Good evening and welcome to Fratton Park for tonight's League One fixture against Swindon Town.

We go into the game on the back of a frustrating and disappointing result against Walsall here at the weekend. I don't think we necessarily deserved to lose the game, but we certainly didn't do enough to win it. We created a lot of half chances - in the first half. especially - but didn't do enough to test their keeper.

It looked like a foul on Mustapha Dumbuya in the build-up to the first goal, but sometimes those decisions go against you. I'm not going to get too worked up about that because they might go our way tonight.

Walsall scored with two great shots from outside the box and once you fall behind, it's always going to be an uphill battle. I also thought that they worked harder than us, which was particularly disappointing. We didn't do enough to impose ourselves on the game.

Izale McLeod produced one of the brighter performances. He worked his socks off and his goal was a just reward for that. But when we did score, we didn't do enough to press Walsall and that allowed them to get back into the game.

The level of work-rate from some of the players was questionable. I'm sure they'll raise their game against Swindon, but they can't just do that for the bigger matches. Every fixture is just as important as the next one and they have to realise that.

Our fans have been fantastic all season and they were great again on Saturday. They never stop backing us, even when we fall behind, but some of our lads seem to be struggling with the pressure of playing at Fratton Park. The strange thing is, it seems to be affecting some of the more senior players and not the younger ones. I'm learning about them all the time - and I probably learn more from a defeat than a victory.

I'm sure it helps the players to have a chance to make up for the result immediately. I would have preferred a whole week on the training pitch to try to put things right, but they know they can do a lot better and now have the opportunity to prove that to me and the supporters.

Tonight's encounter is the second of three games in a week and if we don't stand up and be counted then we could allow the sides above us to pull away and the ones below to catch us up. So we have to be really positive and take the game to Swindon straight from the kick-off.


We're playing a side who, at the start of the season, many predicted would finish in the top six, if not the top two, come May. It's sure to be a tough test, but we have to utilise our small squad as best we can and hopefully come away with all three points.

MICHALIK JOINS BLUES

Pompey have signed defender Lubomir Michalik on a one-month deal. The 29-year-old will wear the number 20 shirt at Fratton Park.

"I'm very happy to be here," said the Slovakian. "I heard about Pompey's interest in me and I didn't have to think too long about coming here.


"I've never played at Fratton Park, so I'm excited about getting out onto the pitch and showing what I can do.

"Hopefully I can help the team to win a lot of games and keep some clean sheets - and if I score some goals then that is a nice extra."

Michalik moved to England from his homeland to sign for Bolton in January 2007 and made 17 appearances during his time at the Reebok Stadium.

He joined Leeds on loan a couple of months later, before making the move permanent in January 2008.

The Slovakia international then moved - initially on loan - to Carlisle in the summer of 2010 and was part of the side that lifted the Johnstone's Paint Trophy at Wembley in 2011.




IPT DATE SET

BLUE SEPTEMBER

Blue September, the campaign to raise awareness about cancers affecting men, has picked up its brush once again to paint the UK blue.



The city of Portsmouth is throwing its weight behind the campaign by turning the Spinnaker Tower blue tonight and encouraging people to have their faces painted the same colour.

This awareness is much needed as men are about 40

per cent more likely to die from cancers than women. Men are encouraged to take preventative measures and seek medical advice at the first sign of change in their bodies.

Professor Sir Mike Richards CBE, the national clinical director for cancer at the department of health said: "We need to encourage men to lead healthier lifestyles, to take up screening invitations and to present earlier when they have symptoms that could be due to cancer. Earlier diagnosis can undoubtedly save lives."

This year sees The Urology Foundation coming on board as the beneficiary for Blue September. Money raised will go towards funding research into urological disorders, including prostate cancer, kidney cancer and bladder cancer. Urological cancers affect twice as many men than women.







Pompey vs Swindon Town

Pompey and Swindon renew acquaintances on the back of two vastly contrasting 2011/12 campaigns...



It has been more than 12 years since Swindon last made the 84mile journey from Wiltshire to Fratton Park.

The sides have suffered differing fortunes since then, but Pompey's fall and the Robins' rise means they are on an even keel once more. While the financially-stricken Blues were being relegated from the Championship last term, Swindon were romping to the League Two title.

