



I hope Graham and his group all make it back in one piece, and I'm sure you'll give them all a great reception when they arrive this afternoon.


It just leaves me now, on behalf of all the staff and the players, to thank all of our fans for their fantastic support you've given us this season.





Bardge Honour

Last August in The Times preview for this season the prediction for Swindon Town was that they would finish 13th on the basis that "Di Canio's fledgeling managerial ability will be tested."

Eight months on in the East End of London the buzz around Upton Park from some disgruntled West Ham fans not happy with the Hammers style of play is for the fiery Italian to be installed as Sam Allardyce's successor.

A rookie manager he may well have been but Paolo Di Canio has come up trumps forging together a Swindon team that has combined quality with success.

There is no doubt that the Italian's arrival in Wiltshire has been good for Swindon and for League Two.

Paolo is unquestionably a contradiction in terms. He won a FIFA Fair Play award three years after shoving referee Alcock to the floor while playing for Sheffield Wednesday against Arsenal. That landed him with a lengthy ban and when he failed to return from Italy Wednesday, who had paid Glasgow Celtic £3million for him in 1997, moved him on to West Ham for £1.7m.

Hammers' boss Harry Redknapp was thought to be taking a big risk by signing the often volatile Italian but the gamble paid off handsomely. At Upton Park his skills verged on genius. He scored 47 goals in 114(4) PL appearances some of them classics such as the one against Arsenal when he flicked the ball over Martin Keown before clipping it into the net from 15-yards. There was an FA Cup winner at Old Trafford; a sensational cushioned volley against Wimbledon that ended the 'Goal of the Season' contest right

The East End dubbed him the "Roman Emperor" and Paolo, now a cult figure, turned from sinner to saint in the eyes of the world when in the dying embers of a 1-1 draw at Everton he was on the end of Sinclair's cross in front of goal. But with goalkeeper Paul Gerrard lying injured he caught the ball instead of volleying it into the empty net for what would have been the winner.

Paolo retired in 2008 from a playing career which embraced Ternana, Lazio, Juventus (UEFA Cup winner), Napoli and AC Milan in Italy and Charlton and having acquired coaching badges and a UEFA Pro Licence, he opened his managerial account with a 3-0 home win over Crewe.

The secret he revealed was psychology: "In the warm-up I went out to check the players' faces and their body language, and the way they treated warm-up, to be ready for the kickoff. This is crucial. We are not top class level, but even Pep Guardiola looks at Lionel Messi and will say 'hey come on or I will push you out'."

Di Canio wants to play the Barcelona way and was frustrated by our tactics in the goalless draw our 10-men forced in October. "They think there is a football pitch in the sky," he lamented but then as Barcelona found against Chelsea there is more than one way of playing this game.

He pledged to honour the title win with a tattoo of the club crest. "I'll keep my promise. For me promises are more important than a contract," he says

The enigma that is Di Canio remains bitter sweet. He

once said: "In life I always wanted confrontation, to have a challenge," and he's certainly not changed. Sent off for the third time this season he retorted: "They can send me off every week I don't care – we will still win the league. I don't want to stop the way I am," and he certainly hasn't.



Swindon Town



Hail the npower League Two champions who a year following relegation from League One return there in style. Di Canio's side were promoted a fortnight ago despite a second defeat in five days - losing 3-1 at Gillingham - and last week sealed the Championship title with a thumping 5-0 victory over Port Vale.

Swindon have proved themselves as the best team in this Division yet by the end of August 'The Robins' prospects of flying straight back to the League One nest looked highly questionable.

Under new boss Paolo Di Canio they kicked off the campaign in splendid fashion beating Crewe 3-0 but apart from defeating Bristol City 1-0 in the Carling Cup the opening month brought little reward with defeats at Cheltenham, Dagenham and Shrewsbury as well as home to Oxford in the derby clash that Di Canio rated more passionate than those in Rome and Milan.

Southampton too had knocked Town out of the Carling Cup with a 3-1 win at the County Ground and Di Canio's management technique was beginning to come under fire after a much publicised bust up with striker Leon Clarke.

But three straight wins, at home to Rotherham then Southend and away at Crawley turned things around. Crawley boss Steve Evans had dubbed Swindon "the Di Canio circus," but it was Evans who was left looking the clown as goals from Connell and Kerrouche (2) ripped into the Crawley net without reply!

Dissatisfied following a 2-0 defeat at Macclesfield and a 3-3 home draw with Hereford Di Canio bravely re-shaped his team for the trip to Accrington and it paid dividends. Fielding all four of his recent signings, two of whom Jake Jervis and Christian Montano (on loan from West Ham), scored in a deserved 2-0 victory, there were also debuts for Wes Foderingham and Liam Ridehalgh at Livingstone Road Di Canio explained: "A manager has to be strong about his decisions. I played four players who have only just joined us because I wanted to bring in a fresh energy."

It surely worked for Swindon had embarked on a an undefeated run of 12 league and cup games eight of which were won and by the end of December they were fifth in the table with 40 points from 23 games.

