I've said it before but there are no easy games in this division, especially at this time of the season when most teams in the league have something to play for, and today is no different with both us and them having our own respective causes to fight for.

Away from the game today, we sent Vincent Pericard away to Lilleshall last week to try and get to the bottom of out properly.

He's not 100%, but we're trying to get this little niggle into some sort of context so that we can treat it properly and then we can see what Vince is really all about, which I'm confident we will before long.

We've had some massive games in recent weeks, and it has been brilliant to see so many fans come out to support us both for the home game against Norwich, and the away matches at Brighton and Southampton.

We're moving into a really crucial stage of the season now, and it would be great to see you continue to support the players in the same way you have throughout the season, and hopefully we can reward you with some good performances – starting today.

This is the fifth year the club have run such games, which not only offer fans a unique chance to play at The County Ground – but also the chance to score in front of the Town End in the famous red and white!


This year there are two 90-minute games, one open for players aged 16 – 30 years old and a veteran's game for players aged 30 and over.

It's the **second part** of our feature-length interview with Andrew Fitton, Nick Watkins and Jeremy Wray. To conclude, we look to the future of the squad, The County Ground and football in general. —

Charlie Austin has been a revelation and his goals have been key in the last few weeks...

AF: His is a success story for football. In the preamble at the Football League awards [March], the MC mentioned the significance of someone going from being a 20-year-old bricklayer to someone who scores 13 goals in 15 games within six months. For him to get noticed by England's Under-21 squad is also great, so it's one of the greatest stories of the season,

bar none.


JW: Not all of our signings have been a success, but the vast majority have and the reason is that they're getting exposure and game time they probably wouldn't have got elsewhere. So many big clubs import foreign players into the first team, which means there are young lads sitting there – probably financially comfortable – but with no game time. We give them exposure and it works for both clubs. It gets difficult at the end of the season. If we go up, presumably teams are happy for their

players to continue their development here, but that becomes harder if we don't make it. And if we don't sign them, you have to be careful that the standard doesn't drop. You just have to ride the wave while you're on it. We've achieved a level we don't want to drop below; this is the new 'norm'.

At what stage do you look to strengthening for next season?

AF: It has started already.

Last year Danny and I spent a lot of time going through our targets of players for each position. This year

it's slightly different because we have a better starting position. We know what we'd like our squad to look like in terms of position, types of player and age - so we have a better view of what we're looking for. Our biggest challenge is deciding whether we would want the same players in League One as we would the Championship. But, one of the things we are looking to do is go after a player that will improve what we've got. So, the first question is, is this player good enough for Swindon Town? If yes, the second question is, can this player play at a higher level, because that's where we want to be. I don't think we've got a Championship squad yet, but we have players playing at a higher level that can cope with League One, or the Championship.

You can't tell me that David Lucas couldn't play in the Championship, or Jonathan Douglas, or Charlie Austin.

NW: We have already made contractual commitments to members of the squad, while other members, such as Douglas, are already on contracts from this season that run for another year. The nucleus of the squad will be here regardless of what league we're in. The idea is to keep this squad together, and we have a strong nucleus. Then, depending on where we are, Danny will tell us what he will need for the specific division we're in. I imagine if we were to go up, his targets might be slightly different than if we were to be competing in League One again. It's horses for courses.

JW: What we've built already needs

to be able to either go for promotion again next year, or compete at a higher level. This is a hard league to get out of, especially this year with the teams that have come down. On paper, next year this league could be weaker – that's no disrespect to the teams potentially coming down, but the league might well look weaker if the teams at the top now do go up. So, if we didn't make it this year, we'd like to consider ourselves favourites next year.

Given our success this year, do you expect teams to come looking at our players?

NW: I never travel in hope with regards to thinking about whether people will bid for our players. We'll treat it as it comes, but Simon Cox is a case in question. The offer from West Brom came from leftfield, but he went to develop his career. He had a year left on his contract but he is an ambitious young lad. He would have done a job for us had he stayed because he loved the club, but we had a duty as a club to support him as a player and from a personal point of view. We have to be mindful of that with our players, but also we want to become a stepping stone by allowing our players to play in the Championship with us.