They did so under the charge of Paolo Di Canio – and if he was passionate

and eccentric as a player for the likes of Sheffield Wednesday and West Ham, then he has remained just as fiery as a manager.

The Italian – who also led Swindon to the final of the Johnstone's Paint Trophy final – managed to maintain that momentum at the start of the 2012/13 campaign.

The Robins collected seven points from their opening three matches in League One, with a goalless draw at Hartlepool followed by home victories against Crawley (3-o) and MK Dons

There has also been a run to the third round of the Capital One Cup, courtesy of a comfortable 3-o triumph over Championship Brighton and then an even more impressive 4-3 win at Premier League Stoke. James Collins scored a hat-trick at the Britannia Stadium to set-up a home tie with Burnley in the last 32.

But Swindon endured a rocky week at the start of the month, losing three games in the space of seven days. It started with a heavy 4-1 defeat at Preston, before a Johnstone's Paint Trophy exit to fierce rivals Oxford. Then, 10 days ago, the Robins were beaten 1-0 at home to Leyton Orient, bringing to an end a 28-match unbeaten run at the County Ground that stretched all the way back to August 2011.

Di Canio picked out individuals for criticism, forcing goalkeeper Wes Foderingham to apologise for a furious reaction to being substituted after just 20 minutes at Deepdale. He then



blamed defender Aden Flint for the loss at Oxford.

But one man who has continued to shine at the County Ground is former Pompey winger Matt Ritchie. The 23-year-old, who is originally from Gosport, progressed through the Blues youth set-up, but made just 10 appearances before being allowed to leave Fratton Park in January 2011.

Pompey's loss has most definitely been Swindon's gain. Ritchie scored 11 goals in 52 games last season — as well as providing 17 assists — and was named the League Two Player of the Year. He seems to be replicating that fine form this term, netting twice in six games — including the winner against MK Dons.

But Di Canio is not just relying on last season's stars. Andy Williams, who was signed from Yeovil, and Collins, who arrived from Shrewsbury, netted 17 and 16 goals respectively during the 2011/12 campaign.

Former skipper Paul Caddis left the County Ground for Birmingham on loan following a falling out with Di Canio, with striker Adam Rooney moving in the opposite direction.

Pompey were 4-1 victors when they last hosted Swindon in March 2000, but with all that firepower in their ranks, the Robins will be hoping to sing a sweeter tune tonight.





IM SWINDON HAVE GONE FROM STRENGTH TO STRENGTH OVER THE LAST COUPLE OF YEARS. IS IT REALISTIC TO EXPECT THEM TO EVENTUALLY REACH THE PREMIER LEAGUE?

SM 1 think the Premier League is very much a long-shot in the foreseeable future. John Bostock joined on loan from Tottenham this summer. after impressing during a brief spell in Wiltshire last term, and his ability to create something out of nothing is another weapon in Di Canio's arsenal.

IM) WILL SWINDON BE GOING ALL OUT FOR A WIN TONIGHT?

SM >> Di Canio is as flamboyant as they come and he is always after a win, wherever his team plays, whoever the opposition. It will be no different at Fratton Park. He likes his teams to play expansive, flowing football and they will arrive in Portsmouth keen to produce the kind of performance that satisfies their manager. Di Canio has become a national media love or love-to-hate figure during his tenure at the County Ground and the people of Pompey will see first-hand exactly why tonight.

Darel Russell believes Pompey's squad contains the perfect blend of youth and experience



Some of his new team-mates were toddlers when Darel Russell began his football career.

The likes of Ashley Harris and Adam Webster had not even started school when the combative midfielder was starting out at Norwich.

Pompey's financial plight has seen a rag-tag mixture of youth and experience come together on the south coast to try to revive the Blues' fortunes.

It was clear for all to see at Crawley 10 days ago when two teenagers combined for the opening goal before a 30-year-old curled home the second.

But Russell believes that the mixture of ages in Michael Appleton's cobbledtogether squad is a plus. The 31-yearold former Canaries, Stoke and Preston star insists he can learn from Pompey's protégés – and vice versa.