Paolo had found himself fighting to keep Matt Ritchie when in November Bournemouth tried to take the midfielder on loan offering to pay £250,000 for his transfer in January. But their request was rejected Di Canio explaining: "Ritchie is a top player. Are they ready to give £2 million? This is my price."

Super Swindon booked their place in the fourth round of the FA Cup by coming from behind to tip Premier Wigan out 2-1 with goals from Connell and new recruit Paul Benson but their Cup adventure ended at Leicester where the Championship side won 2-0.

This nonetheless was only a blip for the Robins were in full flight in the league and the 3-0 demolition of Crawley in the first fixture in February took them to within a point of the top spot. This was achieved two games later after wins at Hereford and home to Shrewsbury.

Two tap-ins from substitute Alan Connell was enough to clinch a 2-1 win over promotion chasing Shrewsbury and this was followed with successive 2-0 home victories over Accrington Stanley and Burton Albion.

The triumph over the Brewers etched another milestone in Swindon's history for that Tuesday night the team had set a Club record of 10 successive League victories beating the Club's previous best by two.

The winning sequence came to grief in the derby clash at Oxford where the U's completed the 'double' over their Wiltshire rivals with a 2-0 win. But Swindon were to bounce back chalking up seven wins and a draw from their next nine games.

In eight of these matches the Robins maintained clean-sheets embracing a run of six successive shut-outs commencing with the 2-0 defeat of Torquay United at the County Ground on March 20, (a result that sent Swindon seven points clear of the second placed Gulls and with a game in hand), culminating with a 1-0 home win over Plymouth on April 14.

Sandwiched between this amazing run was the disappointment of a 2-0 loss to Chesterfield in the JPT final at Wembley, but this did not derail the charge towards League One as they reeled off four straight wins in April without conceding a goal; away at Barnet 2-0 and Morecambe 1-0 and home to Northampton 1-0 and Plymouth 1-0.

With the championship trophy waiting to be claimed Town suffered back-to back defeats for the first time since August going down 2-1 at Aldershot and 3-1 at Gillingham. Nonetheless, results elsewhere confirmed Swindon's promotion and last Saturday's 5-0 defeat of Port Vale crowned them as Champions!

WESLEY FODERINGHAM -

Goalkeeper

An England Youth international, Wes celebrated his FL debut with a clean sheet at Accrington in October after arriving on loan from Crystal Palace before signing in January. According to Di Canio; "he has the reactions of a cat. We have a goalkeeper who keeps his concentration and has played a big part for us." Wes, who was 21 in January, was on the books of Fulham in 2009-10 and joined Crystal Palace a year later without getting the opportunity to play in the first team at either club. But he has really proved himself at Swindon and saved a penalty in the Barnet scoring one goal, a last-1-0 defeat of Cheltenham.

PHILIP SMITH - Goalkeeper Phil was between the posts for the 3-1 defeat at Gillingham a fortnight ago. A trainee at Millwall he made five League appearances for the Lions in 1998-99 but was released at the end of that season and dropped down to the non-League circuit with Folkestone Invicta, Dover Athletic, Margate and Crawley Town. Swindon signed him on a free in July 2006 and he made his bow in the Robins eleven in a Carling Cup defeat to Brentford that August. Phil has now made over 100 League appearances for the Club his best season being 2006-07 when he was

PAUL CADDIS - Defender

POY.

Swindon's influential skipper has been hampered by injuries of late a troublesome ankle problem being the latest inconvenience. Signed alongside fellow Celtic youth team graduate Simon Ferry in August 2010 having made 3(14) SPL appearances for the Bhoys and played Champions League football following his debut from the bench in a 1-0 win at Falkirk (27-1-08). Paul made his Football League bow in

a 2-2 draw at Hartlepool (14-8-10) and contributed one goal in a 3-2 defeat at Bournemouth (1-2-11) in 36(2) League outings last season. Essentially a rightback he has also featured at centreback and in midfield and has contributed four League goals this season two of them pens.

JOE DEVERA - Defender Equally at home at rightback or centreback Joe was Di Canio's first signing last June joining the Robins after six seasons with the Bees of Barnet, Barnet's POY in 2008 and 2011. Joe made 171(6) League appearances for minute equaliser in a 1-1 draw at Cheltenham (19-2-11). He has already matched that for Swindon with the second strike in the 4-0 defeat of Dagenham in March.

ADEN FLINT - Central Defender A solid and dependable defender Aden arrived at Swindon from Blue Square North Alfreton Town (capped twice by England 'C') in mid-January 2011 and made his



League entry in a 1-1 home draw with Rochdale (5-2-11). However, did not establish himself in the team until this season having made a MOM performance in the 3-0 home win over Crewe on the opening day of the season in which he scored the equaliser in the 4-1 FA Cup defeat of Huddersfield in November.

ALAN McCORMACK - Central

Defender

Paul Benson and McCormack were team mates at Charlton and the striker admitted: "Before I joined Swindon you could have knocked me down with a feather when I saw boss Paolo Di Canio had moved Mac to centre-back, I never imagined him as anything other than a midfielder. He is not the tallest and can't be expected to win aerial battles against big opponents. But his anticipation and experience really is something else." Alan had spent nine seasons as a midfielder with Preston. Southend, where he was the heart of the engine room, and Charlton as well as loans with Leyton Orient and Motherwell making over 200 League appearances. A vocal presence his thunderous tackling and determination to win are qualities Di Canio much admires.

