

Manager's Report

with Gary Simpson

It seems strange to be saying this on a Friday, but welcome along to the Moss Rose for this evening's encounter with Swindon Town who many expect to be pushing for promotion come the end of the season.

I say strange as Friday isn't a regular day on the footballing calendar as you know. As a club we experimented last year against Accrington and by and large the feedback was positive. So when the Chairman asked if I was happy to look at a couple of games again this season, as the manager I didn't have a problem with that.

We'll of course prepare for the game in exactly the same thorough way as we would for a Saturday match and if it encourages a few more people to attend the game then that has to be a good thing.

Hopefully our last couple of home performances will have also persuaded a few more fans to return as well. I thought our display, particularly in the second half against Northampton was spot on. We played some good football, didn't let our heads drop when the goals weren't going in, and eventually got our reward.

The same couldn't really be said of the long trip south to Plymouth last Saturday. First up can I say a big thank you to the fans that also made the journey to support us! It's a long way especially when you lose. It was always going to be a tough day. Argyle's troubles are well documented and we were always going to be positioned as the villains of the piece on the day.

The new manager had certainly got them up for the game and their players worked hard and stuck to the task. To some extent we did the same but we gifted them two silly goals from set pieces and you just can't do that if you want to win games of football.

I spoke after the game about learning how to win games. That may sound an obvious thing to say but it is worth stressing. There is no point in being the best side, playing the better football and coming home with nothing. Every side in every game will have their moments of pressure. That's inevitable. But when they do it's about weathering the storm. At the moment, particularly away from home,

that's something we are struggling to do. And that was the case against Plymouth.

If I look at the Morecambe side we played the other week, well I reckon they would have probably come away from a game like Plymouth with at least a point. They've five or six keys players in the side in their thirties. That experience counts for a lot.

By contrast we have a lot of lads in their early twenties, some even younger. They are learning their trade and part of that development includes working on their communication during games. We're not the most vocal of sides and that's something we've spoken about in training this week. We shouldn't be afraid to open our gobs to put it bluntly!

As long as it's constructive I don't have a problem with that. So I suppose what I am saying is we are looking for more leaders out there to get us through those pressure periods in games.


And a greater level of consistency of course! As a manager it's frustrating to come away from Home Park knowing we haven't performed to anywhere near the level we had done seven days earlier. But that is part and parcel of having such a young squad and the key thing is to continue to support each other and work hard.

The games against Wimbledon and Northampton should act as a good reminder of what this talented young squad is capable of achieving. We just need to see more of it both home and away if we are to have any aspirations of a top half finish this season.

That's the challenge and as I always say it is made that much easier with your support.

Enjoy the game and hopefully a win this evening will set up the weekend nicely for everyone.




away from Home Park without a point this season; one to put behind us then with a good display this evening.

There is an alphabetical list of players going back to 1930, with profiles for the majority together with many photographs. Many interesting facts are recorded such


as - discover who usually played in his glasses, the player who was sent off by the referee to have a protruding nail in one his boots knocked back in and double hat-trick

Our Opponents...

SWINDON TOWN



A bit of a rollercoaster ride is how the local paper described events at the County Ground since the arrival of the irrepressible Paulo Di Canio.

The 42 year old arrived at the club in the summer to take up his first coaching role in England since retiring from the game back in 2008 after a career that included spells with Lazio, Juventus, Napoli and AC Milan and of course West Ham United.

As a player he was certainly not shy in coming forward. He famously, if that's the right words pushed over referee Paul Alcock in a fit of pique whilst at Sheffield Wednesday but showed the other side of his character when choosing not to shoot when Everton keeping Paul Gerrard was down injured, something which earned him the Fifa Fair Play Award back in 2001.

The one thing that links both is a passion for the game and that's something he is undoubtedly looking to instil in the club after what can only be described as a season to forget last year. The Robins never really recovered from their play-off final defeat against Millwall the previous May.

Having departed with the services of long time boss Danny Wilson in March, the experienced Paul Hart was given the task of resurrecting the Robins' flagging fortunes. But to no avail and the club return to the League's basement after four seasons in League One.

The season is barely two months old but already Di Canio has been in the national headlines on more than one occasion. But its matters on the field that concerns him most. After an opening day win over Crewe Alexandra four successive defeats in August had raised some concerns. But as many wins in September suggests that Di Canio is quickly learning his trade and fashioned together a squad that is certainly capable of achieving the aim of promotion next May.

This was perhaps best highlighted by the Robins' 3-0 demolition


of much fancied Crawley Town, and whilst they were not able to follow that up with a win in their next game at Burton, hopes were again raised last Saturday thanks to a comprehensive 4-0 thumping of Barnet in front of their own fans.

Speaking after the game the manager had these words to say:

"I didn't have any doubts about my team. To win 4-0 is a fantastic result but obviously we deserved it because we played very well today. Matt Ritchie is at different level - his delivery is a different class and the way he worked off the ball was crucial."