"It's a young man's game," he jokes. "The game's constantly evolving and there's fantastic ability from the young lads – I'm discovering things from them. I can teach them the cuter tricks that come with experience, but there's stuff they do that I learn from.

"If I'm not learning then I'm not moving forward. If that happens then you might as well stop because there's no fun in stagnating. I always strive to improve."

But Russell is also enjoying playing alongside more experienced players, like Blues skipper and fellow midfielder Brian Howard.

"I've played against him several times before, so knew how good a player he was," Russell reveals. "Brian knows the game and is an intelligent player.

"We want to get a bit of continuity going in the midfield area. We need to learn each other's strengths, but that comes with playing together. It can click into place overnight, but more often than not it takes a bit of time to get things right – especially with all the changes that seem to happen here every day.

"But we're moving in the right direction all the time. With every game we play, we seem to get closer to where we want to be."

Russell joined Pompey earlier this month with the club's future still very much uncertain.

Administration and the threat of a 10-point penalty could have put him off coming to Fratton Park, but Russell is only focused on what he is employed to do – perform on the pitch.

"There were initial reservations and you have to ask the right questions,"

he explains. "But once I made the decision to join Pompey, I decided not to worry about it. The next game is all I'm concerned about because that's all I can control. Everything else has nothing to do with me – it's as simple as that.

"Maybe it's unsettling for some players and I'm sure it would improve the mood of the fans and the staff at the club if things were sorted soon, but I'm just concentrating on training and playing to the best of my

ability when I get out onto the pitch.

"This is one of the biggest clubs in the division and it's one with a fantastic history. I've played at Norwich and Stoke which are similar in terms of having a big, passionate fanbase and this is another good, exciting challenge for me.

"It obviously takes a while to settle when you come to a new club, but I'm feeling more comfortable with every day that passes.

"I've got a long journey in from the east side of London every morning, but I'm enjoying myself. There's nothing better than getting out on the pitch and competing – it doesn't matter who the opposition are. Nothing can compare with that thrill."

Russell had been without a club since leaving Preston in the summer and is now working hard to reach his physical peak.

"I need to get fully fit and into a routine here at Pompey," he says. "I did as much as I could this summer, but there's nothing like being in training every day and having that competitive edge.

"The guys in our squad are talented individuals that stretch you every day, so I have to be up to speed as soon as possible."

Russell knows that Blues boss Michael Appleton was, like him, a central midfielder during his playing days, which can help him settle quicker.

"It's a rare occasion when the manager plays in the same position as you," he explains. "I had it with Peter Grant and Lee Clark (manager and coach) at Norwich. It helps you to learn from someone who sees things in a different light, but has had similar experiences to you.

"The manager here is all about progression. He wants us to play football the right way and you'd expect







to see an improvement as the season goes on.


"He was a big reason why I chose to join Pompey. There was interest, but it only becomes real when you jump in your car to talk to the manager."

As well as the lure of playing for Appleton, the backing from the Fratton faithful also enticed Russell to the south coast.

"I don't need to say too much about the fans," he says. "Their support pretty much speaks for itself. They're fantastic and sing throughout the whole game. It seems like they're enjoying themselves despite the situation at the club. It doesn't matter whether it's a home game or an away game – they're all you can hear and it provides us with a huge boost.

"When you have backing like that, it only makes you more determined to go out onto the pitch and give everything you've got.

"You want to raise your game for them because they're so loud and passionate and I'm sure they appreciate it when our efforts pay off."



Generally this column is quite frivolous, but sometimes it doesn't seem right to be so. This is one of those occasions.

On the day this latest offering was due, the news was dominated by the release of new reports, new details and new evidence about the Hillsborough disaster. And it somehow didn't seem right not to reflect on it here. So you'll have to forgive me for the lack of the usual trivia, ramblings and Pompey nostalgia this time.

Tragedies happen all the time. Earthquakes, plane crashes, mass killings, all sorts of things the world over that lead to many lives being lost at one time. But I don't think any one tragedy has had such a profound effect on me as the one which struck on April 15 1989.

Not for one moment am I going to claim to know how it must have felt to have been there, or to have lost a loved one, or even to have been a Liverpool fan or resident watching on from elsewhere and feeling such a terrible sense of loss.