Stadium redevelopment is a hot topic at the moment, where are you with that?

NW: We're in Phase One, which is to set about creating the financial feasibility model and a business case needed to aid the development of a new stadium, to identify how a new stadium that could cost a lot of money - maybe up to £20million can be sustainable. We don't want to stick another debt milestone around the club's neck, or create something to which there is no demand for. All of this, looking at financial viability and commercial reality, will take 12 -14 weeks to engage, discuss and look at our options. Then we will look at outline planning from that point, see if it stands up to test and move into the design side, which is Phase Two. We've met with developers who have worked on things we think are akin to The County Ground, so redeveloping on site - as opposed to moving to a new stadium. We need people who have done that. who have maintained maximum capacity while working on new developments. We have various schemes put in front of us, but we need to know what is possible in terms of finance and planning before we look at the design. We're in dialogue with the council at this stage and we will keep them informed of what we're doing.

JW: People look at what's gone on in the past and the Council have come in for a lot of criticism for not embracing previous projects, but that's unfair. Quite rightly, they may have looked at previous



administrations and wondered whether these were the right people to take the club forward. That's what we have to do; we have to convince them that we are good people, that we are credible and that what we want is for the good of Swindon. Hopefully if this is achieved, then it will reflect well on the Council that allowed it to happen at the time. That's what we're keen to do, and I hope we're close to selecting our development partners to help project manage. Then we'd be looking to put ideas to the Council and try and get support from them all along the way. We want a series of yeses' along the way so that when the final application is submitted, it's a mere rubber-stamping process.

There are plans and ideas we like above others, but to reveal them would give too much away! There are examples of work that has been done which we like, by various developers that are keen to work with us. They have a vast ream of ideas for Swindon and there are some that fit very well with what we want to do. Maybe we end up picking the best of various people's ideas, but it all comes back to budget, appetite... one thing we're convinced of is that we redevelop where we are now.

It's not like we're looking to make a huge return on the investment directly, it's just important that there are things that help support the club. We're not looking to put up houses and sell them on. What you need is a revenue stream that allows you to grow the club. A 20,000-seater stadium might need a hotel or other

leisure facilities, but it's about what is needed and we have various options we think could go into the site. First and foremost, the redevelopement must benefit the club and the community.


AF: We know what is needed for a Championship stadium, taking into consideration analysis of Championship clubs and crowds. We also know what's needed for a League One stadium, and there's a big difference between the two. In League One, you don't actually need anything that holds more than 15,000. In the Championship, you need the capacity to take up to, and more than 20,000 – possibly up to 25,000. The town will dictate to us whether we need a capacity of 15,000 or 25,000.

JW: What would frustrate me is if the football improved on the pitch, but we couldn't entice a bigger crowd, meaning we'd have to draw a line at what would be our limit. That would be sad, but we're not foolish to admit that, if that's the case.

Non-matchday revenue streams seem to be the key issue with any redevelopment...

AF: We are increasingly one of the best conferencing facilities in the town already, but market research tells us that there is a desire for another hotel in the town particularly with good car parking, which we would have. These things are a given, but you would need to create space for other activities. It could be like Preston, which has the National Football Museum and



a walk-in medical centre, both of which contribute rent, or it could be business offices or a leisure centre, but we're still doing work on that.

NW: It has to be an asset that makes money seven days of seven, not one out of 14.

Going back to the state of the club when you took over, has that been the most frustrating part of your involvement?

AF: I'm not so worried about the finances of the club, because someone has paid for that, but what you have to do as a club is try and grow, and it didn't. The club was in a terrible state and we lost fans as a result. People don't come back just because you've taken over; you have to tempt them back, to make them fall in love again. That's what makes me angry, the destruction that was done before us – it makes our task very difficult.

