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

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


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
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A Word from the Chairman

We have got ourselves into a very difficult position but we still have winnable games to get away from the relegation places. At a time like this everyone is trying to put the blame on to others, but we must stick together and see the season through.

A fair amount has been written in the News & Star about the possible resurrection of the old north and south divisions, to replace divisions one and two. I know our MD had suggested the subject be raised for discussion at the Football League, but his thoughts are personal and not a club decision. It makes sound financial sense to make a move in that direction, but I don't think the bigger clubs in Division Two would be in favour and also the clubs in the Midlands will not see away travel as a major expense.


Chris Howarth saw his surgeon on Tuesday. Hopefully, by now they will have changed the cast he was wearing for a much lighter air cast.


lan Harte has been running and has done



Danny Wilson was announced as the new Swindon Town Manager on 26 December 2008.

As a player Danny Wilson spent time with Bury, Chesterfield, Nottingham Forest, Brighton & Hove Albion, Luton Town, Sheffield Wednesday and Barnsley - making over 600 appearances during an established career. He won 24 caps for Northern Ireland, as well as winning the League Cup with both Luton Town (1988) and Sheffield Wednesday (1991) and has also achieved success in domestic and cup competitions as a manager.

His managerial career began with Barnsley in 1994 and his first season in charge saw the Tykes rise to sixth place in Division One and it wasn't long until Barnsley fans tasted success once again under Wilson 's tutelage. In 1996/97 the Wigan-born boss guided Barnsley to promotion to the Premier League as runners-up, the first time in the club's history that promotion to the top-flight had been achieved. Their first season amongst the nation's top teams saw Barnsley reach the FA Cup quarter-finals after defeating favourites Manchester United in the fifth round.

A return to Sheffield Wednesday, where Wilson had enjoyed a three-year stay as a player, came about in the summer of 1998. A 12th place finish was achieved in his first season and the following year he was named Manager of the Month in January 2000, a month which included a victory at White Hart Lane and a draw against Arsenal at Hillsborough.

Wilson took over the managerial reins at Division Two Bristol City in June 2000, with the likes of Robin Hulbert, Aaron Brown, Lee Peacock and Tony Thorpe in the squad that season. April 2003 saw Wilson guide the Robins to success in the Football League Trophy with current Town man Lee Peacock scoring the first goal in a two-nil win over his former club Carlisle United at The Millennium Stadium in front of over 50,000.

The next step for Wilson was to replace Stuart Murdoch as manager of MK Dons in December 2004 and he saved the side from relegation in his first season with the club before departing in May 2006.

Hartlepool United appointed Danny Wilson as their new boss in the summer of 2006 and it was a successful stay with the North East club. Starting the 2006/07 season in League Two, Wilson 's managerial credentials shone through as he guided the Pools to promotion at the first attempt - joining Walsall and Swindon in the promotion honours. Hartlepool were on a four-game unbeaten run at the time of his departure from the manager's role at Victoria Park in mid-December 2008.

Striker Simon Cox signed a permanent deal at The County Ground in January 2008 after enjoying successful loan spell with Swindon. Cox initially arrived in August 2007 on a long-term loan and made the most of his temporary stint, scoring 10 goals before his loan spell was up including a last minute penalty against Swansea City on New Years Day to secure a point.

The front man then returned to Reading and came off the bench in the FA Cup tie with Spurs at The Madejski Stadium. That proved to be his last of nine senior appearances for his hometown club. Cox had joined Reading at the age of nine and progressed up through the academy ranks before making his senior debut against Luton Town in the Carling Cup in September 2005.

Striker Billy Paynter signed for Swindon on Friday 31st August from Southend United. Paynter began his career at Port Vale and he initially moved on loan to Hull in November 2005 before signing permanently for an undisclosed six-figure fee less than two months later. Brian Horton handed Paynter his Port Vale debut in May 2001. At only 16 years and 294 days old, this made him the youngest Vale player for 20 years, and his debut goal in September 2002 made him their youngest scorer for 24 years.



AMANKWAAH

The first signing of the summer, Kevin Amankwaah signed for The Robins on a twoyear deal from Coca-Cola Championship side Swansea City. At 6'1 he added height to the backline although was kept out of the line-up in the opening games by Jack Smith. Amankwaah has now made the right-back slot his own after being reunited by his former boss at Bristol City, Danny Wilson. The defender scored his first goal in a Swindon shirt against Walsall and followed that up with a header against Cheltenham Town in March.





JACK SMITH

Town's number two for the last three seasons, Jack Smith signed from Watford in the summer of 2005. Due to the departure of Paul Robinson to West Bromwich Albion he was thrust into the first-team spotlight at Watford and coped admirably, registering two goals - the first of which a 'Goal of the Season' contender at Sheffield United in front of

the Sky Sports cameras. He made 38 league starts in his first season as a Swindon player - in a variety of positions including right back, left back and midfield. Smith scored his first goal for the club from the spot during the preseason tour to Ibiza in the summer of 2006 and followed that up by opening the scoring, also from the penalty spot, in the 2-1 win over MK Dons in September of the same year. He went on to enjoy a solid season at right-back as Town went on to win promotion from League Two. The defender started the 2007-08 in solid form, despite pressure from summer signing Miguel Comminges. However, a dislocated shoulder at Swansea City at the start of October halted his progress. Smith returned to action for the FA Cup win at Wycombe Wanderers in mid-November and forced his way back into the starting line-up and went on to make a further fifteen first team appearances. He also scored in the six nil win over Port Vale in April. Began the season as the first choice right back, fighting off competition from new summer signing Kevin Amankwaah. Scored against Oldham Athletic, Peterborough United. Leyton Orient and Stockport County. Amankwaah's resurgence has meant a bench spot for Smith in recent weeks.

JAMIE VINCENT

Began his career at Crystal Palace before switching to AFC Bournemouth, where impressive performances for The Cherries brought about a £500,000 switch to Huddersfield Town. It was a successful time at The McAlpine Stadium with the defender making over 60 appearances, games which drew the attentions of Portsmouth. An £800,000 move to Pompey followed in February 2001. After three years with the Fratton Park club, further

PHIL SMITH

Goalkeeper Phil Smith joined Swindon in July 2006 from Crawley Town and made his first start for the club in the Carling Cup defeat by Brentford in August 2006. Smith had made 74 starts for Crawley Town during a two-year stay, which followed a year's spell at Margate where he made 35 starts. A dependable customer, Smith was made to wait for his chance which came following an unfortunate injury to Peter Brezovan in October. The keeper had impressed enough to be handed a new two-year contract by Christmas and played a definitive part in the promotion campaign making a string of superb saves to earn his side numerous points. After being released by Millwall as a youngster, Smith spent time in non-league with Crawley and Margate. When Crawley went into administrations he signed for Swindon in the summer of 2006 under Dennis Wise and impressed during the promotion campaign after deputizing for the injured Peter 'Brez' Brezovan. He has been solid in goal ever since and picked up the PFA Fans Player of the Month for December 2006 which was presented on before the home game against Macclesfield Town. Smith was also rewarded for his efforts, with a two year extension, ensuring he had a future at the club. until 2009 at least. His heroics between the sticks for the '06-'07 didn't go unnoticed by the fans, who named him their Player of the Season in May 2007. Had made over 50 appearances for The Robins before the start of the 2008/09 season. Enjoyed regular spells in the side in September, November and December but after losing his place to Peter Brezovan in the New Year, has now returned to the starting line-up.



spells followed at Derby County and Yeovil Town before signing for Swindon under Dennis Wise in the summer of 2006. Under the management of Paul Sturrock, Vincent was given the Vice Captaincy and also skippered the side on a number of occasions. Vincent's solid performances in defence for the Robins secured his place in the first team last season. Played against Portsmouth in pre-season in July 2008, but missed the first half of the season with a knee injury. Returned to the fold against Walsall - which coincided

with a Swindon win - and has made a valuable contribution since then.

