient the following season. A thumping 7-1 win was recorded at Lea Bridge on January 21 1933 with Wally Keen, Tormmy Mills and Charlie Fletcher all bagging a brace whilst Andy Thompson completed the rout for the home side.

The Robins heaviest victory is their 5-0 win in October 1963 and they also recorded another 5-1 success, this time back in November 1966. Having met in the Fourth Division in the 1985/86 season when Swindon took revenge for a 1-0 defeat at Brisbane Road on November 30 by gaining a 4-1 win at their County Ground home, that proved to be the final time the clubs were to face each other in League battle until last season.

They did not lose contact though, meeting up on five occasions in various cup competitions in those intervening years. Those provided Orient with just one victory when they progressed into the Second Round of the 1999/2000 League Cup competition on a 2-1 aggregate after winning 1-0 at Swindon.

A hat-trick from Ken Facey, after Ron Heckman had opened the scoring delighted the majority of the 14,173 fans as the O's retained their unbeaten home record by recording their sixth successive

home win of the season.

The previous week they had slumped to a 3-0 reverse at Newport County where Tommy Johnston had notched the hat-trick that was to ultimately persuade manager Alec Stock to lure the legendary centreforward to Brisbane Road some three months later.

Orient dictated from the start as the bottom of the table visitors, who had conceded 31 goals in 14 League matches with just nine goals for, struggled to contain a rampant outfit eager to wipe out the memory of the defeat in Wales that had caused them to drop to fourth place in Division Three (South) behind pacesetters Northampton Town. A clinical finish from Heckman broke the deadlock before Facey recorded the first hat-trick of his professional career to prove the influential force in a convincing and comfortable win for the O's who were destined to carry off the League title at the end of the season. Best of all though was striker-turned-midfielder Lee Peacock, who at 32 is actively thinking about retirement and has some even more unusual career paths up his sleeve.

Peacock spends so much time playing on the PS3 that he's hoping to turn the hobby into a career - as a tester of football games, ideally, given his expertise in both areas. If not, he quite fancies becoming a referee, via the FA's fast-track course.

THE SALE OF THE SA

THE expertise and experience of safety stewards, police, doctors and members of the St John Ambulance are vital ingredients in the safety management of the Matchroom Stadium. However, the successful implementation of this plan depends to a very large extent on the cooperation of you the spectator.

Please contact a steward if you have any worries over a matter of safety, concerns about the behaviour of other supporters or if you need help with ticketing or finding your way around the stadium. As Stadium Manager I would like to draw your attention to a number of key issues.

FIRST AID

There is a first aid room located under the Kitchen Court flats between the North and East Stands. These are manned by members of the St John Ambulance and Cater for most types of injury or illness. Should you require medical attention ask either the nearest steward or a member of 51 John who are located throughout the ground.

There is also a club doctor in the stadium for all fixtures and, for fixtures with crowds of over 5,000, the London Ambulance Service are also in attendance.

PERSISTENT STANDING

The Matchroom Stadium is an all-seater stadium and standing during matches or other events is not permitted. Spectators should remain seated at all times and not obstruct the view of others.

LOST PROPERTY

Stewards will ensure that any lost property is taken to a secure storage location. If you wish to claim property you believe to be lost in the stadium please ask the nearest steward or telephone the club on 0871 310 1881.

FACILITIES FOR DISABLED SUPPORTERS

Viewing areas for wheelchair users and dedicated toilet facilities are available throughout the ground. Disabled toilets are located on each concourse and all have emergency alarms.

The club provides a dedicated steward whose sole responsibility is the welfare of our disabled supporters and he visits all disabled areas regularly throughout the course of an event.

PROHIBITED ITEMS

Leyton Orient has a legal obligation to deny entry to the stadium to anyone carrying cans, bottles, glasses or containers of any description. Other prohibited items are clearly displayed at each turnstile block.

Spectators bringing such items will have them confiscated and these cannot be returned – they are given up as a condition of entry.

PLEASE DO NOT SMOKE

The Matchroom Stadium is a non-smoking venue. Spectators are requested not to smoke at any time in public areas and safety stewards are authorised to ask any person found smoking to leave the stadium.

LICENSED BARS/FOOD OUTLETS

There are many bars and food outlets open to the public here at the Matchroom Stadium.

For these outlets to operate safely and effectively it is critical that all persons making use of them move away from the bar and counter area immediately after purchases have been made.

Supporters are reminded that it is a criminal offence to consume alcohol within sight of the pitch and any supporter attempting to carry alcohol into the stands faces possible ejection and arrest.

EMERGENCY EVACUATION

In the event of an emergency within the stadium which requires there to be any form of evacuation, a tannoy announcement preceded by an audible tone will be made.

Supporters should then follow the instructions given to them by the safety stewards and, in the event of an evacuation, should make their way to the nearest exit gate.

PLAYING SURFACE

Supporters are reminded that at no time are they permitted to enter the field of play. Any supporter who encroaches onto the pitch will be ejected from the ground and arrested.
