




Once again the support was fantastic on Tuesday, I think at periods in the first half especially the atmosphere created when were going forwards was immense and that comes as a great boost for all the players.

Chris is joined today by a number of former Burton Albion players including Ray Bowering, Geoff Tye, Maurice Hodgkin and Jim McAdam.



So, whatever the result today, we may see a little Italian bonding after the clash of the Paolos. One thing is for sure, though, I don't think Steve Evans will be invited to the aftermatch party.

Let's hope the celebrations today are all about yet another Brewers win, in the wake of Tuesday's magnificent performance against Crewe!

Swindon Town Player Spotlight

Mattia Lanzano

Italian goalkeeper Mattia Lanzano (right) departed native side USD Gavorrana 1930 in July to sign a two-year deal with Town The 20-year-old custodian travelled with the squad on the pre-season tour to Italy, and made his debut in the 11-0 win over Norcia. Lanzano competes with Phil Smith and Mark Scott for the number one iersey at The County Ground.

Paul Caddis

Signed alongside fellow Celtic youth team graduate Simon Ferry in August 2010 for a combined undisclosed fee.

The 22-year-old penned a threeyear deal, and his capture concluded a lengthy pursuit from then Town boss Danny Wilson. Caddis can play in many different positions, but is predominantly a right-sided defender.

Joe Devera

Became Paolo Di Canio's first signing as Town boss in June 2011. Devera linked up with the Robins after an established spell with Barnet and will hope to use his considerable experience to help Swindon to success.

The 24-year-old, who is of Venezuelan descent, made 177 appearances during a six-year career with the Bees, and was named the club's Player of the Year in 2008 and 2011.



Oliver Risser

Risser penned a two-year-deal at The County Ground in July 2011, and was named club captain shortly

The 30-year-old is a Namibian international who has played in Norway, Germany and Greece during his career.

A powerful defensive midfielder, Risser can also play as a centreback.

Callum Kennedy

Former Reading youngster was first granted a taste of first team action by former Town boss Paul Sturrock. The youngster made a surprise start in the 4-1 win over Brentford in the Johnstone's Paint Trophy in

September 2007.

He was awarded a new one-year contract in the summer of 2009 and competed with Lecsinel Jean-François for the left-back slot before a pelvic injury sustained mid-way through the season kept him on the sidelines for the remainder of it.

Simon Ferry



Celtic in August 2010, penning a three-year deal. The midfielder (below) had enjoyed a hugely successful season at Swindon in 2009/2010, making 42 starts and scoring twice in Town's play-off campaign. Ferry made 25 appearances during the 2010/11 season and was often a frustrated figure on the substitutes

Made the permanent switch from



bench, especially during the second half of the campaign.

Alan McCormack

Signed a two-year-deal at The County Ground in July 2011. Following his release from Charlton Athletic, the Irishman trained with Paolo Di Canio's side for a week before putting pen to paper. McCormack started his career at Preston North End, before a series of loan moves preceded a switch to Southend United.

Alan Connell

Swindon Town clinched the signing of Grimsby Town striker Connell for an undisclosed six-figure sum in July 2011. The 28-year old frontman put pen to paper



year deal at The County Ground. Connell arrived at Blundell Park from Bournemouth in July 2010 and scored 25 league goals for the Mariners last term - finishing the campaign with 29 in all competitions.

Mehdi Kerrouche


Algerian striker Medhi Kerrouche (right) became Paolo Di Canio's eighth signing of the summer, agreeing a two-year contract at The County Ground. The 25-year-old free agent left United Arab Emirates side Al-Oruba during the summer and took the number 39 shirt after signing with Town.

Lander Gabilondo

Spanish winger signed for Town in August 2011.

After arriving on trial soon after the start of the campaign, he impressed the Town





management before being awarded a one-year deal.

Born in San Sebastian, Lander (below) came through the youth system at Real Sociedad where he turned professional at the age of 18.

He then moved to La Liga rivals Osasuna where he played 159 games in the Spanish 2B division.



