



Without a win in the opening seven games, it's fair to say this wasn't the start to the season Martin Allen was hoping for, however, they will be a stern test for the Lilywhites, as we have seen over the years!

The Gills currently occupy a position near the foot of League One, but have the players and manager to turn things quickly on their head.

Losses to early pace setters Wolverhampton Wanderers and Levton Orient will not worry gaffer Allen and he will again be hoping they can make the Priestfield Stadium a fortress for the 2013/14 season.

One bit of positive news for the fans is the return of 31-year-old prolific striker Adebayo Akinfenwa. The Englishman who played for Gillingham between 2010 and 2011 has returned on a free transfer from Northampton and he is already the club's joint top scorer with two goals. Gills fans will be hoping he can continue his scoring form throughout the season.

The Blues have been busy in the transfer market this summer bringing in eight new players whilst six have left. This may suggest some explanation for the lack of early form as the squad continue to gel.

Danny Hollands has added much needed flair to the midfield while Cody McDonald has been brought in from Coventry to add firepower up front

Gillingham will be desperate to pick up points with games against early leaders Leyton Orient, Peterborough, MK Dons and Wallsall coming up before Christmas as well as crucial games with teams around them.

TICKET DETAILS

Tickets went on sale last Monday, with an initial 498 seating tickets in the open Rainham End stand, with more available if required, plus three pairs of wheelchair disabled tickets.

There are two price-bands of tickets: those purchased in advance are as follows: adult £15, senior citizens (over 65) £14, U18 £10, U12 £5, wheelchair support and carer (sold as pair) £15.

Any sales on matchday at Priestfield see a significant increase in pricing as follows: adult £20, senior citizens (over 65) £19, U18 £12, U12 £7, wheelchair support and carer (sold as pair) £20.




THE NEW

SYSTEM FROM FOSTER'S







By the sounds of things, the 29-year-old striker is just as pleased to be back as the thousands of North End supporters that sing his name every week.

You're back! You spent a year away at Doncaster, won promotion, got a medal in the cabinet, how's it been settling back in?


We've got a good group of lads and they've made it a lot easier to come back in. I've known quite a few of them from playing against them over the years so it wasn't completely unknown. Since preseason and since we had a bit of a u-turn about me staying on, it's been easy. The lads have just accepted it, I'm part of the squad and thankfully I got myself into the team last week

You say you knew a few of the lads, but it must have been like moving to a new club? You came back into the dressing room to a Club you've been at for three years and, in effect, half those players you'd never played with before...

Yes, there was only Stucki and Bails from before the previous manager so it was, but I guess when you've been around the block I've met plenty of new players. It wasn't too hard, it wasn't as hard as I was expecting in a way, but it's easier when you've got a good group, when you haven't got the egos and haven't got any arrogance around the changing room. You come into a team, as you can see with the way we've been going this year, we're quite tight knit and quite close. I think it made it easier for me and I'm just thankful that they've welcomed me back and it's time for me to play my part.

It was extremely public and clear in the early part of the summer that potentially you weren't going to be here, not for footballing reasons, but for other reasons. Tell me about that day when you turned up at the training ground, it was also the day Kevin Davies signed, and you were told the Club would still like you?

It was a bit surreal to be honest because from day one of pre-season we'd put



out the sort of understanding of what was going on and that the Club needed me to go. I took that on the chin and it's just a matter of moving on and unfortunately doing things right for both parties. We were playing head tennis on the back pitch at Springfields and Kev Davies arrived. There were obviously all the rumours of him signing, nobody had seen him, but the Club knew what was going on. He just bowls up to the training ground, walking in to introduce himself and then as soon as he's introduced himself I was pulled aside and it was outlined what the owner and manager have been saying all pre-season, which was that they'd like me to stay. It was my decision, if I was happy to do it then the Club would be more than happy to keep me. It was a no brainer to be honest, because it's three years that I've been here now and I've missed a year and essentially in my head I didn't play last year and then for the last six months of the first year in League One I wasn't up to much. But now it's down to me to work my way into a team that's not struggling for a striker! After that day it was set in my head what the manager and Club were thinking, so for me I was just happy to get on with working and not having to worry where my future lies.

You spent the whole of pre-season with the team so that helped. Being back at Deepdale, what was the experience like with the fans? Was it like you'd never been away?

It all started from the Liverpool game. When I came on at half-time the fans were brilliant as usual and, in fairness, they have been since I came to the Club. I was a bit apprehensive as to how they were going to be, because when I was away there was a lot of stuff you could read in the press; stories getting spread around without any truth and my parents obviously go on the websites, with them being 3,000 miles away and they read stories which had no truth behind them. I was a bit womed about how it would be, but as soon as I stepped onto the pitch against Liverpool it was clear that they hadn't forgotten me and I'm grateful for that because it's been a long year, but it's time for me to get back to what I do best.

I WAS PULLED ASIDE AND IT WAS OUTLINED WHAT THE OWNER AND MANAGER HAVE BEEN SAYING ALL PRE-SEASON, WHICH WAS THAT THEY'D LIKE ME TO STAY.

We had a sell-out against Liverpool, 17,000 against Wolves and then nearly 18,000 against Blackpool. That was a phenomenal way to start the season...


I did the media at the start of the season, it was just before the Blackpool game, and we're at a League One club and we're filling the stadium three games in a row and I think you had the Blackburn game in the middle of those three, but other than that you're getting 16, 17, 18,000 - it's just ridiculous. It was phenomenal. The Liverpool game was a workout and a friendly, but when the business end came down and we had Wolves and played quite well and then you've got the Blackpool game which the atmosphere was electric for 90 minutes and to finish it off the way we did was fitting and perfect. A perfect night for the

fans and I think it's a sign of where we want to be because we competed with, if you look at the Championship table and see Blackpool and Burnley, they're both in the top four. We've competed with both of them and that's a sign of where this Club wants to be and where this Club should be. It's down to us to get those types of days week-in, week-out and I think it's deserved to the people who come and supported us through the thick and thin, and more recently the poor results and poor league standings.