Ritchie is indeed seen as a key cog in the Robins' wheel and the former Portsmouth man was full of praise for his new gaffer.

"He knows everything about everyone – it's brilliant. Their keeper had a knock during the week and the manager said before hand that his left side was weak. I saw a little gap and squeezed it into the corner. Obviously little things like that pay off. The manager and the coaching staff study every player we are going to play against and the information they give us is brilliant."



SWINDON TOWN

The Robins made it four league wins in five last Saturday as they put four past a struggling Barnet side without reply. Matt Ritchie helped himself to two of those goals and here is a look at the players who took to the field at the County Ground.

PHIL SMITH.

Goalkeeper Smith joined Town in July 2006 from Crawley and was named fans Player of the Season in May 2007. In and out of the side over the years as he battled for the first team slot first with Peter Brezovan and later David Lucas, he was still heavily involved with the side's Wembley visit in 2010 with a string of saves in the Semi Final against Charlton. He was the regular started for the Robins last season and looks to be the man in possession of the berth this season with eight appearances already.

CALLUM KENNEDY

The youngster made a surprise debut in Swindon's 4-1 win over Brentford in the Johnstone's Paint Trophy in September 2007. After being taken on the club's pre-season tour to

Austria in 2008. Kennedy was handed a chance to impress in preseason with games against Cardiff City and Plymouth

Argyle. A pelvic injury kept him out of much of the 2009/10 season but after loan spells at Gillingham and Rotherham United during Season 2010/2011, Kennedy returned to The County Ground as first-choice left-back for Season 2011/12.

JOE DEVERA

Devera became Paolo Di Canio's first signing as Town boss in June 2011, linking up with the Robins after an established spell

appearances during a six-year spell, and was named the club's Player of the Year in 2008 and 2011 after coming through the youth ranks at the club.

ALBERTO COMAZZI

with Barnet where

he made 177

Experienced defender Alberto Comazzi signed a two-year deal at The County Ground in July following lengthy talks with the club. The 32year old progressed through the youth team ranks at AC Milan before spending time with the likes of Como, Monza and Verona. Comazzi spent last season at Spezia, before arriving in Wiltshire for his first spell in English football with Town.

PAUL CADDIS

Caddis signed from Celtic along with Simon Ferry in August 2010. Predominantly a right sided defender, the club captain can play in many different positions. After coming through the

youth ranks at Celtic, he made 25 appearances for the Bhoys in 2009/2010, including starts in the Champions League. Almost everpresent last season, he was voted Fans' Away Player of the Year and took over the captain's armband in August 2011.

SIMON FERRY

Along with Paul Caddis, Simon Ferry made the permanent switch from Celtic in August 2010 after having made 42

appearances in his first season with the club whilst on loan from the Scottish giants as

the Robins reached the League One play-offs. It was his first taste of professional football after he was sidelined for nearly two years with a serious ankle injury at Celtic. Made 25 appearances for the club last season, but has regained his place as a regular starter this year.

JONATHAN SMITH

Swindon Town secured the signing of York City midfielder Smith in June 2011. The former Forest Green Rovers man where he scored 15




times in just over 100 appearances in midfield - joined the Robins for an undisclosed fee. The 24-year-old was highly-rated during his time with the Minstermen, and the former Morecambe trainee will be hoping of making an impression in League 2.

ALAN CONNELL

Swindon Town clinched the signing of Grimsby Town striker Connell for an undisclosed six-figure sum in July 2011. Connell arrived at Blundell Park from Bournemouth in July 2010

and scored 25 league goals for the Mariners last term - finishing the campaign with 29 in all competitions. A popular player in two spells at Dean Court,



RAFFAELE DE VITA

Italian striker De Vita joined the Robins in June 2011, joining Town

after a three year spell in Scotland with Livingston. De

Vita joined Blackburn Rovers aged 15 and came up through the youth and reserve team ranks at Ewood Park. Despite a hat-

Park. Despite a hattrick in a reserve team game against Wigan Athletic, first team opportunities never surfaced and the frontman opted to leave the Premier League side. In July 2008 he moved into Scotland to join Livingston where he spent three seasons. Last term he made 31 appearances, scoring 11 goals.

MEHDI KERROUCHE

Algerian striker Mehdi Kerrouche became Paolo Di Canio's eighth signing of the

summer when he joined from United Arab Emirates side Al-Oruba.

Kerrouche scored 12
goals in 18 games for the UAE
Second Division outfit last year,
and has been prolific in front of
goal for Swindon so far this season
with five goals from eight
appearances – three of which came
from the bench.

OFF THE SUBS' BENCH

ADEN FLINT

Flint joined Town from Blue

Square North side Alfreton Town in January 2011 after having attracted interest from the likes of Colchester United, Derby



County and Luton Town with his performances for Alfreton. The defender, who has also received two international caps at England 'C' level and was thrust straight into the starting line-up on the opening day of the 2011/12 season, being named man of the match in the 3-0 win over Crewe Alexandra. Replaced Comazzi in the win over Barnet.