JW: It's the one thing we haven't cracked. I guess we want to know that what we're doing on the pitch is wanted by the town. It's easy to get carried away with developing the stadium and moving the club forward, and we'd love to go ahead with our plans, but it's got to be wanted. No-one wants a white elephant. There's no ego trip involved here, this progress needs to be sustainable. A lack of interest would be a great shame, because we would have to reign in our own ambitions.

AF: We have the infrastructure of a Championship club, but we have the crowd base of a League One club, so the costs of one and the benefits of the other! So, it's up to us to attract people back to help us grow again. But we saw more than 2,000 supporters at Southampton, 6,000 at Fulham... compare that to Leeds, who have the highest average away support at just fewer than 2,500 – we have proved we are a big club. We may struggle at Carlisle on a Tuesday night, but we generally take a good crowd – which shows there is a base there.

You discussed applying business models to football, but have you found the nature of football, the ups and downs, difficult to cope with in terms of running a business?

NW: Andrew has been involved in sport all his life so is used to the affects of winning and losing. Similarly, Jeremy is involved in gambling, so wins and loses all the time! I was also involved in rugby, at Wasps, and you have highs and lows. Everybody has worked hard to reestablish the club on and off the field, we're all working in harmony and it was gratifying to see this reflected at the Football League awards, when we were nominated for two categories and all of this is important along the way to benchmark the progress we're making.

What would you say are the biggest problems in football at the moment?

AF: I've spent a lot of time with the Football League and I've been trying to enforce the message that we need to address the problems plaguing football, and the need for financial prudence. It's not fair on clubs trying to run their businesses properly. The example I gave the other day was that if someone gave me £70million, I could probably deliver Premier League football to Swindon, but I wouldn't be able to sustain it. It's completely unfair, therefore, for a club that's done that to just drop down a division, and still receive parachute payments from the Premier League, from my perspective, they need to be told to go back down to the bottom and start again.

JW: Football will definitely come through the current climate, but not without casualties. Casualties will be healthy, although it will be horrible for those actual clubs involved. Even then, clubs rise again. Chester City have gone out of business, but already there is a team in place to try and rise again, much like AFC Wimbledon have done.

Football needs a reality check. Look at Portsmouth, you can't help but be sympathetic to those on the periphery who have been affected, creditors like the local builder. He might be owed £20k, which is less than a players' salary, but to him, that's his business. For the club to go into administration and wipe out that debt, I can't believe that's right. It shouldn't be allowed. People ask us why we didn't go bust first and then rebuild: we would have saved ourselves £6million, but you then drop down the divisions. So we decided to go down the more honourable route. Also, HMRC are now taking a less sympathetic route to football clubs as well. Clubs can't avoid those bills any more. That said, there will always be individuals who will supply the next bit of money clubs need to operate.

NW: Nature is stronger than man and there will be a cull. The weaker teams will struggle and it can't go on as it is. Football can't sustain the wages at certain levels and there will be a levelling out. Hopefully those who survive will do so in a more sustainable world.

ranmere Rovers have been involved in a relegation dogfight for a large proportion of the season, and remain one of at least seven clubs who could face the

drop as the campaign moves into its final stages.

Rovers started the season under the now infamous stewardship of John Barnes, and the former Liverpool man's ill-fated reign began in a similar vein as it finished.

A 4-2 win over Gillingham in the second match of the season was then followed by six consecutive defeats, including a 4-0 home drubbing against Charlton Athletic – a run which turned a large section of Rovers' fan base against Barnes.

And, despite a brief resurgence which saw Rovers register four points from six against Colchester United and Wycombe Wanderers, a subsequent 5-0 hammering at the hands of Millwall sealed Barnes' fate, and he was sacked a few days later.

Club Physiotherapist Les Parry then took control of the side, but did little to turn around their fortunes early on, suffering five defeats from his opening six matches, including a 4-1 loss to Town at Prenton Park in late October.

However Parry, who had recently been confirmed as boss until the end of the season, then went on to guide Rovers through the Christmas period without defeat; instilling an optimism in the fans in the process that had been largely absent up until the turn of the year.