Stevenage was your first league start since you came back. How much of a confidence booster was it to be selected, and you were placed in that role just behind the other two forwards, probably a role that suits you...

It was a role I played in with both Mells [Neil Mellor] and Proc [Jamie Proctor], back when we first came down to this league and it was unexpected because Holmsey is a good footballer and he's one of our main men. I was half expecting to be a on the bench and





hopefully play a part, but the manager named the team and i was in. It was good for me, because I want to go out and show what I can do and I think with a little bit of an added incentive for the game as well. So, to get in the team and, apart from scoring a goal, I thought I played quite well. Hopefully it'll be a spot I can hold down, but, like I said, Holmes is a good player and you've got so many players fighting for 11 positions. I'll do my best to keep myself in there. All I can do is work hard and try and produce results on the pitch and go from there. If I'm in next week happy days, if I'm not then I'm just going to work harder to get back in.

Every footballer wants to play every game, but with the squad we have now got, people are going to have to miss out and there will be changes, particular at the front end. Everybody has got to be patient haven't they?

Yeah, but it's a long season, and the manager has already shown we can play two, three or four formations. So it all depends on what formation he picks, what team he picks and the thing is, he's got players in every position that have back-up and they're chomping at the bit to get in there. I think, with the strikers we've got, we've got 38 games left in the league so that's a long way. Touch wood, we haven't had any injuries yet so the lads that get in there and hang onto the shirt, fair dos, they keep hold of it. But it's very rare that you get that for the whole season, players playing every game. You've got players sitting in the background waiting for their chance, like I did against Stevenage, and hopefully keep it, but we've always got competition and it's a healthy option for the gaffer.

You're also back in the Canada squad as well, it was good to get over there and be part of that with the new manager and you've got some important games coming up over the next few months with them as well...


It's not confirmed, but we're trying to get a game, in the middle of October, in London. Hopefully, I'll be playing against a team-mate if he can get himself into the mix. But it is good to be involved. Benito Floro [the Canada manager] came to watch me against Blackpool so I put myself in his good books with how I played Just to get back involves, it's been the best part of a year since I was involved so just happy. Okay, I missed the games while I was out there but I got to train and show them what I'm about, my attitude and how I love playing and how much it means to me to play for Canada. Hopefully, it stands me in good stead for the next camp and if I'm involved then I'll do the exact same and do as hard as I can.

Club and country are almost identical in this situation aren't they, it just shows that? football's a game of opinion. Both Club and country change manager and it means a change of circumstances at both for you...

With Stephen Hart, the previous manager, I never had a bad relationship with him, it was just I had a few injuries and we didn't qualify so we only really played friendlies which were mostly in the US. So it ended up being a matter of, I just couldn't get in. A couple of times they said they wanted to try some younger lads and the new breed. It wasn't the same case as it was for Preston but, hey, if I'm back in the mix for both, it's down to me to keep myself in there and I'm just looking forward to the challenge.

Last season you were at a club that got promoted, you saw a side that got out of this division. Can you see ability in the dressing room you're in now that has the opportunity to try and do the same thing this year?

Yeah, I said that at the start of pre-season. We've got a deep squad, I think we've got a deeper squad here than we had at Doncaster last season. We've got two or three players that can play in every position so that's definitely a massive plus for us but the best thing about us last season was our togetherness. We won 15 games away from home and not many teams do that in the world, never mind League One. But it's down to us, we're on the right track definitely. think, looking at it this season is a tougher league than it was last season. There were a few softer clubs last year and we were fortunate to get there at the end, but it was well deserved because we



worked hard for it. There's no reason why, with the squad and fanbase we've got, there's no reason we can't get ourselves up there. It's going to be tough but, when's it ever easy?

PROGRAMME MATTERS

Take away the fixture details from the front cover of most of today's league club programmes, and you would struggle to distinguish one from the other, at first glance at least. Distinctive cover styles, sometimes featuring sketches or photographs of the stadium, are a thing of the past, as programme designers maximise the impact of full colour, match action photography.

INSTANTLY RECOGNISABLE

Each August, every football pitch was a vivid green; the new kit of every club was sparkling bright.

In days gone by, clubs ran for years with the same cover design, the visual impact of the programme being regarded as secondary to the provision of team lines and a half-time scoreboard. This meant that many programmes were bland and unchanging, but it did provide an enduring image of the club programme, and provided an identity for the club with the wider footballing

The handshake between spectator and player superimposed on a contemporary football, is instantly recognisable as the Manchester United programme. There have been many occasions over the last few decades when United's programme designers, in their search for a more modern profile, attempted to drop this traditional masthead, but public opinion kept bringing it back.

Club crests and cartoon representations of nicknames were often prominent in programme designs - the Liver bird at Liverpool, the Magpie at Newcastle United and Notts County, Robins at Bristol City and Swindon Town, The Canary was never far from Norwich City's programme cover, the Imp from Lincoln City, and the straw hat from Luton Town.

Local pride was often evident. Various sketches and photographs of HMS Victory have adomed the front of the Portsmouth programme over

the years, while Torquay United often depicted a beach or promenade scene to signify their home in the English

Everton's programme for much of the 1960's featured a white sketch of Goodison Park on a plain blue background, while stadium scenes were always a feature of Cardiff City, Aston Villa, Sheffield Wednesday and Fulham programme covers, the last named alternating between the Cottage pavilion (as in Craven Cottage) or the impressive frontage of the Stevenage Road stand.

