WELCOME to Brisbane Road for this evening's rearranged npower League 1 fixture against Swindon Town.

This game initially fell victim to the weather on Boxing Day and Paolo Di Canio's Robins have enjoyed terrific form since that date.

They have won three and drawn one of their four matches so far in 2013, scoring 12 goals along the way.

Swindon kicked off the New Year by defeating struggling Portsmouth 5-0 in front of over 11,000 fans at the County Ground, and they followed that with another thumping victory – this time by 4-0 – over Carlisle United.

In-form AFC Bournemouth held them to a 1-1 draw at Dean Court on January 12, but Swindon got back on track two Saturdays ago by triumphing 2-0 against Shrewsbury Town at home.

Di Canio's side are currently fourth in the League table, having taken 49 points from 27 games, and they sit seven points behind second placed Doncaster Rovers having played a game less.

When Orient visited Swindon back in September, Lee Cook scored the only goal of the game to give Russell Slade's side their first win of the campaign and get their season off and running.

Following Saturday's 2-1 win over Notts County, Slade had praise for the O's work ethic.

He said: "We worked hard for the win against a good side,"

"Don't forget that they played their part today - they came at us in the second period and it became a very open game, but fortunately we got the first goal.

"They changed their keeper and the young one that came on, he was inspired. We had 16 shots today, 11 on target and he's kept most of them out.

"When we got the first it was a bit of a release. Goals settle you down and you wonder if it's going to come, but we got it, and what was important was that we backed it up a few minutes later.

"The games keep on coming thick and fast, and against good teams too. It's a difficult spell of games, we're playing two a week and we have to keep on digging out results."

Carling Cup.



DAVID MOONEY got back on the goal trail with the opener in Saturday's 2-1 victory over Notts County.

The Irishman followed up a Lee Cook shot which struck the crossbar to nod home in the 65th minute and set Orient on the way to their first League win of 2013.

The win moved Orient to within touching distance of the top half and Mooney felt the three-point haul was exactly what the Londoners deserved for their performance.

He said: "It was a deserved victory in the end, I think we played really well today and probably could have won it a bit more comfortably than we have, but the three points is massive for us and pushes us on.

"We've played really well this year and probably not had the rewards that we deserve and thankfully today we got three points."

Orient's victory also put paid to Notts County's remarkable run of 22 away League matches undefeated and Mooney was delighted that the O's were able to give Keith Curle's men that rare taste of a pointless trip home.

He continued: "Kevin Nugent said to us the other day that they were unbeaten away all season, you don't realise that coming in to games, but it just goes to show you the quality they've got and I think everybody watching that would have enjoyed it. It was a good open game,

there were loads of chances and thankfully we've managed the win."

Mooney's goal was his 11th of the campaign and although he won't set a goals target for himself, he does have his eve on a top-six finish.

He added: "I don't set myself targets, I just want to try and score in every game if I can, and I think with the boys we've got in the team, you've got people who can create chances for you and who I can create chances for as well. If I can score as many goals as I can to help the team then I'll be really happy.

"The play-offs has been mentioned obviously, but with the next three games against Swindon, Tranmere and Stevenage, they're going to be massive. If we can win all three it'd put us in a great position, but we've just got to concentrate on the next game and hopefully, if we beat Swindon, you never know where you are after that. Because we've done so well recently and not won, it's been disappointing, we could be a hell of a lot closer than where we are, but thankfully today we've managed the win."


He has done a great job at Swindon, guiding them out of League 2 last season and I would like to wish him a happy New Year.

SWINDON TOWN arrive here this afternoon looking to gain their second successive promotion after they captured the League 2 title last May.

It's been a topsy-turvy time from Robins supporters in recent seasons, but the club look to be on their way up again and are well placed in the promotion chase after taking 36 points from their first 22 games this term.

