



CLEAN SLATE FOR CHARLTON AS TAKEOVER GOES THROUGH

The Addicks ended 2010 with some major news as the club passed into new hands – but the long-term strategic plan involves a number of familiar faces. MATT WRIGHT reports

t's a new year and a new era for Charlton after the acquisition of the club was completed three days ago.

The club announced on New Year's Eve that lawyer and businessman Michael Slater and international property developer Tony Jimenez had taken control of the Addicks.

And there are also some familiar faces on the new Charlton board in the shape of former chairman
Richard Murray and Peter Varney, who represented the investor group throughout the takeover negotiations. Former Addicks chief executive Varney will become executive vice-chairman with responsibility for corporate strategy and planning.

Also on the board is Stephen Kavanagh, who becomes chief executive and will continue to be responsible for the day-to-day running of the club.

"We are delighted to have taken control of Charlton," said new chairman Slater. "The club has a long and proud history and an incredibly loyal fanbase.

"I'd like to pay tribute to Richard Murray, who took on a huge financial responsibility last summer when he saved the club from almost certain administration while he sought new investment. I'm delighted that we'll continue to benefit from Richard's unique insight and relationship with the club and the supporters.

"As the new owners, we are both football fans and businessmen. The acquisition brings much-needed



financial stability to the club, and our plan is to run the club on a sensible financial footing and develop a commercial plan to ensure we make progress on and off the pitch to meet the expectations of our fans.

"What we won't do is create unrealistic, pie-in-the-sky expectations. We will always live within our means, and, with a sound commercial approach and the run of the ball on the pitch, our aim, obviously, is to make steady upward progress and bring success to The Valley."

Slater, 44, is the financial controller of Swiss-based investment groups the Rose Trust and Blue Star International Group, and chairman of Reflex Vehicle Solutions Limited, a successful vehicle rental business based in Stockton-on-Tees

He added: "The fans have continued to support the club in large numbers over the past few difficult seasons; this was a big factor in our decision to invest and come here."

Murray, meanwhile, will continue his involvement with the club, which spans almost 20 years,

He said: "I have made no secret of the fact that the club has been actively seeking new investment, and it has taken me some time to find the appropriate new owners, but I believe I am now passing the club to the right people, who can secure its long-term future.

"I have been impressed by their enthusiasm and their plans and ideas for its future progression, and I am delighted that I will continue to be involved at board level with them to help rebuild the club both on and off the pitch."

We've had some eventful games over the past year or so, especially at The Valley, and after we were beaten in the play-offs last May, there is a healthy rivalry between the two clubs.

Unfortunately, I had to write these notes before the Colchester United game on New Year's Day, which came three days after we drew with Brighton & Hove Albion.

Before the game, we would have been pleased with a point, but obviously that changed when they went down to 10 men early on after we had taken the lead.

It's been shown numerous times that it's difficult to play against 10 men, but we still created some good chances when we passed the ball patiently, and I felt we had enough

opportunities to win the game.

The first eight minutes were certainly eventful. First there was the penalty, when Scott Wagstaff was incredibly unlucky for his 'goal' to be ruled out when he put the ball in the net after Joe Anyinsah had been fouled. Johnnie Jackson stuck the spot-kick away nicely, though.

After the referee awarded the penalty. I thought he had to send Marcos Painter off because he scythed him down just as he was about to score, and we felt doubly hard done by because Joe unfortunately picked up an injury.

I had a chat with Gus Poyet afterwards, and he was bemoaning his luck about Inigo Calderon being sent off – I told him he was lucky they didn't go down to nine men!

Brighton's main threat came from set pieces, although Radostin Kishishev had a late chance. Given he only scored twice in 200 games while with Charlton, we would have felt hard done by if he'd scored, but Rob Elliot made a good save. All in all, it was a good performance.


I must also thank the fans who travelled and were in good voice. It was a misty old night, and I wouldn't be surprised if they couldn't even see the goal from where they were sitting.

CHRISTIAN VALUES

Having had time to reflect during his lengthy suspension – compounded by the weather – one durable defender meets GARY HAINES to discuss winter breaks, prolonging his career, the Brighton draw and an extracurricular learning curve

During a festive season in which families and friends in Charlton and beyond eat, drink and be merry, Christian Dailly's glass will always be half full.

Of course, with the hectic Christmas and new-year period meaning match action aplenty, the stalwart Scottish defender only partook of non-alcoholic beverages.

And, back in the first-team fold after sitting out four games through suspension, he is relishing his expected return to the Valley pitch this evening.

The last time Dailly featured in SE7, almost six weeks ago on November 20th, he made an early departure following a straight red card for an alleged elbow on Yeovil Town's Sam Williams 19 minutes from time.

Having also been dismissed against Leyton Orient in August after receiving two yellow cards, Dailly faced a four-match ban, even though his opponent and Glovers boss Terry Skiverton both admitted that the challenge wasn't malicious and that Williams' injury was the result of a clash of heads.

"I actually saw the challenge as an opportunity to lift the crowd a bit – a chance to get a good challenge in and get everybody up," said Christian, who also missed a handful of games after sustaining a fractured eye socket against Dagenham & Redbridge in August.

"It kind of worked, albeit in the wrong way.

Everybody defended brilliantly to get the team through to three points with 10 men, so it gave everyone a lift. I just wasn't on the park!

"There's no doubt I went in to win the ball and I didn't hold back," he added. "But I didn't go in to injure the guy in any way. And I didn't catch him with my arm; it was a head clash.

"Their manager said it, their player said it, I said it, but the club took some advice and was told that an appeal could have earned me an extra game, maybe two, or the FA could even double the suspension."

Fittingly, however, Dailly, whose ban lasted longer than expected when the match at Rochdale on December 4th was postponed, turned that notable negative into a positive.

