





This week, THE IRON speaks to striker Matt Godden, who is enjoying his best run in the side since becoming a professional four seasons ago, starting the last four matches for his side. What does he expect today then?

NITED STRIKER MATT GODDEN STILL BELIEVES THE IRON ARE STILL HOLD A VERY GOOD CHANCE OF AVOIDING RELEGATION TO LEAGUE TWO WHEN THEY ENTERTAIN SWINDON ON THE FINAL DAY OF THE SEASON AT GLANFORD PARK, WRITES ADAM GRICE.

Godden, who had two previous loan spells at Blue Square Bet Premier side Ebbsfleet United earlier this season, has led the frontline in recent weeks after finally being given his chance in the side.

The 21-year-old told THE IRON: "It has been very good to return to the club and start playing regularly at this level.

"Obviously to come back from Ebbsfleet and be back in around the players has led to the gaffer giving me my chance."

He added: "I could have done with a goal last Tuesday night at Bury and I should have really scored but as long as I am playing then I am happy.

The Canterbury born striker signed professional terms for the Iron in 2009. who were then under the management of Nigel Adkins, after two years as a youth trainee.

However, Godden was only rewarded with his first competitive start for the North Lincolnshire outfit earlier this season in the 3-0 loss at Preston North End.

"I have waited near enough four years for this. I have been in and out of the squad and I came off the bench when Baraclough was

here, but I never really got my chance under Alan Knill," he continued.

"The gaffer has come in and we have had a few meetings together and I have got a lot out of those meetings. He has given me my chance and I have got a lot of respect for him because of that."

Earlier this season, the Iron striker scored five goals in 10 appearances for Ebbsfleet and he believes that his experiences from playing regularly lower down the pyramid has been significantly beneficial.

Godden said: "Every loan spell that I have been on has been really good, obviously I really enjoyed my time at Ebbsfleet because it was closer to home and I was playing week in week out which was needed.

"It was Saturday, Tuesday, Saturday, Thursday some weeks, so I was getting the game time that I so badly needed.

The four games in a week did my fitness a lot of good but obviously I was scoring as well which was great for my confidence.

"It was really beneficial for me." Following last weekend's penultimate round of fixtures United find themselves in with a shout of avoiding relegation and Godden feels that is they perform like they did in their last outing at Glanford Park, then they can pull off the great escape.

However, he did admit that some of the recent performances had not been good enough.

Godden said: "From a team point of view Preston we just were not good enough and everybody knows that, the fans saw that and they had a right to boo us at the end.

"Walsall seemed like a totally different side, we started well and we just maintained our performance. We worked really hard in the build up to the Walsall game and we just carried on from what we had been doing in training.

"I thought we was unlucky not to get the three points and then against Bury the first half we played well and created a few chances before we fell apart in the second half. We just was not good enough and we did not get out of our own half." Since Godden was recalled Glanford Park by manager Brian Laws in March he has formed an excellent working relationship with fellow striker Karl Hawley, who he admitted complements his own game.

"I get on really well with Karl, I think we are starting to understand each other a lot more now and it is going pretty well," he stated.

"I know he is a strong lad and when he has a defender pinned up against him there will not be many that will get past him, I know that I can come around him and link off the front of him."

The 21-year-old added: "My link up play is getting better and in the lead up to the Walsall game I really enjoyed training with him."

Next year the Iron boss has confirmed that his squad will possess a wealth of youth team players and he credits the work that the youth team development officer Tony Daws has done, alongside his assistant Paul Harsley.


It is a path trodden by Godden and fellow former youth team star Niall Canavan.







HE END OF THE SEASON IS A TIME FOR REFLECTION, AND TO LOOK BACK AT WHAT HAS BEEN ACHIEVED SINCE WE GATHERED IN JULY FULL OF HOPE.

And although results on the pitch have not matched the expectations of fans, the growth of an independent and active supporters trust.

The Iron Trust had 253 full members this season, after launching at the start at last summer's open day in an attempt to give supporters a stronger voice in the running of the club.

Since then it has established a £2,000 shareholding in the club, and met regularly with senior club staff.

The Trust has argued in favour of greater fan engagement, allowing members to put questions to the club's board of directors at the SUFC AGM as well as questioning Iron director Dennis Hobson at the Trust AGM. The club also agreed to a Trust suggestion to release information about this season's budget to help fans understand the financial situation which means an operating loss of £1million for this season (on top of £1.9m for last term).

"Progress has been good and recruitment in line with our hopes taking into consideration the current fortunes of our club," said Tony Gosling, chairman of the Trust.

"We want to be a dynamic and respected Trust who can remain independent but supportive of our club."

One of the Trust's main launch events last year was a UK premiere of a Spanish TV documentary on Alex Calvo-Garcia, followed by a question and answer session with the Wembley goalscorer.

The Trust are planning a similar event for pre-season, and welcome membership renewals and sign-ups now.

The price will remain £10 for adults, £3 for U16s and £20 for families (2x adults and unlimited U16s).

The Trust board are all volunteers, with the greatest expected expenditure being the purchase of shares in the football club.

"We must continue to remain a critical friend building on the trust and honesty we have already established with the

club's board and management team," added Tony.

"The message to Trust Members is that we will continue consulting with them, we will continue to air their concerns, views and ideas. We will be discreet in the way we do that and present ourselves with integrity."

The idea was originally bandied around by a few supporters after North Lincolnshire Museum's 2011 exhibition on the club.

The popularity of this led to suggestions of a permanent collection, which will likely be predominantly displayed online but could be displayed in a variety of venues - including Glanford Park and North Lincolnshire Museum.