CRAIG EASTON

Craig Easton arrived at The County
Ground in June 2007 and added real
experience to the central midfield area.
The former Scotland Under 21
International joined up at The County
Ground with over 300 league appearances
under his belt and has made a significant
impression since signing for The Robins.
Easton, 28, started his career at Dundee

United where he came up through the ranks to make 162 league starts before departing in the summer of 2004. He then spent a year at Livingston before joining Leyton Orient in July 2005. In all he made 65 league starts in two seasons for Martin Ling's O's. Easton was handed his first chance to impress in the home Carling Cup clash with Charlton Athletic in August 2006 and made 40 league starts for Town last term, scoring six goals along the way including a brace in the 3-2 win over Huddersfield Town. The 2008/09 season has not been as productive, although the term has included Stockport County and Huddersfield Town.

immediate impression, saving two penalties on his debut at Hartlepool United in August of the same year. Brezovan's impressive performances saw him retain the number one spot until a broken arm against Grimsby Town in October 2006 brought his season to a shuddering halt. A long spell on the sidelines was frustrating - although Town moved to tie up a permanent switch in March 2007. 'Brez' returned to action at the start of the 2007/08 season although was made to wait for his chance with Phil Smith keeping him on the bench. Regained his place in the starting line-up at Port Vale in October and kept his place

in the side. A talented artist, 6'6 Brezovan began the new 2008/09 season in between the sticks and will hope for another successful season in England.

PATRICK KANYUKA

Physical centre back who joined Swindon Town in January 2008 following his release from Coca-Cola Championship side QPR. Started out with Leyton Orient as a youngster and after impressing against QPR in a friendly, joined the Loftus Road side on a permanent basis. He made his first appearance for QPR against Burnley in 2005 and went on to make 12 league appearances for The R's. Made an

JON-PAUL MCGOVERN

Jon-Paul McGovern joined Swindon Town on Friday 31st August 2007, just hours before the close of the transfer window, signing a contract until the close of the 2009/10 season. A lively winger who can operate out wide or through the middle, McGovern's arrival was a major boost to then boss Paul Sturrock who had been chasing the player for some time. The 26year old was a key cog in Sturrock's Sheffield Wednesday side which won promotion to the Coca-Cola Championship and made over 60 appearances for The Owls during two seasons at Hillsborough. McGovern began his career as a trainee at Celtic but after one season, he was released by the Scottish giants and subsequently signed for Livingston in July 2003 after a successful loan spell in England with Sheffield United. A promising season for 'Livi' saw Sheffield Wednesday come in for the midfielder who joined Paul Sturrock's squad in time for the start of the 2004/2005 season. He was an ever-present during the promotion winning campaign and scored the first goal at the Millennium Stadium to help secure promotion. The Glasgow-born midfielder was on the score sheet against Tranmere Rovers on the opening day of the new 2008/09 season, but has not featured since the away draw at Oldham at the end of January after injury.

PETER BREZOVAN

Slovakian goalkeeper who joined Swindon in the summer of 2006 on a year-long loan from FC Brno. The stopper made an



MICHAEL

Swindon Town manager Maurice Malpas dipped into the transfer market with the addition of Michael Timlin in May 2008. He started his Fulham career as a left-winger but was converted to central midfield by Fulham's then Academy Director, Steve Kean. The switch paid remarkable dividends for the player as he made rapid through the Academy's ranks and on to the international stage with the Republic of Ireland. Timlin initially arrived at Swindon on loan in November 2006 and went on to make 24 appearances as The Robins went on to win promotion from League Two. The midfielder returned to Swindon in March 2008 in a loan deal until the end of the season. He played ten league games, scoring once in the 6-0 home win over Port Vale in April. Following the permanent switch to Wiltshire, the Irishman has relocated from his London base to Swindon and began the season alongside Lilian Nalis in midfield. A regular throughout the season, 'Timms' has also worn the Captains armband on a number of occasions.

immediate impression in his first appearances in a Town shirt, winning the Man of the Match award after a 1-0 win at Luton Town at the end of January. However a series of niggling injuries meant he made only three further appearances for The Robins before the season was out. A summer of rehabilitation saw the defender impress in pre-season in Austria, with dominating displays against the likes of Fenerbahce where he came up against former Chelsea striker Mateka Kezman in a 1-1 draw. Kanyuka made his first League One appearance of the season in the 3-1 home defeat to Colchester United on Saturday 23rd August 2008. Has been utilised in central midfield by Town boss Danny Wilson in the second half of the campaign.

LILIAN NALIS

Swindon Town signed midfielder Lilian Nalis on a one-year deal at the end of July following his release from Plymouth Argyle at the end of the 2007/08 season. 36-year old Nalis has plenty of experience in the English game with spells at Leicester City, Sheffield United and The Pilgrims. A French midfielder, Nalis began his career in his home country with the likes of Le Havre, Caen, Guingamp and Bastia. After three seasons with the Bastia, Nalis moved to Italian side Chievo before a move to England. He joined Leicester City in 2003 and spent two years with The Foxes - one of which in the Premier League, before a switch to Sheffield United. A loan spell at Coventry City followed and after just six appearances at Bramall Lane - he joined Plymouth. In total Nalis made over 100 league appearances for The Pilgrims and featured for Swindon in the pre-season games against Chippenham Town and Cardiff City. A regular during the first months of the season, the midfielder has made fleeting appearances since then, including an impressive display against MK Dons in March.

MARK MARSHALL

Signed a two-year contract with Swindon Town in the summer of 2008 after joining from non-league side Eastleigh. First linked up with Swindon for pre-season training in July and made his first

appearance in a Robins shirt against Premiership Portsmouth at The County Ground on Friday 18th July. Not fazed by taking on the likes of David James and Sol Campbell, Marshall was handed another chance to impress. He was handed a start at Hampton & Richmond in another preseason encounter and shone during the win, which convinced boss Maurice Malpas to offer Marshall the opportunity of a permanent switch to Wiltshire. The flying winger made his League One debut off the bench at Cheltenham Town in August and has made a number of appearances as an impact player since then. Scored the winning penalty at Aldershot Town to secure a Johnstone's Paint Trophy first round victory and has been brought off the bench by Danny Wilson in recent games.

CHRIS ALLEN

Young midfielder who came to the fore during the 2007/08 campaign after being handed his full league debut at Southend United in December. The Devizes-based middle-man made eight league appearances for The Robins last season and will be keen to impress during

Robust centreback who arrived in Wiltshire during the summer of 2007. After impressive displays for the youth and reserve sides. Morrison was handed a call up to the first team and made appearances against Gillingham and Millwall at the end of the season. The defender has benefited greatly from the advice passed on from defensive coach Ady Williams, himself a veteran of over 500 professional games which included International outings for Wales. Morrison made his first start of the season in the Carling Cup encounter against QPR where he lined up against the likes of Emmanuel Ledesma and Dexter Blackstock. Has gone on to make the centreback shirt his own since stepping in against MK Dons in March and scored his first senior goal in the home win over Oldham.

reserve outings this term in a bid to win a first team spot. With excellent delivery from a set-piece situation and a keen eye for goal, Allen has a lot to offer the Town squad. He made consecutive first team starts against Walsall and Oldham Athletic in January but will hope to impress when a future opportunity arises.

CALLUM KENNEDY

Former Reading defender was granted a taste of first team action by former Town boss Paul Sturrock. The youngster made a surprise start in the 4-1 win over Brentford in the Johnstone's Paint Trophy in September 2007. Comfortable at leftback, Kennedy was a regular for the Town reserves last term and was taken on the pre-season tour to Austria in the summer of 2008. The player was handed a chance to impress in pre-season with games against Cardiff City and Plymouth Argyle. He was also an unused substitute as Town began the League One season with a 3-1 win over Tranmere Rovers at The County Ground. After being named on the bench against Leicester City, Kennedy made his full debut against Carlisle United at the start of December.



United created the first opening when Kavanagh swung a swirling free kick in to the area. Ifil got a touch, but all that did was divert the ball onwards towards the waiting Peter Murphy. He took another touch, but it fell on his weaker right foot and he dragged a poor shot wide.

