





CHARLTON ATHLETIC have made a similarly inconsistent start to the season as have their hosts this evening, having registered six wins, four draws and four defeats from a taxing opening 14 games of the campaign.

THE Addicks faced a tough summer, losing a number of the stars who helped them reach the playoffs last year, not least Nicky Bailey and Deon Burton who joined Middlesbrough and Azerbaijani side Gabala respectively.

Manager Phil Parkinson brought in the likes of Paul Benson, Pawel Abbott and Alan McCormack to try and plug the gap, but his endeavours have yet to really bear fruit thus far this term.

The Addicks made a solid start to the season. remaining unbeaten in their opening three games courtesy of wins over AFC

Bournemouth (1-0) and Leyton Orient (3-1), and a draw against Oldham Athletic at The Valley (1-1).

Consecutive league defeats to Huddersfield Town (1-3) and Exeter City (0-1) then followed, either side of a 1-0 Johnstone's Paint Trophy win over Dagenham & Redbridge, and proceeded to put a dampener on what had been a positive start.

A period of just two defeats in eight games brings Parkinson's side into tonight's match and the manager will be hoping his side can take confidence from consecutive wins over Carlisle United

(4-3) and Sheffield Wednesday (1-0) as they prepare to face the side that ended their play-off dream

Few fans of either side will need reminding of the last meeting between the sides, with Town registering a memorable penalty shoot-out victory over the Addicks after a titanic playoff semi-final struggle which had seen the sides level on aggregate after 210 minutes of football.

But it was Liverpool loanee Stephen Darby who drilled home the deciding spot-kick at The Valley to send Town into the final.


ELLIOT

A boyhood Charlton fan Elliot made his 100th league appearance during the recent 4-3 win at Carlisle United and is back in the number one shirt this term after spending the tail end of the 2009/10 campaign on the bench Born in Greenwich. Elliot has spent loan spells at Accrington Stanley and Notts County.



ROSS WORNER

A 21-year old goalkeeper who joined the Addicks in the summer of 2010, Worner began his career with Woking where he came up through the youth ranks. An outstanding season last term saw him catch the attentions of higher-division clubs, with Charlton winning the race for his signature.



Versatile defender Fry signed on for a second loan spell at The Valley just 48 hours before the start of the new League 1 season. Frustrated by injury during his initial switch from parent club West Ham United earlier this year, the left-footer arrived on a new six-month loan in August. Fry has been at West Ham since the age of 11 having started his footballing journey on the books of Ebbsfleet United (then known as Gravesend & Northfleet). He played two U18 games as an over age player in his first spell at the club but a knee injury curtailed his progress His first squad appearance came in the agonising play-off semi-final second-leg penalty shoot-out defeat against Town



Having spent two spells on loan with the Addicks last season. Sodje signed a permanent deal with the club on the eve of the League 1 play-off semi-final second leg against Town in May The 29-year-old frontman initially arrived on loan from Sheffield Wednesday in November and scored five goals in total



JOSE SEMEDO

Midfield powerhouse Semedo produced his best performances in an Addicks shirt last term and was just pipped to Charlton's player of the year award by Christian Dailly. A popular figure around the training ground. the defensive midfielder was a key figure in Charlton's push for League 1 promotion in 2009/10.



Midfielder Racon is about to embark on his fourth season in English football after signing for the Addicks in August 2007 from Guingamp A player who loves to be on the ball, Racon made 36 league appearances last term, but scored just one goal - a late consolation in a 2-1 defeat at Bristol Rovers



2009/10 proved a real breakthrough campaign for hard-working wideman Wagstaff, who was named the club's young player of the year for a second time. The Kentbased 20-year-old, who signed a new one-year contract at the club in July, featured in every squad in all competitions last term, and achieved several personal milestones.



CHRISTIAN 36

The former Scottish international signed for Charlton in the summer of 2009 following a successful trial spell. The defender, who has 67 caps for his country to his name, had an impressive season last term and his assured performances helped the Addicks to reach the end of season play-offs.



IMON RANCIS

Charlton's fifth signing of the summer; defender Francis joined the club just eight days before the start of the 2010/11 campaign. 25-year old Francis, who signed a two-year deal, cost an initial £35,000 from Southend United where he was named the Shrimpers' player of the year last term.