"When I was sent off against Yeovil, I was really angry," admitted Christian, who finally returned to action as the Addicks made an agonising exit from the Johnstone's Paint Trophy in a penalty shootout against Brentford at Griffin Park on December 14th.

"I was angry for literally an hour, and then I started thinking. If you get a spell out of the team, I look at it as an opportunity to work on other things. When you are not playing, you can train a bit differently and do bits and bobs that will help you to prolong your career."

Dailly added: "It gave me an opportunity to get some extra running in, and some extra

strength work. It's important as you get older to keep that up, and I worked on my running technique.

"It just takes the effort to do it, but I'm probably quite fortunate because training, for me, is not really an effort; it's just enjoyable."

The 37-year-old continues to speak with enthusiasm and passion, demonstrating a real affection for the game which has sustained his career, which is entering its third decade in 2011.

"It's good to be back in with the boys," said Christian, for whom the final match of his suspension was the disappointing 1-0 defeat to Walsall last time out at The Valley. "I get a little bit agitated watching the games. I always start off making the effort to try to look at things with a coach's head on, and trying to analyse the game, but I always get sucked into watching from a fan's perspective.

"I've played in hundreds of games like the Walsall one when the team has not played well, and it can be difficult to put your finger on why.

"Maybe it was a bit of fatigue after the run we'd been on, but you just have to regroup. And if we can get on a similar run again at any time this season, we will put ourselves in a great position."

Charlton's last sustained period of fine form was sparked by a 4-0 defeat to Brighton & Hove Albion, and Dailly admitted that the Addicks had had enough chances

> to win the game when the two sides met again and drew 1-1 five days ago.

we created enough opportunities to win," said Christian after Charlton were unable to capitalise on the Seagulls' having been reduced to 10 players after just eight minutes.

"It was a tough match, though,"

After Dailly's return to action against Brentford coincided with the club's first clean sheet for

almost a month, the skipper and his teammates were also disappointed by the nature of Brighton's equaliser.

"It wasn't a free-kick for their goal," he said. "We got the penalty, when he should probably have been sent off because he was the last man. Then we scored and the goal wasn't given. Then we got a penalty and scored, and then their player was sent off.

"The crowd was getting irate and it definitely seemed to influence the referee. Free-kicks were going against us left, right and centre for what were just normal challenges. Gary Doherty won a header and he gave them a free-kick [from which Brighton scored], but you just have to get on with it."

Having shrugged off their Walsall woes with a solid display at Brentford, Charlton were frustrated when the following two games, at Hartlepool United and at home to Southampton, fell victim to the adverse conditions up and down the country.

For the durable Dailly, whose professional career kicked off with hometown club Dundee United in 1990, playing in arctic conditions is like, well, snow off an Eskimo's back.

But he admitted: "I've never seen conditions quite as snowy as they have been recently. It said minus six on my car at one point, which I've never seen either, especially living down here where it's a good five or six degrees warmer than



the north of Scotland.

"The conditions have made it really difficult to get a proper training session on. The groundsmen were brilliant, and separated little bits of grass for us to work on each day.

"There is nothing we can do about the weather, though. If you get a big backlog of games, you just have to play them, and it will be a good opportunity to get a whole load of points in a short period of time. So that might be a positive way to look at it."

There was little positive about the club's last scheduled fixture against Southampton, with the Boxing Day match controversially called off just an hour before kick-off.

"I thought the pitch was definitely playable," he said. "The linesman said an area was slippy for him, but I didn't feel it was like that.

"I just felt sorry for everyone who had got themselves up for the game; all the fans who based their Boxing Day around the match."

As a man who has seen pretty much everything in the game, the 67-cap ex-Scotland international is well placed to comment on the idea of a winter break during the season.

"There's probably an argument for

it, but I have some issues with it," said Christian. "First, when would you do it? You can say at the end of December, but the snow doesn't normally come in December; it's usually in January or February.

"I suppose if you were going to have one, the odd week to help teams regroup slightly might be a decent idea. It would give you a chance to train and do some preparation and fitness work that you just don't get the chance to do because of the number of garnes.

"It's a really difficult one, though.

I've never had a winter break, so
because I've never had one, I never
miss it."

He added: "I'm hoping for a clean bill of health throughout the next few weeks because we have a lot of games coming up.

"It's a tough month, but that's fine. I don't think it matters who we play; we know that when we are all right and everybody is bang on, we can beat any team.

"At the same time, teams are quite evenly matched in this league, so if you are not right, then you are liable to lose, as the Walsall game showed. We've got to be sure we are as right as possible for every game." ◀

Studying those mechanics is something I've always been interested in, and it not only helps me to prolong my career, it helps other people as well.



Faced with events beyond their control. Charlton staff did their best to deal with Boxing Day's late call-off, says managing director STEPHEN KAVANAGH – but the club is still counting the cost

t's difficult to put into words the anger, frustration and disappointment everyone at the club felt following the postponement of our match on Boxing Day.

Only one League One game was played on December 26th, but we firmly believe our fixture against Southampton should have gone ahead.

In many ways, we have to move on. The club has nothing to gain by continuing to protest about a decision that we believe wasn't correct, and one that made a mockery of the huge amount of work undertaken by staff and supporters in a bid to get the match played.

Equally, however, we have a duty to explain what happened. And it's hard to glibly forget such things when you know how much it will cost – an estimated £60,000-plus.

Even ignoring the fact that we believe the pitch was playable, and that we were sure any concerns referee Andy D'Urso had could easily have been addressed before kick-off, postponing the match so late in the day was the worst possible scenario for the club.

This is true financially, because we still have to pay all the policing, stewarding and staffing costs, the coach firms which had already transported fans to the stadium and for the food which was wasted, but it also applies logistically.

The last thing we wanted –
particularly on Boxing Day, given
the lack of public transport – was
for so many people to descend
on the stadium without a game
taking place.

