



"Welcome to this afternoon's Coca-Cola League One fixture against Swindon Town Football Club. Today is a very special day for the Club as we celebrate our 125 year anniversary. Formed in 1884, the Club has enjoyed a fine history and the events of today will mark the occasion."

"We have invited as many former players as possible to the game to take part in a parade on the pitch before kick off. As you can imagine, tracking down these players has not been easy. We have been delighted with the response from those we were able to contact and look forward to welcoming them back today. They have all made a contribution to the Club's history and we thank them for that. Some, unfortunately, could not be with us today as they had prior commitments or are still involved in football with other clubs.

I have been very proud to have been owner of the Club since 1987. We have had many memorable days out at Wembley Stadium, some enjoyable trips overseas in the Anglo-Italian Cup and brought some big

We have had some very memorable meetings with Swindon in the past - not least the Play Off semi finals in 1992-93 - and hopefully today will be another enjoyable contest. I'd also like to welcome David Martin who we signed on loan from Liverpool shortly before our last home game against Brighton and Hove Albion. We are grateful to Liverpool for helping us out and hope David has a successful time at the Club.

Our next home game is the FA Cup First Round tie against Leyton Orient on Saturday, 7th November, kick off 3pm. It remains a very special competition and hopefully the game will be the start of another good cup run. I hope to see you then."

I'd like to welcome everybody to today's match, with a special welcome to those ex-players who have come to help us celebrate our 125th anniversary."

"I'm sure it's going to be a memorable occasion seeing so many players from the past. It will also make some of us realise how old we are when we see the state of the players we used to watch."

"If you're reading this, it means I'm still in charge of team affairs which will also mean I've been in a good mood for the past couple of days. That wasn't the case early on in the week when I was a bit down following the nature of our defeat at Hartlepool. I said before the Hartlepool match that all I could promise the fans was a performance from the lads. I'm sure that those of you who were there will agree that they certainly produced a performance and, with the rub of the green going the other way, could have come away comfortable winners. The highlight of the day was our fans' response to the effort from the players, they didn't shut up for the whole match driving us forward even when we were one down. I know I go on about it, but I can't overstate the importance of the vocal support from the fans, especially when things aren't going quite as well as we, or you, would like. Just on that match, I don't really believe in luck, if we take our chances and stop the opposition from taking theirs, we'll win. During the past 3 matches we have had more attempts on goal than most other teams in our division and our keeper hasn't really had to make a save of note. Garno and the chief have been doing a great job on the training ground and the lads have been responding by working really hard. I believe we are improving with each match and once a few of those chances start going in, it will be onwards and upwards.

I have to mention Charlie Barnett's sending off last week. At the time I thought the referee was going to award us the free kick as both lads went in the same and their lad came in from the side. I didn't give a thought to either player doing anything malicious so you can imagine my surprise when Charlie was sent off. I asked the ref to look at the incident again and he said he would. The assessor however, had taken the DVD so it would be midweek before the ref could look at it and get back to me. Unfortunately and appeal had to be lodged by Monday. We looked at the DVD and the camera angle showed Charlie going in with one foot but the point of impact was obscured by the Hartlepool player. We would therefore have appealed using footage which was inconclusive and no

idea if we had the backing of the referee or not. This was a recipe for a frivolous appeal and an extra match ban, hence our decision not to appeal. I'm all for quick appeals, but if we are going to have them, surely we need to give referees the tools to review their decisions prior to the deadline for making an appeal.


The FA Cup draw could have been worse, we could be playing Leyton Orient away. It's not ideal to draw a team out of your own division but at least our ball came out of R2D2 first. I'm sure all of those of you who travel to our away matches were watching the draw and screaming 'No' every time a team from the edges of Britain came out of the hat first, I was. We have enough long trips in our schedule without having to travel to the likes of Gillingham, Brighton or Aldershot so a home tie was most welcome. The FA Cup is special. The atmosphere is different, the build-up feels different, the nerves are more evident and it's a great occasion. All that said, it's your support that makes the cup that extra bit special so I would ask that you turn out in your droves next week. Bring a friend and I'm sure the atmosphere will hook them into returning week after week. I'd like to welcome the staff, players and fans of Swindon Town. I was delighted to see Peter Shirtliff get the assistant managers job at Swindon. He's an excellent coach and I struck up a close friendship with him when he was at Tranmere. I didn't realise how much I missed him until we lined up for the pre-season team photo and I was looking around for him to stand next to so that I looked a bit better than I actually do. I've also got to know Danny Wilson over the past #1*5 years which is one of the positive things about being involved in football. I used to sit on my dad's shoulders and watch Danny when he played for Sheffield Wednesday so it was great to get to know him. Welcome to all from Swindon.

Finally, a personal welcome to the players who will parade around the ground before today's match. Although I won't know all of them, I will be aware of their names and their contribution to where the Club is today. There will be plenty I do know, some who I have regular contact with and others I won't have seen for a number of years, I can't wait. I hope you all enjoy the celebrations and today's match."



The First Ever - Team Manager Bert Cooke

It's highly likely that Bert Cooke will forever remain Rovers' longest serving manager. Born in Birkenhead, Cooke took the reins as Secretary-Manager in 1913 and remained in the position until 1935. He brought several of Rovers' most successful players to the Club, responsible for the signings of Dixie Dean, Pongo Waring and Ellis Rimmer. While not a manager in the modern sense as team selection was carried out by the directors he was also in charge of finances and travel, and he took charge of 578 league games.



Media Perspective

Past Heroes

'If you know yer history' is a line in a traditional anthem for Everton fans that continues..' it's enough to make your heart go 000....000..000' - and I think any modern day fan would agree that the ups and downs of your own team takes your heart to highs and lows on a regular basis and influences how you behave and how you feel.