Paolo Di Canio's side have built on last season's impressive record when the Robins stormed to the League Two title after winning 29 of their 46 fixtures and ended up with 93 points - five clear of runners up Shrewsbury Town and nine ahead of Crawley who filled the last automatic promotion spot.

Much of Swindon's success came as they turned the County Ground into a fortress as they won all but four of their League encounters at home.

The Robins recorded 19 successes and three draws with their solitary League reverse coming in an odd-goal-inthree setback against Oxford United.

That was the perfect response, as a year earlier Swindon were relegated from League 1 when they finished rock bottom with 41 points, and dropped down a division along with Plymouth Argyle, Bristol Rovers and Dagenham & Redbridge, as they finished seven points adrift of Walsall who just about dodged the drop.

Appointed

After their relegation in May 2011, Swindon appointed Di Canio as their manager and there has rarely been a dull moment since.

The Italian has made an impressive start to his managerial career in England as he guided the Robins to promotion in his first season in charge and also took the club to the Johnstone's Paint Trophy final at Wembley, when they were beaten 2-0 by Chesterfield.

A stoppage-time goal by substitute Craig Westcarr wrapped things up after Swindon central defender Oliver Risser had handed the Spireites a 46th-minute lead with an unfortunate own goal.

Swindon came storming back to try and level things up, but Westcarr's last-gasp strike killed off their comeback

However, Di Canio's tenure at the County Ground appears to be increasingly uncertain and two weeks ago he described the atmosphere at Swindon as "hostile" and suggested he could have left the club two months ago.

"If I find a hostile environment I become more nasty and more focused, because I don't distract myself from my players," he told the BBC.

"It's not my staff and players. It is hostile, but for personal interests. That is rubbish and something that will destroy this club for sure."

Complete

Russell Slade's side will be looking to complete a League 1 double against Swindon this afternoon, as when the two sides met on Saturday, September 8, Lee Cook's strike ended Orient's five-and-a-half-hour goal drought, as they picked up their first points of the season with a

Cook struck 14 minutes into the second half, finishing off a Leon McSweeney cross and became the first O's goalscorer since Michael Symes had netted in the final minute of the opening day defeat at Tranmere Rovers.

It was a deserved success for the O's, who defended solidly and created far more than in the previous three League games.

The three-point haul inflicted a rare home defeat on Di Canio's side as they hadn't lost at home for a year and hadn't even conceded a goal at the County Ground since last February.

One man looking forward to this afternoon's game will be Scott Cuthbert. The 25-year-old Scottish central defender became Orient's first signing of the 2011 close season when he made the move from Swindon Town to the Matchroom.

The busy Oldham keeper Alex Cisak made his first save with 10 minutes on the clock from Andy Williams, while Matt Ritchie knocked an effort over the top.




De Vita gave the Robins the lead just before the half hour mark when he controlled a cross from the

Football League match staged under lights there was against Millwall in February 1956.

The biggest stand at the ground is the current Arkell's Stand, which was built in 1971 and holds around 5,000 people.

Behind one of the goals is the open Stratton Bank, which can seat 2,200 spectators, while the covered Town End has the capacity for around 2,000 spectators.

The stadium is completed by the most recent addition, the Don Rogers Stand, which runs along the side of the pitch and was constructed in 1994 to hold 4,800 fans.



BE. Following the O's home defeat at the hands of Scunthorpe, Trevor Davies asked a very poignant question: "Why is it easier for League 1 teams to win away?"

The Iron had just ended Orient's magnificent eight-match winning streak, with six of those victories coming on the road. Whilst Scunny had recorded their third win since Brian Laws had returned as manager, with all those victories achieved away from Glanford Park.

In fact after that round of matches, 11 League 1 sides had recorded more wins on their travels, with only eight achieving greater success in front of their own fans.

"Such a development has to be an improvement on the current position whereby supporters stand in areas designed for people to sit."

What was even more remarkable was what happened on November 20 when not a single home club managed to take maximum points. Of the 11 League 1 matches played, seven resulted in away wins!