And while some fans have criticised the delay before the decision to postpone the game was taken, this was out of our hands. We were doing our utmost to get the match played, and the longer the delay, the more it cost the club.

LAST-DITCH INSPECTION

I've also been asked why we didn't announce earlier that a pitch inspection would take place, but the first we knew one would be needed was when the referee took a look just before 11am following his arrival at the ground, as he would do when he gets to the ground for any match.

The cost of the postponement is compounded by the fact that the game, against one of the most fancied sides in the division on a traditional holiday, should have been our most lucrative league match of the season.

Obviously, we won't now receive anything like the same income we were expecting at the rescheduled game, and it's even worse than that because we've already budgeted for that revenue from Boxing Day.

That said, it's not all about money.

We quickly announced that all of our fans who had booked hospitality packages would receive the same package at the rearranged game, with the news of the postponement coming as some supporters were tucking into their pre-match meal.

It's certainly been a busy
Christmas, with discussions
regarding the club's acquisition
continuing on and after Christmas
Eve, while events on Boxing Day
meant that the following two bank
holidays soon became working days,
too, as we dealt with the fall-out.

But what most upsets me is that the people who have suffered most from the postponement are fans, the very people who volunteered their services and gave up their time to help us in advance of the match.

Their efforts made a huge difference, and regardless of how it all turned out, we're still immensely grateful.

Finally, I'd like to wish all staff and supporters a happy new year. Let's hope that all our hard work and efforts are rewarded properly this year.

D'URSO DELIVERS KNOCK-OUT BLOW IN BOXING DAY BOUT

The Addicks were left punch-drunk the day after Christmas – and it had nothing to do with festive over-indulgence. MATT WRIGHT looks at the circumstances of a controversially called-off game

Light days after Charlton's Boxing
Day match against Southampton,
club officials were still coming to
terms with the decision by
referee Andy D'Urso to
postpone the clash an hour

And given estimates that the cancellation will cost the Addicks in excess of £60,000, even before match ticket refunds are taken into account,

before kick-off.

the ramifications will be felt for some time yet.

"In 20 years of being at The Valley, it's the worst decision I've ever seen," said groundsman Colin 'Paddy' Powell. "If games are going to be called off when the pitch is as good as it was, you're never going to get any games played.

"I've been thinking about it since Boxing Day, and I reckon we've played around 10 games here when the pitch was in worse condition." The story of the Boxing Day debacle begins the night before the night before Christmas, when

dozens of supporters responded to an appeal by the club and volunteered their services to clear ice and snow from around The Valley.

The diligent fans spent many hours working alongside staff to shift the snow from the pitch, concourse areas and walkways around the ground, and then laid covers on the playing surface to protect against any overnight frost.

And what many find to be the most difficult consequence of

> D'Urso's decision is that all those efforts were ultimately in vain.

In a bid to ensure that everything was being taken into account, Charlton asked The Football League to send a referee to the ground to inspect the pitch as a precaution at 10am on Christmas Eve, and shortly after Phil Crossley reported no concerns, the club

> released a statement to that effect on its official website and to the media.

Charlton managing director Stephen Kavanagh added: "Of course, we're still in the hands of the weather to some degree, but we have done everything we can at this stage."

Powell inspected the pitch himself on Christmas Day to ensure nothing was amiss, and was at the ground by 7.30am on Boxing Day for the final preparations ahead of kick-off.

An overnight frost, caused by temperatures which dipped to minus four degrees, meant that several areas of the field of play were hard, but the groundstaff were confident that these wouldn't pose a problem by kick-off.

But after D'Urso arrived at the ground at around 10.30am, and took his first look at the pitch just before 11am, he expressed concern about two areas where his assistants would run the line, in front of the west stand at the Jimmy Seed Stand end and on the opposite diagonal.

This was the first suggestion that there was any doubt that the game



would go ahead, and, after rejecting the idea that his linesmen could run the opposite flanks because he was used to looking in a certain direction to see his assistants, D'Urso then told staff that he would officially inspect the pitch at 11.30am.

This information was immediately passed on to the media and broadcast to supporters via the club's own communication channels.

At 11.30am, D'Urso emerged and, at around 11.45am, told staff that he was unhappy with the section in the south-west corner

where his assistant would run the line.

At this point, Charlton safety officer John Little suggested a delay of 15 minutes to the 1pm kick-off time to give staff further time to remedy the situation.

This was agreed and publicised by the club, and Little went on to point out that, with no trains running on Boxing Day, the kick-off could be delayed for as long as necessary to ensure the match went ahead.

With D'Urso having indicated that the area of concern was in the south-west corner, Addicks groundstaff concentrated their efforts on this particular section of the pitch. A heater was moved from the area opposite the tunnel to speed things up ahead of a second inspection at around 12pm, salt and sand were applied to soften the surface, and it

was clear to all that these measures were working and that the area would pass an inspection.

It was to everyone's general bemusement, therefore, that D'Urso completely ignored this area when he came out at midday, walked over to the north-east corner opposite the tunnel – which, he'd told staff, was being addressed satisfactorily – and promptly called the game off at around 12.05pm without any further conversations with officials.

This was over an hour before the planned delayed kick-off at 1.15pm,

with the sun shining on the pitch and plenty of time for groundstaff to address any further concerns.

D'Urso later told BBC LONDON:
"The area opposite the tunnel was
quite frozen in places, so my
concern is for the safety of the
players. I'm not prepared to take
that risk.

"You also have assistants who are moving up and down the line, making quick movements. They have instant decisions to make in terms of offsides, and a slip by an assistant could not only mean he falls and hurts himself, but he may

also miss an incident."

Powell responded: "I just don't think he gave it a fair amount of time before he made his decision.

"There was still plenty of time before kick-off if he had any issues. The areas he identified would have been fine by kick-off, and I know that's true because I went out to check at kick-off time. And that's even after we stopped working on them when the game was called off."