But it's true what they say: we football fans are just one big group. A group who all experience the same highs and lows, albeit at different times, and experience the same triumphs and suffer the same injustices.

I was watching Pompey play at Crystal Palace on the day of the disaster and it was in the days when I'd often keep a radio pressed to my ear, so I knew quite early in our game what was unfolding in Sheffield.

Apart from the fact that game at Selhurst was Andy Awford's debut, I couldn't tell you a thing about it. I spent the rest of the afternoon listening in horror and relaying information to other fans with me.

The coach journey home was completed in stunned silence.

I, and the people I was with at Palace, had stood on the Leppings Lane terrace 13 months earlier when Pompey had lost at Sheffield Wednesday towards the end of our season in the first division. We'd been to Anfield, too, in that same season and enjoyed a couple of great tussles home and away (even though they ended in defeat) with the Reds.

This being the latter end of the 1980s. we all thought back to the days when we'd stood on packed terraces that were probably a little over-populated. It was impossible not to think about how easily we might have been caught up in something similar just through being in the wrong place at the wrong time.

In the weeks, then the months, then the years, that have passed since that black day, it's been impossible not to be impressed by both the dignity and sheer endurance shown by those involved in the campaign for justice for the 96.

Last week, 23 years too late, they had their day. They got the apologies and admissions from people in power that they and those they lost deserved. Hopefully, now, they will get yet more answers, more truths.

It was a victory for decent people and, without wishing to dilute the meaning of last week's reports and conclusions for those directly involved, it was also a victory for ordinary football fans.

Too many people in authority passed the buck after Hillsborough, deciding it was easier to paint football supporters as lowlife hooligans and be believed, than it was to own up to mistakes and woeful errors of judgement.

The real truth was understood by football fans, and many others, a long time ago. Now, at least, everyone else does too. But it doesn't bring back the 96.

Peter Harris' brace and goals from Jackie Mansell and Gordon Dale – as well as an own-goal – saw the Blues come from behind to triumph.


But it was not the players who were given the credit for a magnificent victory according to reporter Martin Lee from the Sunday Graphic.

They got off to the best possible start when Newcastle could only clear a corner as far as Pamarot, who sent the ball flying straight into the net with an exocet from 25 yards that Steve Harper had no chance of saving.

The game then went from the sublime to the ridiculous as Benjani, John Utaka and Niko Kranjcar took advantage of some woeful defending to seal a 4-1 rout.

But it was Pamarot's strike that stood out and it won the French defender Pompey's Goal of the Season award at the end of a memorable 2007/08 campaign.

60 MINUTES FROM FRATTON

Last Saturday witnessed the preliminary round of the FA Trophy. This competition, which ultimately finishes at Wembley Stadium, is open to the principal 266 football clubs below Football League status. Put simply, all teams who play in the Blue Square Conference, Evostik Northern Premier League, Evostik Southern League and Ryman Leagues.

In line with many cups, there are exemptions for higher-placed clubs. Thus Havant and Waterlooville enter at the third qualifying round and Conference Premier teams at the first round proper. So for teams already involved, to win the trophy a minimum of ten victories are required. The Hawks need a mere seven triumphs.

Local clubs in action last Saturday included Fleet Town, Godalming Town, Guildford City, Sholing, Winchester City and Worthing, Bognor Regis Town and Gosport Borough enter the fray in the first qualifying round which takes place on Saturday, September 29.

As with the FA Cup, there is prize money at stake in each round. Winners last Saturday banked a cheque for £2,300, while for the trophy winners there is a cool £50,000 reward.

>>> Swindon always remind me of one of the bleaker

times in my career when I was at Leeds United. A huge reason why I signed for them was manager Billy Bremner. So when he was sacked it certainly wasn't the way the script was supposed to read. If I thought that was bad, then I was in for a bigger shock when Howard Wilkinson took over.

During the period when I was in the England under-21 side with Billy Gilbert, we were forever playing unappreciated practical jokes on him when he was part of the set-up. He thought we were brash cockneys and we used to ask him how much he was paid for collecting the balls after a training session. I never dreamt he would one day be my club manager.