JAMES 'JAY' MCEVELEY -

Defender


Signed on loan from Barnsley in March the former Blackburn Rovers trainee gained UEFA experience and was on loans with Burnley, Gillingham and Ipswich prior to a £600,000 move to Derby County in January 2007. Jay has a story to tell for playing as a wide midfielder for the Rams he fractured a cheekbone at Middlesbrough in October 2009. In the course of a routine operation to repair the damage his heart stopped beating for two minutes and he regained consciousness

in intensive care. He went back into the team at centreback and finished the season as leftback where he currently operates for Swindon. Made 15(2) League appearances for the Tykes last season. A Liverpudlian Jay played for the England U-21's (3) and attained three full caps for Scotland in 2007-08 on a grandparent qualification.

MATT RITCHIE - Forward

A tricky winger Matt, the scorer of seven goals by Christmas (now extended to 11), was described by his manager as "fantastic, one of the best players in this league. He is at a different level - his delivery is different class and the way he works off the ball is crucial." The 22-year-old winger insists he is loving life under Di Canio claiming "he's shown a lot of faith in me." Matt was with Portsmouth from the age of six but was released by Steve Cotterill, as Pompey's financial problems began to bite, having made two PL appearances on the leftwing in a goalless game at Wigan (14-4-10) and from the bench in the following game at home to Aston Villa. Matt made his League debut on loan with Dagenham the previous season scoring 11 goals (including one here in a 1-1 draw) in 36(1) League appearances having made his entry from the bench v Rotherham (27-9-08). Matt also had a successful loan at Notts County in September

SIMON FERRY - Midfield Now in his third season with Swindon the former Celtic youngster made his League debut in a 2-1 home win over Southend (29-8-09). He started all 40 League appearances that season scoring twice and last season added 18(3) League games to his CV. Simon, a central midfield workhorse, has scored this season in the 3-3 draw




with Hereford and v Huddersfield in the FA Cup.

OLIVER RISSER - Midfield
A powerful defensive midfielder
Oliver made a scoring debut for
the Robins in the 3-0 defeat of
Crewe on the opening day of the
season and has also found the net
in the 2-0 victories over Torquay
and Barnet. The 30-year-old
Namibian international has plied

his trade in Norway, Germany and Greece.

JONATHAN SMITH - Midfield

Di Canio was not surprised when the former Forest Green midfielder, signed from York City last summer, came off the bench and scored from 30-yards to set Swindon on their way to a 2-0 home win over Southend (9-9-11). Jon said: "The boss saw me playing for York on



Hot shot Paul Benson has contributed 12 goals since his arrival from Charlton Athletic in a swap deal that took Leon Clarke the other way in January.

It was Benson who blasted
Dagenham & Redbridge to the
Conference title in 2006-07, winning
the 'Golden Boot' award with 28 goals.
However, having played more than his
part in helping the Daggers qualify for
promotion to the League for the very
first time in their history he was not to
enjoy fully the fruits of his endeavours
suffering an injury plagued baptism in
his first League campaign.

Paul lined up for the Daggers historical entry into the League at Stockport on August 11, 2007, but then made but two cameo roles from the bench in the next 10 games as he struggled to overcome a knee injury.

He claimed his first League goal when making the first of those two sub appearances in a 1-0 home win over Lincoln City (1-9-07) but alas, his troubles were far from over for besides a nagging knee injury Paul lost two of his teeth in a Boxing Day game at Barnet, after which he cracked a leg bone in training. All this limited him to just 19 League starts and six goals in his first ever season at this level.

Nonetheless Paul's contribution, which included a goal against us in our 4-1 win at Dagenham in November 2007, again proved significant when in the last game of that season he smashed home the penalty in the 2-0 home win over Mansfield that secured the Club's League status.

Signed from White Ensign, in May 2005, Paul was to top the Daggers scoresheet for four consecutive seasons and in 2009-10 he netted 22 goals, including four in the Daggers 5-0 defeat of Shrewsbury, further adding to his tally in the regular campaigns by scoring three times in the play-off semi-finals against Morecambe and once in the 3-2 final victory over Rotherham at Wembley.

Forty goals in 95(5) League appearances for Dagenham persuaded Charlton Athletic to splash out on him and Paul registered his 50th career League goal in the Addicks 2-2 draw at Bristol Rovers (23-4-11). He made just one sub appearance for the Londoners this season to return figures of 10 goals in 28(5) League appearances in Charlton colours.

Now 32, Paul, a trainee accountant, added to his figures with Swindon's winner against Premier Wigan Athletic in the third round of the FA Cup, and summed up another glorious achievement by insisting: "With the buzz around here and the infectious enthusiasm of the manager, I reckon I've got three or four more years left in League football.

"You won't see many 35-yard piledrivers from me. Getting in the box is my game," and it is a game that has enthralled manager Paolo Di Camio who says: "He's an absolute warrior, he runs his socks off."