Richard Keogh almost unlocked the Robins defence with a direct pass that evaded everyone. Bridge-Wilkinson was chasing it, but it skipped through to Phil Smith who had advanced from his line.

The Robins had little to offer in the opening quarter of an hour, with a McGovern cross the only moment of work for a comfortable Carlisle back line. However, a mistake from Keogh on 19 minutes nearly cost his side a goal as he decided to volley a harmless McGovern free kick delivery back in to the mix. He could have allowed it to go for a goal kick, but it rebounded back off Peacock and dropped just wide of the target.

It was all about Krul again in the 39th minute when the Cumbrians got caught on the break having committed themselves forward. Peacock shifted the ball quickly, splitting the defence and sending McNamee one on one with the Dutch U21 international. He waited for the shot, and got both hands to it to beat it away from the top corner.

United should have taken the lead on the stroke of half time when Kavanagh sent a neat free kick in to the box. Murphy missed his touch, confusing the keeper,

but he managed to get his hands to it to stop it from going in. Keogh was on the follow up, but Ifil volleyed it against him and was then able to clear the second ball as the big Carlisle defender crumbled to the floor.

The blue shirts stayed forward, and Liddle picked it up on the edge of the box, but could only send his strike in to the stands. The Cumbrians fashioned a good move on 48 minutes with Kavanagh pullign the strings in midfield. Bridge-Wilkinson overlapped, and used Liddle when the moment arose. A good cross was angling towards Jeff Smith, but Taylor got his head to it and made the save easy for Phil Smith.

Disaster struck for United in the 50th minute when Peter Murphy stuck his boot out to prevent a fierce left wing cross from going through to Cox at the back stick. His connection was firm, but it took it on to the bar and in to the back of the

net, leaving the Carlisle defence stunned

Lee Peacock hit the bar with a stinging header as he arrived late in the box, and Billy Paynter headed one wide in what became a good spell for the Robins.

Michael Bridges screwed the ball wide from 20-yards after a good link up with Danny Graham, and Jeff Smith was denied two penalty shouts when he fell to ground in the area as Carlisle stayed forward.

Kavanagh was off target with a 23-yard free kick as the blue shirts kept knocking on the door, but the ball just wouldn't run for them in the final third. Billy Paynter reminded the United defence that there was still work to do when he shot from 22-yards, but it was easy for Krul as he dropped to his left.

Cox then smashed a volley against the bar on the turn when he took a Paynter flick on his chest, and McNamee blazed one over the bar when he went on the run with the Robins starting to settle.

What they're saying about The Robins

Swindon striker Simon Cox is hoping his side can build on their good performances in March as they seek to avoid the drop from League One.

The in-form forward netted eight goals in as many games last month and was rewarded with the Powerade League One Player of the Month award for March.

He told the club's official website: "It's been good, a lot of games but that's always nice because you get a lot of goals.

"When your playing well as a team, and obviously we played well in March, it was good for us and sets us up for a good April hopefully. It was obviously pleasing to cap it off with a nice award."

Meanwhile, on-loan midfielder Owain Tudur-Jones insists he will get stronger with each game he plays. He told the Swindon Advertiser: "It takes a little while to get into your stride and I'm still finding my feet but certainly I feel stronger in every game. I don't think it's a case of me coming in here and trying to be the star man week-in, week-out. It's about trying to fit into the way that we play and trying to make us stronger as a team."

Robins chief executive Nick Watkins told BBC Radio Swindon: "The value of Simon is well over £1million. If a Premier League side was to make a sensible offer we'd have to consider it.

"There is always going to be speculation about someone of his talents playing in League One when he could play in the Premier League. There are no offers on the table at this stage, but there have been more scouts at the County Ground in the last few weeks than at a jamboree."



CHRIS Allen admits he fears for his Town future, as the young midfielder contemplates the possibility of life away from the County Ground.

The 20-year-old is one of 15 Swindon players whose deals run out in the summer, and boss Danny Wilson is expected to take advantage of the situation by making wholesale changes in the close season.

"I haven't played that many games under the new manager, but I've been involved in pretty much all of the match day squads," said Allen, who grew up in Devizes. "It's important that I keep trying to stay involved in the side. If I do, and play well in the reserves, then hopefully I can get a new contract. It is a worry for me and it's a worry for everyone when they have to try and earn a contract."





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Season Ticket Early buy savings to be made!

Carlisle United fans can save themselves an EXTRA £20 off the price of a season ticket if they buy one before the end of this month thanks to a new offer.

The Blues are freezing season ticket prices right across the board for 2009/10 - the third year in a row that there has been no increase. Just like for the current 2008/09 campaign, a two-price system will again operate during the summer, meaning season tickets will be available at the same reduced Early Buy rate for 2009-10 if bought before June 12.

But under a further cost-cutting initiative, supporters can actually pay £20 less than last year's lower prices if they take advantage of an additional new Early Buy option by purchasing a season ticket before April 30.

The new pre-May Early Buy option is being introduced for the first time this year on top of other existing schemes to help fans afford season tickets during the recession, such as spreading payments over five monthly installments by standing order from July.

The new April 30 offer means fans can save £50 by purchasing their season tickets before the first Early Buy deadline. For



expensive adult seated season ticket will cost £340 before April 30, rising to £360 from May 1 until June 12 and then £390. The lowest of those three prices means the season ticket holder is gaining free entry to SIX league fixtures on the equivalent match day prices for the same seat. The equivalent £50 staggered savings on an adult terraced season ticket reduce the cost to £260, £280 and £310.

Managing director John Nixon said: "We fully understand how the recession is hitting a lot of our fans and the club as well, so we have introduced a new Early Buy option on season tickets as another incentive which will hopefully help everyone.

"I know some people decide not to buy a season ticket because they might miss a couple of matches for something like a wedding or a holiday during the season but adults can now get into the equivalent of six league matches for free if they buy a seat for 2009/10 before April 30.

"We were adamant that we were not going to put the cost of season tickets up for the new season - and we have achieved that. But now we can actually offer season tickets to fans at a lower price if they buy them before April 30 thanks to the even earlier Early Buy option."

There are some other great Early Buy season ticket offers, with family enclosure passes available for combinations of one adult and up to two children of various ages from £260 if bought before April 30. Adult season tickets start at the same price and from £185 for seniors before April 30, while children can get a terraced season ticket for just £35. That works out at up to 11 free matches for children or six for adults and seven for seniors over the whole season when compared to pay-on-the-day admission. Admission to all matches is free for under-sevens if they are accompanied by a paying adult.

Carlisle United have 2,700 season ticket holders for the current season - a total bettered only during the club's solitary season in the top flight back in 1974-75.

Meanwhile, all individual match day tickets will also remain the same next season. These include £20 for a seat for adults [£18 in advance] or £16 to stand [£14 in advance].

Tom Aldred continues with his take on life as a Youth team player:

We played Stockport County at Creighton last Saturday, and it was difficult conditions for us yet again. The wind was blowing strongly but I thought we dealt with it quite well, and we played some decent stuff.

We were three-nil up in the first half, but we were playing with the wind, so we knew the second half was going to be much more difficult. We dug in though and it was fairly open, even though the flight of the ball was very difficult to judge.

Unfortunately we conceded a late goal, but I suppose that it didn't really matter in terms of the result. To be honest, I have to admit that I gave a penalty away. The lad came at me and I clipped him as I tried to make the tackle, and he went down. It was unfortunate, but overall I thought we did well. A few of the Under-16 lads came on once the result was safe, and that's good, because they will be doing it for real next year. It looks like we have got a good crop of players because they did well and they didn't look out of place.

We had a Reserve game on Wednesday, against Rochdale, and although we got beat I thought we played quite well. It was a very young team, virtually a Youth team, but we held our own. We're getting used to playing at Reserve level now, and most of us really look forward to it.