All supporters respect the importance of the history of their club. The recent publication of Rovers 'Complete Record' salutes the past and while I've only the slightest of knowledge about Tranmere compared to Gilbert, Steve and Peter the authors, the unearthing of the photograph on this page from the late 1960s got me thinking about my memories of two of the group in the picture, Dave Russell and George Yardley.

The interview techniques are much different now, of course, we don't have managers and players huddled around the boot of a car with just one microphone to share. On many occasions we have to fight for our space to ask a question and sponsorship defines a clear pecking order of who can ask questions and when. But all those years ago I'd never have imagined I'd now be in the privileged position of conducting interviews with some of the great names in European football.

As for my memories, well Dave Russell was one of a select band of managers who was never sacked and I also seem to recall he was quite a snappy dresser. Always immaculate, as were his manners, and I've been told stories of how respectful of young reporters he always was, no matter how pointless a question seemed to be. He also made a habit of taking time to talk to the fans, something that many modern day managers could take a lead from. Most of all though, Dave was an innovator. Without him the Rovers

production line of local talent wouldn't have begun and players like Roy McFarland, Alan King, Ray Mathias and many more wouldn't have enjoyed the careers they have. Friday night football, the club colours of the 'Super Whites' and the first official club crest can all be attributed to this great servant of the club.

His greatest signing was arguably another face on the photo, George Yardley. He began his career at East Fife, one of Russell's stamping grounds. Yardley scored 68 league goals in 123 appearances with another 13 in cup ties he was the player every young fan wanted to be like. Alongside striking partner George Hudson and with youngster Ken Beamish supplying the crosses they really were something else ... and to think that George started his career as a goalkeeper. He once played for an amateur Scotland team against Wales in the same team as Sir Alex Ferguson and it was only a broken bone in his hand that led to him changing from stopper to striker. After he returned from injury he couldn't get a game, then as a stand-in forward he scored 4 in a reserve game for East Fife and the rest as they say is history!

We all love stories about our club's past and I was struck by this after a phone call from a Rovers fan (Mike I think) to Danny Baker's off the wall programme on 5 live last Saturday morning as I was driving to Hartlepool. He recounted a story from a game in September 1979 when Rovers in Division Four and then managed by John King lost 5-0 at home to Bournemouth. He remembered a pensioner who lived down his street called Mr Brown climbing over the perimeter wall at the Cowshed end and berating a player for his performance using his umbrella as a weapon. These

days Mr Brown would have been ejected and probably banned for life, back then he returned into the crowd to the cheers of the home fans.





Now plying his trade in the A-League for Wellington Phoenix, the three times leading scorer fondly recalled his time at Prenton Park.




The striker, who played more than 300 times for the Club between 1987 and 1994, fired the Club to promotion to the old Division Two (now the Championship) before reeling away in celebration.

Malkin said: "I've got so many great memories of my time at Tranmere. The people I used to play with and the staff were so brilliant. It was my best time in football.

"The Play Off Final is my favourite memory, I'd had a lot of injuries that season so to get the goal that got us promoted meant a lot to me and a lot to Wirral.

"We had so many great Friday night games they were tremendous times.


"Tranmere is a very special club for me."



With 19 points from 14 games, Swindon come to Prenton Park just above mid table and only three points adrift of the top six.

The Robins, led by manager Danny Wilson and assistant manager Peter Shirtliff a familiar face around Prenton Park have picked up four wins and seven draws, including victories over Southampton, Southend and Brentford.

Wilson's side has seen a number of changes from last season, with leading scorer Simon Cox departing for West Bromwich Albion. Coming into the County Ground were Gordon Greer, Jonathon Douglas, Scott Cuthbert, David Lucas and Alan O'Brien, while they have also been busy in the loan market, bringing in Simon Ferry and Ben Hutchinson from Celtic along with Alex Revell

Last weekend the Robins lost 1-0 at Norwich City, and after the game Wilson commented: "Apart from giving a sloppy goal away I thought we did quite well in large parts of the game.

"We maybe should have got something out of the game, but the difference is in that last third of the

"The rest of the play was very good and I thought we defended brilliantly at times against a very good Norwich side.

"We put in a good performance but unfortunately we gave a sloppy goal away and that's been the

"There was a little bit of a scramble, it hit somebody and then fell to Martin who scored. It's the rub of the green unfortunately but we didn't react to the second ball.

It's the type of luck that's going against us at the moment and falling to other people, but we've got to change that ourselves.

"Norwich are a handful and have got some good players throughout their side. But I thought we gave a very good account of ourselves, and if we were more clinical in wider areas, we possibly could have got something out of the game.

"I don't worry because we will get it right. We will just continue to work on the areas where we think we need to improve.

"Worry doesn't get you anywhere. We've got to maintain that we can play like we can, but we have to also make ourselves more of a threat in the final third.

"It's not all doom and gloom for us. We've had some very good performances but now need to go

Today's match is the 59th time the two sides have met and Rovers' 3655th Football League match. All four of the last games played between Tranmere and Swindon have gone the way of the home team with Antony Kay's goal giving Rovers a 1-0 win at Prenton Park last February.

The Players

David Lucas

David Lucas signed for Swindon Town FC on a free transfer in June 2009 following his release from Leeds United.

Lucas is reunited with former Sheffield Wednesday teammates Lee Peacock and Jon-Paul McGovern at The County Ground, and has signed a two-year deal. He began his career with Preston North End and went on to spend ten successful years with the Lancashire club. He also won International honours whilst with Preston, representing England at Under 21 level. He has since played for Sheffield Wednesday, Barnsley and Leeds.

Scott Cuthbert

Swindon Town announced the signing of Celtic defender Scott Cuthbert in July 2009.