Most of these standard designs were an economy measure. The 'shell' of programmes would be type-set for the whole season, and in the case of two-tone covers, they may have been pre-printed for the entire season. In some instances, each cover for a complete season would be identical to all the others, in other words no fixture details at all would be printed on the front of the programme.

Our next programme from the archives comes from 1974, when Sir Bobby Charlton was manager and the Lilywhites faced Blackburn Rovers in Division Three.

On the first two pages of the matchday magazine, an away section concentrates on the visitors, providing readers with a brief bio of each player. as well as their head coach. Ken

The game itself took place on Saturday 14th September at Deepdale, with information such as team news and upcoming fixtures on the back page of the programme.

A short description of the match's referee, AWS Jones from Ormskirk, reveals that he was 'married' and 'a buying contractor with sailing and gymnastics as hobbies'.

A section on page four titled Snap Shots', rounds up some derby-related facts as well as more general football news stories from around the country.

One such story explains that lan Callaghan would, the very next day, miss his first game for Liverpool after 250 consecutive matches - a certain Bill Shankly apparently resting the midfielder for their League Cup tie with Brentford.

Elsewhere in the programme, 'Our Division' keeps on top of the league's recent fixtures and results, much like The One And Only's League One Round Up'does today.

The programme, priced at just 10p, also features a column written by manager Bobby Charlton, which urges the PNE squad not to get too complacent following their recent victory over Sunderland.

The game itself finished 0-0, with Rovers eventually topping the Division Three table as champions and PNE having to settle for ninth spot.



He's just got a move to another Premier League team where he's starting games. His passing range is one of the best, he can just put the ball where he wants it. He plays a bit like Steven Gerrard. He tackles and puts himself about and also likes to shoot as well.

I've been with him at Norwich for about six years and, in my eyes, he's probably always been one of the best players that's been there. He gets overlooked quite easily because he doesn't score

NATHAN REDMOND

I didn't know much about him until this summer when he came with the U2 Is. but he came into the team and he was the best player in the Championships. Every time he got it, it looked like he was going to create something, defenders look scared because of his pace and skill.

FORWARD:

GRANT HOLT

The goals he scored at Norwich were phenomenal, I think, in his first two seasons, he scored a total of around 60 goals in League One and the Championship. Then he did it again in the Premier League, he scored 15 or something like that. He's just always in the right place at the right time.

I was lucky enough to catch him in his last ever season as a player. I was on the bench for the first time on his last ever game. He helped me massively, he's such a nice person off the pitch and on the pitch, you can see what he's done from his career. He wins everything, scores goals, he's a leader.

DANNY WELBECK

His work-rate and off-the-ball stuff that you don't really see is brilliant. He kicked on and went to Sunderland and now he's playing week-in, week-out for Manchester United. He's probably England's first striker on the teamsheet and he's started to add goals to his game.

Norwich attacker Nathan Redmond began his career with Birmingham City as a trainee. Born and bred in the Midlands, the 5ft 8" midfielder made his debut for the Blues against Rochdale in the Capital One Cup, as Birmingham secured a nervy 3-2 victory at St Andrews.

He followed that up with two further appearances in 2010/11, but it was the following season in which he really established himself in the side.

In his sophomore campaign, Redmond made an impressive 37 appearances for Birmingham, scoring a total of seven goals including one crucial equaliser away at Brighton & Hove Albion.

Last season was less successful for the midfielder in front of goal, as he managed a disappointing total of two for Birmingham in 45 appearances.

However, his flair and creativity was there for all to see, prompting the then-England U21 manager Stuart Pearce to call-up Redmond for the 2013 U21 European Championships.

The midfielder was a shining light in a dismal campaign for the Three Lions and, just a month after the tournament, he was snapped up by Premier League side Norwich City.

Already this season, Redmond has scored a winning goal for the Canaries - sending a wonderfully hit 25-yard strike beyond Artur Boruc to earn Norwich three points against Southampton.

Steven Caulker came through the ranks at Tottenham Hotspur before moving to Cardiff City for £8m in July 2013.

The towering defender was often sent out on loan early in his Spurs career, and enjoyed spells at the likes of Yeovil Town, Bristol City and Swansea.

He spent a year Hulsh Park in his first temporary deal, making 46 appearances for the Glovers and establishing himself as a key player for the club.

The next season, Caulker spent time at Ashton Gate, and was a cut-above in the Championship – playing 30 games for the Robins and barely putting a foot wrong.

The following season saw his receive Premier League interest before the centre back was eventually loaned out to Michael Laurdrup's Swansea.

During his time in Wales, the 6ft 3" defender was also making strides on the international scene - appearing frequently for England's U21 side.

His impressive performances at the Liberty Stadium prompted Andre Villas-Boas to try-out the defender in the Tottenham side the following season.

His no-nonsense style of play soon caught the eye of newly promoted Welsh side Cardiff, where Caulker was presented as one of the club's marquee signings in July 2013.

"It's very varied, there's lots going on," she told The One And Only in an exclusive interview. "It's certainly not boring and there's plenty to do and I enjoy meeting people."





After an impressive start to the Sky Bet League One season, Paul Huntington is hoping to see the goals and clean sheets continue in North End's bid to extend their unbeaten start.

The Lilywhites welcome Mark Cooper and Swindon Town to Deepdale this afternoon following a 3-2 local derby win for the visitors over Bristol City and a glamour Capital One Cup third round encounter with English footballing giants Chelsea on Tuesday.

But the Lilywhites are more focused on what they do in a bid to make it nine games undefeated in the league come 5pm this afternoon.