"We received a very positive response when we told the club's board we wanted to pursue this as a long-term aim" said Trust board member Luke Thornhill, who is heading up the project.

"They pledged the full support of the club, we also have had very upbeat

expressions of interest from Study United, who already have some work we can build on, and the Museum, who are clearly the local experts on collecting and archiving items of historical interest.

"We want the Iron Museum to do all the usual things like recording results and records, but more than anything we want it to represent experiences. I am particularly keen to get recorded interviews with people who recall our earliest days in the Football League - or earlier, if possible - to contrast it to what it is like standing on the Donny Road End today. Or imagine the comparison between the great Barrie Thomas' daily routine and that the likes of Billy Sharp or Gary Hooper went through.

Northampton Town. With Scarborough in a struggling position in the league, their ground's average attendance had dropped below that of the leagues, just 1700 people arrived to view the game.

It was mainly all Scunthorpe too, so any home fans would be claiming a case of déjà vu for the season as they slumped to yet another drubbing of a scoreline. It was evident from the two fixtures that Scunthorpe had against them, that they had a real problem with their defence, shipping goals left, right and centre.

Andy McFarlane added his sixteenth of the campaign to solidify his place as the Iron's top goalscorer for the season, although that wasn't really in any doubt, especially looking back to his share of four goals in that 8-1 victory which broke club records. Phil Clarkson netted the second; his sixth and final goal for the Iron in his one year stay at Glanford Park. It was his third goal in as many games for the side, who scored the second goal in their 2-2 draw four days earlier.

The final two goals came via the boot of David D'Auria, one of which a penalty, to seal what turned out to be Scunthorpe's final three points of the season; with them drawing their final game at Glanford Park against Darlington a week later; in a similarly enthralling 3-3 draw in what was a typical end of season

spectacle.

The season ended with the Iron at the bottom of the top half of the table, just gripping onto the final place in the top twelve courtesy of the draw. It was incidentally their lowest finish in the league for three seasons, having narrowly missed out on the play offs the season prior. An even

lower finish of 13th was in store the following season, however.



The third placed finish for only their fourth season as a league club was no mean feat for the Iron who vastly improved on a 15th place finish from the previous season. Strangely, like today, Scunthorpe's season ended on this day 59 years ago; but only for half the clubs in the league. The other half played out another weekend of football in what was their 46th encounter of the season, the Iron slipping to third in that final round, despite ending their campaign in second position.

The Iron's final home game of the campaign three days earlier had ended in an Iron win over Carlisle, with nearly 8000 people seeing the season bow out in impressive fashion, in a campaign which had exceeded expectations.

Merfyn got Scunthorpe's only goal to end his season with a league tally of nine, just one short of joint top goalscorers Jack Haigh and Gordon Brown, who were both on ten. Remarkably Jimmy Whitfield also finished one short of the clubs accolade on nine goals, whilst Jack Brownsword managed eight in what saw a whole host of goals scored in the season.

The season had been a success all round, with the Iron also reaching the fourth round of the FA Cup for the first time in their history, albeit requiring seven games within the rounds before being knocked out of the fourth round by Portsmouth in a second replay, played at Arsenal's Highbury. No replay was required of round one though, with the Iron setting another record, smashing their local rivals Boston United 9-0 in a thoroughly

FAREWELL TO THE CHAIRMAN



T'S THE END OF AN ERA THIS AFTERNOON AS STEVE WHARTON SITS IN THE CHAIRMAN'S SEAT AT SCUNTHORPE UNITED FOR THE VERY LAST TIME, WRITES BOB STEELS.

And he more than anyone will be so desperately disappointed that his departure coincides with the Iron flirting with a relegation back to the basement division of the Football League, where club history has seen them languish so long, for the first time in nine years.

Wharton has tried to leave before but now just a year or so short of his 70th birthday, this time there will be no coming back. He is a man who, remarkably perhaps, has divided opinion among United fans.

Most recognise his achievement in steering one of the smallest clubs in the Football League to play recently at Championship level three times in four seasons.

Others criticise him for a supposed lack of ambition by not digging deeper into his own pocket to splash the sort of cash that the club itself could never afford.

What is undeniable is that most other people within football have held Scunthorpe United up in recent years as the model way in which a small club can be successful without running up the sort of debts that have crippled many others.

To borrow a quote from former manager Nigel Adkins, Wharton has always wanted United to be 'the best they could be'. He has never lacked ambition for the club - but has always insisted that it must be tempered with a touch of realism.

Look back nine years ago and you will see just how much this club meant to Scunthorpe United - and just how much he has meant to to the club. He never really wanted to become the Iron's chairman at all, but found himself suddenly thrust into that role in the summer of 2001.



I remember in a first interview with him, Wharton insisted he would not outstay his welcome and if he could not bring success to Glanford Park within a couple of years, then he would stand aside and let somebody else have a go.

Success did not follow quickly and early in 2003/04, Wharton did step down from the boardroom - but the men he left behind were divided. They all wanted success for United but did not how to achieve it.

Six months later, with the club was in real danger of being relegated from the Football League, Wharton didn't just sit idly by and watch. What was happening hurt him to the core - and he returned to steady the ship.

When they finished third from bottom in League Two at the end of that season, no sane Scunthorpe fan would have dared dream about what was to follow. But what had just happened was a real wake-up call for all concerned - probably too for Wharton himself.

He quickly set in motion the wheels that were to help Brian Laws and his management team drag United out of the gutter and bring some pride back to Glanford Park.

Twelve months later the Iron were celebrating promotion to League One and two years later on they were heading to Championship level for the first time in 47 years!