Swindon started the season brightly enough with a convincing home win against Crewe but followed that up with four defeats in a row albeit all four by just one goal. They got their season back on track with a televised win over promotion-chasing Rotherham and by beating Southend last Saturday.



PAOLO DI CANIO

Despite an illustrious playing career in England and Italy most fans still remember the Swindon manager for one incident.

In September, 1998, he had an infamous altercation with the referee while playing for Sheffield Wednesday against Arsenal. He pushed Paul Alcock to the ground and was roundly condemned for his treatment of the ref which earned him an 11-match suspension and a hefty fine.

By contrast, Di Canio had a dazzling playing spell at both Wednesday and West Ham scoring the goal voted the best of the decade by Sky Sports viewers and Goal of the Season on Match of the Day - a wonderful volley he scored in March 2000 (watch it on Youtube).


Di Canio made over 500 league appearances and scored more than 100 league goals.

Before coming to England, Di Canio played in Serie A for Lazio, Juventus, Napoli and AC Milan, he also played in Scotland for Celtic. He retired from football in 2008 and took over as manager at Swindon in the close season.

THE BOY'S a bit special


Swindon's No 10 was named the club's Player of the Year last season despite not actually officially signing until January. He had been previously on loan at the club from



For the start of the 2010-11 season, Ritchie found himself in the starting line up at Portsmouth but after losing his place went on loan to Swindon, where he hasn't looked back.







Today the Brewers line-up against a former Premiership team as Swindon Town join Bradford City as another former top flight club in the basement division after a brief flirtation with the big boys.

Swindon turned professional in 1894 but enjoyed just one season amongst the elite.

They won promotion to the Premier League after coming through the play offs at the end of the 1992-93 season.

They were the second team

to win promotion to the Premier League via the playoffs route, beating Leicester City to secure their place.

Sadly, like so many cubs, they had a single season in the top flight with a Derby Countylike ability to ship goals. More than 100 went into Swindon's net as they quickly returned to the lower divisions where they have spent the vast majority of their football life.

There have, however, been periods of great success for the Wiltshire side, most notably when they won the 1969 League Cup beating

Arsenal at Wembley.

As a result of that success, they were entered in and won the 1969 and 1970 Anglo-Italian Cups.

DID YOU KNOW?

Swindon played Manchester United in the highest scoring Charity Shield match ever. Swindon won the Southern League championship in 1911 earning them the right to play Football League champions Manchester United in the

annual game. The game was played at Stamford Bridge with Manchester United winning 8-4.

The game was played in the September of 1911 only six months before the sinking of the luxury liner the Titanic which struck an iceberg crossing the Atlantic. Most of the money from the Charity Shield game went to help survivors of the Titanic as a result.

LAST SEASON

Where did it all go wrong for Swindon in 2010/11? Was it really all down to the loss of striker Billy Paynter (right) to Leeds? In the 2009-10 season Swindon had been one of the top teams in League 1 looking a sure bet for automatic promotion for much of the year before slipping to fifth. However they were back on course when they beat Charlton Athletic in the play off semis only to lose 1-0 to Millwall at Wembley. Surely 2010/11 would see Swindon go one better?



Wilson resigned, on April 25, 2011, Swindon were in freefall and were duly relegated to League 2 after losing 3-







Current boss Phil Parkinson is the third permanent manager in the job this calendar year. They year started with Peter Taylor in charge but he left early in the new year to be replaced by former boss Peter Jackson. He then became the first manager this season to leave his role when he quit in August and former Charlton and Colchester boss Parkinson now has the task of moving Bradford up the League 2 table.

At this venue young people aged 14 – 18 will have the unique opportunity to participate in the Brazilian 5 a side football game called 'FUTSAL', this form of the game allows players to express themselves as footballers and as individuals, providing the basis for players to show their ability and skills whilst promoting fair play and respect.