GARY 12

Doherty was Phil Parkinson's first signing of the summer when he arrived on a free transfer following his departure from League 1 champions Norwich City. The former Luton Town youth product ended a six-year association with the Canaries in the summer after helping them seal an immediate return to the Championship.



JOE ANYINSAH 23

Phil Parkinson completed his second attacking deal of Bank Holiday Monday 2010 when Charlton announced the capture of former Carlisle United man Anyinsah. The 25-year old scored 15 goals in 59 games for the Cumbrians, and netted 11 times last term as he helped United reach the final of the Johnstone's Paint Trophy.

INTERESTING FACT!

Peter Shirtliff, currently assistant manager to Danny Wilson at The County Ground, once scored two goals in the last 10 minutes of extra-time in the 1986/87 play-off final to keep Charlton Athletic in the First Division.


ALAN McCORMACK 16

The midfielder arrived at The Valley on the same day as fellow Irishman Gary Doherty in early July after leaving cash-strapped Southend United. The Midfielder, who came through the ranks at Preston. North End, spent almost four seasons on the Essex coast, netting three times last term as the Shrimpers were relegated to League 2.



PAWEL ABBOTT

Phil Parkinson completed a hectic day of activity on July 30th by clinching the transfer of Abbott from Oldham Athletic for a nominal fee, just seven hours after agreeing a deal for Simon Francis. Abbott's last game for the club came against Charlton in Oldham's final match of 2009/10



JOHNNIE ACKSON

Versatile left-footer Jackson became Charlton's third summer signing when the free agent returned to the club in early July. The 28-year-old, who can operate at left-back, left midfield or in the middle of the park, spent a month at The Valley last season when he was recruited following an injury to Grant Basey. He links up with a familiar face in Addicks boss Phil Parkinson, whose first foray into the transfer market as a manager saw him sign the Camden-born player on loan for Colchester United in 2003. A former Tottenham Hotspur youth product, Jackson will be familiar to Town fans after spending a 17-game loan spell at The County Ground during the 2002/03 season.



INITIALLY lined up as a potential replacement for Alan Curbishley in the summer of 2006, Parkinson finally became the Addicks manager in November 2008.

He was installed as caretaker boss when Alan Pardew left the club by mutual consent following a 5-2 home defeat against Sheffield United, and was handed the job on a full-time basis on the final day of 2008.

Back in May 2006, Parkinson's former club, Colchester United, denied him permission to talk to the Addicks, and the Chorleyborn 42-year-old instead moved to Hull City.

After a short spell at the KC Stadium, he was appointed as assistant to Pardew in January 2007. The pair had worked together previously, when Parkinson was Pardew's captain during a glittering career at Reading.

A fearsome midfielder, Parkinson made 424 appearances for the Royals, and was voted the best central midfielder in the club's history by fans.


Skipper when Reading reached the second tier in 2002, Parkinson was soon taking steps on the coaching ladder and gained UEFA's highest coaching qualification, the Pro Licence, within three years.

By this time a managerial career had been born as he took charge of unfashionable Essex outfit Colchester in February 2003.

Parkinson passes on the instruc

Three seasons later, the U's, despite having the lowest average attendance in the division, were promoted to the Championship following a second-placed finish.

After Charlton's initial enquiry regarding their manager fell on deaf ears at Layer Road, Parkinson instead headed for Hull City where he recruited many of the players who would go



One To Watch

Charlton completed the signing of Dagenham & Redbridge striker **PAUL BENSON** for an undisclosed fee on Monday August 30th.



BORN in Southend-on-Sea, Benson joined the Daggers in July 2005 after being spotted playing for Essex non-League outfit White Ensign, for whom he scored 96 goals in two seasons.

The six-foot hitman struck 28 times in 2006/07 to help Dagenham & Redbridge win the Conference title, and netted 22 goals last term, scoring in all three play-off matches as Daggers defeated Rotherham United 3-2 in the League 2 play-off final to clinch promotion.

In total, including FA Trophy matches, Benson notched 84 goals in 201 games for John Still's side.