This does appear to be a League 1 phenomenon. In the

Premier League and Championship home advantage still counts. Whilst in League 2, more clubs secure all three points at home, although there are a higher percentage of away wins than in the top two divisions.

After the Scunthorpe defeat I asked Russell Slade why he thought so many clubs in this division achieve success on the road. The O's boss said that the pressure of playing at home had a lot to do with it.

There is no doubt that in every match the onus is on the home team to attack, with supporters urging their side to push forward in search of the breakthrough and when it finally comes they still demand more. This can be to the advantage of the away side, who do not have to take risks, as they wait for an opportunity to capitalise on a quick counter attack.

It will be interesting to see if the trend of away-day success continues in the New Year. If it does, you do have to question the long-term effect that this might have on those supporters who are unable or not prepared to travel, and as a result will miss out on seeing their team's best results.

For today's clash Orient's home faithful will be hoping for a return to "fortress Brisbane Road."





Programmed

IN this feature, we review the club's matchday programme for the Division Four game with Swindon Town on October 15 1955.



E dig deep into the archives to find a copy of the matchday programme involving this afternoon's two sides and the issue selected is the publication from our promotion season of 1955/56 season and the match with Swindon Town played on October 15.

The matchday programme of that time was just a four page item costing 3d although there was plenty of editorial copy on the first two pages provided by the editor "Forester" who began this particular series of notes reflecting on a disappointing display by the first team seven days earlier.

"Orient's performance at Newport in last Saturday's League match will not go down in the records as one of their best and a 0-3 defeat left many, many supporters a little surprised by the weight of the beating," he wrote. "Up to the match, O's defence had only conceded three goals in six away games this season so there is every reason for disappointment."

The damage was done by County centre-forward Tommy Johnston who scored all three goals although three months later, he was to sign for the O's to become one of the greatest players to ever represent the club.

Having provided brief details of the reserves' 2-2 draw with Birmingham City. the editor then discussed players' wages.

THE MATCH

The O's, lying in fourth **position** in Division Three (South), proved far too good for their **bottom** of the table opponents who had recorded only four points from their 14 matches thus far

that included just a single victory.

Ken Facev scored a hat-trick after Ron Heckman had opened our account in front of a crowd of 14,713 as the home side continued their impressive form at Brisbane Road to complete their sixth successive home win of the season and retain their unbeaten record with a tally of 22 goals scored and just four conceded.

"I need hardly remind you perhaps that there has been a good deal of publicity lately on the question of 'slavery' and professional soccer players," he stated. "The subject is generally, far too important a topic and too conflicting to elaborate on here but I am given to understand

> that during last season, there were five Orient first team players who received wages of £1,000 apiece. On reflection, you know, that is pretty good remuneration from a struggling small club and a rather pleasant form of 'slavery' I should say."

Elsewhere, on page two the Supporters' Club Notes written by "Beacon" reflected on a very enjoyable Social evening spent at The Coach and Horses, High Road Leyton,

when Supporters' Club Chairman Freddie Dunn addressed the gathering.

Touching on the Appeal Fund, he declared that "no depressing newspaper chat should mar the evening's enjoyment," Beacon wrote. The Football Club had issued an appeal for funds to help them realise their promotion ambitions and Frank Harris, chairman of the Appeals Fund invited all those who had not subscribed to the find to do so NOW. "There will be NO SURRENDER," he declared.

Page three carried the team line-ups and league tables for both Division Three (South) and the Combination League while on the back page, the fixtures and results for both teams were published. The only advert in the programme was for the Hackney Empire and that was displayed at the foot of the last page. It showed that twice nightly, at 6.40 and 8.50, there would be an All Star Variety show including The Radio Revellers (with Billy Dainty the new TV Comedian) and The Aerial Kenways (with Billie Wyner the Glamorous Pianiste). The theatre's Christmas attraction was to be "Guys And Dolls" direct from the London Coliseum.