The 22-year old came up through the ranks at Celtic Park and Captained the club's Under 19 and Reserve teams.

Cuthbert came through the ranks at Celtic and captained the Under-19's and Reserve teams. He made his debut for the first team in a pre-season friendly with Manchester City in August 2008.

Phil Smith

Phil Smith joined Swindon in late July 2006 from Crawley Town.

Smith had made 74 starts for Crawley Town during a two-year stay, which followed a year's spell at Margate where he made 35 starts. A dependable customer, Smith slotted into become the number one for the remainder of the 2006-7 season following Peter Brezovan's unfortunate injury.

Hasney Aljofree

Experienced centreback who arrives at The County Ground with plenty of Coca-Cola Championship experience.

Previous clubs include Bolton Wanderers, Dundee United and Plymouth Argyle, from where he signed for Swindon on a three-year deal in the summer of 2007.

Lee Peacock

Lee Peacock joined Swindon Town on 20th January 2006 on a free transfer from Sheffield Wednesday. The experienced frontman started his career at Carlisle United as a trainee, but after scoring 11 goals in 52 appearances he made the switch to Mansfield Town in October 1997 for £75,000. It proved to be a

productive spell with The Stags with 29 goals in 80 appearances attracting Manchester City who parted with £500,000 for his services. However, his time at Maine Road was not as successful as he would have liked due to injuries, but his next stop certainly was. A £600,000 move to Bristol City in August 2000 heralded the start of a successful four year spell at Ashton Gate. 54 goals in 131 league starts was the result of his stay with the Robins. Next up was Sheffield Wednesday, who he joined on a free transfer in the summer of 2004, on a free transfer.

Craig Easton

Craig Easton arrived at The County Ground in June 2007 to add further experience to the central midfield area.

The former Scotland Under 21 International joins up at The County Ground with over 300 league appearances under his belt.

Easton, 28, started his career at Dundee United where he came up through the ranks to make 162 league starts before departing in the summer of 2004.

He then spent a year at Livingston before joining Leyton Orient in July 2005.

Jon-Paul McGovern

Jon-Paul McGovern joined Swindon Town on Friday 31st August 2007, just hours before the close of the transfer window.

A lively winger who can operate out wide or through the middle, McGovern's arrival was a major boost to Paul Sturrock who had been chasing the player for some time.

The 26-year old was a key cog in Paul Sturrock's Sheffield Wednesday side which won promotion to the Coca-Cola Championship and made over 60 appearances for The Owls during two seasons at Hillsborough.

Kevin Amankwaah

Right back Amankwaah began his career at Bristol City. He eventually left Ashton Gate in February 2005, when he signed for Yeovil Town, initially on loan and then on a permanent basis. Amankwaah signed for Swansea City in July 2006 for a fee of £250,000. He left to join Swindon Town in June 2008.

Michael Timlin

Swindon Town manager Maurice Malpas dipped into the transfer market with the addition of Michael Timlin in May 2008.

DANGER MAN

Billy Paynter

Striker Billy Paynter signed for Swindon Town on Friday 31st August for an undisclosed fee from Southend United.

The 23-year old striker was restricted to just five league starts at Roots Hall after signing a three-year contract with the Blues from then Championship rivals Hull City in August 2006.

The 6'0 striker has scored 60 career goals and made 200 league starts and adds much-needed firepower to the Swindon attack.





He started his Fulham career as a left-winger but was converted to central midfield by Fulham's then Academy Director, Steve Kean Following the permanent switch to Wiltshire, 'Timms' has relocated from his London base to Swindon and began the season alongside Lilian Nalis in midfield.

Jonathon Douglas

Jonathan Douglas signed for Swindon Town on a free transfer in July 2009 following his release from Leeds United.

Douglas is a combative midfield player who leads by example. He started his career in Ireland with Monaghan United before a move to Blackburn Rovers in the summer of 2000. In August 2005 he made a loan switch to Elland Road and made 32 league starts during the season, before making the move permanent twelve months later.

Gordon Green

Gordon Greer became Town's first signing of the summer in 2009 on a free transfer following a successful loan spell with the club. Greer started his career with Clyde, making 32 appearances for the club before moving to England with Blackburn Rovers. Greer only appeared once in his one-year tenure at the

England with Blackburn Rovers. Greer only appeared once in his one-year tenure at the Ewood Park club before going on loan to Stockport County. Whilst at Edgeley Park, the centre-back made five appearances and scored



once before making the move back up to Scotland.

He spent the following three seasons with Kilmarnock, making 119 appearances and scoring three goals

Ben Hutchinson

Ben Hutchinson joined Swindon Town on loan from Celtic in a deal which will keep the striker in Wiltshire until 26th January 2010. The young striker signed for Celtic from Middlesbrough at the end of the January 2008 transfer window. He made nine appearances for Middlesbrough, and scored on his debut for the

He made his Hoops debut in a 3-0 win over Hearts at Celtic Park on February 16 2008, coming on as a late substitute.

Sean Morrison

Sean is a robust centreback who arrived in Wiltshire during the summer of 2007.

After impressive displays for the youth and reserve sides, Morrison was handed a call up to the first team and made appearances against Gillingham and Millwall at the end of the season.

Callum Kennedy

The f ormer Reading defender was granted a taste of first team action by former Town boss Paul Sturrock.

The youngster made a surprise start in the 4-1 win over Brentford in the Johnstone's Paint Trophy in September 2007.

Comfortable at left-back, Kennedy was a regular for the Town reserves last term and was taken on the pre-season tour to Austria in the summer of 2008

The player was handed a chance to impress in pre-season with games against Cardiff City and Plymouth Argyle.

Yinka Casal

Swindon Town signed 20-year old defender Yinka Casal on a two-year deal from Dutch club Cambuur just two days before the start of the 2008/09 season.