One of his first games in charge was at Swindon and his kind of football saw our goalkeeper launching the ball as high and far as he could. Swindon had Lou Macari in charge and he played the same way. I was told to chase the ball wherever it went. Consequently I spent the whole game chasing it as it went flying over my head this way and that. I touched the ball three times all day and ran twice as far as Mo Farah.

After the game Howard said: "I want to see more of that from you." I think it was his way of paying a compliment. But I knew my career at Leeds was going the same way as the ball that day – nowhere. Still he did win Leeds the title some time later.

I mentioned the other week about how Ian Baird berated me for the fact I never gave him any decent crosses. He was convinced I was the reason why the Pompey fans got on his back so much. So you can imagine the look he gave me, and what he said, when I walked into the Leeds dressing room literally days after he signed for them.

By the time Howard Wilkinson had taken over I still don't think I'd found his head. But we were agreed on the above game at Swindon. At the end of that match I went over to 'Bairdy' and said: "What do you think of that?" The reply was slightly less flattering than what he said to me when I put in a wayward cross!






Spinnaker Tower and HMS Warrior, then they headed off to Victoria Park for a rest before a stroll back to Southsea.

POMPEY 2 MILLWALL 0

September 28 1982 – Division Three

Goals from Billy Rafferty and Alan Biley saw Pompey to victory in front of 7,615 at Fratton Park.

The Blues totally outclassed the Lions and in a goalless first 45 minutes, 19 year-old Neil Webb, back in the side after a month out with a knee injury, produced a brilliant show of midfield play and could have finished the half with a hat-trick.

The first goal came after 51 minutes when Biley was sent tumbling in the penalty area. Millwall goalkeeper Paul Sansome saved Bobby Doyle's spot-kick, but Rafferty followed up to put the ball into the net. Biley wrapped the game up on 78 minutes, brilliantly curling the ball around Sansome and in off the far post.

Billy Rafferty was sent off as Pompey crashed to defeat at Roots Hall in front of a crowd of 4,589.

Southend's first raid after nine minutes brought a penalty as Steve Aizlewood pushed Keith Mercer and Dave Cusack scored from the spot. The match was effectively over ten minutes into the second half when Anton Otulakowski rifled home from outside the area.

Garry Nelson appeared to be yards offside when he netted Southend's third

goal and 13 minutes from time Rafferty, already booked, was ordered off after clattering into goalkeeper John Keeley. Nelson completed Pompey's misery in the dying seconds.

Scottish midfielder Doyle was an influential figure in Pompey's third division title triumph. Signing professional terms for Barnsley in December 1972, he was ever-present in 1975/76 and joined Peterborough for £20,000 in July 1976. He starred in their 1977/78 promotion near-miss and moved to Blackpool for £120,000 in July 1979, Frank Burrows paid £75,000 for him in December 1980 and he netted 16 goals in 177 league games while at Fratton Park, prior to joining Hull in August 1985, where an ankle injury curtailed his playing career two years later. Now living in Orton Waterville, he is an HGV driver for King Brothers.

SWINDON TOWN IN 1982/83

Swindon finished eighth in the fourth division. The Robins were second in the table at Christmas after losing just three of their opening 20 games, before only two wins in 17 matches led to Ken Beamish replacing John Trollope as manager in March. Paul Rideout and Andy Rowlands scored 36 goals between them.

The game turned five minutes into the

second half when Todorov raced onto Nigel Quashie's through ball and clipped the ball over Tony Warner. The striker sliced a shot wide before limping off with a knee injury.

Sam Parkin was leading scorer with 25 goals and Matt Heywood was ever-present.










>>> Fratton Hotshots

To many supporters who saw him play, Len Phillips is regarded as one of the most skilful and intelligent players ever to wear Pompey colours. He provided loyal service to what turned out to be his only league club and his talent drew regular applause from the large crowds of the 1940s and 50s – and even from the opposition!

Len held a regular place in the Pompey team that won back-to-back league titles in 1949 and 1950, as he possessed perfect balance and the ability to dribble, tackle, pass and score. This quickly made him a favourite with the crowd at Fratton Park. Discovered by Pompey in the Royal Marines football team, Len was a former Marine Corporal who suddenly found himself embarking on a new career, joining a professional football club, following the end of the Second World War.