LUKAS MAGERA

Town signed Czech Republic international striker Lukas Magera in August from Politehnica Timi_oara in the Romanian Second Division. The 6'4 striker has also been with Banik Ostrava, where he has played most of his football since coming through the youth ranks with the club, and played for his country against Scotland in a UEFA Euro 2012 Qualifier in October. Came off the bench for De Vita last weekend.

AHMED ABDULLAH

Joined Swindon on loan from West Ham on the final day of the transfer window this summer. The midfielder has featured five times for the club so far, with four coming from the bench, including last weekend's appearance when he replaced Jon Smith.

ONE TO WATCH

MATT RITCHIE

After two separate loan spells whilst at Portsmouth, Matt Ritchie signed permanently with Swindon Town in January 2011 having also played for Notts County during the 'Sven' era. The skillful wide man made his full debut for the club in the 2-0 Johnstone's Paint Trophy second round win over Torquay United at The County Ground, before going on to make 34 appearances during the rest of the season, scoring 12 times and leading the way in the assists column. A bustling attacking midfielder, the 22-year-old was voted Fans' Player of the Year for his efforts in 2010/11 and is often used to deliver the ball from set pieces.

To gauge the mood of the Robins' faithful, we caught up Swindon fan Jon Watton who has been a regular at the County Ground for the last eleven years.

Tell us a little bit about yourself? How long have you supported Swindon etc.

I have followed STFC since moving to the town from Wolverhampton back in 2000. For the last three seasons I have been an executive guest in the member's suite and have travelled to many away games in this time also.

What were your thoughts on how the team performed last season?

It came as a bit of a shock to the system. It was a real big fall from grace as we'd gotten to the play-off final the year before that, so relegation was the last thing on our minds. So a mixture of being extremely disappointed and disgruntled as towards the end it just seemed like a vicious circle we couldn't get out of.

What was your initial reaction to the appointment of Paulo Di Canio?

There's always rumours flying about the place but this one seemed a bit far fetched. However I was delighted when it was confirmed. It has brought a real buzz to the football club and the disappointment of the previous twelve months were forgotten and replaced by excitement and optimism.

Which of the new additions do you think has made the biggest impression since joining the club in pre-season?

Mehdi Kerrouche has very quickly become a fans' favourite and his two goals against Crawley Town sealed a hard earned victory following long periods of us being under pressure. So I would probably have to say him. But there seems to be a lot of potential in the squad and we're looking forward to the remainder of the season which is more can be said for most parts last year.

How do you think Di Canio has done overall?

It is very difficult to judge after only 10 league matches. He's a 50/50 win to loss ratio so I suppose you could say the jury is still out. However this is a steep learning curve and we are improving all of the time. I am convinced come the end of the season Paulo will have succeeded.

It has been a mixed start to the season, especially with home and away form (very similar to ours); do you feel that it is just a case of it taking a while for the team to qel?

It is very early days with lots of new players and I still don't think we know yet what our best side is as each game seems to bring with it more changes to the line up / formation. I do believe however we are now nearing the point were we do and the fact we have taken 12 out of the last 15 available points against strong opposition bodes well.

What are the fans' expectations for the current campaign?

- 1 Swindon's 'Oasis Leisure Centre' is a live music venue and when Manchester band The Inspiral Carpets were playing there with a roadie by the name of Noel Gallagher. His brother Liam saw the name on a gig poster, and thought it might be a good name for a band.
- 2 After a competition in 2009, Swindon is now 'twinned' with Disney World in Florida - the first time The Magic Kingdom has been twinned with somewhere in the real world.
- It is unknown if there are plans to rebrand the Teacups ride in a Swindon theme and name it after one of the town's other claims to fame, The Magic Roundabout.
- If you are feeling a little bit dizzy after a trip around the Magic Roundabout, why not drive in a really straight line for a while? The A419 which runs from near Swindon to Cirencester is partly the Roman Road 'Ermin Street'
- Speeding is, of course, against the law, but if you drift a bit above the limit, don't panic. Swindon abolished Speed Cameras in 2009.

- From Speed Cameras to TV Cameras Swindon Viewpoint was an early experiment in cable TV. The channel lasted from 1973 to 2000 hen it was bought by NTL and closed down.
- As with Bristol, Isambard Kingdon Brunel plays a large part in the history of the town, choosing it as the site for the Great Western Railway's Railway Works.



- 8 Because trains would usually stop for 10 mins to change locomotives it became the first railway refreshment rooms. And a million jokes about British Rail sarnies were born.
- 9 If railway food does make you ill, then don't worry. Swindon also sowed the seeds for the NHS. Railway workers paid a small amount from their wages into a healthcare fund for themselves and their families from 1871. It was later used as a blueprint for the NHS.
- 10 Unknown if he had a dry, curling sandwich, but Sherlock Holmes stopped for lunch in Swindon in one short story - The Boscombe Valley Mystery. It began a tradition of detective work in the town as The Curious Incident of the Dog in the Night-time and Jasper Fford's 'Thursday Next' novels are set in the town.