The versatile player began his career with Fulham's Academy before crossing the Atlantic for a spell with DC United, signing in February 2007.

He then signed for Cambuur Leeuwarden in the summer of 2007 and impressed during his spell with the Dutch club.

He went under the knife in the summer of 2009 to cure a knee injury and is currently recovering from surgery.

Simon Ferry

Simon Ferry joined Swindon Town on loan from



Celtic in a deal which will keep the midfielder in Wiltshire until 26th January 2010.

The midfielder rose through the Celtic youth ranks and trained regularly with the first-team squad when Gordon Strachan arrived at the club in 2005.

He was part of the Scotland Under-19 side that reached the final of the 2006 European Championships and then made his first-team debut on a pre-season tour of Poland.

After injury he made the bench for many of Celtic's games in the 2008/09 run-in and scored the goal that clinched an eighth successive title for the reserves.

Lloyd Macklin

Lightening-quick winger who was joined by Ben Joyce and Callum Kennedy on the pre-season tour of Austria in the summer of 2007.

Macklin came up through the ranks at SN1 and was handed his first taste of first team action in the home pre-season friendly with Bristol City. He then became the youngest ever play to represent Swindon at first team level when coming on against Brentford in the Johnstone's Paint Trophy in September 2007.

He went on to feature prominently for the youth and reserve teams as the 2007/08 campaign was played out and will be hoping to press for first team involvement now the new season is under way.



Club Connection - Steve Peplow

After beginning his career across the River Mersey at Liverpool, Steve Peplow moved to Swindon Town in 1970 where he made 40 league appearances. Four years later he arrived at Prenton Park when signed by Ron Yeats, and he quickly became a favourite with the fans.

A skilful winger, Peplow made 272 appearances for Rovers, scoring 47 times and making countless more for the likes of Ronnie Moore, Bobby Tynan and John James.

He is still a regular at Rovers home games.




As a player, Danny Wilson won the League Cup with both Luton Town in 1988 and Sheffield Wednesday in 1991. His equaliser for Luton against Arsenal with seven minutes remaining in the 1988 final is arguably the most famous match-saving goal in the club's history. He was also a runner-up in both domestic cup finals with Sheffield Wednesday in 1993. He also made 24 caps for Northern Ireland, scoring 1 goal.

After ending his career, Wilson managed Barnsley, Sheffield Wednesday, Bristol City, and Milton Keynes Dons, before being appointed manager of Hartlepool United in June 2006.

In the 2006-07 season, he guided Pools to second from top of League Two and promotion back to League One.

After leaving Hartlepool United last season, he took over the reigns at Swindon Town.

TRECTIMELINE

1884 - Formed as Belmont FC, the name Tranmere Rovers was adopted one year later.

1912 - The Club moved to its present home of Prenton Park in Birkenhead and gained membership of the Football League nine years later. Since then Tranmere has established itself as Merseyside's third club and one of the more successful lower division sides in the Football League.

1924 - A young Birkenhead player named William Ralph "Dixie" Dean made his debut for Tranmere at the age of just 16 years 355 days, a record that would stand for many decades. Dean scored 27 goals in 30 games for Tranmere before being transferred across the River Mersey to Everton where he scored a British record 60 League goals in 1927-28.

1932 - Tranmere draw 2-2 at home to Chelsea in the FA Cup Third Round.

1934 - Tranmere entered the record books in 1934 when Robert "Bunny" Bell scored nine goals - and missed a penalty - on Boxing Day in a 13-4 victory over Oldham Athletic.

1938 - The Club claimed their first ever Championship in the Football League, winning the Division Three North title and a place in Division Two for the first time.

1952 - Rovers claim a huge FA Cup scalp, beating Huddersfield Town 2-1 away from Prenton Park.

1961 - Dave Russell is appointed Rovers Manager and he changes the face of the Club forever by introducing an all white kit.

1972 - The Club has a record attendance as 24,424 pack into Prenton Park for an FA Cup Fourth Round tie against Stoke City.

1973 - Rovers perform another giant-killing act, this time against Arsenal in the Second Round of the League Cup, by winning 0-1 at Highbury - and in time become the only English Football League club to boast a 100% record at the famous old stadium.

1987 - A dark hour but a fantastic silver lining as Rovers secure their place in the Football League as a late goal from Gary Williams sees them defeat Exeter City 1-0.

1988 - The Club makes its first ever appearance at Wembley Stadium in the Mercantile Credit Football League Centenary Festival, beating Wimbledon and Newcastle before losing to eventual winners Nottingham Forest in the semi finals.

1990 - Tranmere take 22,000 fans to Wembley as a 2-1 win over Bristol Rovers sees them lift the Leyland DAF Cup.

1991 - Wembley success again, this time in the Play Offs as Tranmere gain promotion for the second time in three seasons under John King, this time beating Bolton 1-0 after extra time. That summer, perhaps the greatest football bargain of all time landed in Wirral as Rovers pulled off the signing of John Aldridge for just £250,000 from Spanish side Real Sociedad.

1994 - Rovers are denied a place in the Coca-Cola Cup Final in the cruellest way possible as defeat in a penalty shoot out against Aston Villa in the semi final leaves players and fans heartbroken.

1995 - Tranmere reach the Play Offs for the third year in a row, and for the third time fall short at the semi final stage and miss out on promotion to England's top flight.

1996 - Aldridge became player manager and guided the Club to Wembley for the sixth time four years later as Tranmere reached the League Cup Final, the last final to be played at the old Wembley. Along the way Tranmere gained a reputation for being League and FA Cup giantkillers, defeating Premier League sides such as Everton, Southampton, West Ham, Sunderland, Leeds, Middlesbrough and Coventry City in the space of two years.