Originally on the books of Southend United, Benson departed Roots Hall when he wasn't offered a professional contract at the end of his time in the chub's youth set-up.

He went on to join two of his brothers at White Ensign, who were then at the very bottom of the non-League football ladder.

Four years into a trainee accountancy course in the City of London, Benson swapped pinstripes for the red and white of Dagenham & Redbridge. However, his first season with his new side was one of frustration as he found the back of the net just once but he found his shooting boots the following term, hitting 28 goals to finish as the Conference's top scorer as Still's side sealed promotion to League 2. Daggers' first season in The Football League saw Benson finish as the club's second top scorer with nine goals after missing part of the campaign through injury.

He hit 21 goals the following term and last season notched at Wembley to take his tally for the season to 22.

The play-off games against Charlton last season were fantastic and they were games everyone will remember for a long time. The challenge now is to knuckle down and try and put in another performance against them.












































JONATHAN DOUGLAS:

I'm going for another X-ray this week so we'll find out more details about it then, but it's coming along nicely enough and hopefully it will have healed up before too long.


What has your rehabilitation process comprised of?

I'll be passed on to Dave (Morrison) the fitness coach soon and I'm sure he's got some ideas in his head about what he's going to put me through, but I'm looking forward to it because it means I'll be back soon.

You spent a bit of time with Dave Morrison this



I did yes, when I was suspended after being sent off against Millwall. He is possibly the busiest man I've ever met in football, but he knows his stuff.

I saw Prutts with him last week, and now he'll have me and Alan Sheehan as well so it should be good fun!

But it's something that you need to do before you get back and start playing again, so as I say, I'm looking forward to doing it because it means I won't be that far away from being back playing.

How do you think Scott Cuthbert has coped with standing in as the team's captain in your absence?

Scotty's done very well, and is a natural leader so it's something that comes fairly easily to him.




Town were shocked to hear of the death of former



HAVING served under 12 managers, the former Swindon based student will be taking some deserved time out before continuing his long affiliation with the club with a part-time physio role at The County Ground. With so many stories to tell from his tenure at SN1, we couldn't let him go before relaying a tale or two...

How did you first arrive at Swindon Town?

The club were looking for someone to fulfil some first aid duties and I applied for the role. After the interview I came on board and it was a pleasure to be involved. I began working with the youth team, who were then managed by John Trollope and Swindon was a fantastic place to be in those days.

Do you remember your first game as physio?

I began working with the youth and reserve team, but was lucky enough to be involved in the general entourage of the play-off season in 1992/93. I remember having a very fatalistic conversation with the club chaplain at Tranmere in the second leg - and thankfully we made it to Wembley!


What do you remember of the Play-Off final in 1993?

The steward when we got there told us we were in the same dressing room as 1969 and he was proved right in the end. The game itself was pretty excruciating but the feeling after the game was absolutely fantastic. The celebrations after the game were wonderful and although it's a bit of a cliché, the celebrations really pulled the community together.

What are your other fondest memories from your time as physio?

I remember the final day of the 1995/96 season after we had won the Second Division Championship. I think the game was against Stockport County and despite the game

turning out to be a 0-0 draw, the players were paraded out after the game and that was a great afternoon.

The promotion in 2006/07 is also another memorable one. The season started well under Dennis (Wise) and Gus (Poyet) and after a little dip, things got back on track with Paul Sturrock at the helm. The final day of the season was a 1-1 draw with Walsall, which proved to be enough to secure promotion. The game was a bit nerve-wracking at times but thankfully things turned out okay in the end! It was a beautiful day in front of a full-house and a smashing day for Swindon Town.

And what about the low points of life at Swindon Town Football Club?

There have been plenty of times over the years when the team has been stuck in a rut and you just don't know where a win is going to come from. I remember one game at Charlton in March 2000. Steve Cowe scored early on and it was like the Alamo from there on in - but we held on for a win. It was one of the bright spots of a very tough season.

When things aren't going well it is very tough and financially there have been plenty of occasions when the club has been really up against it. Thankfully those days are over now.

DICK MACKEY:



Do you have to treat different players in different ways?