With five goals in five games Paul was acclaimed the League Two Player of the Month for February, a month in which he claimed his 100th senior goal in the 2-0 defeat of Burton Albion (28-2-12).

Of course we know to our cost the goal poaching skills that Paul possesses for he has scored three times in five appearances for Dagenham against us. YouTube in the summer and asked me to sign. There was no difference in the money but I jumped at the chance of making my mark in League football." Di Canio says: "He's a very good player who likes to get forward."

LEE HOLMES - Midfield

The scheming fleet-footed leftwinger made 19 appearances for City when on loan here from Derby in 2006. Currently on loan from Southampton, who he joined in July 2008, Lee's goal beat Northampton last month. He has also played for Walsall on loan

ALAN CONNELL - Striker

Alan came off the bench to knock Rotherham off top spot with two goals - the first within 34-seconds of his introduction - in Swindon's 3-2 victory on September 3. He then revealed: "My mate rang on Friday saying he was thinking of betting on me to score. I said not to bother. I didn't think I'd even be playing. In two earlier games I'd been subbed twice within half-an-hour." A junior at Ipswich Alan came into senior football with Bournemouth and went on to play with Torquay, Hereford and Brentford before rejoining the Cherries in 2008. Alan, who scored seven goals in 22 games for Torquay, has hit the net 12 times for Swindon this season.

The visitors get the game underway here at VP. Nahki Wells is sent racing through on goal in the 2nd minute of play, but Jose Veiga is on hand to brilliantly thwart the Bermudan and the following effort from Kyel Reid. Matt Hamshaw and Ben Mills are linking up well for Brian Horton's men in the early stages and this is shown when Hamshaw finds the latter with neat passes in the final third.

Macclesfield have started fairly brightly in their quest for vital points to aid their survival bid, and it takes a good piece of defending from Ricky Ravenhill to halt the pace and trickery of Marcus Marshall in the bantams area. Moments later, the visitors should've certainly gone one goal to the good Lewis Chalmers catapults a throw in into the box, the resulting knock down falls into the path of Ben Mills who lashes over from only a couple of yards out. Kyel Reid is starting the game well on the left flank and on this occasion he delivers a cross that can't be properly dealt with by Macc and the loose ball is hammered a yard or two wide by Ritchie Jones.

Guy Branston is having an impressive spell in a claret and amber shirt at the moment, and he shows a good piece of strength to win the ball back after Ravenhill's pass was intercepted. Matt Hamshaw then produces another accurate pass

to find Marshall in the City area, but Marshall, however can't get a shot away due to sturdy defending from City. The home faithful then cry for a backpass decision after Marshall half brings a deep Ramsden cross under control, the ball then finds its way into the arms of Veiga. Nothing given on this occasion by G.Ward, the man in charge. Just moments before the half time break Colin Daniel is an inch or so away from giving his side the lead, he is sent chasing a long punt forward before getting a yard or so on two City defenders. Fortunately for City, his shot is unable to find the net.

It is City who are out of the traps quickest at the start of the second half, and Kyel Reid produces some good wing play getting past Amaud Mendy, and cleverly getting away from Hamshaw. The bantams following then feel aggrieved by a questionable refereeing decision. Nahki Wells looked to have been fouled by Mendy, play went on and then the referee gave a free kick Macclesfield's way after Ravenhill had made minimal contact with Mendy. Amaud Mendy is then booked for hacking down Wells by the comer flag, and the following freekick from Craig Fagan is nodded downwards towards goal by James Hanson, before Mills gets his legs in a tangle and ends up giving City the lead himself.

Macclesfield can't really afford

to lose this afternoon at VP and Brian Horton does his best to solve their problems by bringing on two strikers; Ben Tomlinson and Matt Smith. Wells is gaining confidence as the game grows on and he has two attempts in the space of a minute. the first is smashed just wide after a lay off from a freekick, and the second is hammered narrowly wide after a long positive drive from the Bermudan. Nat Brown's loose header is almost criminal when Hanson nods the loose ball into the path of Wells who scuffs his shot straight at

It is Deane Smalley who eventually replaces Wells, and he himself is instantly involved in two good pieces of play. The first, he has a header on goal which forces Veiga into a smart save, and the second he plays a neat one two with Ricky Ravenhill, but again Veiga is on hand to thwart the effort, this time from the boot of Ravenhill.

Late on and as expected, Macclesfield are throwing everything but the kitchen sink at City in their bid for a late equaliser, but a bundle of crosses from Matt Hamshaw can't quite force any clear cut chances for the desperate visitors.

Full Time and City have edged out their relegation threatened opponents in a fairly drab encounter, to guarantee that they will be spending the 2012/13 season in League 2.



We must congratulate Paolo Di Canio and his players for securing promotion back to League One and clinching the Championship at the same time following their 5-0 victory over Port Vale last week. Let's hope we have a party atmosphere this afternoon.