Wharton knew that if the club was to establish itself at that level, then Glanford Park would have to become all-seater.

He had the ambition to have plans drawn up to build a huge extension to the home end of the ground to include both conference and leisure facilities, probably realising that much of the cost would have to come out of his own pocket.

He then began talking to North Lincolnshire Council about the possibility of United moving from Glanford Park to another brand new stadium as part and parcel of a major redevelopment on the western side of town being planned by the local authority.

But the changing financial climate put that on hold, and Wharton too suffered his own health problems towards the end of Scunthorpe's first season at Championship level.

It was continuing problems with his health that did not permit Wharton to

give the time and energy he wanted to help Ian Baraclough during his short tenure of management.

Appointing Alan Knill proved, in hindsight, to be a big mistake and now, as United head back to League Two, much of Wharton's work is in danger of being undone.

Now just a year short of his 70th birthday, the chairman always knew that a time like today would arrive when he could no longer continue at the club.

That's why he always wanted United to be self-sufficient, and not spend money they could not afford. What happens next? That's something we are all waiting to see this summer.

Who will it be that offers the Iron the new leadership they now need. No-one probably shares the same degree of passion for Scunthorpe United as Wharton.

Even in his departure, he has left a significant loan in the club to help them through difficult times.

History should judge Wharton kindly. And United's fans should thank him for his efforts, while wishing him this afternoon a long and happy retirement.

SOME OF YOU MIGHT NOT KNOW THAT SCUNTHORPE-BORN LEE RIDLEY WORE THE NUMBER '24' SHIRT DURING HIS FORMATIVE DAYS AT THE CLUB. The left-back, who went on to make exactly a century of appearances for the Iron, was assigned the number during the 2000-2001 season - United's first back in the old Division Three following relegation from the old Division Two in the summer of 2000. By and large, however, Lee played for the club during the good times. He enjoyed promotion with Scunthorpe during both 2005 and 2007, and even picked up a League One winners' medal during the latter of these. He also scored the opener in a televised FA Cup match between the Iron and Wrexham in November 2004, which United won 2-0 against a team then placed a league above us. It was in the summer of 2007 that Ridley left to join Cheltenham, fearing that his firstteam opportunities might be limited with the emergence of Marcus Williams at Glanford Park.





WHERE ARE THEY NOW?

HE 2012/13 SEASON **CONCLUDES FOLLOWING THE 46TH NINETY MINUTES OF THE** SEASON, WITH THE POSSIBILITY OF **EVEN MORE FORMER IRON PLAYERS** NETTING IN THE FINAL MATCH OF THE SEASON, WRITES JAMES MOODY.

Indeed, no fewer than six former Scunthorpe players all found the net on the penultimate weekend of the season, with a whole host of goals netted since the last piece documented in the Walsall programme.


Northern Ireland international grabbed his sixth goal for the Millers against Exeter in their 4-1 win after a drought of thirteen games without netting.

With CLEVELAND TAYLOR falling out of favour at his parent club Burton, he took out a loan spell at local rivals Grimsby Town; a venue where he became an instant hero to the Mariners fans. In total, the five rides have raised more than £30,000 for the club's chosen charities.

After Bike Ride V, chief organiser Chris Vaughan, the SULSESC club treasurer, said: "We did it! After watching United play at Bournemouth on the Monday, we cycled north to stay overnight near Ringwood before continuing via stopovers at Calne, Worcester, Newport in Shropshire and then Warrington, to Deepdale.

"Between two disappointing results for the mighty Iron, we cycled 300 miles up hill and down dale, often in the teeth of the storm and never wearing less than four layers.

"The sheer determination displayed by the riders to reach their destination - and some days, it required sheer pigheaded determination - deserves your continued support, so if you haven't yet donated, please do so even though we've now passed our target. JERRY MAHONY 🕵 END OF AN ERA FOR ONE OF THE IRON'S LONG-TIME SERVANTS

NITED WILL BID A FOND FAREWELL TO A VERY POPULAR, LONG-TERM MEMBER OF THEIR BACKGROUND STAFF FOLLOWING TODAY'S GAME, WRITES TOM HARDY.

Groundsman Jerry Mahony has been involved with the Iron since he was a teenager, but has worked full time for the club for around twelve years.

During that time he has performed a number of jobs such as selling programmes, cutting and marking the pitch and performing the role of club mascot, Scunny Bunny.

However, due to medical problems, the decision was made to let 51-year-old Jerry explore his opportunities elsewhere.

"The decision was mutual, partly because of my health," he told THE IRON.

"It's disappointing but my health isn't very good, I've done my shoulder in and my knees aren't right from kneeling on concrete for all these years.

"This heavy lifting isn't good for me at the moment. I can still do it but I'm struggling."

He added: "I've cut grass, marked the pitches, done general repairs, a bit of everything really. I wouldn't call myself a handy man though.

"It's been enjoyable, but there's been a lot of more work to do lately.

"I'm looking for a driving job or something with computers in an office. That's the direction I'm going for."


Jerry first started working for Scunthorpe as a teenager selling merchandise back in the days at the Old Show Ground and managed to work his way up from there.

He remembers the first game he ever went to see at the stadium when he was just nine years old, and since then, he has been a diehard Scunthorpe fan, rarely missing a game.

"My first game was in 1969, I think it was against Shrewsbury and we lost 3-2. Kevin Keegan was playing but I don't remember a great deal else," he said.

"My Dad worked shifts and he used to take me to games when he could, I think I went to about ten games in my first

"From 1974 to 2002 I never missed a home game. Then I had a liver transplant and that made me miss about four matches.