A determined, if inconsistent run of results has brought Parry's side up to today's clash, with five draws, five defeats, and four wins serving to keep them in and around a relegation scrap they are hoping to pull away from as the season draws to a close.

Rovers fans will be hoping their side can improve their dismal away form this afternoon by registering only their third win away from Prenton Park in what has been a forgettable season for today's visitors.



Goalkeeper Luke Daniels joined Tranmere Rovers back in the summer in a season-long loan deal from Championship side West Bromwich Albion.

The Bolton-born 22-year old is a former Manchester United trainee and England Under-18 international who joined the West Brom ranks in the summer of 2004.

He played for Shrewsbury Town on a season-long loan deal last term, playing a key role as they reached the League Two Play-Off Final. He saved two penalties in the semi-final shootout victory over Bury.

In Tranmere colours, he has been a regular between the sticks and made his 33rd League One start for the club in last Saturday's away defeat at Brighton & Hove Albion. He is yet to make a first team appearance for West Brom but his experience this term could play an important part of his future development.

GOODISON

Ian Goodison joined Tranmere Rovers in February 2004 during Brian

Little's tenure as boss and was an instant success at the heart of the defence.

ROVERS

The former Jamaican international has since made almost 250 league appearances and he became

team

captain in the 2006-07 season.

He was rewarded for a string of Man of the Match awards with a new two and a half year contract in November 2006 and went on to become the Fans' Player of the Season two years in a row.

Goodison made his debut for Jamaica in 1996 in a friendly against Guatemala and he scored his first international goal in the fixture. With over 100 caps for his country, the defender has vast experience on both the domestic and international scene.

WELSH

Andy Welsh, a former England Under-21 international midfielder, joined Tranmere Rovers in the summer of 2009 from Premier League side Hull City, where he had spent the previous four seasons.

The 26-year old began his career at Liverpool and made his debut at the age of 18. He made seven appearances in the 2004-05 season and won his first of eight England Under-21 caps.

He spent the first half of the 2005-06 season on loan at Hull before joining The Tigers on a

permanent basis. Last season he spent time on loan at Carlisle United and Bury and also has a temporary spell with Chester City to his name.

Welsh has been a regular in the side this term and scored his first of four goals this term against Gillingham, with further efforts finding the net against Colchester, Brighton and Leeds.

CURRAN

Craig Curran is a young striker who made a stunning impact at the end of the 2006-07

season, scoring with his first touch just 30 seconds after coming off the bench at Prenton

Park against Brighton & Hove Albion. The frontman followed it up with a

hat-trick on the final day of the season against Brentford. The treble was

scored inside the first 36 minutes of the game, breaking a record set by Tranmere legend Dixie Dean as the youngest ever player to score a hat-trick in a Rovers shirt.

Curran is a product of the youth system at Tranmere and was top scorer for the reserves in 2006-07. He made 38 appearances in the 2007/08 which were predominantly off the bench and missed the majority of last season through injury.

SAVAGE




28-year old striker Bas Savage joined Tranmere in July 2008 and scored on his debut for Rovers against Swindon at The County Ground in a 3-1 defeat.

he joined the Prenton Park side from Millwall on a two-year contract.

His career started at Reading in 2002 and he became a popular figure at The Madejski Stadium after joining from non-league football. He has also spent time with Wycombe Wanderers, Bury and Bristol City before joining Millwall in January 2009.

The frontman has made just a handful of appearances for Tranmere this term after injury, making his first outing of the season against Southampton in a 2-1 victory on Saturday 6th March.

Savage is known for his trademark moonwalk goal celebration, which has gained cult fame on TV's Soccer AM, although Swindon fans will hope the visitors have little reason to celebrate this afternoon.



Long-serving Tranmere Physio Les Parry took charge of the first team following the departure of John Barnes in October 2009.

Barnes was appointed manager at Prenton Park in the summer of 2009, assisted by former Liverpool and Tranmere player Jason McAteer. The duo endured a disastrous start and won just three of the opening fourteen games in charge.