David Layne was born in
Sheffield in 1939 but joined second
division Rotherham United as
a junior. He made his debut in
September 1957 at Stoke City
in a match Rotherham lost 4-1,
nevertheless the young centre
forward made a goalscoring debut.
For whatever reason David lost
his place immediately, and didn't
feature again until the final game
of the season when Rotherham
lost 3-1 at Fulham, but guess who

I am thrilled to be able welcome another former City superstar back to Valley Parade. It is fifty years ago this season that David Layne broke Johnny McCole's seasonal goal scoring record, by netting thirty four times in the league and two more in the F A Cup. The total of 34 league goals has never been broken, and, to be honest as things stand you can't see it being broken anytime soon. David Layne was one of my all time heroes in the game and I am sure there are plenty of other like minded City fans in the stadium today. All things being equal we will be able to introduce David to the fans at some stage this

scored the Millers goal. So David's first season saw him score two goals in two appearances. He played in the opening game of the 1958-59 campaign away at Bristol City. the home side won 6-1 and again David suffered. He was back in the team for the home derby against Barnsley, Although Rotherham won 3-0 there were no goals for Layne. David played spasmodically that season with his best run being four games. He ended up with nine appearances and two goals, the goals came in back to back matches at Derby and at home to Bristol Rovers. After eleven appearances and four goals, David left Millmoor

to join Swindon Town then a third division side and he had his first taste of Bradford. He made his Swindon debut against Queens Park Rangers on the opening day of the 1959-60 season, Swindon lost 2-0. In his second home appearance Bradford City were the visitors to the County ground and ended up losing 5-3, again there were no goals for David Layne. He broke his duck in the following game, a 3-0 victory at Barnsley, and he scored five goals in the next four games, he ended the season with twenty goals in twenty seven appearances, this included back to back hat tricks against Shrewsbury at home in a 4-2 win, and away at Southend in a 3-1 win.

The 1960-61 season began with David out of the side coming in after four games. He had two spells in the side and scored eight goals in fourteen games including a hat trick against Bristol City. His final game for Swindon came in a 1-1 draw at Halifax Town on December 17th 1960, within days he had completed an £8,000 transfer to third division rivals Bradford City. He made his Valley Parade debut on Boxing Day in a goalless draw against Hull City. Swindon were in lower mid table whilst City were in the relegation places fourth from bottom. After three false starts the new centre forward opened his scoring account with both City goals in a 2-2 draw at Bury. City might have had the best centre forward in the division, but we struggled elsewhere and we remained in the relegation places for the rest of the season apart from two very short spells. On Easter Monday 1961 David actually finished the game in goal due to an injury to regular keeper Mitchell Downie who was injured just after David had headed an equaliser, the ten men of City held out for a draw. Sadly City were relegated at the end of the season to Division Four. New manager Bob Brocklebank brought in a couple of new half backs in







Mike Smith and Stan Harland and after a really slow start which saw them sixth from bottom of the table at New Year, the goals scored by David Layne propelled City to the periphery of the promotion places and only a 5-3 defeat in the penultimate game of the season at Workington, prevented City from clinching an amazing promotion. City scored ninety four goals that year with thirty four alone coming from David Layne. He terrorised defences and scored three hat tricks against Crewe and Gillingham at home and away at Carlisle who eventually pipped City for promotion. He scored eleven times in the final seven games as City tried everything to get over the promotion line. David's scoring exploits added up to forty six goals for Bradford City in sixty nine league and cup games. With a goal scoring ratio as that it was inevitable that someone should come in for our own goal scoring machine. Sheffield Wednesday were the team who took Mr Layne on and parted with a substantial cheque of about £22,000 to do so.

Once at Hillsborough there was no change for David, he scored twenty nine league goals in his first season at Hillsborough, in Division One as well and scored his first league goals at Leicester against Gordon Banks. David scored one hat trick against Manchester City and also managed eight braces. The 1963-64 season went in a similar vein as David rattled in another twenty three league goals including a hat trick at Ipswich Town of all places. He also represented Sheffield Wednesday in the Inter Cities Fairs Cup that season and managed a hat trick in a 4-1 win over DOS Utrecht. He scored 128 goals in 191 league games at a ratio of a goal every 1.4 games, to put this in perspective, the most prolific goal scorer in English football at the time, Jimmy Greaves was scoring at a ratio of a goal every 1.2 games. Please make David most welcome.

When you are on top and take the lead in a game, your aim has to be to finish things off and secure the win.


Even when you aren't quite at your best, you still have to shut the game down and not concede goals.