Speaking exclusively to The One And Only, Huntington said: "We have got a good squad, that is part of our confidence and the competition for places is great.

"It is not just about the 11 players, we have got a very strong bench and everyone is wanting each other to do well which can only bode well for the future and we have just got to keep working hard.

"Going in to it, we have four wins on the bounce and are full of confidence."

Preston North End manager Simon Grayson's first match in charge of the Lilywhites was against the Robins at the County Ground in a 1-1 draw; Will Hayhurst scoring for PNE on that occasion and Hunts is fully aware of just how dangerous Swindon are and how much they love to play football.

He continued: "Swindon are a good footballing team and it will be another tough game, but we will be the home team and we will be looking to go out and get another win and continue to build on that fourth place that we have got at the moment"

Last Saturday was a historic occasion for North End, with Stuart Beavon's solitary second half strike putting to bed a 35 year curse which had seen the Lilywhites and their supporters never return from Bramall Lane with a victory in the bag.

And although this was a first for a generation of PNE fans, the central defender insists that records are not something he and his team-mates worry about come 3pm on a Saturday.

Hunts added:"I don't think the players worry about records and things like that to be honest.

"It is just another game and Bramall Lane is never an easy place to go to. but they haven't been on a great run and thankfully we capitalised on that and got the three points.

"That is what we were there to do, to do a job and get another three points, keep a clean sheet and to score one at the other end is perfect."

Speaking of Bramall Lane and Sheffield United, a real togetherness in the squad was evident to see, as the players dug deep and fought hard for one another before claiming the win.

And Huntington was delighted to see everyone pulling together in the same direction that afternoon.

He concluded by saying: "The win at Sheffield United was very much a team performance.

"We dug in away from home, everyone worked hard for each other and we played with a good discipline and a good shape.

"In the second half we got on the ball a bit more and passed it well and it is another good win that keeps the unbeaten run going.

"In any away game, I think you are going to come under spells of pressure, even at home that happens, but we stood up to that and managed to nick it 1-0 and I thought we looked


Posh's result was deemed even more remarkable considering that they were reduced to nine men with Nathaniel Knight-Percival and Mark Little seeing red. The Blues practically had the game wrapped up by half-time with goals from Lee Tomlin and Britt Assombalonga giving ... them a healthy lead, before Izale Mcleod bagged a consolation goal for the Dons to set up a nervy finish.

Wolves continued their good run of form with a well fought for away win at mid-table Shrewsbury Town. Bakary Sako's penalty in the 84th minute was enough to gift the Wanderers a sixth win in eight games leaving them five points off the top of League One.

Martin Allen and Gillingham's difficult start to the season continued as the Gills slipped to the foot of the table after a 1-0 home defeat to last year's Capital One Cup finalists Bradford City. Gary Jones' ninth minute comer managed to evade everyone in the Gillingham box, nestling in the bottom comer, lifting Bradford up to an impressive sixth place.

Coventry's positive start to the season came a cropper at Vale Park the Sky Blues on the wrong end of a five-goal thriller with Port Vale. Fans of the Midlands side have had plenty to talk about so far this season, but it's fair to say they've had an exciting time with goals. The sides were level until late on when Chris Birchall's right-footed finish broke Coventry hearts.

Two sides currently at the wrong end



of the table met at Meadow Lane as Notts County picked up their first win of the season defeating Tranmere 2-0. Joss Labadie gave County the lead in the seventh minute with Tranmere's best chance coming through Jean-Louis Akpa Akpro, whose header crashed against the bar, before Marcus Haber, on loan from Stevenage, guaranteed all three points for the Magpies.

Bristol City remain currently in the relegation zone after a thrilling 3-2 loss to local rivals and today's Deepdale visitors Swindon Town at the County Ground. City took the lead twice through Aden Flint and former Arsenal man Jay Emanuel Thomas before new signing Nile Ranger scored the winner for the Robins, leaving City in 21st place.

Neither team could grab a vital winner at the Bescot Stadium as Wallsall and Rotherham played out a 1-1 draw. Both teams are hovering around the Play-Off zone and looked evenly matched game, with both teams sharing the points.

Carlisle picked up their second successive win with a 3-1 win away to Stevenage. The Cumbrians haven't had the start to the season they would have hoped, but caretaker boss Graham Kavanagh did his hopes of getting the job on a full-time basis no harm at all, with former North End winger David Amoo putting the icing on the cake with the third goal against his former manager and coach.

Points were shared for Colchester and Crawley as the two sides failed to find a winner in the game that ended I-I at the Colchester Community Stadium, Former West Ham United striker Freddie Sears gave The U's the lead before Emile Sinclair equalised for Crawley, with North End loanee leffrey Monakana awarded the man of the match.

And finally, Oldham and Crewe had to both settle for a point a piece after a 1-1 draw at Boundary Park Oliver Turton's first senior goal put Crewe ahead before Charlie MacDonald earned a point for the hosts - who will be this week keeping an open eye for news of a possible takeover, after it was revealed Super League's Salford City Devils' owner Dr Marwan Koukash could be interested in purchasing the Latics.

It was sharp-eyed Swarbrick who pointed out a slight inaccuracy about the stand in which Preston fans were housed last week.


Sheffield United have named the away end the Jessica Ennis Stand in honour of the Olympic gold medal winner who hails from the Steel City.

A LILYWHITE BORN AND BRED

A Preston lad through and through, it was a dream come true for David Lucas when the goalkeeper made his debut for North End in the 90s.

The current Fleetwood Town shotstopper went onto enjoy over a decade at his hometown Club, featuring in 150 games and fulfilling a lifelong ambition in the process.

"To be honest, growing up, it was a dream that you never thought would .. come true," he told The One And Only in an exclusive interview.