The late postponement was the worst-case scenario for the club and supporters of both teams, the

> vast majority of whom had arrived or were en route to the stadium, although the Addicks had yet to open the Valley turnstiles.

Charlton manager Phil Parkinson, his Southampton counterpart Nigel Adkins and both sets of players were

perfectly happy for the game to go ahead. Indeed, after the postponement was announced, Adkins asked if the Saints players could train on the surface.

Charlton officials, including
Kavanagh, Parkinson and Powell,
later queued up to reiterate that the

Rob Elliot and Pawel Abbott both reached personal career milestones just before the end of 2010 – and an Addicks landmark could be recorded this evening.

Johnnie Jackson,

to nine with an early penalty in East Sussex, recorded his 250th career appearance against Brentford on December 14th, when another of the left-sider's spot-kicks was saved during the penalty shootout as the Addicks exited the Johnstone's Paint Trophy at the southern semi-final stage.

Simon Francis played his 300th match in the FA Cup replay against Luton Town on December 9th, while Lee Martin and Kyel Reid both reached 100 career league and cup appearances against Bristol Rovers on November 23rd.

However, after suffering a shoulder injury against Walsall last time out at The Valley. Akpo Sodje may have to wait a while longer for his 200th game. The striker has played 196 matches, but is currently sidelined, and Joe Anyinsah will also be absent this evening after being forced off with a groin problem following the early foul which earned Charlton's penalty against Brighton.

Charlton's victory over Luton in the second round means the Addicks will play a minimum of 56 matches this season, the highest number of games since 1995/96, when the club played 57 fixtures.

And the Addicks could reach a century of goals against Swindon Town this evening, having so far scored 99 times in league and cup games against the Robins.

WILL SWINDON SEE MATT FINISH? VAT VARIATIONS

Matt Fry is due to play the final game of his loan spell with Charlton this evening, having last week revealed that no decision had been reached about whether he would stay at The Valley.

"I had a brief chat with the manager [Phil Parkinson] about it a few days ago, and he said he'd like to keep me until

end of the season," said the 20-year-old West Ham United defender, whose second stint in SE7 ends tomorrow.

"I'd be happy to do that, but the final decision is with West Ham."

Meanwhile, today's match against Swindon Town is the final fixture for which Marcel Seip is eligible, after the defender was recruited on loan from Plymouth Argyle in November.

The loan of Seip, who had yet to make his Addicks debut prior to the new year, runs until Saturday.

The operating hours of the commercial centre and Valley Superstore will return to normal this week after the end of the festive period. But while the commercial centre will open as usual at 9am tomorrow, the Superstore will remain closed until 10am on January 6th.

The store will be shut tomorrow and on Wednesday to allow staff to carry out a number of changes following the VAT increase, more details of which can be found on page 18.

VALLEY GAMES CALLED OFF

lollowing a series of complaints from supporters, Charlton are asking parents to refrain from allowing their children to play football outside the lower weststand concourse after matches.

A number of fans have been hurt, by accident, during the impromptu games which take place near turnstiles 12-15.

Damage has also been caused, so, from today's match, stewards will start to take action to break up the small games.

Safety officer John Little said:
"It's not our intention to be heavyhanded, and we're fully aware that it's a bit of fun for youngsters and that no one is being hurt deliberately, but we can't ignore the injuries and damage being caused and the complaints we're receiving.

"Ultimately, the area outside the west stand isn't a football pitch, and we have a health and safety duty towards everyone who comes to The Valley."

HAMMER TIME ON FRIDAY

Charlton's U18s will take on West Ham United on Friday after going almost a month without a match.

The two sides will be in action at Sparrows Lane, after the postponed game on December 18th was



quickly rescheduled.

SKY SWITCH LIMITS CLUB'S VAT VOID

Changing the date of this evening's game for TV coverage helped Charlton avoid extra complications caused by the rise in VAT, says head of club development RICK EVERITY

Sky TV often gets the blame for inconvenience caused by fixture changes, but in the case of today's game, the company's intervention has done staff at The Valley a bit of a favour.

Although this match against
Swindon Town was originally
scheduled for this afternoon, it was
quickly changed to tomorrow by
agreement between managers Phil
Parkinson and Danny Wilson, to
allow more recovery time following
the Saturday fixtures.

With VAT due to rise from 17.5 per cent to 20 per cent at midnight tonight, that would have created a bit of an accounting headache, with tickets for the game having to be sold at two different rates of the purchase tax, depending on when they were bought.

Thanks to Sky, the game reverted to this evening, however, and we didn't have any such problem.

However, tickets for our next home match against Plymouth Argyle on January 22nd, which are already being sold, will rise in price tomorrow, and all remaining home games will be charged at a higher rate.

As set out last summer when the VAT rise was announced, we are increasing the adult prices of £17, £22 and £25, and the over 60s and U21s price of £17, by 50p, but the £13 concession price and the £5 U18 price will remain unchanged. If you buy a Plymouth ticket today, you will not pay the extra.

The aim is to ensure that the club achieves the same net revenue across all ticket prices as it would

Season-ticket holders are unaffected, of course, and we aren't increasing the price of any half-season tickets purchased after the VAT rise, as they will cover fewer games at that stage.

There are no changes to Valley
Express or Valley Away coaches,
or to the price of the Valley Review,
as these items are zero-rated.
Valley Gold is unaffected and we
will absorb the increase into the

existing £20 Young Addicks membership fee.

Things get a bit more complicated in the hospitality and refreshment areas. We will absorb the VAT increase within the current prices at concourse kiosks, but there will be changes in Bartram's, Crossbars and other hospitality areas.

For example, after today, a pint of Foster's in the internal bars is rising

> from £3.30 to £3.40, which includes a small element of rounding to avoid creating issues

around change.