Football historian **LEIGH EDWARDS** recalls Bradford City's 1981-82 promotion campaign



Match 45 – 8th May 1982 – Attendance 9,768 BRADFORD CITY 2 AFC BOURNEMOUTH 2

Bradford City clinched promotion with this exciting draw at home to AFC Bournemouth. The visitors stunned City by taking the lead after four minutes when, following Steve Carter's corner, Andy Crawford scored from ten yards. Roy McFarland's side equalised on 29 minutes when Ian Leigh's weak kick fell to Bobby Campbell who curled the ball past the stranded keeper. Barry Gallagher's free-kick hit the post early in the second half but Cherries regained the lead on 63 minutes when Howard Goddard tapped in Crawford's centre. City drew level in the 88th minute when Cooke headed on Neil Ramsbottom's goal kick for Campbell to score from 30 yards. CITY: Neil Ramsbottom, Cec

MANAGER PROFILE ROY McFARLAND

Ex-England international central defender Roy McFarland managed Bradford City to promotion in 1981-82. He featured in Tranmere Rovers' 1966-67 promotion success and joined Derby County in August 1967, starring as Brian Clough's side won the Second Division title in 1968-69 and League Championship in 1971-72, missing their 1974-75 success through injury. Moving to Bradford City as player-boss in May 1981, he scored once in 40 League games before rejoining Derby as assistant-boss in November 1982, having two spells as manager. He was later in charge of Bolton Wanderers, Cambridge United, Torquay United. Chesterfield and Burton Albion.

Football historian **LEIGH EDWARDS** profiles fen leading post-war Swindon Town captains

MAURICE OWEN

Long-serving favourite Maurice Owen captained Swindon Town's 1962-63 promotion success. Initially with hometown Abingdon, the centre-forward turned professional at the County Ground in December 1946 and grabbed a hat-trick on his League debut in the following month's 5-0 victory at home to Watford. He was leading marksman on six occasions and helped Swindon twice reach the FA Cup fifth round. Later playing in a defensive role, he scored 150 goals in 555 League outings for the Robins before retiring in May 1963 and joined the club's coaching staff. He then settled back in Abingdon and died in July 2000.

STAN HARLAND

Central defender Stan Harland captained Swindon Town's 1968-69 promotion and League Cup 'double' triumph. He had spells



with Burnley, New Brighton,
Everton and Bradford City before
joining Carlisle United in June
1964. Ever-present in their 1964-65
Third Division title campaign,
he moved to the County Ground
in August 1966. Also skippering
Swindon's 1970 Anglo-Italian Cup
final success, he netted six goals in
237 League games prior to joining
Birmingham City in December
1971 and captained them to
promotion that season. He was
later Yeovil Town's player-boss and
died in Yeovil in September 2001.

ROD THOMAS

Welsh international right-back Rod Thomas was capped 30 times while at Swindon Town. Initially with Gloucester City, he moved to the County Ground in July 1964 and was an important figure in Swindon's 1968-69 promotion and League Cup 'double' success. He also starred in their 1970 AngloItalian Cup final triumph and netted five goals in 296 League games before following Dave Mackay to Derby County in November 1973. Featuring in their 1974-75 League Championship campaign, he moved to Cardiff City in November 1977, then had spells with Newport County and Gloucester again before becoming a publican.

JOHN TROLLOPE

Long-serving left-back John Trollope holds Swindon Town's appearance record. Signing professional at the County Ground in July 1960, he made his League debut in Swindon's 1-1 draw at home to Halifax Town a month later and was ever-present in seven consecutive seasons including the 1962-63 promotion success. He featured in Swindon's 1968-69 promotion and League Cup 'double' campaign as well as their 1970 Anglo-Italian Cup final triumph. Scoring 21 goals in 770 League games for Swindon, he was their coach, then manager between November 1980 and March 1983. Later youth-team boss, he was awarded an MBE.

ANDY ROWLAND

Versatile England Youth striker Andy Rowland skippered Swindon Town's record-breaking 1985-86 Fourth Division title triumph. Initially with hometown Derby County, he moved to Bury in August 1974 and was leading marksman in three successive seasons. He was ever-present in 1975-76 and helped them progress to the League Cup fifth round in 1977-78. Reunited with Bobby Smith at the County Ground in September 1978, he was top scorer as Swindon were League Cup semi-finalists in 1979-80. He netted 80 goals in 287 League games prior to joining Swindon's coaching staff and served the Robins for 22 years.

COLIN CALDERWOOD

Commanding central defender Colin Calderwood was capped 36 times by Scotland after leaving Swindon Town. Signing professional for Mansfield Town in March 1982, he moved to the County Ground in July 1985 and starred as Swindon won the Fourth Division title in 1985-86. He was also an important figure as they won promotion in 1986-87, then featured in two further play-off finals including their 1993 Wembley triumph, Scoring 20 times in 330 League games for Swindon, he moved to Tottenham Hotspur in July 1993, then Aston Villa and Nottingham Forest. He has managed Northampton Town, Forest and Hibernian.

GLENN HODDLE

Ex-England international midfielder Glenn Hoddle led Swindon Town to First Division play-off final glory in 1992-93. Signing professional for Tottenham Hotspur in April 1975, he starred in their 1981 and 1982 FA Cup final successes and was a finalist again shortly before joining Monaco in June 1987. He helped win the French League title in 1987-88 and was appointed Swindon's player-boss in April 1991, scoring once in 64 League games while at the County Ground. Moving to Chelsea in a similar capacity in June 1993, he guided them to the 1994 FA Cup final and has since managed England, Southampton, Spurs and Wolves.