These sessions have been organised to provide free football for individuals who are currently not engaging, people participating in Anti Social Behaviour, or just members of the local community interested in, or enjoy playing football. The sessions have been formed short term to provide something for the local communities, reduce boredom, and hopefully provide enjoyment for individuals

participating, whilst reducing particular crime rates through playing football.

A WORD WITH... Nathan Stanton

Burton Albion have been boosted by the news that central defender Nathan Stanton will not be sidelined for the rest of the season as expected, instead the former Rochdale centre back could return in time for the end of October.

Stanton was due to undergo an operation to correct a disorder with his patella, but has now undergone a much less invasive procedure which will allow him to return in a little over a month's time.

Speaking after his operation Stanton said, "When the surgeon told me it was only going to be six to eight weeks I was delighted. I'm back now doing my rehab and I'm hoping it will be even quicker. There's no rush as originally it was going to be between six and nine months.

'I was in there (hospital) for six hours. It was an in and out job really, nothing too major. I've had the operation before and I was in a knee brace for two months. I was none wait bearing and I didn't even go out of my house for about two months. It was a massive relief this time around when he said it would only be six to eight weeks.

'I wasn't thinking too much about the injury, I was thinking about the future. It's given me hope and fingers crossed I can get back playing soon and help Burton get promotion.

'I had a lot of good well wishes from the lads, it was brilliant and kept my spirits up when originally I thought it was going to be six to nine months. I'm really delighted and the lads have been great.'

'To be honest it had been the best I've felt. I had a full preseason, I just missed the Telford game when I got a little injury before the match. I've felt fine and then I played against Burnley, finished the game, and two days later my knee swelled up and things deteriorated from there.'

The news of Stanton's injury came in the same week that Tom Parkes returned to Leicester City after suffering a fractured ankle against Port Vale. That left Ryan Austin and Tony James as first choice entre backs with Darren Moore returning to fitness after missing a section of preseason.

Stanton continued, 'They say centre halves are meant to be hard. We had a lot of problems last year as well with the centre backs getting injured so obviously the gaffer has strengthened and kept five.

We're down to three now

but people can slot in there and whoever has had to play has done really well.'

But despite his absence Stanton has been pleased with the Brewers beginning to the season with points being gathered consistently in the opening six weeks.

'I don't want to talk too much about last season but we look more solid this year and we look like we are going to score in every game as well,' said Stanton. 'Now we just need to make sure we keep hanging on to wins. That's more of a mental thing but I'm sure we will overcome it and I'm sure we will be up there by the end of the season.





He is also someone who can come out of defence with the ball and play, which was important to us." Crawley defenders Pablo Mills, John Dempster and Kyle McFadzean are all currently on the sidelines and they lost 6-0 to Morecambe on Saturday.

Coleman needs a cutting edge from slow-start Stanley

Accrington Stanley manager John Coleman believes his side can have another good season in League Two. The Lancashire club reached the play-off semi-finals last season but then saw key duo Phil Edwards and Jimmy Ryan leave for League One clubs. 





Match Report: Albion v Plymouth Argyle


Summary

Burton Albion secured their first home win of the season thanks to goals from Justin Richards and Calvin Zola as struggling Plymouth Argyle were put to the sword at the Pirelli Stadium. Richards opened the scoring in first half stoppage time with a well taken goal to make it three in as many matches and Zola scrambled home a second to give the Brewers breathing space with a little over half an hour to go. Home nerves were jangling at the end though as on loan midfielder Will Atkinson netted from close range in stoppage time at the end of the game.

This week we take a look at the career of the Brewers third manager, William Sneddon, in our series focussing on the early days of the Club

William Sneddon (July 1952 – May 1953)

during the Birmingham

League era.

Burton Albion's third manager William Cleland Sneddon, was appointed less than four weeks before the start of the 1952 – 1953 season, with the club's directors having overseen the re-signing of most of the players retained from the previous term, plus several new professional and amateur signings.