Milce SIIIII (21) (2 of Swindon Town's finest-ever players

Football historian LEIGH **EDWARDS** profiles one finest-ever players



Brilliant winger Mike Summerbee was capped eight times by England after leaving Swindon Town.

A son of former Preston and Barrow wing-half George Summerbee, he was born in Preston and moved to Cheltenham as a youngster when his father became

Cheltenham Town's manager. Mike was the first wave of young players introduced by Bert Head at Swindon and made his League debut in the Robins' 2-0 victory at home to Bournemouth three months before turning professional in March 1960.

Summerbee scored his first League goal in Swindon's 4-3 win at home to Colchester United the following month and missed just one match in 1960-61. He formed an exciting right wing partnership with Ernie Hunt and was a key figure as Swindon won promotion for the first time in their history in 1962-63. Other young stars who played for Swindon during this period included Cliff Jackson, Don Rogers, John Trollope and Bobby Woodruff.

Mike featured prominently as Swindon stormed to the top of the Second Division in the opening weeks of the 1963-64 campaign and began to attract the attention of bigger clubs. Summerbee was Swindon's leading marksman and 'Player of the Year' in 1964-65, netting 39 goals in 218 League games for the Robins before moving to Manchester City for £31,000 in August 1965.

Joe Mercer's first signing for City, the manager had played alongside Summerbee's father in Aldershot's star-

studded wartime team and followed young Mike's progress. Mike was everpresent in City's 1965-66 Second Division title triumph and starred as they won the League Championship in 1967-68, the FA Cup in 1968-69 and League Cup and European Cup Winners' Cup in 1969-70. He missed the latter final through injury but was awarded a special winner's medal.

Summerbee made his full England debut in the 1-1 draw with Scotland in January 1968 that confirmed Sir Alf Ramsey's team as the winners of their European Nations Cup group and

winners of the Home Championship. He kept his place for England's 1-0 victory over Spain at Wembley in the European Nations Cup quarter-final first-leg and scored his only international goal in the 1-1 draw against Switzerland in November 1971



A fashionable dresser in the 'Swinging Sixties' Mike was part-owner of a boutique with George Best. He was a League Cup finalist again in 1974 and played over 300 games in the top-flight before moving to Burnley for £25,000 in August 1975, then had a spell with Blackpool before becoming Stockport County's player-manager.

Mike was a colourful character and a genuine personality as well as a player with skill in abundance. He retired from the game to concentrate on his business activities, including a bespoke shirt making company, combining these with a successful career as an after-dinner speaker and also appearing alongside Pele in the film 'Escape to

Victory'. His son Nicky followed in his footsteps, playing for both Swindon and Manchester City.

Football historian LEIGH EDWARDS selects ten post-war Swindon Town Classic Campaigns'.

1962/63

Swindon Town won promotion to the Second Division for the first time in 1962/63. Bert Head's young side won just one of their first six games, then top scorer Ernie Hunt netted a hat-trick in a 5-1 victory over Brighton. Cliff Jackson scored three times in a 4-3 win at Millwall and

Jack Smith did likewise in a 5-0 victory over QPR as Swindon overcame the 'Big Freeze' to maintain their promotion challenge.



They hammered Colchester 6-1 and clinched promotion with a 1-0 win at home to Shrewsbury. Keith Morgan and John Trollope were ever-present, while other stars included Mike Summerbee and Bobby Woodruff.

1968/69

Don Rogers starred as Swindon Town achieved an epic League Cup and promotion 'double' in 1968/69. Early pace-setters in the Third Division, they lost 1-0 at home to Watford in the title 'decider' watched by 28,898 and finished runners-up on goal average. Swindon defeated

Torquay 2-1, Bradford City 4-3, Blackburn 1-0, Coventry 3-0, Derby 1-0 and Burnley 3-2 in the League Cup before beating Arsenal 3-1 after extra-time in the Wembley final: Peter Downsborough, Rod Thomas, John Trollope, Joe Butler, Frank Burrows, Stan Harland, Don



Heath, Roger Smart, John Smith (Willie Penman), Peter Noble, Don Rogers.

1969/70

Swindon Town challenged strongly for promotion to the top-flight in 1969/70. Fred Ford replaced Danny Williams as manager and Arthur Horsfield was signed from Newcastle, starring as Swindon were among the early leaders. Peter Noble grabbed a hat-trick as they beat Charlton 5-0 and maintained their promotion challenge with a 14 match unbeaten run. Swindon finished fifth in the Second Division, their highest position at the time. They also defeated Blackburn 4-0, Chester 4-2 and Scunthorpe 3-1 in the FA Cup before losing 2-0 to Leeds United in the sixth round, then beat Napoli 3-0 in the Anglo-Italian Cup final.