SHAUN TAYLOR

Influential central defender Shaun Taylor captained Swindon Town to the Second Division title and FA Cup fifth round in 1995-96. He impressed with Bideford before moving to Exeter City in December 1986 and skippered their 1989-90 Fourth Division title triumph. Joining Swindon in July 1991, he was ever-present as they won promotion to the Premiership in 1992-93. He was their 'Player of the Year' three times and netted 30 goals in 212 League games while at the County Ground. Moving to Bristol City in September 1996, he captained them to promotion glory in 1997-98. He has since coached at Exeter and Torquay.

MATT HEWLETT

Ex-England Youth midfielder Matt Hewlett skippered Swindon Town to the Second Division play-offs in 2003-04. Signing professional for Bristol City in August 1993, he made his League debut in that month's 3-2 defeat at home to Sheffield Wednesday and was an influential figure as they qualified for the Second Division play-offs in 1996-97, then won promotion in 1997-98. He had a loan spell at Burnley before moving to the County Ground in July 2000 and netted six goals in 179 League outings for Swindon prior to joining Torquay United in July 2005 but recurring injury problems curtailed his career in February 2007.

GORDON GREER

Scotland B international central defender Gordon Greer captained Swindon Town to the League One play-off final in 2009-10. Initially with Port Glasgow, he joined Clyde in June 2000 and moved to Blackburn Rovers for £200,000 in May 2001. He returned to Scottish football with Kilmarnock in August 2003, then joined Doncaster Rovers in July 2007. Featuring in their 2007-08 promotion campaign, he moved to Swindon initially on loan in January 2009. He joined them on a permanent basis in July 2009 and partnered Scott Cuthbert in the heart of their defence but missed the play-off final at Wembley due to suspension.

Cleckheaton-based John Muranka - a Bradford City Season Ticket holder - has been working with Oliver for the past 14 months.


Oliver admits he could see the benefits of the self-help sessions almost straight away.



I never really had a pre-season break last summer as with Dave Wetherall departing I had to recruit somebody to replace him or take on the role of U18 Coach / Manager which was never going to be easy.

Between the ages of 18-21 is a massive time for a player to develop in more ways than one and I firmly believe that we've let a lot of players go that would have been good enough for us.

another big prospect (Adam Baker)
through to the first team squad.

I hope Adam gets the right development he needs as I firmly believe looking at some big earning flops we've had here he is a big prospect for Bradford City Fc and needs the support and trust of his coaches to prove himself.

He's been at this club since he was 10 and his mum and dad are so appreciative of what we have done for him.

We will always produce a player or sell a player from our department because I believe in what we do and with links developing with the American Riasa programme I believe we can get something good going right through to the 18-21 group of players.

I personally have had a very challenging year in lots of ways but I believe that next season you loyal fans that have stuck by this club through thick and thin will get what you deserve and that certainly isn't another relegation battle!

I was born in Bradford and love this club with a passion just like you and I believe Phil (The gaffer) will get us where we should be.

Hope you all have a good summer break and let's all get together for next season and support Phil and his players.





What soothing words filtered through the radio waves on Sunday night when I heard that the FA was interviewing Roy Hodgson, their only candidate, for the England managerial seat.

Harry Redknapp was overwhelmingly the popular choice driven by the tabloids that thrive off his chirpy cockney personality. Nonetheless, public images can often be deceptive and my belief. as I stated in this column in the Hereford programme, was that Roy Hodgson was a much more suitable candidate.

Ignore all that clap-trap in the national newspapers implying that the FA has gone for Hodgson because he is the cheaper option with no compensation to pay West Brom. The selection has been made on technical

Hodgson was no great shakes as a player but then neither was Arsene Wenger, Jose Mourinho or Bertie Mee. Having failed to make the Crystal Palace first team Roy played non-League football and at 28 embarked on a coaching career in Sweden with Halmstad.

He won two Swedish titles with them and five with Malmo, the latter after a very brief stint with cash strapped Bristol City in 1982. Two more years in Sweden in charge of Orebro were followed by a move to Switzerland in 1990.

There he continued at club level with Neuchatel Xamax until appointed as the national team coach masterminding Switzerland's arrival in the World Cup Finals of 1994 in the USA. The Swiss qualified by finishing second in European Group 1, embarked on an ill-fated wooing of



a point behind Italy having overcome Portugal, Scotland, Malta and Estonia, winning six and drawing three of their 10 qualifying ties and finishing with a better goal average than the Italians who they defeated 1-0 in Berne.

Switzerland opened the tournament against the USA. It was their first finals match since 1966 and also the first played indoors in the Pontiac Silverdome in Detroit. It finished 1-1. Then they pulled off a shock win beating Romania 4-1. It was Switzerland's first win in the finals since 1954! They eventually lost to Spain in Washington

Roy spent the next two years in charge of Inter Milan reaching the UEFA Cup final in 1997. He then had 16-months as manager of struggling Blackburn Rovers having previously declined the Lancashire club who then more boxes than Harry for this

Sven Goran Eriksson who went back on an agreement to manage them.

But Rovers were financially forced to let their top players go and after finishing sixth in the Premiership Roy was axed in November 1998 barely two months after being tipped to take over as England manager.