"Things like that don't usually happen to a working class kid in and around Deepdale, but obviously as you get older, you leave school, you join as a YT, then you get more and more contact with the first team as you progress.

"I was at the stage where I really improved and was performing well and the season when I was 17 or 18, I went on-loan to Darlington and played a good few games for them.

"So I had a taste of league football and then at the end of the season I managed to play in the championship winning game for PNE away to Hartlepool and it was the stuff dreams are made of."

Lucas broke into a side that was filled with star quality, including current Manchester United manager David Moyes, who was skipper of the team at the time.

And the Scot clearly had a major influence on the keeper both in his playing days and when he took charge of the Lilywhites as head coach.

"When I made my debut, Moyesie definitely played in that game as a centre half, captain and then he was the assistant manager and I played games with him during that period," Lucas continued

"Then he hung up his boots and became manager and to be honest he was integral to a lot of people's development as men and as footballers."

From time to time, Lucas can be spotted at Preston's Springfields training ground, helping coach the next crop of North End keepers.

He believes the life of a youth team

player has changed drastically since he came through the PNE Academy - and not just because the plastic pitch he used to train on at Deepdale has now gone!

"When I was at schoolboy age we'd just train on Deepdale two or three times a week because obviously we had the plastic pitch and what have you," he said.

"It's a lot more structured now, a lot more co-ordinated and a lot more

disciplined. I think when we were growing up it was a case of getting the lads in and seeing how they progress and by the time they're 16, see if they think they'll be able

"I think now it's a lot more long term based, even from the age of ten or 11. they ultimate goal is getting to 16 or 18 and it's a lot more planned out than it was when I was growing up."

As rewarding as it might have been to play for the team he had supported all his life, you would think the prospect of playing against North End for a different club would be difficult to face up to.

Lucas was presented with that dilemma twice in his career, when he was pitted against the Lilywhites for Rochdale in both the Johnstone's Paint Trophy and League

But he claims it didn't affect him much, thanks to the warm reception he received from the Preston fans.

"I've only played them twice and they were both for Rochdale," he said.

"One was in the IPT at Rochdale and the second one was in the league game at Deepdale and that was the only time I've played back there.

"The reception the fans gave me was really heart warming and to be fair they know that I'm just like one of them.

"I came through the system, through the ranks and at the end of the day all I wanted to do was play at Deepdale."

Lucas also spent a successful two years at Swindon, appearing in over 70 games for the Robins, and he remembers his time at the County Ground fondly, saying: "Swindon is another team that is very close to my heart.

"I had two great years there, my family loved our time there but I think from the recent results under Mark Cooper, they're going to be knocking on the door heavily.

"I just think they've got lads who have been there for the past couple of years and they're going to be, I'd pick them for a Play-Off team at least."

Though, despite his high hopes for Swindon, Lucas still expects North End to win this afternoon's encounter.

"I'm going to go for a 1-0, Humey," he predicted.

"I think you've got two good goalkeepers there in Wes and Dec so I think goals will be few and far between."







Carers Central is an independent registered charity (no. 1112213), originally established as Preston Carers Centre in January 2006. Since that time the organisation has grown continuously to provide more services to an increasing number of carers.

Of their partnership with the Carers Trust, Ian Penrose, Chief Executive Officer at Sportech PLC, owners of The Football Pools, said: "As a Group we believe in leaving a lasting legacy in the community. Sportech PLC has been a long term

supporter of Carers Trust, and we are pleased to be working with them on this initiative.

They are currently actively supporting over 3,500 adult carers from a range of situations including mental health issues, physical disabilities, parent carers and our BME community.

A Carer is someone, who without payment, provides help and support to a partner, child, relative, friend or neighbour who could not manage without their help. This could be due to age, physical or mental illness, addiction or disability.

Among the barriers to carers gaining the support they need are isolation, inadequate respite provision and a lack of awareness of the role and needs of carers. Many will be caring for 50 plus hours each week, which impacts hugely on their own health and wellbeing.

Many carers also do not recognise themselves as carers; they see themselves as husband, wife, partner, parent, friend or relative of someone who needs help but it is important they are identified to open up the various support services that will improve their lives and those they care for.

Through their work the charity ensures that potentially vulnerable people have the support, knowledge and confidence to make the best use of the range of services available which include coffee mornings, events, computer training and sit in services as well as advice on benefits, emergency plans and the opportunity to make their voices heard.


Anne, 47, carcs for her husband who has mental health issues and has been through a lot after finding out he was ill: "Since my husband became ill we have fallen into poverty." she said. "I have lost a well paid job, our house and the future we thought we would have – all as a result of my caring role. But the support I get from Carers Central helps me to keep going".

Meanwhile, 61-year-old Ed cares for his wife Linda who has multiple sclerosis: "About ten years ago, as my wife's multiple sclerosis progressed, Linda was no longer able to work," he said. "There were outbursts of anger and frustration. These were not always handled well by me. When I contacted Carers Central I realised for the first time in years there was someone willing to listen to me."

"I have since attended some courses and support group sessions provided by Carers Central, which have all enabled me to manage myself better and improve my health and ability to care for Linda."

Preston North End are sad to announce the death of lifelong supporter Norman 'Norm' Brough.


Following this battle to recover from a stroke, Norman sadly passed away on Monday 16th September, aged 83.

WAY BACK WHEN

North End had faced Swindon Town in both cup competitions prior to our featured game. however, our first league encounter was almost 50 years ago to the day – as Sam Gilliland explains...

1963 marked the first-ever Football League meeting between Swindon and PNE - on Saturday October 12th.