"All in all. I think I've missed about five games at home in the past 29 years and thirteen away matches since 1980. Most have been down to health reasons.

"The best match I've ever been to was Swansea at home in the play-offs in 1999 when we won 3-1. It was the best atmosphere I've ever seen here.

"I'd like to think them days are around the corner again but it might take a few vears to rebuild."

The chance to wear the Scunny Bunny mascot outfit fell into Jerry's hands more through luck than anything else.

And since 1998, he has entertained United crowds at Glanford Park and helped push the team on to victory.

"When we were sponsored by Pleasure Island, they brought down their mascot and they had someone to do it for them," Jerry explained.

"There was one time when their guy couldn't do it so I filled in.

"Pleasure Island stopped sponsoring the shirts and apparently the Telegraph did a competition for a new mascot, but I didn't even see it.

"Then Scunny Bunny was born, so to

"Someone else was due to do it but on the day of the game they pulled out. And I've ended up doing it for the past fifteen vears.

"I still do it now, I haven't been doing as many home games but I'll make my comeback today and I'll carry on doing it next season."

Ahead of today's match, Jerry admitted that he is very anxious as the prospect of relegation to League Two looms.

He, like all United fans, is hoping the Iron can secure victory against Swindon and in

turn, Colchester fail to take anything from their game at Carlisle.

"It's going to be a nervous day. We've got to hope Carlisle can beat Colchester by one and we've got to score two here.

"It depends, Colchester might shut up shop or Carlisle might think they'd prefer to come to Scunthorpe next season rather than travel an extra 200 miles!

Jerry added: "We lost against Bury and then put in a performance against MK Dons, who had a chance of getting into the play-offs.

"Football's a funny old game, if someone gave me £1000 to put it on a result here today, I wouldn't know where to go.

"Having a big crowd behind you can make a big difference. Hopefully the gate will be bigger than usual and there'll be a good atmosphere."



But fair play to them for their efforts to spread the word about this afternoon's game, attract a bumper crowd and also keep people believing that what seemed was the impossible, is now possible.


A lot of angst remains about the Iron's decline in the past couple of years.



T IS EASY TO SEE WHY MIKE WHITE IS SO SUCCESSFUL IN HIS CAREER IN

Mike admits that as a 10-year-old he used to commentate to himself on football matches as he watched them on TV, or to his mates as they played the game, which he admits: "Usually invited comments like 'Oh! Mike will you shut up!' but now they admit I was always destined to do it!"

But it wasn't just his speaking skills which were emerging at that early stage.

He continued: "At about 11 or 12 I wanted to get into sports journalism and again I'd watch games and this time I'd write reports on them."

After leaving school he studied media at Hull College and while there he was able to gain some work experience at the Hull Daily Mail reporting on Hull City juniors

and some reserve team games. He admits this early contact with a football club gave him an invaluable insight into the culture of professional football.

He said: "I got to know Terry Dolan [the manager at the time) very well and he always looked out for me and helped me out if need be."

While clubs tend not to be so open these days, he speaks very highly of Scunthorpe and the access the gets to the manager and players.

"When we go to press days we are not shunted into the background, but we don't abuse this access and we are able to develop good working relationships with the club based on mutual respect for each other," he said.

He feels that his early experiences at Hull helped him with this. After College he got a job at the newspaper in advertising, but his love was always the editorial and sports side and he eventually secured a weekly column covering local amateur football in Hull, which gave him his first by-line (accreditation by name for his work).

A move to Kent saw a period in Mike's career which to describe as colourful might be an understatement! He took an initial position in a call centre; within six months he was promoted to the client services department and within a year he was an account manager boasting some prestigious clients such as Coca-Cola and Nikon.

As he says: "It was completely different [to what he was used to) and eventually I was nine years in marketing."

However sport was never far away, but this time it was wrestling which took his attention, a sport for which he has always had affection.

"Even when it became uncool to watch I kept watching it - loved it!" he says.

"Following a conversation with a friend who worked in the wrestling industry in Kent, I was invited along to see what I could do and as I dislike pain I took up refereeing!

"Although I had never done it before I thought I would give it a go!"

Because of his natural talent - or as he puts it "I had a bit of a gob on me!" - he became a ringside announcer and also managed a couple of wrestlers.

He admits: "I loved it! It was a release and I developed a new persona Mike White, Business Adviser to the Stars! In other words I wanted an image which said 'I'm no ordinary manager I only deal with stars!' It was fantastic; we had so much fun doing it!" And, it was all done as a hobby!"

It would seem that the media career he originally sought was a distant memory but not so. A move back to Yorkshire led to work with Hospital Radio in Hull, initially covering rugby league.

"I owe alot to the Station Manager, Nick Palmer, who gave me so much help in those early days," says Mike. "It is a well worn path from hospital radio into local radio and I was mentioned to David Burns [the Station's former Sports Editor] who offered me some part time hours on the station." Mike was working full time for Kingston Communications at this time and in 2005 he took the gamble to give up his job and commit to the radio; it was a gamble which paid off as he is now a full time member of the sports team.

In the early days at Radio Humberside, Mike mainly covered rugby league so it took him some time to become recognised as a football man, however working with David Burns at Hull City and now established at Scunthorpe he feels his rugby image is behind him.

His first full commentary on the Iron was in 2006 covering for Matt Dean, ironically, at Gillingham where he had lived while in Kent! He has covered games from time to time since then, but it has been this season that has seen him take on match commentaries permanently, usually with George Kerr or Lee Turnbull alongside as expert summarisers. His match preparation

He explained: "When we have a game coming up I will spend time watching the next team on the Football League Show, reading about them or looking for snippets

of news, I then draw up a written text which itemises all the information I will use during the broadcast.