A meal in Legends will rise from £24.95 to £25.50, but as other hospitality is normally advertised net of VAT, the quoted price for other areas will remain the same.

In the retail area, prices will generally rise to reflect the VAT increase, although the club will make no change on items below £3 and will also absorb the impact on some special offers, such as DVDs.

The price of an adult replica shirt will go up from £39.99 to £40.99, but children's sizes will remain at £29.99 because children's clothing is zero-rated for VAT.

If all this seems complicated, please spare a thought for those who have to implement it!



96. What can you remember about your debut in football?


My debut was for Manchester

PAUSE FOR THAW-T AFTER FESTIVE PROGRAMME IS FROZEN OUT

Referee Andy D'Urso's late, late show in SE7 left the Boxing Day Valley Review in danger of being wasted, resulting in a rethink when producing today's edition. Editor MATT WRIGHT explains more

There is nothing worse for a programme editor than a late postponement.

Not since New Year's Day 2003, when heavy rain led to a waterlogged pitch just an hour before the London derby against

West Ham United, have Charlton had a home game called off with so little time until kick-off.

And it left the matchday programme produced for the Boxing Day visit of Southampton in a complicated position.

In contrast to that fixture
against the Hammers almost eight
years ago, the turnstiles were not
opened ahead of the match eight
days ago.


This meant that, although the Valley Review was on sale around the ground and in the Superstore, and distributed in the hospitality suites as normal, only around 360 issues were sold.

Even though the club can no longer boast Premier League riches, we quickly ruled out using the same edition whenever the game was rescheduled, not least because the number of games the club currently has outstanding means that it is likely to be some time before the match takes place.

But we also faced an editorial dilemma regarding what to do with the content in the Southampton programme.

If we re-used the articles in future editions, such as today's match

against Swindon
Town, then a
minority of readers
would see them
twice. But equally,
we didn't want fans
to miss out on
some interesting
content from the
Saints issue.



As a result, there is a bit more duplication from the Southampton programme than we would have liked, but where possible, we have updated sections, such as the main Christian Dailly interview and the 100 to One and First and Last features with Lee Martin and Dave Lockwood respectively. There is

even a new cover.

However, for the vast majority of supporters, this will be a completely new issue. So enjoy!

PIECES IN A POD

Christmas may have passed, but there is still a present in the offing for fans, because the *Chariton Live* podcast is coming to iTunes.

A number of complicated technical hurdles have been overcome, and we hope that the edited highlights of each two-hour show, broadcast every Sunday on CAFC Player from 7-9pm, will soon be available to download.

Each free podcast will be around 25 minutes long, and will include match reaction, excerpts from interviews with special guests, fans' comments and the usual banter between the panel.

The intention is to offer a general round-up of each show rather than the whole 120-minute programme, partly because that doesn't suit the podcast format and partly because we also want to promote the live show on CAFC Player.

However, because we're trying something new, we will certainly be listening to the feedback we receive from supporters on the first few podcasts.

MAINE EVENT MAGAZINE REAPS RICH REWARDS

Defeat by the Red Devils in 1947 left most of the travelling Addicks fans feeling Blue – that is, until now... GARY HAINES also looks at Charlton's FA Cup record against their next opponents

Sixty-four years ago tomorrow,
Charlton travelled to Maine Road for
a First Division clash – but their
Manchester opponents were not as
obvious as you might expect.

Manchester United moved in with their neighbours for eight years after their Old Trafford home was damaged by German bombs in March 1941, and the Red Devils were 4-1 winners in front of 43,658 fans, with Chris Duffy netting a late consolation for the Londoners.

It was a heavy defeat for Jimmy Seed's side, but any supporters who made the trip and purchased the matchday programme may find any lasting disappointment lessened by the news that they could make a potential resale profit of over 8,000 per cent, according to Charlton historian Colin Cameron.

"Looking on eBay recently, I was interested to see that the winning bid for a programme for the match on January 4th, 1947 was £102, which represented 8,160 times its original cost – 3d in old money.

"Back in those days, £102

would nearly have paid the total wages of the 11 Charlton players, because the total weekly wage of the team, excluding win and draw bonuses, would have set the Addicks back £114.

"The maximum wage for every club in the country that season was £12 in the winter and £10 in the summer."

ONE VISION FOR SPURS

Although Phil Parkinson recently banned all talk of Tottenham Hotspur, Sunday's FA Cup tie means there is plenty to look forward to and much to recall as well.

As Chas & Dave often chirp, 'it's lucky for Spurs when the year ends in one', and that's been the case for the North Londoners against the Addicks in English football's premier domestic cup competition.

On January 7th, 1961, Spurs beat Chariton 3-2 at White Hart Lane on their way to winning the

Stalwart defender Christian Dailly has embarked on his 21st season as a professional – the *Valley Review* looks back through his career...

June 10th, 1998: Scotland 1 Brazil 2. Dailly and Scotland kicked off the 1998

World Cup in the Stade de France by giving the reigning champions an almighty scare. In front of a crowd of 80,000, things looked bleak when Cesar Sampaio opened the scoring after just four minutes, but Scotland levelled through a John Collins penalty.

Derby County's 24-year-old Dailly – who was playing in his first World Cup and had starred in the video for Del Amitri's official World Cup song, Don't Come Home Too Soon – had an effort saved, but Tom Boyd's own goal gave Brazil victory. Scotland finished bottom of their group after drawing with Norway and losing 3-0 to Morocco.

competition, when they became the first club to achieve the league and cup double in the 20th century.

The clubs met again at The Valley 40 years later, when an unlikely scorer was on target for the Addicks on February 7th.

Boyhood Tottenham fan

Chris Powell put the home side
ahead in a fourth-round tie –
and was promptly booked for
over-celebrating his first goal for
the club.