The two sides had met in both League Cup and FA Cup before then -North End winning on both occasions - with the FA Cup game taking place in 1935. But never before had they met in the league despite both clubs formation dating back to the 1800s.

It was an early season fixture in the old Division Two. North End were battling at the top of the table after

12 games, and Swindon, on 19 points, were four ahead of Preston on 15 and sitting in second place.

North End had won seven of their first 12 games, drawing four and losing the other two. They were also scoring goals at a good rate, with 27 so far having conceded 21.

Going into the match, Preston lined up with: Kelly, Ross, Smith, Lawton, Singleton, Davidson, Wilson, Ashworth, Dawson, Spavin, Holden.

Swindon's line-up was: Turner, Dawson, Trollope, Morgan, McPherson, Woodruff, Summerbee, Hunt, Smith, Smart, Rogers

A crowd of 21,243 turned up at Deepdale on the day - North End's biggest crowd of the season up to then - in anticipation of a PNE win.

Here is Walter Pilkington's report for the Lancashire Evening Post & Chronicle, published on the following Monday's edition of the newspaper; Walter was the Sports Editor at the

'North End's followers were pleased to welcome Swindon Town's first appearance at Deepdale for a League match. It will be remembered they played on this ground once in the League Cup. The visitors have made themselves an attraction by soaring to the summit of Division II, fresh from being promoted. Indeed, they can claim the distinction of a unique feat, which is that of a promoted club winning their first six matches in new company no matter what section.

'North End satisfied the season's biggest crowd at Deepdale - 21,243 - by continuing their winning ways and so remaining one of five Second Division teams unbeaten at home.


'Although a spirited side scored only one goal in earning considerable extra bonus and contributing to ousting Swindon from top place in the table. they got less than their due.

'If the aspiring Wiltshire club had lost by three or four goals, they would have been looking for excuses if they had complained. Their only justifiable grumble was that fortune served them badly when Holden scored the decider midway through the first-half.

'Swindon's goalkeeper was helpless, with Dawson almost on top of him after they had collided in going for a free kick when Holden's calmly taken shot from a narrow angle glanced through off the centre forward's back. They argued that it would not have gone in otherwise.

'If this were bad luck, the rumbustious Dawson, whose determination and dash consistently provided the greatest threat to Swindon, had equal reason to feel aggrieved when Turner instinctively shot out a foot to deny North End's leading scorer a well-deserved second half goal.

'Dawson's strong challenging extended and agitated Swindon's efficient, well-organised defence, but it was not his day as a marksman.





Turner, whose agility and skill prevented Preston from winning comfortably, had saved three excellent attempts from him before frustrating Dawson again with the best save of the match near time.

'North End's performance, considering the extent to which they dominated play, was not so convincing as could have been wished owing to fumbling or slipshod finishing but it needs to be judged by the quality of the opposition.

Swindon displayed rhythm and intelligence in clever approach play they consolidated and covered well under pressure. Their attacking efforts, however, were blunted by improved marking and more effective defensive tactics by Preston. Gaps hitherto alarmingly apparent were much less frequent thanks to better co-operation with Singleton and the backs by the wing halves

Lawton and Davidson bore favourable comparison with Swindon's industrious

Morgan and Woodruff in keeping Hunt and Smart quiet, and that was half the job done. Hunt was seldom dangerous and Smart got in one telling shot. Kelly averted an equaliser by saving it brilliantly. Summerbee was restrained by Smith, and Swindon's Smith, although clever and artful found Singleton tenacious and hard to beat. The outcome was a welcome and overdue clean sheet."

The result kept North End in fourth place in the table, although it moved them ever-closer to the teams above

Some of the other results that day

included a 3-0 win for high-flying Charlton at home to Bury, Manchester City were held to a draw at Grimsby Town, Leeds United won the West. Yorkshire derby 2-0 at Huddersfield Town, and Middlesboro, one place below North End. beat Portsmouth 3-1. Northampton also won 3-1 in the South West against Plymouth.

Unfortunately for North End, by the end of the season, they had just missed out on promotion to Division One - five points short of Sunderland in second who were promoted with champions Leeds United.

Preston could be proud of their record at Deepdale that season, however, as they were beaten just once and won 13 of their 21 home fixtures. It may have been their away form which cost them, as eight defeats on the road added to the seven draws at Deepdale which left them having dropped points.



That same season Ranger was loaned to Barnsley before returning to Newcastle. He was released by the Magpies earlier this year before putting pen to paper for Swindon on a one-year-contract.

With a new start Ranger is hoping to put the past behind him and has started well to his time at the County Ground. He scored his first goal for the club in their shock win at QPR in the Capital One Cup second round and will be looking to build on that.

12 DANNY N'GUESSAN

AGE 26 FORMER CLUBS Rangers, Lincoln City, Boston United, Leicester, Southampton, Scunthorpe, Charlton, Millwall

The Frenchman is well travelled having played for nine British clubs in his career. N'Guessan's most successful spell came during his time at Lincoln City before he later earned a move to established Championship side Millwall in 2011. The powerful frontman joined Swindon this summer following his release from The Den and bagged his first goal for the club in the dramatic 3-2 defeat to Wolves earlier this season.

COOPER AIMS FOR CONSOLIDATION

Swindon Town manager Mark Cooper is content with his side's start to the season after such a large summer overhaul and insists consolidation is the main aim this campaign.

This afternoon's visitors currently sit 11th in League One with 11 points on the board after winning three, drawing two and losing three of their opening eight fixtures.

The summer signalled numerous new arrivals at the County Ground, though Cooper believes his players have all settled in quickly.

"I think we've been fine, we've had 17 players out and 16 coming in so we've had a big turnaround," he told The One And Only in an exclusive interview.