"This will include details of form, their players, and previous games and their matches with us, etc.

"I will also include latest news from Scunthorpe, referee information and any other relevant bits. I then fully familiarise myself with it to ensure it flows and doesn't sound like I'm just reading it."

When asked to name his most memorable match he nominates, without hesitation: "The Tranmere game in 2009, when we made the play offs. The atmosphere was electric!"

Mike is full of praise for United, saying: "I have really enjoyed the chance of working closely with the Iron.

"I find them such a friendly club, they make me very welcome, and I feel I have ridden the highs and lows with all the fans. I mean when we scored in the Walsall game I was up and down in my seat as I was doing the commentary - you get immersed in it, it's difficult not to."

This is a man who clearly enjoys his work and who genuinely values his relationship with this football club.

INCE JOINING ON A FREE TRANSFER AT THE BEGINNING OF SEPTEMBER, KARL HAWLEY HAS BEEN A REGULAR FIXTURE IN THE IRON STARTING ELEVEN, WRITES TOM HARDY.

With 39 appearances so far this season, the 31-year-old striker has found the back of the net on ten occasions, which is his highest tally since the 2006-07 campaign.

Of these ten goals, there has arguably been none more important than the winner against MK Dons last weekend which kept the Iron's chances of survival alive.

"The ball came out to the right and my first initial thought was to hold back for a cutback," Hawley told THE IRON as he explained his crucial goal at Stadium:MK.

"I dipped inside the centre half, it took a slight deflection and I just managed to stop it from going behind me and scooped it in.

"I was delighted that I scored, obviously." He added: "We went into the MK Dons game and our objective was to get three points and we managed to do that to take our chances of staying up into the last game.

"It's our job, we're professional people and we owed it to ourselves and the fans and everyone involved in the club to show them that we're still fighting, and that's what the boys are doing.

"I think we had a bit of luck but it was overdue and that's what you need when you're defending like that.

"We were throwing bodies in front of the ball and in front of the goal and we managed to get the three points."

United have to beat the Robins this afternoon and hope that Carlisle can defeat Colchester by a margin which will sway goal difference in Scunthorpe's favour.

If both sides' goal difference finishes the

same, the decision of who will remain in League One next season will come down to the number of goals scored.

And Hawley, the former Cumbrian, is hoping that his old side can lend him and his teammates a helping hand today.

"I still know a few of the lads and I'll be throwing them a few texts and seeing if they can do us a favour," he said.

"But they're professional people and they're going to go and try and win their last home game.

"I know how much it means to the fans, they don't want to go half-hearted and I'm

the break and two quick-fire goals left Brian Laws' men with nothing to show for their trip to Gigg Lane.

But instead of focusing on that particular game, United's

thinking that's the art of management. You have to grind out results and put games to bed, that's the major thing.

"Like against Bury, we should have won that game and in the second half it should've been all over."

Following his release from Notts County at the end of last season, Hawley was snapped up by former Scunthorpe boss, Alan Knill.

However the arrival of Brian Laws in October didn't affect the experienced striker as he had become accustomed to playing under a number of different managers during his time at Meadow Lane.

In fact, Laws was so impressed by the former England C international's performances that he offered him an extension to his contract which originally expired in January.

> "Obviously I was delighted to stay. I've enjoyed it, even though it's been a difficult season," Hawley said.

"I've been playing and there's a good bunch of lads here who welcomed me as soon as I came in.

"The first manager was all about playing football, whereas this gaffer is more about the other side of the game like working hard and closing down.

"That's the major difference, it's a bit of old school - new school. I haven't got a problem with either style, it's each to their own and we've got to buy into that - that's all you can do as a

Another man who was brought in at the same time as Hawley was Leon Clarke - who still remains the club's top scorer despite the fact he moved to Coventry at the beginning of January.

The pair formed a solid partnership together but since Clarke's departure, Hawley has had to link up with a number of new faces, in particular Akpo Sodie.

A change in strike partner can sometimes prove to be tricky, particularly when two players have developed a good understanding of each other's strengths and weaknesses.

"It's difficult but that's part and parcel of the game. You don't really worry too much about that and you get on with it," Hawley insisted.

"It doesn't matter who you play upfront with, you've got to make the best of the situation.

"Whether it's Leon Clarke, Akpo Sodje, Mike Grella or Matty Godden, you've got to try and get the best out of that person and hopefully they get the best out of you to work together for the team, for yourselves and each other.

"But I think Leon and Akpo are different players to be honest. Leon's a lot more technically gifted whereas Sodje is strong and good in the air.

"Leon didn't even like heading! He used to say 'just because I'm tall, they think I can head the ball'.

"That's what he first said to me. He didn't really like heading it but he was still decent in the air. Obviously he's an out and out goalscorer as well."

With just one game of the season remaining and a whole host of contracts which expire in the summer, much of the Scunthorpe squad will be battling to ensure they still figure in Brian Laws' plans for next year.

Even though the Iron's relegation to League Two could be confirmed today, Hawley doesn't hold any regrets from his time so far in North Lincolnshire.



Swindon ready for the play-offs

ITH THIS AFTERNOON'S VISITORS SWINDON TOWN HAVING ALREADY SECURED A PLAY-OFF POSITION, THE IRON WILL BE HOPING FOR A FAVOUR AS THEY NEED TO WIN TO ENSURE THEY AVOID THE LEAGUE ONE DROP, WRITES ADAM GRICE.