Mathias Svensson doubled the lead four minutes after the break, but an own goal from Richard Rufus offered the visitors a route back into the game. By 63 minutes, Spurs, who included striker Gary Doherty in their line-up, led 3-2 and Sergei Rebrov added a late fourth.

Doherty netted against

Tottenham's fierce rivals Arsenal in
the semi-final at Old Trafford, but the
Gunners won 2-1 to put the iconic
anthem in mothballs until now.

Stuart Leary scores Charlton's first goal in a 3-2 FA Cup third-round defeat at White Hart Lane in January 1961

Tottenham and Charlton have been pitted together twice more in the FA Cup since 1961. On January 5th, 1985, Mark Aizlewood's 50thminute strike – after his penalty and the follow-up from Steve Gritt were saved by Ray Clemence – at White Hart Lane cancelled out an opener by Garth Crooks, who would join the Addicks two seasons later.

Spurs won the replay 2-1 on

January 23rd thanks to goals from Tony Galvin and Mark Falco, with Ronnie Moore replying from the penalty spot.

That draw with Spurs was the only occasion on which Charlton have enjoyed a measure of success in the competition against London's so-called big four.

The Addicks have not managed a goal in two defeats apiece against Arsenal and Chelsea, while five FA Cup games against West Ham United have resulted in five losses.



Random Addick

Now more likely to be found writing about the beautiful game than playing it, Lawrie Madden saw plenty of highs and lows in five seasons with Charlton.

A former Arsenal youth star in the same crop as Liam Brady and David O'Leary, Madden joined Chariton in December 1977 and played 127 times for the club, scoring seven goals. The defender-cum-midfielder suffered relegation to the third tier in 1979/80 before helping the Addicks return to the Second Division a year later. Bethnal Green-born Madden, now 55, went on to enjoy the finest spell of his career for Sheffield Wednesday, and currently works as a freelance football journalist and helps to train aspiring writers.

AUSTIN POWERS AS SWINDON HOPE FOR SWING IN FORTUNES

The Robins return to SE7 hoping to shrug off a hangover in the new year – and their talismanic young striker could be key to an improvement in form. GARY HAINES assesses the Wiltshire men

GROUP LED BY DAN WILSON, SUCCESS AT CLOSING TIME IS TONIGHT'S AIM

Wembley is no place for losers, as Swindon Town would testify following their League One play-off final defeat by Millwall last May.

Having been 90 minutes away from playing Championship football for the first time since 2000, the Robins remained in the third tier after their 1-0 loss at the home of football.

Perhaps nursing a hangover from last season, Danny Wilson's side has struggled to make inroads at the right end of the table in 2010/11 due to an erratic start to the campaign.

A run of five league games without a win left the Robins swimming against the tide, but their elusive first league victory, a 1-0 County Ground success courtesy of Charlie Austin, came against promotion favourites Southampton on September 11th.

Highly-rated Austin has continued his fine goalscoring form of last term, and took his tally for the first half of the season to 15 with a leveller against Peterborough United on December 28th.

The striker, who joined from Poole Town in October 2009 following some prolific scoring exploits for the non-League club, forged a formidable partnership with Billy Paynter in 2009/10 as the Robins flew into the play-off picture.

And Paynter's departure to Leeds
United in the summer seems to
have had little impact, with Austin's
10th league strike earning a useful
point against the Posh six days ago.

Town had been beaten by a lastgasp own goal when the sides met in a nine-goal thriller at London Road in October, a result all the more galling because they had fought back from 3-0 and 4-3 down.

And although Swindon have enjoyed knock-out success at Southampton and Plymouth Argyle, a 2-1 win at Walsall on September 18th remains their only league win on the road this season.

Wilson and his men also suffered the ignominy of a humbling home defeat by Blue Square Bet Premier side Crawley Town in an FA Cup second-round replay, and that was the Robins' last outing before the draw against Peterborough.

Swindon – who enjoyed two classic confrontations at The Valley last season, including a 2-2 draw against nine-man Charlton on

Boxing Day – beat the Addicks on
spot-kicks to reach the play-off final.

The Wiltshire club sat just five points
outside the play-offs ahead of their
home clash with AFC Bournemouth
on New Year's Day.

But of more concern to Wilson would have been the fact that they were just three points above the relegation zone, so the Robins boss will be looking to make forward strides in 2011, starting this evening. Jon-Paul McGovern

The tive-toot-eight midfielder netted three goals in 16 league games for eventual League Two champions. Notts County, made four substitute appearances for Swindon and played his first Premier League match for Pompey, featuring in three different tiers of English football in just over 14 weeks.



SEAN MORRISON DEFENDER Centre-half Morrison, 19, started out with Plymouth Argyle before coming through the youth and reserve teams at The County Ground. The six-foot-one defender played 23 matches in 2008/09, and enjoyed a loan spell with Southend United last season, making eight league starts for both the Robins and the Shrimpers. Before Saturday, Morrison, now firmly established at the heart of Swindon's defence, had scored six goals since making his debut in April 2008, including four in 23 matches this season, and the Robins have never lost when he has found the net.



CHARLIE AUSTIN FORWARD Highly-rated Austin, 21, has gamered rave reviews since being plucked from non-League in October 2009. Having scored 46 goals in 46 matches for Poole Town in 2008/09, the six-foot-two hitman netted his 20th goal of the campaign as Swindon defeated Charlton in the League One play-off semi-finals last May. Despite the departure of strike partner Billy Paynter in June, Austin has struck 15 times in his first 21 games this season, including eight goals in the final nine matches of 2010, with the Addicks one of just six sides to prevent him finding the net.

BEST OF THE REST

Providing back-up in goal is former England U21 stopper David Lucas, 33, who played as Swindon defeated Charlton in last season's League One play-off semi-finals.

Poland U21 international Jakub Jesionkowski, 21, and former Aldershot Town stopper Mark Scott, 20 today, had yet to feature before the weekend.