Sneddon was the licensee of the new Inn, Coppice Side, Swadlincote, having recently moved From Milford Haven, South Wales, where he had been player-coach at the town's Welsh Senior League club for several seasons, prior to which he had











enjoyed a professional career at the highest level. Although, aged 38, he was still able to play, the

club revealed that he would only turn out if the need arose but would train with the players in his managers' role.

The second Scot to be in charge during Albion's short existence, Sneddon was born at Wishaw, near Glasgow, in 1914 and showed fine form and ability at Scottish League clubs Hamilton and Falkirk before commanding a £4000 transfer fee when moving south to Brentford in June 1937 (pictured). The hitherto unfashionable London club had risen quickly through the divisions during the 1930's and finished in the top six of Division 1 in season 1935-36 and 1936-37. Sneddon made a good start to his career in England, missing just three games during the 1937-38 term, with Brentford again finishing 6th in Division 1 after heading the table for much of the season. He lost his first team left half spot towards the end of 1938-39 (27 appearances, 2 goals) and joined Second Division Swansea during the summer of 1939.

After only three games of 1939-1940, WW2 broke out, the Football League programme was postponed and, like so many players of his generation, he lost his best footballing years during the hostilities. He did return to Brentford for two season of the Wartime League and played left half at Wembley when his team beat Portsmouth 2-0 in the London War Cup final in May 1942, in front of 72,000 spectators.

He was back with Swansea for the final wartime season (1945-46) and played just twice in 1946-47 before being transferred to Newport County in October 1946. After 18 games for the Second Division club he made his last Football League appearances in May 1947, moving to Milford Haven for the 1947-48 campaign, holding a position as player-coach for four years, prior to re-locating to the Burton area.

Sneddon took up his position at the end of July 1952 and rekindled public interest with a total of almost 3500 spectators turning up for the two pre-season practise games. His only major signings prior to the Birmingham League kick off were Platts ex-Chesterfield and Forest keeper, and Malcolm Thomas, a 21 year old wing half, known to him at Milford Haven and Swansea.

The two opening home games were won with almost 5000 fans at each of the Birmingham League fixtures against Aston Villa and Brush Sports but, during September 1952, only one of eight matches ended in victory for Albion as exits were made from four cup competitions. The team's defensive positions were causing problems and Sneddon himself turned out in an unfamiliar left back position for two games towards the end of the month. The new manager then took action and brought in experienced full backs Arthur Green and Snowball, along with winger Tom Russell, and the team's fortunes took a turn for the better. From early October to mid December 1952 nine out of ten Birmingham League games were won with nine goals being rattled past both Whitwick Colliery and Wellington Reserves, plus a 5-0 victory over Tamworth, on Staffordshire Senior Cup duty.

The good form, with Sneddon fielding a settled side, continued though into the following March, with Albion 2nd place in the Birmingham League chart, close behind leaders Owestry. At the beginning of April 1953 nine Birmingham League fixtures remained but, with two defeats over Easter, any chances of the titled disappeared with a 0-2 defeat at Brush Sports midway through the month. In fact, only 6

points were gained during the final 5 weeks of the term and the team were also beaten by Port Vale in the semi-final of the Staffordshire Senior Cup. Albion finished 4th in the Birmingham League – the highest position to date – but at the end of April 1953 the club parted company with its third manager in just 18 months.

Sneddon tendered his resignation, which was reluctantly accepted by the directors, who thanked him for his services over the past 9 months. Sneddon was of the opinion that the Board thought that the team's loss of form in recent weeks was due to bad management and that the subsequent lack of confidence in his abilities gave him no option but to resign. It was agreed by all parties that it would be in the club's best interests to appoint a player manager at the earliest opportunity.

Sneddon's record in charge was good, 26 games won out of 51 played, with only 14 being lost and a goals tally of 122 for and 68 against. It had been an exciting season for the supporters and they showed their appreciation by the numbers that attended games at Wellington Street – over 180,000 in all between August 1952 and May 1953.

He left the club after the final Birmingham League game in 2nd May 1953 and eleven days later his successor was named.

Sneddon died at the age of 81, in 1995.