The Robins, who are now under the management of ex-Aston Villa coach Kevin MacDonald, kept their hopes for a second successive promotion alive as they secured a play-off position with a 3-0 victory over Stevenage.

Whilst the Iron kept their hopes of survival alive with a 1-0 away victory at Milton Keynes Dons.

The Wiltshire based club, who were formed in 1879, won the League Cup in 1969 when they beat Premier League side Arsenal in the final at Wembley.

Roger Smart gave Swindon the lead before Bobby Gould levelled with just four minutes of the match remaining.

Don Rogers then scored a five-minute brace to ensure Danny Williams' side recorded a shock victory in front of 98,189 fans.

As winners of the League Cup, Swindon were assured of a place in their first European competition: the Inter-Cities Fairs Cup. However, The Robins, who are now under the management of ex-Aston Villa coach Kevin MacDonald, kept their hopes for a second successive promotion alive as they secured a play-off position with a 3-0 victory over Stevenage.

the Football Association had previously agreed to inclusion criteria with the organizers which mandated that only League Cup winners from Division One would be able to take part.

As the team were not eligible, the short lived Anglo-Italian competitions were created to give teams from lower divisions experience in Europe.

The club was founded by Reverend William Pitt in the late 1870s and they turned professional less than two decades later.

They reached the semi-final of the FA Cup for the first time in 1910 but they lost to the eventual winners Newcastle United.

The following season, 1910-11, Swindon Town won the Southern League championship, earning them a Charity Shield match with the Football League champions Manchester United.

This match is, to date, the highest scoring Charity Shield as Manchester United beat the Robins 8-4 at Stamford Bridge. Some of the proceedings from that match were later donated to the survivors of the Titanic.

During World War II Swindon received compensation of around £5,000 after the County Ground was used to house Prisoners of War.

The Second World War affected Swindon Town more than most other football clubs and the club was almost disbanded, the club needed a large amount of time to recover and for this reason it failed to make any real impression in the league.

The club only made it back into the Second Division in 1963 when they finished runnersup to Northampton Town.

In 1989 manager Lou Macari left the club to take over at West Ham United. This led to former Tottenham midfielder Ossie Ardiles taking over at the helm.

In his first season in charge of the club he

guided them to promotion through the Second Division play-offs. However, the club then admitted 36 breaches to League rules - mainly in relation to fielding ineligible players - which resulted them in being demoted to the Third Division.

This resulted in Sunderland being promoted to the

First Division whilst Tranmere Rovers moved up to the Second Division.

Swindon's season has been in the limelight for the majority of the season as they were managed by now Sunderland boss Paolo Di Canio.

Following the un-agreed sale of star man Matt Ritchie the Italian threatened to walk away from the club before finally doing so some weeks later.

This then sparked worldwide interest from the media after reports that Di Canio had 'broken' back into the County Ground to tear down all pictures that were associated with his reign.

"The way it was portrayed to me is that they want it to be a coaching club, to try and develop players. I just felt it was the right fit for me.

"I was getting fed up at home, the missus wasn't too happy with me and my golf wasn't getting any better so I thought I should get back in to football."

ANDY WILLIAMS MOVED TO WILTSHIRE FROM YEOVIL TOWN IN THE SUMMER OF 2012.

He began his career with hometown club Hereford United after graduating through the Bulls' youth academy. He made his first team debut as a substitute in the Herefordshire Senior Cup final against Forest Green. He finished as the club's top goalscorer in the 2005-06 season with 13 goals from 45 appearances - most notably in the Conference play-off final win over Halifax Town.

He played in the Football League for Hereford, and finished with 22 goals in 117 appearances.

The midfielder's performances earnt a £150,000 move to Bristol Rovers in the summer of 2007. He scored on his debut for Rovers just four minutes after coming on



as a substitute. He went on to amass just over a century of appearances and scored 10 goals at the Memorial Stadium.

He returned to Hereford United on loan before moving to Yeovil Town permanently in 2010. Williams spent two years with the Huish Park side, and scored eight goals in his debut season before bowing out on a high as the club's top goalscorer with 17 goals. The striker's 25 goals in 78 appearances attracted the interest of the Robins, and he rejected a new contract with the Glovers to arrive at the County Ground.

He has currently blasted 12 goals in 45 appearances so far this campaign, forming a lethal partnership with fellow striker James Collins.

Williams is one of Swindon's key attacking artillery.

He began his career with top flight side Stoke City in 2006, playing for the Potters at academy and reserve team level before making his first team debut as a substitute in against Tamworth in the FA Cup.

Rooney has developed from a striker into a winger during his spell with the Robins. He has scored nine goals in 30 appearances so far this campaign.

He scored his first professional goal against Reading in April 2006 before becoming one of the club's youngest ever hat-trick goalscorers at the age of 18-years-old, against Brighton and Hove Albion.

He went on to make 12 appearances in the Premier League for Stoke City before finding first team football limited. He finished his time at Stoke with four goals in two starts and 17 substitute appearances.

He then spent time on loan at Yeovil Town, Chesterfield and Bury before moving north of the border to Scottish side Inverness Caledonian Thistle in the summer of 2008.

The former Republic of Ireland international's 24 goals helped fire Inverness to a Scottish first division title. He then went on to score 21 goals in the SPL, finishing with a prolific return of 44 goals in 103 appearances before earning a move back to England with Birmingham City.

He has currently scored seven goals in 30 appearances for the St Andrews side, including a European goal in a 1-0 win over NK Maribor.

PROVEN PERFORMER GRAY ROBERTS

The left winger began his career as a youth player with Premier League giants Liverpool but didn't gain a professional contract at Anfield. He ventured into the Welsh leagues with Rhyl, Bangor City and Welshpool Town before moving back into English football with Accrington Stanley.