He returned to Inter as caretaker boss then was with Grasshoppers in Switzerland before leading Copenhagen to the Danish championship. He had a brief spell with Udinese in Italy returning to international football in charge of the United Arab Emirates and after 18-months with Viking in Norway he was two years the national team manager of Finland.

In 2007 Hodgson became Fulham's boss steering them away from relegation and into the Europa League final leading to his appointment as manager of Liverpool last summer. Given only six-months before the axe fell Roy's troubles at Anfield have been put into perspective by the team's subsequent performances under King Kenny.

An intelligent man fluent in several languages Roy's subsequent success in charge of West Brom plus an international record of four defeats in 30 qualifying games with Switzerland the UAE and Finland are impressive credentials. He sits on FIFA technical committees and I believe ticks appointment.







Stadium Safety

GROUND REGULATIONS

Persons are admitted to this ground subject to their acceptance of the Ground Regulations and the Rules and Regulations of the Football Association and the Football League which are posted in and outside the Stadium. Entry to the ground shall constitute unqualified acceptance. The club reserves the right for stewards, servants, agents and Police to remove from the ground, any person who does not comply with these rules and regulations, or whose presence within the ground is, or could reasonably be construed as constituting a source of danger, nuisance or annoyance to any other person.

In addition, throwing of any object within the stadium, taking part in chanting which is indecent, racist or homophobic and entering onto the field of play or the surrounding track without lawful authority or excuse, are all criminal offences.

The use of threatening behaviour or abusive language is also strictly forbidden and will result in ejection from the ground.

EMERGENCY PROCEDURES

In the unlikely event of an emergency at Valley Parade requiring the evacuation of all or part of the ground, spectators are requested to, stay calm and listen for announcements over the public address system.

All emergency announcements will be preceded by a distinctive chime. The announcements may direct spectators in specified areas to evacuate through exit gates to the outside of the ground, or on the pitch.

Club stewards will assist in directing spectators to the safest locations. If requested to vacate a particular area in the ground, spectators should do so as calmly and quickly as possible to assist in a safe and speedy evacuation.

PERSISTENT STANDING AT MATCHES

The Coral Windows Stadium is an all-seater stadium. While the Club

appreciates that people will stand when there is exciting action on the pitch, it is not permissible for people to stand for long periods of the game. The Club has to make match-by-match returns to the Football League and is monitored by the Football Licensing Authority (FLA) in relation to persistent standing.

In addition to complying with the requirements of the FL and FLA, persistent standing obstructs the views of other supporters who have paid good money for tickets or may not be able to stand for long periods. So, please respect the needs of your fellow supporters and sit down to allow them to see the game. Safety stewards will request that spectators remain seated and your full co-operation would be appreciated.





A SUMMER OF FOOTBALL

The curtain comes down on another season, a season that once again has left our dreams unfulfilled. However, there is always next year to pin our hopes on and once the dust settles we can be thankful we haven't followed Macclesfield into the Blue Square Premier. Thus we can look forward to 2012-13 renewing old acquaintances with Exeter, Rochdale, Chester and Wycombe with Fleetwood Town presenting a fresh dimension.

The League Two season kicks off on Saturday, August 18, so make a note in your diaries – it is only 15 weeks away. And there is a change to the usual format with the Carling Cup kicking-off prior to the league programme on the previous Tuesday, August 14.

The fixtures will be out in June and before that there is a feast of football in store for the discerning enthusiast with the Champions League final between Bayern Munich and Chelsea; the Euro 2012 championship finals and of course the Olympic Games tournament.

Chelsea and Bayern Munich have only met once before in the quarter finals of 2004-05 when the Blues went through on a 6-5 aggregate win having beaten the Germans 4-2 at Stamford Bridge but lost in Munich 3-2.

Bayem have the advantage of playing this final on home soil where they have lost only once to English opposition. And it wasn't Liverpool, Tottenham or Everton, but Norwich City who claim that honour having won 2-1 with goals from Jeremy Goss and Mark Bowen in a UEFA Cup 2nd round



first-leg tie in 1993-94.

The big football event of the summer is of course Euro 2012 and the finals in Poland and the Ukraine are not the ideal place for a new England manager to start his reign.

History and expectations have always pointed to disappointment for the English the best we have ever come being third when we beat Russia 2-0 in a play-off in Rome in the European Championship finals which comprised four finalists in 1968.

The European Championship is arguably harder to win than the World Cup and history shows no solace for England. We did reach the semi-finals on home soil in '96 only to fall in the lottery of a penalty shoot-out with Germany.

England are in Group D of this competition along with France, Sweden and hosts Ukraine the top two teams of which will battle it out with the top two teams from Group C – which consists of Spain, Italy, Republic of Ireland and Croatia – for a place in the semi-finals.

Great Britain finished fourth the

last time the Olympic Games were in London, in 1948, losing 5-3 to Denmark in the third-place play-off.

We have won the Olympic Football title twice; in 1908 in London when the United Kingdom, consisting entirely of Englishmen, beat Denmark in the final at Shepherds Bush and in 1912 when the UK again beat Denmark in the final in Stockholm. However, we haven't competed since 1960.

GB is in Group A along with Senegal, UAE and Uruguay – winners in 1924 and 1928.