2005 - Now back in Division One, Brian Little's side miss out on Play Off glory once again, this time Rovers losing to Hartlepool United following a penalty shoot out at Prenton Park.

2009 - The Club celebrates its 125 year anniversary. Who knows what lies ahead in the next 125?









1923 - The 1923-24 campaign saw the Third Division North expanded from 20 to 22 clubs. Rovers finished 12th (out of 22) at the close of that season - aided by the players shown on this postcard here - and captained by Tom Buchan 'holding the reins.'



1926 - Before a training session, the players enjoy their own 'photocall' as Ted Barton, John Johnson and George Jackson are on the picture, with Vince Matthews in charge of the camera. The backdrop is the Cowshed end of Prenton Park.





1938 - Rovers achieve their first major League success by winning the Third Division North Championship. The team included Reg Spencer, Duke Hamilton, Jack Curnow, Gillie Wassell, Ted Anderson, Archie Clark, Tom Davis, James Cassidy, Pongo Waring, Billy Eden and Ronnie Dellow.







1947 - The Football League returned to 'normality' in time for the 1946-47 season, and enabled Rovers in particular to complete the fixture list. Here, Rovers challenge Oldham at Boundary Park and despite having gone a goal down, then run out 2-1 winners.




1952 - The Rovers team who are set to face Chelsea in the FA Cup Fourth Round at Stamford Bridge, line up for a group photo outside their London hotel. Having already beaten First Division Huddersfield in the previous round, and despite their brave efforts, Chelsea run out eventual 4-0 winners.





1963 - Thanks to manager Dave Russell, White is now the predominant colour of Rovers home kit, having seen it replace the blue shirts previous seasons. Russell believed that Rovers required their own 'idendity' apart from their larger neighbours Liverpool and Everton.




1986 - The weather grasps yet another firm grip on the fixture calendar, in particular a home meeting with Swindon Town.




1991 - Rovers' dramatic Third Division



Cambridge United are the latest victims of the 'Gunslinger' here, as he helps Rovers to a 2-0 victory.





Thoughts from the stands...

Whoever would have thought the creation of the young lads of Belmont and Lyndhurst Cricket clubs - apparently alongside a ditch in Borough Road - would have stood the test of time for 125 years and given immense joy to so many in the intervening period.

After all, playing the new game of Association, rather than Rugby football, was merely a means to extend sporting activity throughout the winter after the cricket season finished. In 1884 they played their first full season as Belmont Football club before adopting the name that means so much to us these days.

Now, this is neither the time, nor place for a history lesson about our

formative years or to wax lyrical about the famous matches and players that have captured the imagination. The recently published 'Complete Record' nails that in every respect.

However, little of that massive tome was written from a personal perspective what shaped my relationship with Tranmere Rovers and the treasured memories I have, so the Editor's request affords me a rare luxury.

Compared to most of my friends I came to watching professional football comparatively late. My first Rovers match was the FA Cup replay against First Division Coventry City on 21 February 1968. Along with 20,000 others I squeezed into the Borough Road and watched in awe as George Yardley and George Hudson sent the Sky Blues packing. Oh, how we danced with joy on the muddy pitch at the final whistle.

But matches like that were few and far between. For a few years my visits to Prenton Park were sporadic, interlaced with trips to Goodison Park and occasionally, Anfield. Being part of a local league team that played on Saturday afternoons also limited my opportunities to watch how the professionals did it.

Regular Friday night football was not only a financial fillip for the club, it reawakened my interest in Rovers and our boozy Friday nights out commenced in the Borough Road side watching the tortuous labours of Jackie Wright's team of honest artisans. At least when Ron Yeats took over there was a sprinkling of glamour as St John and Bobby Graham strutted around Prenton Park.





I can remember little now about the matches we watched but can recall with a chuckle the night fullback Freddie Molyneux climbed over the Borough Road fence to confront his perennial barracker, a farmer called Donald, who stood near to us, inviting the said gentlemen to take the throw with the aside, "Go on mate, you reckon I'm rubbish, lets see if you can do better " The crowd cheered with delight at his discomfort. Through coaching and

Through coaching and training my team, Glasshouse in the Birkenhead and Wirral League, enduring friendships

were eventually forged with Dickie Johnson, Ray Mathias, Ray Stubbs, and Ronnie Moore, all of which cemented my affection for the club. By 1976, when we cheered the lads onto promotion with Ronnie our rapier sharp spearhead, I was very fortunate to have unfettered access behind the scenes. That, along with a career swerve into football journalism, was to pave the way for me being invited to become the club's programme editor some years later in 1984.

These days it's the funny things one remembers. Like the day pensioner Charlie Lindsey whacked the Bournemouth keeper across the backside with his walking stick in 1979 and was cheered loudly by the crowd as he was frogmarched from the cowshed to the police room even doffing his hat to Bill Bothwell en route! Press photographer Barry Farrell made a fortune from the photo having goaded the old boy into doing it!

By 1981 though sadly there was a terrible stench of decay around Prenton Park. I remember sitting in Jack Butterfield's office and him telling me we made more from the monthly celebrity dinners than we did from a 1,100 gate on matchdays. Times were desperate but everyone rallied around. From adversity came unity and strength.

A hardy band of supporters, myself included, fought to keep the club alive until the Council provided some security. Then Osterman's great American dream turned sour and once again, like a punch drunk boxer, we wobbled but thankfully avoided hitting the canvas.

That's what makes all the subsequent success we enjoyed under John King from 1987 onwards and to a degree John Aldridge later on - all the sweeter. You have to endure the bad times to appreciate the good and supporting a football club is a rollercoaster experience, and of course that is just as relevant in our current predicament.