Parry, assisted by Shaun Garnett and Wayne Allison, led the team to an improvement in results and was appointed manager until the end of the season two months later.

Parry started out on a parttime basis before working with Tranmere's first team in 1993 on a full-time basis, racking up more than 900 consecutive games in the process.

As caretaker manager he has a win ratio of around 33% and goals from former Town midfielder Gareth Edds and Andy Welsh helped secure his first victory as boss in October 2009, a 2-1 win over Brighton & Hove Albion.

Tranmere are currently right in the midst of a relegation battle and host Wycombe Wanderers, Exeter City and Millwall in their remaining games as well as trips to Walsall, Brentford, Colchester United and Stockport County.



aul Bodin was a key member of Town's 1992/93 play-off winning campaign. He featured in both of the play-off semi-final games against Tranmere Rovers before scoring the decisive penalty at Wembley to secure promotion to the Premier League with victory against Leicester City.

The official matchday programme caught up with the Welshman ahead of today's League One contest to look back at Town's rise to the top-flight.

What do you recall of the play-off games against Tranmere?

At home we managed to come out of it with a 3-1 win. Dave Mitchell and Craig Maskell took advantage of a couple of mistakes at the back, and Steve Vickers notched an early own goal. We expected a very tight game at home and were delighted to take a 3-1 cushion back up to Prenton Park.

There was a tremendous atmosphere for the return leg. We wanted to keep it tight at the back but they managed to get back in it but thankfully Craig Maskell and John Moncur came up trumps to get us through to the final.

There were some big names in both sides too...

Glenn as player-manager was

fantastic throughout the season and he was thorough on and off the pitch. We had a very settled team with around 16 players being used consistently throughout the season. The Tranmere side had Pat Nevin and Gary Stephens in it with John Aldridge also involved – all three played international football!

How did the players deal with the promotion pressure that season?

We went into the play-offs on the back of a great run. The Birmingham game was significant having come back from 4-1 down to win 6-4; that was important. I managed to score a couple in the final run of games against Peterborough, Luton and Notts County. The key to the season was a settled squad with continuity throughout the side.

Do you think Town have what it takes to go all the way this term?

Definitely! The side has got better and better as the season has gone on. We can hold onto 1-0 leads and there are goals in the team as well. Charlie Austin has been scoring regularly with Billy Paynter having his best season in a Swindon shirt.

The football has been fantastic – which has been great for the younger players at the club to watch and learn.

STAR MAN

ranmere Rovers signed lan Thomas-Moore on transfer deadline day in January 2008 and the striker has ten goals to his name so far this term.

The 33-year old striker is the son of former Tranmere manager Ronnie and Moore junior began his career at Prenton Park in 1994 and his early form earned him England Under-21 caps.

After being sold to Nottingham Forest for £1 million in 1997, where he played in the Premier League, he then moved to Stockport County for £800,000 in 1998. He had a goal ratio of one in four games for County and became the club's top scorer, which soon brought him to the attentions of near neighbours Burnley and he joined the Turf Moor outfit for £1 million in 2000. He spent five seasons at Burnley before signing for Leeds United and then joined Hartlepool United in the summer of 2007. It was to be a short stay at Victoria Park with six goals in 22 league starts before making the deadline day switch to Tranmere.

The number nine has now made more than 500 league appearances during an established Football League career and he will be hoping to utilise all of his experience to help edge Rovers away from the League One drop zone.

The latest departure is Matt Ritchie. The Portsmouth winger was recalled by his parent club just after the deadline and promptly made the bench for Pompey's Premier League defeat against Tottenham Hotspur at White Hart Lane in front of 35,000 - very different to Victoria Park!

And one last question; how much will depend on the outcome of Swindon Town at Millwall on Saturday 8th May?


We just have the one more





Once Town boss Danny Wilson has targeted a player to add to the squad, Football Secretary Louise Fletcher's work starts to get the deal 'over the line', part of her busy County Ground role...