"They've adapted to a different style of play and they've adapted to it quite well so it's a very young group, but we're doing alright."

Of those new additions, six have come from Premier League giants Tottenham

lack Barthram, Nathan Byrne and Massimo Luongo arrived on permanent deals, while Ryan Mason, Alex Pritchard and Grant Hall are on-loan at the County Ground.

And Cooper pointed to Swindon's owner as the main man behind the

"They've done very we'll, our owner is close friends with Tim Sheerwood so they've got a bit of a friendship there and we've tapped into that" he said. "There's no law against it, we've got three lads that have been a Brighton so we've got a mixture of everything really."

The Robins' signing of former Newcastle front man Nile Ranger turned a few heads during the transfer

The striker joined on a free from the Geordie outfit and Cooper believes the 22-year-old will prove a valuable addition to his squad.

"I think no-one else really wanted to take the gamble, but he's been calm and he's been a breath of fresh air," Cooper added."He's been really good, he hasn't caused us any problems as of yet and his



performances on the pitch have been good.

"Like I say, on the pitch his performances are good and he does carry a goal threat."

Ranger netted a late winner in Swindon's last-gasp 3-2 victory over local rivals Bristol City last weekend.

The win was the Robins' third of the season and their manager was delighted with the application of his side in such a highly-charged match.

"It was a hostile atmosphere, it was electric on Saturday," Cooper said.

"Local derby with two teams going at it and luckily enough we managed to come out with the points which is what we wanted and needed."

The Robins travel to Deepdale knowing they face a tough game against an in-form North End side.

The Lilywhites have won four in a row in League One and Cooper is well aware of the threat they pose his Swindon

"They've hit a bit of form, I've seen a couple games and they have a very experienced manager who knows how to get out of that level and this league," he said.

"We know it'll be a really tough game,

they'll be very well organised, they'll try and play and if we get anything we'll have to be right on top of our game."

After a difficult summer at the County Ground, Cooper knows he faces a hard season ahead, but has targeted consolidation in League One as his main

"lust to make sure the club is sustainable," Cooper said. "After what's happened over the summer, it was totally unsustainable and sort of close to the wire, we had to make up a different

"So just to maintain that and make sure we play entertaining football and keep progressing."

Following a 3-0 loss to West Bromwich Albion, former Robins boss Paolo Di Canio was sacked by Sunderland.

And, after following in the Italian's footsteps at Swindon, the current boss at the County Ground knows just how unforgiving football management can be at any level.

'Football management is a precanous industry," Cooper commented."One minute you're top of the tree, the next you're at the bottom so you've got to enjoy the good times while they last."

MY BEST DAY: MARK COOPER

Some teams are known for being cup specialists, but a manager who can be seen in such light is Swindon Town boss Mark Cooper.

During his managerial career, which has seen the current Robins boss navigate his way from Tamworth to being the manager of today's opponents Swindon, via Kettering Town, Peterborough United, Darlington and Telford United, one theme which underpins his career to date is his ability to excel in cup competitions.

In a three year stint at Tamworth, Cooper led his charges to not one, but two appearances in the third round of England's showcase cup competition the FA Cup.

In the first of those appearances they were felled by Stoke City, but not before forcing a replay after gaining a draw at the Britannia Stadium and then holding the Potters, until the lottery of penalty kicks sealed their exit.

That cup jaunt was followed by a similar one the season after, before Norwich City ended Tamworth's cup exploits for another season following a 4-1 win for the Canaries.

After leaving the Lambs, if anyone thought Cooper's cup heroics were a one team wonder they were proved to be unfounded when he took up the reins at his new club, Kettering.

After winning the Conference North by a 17 point margin in the 2007/08 season, Cooper backed that up by guiding the Poppies to the fourth round of the FA Cup - equalling the record for the furthest the club had ever been in that competition in the 2008/09 campaign.

Again it took Premier League opposition to dethrone him and his players as Fulham earned a place in the fifth round.

The success of that campaign caught the eye of Peterborough and Cooper was appointed as the man in charge at London Road in June 2010.

This was to be a short and ill-fated

spell, however, and he soon moved on to pastures new with Darlington.

A successful first campaign including a run of only one defeat in 20 matches, culminated in a trip to Wembley for Cooper and his team in the FA Trophy Final against Mansfield Town - the first time either side had competed in the final.

After ending the hopes of old club Tamworth plus Bath City, Telford, Salisbury and Gateshead en route to the final, the Stags now stood between Cooper and his first domestic cup honour as a manager.

The black and white stats of the match would show this to be an unspectacular match at best.

But the drama of the finale, in conjunction with Darlington's very appearance in the match following the years of turbulence that they found themselves shrouded in, is enough to write a book about.

After 90 minutes of action, the

deadlock remained sealed with no sign of anyone with a key to unlock either defence.

And 30 minutes on, with penalties just around the corner, the stage looked set for the drama that shootouts always bring.

But Chris Senior had different ideas. A long throw-in by Aaron Brown was met by the head of lan Miller and his flick led to Tommy Wright looping his header up and over the Mansfield goalkeeper and onto the crossbar, before the ball dropped perfectly for Senior who headed home from no more than two yards out, despite the best efforts of the Stags defence.

At full-time the scenes of jubilation were something to behold - in particular for the 10,000 Quakers fans who had made the long trip south, as they had never seen their side score at Wembley prior to this day despite two previous visits to the national stadium!





Fraser Digby

A product of the Manchester United academy, shot-stopper Fraser Digby made a staggenng 509 appearances for Swindon Town.

Nicky Summerbee

The versatile Nicky Summerbee started his career at the County Ground and would later play important roles for both Manchester City and Bradford.