Seeing Rovers promoted and win the Leyland DAF at Wembley was magical, equally the satisfaction of representing England in the Anglo-Italian Cup. Watching with pride as support blossomed and grew along with expectation. I'll confess I had tears in my eyes as 30,000 greeted the team for the Worthington Cup final in 2000 amid a cacophony of noise and fireworks.

No doubt the club's founders, those raw 15 year old church going lads, might also shed a tear - with glowing pride - if they could see us, and the stadium, 125 years on. Not bad for an idea conceived in a muddy ditch!

On This Date



...1891...

While competing within the Liverpool and District League, Rovers contest one of 32 friendly games played during the season, away to Liverpool Caledonians. Rovers win 1-0.

...1896...

In the First Round of the FA Cup, Rovers play host in an 'away' tie to Warrington St Elphin's. They win 5-1.

...1903...

It's another FA Cup tie, this time in the Second Round and at home to fellow Combination side Oswestry United. The sides cannot be separated in a 2-2 draw.

...1908...

Having won the Combination Championship the previous season, Rovers continue their good form and thrash Nantwich at Ravenshaw's Field 5-1 in a another Combination fixture.

...1914...

World War One is already underway when Rovers visit Chester in the Lancashire Combination Division One. They win 2-0 as a crowd of 5,000 spectators earn the home club gate receipts of £75.

...1925...

Rovers are now a fully-fledged Football League club playing in the Third Division North, and in the process of achieving a seventh place finish, beat Lincoln City 2-0 at Prenton Park in front of a crowd of 5,458. Centre forward Fred Marquis and outside left Bob White are the players on target.

...1931...

Ironically, Lincoln City provide the opposition once again, this time though at Sincil Bank in the Third Division North. Despite goals from George Lewis and Fred Urmson, Rovers eventually lose 2-4 in front of 7,623 spectators.

...1936...

Oldham Athletic arrive at Prenton Park, and watched by 6,091 spectators, then leave with a point as both sides draw 3-3. Pongo Waring grabs a brace to add to Joseph Carter's strike.

...1942...

In the midst of football played under wartime conditions, Southport visit Prenton Park for a Football League North One fixture. The result is a 2-2 draw played in front an estimated crowd of around 3,000.

...1953...

The first game played on this date after the Second World War sees Rovers visit Sealand Road in a Third Division North fixture. They are victorious scoring a 2-1 victory thanks to a Harold Atkinson brace in front of 6,824 spectators.

...1959...

Shrewsbury Town are the visitors to Prenton Park in the now relatively new surroundings of the Third

Division. 9,004 spectators watch Keith Williams, Tommy Eglington and Charlie McDonnell all help Rovers to a share of the spoils in a 3-3 draw.

...1973...

Having famously beaten Arsenal in the previous round, First Division Wolves are next in line for Rovers in the League Cup Third Round. But in front of an impressive crowd of 14,442 (some of which are housed under a roofless Cowshed!), their brave efforts throughout the 90 minutes cannot see them repeat their giant-killing feats and have to settle for a 1-1 and a replay to be played at Molinuex two weeks later. The hero of the last round, centre forward Eddie Loyden incidentally scores rovers' goal.

...1980...

The team is under the guidance of new player manager Bryan Hamilton, and Clive Evans and Jim Lumby's brace sees Rovers beat Bury in a Division Four game 3-1 at Prenton Park witnessed by a crowd of 2,432 the biggest home gate since Hamilton took over at the beginning of that month.

...1989...

In their challenge for an eventual play-off spot, Rovers are halted in their tracks with a Halloween night horror show at Gay Meadow. Despite a goal from Mark Hughes, Shrewsbury Town are 3-1 winners in a game which attracts a crowd of 4,927.

...1998...

A share of the spoils against Cheshire neighbours Stockport County, as both sides draw 1-1 at Prenton Park. 6,597 witness amongst other things Scott Taylor scoring for Rovers.

...2000...

A dramatic night at Prenton Park ends in a dream victory for Rovers as it's as Premiership Leeds United who are the latest victims of the hosts giant killing feats during that era. Leeds are two goals to the good thanks to Darren Huckerby, but then 11,681 look on as Steve Yates capitalises on Andy Parkinson equaliser, and who then goes on to score a sensational extra time winner, having already seen the sides draw 2-2 in normal time.

...2006...

A forgettable night at Prenton Park for the majority of the 2,036 spectators, which sees not only a dreary contest but also any hopes Rovers have of making the Quarterfinals of the LDV Vans Trophy in a single goal defeat to Darlington.

Rough Treatment

"I'm expecting to be inundated with complaints about knees, hips and ankles today. No, not from our present crop of crocks but from the ex-players who will be attending today's match."

"It's always the same with ex-players, they all have an ailment, a sore knee or more than average wear and tear because they played when you just got on with it. Not so many years ago, players would go over on an ankle and be told to stamp it on the ground to make it better. Even when the stamping caused the bone to stick through the skin some were told to grit their teeth and get on with it. That's my problem, I was born 20 years too late, I would have fitted into that culture like a snugly fitting sock. My stock response to injuries of "shut up and get on with it" would not have seemed as out of place at it does today. The problem today is that players are a bit more informed, you can't bluff them because they've always got a mate with the same injury who was treated differently and got over their injury quicker. I only typed that paragraph to get the old players talking about how it used to be. If you were standing by one at bar and have just had to sit through a 15 minute story about what it was like in the olden days when you headed the lace of the ball and saw stars, shame. Seriously, a welcome to all our ex-players and I hope you have as an enjoyable day today as we will have seeing you.