1979/80

Bobby Smith guided Swindon Town to the League Cup semi-finals in 1979/80. Swindon had narrowly missed promotion the previous season and Alan Mayes scored twice in an early 4-0 win over Brentford. They defeated Portsmouth 3-1, Chester 2-1, Stoke City 2-1, Wimbledon

2–1 and Arsenal 4–3 in the League Cup before losing 4–3 to Wolves in the semi-finals. Andy Rowland and Alan Mayes formed an exciting partnership as



Swindon gained four successive wins, then trounced Bury 8–0. They took Spurs to an FA Cup fourth round replay but finished mid-table despite signing David Peach and Glenn Cockerill.

1985/86

Swindon Town stormed to the Fourth Division title with a record 102 points in 1985/86. Lou Macari's side made a poor start in the League but defeated Sunderland and Sheffield Wednesday en route to the Milk Cup fourth round. Kenny Allen arrived from Torquay and Dave Bamber from Portsmouth as Swindon soared to the top of the table with 14 wins in 16 matches. They set a club record of 13 consecutive home victories with a 3-1 win over Burnley and clinched the title with a 1-1 draw at Mansfield. Charlie Henry and Colin Gordon scored 35 goals between them, while skipper Colin Calderwood was ever-present.

1986/87

Lou Macari plotted Swindon Town's 1986/87 Third Division play-off final triumph. Colin Gordon was sold to Wimbledon, while newcomers included Jimmy Gilligan, Mark Jones, Fraser Digby and Bristol Rovers pair Tim Parkin and Steve White. Six victories in eight games catapulted Swindon into the promotion race, then Jimmy Quinn returned from Blackburn and Phil King arrived from Torquay. They starred as Swindon gained seven straight wins and qualified for the play-offs in third position after remaining undefeated in their last 11 matches. Swindon beat Gillingham 2-0 in the play-off final replay after a 2-2 aggregate draw.

1989/90

Swindon Town won the 1989/90 Second Division play-off final but were denied top-flight status after an illegal

payments scandal. Swindon had qualified for the playoffs the previous season and Ossie Ardiles replaced Lou Macari as manager.
They soared into the promotion frame with seven wins in nine games including a 6-0 victory over



Stoke and signed David Kerslake from QPR in November. Alan McLoughlin, Duncan Shearer and Steve White starred as Swindon maintained their challenge with just one defeat in 13 matches and finished in fourth position. They defeated Sunderland 1-0 in the play-off final at Wembley.

1992/93

Player-manager Glenn Hoddle was a key figure in Swindon Town's 1992/93 First Division play-off final success. Swindon were early pace-setters and new signing Craig Maskell grabbed a hat-trick in a 4-1 win

over Cambridge United. They went second after a 5-1 demolition of Notts County, then overcame a lean spell with Ross MacLaren's return inspiring a run of



seven victories in nine games. Dave Mitchell netted three times in a 6-4 win at Birmingham and Swindon qualified for the play-offs in fifth position. They defeated Tranmere 5-4 on aggregate, then gained a thrilling 4-3 win over Leicester in the Wembley final.

1993/94

Assistant-boss John Gorman replaced Glenn Hoddle in charge as Swindon Town prepared for the 1993/94 Premiership campaign. New signings included Jan-Aage Fjortoft, Andy Mutch, Luc Nijholt and Adrian Whitbread, with Swindon starting with a 3-1 defeat at Sheffield United. They drew 0-0 at Norwich but despite signing Terry Fenwick and Keith Scott, were already facing relegation by the time they managed their first win 1-0 at home to QPR in November. Swindon completed the double over QPR and also beat Southampton, Spurs and Coventry as well as drawing against Arsenal, Liverpool and Manchester United.

1995/96

Swindon Town stormed to the Second Division title under player-boss Steve McMahon in 1995/96. They had

plummeted from the Premiership to Second Division and newcomers included Wayne Allison, Steve Finney and Mark Seagraves. Swindon were early leaders, winning seven of their first nine games, and Kevin Horlock netted a hat-trick in a 4-1 victory at Bristol Rovers. They remained in pole position and took Southampton to



an FA Cup fifth round replay. Ian Culverhouse and Mark Robinson were ever-present, while leading scorer Wayne Allison and Shaun Taylor also starred as they won the title by nine points.

WHISPER it quietly but are we finally seeing unruly footballers behaviour brought to book by the people they really listen to – their managers.

It's only early days but in the last fortnight there have been three examples of players who have been sent off all being admonished by their bosses. The refreshing approach might not last long but I'm enjoying it while it does. Don't get me wrong, I've never been afraid to stick the boot into officials from the terraces or Press Box but they have a thankless task these days.

With commonsense seemingly outlawed and cameramen at every angle, they are easy targets, so it's been great to see big decisions backed up on the sidelines – and publically.

First MK Dons boss Karl Robinson berated centre-back Gary MacKenzie after he was sent off for an apparent headbutt on Huddersfield's Alan Lee. Rookie boss Robinson left his centre-back in no doubt what he thought:

"It was a disgrace what he did, he knows that, I won't condone it," said Robinson.

"He has been punished internally and he's accepted it like a man. It's not acceptable in the game and it's not acceptable in society."