Name: Louise Fletcher Job Title: Football Secretary Year Joined: 2005

How did you get started at Swindon Town FC?

I started working in kiosk six, which was up in The Arkell's Stand serving both home and away fans. Before working for the club I had been a Season Ticket Holder in both the Town End and Don Rogers Stand. I used to come to games regularly with my Dad and brother.

What's your current role with the company?

I am the Football Secretary and I am wholly responsible for the club's football administration. I manage and facilitate the registration, transfer and reengagement of all players. I am also responsible for the management of all fixtures and maintaining the efficiency of all football administration matters. I also ensure compliance for the football club with all governing body rules and regulations. Another part of the role is to ensure all aspects of football rules, regulations and requirements are fully communicated to the Board, team manager and coaching staff.

Tell us about the most complicated you have had to complete...

Transfers within the EU require international clearance and transfers where agents are involved can also sometimes be time consuming. An example of this would be when 'the three amigos' arrived a few years back during one of the proposed takeover attempts. That was complicated – and expensive!

Which other departments do you work with the most?

Football management is the main one. Danny (Wilson) is the main point of contact from a footballing perspective whilst the Chairman and I are in regular dialogue. Nick (Watkins) the CEO is office-based so we speak every day whilst I also liaise with Peter (Shirtliff) a lot. I also have regular involvement with the accounts, marketing and media departments as well as stadium and operations.

What's the most satisfying part of your job?

The most satisfying aspect of the role is when you complete a player transfer. Once the confirmation letters come through from the FA and



Football League then I'm happy as it means the player is available to the club for selection. There have been occasions in the past when transfers have come extremely close to transfer deadlines, but that's the nature of football sometimes!

How do you unwind away from the office?

I like travelling, eating out and cake-making. On Sundays I try and catch up with my family... I have two nieces who are called Millie and Elise. They will be mascots one day!

Match Background

First Rovers' defender Steve Vickers obligingly headed Town in front while supporters were still finding their seats, then Dave Mitchell took advantage of another defensive slip to give us a third minute, 2-0 lead. Tranmere striker John Aldridge felt aggrieved that his header was ruled out, then Craig Maskell extended our lead to three before half time. John Morrissey made the score 3-1 ahead of the second leg trip at Prenton Park the following week.

Still the tension didn't stop.

again notched for Town


before an uncharacteristic foul from Glenn Hoddle allowed Kenny Irons to score from the spot,










"There are still seven games to go and you cannot take anything for granted," he said.


"It's going to be a difficult game, as they all are at this stage of the season.





DON DOWN'S SYNDROME GROUP


Our aim is to support people with Down's syndrome, their families and carers and also anyone with an interest in Down's syndrome by providing information, advice and support as well as raising general awareness. We are a parentled support group run by a committee of 14 volunteers and a registered charity - 1096089 - affiliated to the National Down's Syndrome Association. All our work is funded by our Group and the money is raised through jumble sales, sponsored walk, donations and grants from local companies and businesses.

The group provides opportunities for parents to support each other by organising trips to the theatre, theme parks, a Christmas party, barbecues, activity sessions and monthly baby/toddler support meetings. We aim to provide training and information through an annual training day aimed at teachers and teaching assistants and through seminars throughout the year. We also

support pre-schools, primary and secondary schools by providing school resource packs containing manuals, flash cards, software, DVD's, numeracy resources and books aimed at educating a child with Down's syndrome.

The Group also provides some specialist sporting activities – football training run in conjunction with Swindon Town Community Team. This training session is open to all children with a disability between the ages of 5 – 18. Tennis lessons with a specialist coach and fortnightly swimming lessons with a specialist swimming coach and working towards nationally recognised qualifications. The Group also runs weekly speech and language therapy sessions.

stiffness and then onto a small-sided game and setpieces to finish. Immediately after, recovery drinks high in carbohydrates were consumed by the players before getting back on the team coach bound for Leeds.

5.00PM: Arrive at the team hotel.