You've got to keep going and it just gets faster and faster. Obviously it's hard and your body begins to shut down towards the end.

We had trained with the first team that

morning, and that had been a hard session, and both Cooky and I knew that we still had the test to come. It was extremely hard, particularly on my legs, and it was a massive relief when I was told to stop.

I thought it was a good exercise though. I didn't enjoy it, but I thought it was worthwhile and I learned from it. I'd definitely like to do it again to see if I could improve ... and it would be interesting to do it when I hadn't had a tough training session half an hour before. I reckon the results would be better. It would also be good to get a go on it when we come back for pre-season, just to see how much of an affect a few weeks off has on your overall fitness.

On Thursday I found out that I had been called up to attend another Scotland U19 training camp. I'm delighted about that. I don't know much about it yet, but it goes without saying that I'm looking forward to it. It's on Monday and Tuesday of next week, so I'll be back by Tuesday night.

It's Not Over Until It's Over

In the coming month Youth teamers throughout the country will be getting the news as to whether they have gained a contract as a full time footballer and the club they have been attached to for the previous two years.

For the lucky ones the dream will live on and hopefully a successful career lies ahead. For those that don't make it, for whatever reason it's a crossroads as they have to make decisions on what they want to do in life. Some will turn the backs on football completely; some will continue in different Leagues and fit football around another job.

Occasionally though there is a way back, it isn't always the end. Here at Brunton Park, Simon Hackney found his way back into football. Both Karl Hawley and Keiren Westwood were looking at work outside football before grasping a second chance with both feet.

One of the most high profile players to be released as a youngster is Dean Windass, who was released from Hull City by our own Denis Booth. We caught up with Denis to find out a little more.

"Yes, I was at Hull City with Dean when he was a youngster. He was only small. He did have very good skill, a very good footballer, but he didn't quite have the strength at that time, that the other boys had. So it was a tough decision but we felt he didn't have the strength be able to compete at that level, so Brian Horton and I released him.

"It's great to see what he's doing now and what he's achieved. He's a good lad, a likeable fella, you can never dislike Dean, I always got on well with him. He said at the time, and I've spoken to him since, that he was behind the others and it was probably right that he was released.

"He has proved what you can do if you go back into football. I think he went to play for North Ferriby and started scoring a few goals there, and then he went under Terry Dolan who took him back to Hull City. He was a sensation early on. I remember them beating Bristol Rovers when I was there, and he got a hat trick.

"I actually saw him out that night and pulled his leg, saying thanks for that Deano, you've got your own back there! He's still around now at nearly 40 and it just proves what you can do if you have the belief and the ability. eano always did have the ability. You can go on and reach the top flight of English and Scottish Football.

"It's a strong message to all youngsters out there, that if you do get released by a football club, for whatever reason, people have to make decisions on young players and it's not because they don't like them.

"The worst side of management is telling someone that you don't think they are quite good enough for us. No one enjoys that, I don't care who they are. To say to a young player that they aren't going to be kept on is hard.

"At Hull City I used to try and get them fixed up with other clubs and, if in years to come you see them playing for another side, it gives you a lot of pleasure. Certainly with Dean Windass, being a Hull boy, it's given me a lot of pleasure to see what he's achieved.

"I've run into him on numerous occasions, one a couple of years ago when Preston were going for promotion. We went to Hull and lost 2-0 and again he was a thorn in our sides.

"He is a genuine character who has shown that being released doesn't have to be the end, it might just be the beginning."

 Released by Hull City he joined North Ferriby on 1 August 1990, before rejoining Hull City on a free in October 1991. A £700,000 move to Aberdeen in December 1995 was followed by moves and loan spells to Bradford City, Middlesbrough, Sheffield Wednesday, Sheffield United, back to Bradford City, and then back to Hull City, where his goal gave the Tigers the step up to the Premiership.

Brighton & Hove Albion boss Russell Slade has made his first signing by bringing in Stockport County midfielder Gary Dicker on loan until the end of the season. Dicker, 22, who has represented Ireland at Under-21 level, first arrived in English football in 2007 when signed by Birmingham City on a six-month deal. Albion chairman Dick Knight said, "He's

calm, commanding, and plays a pass. We have been aware of Gary's quality since we were watching Jim McNulty earlier in the season." Dicker will link up with his Albion team-mates, including former Stockport team-mate McNulty, who signed for Brighton on the last deadline day on 2nd February.

Hartlepool United have completed the signing of Huddersfield Town youngster Joe Skarz on loan. The 19-year-old left-back joins the Victoria Park outfit until the end of the season after struggling to force his way into the Terriers line-up. Town manager Lee Clark said, "Allowing Joe to leave is designed to get him some high standard football for his own development and so we can look at him, Joe is part of my long-term plans and we'll have him watched very closely." Skarz has played 11 times for Huddersfield this season, but has been kept out of the side since November due to Robbie Williams' excellent form. He joins Huddersfield team-mate Keigan Parker, who is already on loan at Hartlepool.



Leeds United have handed Nigerian centre-back Babajide Ogunbiyi a trial at the club. The 22-year-old had been offered a contract with Major League soccer side New York Red Bulls but has stated he wants to play in Europe. The tall defender has trained with the Nigerian national team and was part of their 2008 Olympic team pool. Leeds

boss Simon Grayson has already signed American striker Mike Grella who rejected a move to MLS side Toronto in February to join the Elland Road club.

MK Dons have signed 20-year-old Wolves midfielder Stephen Gleeson on loan until the end of the season. Dons manager Roberto di Matteo told the club's official website, "We're bringing Stephen in to help us in the rush to the end of the season, he's a player that can add a lot of quality to our midfield and give us some more strength in that department." Gleeson is a product of the Wolves academy, but has spent much of his time out on loan at Stockport, for whom he has made over 50 appearances. He also played four times in a short loan spell at Hereford and made his full Republic of Ireland debut against Ecuador in 2007.



Peterborough United boss Darren
Ferguson has been named as the League
One manager of the month for March.
Ferguson's side won all six of their league
fixtures during the period. Posh defeated
Leyton Orient, Hartlepool United,
Scunthorpe United, Northampton Town,
Bristol Rovers and Leicester City in
March. The other contenders for the

award were Simon Grayson of Leeds United, Kenny Jackett of Millwall and Southend United's Steve Tilson.

Swindon Town chief executive Nick Watkins has warned clubs interested in buying striker Simon Cox that they will need to stump up "well over" £1m. West Bromwich Albion and Leicester are the latest teams linked with a move for the 27-goal striker. Watkins told a local radio station that Cox will not leave on the cheap. He said, "The value of Simon is well over £1m. If a Premier League side was to make a sensible offer we'd have to consider it and Simon's ambitions." Cox is under contract to Swindon for another year and would still command a fee after that as he is only 21. The club are keen to hang onto their striker, but Watkins knows a record of 42 goals in 82 games has alerted much bigger teams. "There is always going to be speculation about someone of his talents playing in League One when he could play in the Premier League. There are no offers on the table at this stage, but there have been more scouts at the County Ground in the last few weeks than at a jamboree," he added.



Tranmere Rovers striker Chris Greenacre could be out for the rest of the season after picking up a knee injury. The 31-year-old suffered medial ligament damage while playing in Rovers keeper John Achterberg's testimonial against Everton last Monday. He was using the game as a comeback match, as he recovers from a foot injury he picked up

Player News

Rickie Lambert moved to the Memorial Stadium, from Rochdale, for a fee of £200,000 late on transfer deadline day, 31st August, 2006. The striker was with Liverpool as a schoolboy before a move to Blackpool, as a trainee. He made just three substitute appearances at Bloomfield Road, and signed for Macclesfield in March 2000. He scored eight goals in 44 league appearances for the Silkmen then Stockport County paid £300,000 to take him to Edgeley Park in April 2003. He scored 18 goals in 98 league appearances for Stockport and during his time with the club, finished top scorer, was voted Player of the Season and was made captain of the side. Rickie signed for Rochdale in February 2005, up until that point he spent much of his career as a midfielder, he went on to feature as a striker at Spotland. He finished 2005/06 as the joint top goal scorer in League Two, with 22 to his name and picked up the supporters' and players' Player of the Year awards. He made a slow start to his Rovers career, however he worked hard to recapture his goal scoring form. Last season he finished as Rovers' top scorer, netting 13 goals in 46 league games, and six more in the cups.