The programme was published by Grove Press, 732 Lea Bridge Road, Leyton.

FIFTYPLUS

T WAS 50 YEARS AGO that Leyton Orient were enjoying top-flight football for the one and only time in their history. In this regular feature we follow the season, match-by-match during this historic campaign for the Club.

OCTOBER 17

WITH the demands of playing First
Division football becoming increasingly
testing for the O's, they were given a
welcome distraction from the battle to
secure League points when they were
pitted against Chester City in a Third
Round League Cup match.

A record-equalling performance by our lads saw them thrash their struggling Division Four opponents by a 9-2 margin in front of a crowd of 7,428 to equal their previous record score recorded in a Division Three (South) match against Aldershot in 1933/34. Against a shell-shocked City side, the O's ran riot as George Waites and Malcolm Graham took the opportunities to score hat-tricks, Dave Dunmore collected a couple of goals while Norman Deeley also got on the scoresheet.

Orient boss Johnny Carey made a couple of changes to his regular starting line-up and that offered a debut to left-winger Roger Wedge but it was to prove the only first team appearance that he made.

Despite the barrage of goals, the home side had only found the net once in the opening 38 minutes after Waites found a way past the Chester defence but thereafter, the floodgates opened. The O's players queued up to take pot-shots at goal from near and far and all angles although City did manage a couple of consolation goals towards the finish as their opponents went in search of double-figures.

OCTOBER 20

BACK to League action and how the O's would dearly have swapped a few goals from their match with Chester for just

one at Villa Park where they succumbed to a 1-0 defeat watched by an attendance of 29.370.

Carey made a number of changes from the side that were defeated at home to Blackpool in the previous Division One fixture and although we were able to welcome back Sid Bishop to the heart of the defence after a three-match absence, Malcolm Lucas and Eddie Lewis were both missing due to viruses. Derek Gibbs deputised for Welsh international wing-half Lucas and Bill Taylor was drafted into the left-back position.

Another change was made up front where Waites replaced Terry McDonald but that was to prove his last appearance for the first team ahead of a move to Brighton & Hove Albion. Due to international calls that deprived them of a number of players, Villa were forced to field a host of reserves but they proved worthy winners despite the narrow margin of victory and a huge element of good fortune with their goal.

Villa's winger Harry Burrows sent over an intended cross but the ball swerved past Orient 'keeper Bill Robertson, hit a post and rolled into the net.

While the senior side were in action in the Midlands, our Reserve side were contesting the Football League Combination Cup Final against a strong Tottenham Hotspur side at Brisbane Road where a crowd of nearly 9,000 turned up. Orient had won the Midweek Section of the league and Spurs had lifted the Saturday section title and the two clubs met to decide the overall winners. A

closely-contested affair was settled by Bobby Smith, the Spurs centreforward and holder of 15 International caps for England, who finished off a sweet move involving two other Spurs first team regulars in Terry Dyson and Frank Saul.



OCTOBER 27

SPURS were again the visitors to E10 seven days later only this time, it was their senior side who provided the opposition in a Division One clash attended by a record Brisbane Road crowd numbering 30,987.

Ronnie Foster came into the home side for his first League game of the season and McDonald was restored to the starting line-up while the England amateur international Mike Pinner was given his Orient debut. It proved a miserable time though for the experienced goalkeeper as his side were thrashed 5-1 by the FA Cup holders, a win that allowed the men from White Hart Lane to take over top spot in the League table.

Dave Mackay was missing from the visitors' line-up after being ruled out with a heavy cold and they also had their goalkeeper Bill Brown struggling with a leg injury for much of the game but the North London side dictated the show from start to finish as the O's shortcomings as an effective Division One side were clearly exposed. Remarkably, predatory forward Jimmy Greaves failed to score but his usual incisive qualities were adopted by other colleagues. It took Spurs 21 minutes before they beat Pinner for the first time when John White netted on 21 minutes but Deeley levelled four minutes later when he drove home a superb pass from Ronnie Foster.