Huddersfield defender Jamie McCombe followed MacKenzie's madness a week later.



Winning 2–0 at home to rock-bottom Leyton Orient with just five minutes left, McCombe lost the plot and saw red for an off the ball incident. Boss Lee Clark wasn't happy at the time but after the O's scored twice to deny the Terriers a crucial win he was positively raging at the final whistle – and made it clear who with.

"When you have indiscipline in your group that's what happens. He has killed us. He will be fined the maximum and I think 100 per cent he will struggle to get his place back in the team now," said Clark.

"It was stupid, he said the lad grabbed him and he just threw him over but you cannot raise your hands, you have to be better than that. Their lad was right to go down because Jamie has just thrown him to the ground.

"You can't do that, the rugby was last night. It's not right. I'm very frustrated and angry. I've just told him that might be him out of the team for a long time now."

QPR boss and qualified referee Neil Warnock was next up and left Sky viewers in no doubt what he thought of new full-back Armand Traore after his sending-off in the 1-1 draw with Aston Villa. Traore picked up a second yellow card for a ridiculous lunge on Marc Albrighton and headed towards the tunnel – where he found Warnock waiting.

Now I'm no great lip reader but the words we can print included, in no particular order were: 'you're, stupid, team-mates and down.' And Warnock pulled no punches once he faced the press as well.

"I just thought he was a disgrace," he said Warnock. "I will fine him as much as I possibly can. I just think he was a bit thick and naive. I said to him 'when we're playing at Fulham next week what are you going to be doing?"

Let's hope these wise words have been taken in at Old Trafford, the Emirates and Anfield. Somehow I think it might be a while before they are!

GAME SUMMARY



Nothing really remarkable about the layout but of note is the fact that none of the twenty or so players listed in the Silkmen squad are at the club today.



Match Report

Macclesfield earned their first point in three games against top of the table Morecambe with Ben Tomlinson scoring the quickest ever goal at the Moss Rose.

The striker's low drive after just seven seconds caught the Shrimps cold but Danny Carlton didn't take long to level with his sixth of the campaign.

The visitors came into the game on the back of a brilliant 6-0 victory over fellow high-fliers Crawley but were shell shocked as Tomlinson charged forwards from kick-off and let fly from 20 yards, finding the bottom corner with great accuracy.

Morecambe equalised soon after when Lawrence Wilson's free kick was blocked by the wall but fell into the path of Carlton who fired past Jose Veiga at his near post.

Former Silkman Izak Reid's free kick was headed clear by Shaun Brisley in a dangerous position as the game became very stop-start. Looking eager to impress against his former employers Reid squandered a good chance on 33 minutes when he ran at the Macc backline and shot straight at Veiga when he had team mates unmarked on either side.

In the 37th minute Macc were given a helping hand by the referee when he blocked a Morecambe pass and Sam Wedgbury was able to counter. After he found Tremarco the full-back fed the ball across to George Donnelly and a deflection on his fierce shot almost wrong-footed Roche who did well to save with his legs.

Just before the interval an altercation between Silkmen skipper Nat Brown and Morecambe's Jason Price earned them both bookings and it was fortunate that the half time whistle came not long after as words continued to be exchanged.







A Numbers Game

Continuing our numerical rundown of squad numbers, in this evening's issue of Blues Review we have reached the number six.

FOR THE SILKMEN

Steve Payne may only have been the club's number six in an injury ravaged spell between 2003 and 2005, but it was his first spell with the club which put him firmly in the 'legendary' category.

Signing from ... Huddersfield on loan in September 1994 and

making his debut in a 1-1 draw at Stevenage, Payney instantly became a crucial part of the Silkmen's defence which would go on to win two Conference titles, an FA Trophy and promotion to the Second Division.

His initial three month loan spell proved impressive enough to see Sammy McIlroy making it a permanent arrangement in December of the same year. The Silkmen won the Conference that season earning Payne the first of his medal haul with the Silkmen, but arguably his finest moment in a Macclesfield shirt came the next season when he scored the opener for the Silkmen at Wembley in the FA Trophy Final.

More glory was to follow as the Silkmen stormed to a second Conference win, with another memorable Steve Payne moment seeing him play most of the 5-1 win at Southport in goals after the horrific injury to Ryan Price. Payney unfortunately missed the final day 4-1 win at Kettering to seal promotion with appendicitis as the fans on the pitch chanted his name.

Another year and another promotion followed as Payne, who would also captain the Silkmen, helped the club achieve the incredible home record of Played 23 W19 D4 LO en route to the Second Division.

This would be his final season with the Silkmen as the club were unable to hold on to their lofty position. Towards the end of the campaign, Steve – pushed up front for a game – scored twice against

Chesterfield which saw the Derbyshire club sign him the following summer.

Payne rejoined the Silkmen after five years at Saltergate and played 13 matches at the end of the 2003/4 season. Arriving at the club as squad number '24', he was given the number six shirt for the following year. But sadly he picked up a serious injury in pre-season which kept him out of action for and as unable to play for the club again before his release in April 2005.