Mandale's View

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Around and About

There's nothing like a radical suggestion to get football fans involved in a heated debate.

In an interview with the News and Star last week, United's managing director John Nixon revealed his plans to propose at a Football League meeting of combining Leagues One and Two and splitting them into two regionalised North and South divisions, much like was the case just over fifty years ago.

It's an interesting proposal that unsurprisingly divides opinion among United fans. While it might not end up being viable, the reasoning behind the suggestion is something that definitely requires some discussion.

Nixon argues that it should be at least discussed, with several league clubs struggle to avoid the threat of administration at present. The reduced cost in travelling, amongst other advantages, would provide helpful in the constant battle for survival at lower league clubs.

It might not prove a popular suggestion but I think it should be discussed at the next Football League meeting. But it shouldn't, and I'd imagine won't, be seen as the only option in trying to stabilise the financial fortunes of clubs in League One and Two.

There are a number of pros and cons to the idea of regionalised leagues. The most obvious advantage is of course the reduced travelling costs. United already spend between £80,000-90,000 a year on travelling expenses for away games. Take away some of those long trips to places like Southend and Brighton, which require overnight stays, and that figure drops significantly.

This also has an advantage to United fans as it would see more "local derbies" (if you can call a game 70 miles away that) against the likes of Morecambe and Darlington. This in turn would lead to bigger away followings at these clubs, helping them out financially and United in extra vocal support for the team.

But what about fans visiting Brunton Park?

Would this really see a significant increase in followings coming to Cumbria? Northern clubs like Accrington and Macclesfield have brought away followings to Brunton Park in recent seasons that rival some of the smaller southern clubs in size.

Playing mostly in the north would also have an effect on the London Branch of United's supporters club. The nearest games to them would still be a couple of hours away at places such as Notts County and Shrewsbury.

The issue of promotion and relegation would prove a major sticking point too. At present, only 3 teams are relegated from the Championship to League One. With two separate leagues promoting up to the second tier in a regionalised format, how do you resolve this? Ask the Championship clubs to increase the number of teams relegated to four? But then they only have two possible promotion places to get back up in either the North or South division.

But it shouldn't, and I'd imagine won't, be seen as the only option in trying to stabilise the financial fortunes of clubs in League One and Two

Maybe you could reduce the relegated numbers to two. But then you have the problem of whether you allow only the champions to go up (resulting in the rest of the clubs having a lot less to play for and plenty of dud games long before the season is over). Or make some kind of play-off system that sees the champions go straight into the final or semi-final and then... well you're heading towards the kind of play-off system used in Rugby League's Super League.

It would give opportunities for smaller clubs currently in League Two to be one step away from Championship football. But would they really be ready for it? You only have to look at how Nottingham Forest have struggled since their

promotion last season to see that even teams with money to spend find life hard in the second tier.



You have the added problem of rearranging the Divisions each season as the balance of north and south is shifted due to promotions and relegations. Not a problem for clubs like United and Exeter, at the very extremes geographically. But for the likes of Walsall, one season you might be making trips up to Brunton Park, the next to Roots Hall and yet not able to play a team like Shrewsbury a short distance apart and playing at effectively the same level.


Admittedly, I'm against the idea. I enjoy the fact that we compete in a national rather than a regionalised league and face teams from all across the country, such as Swindon today. But I can see why the idea is seen as an attractive one by some. So far it's only a suggestion and one worthy of more discussion.

But what other ways can the league look to avert the possibility of financial collapse at several clubs? We could go back to splitting takings on gates between the two clubs involved. But would it really be fair on the likes of Leicester and Leeds, who get big attendances, to split that money? Maybe a stronger salary cap? There's currently one in place based on turnover but it's questionable as to whether it actually works. You only have to look at the number of teams over the last few years that have gone into administration to see there's still a problem.

There's no easy answer to the problem, but there's no harm in discussing all possibilities in trying to find a solution.



I am going to fill the last 4 programmes of the season with an insight to the life of a referee, two ex-pro refs are good friends of mine - one of whom is Colin Seel.



These are thoughts of Colin who refereed in the top flight for nearly 15 years.

In over 40 years of refereeing I have never changed my decision because of pressure from players or spectators ... I don't know of any other referees who have either. So what is the point of screaming and cursing when it can't affect the decision, but can lead to disciplinary action?

Here are a couple of examples of opinions being expressed and the outcomes. I may have come out on top in one of the incidents, but I was put firmly in my place in the other!

I was sitting in the Centre Stand at Brunton Park. A Cartisle United fan a few rows in front, and just to the side, of me recognised me and spent half the game berating the referee and passing comments to me about how poorly my "mate" was performing.

With play in the Petteril end of the pitch, a hefty defensive clearance sent the ball towards the Warwick Road, and a Carlisle player chased it down, and controlled it, right on the edge of the visitor's penalty area, just as a defender challenged.

The Referee who had been up with play at the Petteril end of the pitch, followed play as quickly as he could, but was still about 30 yards behind play, when the defender brought the United player down.

The Linesman did not indicate the foul had been committed in the Penalty Area, so the referee awarded United a direct free kick a yard or so outside the Area.

This sent my "friend" into apoplexy has he demanded a Penalty Kick. He then vented his anger on me, asking how could a man who was 50 (it was nearer 30) yards from play decide if it was a Penalty Kick or not! I asked him if he was claiming it was wrong to decide on a serious matter such as this from 30 (or 50) yards distance. "Exactly", he replied.

"Well you seem to have the ability to decide from at least three times that distance", I replied.


The howls of derision from most people, who had heard our conversation, not only embarrassed him, but shut him up for the remainder of the game.

However if I won that particular argument, I was spectacularly defeated by a boy of about 10 years of age at Oldham.



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

Liverpool legend Mark Lawrenson has come out in his support saying its time it stopped as it was doing neither the player nor the

club any good. Of course booing, even booing ones own players isn't anything particularly new in the game. However many football commentators and writers are noticing that the level of abuse and booing being directed at footballers by their own club supporters is like an epidemic virus sweeping modern football and seems to be getting more violent and sinister with each passing week. Lucas has openly wondered if he should leave Anfield such is the force of the abuse he has received. The Brazilian midfielder who has played for his country and is still only twenty two years of age was booed by his fans when coming ON as a sub against Sunderland earlier this month, even by modern standards that has got to be harsh.

The Arsenal player Eboue was so abused by his clubs own supporters that Arsene Wenger was forced to replace him even though he had only played part of the game as a substitute in their recent game against Wigan. The whole Middlesbrough team seems to be getting so much stick by their own fans at a time when they need their support the most it must be hard for them to take. Many suggest that it's happening up and down the Leagues and are asking the question, why?

Robbie Fowler is of the opinion that society has just got a bit more violent and abusive. He always remembers taking stick from opposition fans but not so much from his own fans. He thinks that maybe people on the terraces today who have to pay a lot of money to support their clubs especially if they are following them up and down the country are

quicker to vent their feelings of anger and frustration than in years gone by. Sue Gardner who is The Middlesbrough Official Supporters Club chairperson said after a recent game that, "Booing a player who the supporters believe lives in an "Ivory Tower" is the only way fans can show their feelings." Gardner insisted that, "Booing is the only way fans can vent their frustration with their team on the pitch if they are not performing as they should be, and a lot of people think Middlesbrough are not performing as they should be.