Definitely! Every player feels different things in this business. You cannot dismiss anything and you have to follow protocol when assessing an injury.

Over the years you must have spent a fair few Saturday nights at random hospitals up and down the country?

Yes I have been in a lot of hospitals and most of those occasions have been the result of an emergency situation on a matchday I remember being in a London hospital with the Frenchman, Phillipe Cuervo after what was quite a bad injury. Another one which sticks in the memory is a shoulder injury to Jack Smith at Swansea in a midweek game.

Which player had the highest pain threshold that you have worked with?

Alan Reeves. I think I only saw him twice during his Swindon career which must have spanned over 200 games. I remember running on to the field after a collision against Wycombe in the cup and he said 'Dick, I've broken my leg here.' He was right! 'Reevesy' was an extremely tough cookie.

And which player spent the most time in the physio room?

Probably Gareth Davies, who I saw quite

recently at pre-season at Hereford. He was unfortunate to have lots of injury problems and we spent plenty of time out on the road running. on the rowing machine or on the bikes. He was good fun though. I think he had a three year contract with Swindon but spent two of them working with me.

Les Parry has managed at Tranmere Rovers, but did you ever fancy a crack at management?

I can say it now because there is no fear of it happening, but I think I would have done a superb job! I did some coaching with the Under 16s during John Trollope's time at the club, but it does bring with it a whole host of pressures. It's a great role to be in when the team is winning but there are all too many people to remind you when things aren't going well.

What does the future hold for you?

I will also be working with the youth team, so in a funny sort of way I will have turned full circle In addition to that I am hoping to do a bit of work in the general community and as a qualified physiotherapist, I intend on keeping all my qualifications up to speed, as you have to do.


What is your advice to Kate Cady?

I think you have to be sympathetic, but as firm as possible with players. You have to let them know what you are going to do but players mustn't be too needy.

Do you have a message for the Swindon fans?

I would like to say a partial cheerio to all Swindon Town supporters, who I hold in great regard. They have been fantastic to me throughout my time with the club.

Glenn Hoddle

An interesting character and a very affable one. He was a man of very few words and he had a gift for making minor adjustments during a game and it was fairly obvious, even in those days that he would go on and do well in management.

John Gorman

He obviously felt a great attraction to want to go and manage Swindon because he turned down the chance to join Glenn at Chelsea. John was a very nice man and a good coach. The Premier League season was a difficult one but we had some good days.

Steve McMahon

He was a tough character who didn't suffer fools gladly although I got on with him alright. In some ways he was quite a shy guy, but his persona on the field was a tough one. A game against Leicester sticks in the memory when Neil Lennon was on the receiving end of that 'on-field' persona.



It was so hard for him and Alan McDonald but those days were good fun. For example I remember someone's moccasins being toasted and having jam but on them because they weren't necessarily very fashionable.


Colin Todd

'Toddy' used to growl at people and he was a big character in the game who had a very clever footballing brain. He had quite a short stint in charge here but again they were interesting days to be a part of.











Andy King

He was a shoot from the hip type of character who had an off the cuff style. especially when it came to coaching. He was still a very good player and he liked to mix in at the training ground. You soon learned to keep your head down when things weren't going well though.

Roy Evans

He was a very personable fellow and out of the stories I could tell from my time here, many of them would have involved the period when Neil 'Razor' Ruddock was with Swindon. It would make a fantastic book one day.

Iffy Onuora

It was a very difficult spell for him and the opportunity at Swindon got him on the managerial rung. Iffy and 'Woanie' - again a very good character - have gone on to continue with their respective management and coaching careers after leaving STFC.

Dennis Wise

He had vast experience of the game and wanted to get things right. The preseason in 2006 was pretty awesome and some would suggest slightly ahead of its time because we set off like an absolute train. The whole ethos had a lot of thought behind it

Paul Sturrock

He was something of a footballing omnivore. He was a very inclusive sort of a guy and he had a great record of promotions. He just couldn't get enough of football and absolutely loved the game, whether at the club or after hours back at home watching games on television.

Maurice Malpas

It was hard for him. He was a charming fellow but the interaction between him and the players didn't quite work out. He was a smashing guy and I did feel for him, but it just didn't quite happen at Swindon.