Normally operating in central defence is Scotland B international Scott Cuthbert, 23, who scored three goals in 39 league matches last term after joining from first club Celtic in July 2009.

Available at right-back is former Bristol City and Swansea City man Kevin Amankwaah, 28.

Celtic youth product Paul Caddis, 22, played against Spanish giants Barcelona in the last 16 of the 2007/08 Champions League, while homegrown Nathan Thompson, 19, made his senior bow in October.



FIRST & LAST

WITH DAVE LOCKWOOD

Manning the tannoy on matchdays is a dream for one Addicks supporter, and he tells GARY HAINES about relaunching Charlton Live, getting stick from the players and being called into a former manager's office to discuss his taste in pre-match music

FIRST CONNECTION WITH CHARLTON?

In February 1974, during the threeday week [the result of miners' strikes], Charlton had to play their first Sunday match, against Shrewsbury Town, to avoid using floodlights. I went with my dad.

LASTING MEMORIES OF YOUR VALLEY DEBUT?

I remember standing at the top of the East Terrace, and that we came in through the Bartram Gate. I was overwhelmed by how big it all was. I can't recall the game, but it ended 3-3 and I had some Monkey Nuts.

FIRST KEY SKILL OF A MATCHDAY PITCH ANNOUNCER?

Stay calm, especially when Bob Bolder or Colin Walsh are nearby. Try not to speak too quickly and remain professional at all times.

LAST MATCHDAY PREPARATIONS BEFORE GOING PITCHSIDE?

I meet up with the rest of the Charlton Live team to discuss our next show, and then I'll read the matchday itinerary to see what we are doing. I'll have a chat with the communications team and, before I go pitchside, I'll get a couple of teamsheets and try to find out how to pronounce the names correctly.

FIRST TIME YOU TOOK THE VALLEY MICROPHONE?

It was the first match of 1993/94 against Birmingham City, after I'd been making announcements and playing music at reserve games. I met [stadium manager] Roy King, who told me that because Bill Prosser, the PA man at Upton Park when we'd played there, wasn't available to do our games, I'd been given the job. We won 1-0, but there were no CDs in those days, just an old disco turntable.

LAST HOME GAME YOU MISSED?

It has to be a league game about 20 years ago, although I've missed a couple of friendlies when I've been on honeymoon or holiday.

FIRST TIME YOU WERE LOST FOR WORDS?

It was a few years ago when Alan Curbishley asked me to go to his office. He didn't like the build-up music I was playing, so he threw a few ideas at me. I was like a little schoolboy in the headmaster's office. I think we decided on Into The Valley, but he wasn't a fan of The Red, Red Robin.

LAST TIME YOU LISTENED TO Another Pitch announcer?

I was watching a live game on TV the other week and the guy at Liverpool, George Sephton, was doing his stuff. He has to have the most distinctive voice of all; a really deep, gravelly, 40-fags-a-day voice.

FIRST BANTER WITH PAUL BENSON?

He recently gave me some stick on Twitter after I announced that Kyel Reid had scored against Bristol Rovers. From our angle, it looked as if Reidy had scored, and, in my defence, I was at pitch level and the Rovers bench were in the way. Fair play to Benno, though. He could have been precious about it, but he's been content to mock me. I did call a goal wrongly last season, as well. Generally, we don't call own goals, but in the home play-off game against Swindon Town, the coaching staff told me that David



Mooney had scored our first, so that's what I announced, to the disbelief of the Sky floor manager.

LAST THING YOU SAY BEFORE KICK-OFF?

"You know what you've got to do – you've got to back the boys and make some noise. Come on you Reds!" I'm just a fan with the best job at The Valley, and I want the fans to get behind the players as much as I do, so it's my little way of urging everyone to back the team.

FIRST MEETING WITH YOUR WIFE?

I wouldn't have met my wife if I wasn't a Charlton fan. Her family are all fans, having been born in Woolwich as well. We met at a supporters' club meeting in Gravesend and we've been together for over 16 years. Both my sons are fans; they don't have a choice!

LAST RELAUNCH OF CHARLTON LIVE?

There have been several relaunches of the radio show since its inception on Radio Tharnesmead. We relaunched it on Time 106.8FM a

couple of years ago, but the station folded thanks to bad management. It left a really sour taste in my mouth and I was determined that it wasn't going to die. After many discussions with the club's communications department, we were eventually able to bring it back via CAFC Player. I know some people moan that they have to pay to listen to it, but no radio stations were interested in a specialist show, so this was our only route and I'd argue it's well worth it!

FIRST TIME YOU CO-COMMENTATED?

The first – and possibly last – time was against Southend United for CAFC Player in the Johnstone's Paint Trophy this season. It's so difficult, keeping up with play and speaking. Unfortunately, the main BBC LONDON commentator called the wrong goalscorer [Jose Semedo instead of Therry Racon]. The first thing he said to me when we met was that if he got something wrong on air, I wasn't to correct him, so I had to go along with it.

LAST POSTPONEMENT?

I'm still amazed the Southampton

game didn't go ahead. I stood by the pitch watching how hard staff were working, and you could see that the frozen bits weren't going to be a problem by kick-off. However, the match being called off meant we could record a longer segment for that night's special Charlton Live, and we sat and listened to all the press conferences afterwards.

FIRST CAR?

My first car was a yellow Mini 850cc. I'm six-foot-three, so it was a bit of a squeeze.

LAST TIME YOU SPOILED YOURSELF?

I love gadgets but had always been vehemently anti-Apple. Then I lost my phone. A colleague let me have a play with his iPhone and I realised that I'd been stupid! It's a brilliant piece of kit and it's really handy for *Charlton Live* because we record some material on it.

FIRST FAVOURITE TELEVISION SHOW?