They have paid good money to go to a game and the team are not performing. The majority of fans are frustrated and footballers are not around in the community anymore like they used to be, they all live in 'Ivory Towers' - houses on gated estates so you can't tell them what you think as you don't ever see them in the community. So how else apart from booing on a Saturday can you let them know your not happy with them?" Perhaps in support of the opinion that society is changing and people are growing angrier and have less patience with their stars I was astonished to watch a British Olympic Gold medal winner from the recent Beijing Olympics making his boxing debut as a pro about a month ago, and his own fans in Birmingham were booing him! James deGale the 23 year old boxer says that he will not let the boo-boys sidetrack him in his efforts to become a world champion someday. I couldn't understand why the boxing fans who must have paid a lot of money to get in and watch the night of boxing which had two other British boxers making their debut into the pro ranks. Why boo British guys who are making their first fight? After all they all went on to win?

Society is changing, it is more violent, people are more impatient with their sporting stars, they want immediate results, people have a lot of frustration to vent. Maybe the financial troubles that have beset society are playing their part in motivating this kind of behaviour. After all people are loosing their homes, their jobs, their careers, their savingspeople are angry, and why shouldn't they be. It was so moving and sad watching the news the other night about the workers from Stead McAlpines losing not only their jobs but maybe even their redundancy payments which were promised them!!! People are angry and let down, and why shouldn't they be. A recent survey found that men who are not able to express their worries. concerns and feelings find in sporting events such as football and boxing an opportunity to vent and release their anger. Almost two thirds of the men surveyed (64%) said that whilst watching a football game they are more willing and able to vent their feelings than when doing other activities. Three quarters said they would not be embarrassed to hug a mate during a game.



The survey was carried out by the Mental Health Research Foundation whose chairman Andrew McCulloch said, "It is encouraging that football makes it easier for men to talk about their feelings as traditionally, men are far less likely than women to share their innermost thoughts." Along with hugging their friends, 70 percent of men admitted that a match can make them upset while 58 percent said that what happens over the course of a football match can make them aggressive.

We are living in changing times with pressures on society and the family which have not been seen since the 1930's financial crash. Let's hope the financial situation improves not least for the men of Stead McAlpine and any one losing Jobs and homes.

The new situation suits everyone. Mike Ashley deflects a bit of criticism, the Newcastle fans get their hero back, and Alan Shearer gets the status that will allow him

to sit alongside the likes of Martin O'Neill and nod sagely as a man who has walked, however briefly, the walk. To the rest of us it appears as a PR exercise of such echoing hollowness that it could only be rivalled in vacuity if Laurence Llewelyn Bowen took over the Welsh national side. Shearer has said he will not still be at the wheel for the new season; all four wheels may well be in the ditch by then. So what is the point? To paraphrase Terry Pratchett, the Newcastle fans have been given what they think they want rather than what they know they need.

I would not be greatly surprised if Shearer didn't even stick around for the rest of the season. A term in the Championship would do Newcastle the world of good, their presence would enliven that particular division and they could return to the Premier League leaner and with a more realistic set of expectations. Look at the example of Leeds United, a temporary humbling has not only freshened-up the self-perception of their own fans but softened the attitude of the fans of other clubs towards them.

It must be the season winding-down; I

can feel this column slipping away from me. Back to reality; tonight I will attend my favourite fixture of the year, Carlisle Reserves against Rochdale Reserves, held at Dark Lane home of Rossendale United, approximately twenty minutes walk up the road from me. In that windy arena I have seen the debuts of Simon Hackney and Luke Joyce, and first witnessed the Cowan and Gray team-up that almost saved us in 2004. I also saw one of the best football matches I ever attended, a FA Cup qualifier between Rossendale United and Barrow, 4-4 after extra time Barrow went through on penalties. They serve chips at half-time at Dark Lane and the social club is about ten yards across the car park, but don't have the Guinness, its ice-cold and you won't get warm again until you get home.

Next season there might be a chance for another couple of local games for me in my East Lancs. exile. In 1995 against Bury we were poised to take the Division Three title, before our first trip to Wembley; the fans next to me were planning their pitch invasion even before kick-off. 
Likewise trips to Rochdale were dreadful scrappy draws, or defeats, culminating in that famous 6-0 thrashing. The tide turned briefly in 2003 when Stuart Green engineered a 1-0 victory at Spotland, and driving home in meditative mood I started composing senryu:

Of course Roddy Collins then imposed the old hippy notion that you're either on the bus or off the bus, and with Green's departure things defaulted to normal. Many ghosts were laid to rest when Paul Simpson's side secured the Second Division title on that happy evening against Rochdale in May of 2006. I had been able to hold my head up with Bury fans since the season we were relegated, when Andy Preece left them and joined us and set up the two goals that completed the 3-1 victory at Gigg Lane on Boxing Day 2003. Bury fans complained that Preece had never moved that fast when he played for them.

But it's too early to be looking forward to the new season. There are still important games to play which will be decided through the application of the qualities of hard work and determination as opposed to the temporary manifestation of the embodiment of messianic salvation. If a saviour should arise for Carlisle I hope it's in the opposition penalty box to get on the end of crosses, rather than someone who fancies running a football team because it looks good on his CV.



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Feedback Group Meeting Brunton Park Part One



The Carlisle United Fans Feedback Group held their second meeting of the season in the Sponsors Lounge at Brunton Park on Friday 27 March.

Supporters representing all areas of the ground attended and they were able to put their queries and concerns to members of the Carlisle United board.

Below is a resume of the points discussed at the meeting:

ACTION POINTS FROM THE FIRST FEEDBACK GROUP MEETING

Have the club investigated the possibility of instigating some kind of saving plan, linked to Season Ticket holders, with the Cumberland Building Society?

Initially the idea was to speak to CBS to ascertain whether something like this would be possible. Encouragingly, things progressed very quickly from there. CBS discussed the possibilities at a number of board meetings and are now in a position to launch a Season Ticket Saver Scheme for next season. Full details will be enclosed with the Season Tickets when they are sent out in July / August.

Would the club consider giving priority for limited availability matches to supporters who travel to away games?

This was discussed following the last meeting but the club have decided to heed the lessons learned from recent high interest games and reserve top priority for games such as these for Season Ticket Holders. The priority for all future high interest or limited availability games will be: 1 - Season Ticket holders; 2 - All other Members of Carlisle United; 3 - General sale.

How does a Member of Carlisle United

go about confirming exactly what the Member benefits are?

The current benefits are visible on the website and were published in the recent newsletter. However, the benefits for members are currently under review ahead of next season. The club is looking at the possibility of introducing a reward card system - TeamCard - that gathers points for purchases for fans. Outlets linked to TeamCard include Ebay, LoveFilm, Dixons and John Lewis. Meetings are ongoing with TeamCard and a final decision will be made soon. For further details on TeamCard see www.teamcard.co.uk/teamcard /index.php

Why is there a 50p collection fee for pre-booked tickets?

This was investigated and the club confirmed that there is a 50p collection fee, and that it will stay in place for next season. The fee covers all administration costs included with the handling of prebooked tickets.

Has the club tried to establish links with the Cumbrian / Carlisle based Polish Community?

Media Officer Andy Hall contacted a local Polish worker shortly after the last meeting. His reaction was positive, but he did explain that many of the Polish workers in the area were on Agency books and that they had left / were in the process of leaving the area due to the present economic climate. This made it difficult for any firm link to be established. Feedback Group member David Howe has subsequently offered to investigate this issue further, along with the possibility of speaking to the vibrant Cumbrian-based Ghurka community. Andy Hall and David Howe will be picking this up after the Easter period.

Can we have more of a 'Carlisle United' feel in Foxy's Restaurant?

EWM sponsor the restaurant and it would be wrong for the club to ignore that. However, EWM are more than happy for photographs of United players to be displayed. Andrew Jenkins has supplied some historical team images that will be placed in Foxy's when EWM update the current set.

What is the club doing about the issue of bad / foul and abusive language around the ground?

The club admitted that it was possibly one of the most difficult match day problems that they have to deal with. The stewards are taking a much more visible role, and any offenders will be dealt with accordingly. The option of setting up a text message service so that fans can report incidents of racist or abusive language directly is currently being investigated. The club have lost their Family Excellence award for this season because of this issue. That is something that they are keen to rectify quickly.