He quickly settled into a new team assembled by Jack Tinn and comfortably inherited by new Pompey manager Bob Jackson a season later. In only his second season with the club and his first full campaign, Len scored 16 goals in 45 games, which provided a large contribution to the 1948/49 league championship-winning side. Pompey supporters adored his style of play; he only released the ball to a colleague when the timing was right and had a great knack of holding the ball up to wait for the right moment. Coupled with


equally strong and clever players like Jimmy Scoular, Jack Froggatt and Peter Harris to name but three, the Pompey team were the talk of the country in 1949 and 1950.

England selectors also finally noticed Len's skill and in November 1951 he earned his first international cap against Northern Ireland in a 2-0 midweek victory at Villa Park. But Len was still regularly producing quality performances for Pompey, often scoring two in a match to rip apart visiting defences at Fratton Park.

Len switched positions from insideforward to wing-half in November 1953, shortly after Jimmy Scoular was sold to Newcastle. Some Pompey supporters expressed concern at the time, but their anxiety was unnecessary, as Len turned in fine displays to outplay many of his contemporaries of the time. In one Fratton match against Wolves in January 1954, Len completely blotted out visiting England captain Billy Wright and received a standing ovation at the end of the game.

It is still a mystery how England selectors only picked Len to play for his country on two more occasions, both at Wembley in the winter of 1954. But his overall talent and goalscoring prowess – reaching double figures in three seasons – is how many supporters remember Len. He died in 2011, at the grand age of 89.

I've spoken previously about one of my first independent away games being at Swindon in a 1973 FA Cup third round replay.

Played in the midst of the miner's strike, the match was held on a Tuesday afternoon which crucially meant a day off school. This caused me to miss the dreaded cookery lesson in favour of my true love and vocation.

I think the fact that I was never destined to become Marco Pierre White, but have consequently worked at Portsmouth Football Club for 15 years, somewhat justifies my truancy.

That apart, this particular game throws up some thought-provoking visions of how things in football - and at Pompey - have changed.

For instance, in the Swindon defence that day were two figures who I would later have close encounters with in Civvv Street.

Only two years later, David Munks, previously at Pompey, spent a period signing on behind me at what was then known as the Havant Unemployment Benefit Office. While some years after that, Frank Burrows, who later became Blues manager, popped into my Havant local.

Lould indeed extend this Swindon connection further to later players. On a couple of occasions I've had a drink in the Hungry Horse on the Eastern Road with former Swindon and Pompey defender John McLaughlin.

And former Blues and Robins centre-half

Steve Aizlewood told me over the phone that he watched Pompey's 2008 FA Cup triumph in a Newport rugby club.

Ah, the 2008 FA Cup victory against Cardiff, What a contrast. For all the wonderful triumph and euphoria of that day, can even the most vivid imagination picture similar scenarios? Try to visualise Sulley Muntari signing on behind me at the job centre, David lames popping into my local, or Sol Campbell having a drink in the Hungry Horse.

> It's actually slightly more plausible that I run a chain of Michelin star restaurants in the west end of London.

Okay, there are exceptions. I would never be surprised to see Hermann Hreidarsson looming towards me in Iceland - the supermarket, that is, not his home country.

But for all the negatives Pompey's fall from grace has created, one of the positives has been the return to a more grass roots level. The club has come back to the people and, to all intents and purposes, the players are part of those same people. Expensive bling from the training ground has all but been removed, but in its place something far more valuable has returned. Something that money can't buy.

If it signals defeats at home to Oldham rather than victories over Manchester United, if it means lesser glory against Bournemouth in the Johnstone's Paint Trophy as opposed to beating Liverpool in the FA Cup then, given the club survives, that would be a small price to pay.

And quite honestly, given the chance of a drink with Frank Burrows or Sol Campbell in my local, I'd pick the former every day of the week.







In July Kirsty McGee visited China, in August Mark Corbett and Mark Smith went to America and PitC education manager Adam Lea has recently returned from Malaysia. Adam represented