The visitors were back in front on 34 minutes when Bishop deflected a shot by Tony Marchi over the keeper's head and the north London side then raised their tempo. A minute before half-time, winger Terry Medwin made it 3-1 and second half goals

from the stylish White and Welsh

international winger Cliff Jones completed the rout.

Spurs manager Bill Nicholson said afterwards: "I hope Harry Zussman (Orient chairman) won't be upset but I describe this as a match between thoroughbred racehorses and a pack of willing horses."

The defeat dropped Orient to the foot of the League table and perhaps the only consolation for their dispirited fans came in the knowledge that Spurs had already accounted for Ipswich Town by a similar margin in the clash at Portman Road while West Ham United had been beaten 6-1 at Upton Park.

Tottenham had also shown no mercy either to visitors playing at White Hart Lane having thrashed Nottingham Forest 9-2 and Manchester United 6-2.

A third of the League season had been completed but the cracks in the O's squad were showing and manager Carey made no secret of the fact that he was interested in bringing in a fresh face or two.





Back of the Net



Not your usual Maradona/Carlos Alberto toss-up for top spot, but a domestic round-up featuring all of the current Premier. Football League and SPL sides, which makes a nice change. Diego's effort I know all about; Lee Thorpe's for **Torquay against Stockport in** 2006 - not so much.

mention this today because Swindon manager Paolo Di Canio won the West Ham correspondent's vote for that extraordinary leaping volley against Wimbledon back in 2000. Fair enough, as it's still one of my favourite goals even though it was for West Ham, which would usually take the gloss off, obviously.

To clarify, the poll wasn't about the most important goals, but what Paul Merson would call a 'worldy' - a longrange humdinger, Di Canio-like volley, Maradona-style dribble or even a lovely team effort - the sort of thing that looks great on YouTube even if you've never heard of the bloke who scored it.

Looking at the magazine cover date I'm guessing they sorted the selections before



Dean Cox hit that halfway-line cracker at Walsall in October, which got a fair bit of national coverage. This was shortly after FIFA 13 came out, and I recall some mock Twitter outrage that week about how Coxy's 'long shots' rating was only 67. Bet that'll be the first stat he checks on FIFA

A Cox strike against Walsall did win Swindon's vote, Simon Cox's long-range

there were a few other former and future O's on the Best Goal list. The most famous was by future O's player Justin Fashanu, who took the Norwich honour for that amazing volley against Liverpool, which led to a disastrous move to Nottingham

Adam Boyd pulled off a mesmerising run and chip for Hartlepool against Sheffield Wednesday in 2005, which probably

helped get him that big move to Luton, which also didn't work out. And Gary Alexander's cracking volley for Millwall in the 2009 play-off final definitely isn't his own favourite, given that he could have won them promotion with an easy header later on, but didn't.

On balance, then, you're probably better off with a scrappy tap-in.

"I don't think it's the right solution every time to sack the manager on the back of four or five bad results.


"It is the board of directors that appoint the manager in the first place, so surely there is some responsibility on the board to honour the agreement they have with the manager."

"But either way it looks like it will be a minimum of a couple of months."



Scott Barrett Born in Ilkeston in

1963, Scott joined Wolves from his hometown club and then played for Stoke City before having loan spells with Stockport County and Colchester United. He then moved on to Gillingham on a free transfer in August 1992 where he played 51 League games before linking up with Cambridge United three years later.

He joined us in January 1999 on a free transfer, becoming one of a number of players to make the move down the M11 following manager Tommy Taylor to Brisbane Road. It was his performance in the second leg of the play-off semi-final at Rotherham United that underpinned our ultimate success and booked a trip to Wembley. His heroics at Millmoor included a wonderful save in the dying minutes that took the match into extra-time and then a penalty shoot-out during which he saved two penalties.