Today's column should have the word injury replaced with illness because that's our big problem at the moment. As you know, Michael Ricketts missed 2 matches through illness but started training again on Monday although he still wasn't 100%. Not taking his medication as instructed would not have helped. The doc had told him to get some Beecham's Powders but unfortunately, they don't sell them in Harrods and he won't shop anywhere else. Shay Logan has also been ill and it was very unfortunate that his illness just so happened to coincide with a double training session on Monday with the afternoon session comprising of 20 x 200m sprints with exercises in between. At least he got over it quickly and was able to come in on Tuesday full of the joys of sprint and a bounce in his step. Shay has trained all this week so will be available for selection today.

The only player who remains ill is John Welsh. He has been off since Tuesday and the Doc recons he may not have recovered sufficiently to be involved today. I'm writing this on Wednesday due to it being a special programme so we still have a few days for him to get over it. If he is still not right towards the end of the week I'll probably leave him because illness knocks more out of you than injury. It will be difficult for him to last 90 minutes if he was still on his sick bed on Thursday or Friday. We'll just have to wait and see.

Charlie Barnett has been struggling with his upper back this week. He tried to keep up with me and Craig Curran on the weights on Monday afternoon and he's just not built for it. We were in Total Fitness and I told him to go over to where they have those pink and mauve dumbbells with little handle on them but he wouldn't listen. I think he was frightened of all the slim young ladies in there. Anyway, he tried to keep up and now it looks as if he will be out for 2 to 3 weeks which is a shame because he's banned for 3 weeks anyway for a sending off that never was. It just means he'll spend it in the happy home with Bas Savage and me.

Talking of Bas, he's coming on leaps and bounds. That's a bad idiom to use because he can't leap and he can't bound but he is still making really good progress. Bas is now able to run at half pace and has stepped up his ball work so we've progressed from him trapping a bag of cement to his second touch being a header. Some things don't change even after injury. Me and him play a form of football golf every day as a warm up and he even won one hole out of 12 on Monday so I'm going to have to start using my right foot soon. The problem with him progressing so well is that he can now see that he's not far off doing some proper work and that's frustrating for him. The carrot is dangling just in front of his nose, mind you, in his case means it's quite a way off. Bas is still looking at early next year to be involved again but, with my other hat on, the quicker the better."

Justin Williams & Tony Coombes on the Tranmere treasure trove case...





Something of a puzzle for this week's Memorabilia.

These 3 fixture signs were found a few years ago in a box which contained a small collection of 1960s programmes and some old Rovers newspaper cuttings.

The box had been left behind in a loft in Eastham by the previous occupants and came my way as the new owners were having a clear out.

Measuring 36cm x 16cm (about 14" x 6") the signs are made of cardboard and are intriguingly printed on both sides. Covering the fixtures for the first team games against Mansfield Town, Peterborough United and the Cheshire League fixture against local rivals New Brighton the signs can be traced to the back end of the 1967/68 season (February and April 168).

Pictured here with the match day programmes for the two league games to give a better idea of their size, the signs must have been used to advertise that days' opponents as they are printed up with the words "TODAY" and "TONIGHT", so clearly they were only for use on the day of the game.

Can anyone cast any more light on these items?

Were they pinned up at the turnstiles, or other entrances at the club to remind the faithful who we were playing (remember this was before the days of Tannoy announcements)? Or were they displayed elsewhere maybe buses or local shops? If you know the answer then please contact the club at the address printed on page 3.

With of course no access to email, especially during World War Two, most players were notified by the Club in relation to team selection simply by postcard.

This particular example relates to young player Bill Anderson, a member of Rovers 'C' team who assisted the Club while playing in the Birkenhead League.

The card - just one of a set of many including team photographs that were kindly donated to our programme producer recently - is signed by Jimmy Moreton requesting Bill's attendance in order to play Hoylake.

A more in depth feature into this unique collection will be covered in a future programme.



Swindon Town v Tranmere Rovers

Football League Division Three County Ground - Wednesday 24th March 1979 Price: 15p Pages: 16

For readers who are very recent recruits to the super white army today's programme nostalgia spot will serve as a tasty reminder that this is far from the only season Rovers have found themselves caught up in affairs at the wrong end of the table equivalent to the third tier of the league.

Indeed, as we leaf through these thirty year old pages, we shall see that our position was even worse than the (hopefully!) temporary struggle we are currently experiencing.



MATCH CONTEXT

Amazingly the Division Three table, as it affected Swindon and ourselves, bore a striking resemblance to the one you were no doubt studying with a certain amount of apprehension before you come to the match today. Taking a far inferior goal difference into account, (I told you there were great similarities back in 1979!) Rovers were effectively seven points from safety, as we sat just one place off the bottom. The Robins, meanwhile, just like their present-day counterparts, had their eyes on the prize of promotion to Division Two which, in those days, of course, could only be achieved by finishing in the top three. With several games in hand on most of their rivals, the five point gap looked as though it could still be closed, even with the award of only two points for a win. No doubt Bob Smith's side viewed the arrival of Johnny King's strugglers to their home territory with the hungry anticipation of some of the merciless predators currently brought to our television screens in Sir. David Attenborough's brilliant "Life" series!

PROGRAMME DESIGN AND LAYOUT

Somehow the very plain front cover seemed to reflect a much simpler footballing age than the one in which we find ourselves today. Not even the usual details of the date or competition details were allowed to clutter up the very uncomplicated red and white design. What a contrast to the glossy front cover in your hands at the moment with a plethora of sponsorship names alongside the action photo.

Inside it was a case of black and white print and a few photos with a plain red border around the double pages of the centre spread.