Danny Wilson

He is a supremely organised manager and nothing is left to chance. He has a fantastic record of success and he has done a very good job here. The manager's job here is certainly in safe hands.

Magaluf when I was about 15-years old. I went with a school friend and my parents and we spent two weeks out there and had a great time.


Have you ever been away during the football season?

FOOTBALL LEAGUE HONOURS WAR DEAD

THE Football League has unveiled a permanent memorial to the men of the Footballers' Battalion who fought and died on the Somme during the First World War.

Similar to the famous 'Pal Battalions', the 17th and 23rd Middlesex Regiments became known as the Footballers' Battalions in response to wide-spread public criticism that football was shirking its responsibilities by playing on following the outbreak of war.

Established in 1914 and 1915 respectively, the Battalions allowed professional and amateur players, referees, administrators and football supporters to enlist and fight together in the trenches.

Deployed to the Somme in 1916, the 17th Middlesex saw fierce fighting in Delville Wood in the village of Longueval, where 36 members of the Battalion were killed and almost 200 injured in just three days.

"This is most rewarding day I've had in the job since I took it eight months ago," admitted Football League Chairman, Greg Clarke who unveiled the stone monument close to Delville Wood.

"It is about going back 90 years, about footballers who joined up together and gave their lives for their country. Walking around those graves, seeing people aged 17, 18, 19 who ran into a wood with people running at them screaming, holding bayonets at them, the shells raining down on their heads is amazing.

"They kept going, they never gave up, and that's truly humbling."

Players past and present were represented at the ceremony by former Hereford United, Notts County, Mansfield Town and Lincoln City striker, Phil Stant and current Wycombe Wanderers midfielder Gareth Ainsworth.

Stant, a former soldier that saw action during the Falklands conflict, and now The Football League Trust's Youth Development Regional Manager for the Midlands, has led the campaign to make the memorial a reality. This included arranging bucket collections at matches throughout the county.

More than 100 guests attended the service including STFC Football in the Community Trust manager Jon Holloway and STFC Football in the Community Trust Chairman, Mike Spearman.

















Where are they now?

WAYNE ALLISON

When Steve McMahon forked out £500,000 for **WAYNE ALLISON** in 1995, it was neither an expected or popular decision among many Town supporters. However, 120 appearances, 36 goals and numerous crowd-pleasing performances later, Allison left The County Ground nothing short of a cult hero.

HIS first season will be the one from which most fond memories will emanate for Allison, scoring 20 goals in 55 games as Town stormed to the Second Division Championship under Steve McMahon.

"It was a great first season for me and the team both on and off the pitch," he said.

"We had a good team with a good team spirit, and I thought this translated pretty clearly onto the pitch.

"Swindon was great, and was just a good place to play your football.

"Of course you always remember and enjoy things when you're winning, but it was more the way we did it.

"We stuck to our guns around how we wanted to play kept doing it that way and enjoyed a lot of success with it."

Allison's transition from Ashton Gate 'zero' to County Ground 'hero' was nigh on miraculous, and it did not take long for the famous cries of the striker's nickname 'Chief' to be heard ringing around SN1.

He recalls: "The fans always play a massive part in any player settling in and doing well, because if you can get them on side and appreciating how you're trying to play then it does masses for your confidence.

"Fortunately I've always had it at clubs I've been at, even though my brand of football is not always the most pleasing on the eye! "But I think that if the fans can see that you're trying hard and trying to do your best for the team then they'll look after you – which was definitely the case at Swindon and I was always grateful for it."

As past Town striking partnership's go,
Allison's lethal combination with Steve Finney
rates alongside the Mayes/Rowland, Mooney/
Parkin and Austin/Paynter double acts among
the most prolific The County Ground has seen,
with both front men wreaking havoc in the
Second Division.

"That partnership was great, and we had a good bit of healthy competition between us," remembered Allison.

"We complemented each other well in that he could play and I couldn't!

"It was obviously a delight when either of us scored, but there was definitely that competitive element there!


"It wasn't a case that I wouldn't pass to him because he was higher in the goal scoring charts or anything, we were just happy to see the team doing well."