OTHERS INCLUDE

Since Steve Payne, only two players have worn the number six for the Silkmen before Paul Morgan first pulled it on. Martin Bullock joined the club in 2005 and played almost 100 times or the club before departing for Wycombe in 2007. Luke Dimech spent the 2007/8 season at the Moss Rose before he was replaced by Paul Morgan.

Before this, the shirt had been worn by amongst others Gregor Rioch, Dave Ridler, Ben Abbey and Steve Macauley

FOR SWINDON


Shaun Taylor was listed amongst a Swindon Town Legends XI by readers of the club's local paper during the 2009/10 season and fits our criteria of wearing the squad number six in their only



season in the top flight. During this campaign, Taylor was an ever present for the club after playing a crucial role in their promotion the previous year. In total he remained with the Robins for five years playing an incredible 260 games for the club in that time.

Paul Morgan has been wearing the number for the Silkmen since his

Formerly of AC Milan where he made first-team appearances and counting Lazio, Monza, Verona and Spezia amongst his former clubs, he was brought to England by Paulo Di Canio in the summer. He has played three times this season before a red card against Rotherham.


SIX OF THE BEST






Few players can claim to have the title 'best in the world' for their position. But that is often the accolade given to this week's featured player, central defender Gerard Pique.

The player began his career at Barca but left destined for England, and in particular, Manchester United in the summer of 2004.

That season, United had opted to run two reserve sides. Having signed as a youngster in the summer Pique was involved in both their Premier League Reserve and the Pontins League side, and he arrived at the Moss Rose for a Pontins League Cup match in September

The Silkmen took the lead early on in the game, just seven minutes in. Adam Smart whipped in a low cross which evaded Neil Ross and Tommy (Cousin of John – and Wayne) Rooney before finding Iraqi




international Jassim Swadi at the far post who side footed home. But Madds Timm and David Jones scored for United in the first half before Ramon Calliste hit a third (following up a Guiseppe Rossi strike saved by Tim Deasy) for the game to finish 3-1.

Pique made his senior debut only a month later as United beat Crewe in the League Cup. He went on to play a total of 30 matches for the club either side of a loan at Zaragoza, and won both the Premier League and Champions League with them in 2007/8 before a move back to his boyhood club of Barcelona in 2008.

He was immediately a regular for the side in the centre of defence and has added to his medal haul with three La Liga titles, two more Champion's League wins and the small matter of lifting the 2010 World Cup.

lack of temperature doesn't dampen Oliver's enthusiasm for them) – but we are well looked after.

Make our way up to the press box. There are a wide variety of facilities in the grounds of league two. Today we are in a fairly cramped area perched at the very back of the stand. The ground is largely deserted at the moment and we look out onto a sea of empty wooden fold-down seats – the redevelopment of the ground as a potential 2018 world cup venue didn't extend to this side of the ground but it has a certain old-school charm.

2.00pg

Set up the commentary kit and test the ISDN line. Everything seems to be in working order, audio coming through clear – this year's new equipment is a fantastic improvement on our skype based setup from last season.

Fans begin filtering into the ground. Its not just Plymouth and Macclesfield fans though – this afternoon is a 'Fans Reunited' day for Argyle. A whole host of clubs are represented by fans from across the country, turning out to show solidarity with the crisis hit club.

2:20pm

In addition to a change of management there is talk of a takeover being completed – the potetinal buyer James Brent is interviewed by local press to our right. 2.25pm

Team sheets arrive. Exchange formations with the home media – Macc are going for an unchanged line-up, looking to keep two up front seems to be a good move.

The crowd and atmosphere is building. Half time is here and Macc still trail. Not a terrible performance but hardly inspiring. Plenty of time to change it round still in the second half we hope

Second half gets underway and we are back online.

There is no more joy in this half for Macclesfield. Plymouth double their advantage via a Williams free kick. Initially it looks like the ball didn't cross the line but as it was swiftly followed up and put into the back of the net the debate is academic.

Carl Fletcher's side appear to be galvanised by the atmosphere and Macc struggle to get into the game. As Argyle sat back in the final stages of the game there was a chance to apply some pressure yet they are powerless to stop Plymouth's first clean sheet and win of the season.

Full time and a two nil defeat. Time to summarise the game, pack up the kit, and then indulge in a light jog to the station!

Onto the train with plenty of time in the end, but this small positive seems to do little to allay the disappointment. The first portion of the trip is spent discussing where things went wrong. The long journeys feel a lot longer with performances like this –it also makes commentating a tougher job!

Plenty of Plymouth fans on the train in good spirits as well they might be. They certainly did not look like a side that would gain only one point from their next nine games. The atmosphere around our table is a subdued and there's a chance for another snooze.

Manage to squeeze a change of trains into a one minute window at Birmingham, thus shaving an hour off the journey. Possibly the highlight of the day.