He shared the keeper's jersey with Ashley Bayes the following season before Bayes became first choice. However, he regained a regular place in

the side when his rival sustained a long-term shoulder problem by which time, Scott had also taken on the role of goalkeeping coach. He became the club's first goalkeeper to come off the

substitute's bench when he replaced the injured Glenn Morris in an FA Cup tie against Margate.

In January 2003, at the age of 39, he was the oldest keeper still playing League football but with the signing of Lee Harrison, three months later, Barrett decided to retire having made 110 (1) appearances for Orient. He was subsequently appointed assistant manager to Mark Stimson at Grays Athletic before the pair moved onto Stevenage, Gillingham and Barnet.

Ashley Bayes

Lincoln-born, the former England youth keeper had progressed from apprentice ranks at Brentford to full professional status in July 1990 but three years later after just a handful of appearances, he joined Torquay United on a free transfer.

He became a first team regular for the Gulls but after three years, made another move although staying in Devon to join Exeter City. Once again,

he established himself as their first-choice winning Player of the Year awards at St James Park before heading back to the capital to join Orient in July 1999. His first game for us came on August 7 1999 in a 2-1 defeat at Carlisle United and he lost his place to Scott Barrett although neither were able to claim undisputable firstchoice rights.

Bayes did became the established regular goalkeeper the following term and had made 80 (1) senior appearances when he left us on a free transfer to join Bohemians in June 2002. The next season found him playing for Woking and he subsequently appeared for Hornchurch, Gravs, Crawley, Stevenage and Basingstoke before joining Aldershot's coaching staff.

Lee Harrison

A tall and commanding keeper, he spent most of his time around the lower leagues and earned himself a reputation as a fine shot-stopper. He played for Gillingham, Fulham and Peterborough although most of his career was spent at Barnet where he made 233 appearances before a return to Orient, having been with us as a schoolboy between the ages of 11 and 16, in March 2003 for a £10,000 fee.

After 65 matches, he moved onto Peterborough but returned to Underhill in July 2006 where he took his tally of appearances for the Bees to 300 plus. After being released in the summer of 2010, he briefly joined Dagenham & Redbridge and then Newport County but in August 2012, it was announced that he had been appointed permanent goalkeeping coach at Wycombe Wanderers where he is also registered as a player.

Rhys Evans

The Swindon-born shot-stopper joined us on a three-month loan from

Chelsea in August 2002 and made his debut in the 1-0 defeat at Rochdale on the opening day of the season.

His career had started with Llanelli before he joined the Shakers in June 2000 where he made 142 starts. An agile 6'2" goalkeeper, he made his O's debut against Macclesfield Town in August 2005 and proved to be a dependable shot-stopper with 14 clean sheets in 43 League games that assisted us to promotion that season.

He made a further 43 League starts in our first season back in League 1 but expressed his wish to return nearer to his roots and left in May 2007 on a free transfer to join Shrewsbury Town.

He has since played for Grays Athletic, Newport County and Bath City.

Stuart Nelson

Started his career with Doncaster Rovers but joined Hucknall Town before moving to Brentford in February 2004 for a £10,000 fee. He completed his first full season with Brentford in 2004/05 maintaining 21 clean sheets and helping the team into the promotion play-offs.

He signed for the O's in the summer of 2007 but left less than a year later by mutual consent and joined Norwich City for the next season penning a one-year deal but failed to make a start for the Canaries. He then played for Aberdeen and Notts County before signing for

Gillingham at the start of this present campaign.

A graduate from our youth ranks, he made his senior debut at the age of 17 and became first-choice keeper after an outstanding 2003/04 campaign, which saw him win the Young Player of the Year Award for a second successive season. He was a key member of the O's Under-19 double-winning side of 2000/01 that won their league and the Youth Alliance Cup Final at the Millennium Stadium.

Russell Slade's side will be looking to complete a double over the Saddlers following a 2-1 win at the Banks's Stadium at the start of October in a game that will be remembered for