After a season and a half with Town in the First Division, Allison departed for home town club Huddersfield Town, and he admits it was with a heavy heart that he made the move.

"It was disappointing to leave, and it wasn't an easy decision to make," he said.

"Huddersfield were at the bottom of the









league a few points adrift, but they're my hometown club and my mother was seriously ill at the time so I had to take that into consideration.

"So I decided to go back home to play, but most importantly to be with my family.

"It was a tough decision because what we had at Swindon was working really, really well. But as I said it wasn't just a footballing decision when I left and I had to do it."

The 41-year-old was back at The County Ground as recently as last spring as part of the Tranmere Rovers coaching staff, but having been released from Prenton Park over the summer, he has turned his hand to lecturing at a local college in Huddersfield.


He said: "I sat down with Les (Parry, Tranmere Rovers manager) and a few others at Tranmere in June of this year and was told that they didn't have enough funds to keep on two coaches, so


"Obviously you don't assume anything but I was hopeful of getting another contract after helping keep them up at the end of last year.

"So I was a bit shocked, and thought I have to do something', so now I'm lecturing in Physiology at Kirklees College, helping 16-19 year olds in their BTEC qualification, and it's working out well for me at the moment.

"It's something different, something out of my comfort zone, and it's really opened my eyes to a world outside football which is great."



IT ended up being a fairly routine win for Town against their lower league opponents on October 5th, but for young right-back Nathan Thompson, the 2-0 triumph over Torquay United will stay long in the memory.

This is because, after 27 minutes, the youth team graduate replaced the injured Scott Cuthbert and proceeded to give the assured performance he had been waiting to give since arriving at the club back in 2003.

"I joined when I was an Under 13 so it's been a good seven years now, and my younger brother has been here since he was nine as well so there are plenty of family connections," he said.

"It took a while for me to get the chance in the first team, but when it came it was worth it!

"It's probably best when you don't know it's coming because you haven't got any chance to get nervous.

"Against Torquay it came upon me so quickly that I didn't really have any chance to think about it, and luckily it went pretty well after I got on.

'It was brilliant just to get out there finally and everything went pretty well in the end. Now it's just about trying to get as many games as possible."

A full League 1 debut looked on the cards during Saturday's 2-2 draw with Leyton Orient, but despite being stripped off and ready for action, Kevin Amankwaah, who Thompson was set to replace, shrugged off a calf injury and completed the game - leaving the youngster on the sidelines for the remainder of the afternoon.

'In fairness to Key, he got back up and ran it off, but it was disappointing I've got to say!" he said.

"The gaffer's called me back and I've got my shirt on ready to go, but unfortunately I didn't get the chance to get on again.

But nevermind, hopefully that chance will come again pretty soon."

Having spent a largely frustrating first professional season enduring reserve team football and numerous unused substitute appearances, Thompson admits his debut was a long time

He said: "Obviously with the form Key and Steve Darby were in last year it made it hard for me to get a chance.

"It was difficult, and the gaffer kept saying to me 'patience is the key, you'll get your chance', but it was still tough as I was so desperate to get some games under my belt last year.

"The reserve league has always been so sporadic with the fixtures so you never get the chance to get your match fitness really.

'But I just kept working hard in training and trying to impress the manager which hopefully I

can keep doing this year."

And Thompson's frustration was made all the more unbearable as he watched his teammates progress all the way to the Play-Off Final at Wembley.

"It was bitter sweet for the whole of last year if I'm honest," he said.


"Watching all the lads coming out at Wembley, it must have been unbelievable and watching it in the stands was difficult if I'm honest.

"But as I say I'm working hard and hopefully I can get a chance to experience something like that this year."

Thompson is one of three youngsters in the Town squad who have progressed through the ranks, with fellow graduates Will Evans and Billy Bodin also having dipped their toes in the first team waters this term, and the defender is delighted to be among such familiar company as he and his peers continue to strive to make their way in the game.

"They are lads I've grown up with and they've been the year below me since I started here so to have them around is brilliant.

"I get on with them really well and it's really good to have them around, not least because

they're both really good players.