IT had to happen. The moment that Aaron McLean was named in Hull's team to face Peterborough last weekend, you just knew he would put his old club to the sword.

Sure enough, the man who scored 82 goals in four years at London Road pounced to volley home a spectacular winner — devastating the fans who once adored him.

McLean, who didn't celebrate the goal, joins a long list of players who have returned to haunt their former clubs – some with devastating consequences.

Denis Law

UNDOUBTEDLY the most famous case in living memory, and one that still haunts Law today.

Part of the 'United Trinity' with Bobby Charlton and George Best, Law scored 237 goals in 404 games for United, winning two league titles, an FA Cup and European Player of the Year

His 11-year stay finally ended in 1973 when he was granted a free transfer to arch rivals Manchester City. The pair met on the final day of the 1973-74 season with United needing a win to stay up but Law's cheeky backheel condemned his old side to relegation.

"I was inconsolable," he said in 2010. "I didn't want it to happen How long did the feeling last? How long ago was the game? Thirtyodd years. There is your answer. I played with all those guys. They were pals. I didn't want them down. It was the last thing in the world that I wanted."

Law, by then 34, was immediately substituted and

retired at the end of the season.

Gary McAllister

A £3m signing from Leeds in 1996, McAllister's displays in the heart of Coventry's midfield ensured he became a big favourite at Highfield Road.

When he left in 2000, snapped up on a surprise free transfer by Liverpool at the age of 35, he had scored 26 goals in 140 games for the Sky Blues.

By then, Coventry were struggling big time and, in April 2001, they welcomed Liverpool needing a win to stand any realistic chance of staying in the Premiership.

Sadly, they encountered a rejuvenated McAllister in the form of his life. First, the Scot swung in a corner that was headed in by Sami Hyypia. Then, just moments from the end, McAllister scored a 30-yard free kick to effectively send his old club down.

McAllister, head bowed, trudged back to the halfway line without even acknowledging the goal.

David Villa

LIKE McLean and Gary McAllister, some players refuse to celebrate scoring against former clubs. Spanish superstar Villa went one step further.

Playing for Valencia in 2009, Villa netted a penalty against Sporting Gijon, the club where he made his name and still supports. He then ran to their supporters, put his hands together and pleaded for forgiveness.

ONE of the highlights of the football calendar in our early years in the Conference was the away trip to Scarborough. A weekend on the North York Moors in a lovely B&B we found combined with an away game for the Brewers always seemed the perfect getaway (even if the weather invariably let us down).

Sadly, that fixture will never happen again. Scarborough, founded in 1879, were one of the oldest football clubs in the country and had a colourful history that included being taken into the Football League by Neil Warnock after he left the Brewers for the Yorkshire coast club in the late 1980s.

Scarborough had their downs in the Football League, and were often scrapping to avoid relegation, but they also had a few ups - including play off battles, drawing Arsenal in the FA Cup and beating Chelsea in the League Cup in a replay after drawing at Stamford Bridge. They spent 12 years in the Football League.

But in 2007 they played their last ever game. Having been relegated from the Football League and then the Conference top division they were facing another demotion to the Northern Premier League when they were wound up with debts of £2.5m.

There were no rescue bids, no rising from the ashes and today Scarborough has two smaller clubs, unconnected with the old that are further away from the Football League than we are from the Premiership.

This would be sad if it was a solitary tale of woe that only effected one town or city but this is a football story that has been repeated



up and down the country time and time again. Remember Maidstone United who were one of the early beneficiaries of promotion rather than election to the Football League? Probably not, I guess as they no longer exist They collapsed after three years in the Football League in 1992.

And Colne Dynamos anyone? After a rapid rise through the non-league ranks, promotion to the Conference and talk of the Football League they folded in 1990.

And will we be soon adding Plymouth to that list?

Only a few years ago they were challenging for promotion to the Premiership, now they have one foot in the Conference, having gone into administration and when they played the Brewers recently nearly had a players' revolt on their hands. Only when they got 40 per cent of the wages they were due for August did the players agree to play at the Pirelli.