Can we have more promotional offers to entice people in to the bars?

Azure, the club catering provider, picked up on this immediately and have had promotional prices for most of this season. Carling has been sold at £1-95 and Fosters / Smooth at £2. They will continue to offer prices like this on a match day.

Could we have some guest Ales?

Azure advised us that this is not practical, due to the standing time in the pipes between match days. This would cause excessive wastage. They will, however, look at the feasibility of providing a 'Bottled Ale' option.

Singin' the Blues

If you ever find yourself with a spare four minutes and twelve seconds and You Tube available at the tap of a few keys you could amuse yourself by typing in 'Buxton vs Bradford PA.' On some search engines a simple searching of 'Andy Brownrigg + You Tube' will lead you to this same video. I first came across the legend that is Andy Brownrigg when someone fresh from laughing over the You Tube footage took the trouble to alert fellow message boarders at CUFC Online.



What you get for your trouble is some shaky footage shot on the terraces at Buxton's modest Silverlands Stadium, the two teams appear to be fighting out an inconclusive and less than stunning semi-pro encounter, but the real entertainment is on the terraces, where a full-throated hymn to Mr Brownrigg is being unleashed. Praise doesn't come any more ironic than the torrent of abuse being poured out in a song listing the many unique qualities. The song in question owes an obvious debt to an ironic song of support once used by Stockport County supporters to 'encourage' their own Arthur Brownlow. Each verse gets longer as another item is added to the list of their 'How I love your.....,' items.

Amongst the things Buxton's fans 'love' about Andy Brownrigg are his: knobbly knees, beer belly, two left feet, rancid breath and squinty eye.

I've watched the video a few times and I'll confess, I've yet to spot any player obviously less talented and more-ugly than any other. The strange thing about the song and the moment it captures is that it represents something of a high point in the career of the wayward Andy Brownrigg. Brownrigg became a cult hero in football because of his habit of following hopeful transfers with spells in

the reserves at his new club, and lengthy spells on loan to clubs way below the level of his official employers.

Career wise it started well, eight games for Hereford followed by a six figure transfer to Norwich City, for whom he never played first team football. Kettering Town got some benefit from a loan spell before Andy moved to Rotherham, and soon out on loan at Stalybridge Celtic. The glamour days were all but over before Andy was properly into his twenties. Put it this way, if they made a film of his life, it would probably work better in black and white. If we discount Conference level games Andy has made just 10 senior appearances, including two in an ill-starred spell with cash-strapped Greenock Morton at the start of the 21st century.

Honours wise Brownrigg played 20 games as Kidderminster Harriers romped to the Conference title in 1999-2000. Brownrigg had prospered under the management of another much maligned soccer star - Jan Molby - but after his team finished nine points above Rushden, and set off for five years in the professional leagues, Brownrigg's reward was that nightmare transfer to Greenock Morton. The irony is that the next time he would feature as a key player in a championship winning side, it would be at Buxton, which is where the You Tube clip finds him. As his Wikipedia page notes, Andy.....Was a virtual ever-present the following season when the Bucks won the NCEL Premier League title and was very popular with the supporters at the Silverlands.

These supporters had 46 starts and 5 substitute appearances to embellish the vivid descriptions in the song but - once the club were promoted - their cult hero

was - typically - on his way again. Career wise it has been a trawl of places on the very edges of football reality - Ossett Albion, Maltby Main, Hallam and - when last heard of - Staveley Miners Welfare.

Don't feel too sorry for Andy, he is apparently working towards a Sport and Exercise Psychology BA so he is clearly no slouch in terms of brain power, and he has kept that playing career alive in the face of a mind numbing succession of minnow clubs, so you have to credit his staying power and resilience. Andy will be 33 this year, looking forward, presumably, to a year or two more of pleasing the crowds and enjoying his underground notoriety.

Watching Workington or others at that

level from time to time I've come to find a grudging admiration for those players whose love of the game drives them on in the face of poor crowds and poor wages. If you write off those clearly young enough and talented enough to hope they can climb the ladder, and those with a glittering past behind them, you find plenty for whom the chance to shine for a few hundred die-hards is the nearest to glory they will ever know.



Their best moments reach a wider audience only on You Tube and when their names are mentioned over pints either side of a game those clustered in the pub would probably be

insufficient to fill one level of a double decker bus. If Andy Brownrigg and the hymn of praise heaped upon him by the Buxton fans puts one of these players in front of an audience of several thousand, it isn't such a bad thing. For all the barbs in the song, there's a sense of celebration, almost love, in the voices as they egg on one footballer who can truly claim to be a living cult hero. Go Andy!

With qualifying for the 2010 FIFA World Cup well underway now, and having in fact finished in the Oceania Zone it's worth taking a peak at who the real minnows are.

Well in the official FIFA ranking list there are currently six teams stuck in the wooden spoon spot in equal 202nd with no ranking points, the sextet, comprising of San Marino, Anguilla, Montserrat, American Samoa, the Cook Islands and Papua New Guinea.



Guam the big movers down in the depths after three recent games have seen them move from no points to 34 points in just four days in mid-March, the new ranking table released on the 8th of April having seen the Western Pacific Ocean islanders charge up to 188th. The first of their three scoring matches being their maiden victory over a member of FIFA in which, as hosts, they beat Mongolia 1-0 in the East Asian Cup Preliminary Competition.

Guam then won again just two days later when they defeated the Northern Mariana Islands 2-1, the visitors presumably having been entrenched in defence throughout the game. They needed a last minute equaliser from Jason Cunliffee though to grab a 2-2 draw against Macau, the other results meaning that Guam had topped the group and qualified for the semi-final

stages in which they will play, in Chinese Taipei, the hosts, Hong Kong and North Korea. The winner of that group then going on to play the big boys in the final, that trio being China, Japan and South Korea.

Chinese Taipei are going to have get their act together however as they are one of the big fallers down the charts in the last month, the Taiwanese having dropped down 13 places to 180th. The reason for the Republic of Formosa, erm Taiwan, erm Republic of China being called erm, Chinese Taipei, is that the People's Republic of China somewhat contradictively objects to any name containing the word China. But then they also object to Taiwan because that suggests it is a separate entity from, erm, China.

Back on the pitch and the country on the fewest points, bar the zero brigade, is the Central African Republic on a mighty four points. The Low-Ubangui Fawns as the team is nicknamed, withdrawing from World Cup 2010 qualifying for unknown reasons, along with Sao Tome e Principe at the preliminary stage of African qualifying. That then meaning that the Seychelles and Swaziland as the two highest seeds of the ten teams involved were given a bye into qualifying proper.

The Central African Republic and Sao Tome e Principe aren't the only sides to have withdrawn either as our old friends Guam, Bhutan, Eritrea and Papua New Guinea also pulled out of the race to South Africa. Ethiopia, bordering Eritrea, added to that list as they played four matches in their qualifying group before FIFA announced the immediate suspension of the Ethiopian Football Federation (EFF) in late July 2008 after disagreements between FIFA and the top brass at the EFF.

Ethiopia are actually doing quite well in the rankings table as they currently sit in 99th place, with the final country making up the top 100 being the People's Republic of China. Which makes you even more wondrous about how the points are worked out than you would have been before. The six calculation factors apparently being match result, importance of match, strength of opponent, regional strength, results in last four years, and average points per game in the last 12 months (minimum five matches).

You become even more intrigued by the mathematical formula when you see that Spain are top of the list with a bumper 1,729 points, while Germany sit in second a massive 367 points behind the Spaniards on 1,362. The rest of the top ten from third place down currently made up by the Netherlands, Brazil, Italy, Argentina, England, Croatia, Russia and France, Portugal in 11th being the last of the teams in the thousands as they have 1,013 ranking points at present.

England, in seventh, have 1,193 points, with their improved form under Fabio Capello moving them up two places last month. Their highest ever ranking being fourth while the lowest was a gruesome 27th in February 1996, although we did reach the semi-finals in Euro 96 four months later so it can't have been all bad, apart from losing on penalties to Germany again that is.