"We've all made our debuts this year now so hopefully we can all carry on and make a bit more of an impression this year."

Town management staff have often praised Thompson's work ethic, maturity and natural ability throughout his time at the club, and this belief has seldom been more clearly illustrated than when he was awarded the reserve team captaincy at the start of this term – an accolade he is privileged to have received at such a young age.

"In the first reserve game of the season Pete (Shirtliff) told me I was going to be captain and it was great to be given that," enthused Thompson.

"It was brilliant because there are a lot of older lads out there in the reserve games and to be leading them out as a young lad is fantastic and I really enjoy it."

And with well over half the season left, Thompson is determined to show that he is more than capable of holding down a regular first team spot, and prove to Wilson that he is deserving of an extension to his contract that expires at the end of this term.

"I just want to get as many games under my belt as possible," he said.

"It would be great to put my stamp on the first team and hopefully hold down a place after a while.

"Then it's about trying to earn a new deal at the end of the year, and it would be brilliant to do that because this is where I want to be."





From The Press Box

In the same week that Wayne Rooney's protracted contract negations were played out in front of the world's media, The Football League unveiled a memorial to the players and fans who fought side by side in THE FOOTBALLERS' BATTALION during The Great War.



FOOTBALL has a way of throwing up great contrasts and here was another. While one of the stars of the current game was being rewarded with a staggering £200,000 plus a week contract, the heroes of yesterday were being remembered for something far more important with a simple slab of marble and some eloquent words.

The facts are that from the 17th and 23rd Middlesex Footballers' Battalions more than 1,000 players and fans died while about 2,000 suffered casualties.

Most of the injuries came in the battle of Delville Wood - or Devil's Wood as the troops re-named it - on the edge of the tiny village of Longueval in northern France, where the memorial was unveiled.

The Football League organised a party of dignitaries and players to

attend the ceremony. They included Phil Stant who organised the memorial, Wycombe player Gareth Ainsworth, and Millwall chief executive Andy **Ambler**

All of them agreed with Football League chairman Greg Clarke who said that current players, and especially academy members, should pay a visit to the memorial to gain understanding.

As Clarke said: "The problem of football is it can be all-consuming but it's not all of life. I'd support bringing young footballers out here, to give them a sense of perspective to what true sacrifice is all about

Walking around those graves, seeing people aged 17, 18, 19, who ran into a wood with people running at them screaming, holding bayonets at them, and shells raining down on their heads

is truly humbling."

Wycombe winger Ainsworth added: "The First World War was a massive part of our history and it is so important that it is not forgotten.

"I would encourage all players, especially the younger ones to visit the memorial and learn about what players their age went through for us."

Ambler said he will ensure that the Millwall academy make a visit to the memorial and would encourage all players, academies and fans do the

The role of the Footballers' Battalions has been praised in historical writings of The Great War. But following the outbreak of hostilities in August 1914 the footballers were heavily criticised by notable personalities of the day like WG Grace and Field Marshall Lord Roberts who labelled them as 'shirkers' for continuing to play the game while the majority of other sports had stopped.

It was as a result of the criticism that in November 1914 Brentford MP William Joyson Hicks raised the Footballers Battalion following a meeting in Fulham Town Hall.

At first 35 professional footballers signed up, but within a few months there were more than 300 from clubs including Millwall, Reading, Clapton (now Leyton) Orient and Brighton and

By 1918 only 30 of them were still alive. Many of the stories are documented in the book 'When the Whistle Blows' by Andrew Riddoch and John Kemp, which charts the stories of the 17th and 23rd Middlesex Footballers Battalions.

Was capped by England at youth level, but due to service in the RAF had to wait until December 1961 to turn professional when he joined the ranks at Swindon Town from non-league Dorchester Town. He went on to play 75 league games and was part of Swindon's first ever promotion winning team in the 1962-63 season, before joining Torquay United in July 1964. He played 14 league games for Torquay United over the next two seasons, before leaving the professional game. He subsequently returned to Dorset.

Town had already faced the Hammers twice in the same season, with an enthralling 3-3 home draw in November 1963 in the League Cup forcing a replay with the home side numino out 4.1 winners.