7PM: Evening meal, which consisted of foods high in carbohydrates such as example pasta, potatoes and vegetables, protein and fruits. After dinner, players relax in their rooms or get a massage from the club masseurs Steve Irvine or Mark Webb.

SATURDAY - 7AM - 9AM:

Although relaxing the evening before, the body still burns carbohydrates; breakfast (toasts, cereals, fruits, yoghurt) for the players is taken during this period just to top up the required nutrients. After breakfast the players have time to relax in their rooms. Dick (Club Physiotherapist), Steve Irvine (masseur) and myself head off to Elland Road to set up the playing kit ready for the game.

11.30AM: Players meet up in the hotel reception for a 15 minute walk to stretch their legs.

11.45AM: Players sit down for their pre-match meal, which again consist mainly of foods high in carbohydrates.

1.30PM: Arrive at Elland Road for the game. Available to the players are high energy drinks, gels, fruit and snacks like oat biscuits which are all high in carbohydrates. Players can relax listening to their music or get a rub from the masseur.

2.10PM: Head out for the pre-match warm-up.

2.40PM: Head back into the dressing room for last-minute instruction from the management team again taking on board energy drinks.

3PM: Kick-off – Leeds United vs Swindon Town

4.45PM: Final Whistle. Preparation starts for the next game. Players are given high carbohydrate and protein drinks to replace the nutrients lost during the game. Players have fiveminute ice baths to help reduce any soft tissue damage and the removal of any waste products like lactate which are produced during high intensity activity.

Preparation for the Saturday match starts immediately after the previous game and finishes as the whistle blows on matchday. Alleviating the stress of travelling on the day of an away game is one way to prepare correctly, as sitting stationary on a bus for long periods can result in muscle stiffness and back pain. This can reduce performance and increase the chance of injury. Travelling the day before if more than a two-hour coach trip is required also means that pre-match meals can be eaten approximately three hours before the game thereby allowing the nutrients to be effectively absorbed by the body. This results in increased energy levels and endurance. Without an overnight stay, the departure time from the player's homes and then from the stadium on the Saturday morning would have to be very early.


Here is how the team prepared for Saturday's away fixture at Leeds Utd:

FRIDAY - 10.30AM: Players arrived at The County ground for brunch, which consisted of scrambled eggs, beans and toast.

11AM: Depart The County ground on the team coach. Fruit, cereal snack bars and rolls were on board to keep energy levels high for the players.

2PM: To finish the final preparation on the training pitch, we stopped at Sheffield Wednesday's training ground. The players went through a thorough warm-up to reduce the muscle

the club's attempts to hit that target, however this time out, Bodin is confident that the youngsters from The County Ground will be there or thereabouts thanks to the club's excellent partnership with New College, as he explained.

"I think that we've always done pretty well with the lads who have stayed at the club for the full two years," said Bodin.

"Sometimes we've not always been able to control circumstances around players being sold on or leaving towards the end of the programme which obviously has a knock on effect when you're talking about frameworks.

"This year I think
we'll be a lot closer to that figure with
all of the lads well placed to achieve
everything as things stand. A major
factor in this success has been the
close working relationship we have
with New College. The likes of Paul
Smith and the tutors have been first
class and really flexible with us. If we
need to move a day here and there
it doesn't present a problem and
importantly the apprentices have been
fully integrated in to the College which
is crucial.

"It's good for them to mix with the

other students from a social aspect and it helps them stay in the real world. The last thing I'd want would

> be for them to be cocooned away from interaction which benefits their personal development."

Bodin is also pleased by the way things have been going out on the park. Champions of the Youth Alliance South West Division last season, Town once again top the table

this time out and Bodin believes his current crop could go on to be

home-grown stars of the future, adding: "We've got good results in terms of the ratio of lads that go on to earn pro deals and since I've been here we've consistently churned out players who have featured in the first team.

"This year the likes of Matt Barnes, Billy

Bodin and Will Evans have all done extremely well to be on the cusp of the first team but we've got a number of other youngsters here who can play