PROGRAMME CONTENT

Ironically, that centre spread was the "In Town Today" feature on Rovers, so the colour looked particularly out of place given our colours at the time of royal blue shorts to accompany our white shirts. I wonder if any of the smiling faces beaming out of the full-page team photo will be among the parade of former players on view today. If they are, no doubt they will be framed by much less hair than they were in 1979 when long locks and curly perms were very much in vogue. Sadly one popular player who took part in this match won't be with us this afternoon. The late and much-maligned John Kerr was bravely trying to take up the goal-scoring mantle from Ronnie Moore who had moved to Cardiff City before the transfer deadline. Tony Pullein, in his background piece on Tranmere, found the deal rather surprising, writing that the £120,000 record transfer fee may not appear to be such good business if Ronnie's departure contributed to our relegation. Surprising as that particular leaving of Prenton Park may have been, it was certainly not quite as newsworthy as the subsequent exit by the same Rovers legend thirty years later!

The programme also contained a new Swindon team photo taken, for some strange reason, inside the social club. One member of The Robins squad, who didn't face us in the match, is nowadays a very well-known face (and voice!) on our weekend television screens! (See quiz question below).

Among the adverts for local businesses was one for Rimes Coaches inviting Swindon fans to follow the team on the long trip to Bury the following Tuesday. I would guess that those loyal Town fans sitting in the Cowshed Stand today, after a journey of similar length, paid slightly more than the 1979 fare of £2:55!

MATCH OUTCOME

In spite of another fine strike by John Kerr, Swindon goals by Rowland (2), Mayes and Mc Hale pushed us nearer the dreaded drop. As we were relegated come May, The Robins fell short of their promotion target. For the sake of everybody inside Prenton Park today let's hope both outcomes are different this time around!

IARROLD

Five things you may...or may not...know about United...

Norwich City was founded in 1902 and lost its first competitive match an FA Cup Preliminary Round tie at Lowestoft Town 5-0. The club was wound up in November 1918, but was reformed three months later.

City joined the Football League in Division Three (South) in 1921 and finished
 16 in its inaugural season:

Norwich's biggest honours to date have been two League Cup victories. They became only the second club to lift the trophy after a 4-0 aggregate win over fourth-division Rochdale in the two-legged 1961/62 final, and then beat Sunderland 1-0 in the 1984/85 final at Wembley (both sides were relegated that season). They have also won the Second Division (Championship) title on three occasions 1971/72, 1985/86 and 2003/04 and won the Division Three (South) title in 1933/34.

- Jeremy Coss was never a regular goalscorer from midfielder but, twice in 1993/94 season, he spectacularly went into City's history books. His stunning volley gave The Canaries a famous victory over Bayern Munich at Munich's Olympic Stadium the only English side to beat Bayern there (he also scored in the return leg to send Norwich through). He repeated the stunning strike on the final day of that season to become the last player to score in front of the terraced Kop at Anfield as City beat Liverpool 1-0.

Norwich's famous fans include chef Delia "Where are you? Let's be having you."
 Smith, who is also the club's joint majority shareholder, and Stephen Fry.







Stadium safety and matchday information



Tranmere Rovers Football Club want every person, whether a regular or visiting supporter, to enjoy their day with us.

The following safety policy shows our commitment to ensuring safety within the Stadium.

Stadium Safety Policy

Spectators' safety at the Stadium is of paramount importance. We therefore make public our safety policy which is as follows:

- Provide an organisational structure for the implementation of safety on matchdays.
- Provide training for all matchday staff.
- Comply fully with the Stadium Safety Certificate.
- Undertake to carry out emergency procedure practices during events.
- Arrange for emergency contingency plans
- Maintain records of all events held at the Stadium.

- Liaise with all other agencies on matters relating to safety and ground control.
- Positively encourage spectators to communicate safety issues to the Club.

Ground Regulations

NOTICE: Entry to the Ground is expressly subject to acceptance by the visitor of the Ground Regulations and the rules and regulations of FIFA, UEFA, The Football Association, The FA Premier League and The Football League in respect of the relevant

competition. The Ground Regulations incorporate the Club's Customer Charter. Entry to the Ground shall constitute acceptance of the Ground Regulations.

Copies of the Ground Regulations are on display on signs in all stands at Prenton Park.

No Smoking

In conjunction with the Football League, Prenton Park is a designated no smoking venue. This affects all seating, hospitality suites and concourses.

Family Friendly Areas

For the 2008-09 season, the Club will again be operating Family Friendly Areas within the ground. We are also taking part in the Football League's 'Enjoy the Match' campaign aimed at enhancing the matchday experience in Family Friendly Areas.

These are recommended for families and perhaps some new supporters. These areas are close to entrances, exits and facilities. Specially trained stewards will be close by. We will be asking supporters to respect the fact that families and young children are in these areas.

Code of Conduct for Family Friendly Areas:

Football is a family sport and your safety and enjoyment is of paramount importance. Please encourage the players, respect the match officials and help to create a great atmosphere. The Family Friendly Areas of our stadium are subject to a zero tolerance policy with regard to anti-social behavior:

- *Threatening behavior
- *Foul or abusive language
- *Racial, homophobic or discriminatory abuse are strictly forbidden and will result in ejection from the ground and possibly arrest.

Your support and adherence to this Code of Conduct is greatly appreciated.

If you witness anti-social behavior:

The only UEFA European Fixture to take place at Prenton Park was a UEFA Cup First Qualifying Round Tie First Leg between Shelbourne (Ireland) & Rangers (Scotland) on Wednesday 22nd July 1998.

Due to fears of sectarian violence, and after discussions between the two clubs and UEFA, it was decided that Prenton Park would be the venue for the first leg with Shelbourne as the Home team.

The match finished 3-5 in favour of Rangers after Shelbourne (at the time an amateur side) had earlier taken a shock 3-0 lead. As a result of this game, Rangers were fined

25,000 Swiss Francs and warned by UEFA after some of their fans caused trouble at the game. UEFA also told Rangers that should they be drawn to play in Ireland in the future in UEFA Competition they would be required to fulfil the fixture.