Roberts' 13 goals in 42 appearances helped Accrington return into the Football League by winning the 2006 Conference league title.

The former England C international spent two years with Stanley, scoring 24 goals in over 60



appearances before earning a move to Championship side lpswich Town in January 2007 after an initial loan spell.

He accumulated just under 60 appearances and scored four goals



for the Tractor Boys before departing for pastures new at Huddersfield Town for a £250,000 fee

He experienced a successful four years with the Terriers, racking up over 180 appearances and scored 33 goals from midfield. 2009 saw the Liverpudlian finish the club's top goalscorer with 11 goals, resulting in a host of personal accolades for the club before achieving League One play-off final glory in 2012 in a dramatic penalty-shootout win over Sheffield United at Wembley Stadium.

Roberts has proven to be one of Swindon's mainstays in midfield in his debut season. He has scored four goals in 41 appearances so far this campaign.

THE HOTSHOT JAMES COLLINS

AGE: 22 | NATIONALITY: ENGLISH


The striker began his career with Premier League side Aston Villa, progressing through the Villans' youth academy, and was a member of the first team squad away to Rapid Vienna in the Europa League but never made a first team appearance during his time at Villa Park.. He made his professional debut on loan at Darlington in October 2009 in a 3-0 defeat to Barnet, scoring two goals in seven appearances before firing four goals in 10 games for Burton Albion.


He joined Shrewsbury Town permanently in January 2011, completing the season with an impressive eight goals from 23 appearances. It was last season where Collins demonstrated his clinical prowess in front of goal, as his 17 goals helped promote Shrewsbury into League One as runners up behind the Robins.

After 25 goals in 73
appearances at the New
Meadow, Collins turned down a
new deal to arrive at the
County Ground. Capped for

What have you made of the season so

It's probably been a more turbulent campaign than anyone could have imagined eight months ago. A change in management and Chairman (twice), the arrival of new owners to rescue the club from near oblivion, a terrific League Cup run and the potential of back to back promotions - it's been a script writers dream. The presence of Paolo Di Canio at the football club means Swindon have rarely found themselves out of the headlines in the past couple of years. I think it will serve them well to avoid the glare of the national media for a few months at least. Given everything that has happened, I think this has to be viewed as a successful season but it will ultimately be defined by whether or not the team reach the Championship.


The club are in contention for back-toback promotions, do you think it can be achieved through the play-offs this year?

It's certainly a possibility. The team is packed full of quality and have shown

they are capable of beating anyone in this league. There are two key factors for me which will define how Swindon's season unfolds from here. Firstly, the manager Kevin MacDonald is dealing with an injury list as long as your arm. Several of those absent players are key members of the first-team squad too so it'll be a case of how the side cope with depleted numbers. It's also fair to say that Swindon perhaps should have been coming into today's game fighting for an automatic promotion spot. They were top of the League One table less than three months ago. My slight concern would be whether there is the belief that they can still go up through the play-offs after missing their chance to finish in the top two.

Why do you feel Swindon have adapted to life in League One so easily?

It probably comes down to the simple case of momentum. The likes of Southampton and Norwich have done it in recent years from League One to the Premier League and likewise, Swindon had found that winning mentality in League Two that they were able to carry over into this season. I also don't think there is a huge difference between the bottom half of League One and the top end of League Two. There were some sound purchases in the summer too players that knew the league well. They did come at a cost though with the club having had the financial clout to



compete with the best of them.

If the club were to go up, where do they need to strengthen over the summer?

They'll probably need to toughen up in all areas of the pitch bar the goalkeepers I'd imagine. A key position for me is a winger though as they've failed to replace Matt Ritchie since his untimely departure to Bournemouth back in January - a switch though which helped the club to remain in business.

But that is certainly not the message being put across as the Robins look to gather momentum for the end of season play-offs.

He said: "It's very important to go into the play-offs with some momentum and we have to go into it with that little bit more confidence that everybody else seems to have.

"But that confidence should be there all the time because you don't stay consistently in the top six places of the league unless you are one of the best teams in the league.

"It doesn't bother me at all who we get in the play-offs because, as I've said all along, we're as good as anybody in this league so we have nothing to fear.

"I don't think the tie will be over until the last minute of the second leg because all of the teams in the play-off picture are very similar in terms of ability and I think it will just come down to who gets that little bit of luck.

"We've had a look at the contract situation with a few people but part of it will depend on which division we're in so it's up to the players to focus and try to get us over that line in the play-offs."

Meanwhile, 18-year-old forward Connor Waldon made his professional debut last weekend as a late substitute in Swindon's 3-0 win against Stevenage at the County Ground.

Born and bred in the Town and a Reds fan to boot, Waldon was ecstatic to have made his maiden appearance for the club.


He commented: "It was the best feeling of my life and the whole experience has just been amazing.

Current Aberdeen striker Fallon played at the County Ground between 2003 and 2006, scoring 25

goals in that period. The New Zealand international played for his country at the 2010 World Cup in South Africa and he has represented numerous teams in the UK that include Barnsley, Swansea, Plymouth and Ipswich. Fallon signed for the Robins in November 2003 from Barnsley and he bagged his first goal in a 3-2 defeat to Plymouth. Andy King was the man that brought Fallon to the club and the Gisborne born striker scored seven goals including a brace against Luton. Many fans will also remember his overhead kick from the edge of the area against Bristol City to earn Town a 1-1 draw in Division Two (now League One). Fallon struggled during the 2004-05 season and after only scoring four goals in 33 games he was loaned to Yeovil where he scored on his debut against the Iron. The following season, however, Fallon hit 14 goals by January 2006 and was soon snapped up by promotion chasing Swansea City for £300,00. He added a further five goals that season

This included nine goals in the League Cup helping Town reach the semi-final. His scintillating form attracted interest from a host of Premier League

clubs and he was soon on his way to Middlesbrough for £1,300,000 in 1995. In total he scored 39 goals in 87 games in two seasons at the County Ground and has since had spells at Sheffield United and Barnsley and has cost a total of £3,700,000 in transfer fees in a career that spanned 16 years.