Arrive back in Manchester, the journey at an end, enough time left in the evening to head out to drown our sorrows after a very disappointing afternoon. Still commentating is usually a very enjoyable task, and for every Plymouth there could be a Hereford. Off to Aldershot in two weeks time – a shorter trip at a mere 217 miles.....

Do you remember the first time?

I saw a floodlit football pitch for the first time 17 years ago last Tuesday. Floodlit grass isn't the same as sunlit grass. The contrast between the illuminated pitch and the dark outside world has a focusing effect. The 90 minutes seem more detailed when the lights are on.

Tuesday 20th September 1994. Macclesfield Town vs Southport in the GM Vauxhall Conference. I was 8 years old, and it was the first time I visited the Moss Rose.

I can still remember shuffling through the turnstile behind my dad, into the London Road side of the ground. The pitch was unbelievably bright, and huge, far bigger than I'd expected. The two squads

were warming up, Macclesfield in blue, just nameless men to me at that point. I had no idea of their names, and had never heard of anyone who played for Macclesfield Town.

The only football I'd seen had been on TV. Manchester United with Eric Cantona, Ian Wright at Arsenal, the superstars that kids imitated in the playground kick around.

Nobody knew it then, but those nameless Macclesfield players were already on their way to becoming legendary. Farrelly, Shepherd, Bimson, Payne, Howarth, Sorvel, Tobin, McDonald, Wood, Power, Lyons. Nine games played so far that season; won 3, drawn 4, lost 2. The biggest legend of them all, Sir John Askey, wasn't playing that night, but I didn't care. I'd never heard of him.

We sat in the Main Stand. We'd be there for the next three years, until moving to the Star Lane End at the start of the 1997/98 season. We're still there now.

Up in the main stand sat pensioners wrapped in blankets, grey, white and still. Watch football long enough and you turn to stone. The whole place smelled of tobacco and the voices around me sounded like shovelled gravel. I'd stepped in to the adult world for the first time, where things weren't censored for young ears. Everything unsuitable was launched out there into the glow of the floodlights, to echo amongst the shouts of the players. Men cursed and swore and bellowed things that didn't even sound like words from the shadows of the terraces.

I can't remember anything about the game itself, other than the final score, and the goalscorers. Macclesfield Town 3-0 Southport, Wood, Power and McDonald, all goals scored in the second half if my memory is correct.

I enjoyed it, enough to want to come back. Televised football would never be as enjoyable again. The atmosphere, the chanting, the feeling of wanting and willing the team to win and witnessing the outcome, all that was much better live. I became aware –

although I didn't realise it until much later- that TV doesn't show you the whole game. It only shows the ball. There's far more to football, and attending a match is the only way to see all of it.

Certain things stand out from my first few games as a Macclesfield Town fan. A month later, Macclesfield Town vs Yeovil Town, a ponytailed Yeovil player went down injured and some comedian on the London Road terrace shouted "call for Vidal Sassoon!"

I can still hear, in my head, the sickening thud of the tackle from a Bishop Auckland defender

that shattered George Shepherd's leg, and wiped his name from the Silkmen team sheet forever.

On Boxing Day that year, Steve Wood scored a goal direct from a corner. I can't remember seeing that happen since.

Seventeen years later, and by now I've seen us lose more than we've won, but it's still as good as ever.

If you're under the Moss Rose floodlights for the first time this evening, whether you're 8 years old or 58 years old, then I would say this to you:

It can be hard work, supporting a football team.
But it's much better than staying at home.

Match Report

Macclesfield picked up their first victory in three games with a Ben Tomlinson brace and Colin Daniel's first of the campaign.home pointless.

Marlon Jackson cancelled out Tomlinson's opener moments before half time but a great second half performance gave Macc a well deserved three points with the former Worksop striker firing in his fifth of the season before late substitute Daniel wrapped up the win.

The half looked to be petering out before Northampton drew level out of the blue when Lewis Young was allowed space on the right to pull the ball back to Jackson and although he seemed to scuff his side-footed effort it rolled agonizingly out of Jose Veiga's reach and into the bottom corner for his first Cobblers goal.

The second half began slowly and it took until the hour mark before it came to life with the Silkmen forcing Northampton back into their penalty area for long periods with a string of chances.

The Silkmen were becoming increasingly frustrated as there always seemed to be a yellow shirt in the way of their goal-bound strikes although still had to be wary at the back - Michael Jacobs calling Veiga into action to stop his low 20 yard effort after the keeper had been a spectator since half time.

They finally got the breakthrough their play deserved with six minutes left on the clock when Hewitt's ball in from the right was behind Donnelly but Tomlinson adjusted his position to expertly fire first time past Walker.

Gary Simpson immediately brought on Daniel to replace Hamshaw and the former Crewe man took just two touches to guarantee Northampton would be heading home defeated. With the visitors pushing men forward in search of another equaliser Macc were able to counter attack with three against two to play Daniel through on goal and after taking a touch to control he slid the ball under the keeper with his right foot for his first of the season.