Thunderbirds. I loved the stories and all the machines – I wanted to be Virgil and fly Thunderbird 2. ◀

Charlton may have lost three games to the weather in December, but at least one big Valley event got the go-ahead – albeit after it was forced to be rearranged.


That the Young Addicks Christmas party with the players had to be rescheduled for December 21st was the last thought in the minds of the dozens of junior supporters who attended the festivities, however.


The date of the annual party had to be switched after Charlton's match against Walsall was put back 24 hours to the same day, December 12th, but with

STAFF EARN THEIR SPURS AS FANS SNAP UP HOT TICKETS

Charlton's FA Cup draw at Totienham Hotspur prompted huge demand for seats, but the club's staff passed a demanding test with flying colours, says head of club development RICK EVERITT

Whatever the outcome at White Hart Lane on Sunday, the Tottenham Hotspur game has already provided us with some cause for satisfaction.

That's not just because the club can expect to earn £250,000 from the fixture. It's the fact that the systems we designed to handle the sale of the club's allocation of 4,350 tickets worked well.

Why should that even be worthy of comment? Well, the reality is that there is no one-size-fits-all solution to allocating tickets in these situations.

Every match is different – in circumstances, location and number of places available.

But we aim to be consistent and fair in the principles we apply and to ensure that we meet our obligations to five-year season-ticket holders (VIPs) and Valley Gold members.

About 1,800 Spurs tickets went to VIPs and Valley Gold season-ticket holders, plus fans with a history of four previous away match purchases this season. That left roughly 2,500 for season-ticket holders and other Valley Gold members, which were sold on December 15th and in the first few hours the following morning.

Some supporters have proposed alternative priority structures, including preference for those who had been to earlier FA Cup rounds, or a points system so that people who had attended any previous away games had greater eligibility.

Our view is that a points system would be a disproportionate response to the current situation, but even if it was appropriate, it is



not a practical option given our current ticketing set-up.

Nor is it clear why a fan who attended an earlier FA Cup game in London or Luton should suddenly have priority over another who had travelled to Carlisle United.

One person wanted to know why we only had four of the seven commercial-centre sales windows open on the Wednesday morning. In fact, we had another seven or eight staff answering the phones, which already involved calling in people from other departments who are trained for this purpose.

We set a limit of 20 people in the telephone queue at any one time, so that people could not run up big bills. This resulted in a large number of aborted calls in the first few hours, although by 11am on the first Friday and 12pm on the Wednesday, that was no longer happening.

We also disappointed some fans by declining to look up other people's CON numbers so that they could buy on their behalf, but if we did this, it would obviously be open to abuse by a minority.

One problem we had was that ticket information for the game briefly disappeared from the website following the Luton Town replay due to a technical problem, although we had been publicising the potential arrangements since the Monday.

On reflection, the telephone message could also have been designed better, so that people did not have to listen to so much information before being told that their call had been aborted.

I think it should be acknowledged, however, that all the commercialcentre staff and their colleagues from other departments did a great job, as they usually do.



Some 4,350 Addicks will be at White Hart Lane, and it's no surprise that our tickets have sold out for the club's first match against a Premier League side since May 2007.

Away fans are in the two-tiered south stand, behind the goal, which isn't dissimilar to our own north stand, albeit a bit more cramped. The view isn't bad, but those in the lower tier should take note of the weather before travelling as it's partly exposed to the elements.

The facilities are OK, with a standard breeze-blocked concourse offering the usual food fare. There are numerous burger vans outside the ground, plus every type of takeaway you could wish for.

Alcohol is available in the ground, although not at half-time on our last couple of visits, and the nearby pubs are pretty much home-only. Things improve towards Seven Sisters tube station, while the Haringey Irish Centre, opposite White Hart Lane train station, welcomes away fans, has a car park and serves lovely food and a decent pint.

Lots of residents' schemes
make parking nearby a nightmare,
so I suggest that all journeys are
completed using public transport.

Hillsborough is an excellent ground steeped in history. It's also tinged with sadness, and there is a memorial to those who lost their lives in 1989.

Although it looks a little dated compared to newer stadia with similar capacities, it retains a special aura, and the view is not bad from our vantage point in the upper tier behind the goal, despite four posts near the front of the roof.

It's a bit of a climb, with the entrances to the seating halfway up the stand, and the scoreboard to the right disappears from view the closer to the back you sit. The

concourses are a little dark, but there is plenty of room, and there are TVs and a bookies. The kiosks aren't inviting, but the food is OK.

On our last visit, Wednesday did not sell alcohol, and there aren't many pub options nearby. Along the A61 near the old Wadsley Bridge railway station, the Wadsley Jack is homely, while the larger New Bridge Inn has satellite TV. Of course, the city centre has something for everyone, while The Howard is across the road from the station.

Some street parking is available for early arrivers, or use the unofficial car parks along the A61. ◀ IC



1 Show Me Love - Robin S

I quite liked garage music when I was younger and I went to Ayia Napa three times on the bounce. I used to DJ a bit back in the day, and this was a track I'd always put into my set. I had to sell my decks when I moved in with my missus, though, because there wasn't enough room. I was gutted!



4 Mardy Bum - Arctic Monkeys

Again, it's a song that doesn't age on me; I enjoy it every time I hear it. This type of music is probably the one I listen to least, but the Arctic Monkeys are a good band. I like a lot of their stuff, but this tune is my favourite of theirs, If I had to choose a player this song reminded me of, I'd say Alan McCormack, because he can be a bit of a mardy burn sometimes!



5 Man in the Mirror - Michael Jackson

I'm a big fan of Michael Jackson. He's probably the greatest pop artist who's ever lived. I know a lot of the boys have chosen his tracks, but I don't think anyone's gone for this one and it's one of my personal favourites. It's just a great, great song. I dressed up as Jackson for the players' Christmas party, so I threw a few moonwalks in during the night. Pretty bad ones they were, too!