Alan remained with the Quakers until the end of the 1973-74 season after making over 300 league starts for the club although he spent the summer of 1972 playing in the North American League with Miami Toros. In 1974 he finally left Darlo to sign for Scunthorpe at the start of the 1975 season but he only spent one campaign with the Iron, making 24 appearances before he was off globetrotting again. This time he moved to the Australia with the Ukrainian Sport Club Lions played in Adelaide. He then emigrated to America to play out the rest of his career and he now lives in California.

With no time to stop for tea on the way I was feeling ravenous so I tucked in to a piping hot cheese and onion pasty before finding a seat.






OLLOWING THE CONCLUSION OF THE IRON'S YOUTH TEAM CAMPAIGN. WHICH SAW UNITED PLAY EXCELLENT **FOOTBALL AND FINISH THIRD IN THE** LEAGUE TABLE, ACADEMY MANAGER TONY DAWS SAT DOWN TO GIVE HIS THOUGHTS ON HOW THE SEASON HAD GONE, WRITES ADAM

Overall Tony, how do you think this season has

It has gone really well and I am delighted with the outcomes at the end of this season for numerous reasons. There is no doubt about the fact that for the vast majority of the season, we have played some excellent, attractive football, scoring 50 goals in 26 games and managing to keep six clean sheets throughout the season. The team has been the youngest that I have ever put out with three under sixteen boys and one under fifteen boy playing in the under eighteens in almost every game. On top of that we have finished in third place which is the highest placing in the league that we ever had achieved. With four games to go we were away at Hull City and before the kick-off we all knew that if we won the game we had a chance of winning the league. We were 1-0 up with 10 minutes left and we were playing some outstanding football. Unfortunately we were beaten 2-1 when we deserved to win the game. I feel that if we had won that game it would have put us in a really strong position to challenge for the league title and being in that situation was a great achievement with such a young and inexperienced team. Ultimately our main aim is to get at least one boy signed professionally at the end of each season. We are fortunate enough that the club are signing three this year so that is something that we can be really positive about and I hope that the boys continue to work hard and strive to achieve their goals. We have some excellent young players coming through the Academy. Hakeeb Adelakun has already become the youngest player ever to play for the club making his debut away at Tranmere over the Christmas period at only sixteen years of age. Jamie Wootton made his Football League debut at home to the best team in the league Bournemouth in early December and most recently Luke Hornsey has been called up to the bench. We have a good group of first years moving in to year two of their apprenticeship and we have an outstanding group of school leavers set to join us full time in July. I am very pleased and positive about the progress being made in the Academy and I feel that we are in a position to supply players to the first team more than ever

What are your views on the three players that have been given professional contracts?



I am very proud of all three of them. They have all worked really hard over the last two years and they are all different types of players, we have one coming through from each unit of the team. George, at left-back, has really developed a lot towards the end of the season. He is very difficult to play against or to get past, technically he is very good. The defensive side of his game - one-on-one - has really come on and improved. On top of that he has shown that he is good at getting forward and supporting attacks from wide areas. He has been the silent player really, not getting the reviews for scoring but putting in steadily improving performances that put him in a position to challenge for a contract. Luke Hornsey in central midfield has done really well this season. Physically he is right up there; he is quick, strong and agile. Luke has a very good engine and he can run all day penalty box to penalty box. He is technically very good and this season Luke has added a lot to his game particularly developing the ability to be able to run with the ball and burst through the opponent's midfield. Then we have Jamie

Wootton who has always had the ability to score goals right through the Academy age groups. This season Jamie has improved his game understanding and his work ethic. By Christmas he had scored 20 goals in as many games and I think that if he had continued playing in the youth team after Christmas he would have probably ended up with 30 or 35 goals. We sent Jamie out on loan to Frickley Athletic to get some first time experience playing men's football and to 'rough him up' which will stand him in a really good stead for the years to come.

The last few weeks must have been encouraging for you with Niall Canavan and Matt Godden getting in the team on a regular

Niall and Matt both came through from the same crop of players that we had four years ago. The good thing was that Niall played 15 times in the Championship. For a young former youth team player to come through and play at that level against sides that included international players is an achievement in itself. What has been good since Brian and Russ came back to the club is that they have given Niall the confidence and the opportunity to play week-inweek-out. He is now challenging the more senior players like Paul Reid and David Mirfin in terms of trying to be one of the first names on the team sheet. I think Niall's performances before his broken nose were a positive, he has managed to score six goals this season and he was beginning to develop the potential that he always had as a youth team player. Matt Godden has always been able to score goals; he has just never been given the opportunity before to do it in the first team. He is the best goal scorer that I have ever worked with and now his opportunity may have come. Matt has an excellent attitude, he works hard on the pitch and on the training pitch to improve his game and once he 'finds his feet' in the Football League and scores his first goal, I have no doubt that he will bang the goals in on a regular basis. Hopefully he will become one of the first team regulars at this football club.


Jean Yves Mvoto's last-minute goal for Oldham saw them climb their way to safety as they beat Crawley 2-1.