Elsewhere in the British Isles Scotland come next in 24th, up four places from March, Northern Ireland have then rocketed into 27th from 42nd, while the Republic are below their neighbours as they have dropped eight spots to 34th. Finally come Wates all the way down in 73rd, sandwiched between Algeria and Cyprus, that is still a long way off their worst ever ranking though of 113th in September 2000.



Mr Colin Webster (Tyne & Wear) started refereeing in his native North East in 1988 and progressed through the Wearside and Northern Leagues to reach the National List in 1994. He was promoted to the Referees' List in 2000.

He first came to Brunton Park in January 2001 for our League two meeting with Shrewsbury Town. Steve Soley scored the only goal of the game in the 10th minute, and there were no Carlisle names taken on the day.

Can we have a review of the half-time

The FITC project picked up on this and arranged some penalty shoot-out competitions with local children. This has been extremely popular, and will be used further in the future. A suggestion came from the floor to combine a raffle with a hit the bar style competition. This will be discussed and a decision made ahead of the next Feedback Group meeting.

What is being done about the quality of the speakers around the ground?

The club are working closely with a firm called Solid State in a bid to rectify the speaker problems. A speaker-by-speaker test system is in place and that will be completed within very short order. Questions and queries from the 27 March Feedback Group meeting

Why has the price of soup doubled from last season?

Azure confirmed that the price of soup was now £2 per cup on a match day, up from £1-50 from last season (soup has risen from £1 to £2 for Reserve team games). The reason for the price increase is that the soup is now served in a 10oz cup (it was an 8oz cup last season) and the soup is now home made.

Does the price of drink go up on a match day?

No - the price of drinks are the same throughout the week in all of the club establishments (promotional offers not included).

Is the Legends Bar going to be a white elephant in light of the present economic climate?

No, the facility is being used throughout the week by businesses and companies as an event venue. On match day it used by members (currently 25 of the approximate 40 places have been taken for this season - all places are expected to be taken for next season). Extensive sponsorship from a host of local companies assisted with the building of the Legends Bar.

Why is the pensioner age for women set at 60 as opposed to the men's age of 65 - is this not discrimination?

The club are bringing the pension age in line with government policy. They will stagger the pension age increase for women from 60 to 65 between 2010 and 2020. In order to avoid any confusion, CUFC will do the same. It was also highlighted that the Football League are asking clubs to actively encourage female fans to attend games, and that this policy may go some way to assisting with that.

Do players report fit by their own diagnosis or is there a decision made by a healthcare professional?

Club physiotherapist Neil Dalton is the first point of contact for all injuries or suspected injuries. He is supported by two club doctors and access to a range of specialists. For players with 'niggles,' Dolly will advise the player and the team manager as to what he feels is the correct course of action. A player does have a professional right to declare

himself fit, but it is very rare that the advice of the physio is ignored.

Can the club be more open on its financial position?

Mr Nixon explained that, at current season ticket levels, a crowd of 7500 per game was needed to cover running costs. The club will be down approximately £300,000 on attendance this season. Payments received by the club for players transferred out have been negated by payments made for contracts terminated during this financial year.

Would it be possible for us to have Meal Deals at the outlets around the ground?

Andrew Jenkins agreed to look at the feasibility of offering a drink and pie combination (for example) at a cheaper rate when bought together. An answer would be provided on this at the next meeting.

Where are we with regards to pre-season friendlies?

Letters have been sent to a number of top flight clubs. Once they have finalised their schedules with regards to summer tours, that will then enable us to confirm our fixtures and dates. The plan is to play local clubs at the start of our own schedule.

Next meeting set for mid-July. The Group will be advertised again, ahead of the meeting, in a bid to involve as many supporters as possible.

A Fans Forum, hosted by BBC Radio Cumbria, will also be organised for July - date tbc.



Terrorism and violence should have no place in any civilized society, let alone in any sport.



What happened recently to the Sri Lankan cricketers whilst travelling to a match in Pakistan can only be described as shocking and disgusting. Sport is Sport. It is defined as an 'active recreational 'pastime' - something that should be enjoyed whether you're the player, spectator or viewer. 'He's a good sport' is something most of us have said in the past. And what we mean by this is that 'He' is fair, plays by the rules and behaves in a respectful manner. Sport exists for the enjoyment of everyone.

In the past we've witnessed tragic events within football which have cost many lives such as the Bradford City Fire and the Hillsborough disaster and far too many others. Valuable lessons have been learnt as consequences of these awful events which occurred because of human error. The safety of spectators was neglected on both occasions and decent people lost their lives.

These aforementioned tragic events within football were unintentional. Acts of terrorism are most definitely intentional, and for whatever reason, whether it's religion or politics, they are absolutely needless.

We are all here today to seek enjoyment, pleasure and the satisfaction of [we hope] three points come the final whistle. I don't want to put a damper on that by droning on about tragic events within football but it's important to understand that even our 'beautiful game' is not so 'beautiful' at times. It too [football I mean] has been affected by some forms of terrorism in the past.

Prior to the World Cup in 2002 with days

to go until the opening ceremony Japan and Korea called up military jets to guard English and US teams with surface-to-air missiles and planes amid fear of terrorist strikes by al-Qa'ida following 9/11. The grounds in South Korea were provided with the type of protection usually seen at military bases. The England team had a choice of two local airports and were advised to alternate between them in an attempt to deter any potential terrorists. The USA team were guarded on their arrival by hundreds of armed guards and a SWAT team.

Only recently, the 2010 World Cup in South Africa was thrown into doubt when a local councilor was assassinated after he had blown the whistle on corruption in the construction contracts of the stadiums. There are ten football stadiums being built for the tournament and overall they are running at 33% over budget. It may not sound much but when you see that as a monetary figure running \$320,000 million over its \$980,000-million budget, it speaks volumes - no doubt ticket prices will be affected now!

All we hear about really in the UK [thankfully] relates more to corruption rather than terrorism. There have been investigations into match rigging and allegations of bungs being accepted by various players and managers but little more. Although this is damaging to the game, it is small-time when compared with that of other countries.

Football, being a big business, is increasingly becoming a target for organised crime. Mafia groups have emerged in post-Soviet Russia and Ukraine and they have 'big interests' in sport, especially football.

Remember the Italian 'Serie A' scandal in 2006 - it was alleged that there was

Mafia interests in the match fixing involving 5 of the top clubs. Columbia, now there's a country you'd think twice about playing in! Football players there, especially if involved in the National team are brave (or stupid). Andres Escobar, a Colombian defender back in the World Cup of 1994 whose own goal put his country out of the tournament, was shot dead soon afterwards in the streets of Bogota, Rumours of drugs barons being involved were mentioned at the time. Escobar is just one of a number of Columbian footballers gunned down because of some direct or indirect involvement in criminal activity.

the three men open fired on his car because he had missed an International match and it was revenge for that. Martins described the attackers as 'professional hired assassins.' Is he really that much safer in Newcastle?

Whatever form terrorism takes, it is not welcome within our great game, or any other sport for that matter. There has been enough violence in the past on the terraces without the input from other sources. The game of football is one of beauty, it fills our little hearts and minds every feeling and emotion known to mankind. Sometimes, It's that 'looking forward to the match' feeling that gets us through a rough week at work and gives us something to look forward to. There's far too much unrest and needless violence in the world as it is. Football (and all sports) should be enjoyed and embraced, they should be happy fulfilling experiences and there's no room at all for the sadness caused by acts of violence.

So, let's keep the game safe and beautiful.

EMERGENCY PROCEDURE

In the event of an emergency occurring at the Stadium the Public Address system will be used to broadcast information and instructions to the spectators. Such broadcasts will be preceded by a three-tone chime. When the chimes are heard please be silent, pay attention to what is said and obey any instructions. An example of this alert will be carried out just before kick off and at half time and it will be clearly stated that the announcement is for instructive purposes only.

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