I don't envy Plymouth fans and I'm consistently grateful that, by stark contrast, Burton Albion is a well run club. Under chairman Ben Robinson the Brewers have built for the future by living within our means. Sound financial planning being the order of the day.

So the best news that the club could have was that the annul accounts shows that profits have risen by 55% for the year which ended in May.

That means the club announced a trading profit of £84,400, having returned a profit of £54,310 the previous year.

The year's turnover figure rose 33%to hit £2.5m, compared to £1.9m the previous year.

That shows that the club is growing off the field and that unlike so many of our rivals, the Brewers future is secure.


Ben Robinson said: "I'm pleased with the profit but we still have a lot of scope, albeit in difficult times, to build on our commercial revenues."

"We continue to control our costs as carefully as possible but last year, again, we made a further substantial investment in the playing squad."

And that's what most fans want. Investment in the squad to take the club forward.

But that can only happen as and when we can afford it, because otherwise you quickly get into trouble.

And as fans of Scarborough will surely tell us, the most important thing isn't always winning matches, it's surviving to fight

SO that was 100 games in the Football League on Tuesday night. Doesn't time fly when you're having fun?

It was fitting, I think, that the team turned on one of the very best performances, perhaps THE best, among those 100. More than ever, they looked completely at home in the game against Crewe Alexandra with the physical demands of life in the Football League, although we have to remember that there are a fair few teams who will fight fire with fire a little more than Crewe.

It was a classic example of winning a physical battle, therefore allowing yourself the chance to play your football. It's something that's often called for by managers. and it's easy to forget that the other team's manager has called for exactly the same.

Perhaps they don't hear the manager shouting "keep the ball" frequently. There's enables you to keep the ball until an opening



But, actually, a defeat stands out for me in that season. I have never come away from a defeat feeling more positive than when we lost 1-0 at Bury late in the season.



So those are my specific highlights from the first two seasons and a bit. But there remains a highlight every single time we beat or take points off any of those teams who think they're bigger than they are.






A 50-mile run is an incredible challenge. Try it with your jaw wired shut.

Treatment Table

I am pleased to say that after Tuesday night's game vs. Crewe Alexandra there are no new injury worries.

Jacques Maghoma was on the receiving end of an innocuous tackle on Saturday vs. Oxford which resulted in his ankle swelling up significantly.

Having looked back at the video there was no obvious mechanism of injury. He had an x-ray on Tuesday which gladly revealed there was no fracture. There was however some osteophyte build up in the medial (inside) and lateral (outside) gutters of the talocrural (ankle) joint. The trauma

caused by the tackle at the time has caused a flare up which has resulted in the inflammation. I fully expect Jacques to be back in 2-3 weeks following a period of rest, modalities to reduce the swelling and rehabilitation in the gym.

Elsewhere Jack Dyer is progressing nicely following a hip flexor strain suffered against Sheffield United Reserves. As I'm writing this Jack has been out for a week, his rehab at this point has consisted of rest, ice and low-resistance stationary bike. Before returning to play, he needs to be pain free on both resistance tests and strength


tests. He still has some work to do in the gym and he is starting exercises to re-build his strength this week.

Cleveland continues to progress; he has been running all week with some light agility work such as turning and zig-zag runs. He still has some pain, but this is normal with this type of "high" ankle sprain. We will continue to increase the intensity of his rehab and keep his aerobic fitness at its peak. I expect Cleve to be returning to action within 2 weeks.

Nathan Stanton is progressing nicely and Greg could be out for up to 4 more weeks as we try to settle down the soft tissue damage in his big toe.

Lastly, I would like to give a mention to Hannah Cornell, a Sports Therapy 3rd year student who has been with us since the start of September. Hannah has fitted in superbly with the lads and has been a great addition to the team. Since being with us she has showed great enthusiasm and has demonstrated some really good knowledge along the way and I would like to wish her all the best for the future!