Paul Bodin

Although an integral member of this Swindon side, Paul Bodin onginally came through the ranks at Chelsea. The former Wales international currently coaches the Robins' youth team.

Glenn Hoddle

Player-manager of this Swindon side, Glenn Hoddle made well over 50 appearances for the Club. The Tottenham legend would later go onto manager England at the 1998 World Cup in France.

Colin Calderwood

Former Scotland international Colin Calderwood was captain of this Play-Off winning side. The defender was an ever-present for Swindon from 1985 to 1993.

Shaun Taylor

Originally from Plymouth, centre back Shaun Taylor appeared over 200 times for Swindon in his five years at the County Ground. He is currently the development coach at Plymouth Argyle.

John Moncur

Before midfielder John Moncur made his move to the County Ground, he started his football career with Tottenham Hotspur.

Ross MacLaren

A versalile midfielder, Ross MacLaren had impressive spells with both Shrewsbury Town and Derby County before moving to Swindon in 1988.

Dave Mitchell

Ex-Australia international Dave Mitchell played up-front for Swindon fown for a total of two years. He scored 19 league goals for the Robins and would later move to Australia to play and manage down under.

Martin Ling

Beginning as an apprentice at Exeter in 1984, Martin Ling eventually moved to Swindon in 1991 for a fee of £15,000. While with the Robins, the midfielder played close to 200 games.

Craig Maskell

Aldershot-bom Craig Maskell became a Swindon player in 1992, after spells at Southampton, Reading and Huddersfield.



1968/69 LEAGUE CUP WINNERS

Peter Downsborough

Widely considered the greatest ever goalkeeper to have played for Swindon, Peter Downsborough moved to the County Ground way back in 1965. The shot-stopper would go onto play over 275 games for the club.

Rod Thomas

Former Wales international Rod Thomas became a Robin in 1964 and would go on to enjoy nine years at the County Ground.

John Trollope

The definition of a one-club man, John Trollope played 20 years for Swindon Town. The left back started his career at the County Ground in 1960, retining 20 years later.

Joe Butler

A tough-tackling full back Joe Butler began his career with his hometown team Newcastle United, moving to Swindon Town in 1965. The defender spent 11 years at the County Ground.

Frank Burrows

Scot Frank Burrows moved from Scunthorpe United to Swindon. Town in 1968. He played around 300 games for the Robins over an eight year period, sandwiching a loan spell at Mansfield Town.

Stan Harland

Began as a trainee at Everton before spells at both Bradford and Swansea. He moved to Swindon in 1966 where he established himself in the starting XI, appearing over 225 times for the Robins.

Don Heath

Winger Don Heath began his career at Carrow Road with Norwich City before moving to Swindon Town in 1967. He played over 100 games for the Robins in three years.

Roger Smart

A dedicated inside forward, Roger Smart spent 13 years at the County Ground - racking up around 350 games for Swindon. Following his time with the Robins, Smart went onto play for Charlton Athletic.

John Smith

London-born John Smith made his mark as a professional footballer at West Ham before stints at Tottenham, Leyton Orient, Coventry and Torquay. He eventually moved to Swindon in 1968.

Peter Noble

Former forward Peter Noble transferred from Newcastle United to Swindon Town in 1968. He played over 200 games for the Robins before moving to Burnley and, later, Blackpool.

Don Rogers

Regarded as one of the best players to pull on a Robins shirt. Don Rogers began his career with Swindon Town in 1961. It years of success followed as the forward turned himself into a club legend.

Wes Foderingham

A 22-year-old keeper, Wes Foderingham started his career with Crystal Palace as a trainee, enjoying loan spells at Histon and Swindon. He impressed enough at the County Ground to earn a permanent deal in January 2012.

Paul Caddis

Former Scotland U21 international Paul Caddis came through the ranks at Celtic and eventually moved to Swindon in 2010. In his three years with the Robins, the full back played 92 games for the club and scored six goals.

Joe Devera

After playing over 175 games for Barnet, Swindon snapped up Joe Devera on a free transfer in June 2011. The defender went onto play over 50 times for the Robins before securing a deal with Portsmouth in May 2013.

Alan McCormack

Dubliner Alan McCormack began his career at Deepdale with PNE, coming through the academy as a trainee. Numerous loan spells followed and he eventually found his way to the County Ground on a permanent deal in 2011

Callum Kennedy

Graduated from the Swindon academy in 2007, he went onto play just 43 games for the Robins. He now plays for League Two side **AFC Wimbledon**

Matt Ritchie

Winger who enjoyed three spells at Swindon Town – two on-loan and one permanent deal Ritchie signed for Bournemouth in January 2013 for a fee of £400,000.

Simon Ferry

All-action midfielder who played 175 games over two spells at Swindon Town. Ferry transferred to Portsmouth in 2013 on a free transfer.

Hard-working Preston fan and midfielder Jonathan Smith spent just a year at the County Ground. After his 48 appearances for Swindon he left for York and now plays for Luton Town.

Raffaele De Vita

Italian forward who spent two years at Swindon, scoring 14 goals. He moved to Bradford City on a free transfer in July and has featured for the Bantams in League Two this season.

Paul Benson

Joined Swindon in 2012 and scored an impressive 15 goals in 39 appearances. The striker is currently on-loan at Conference side

Alan Connell

Young striker who impressed at Swindon after netting 13 times in only 44 games. He left for Bradford City in 2012 on a free transfer.

Nicky Summerbee

Son of Manchester City legend and Preston-born Mike Summerbee. His grandfather. George Summerbee, and great uncle. George Summerbee, had also been professional footballers.

Shaun Taylor

Would spend five years at the County Ground before transferring to Bristol City in 1996. Brother of ex-Torquay United player Craig Taylor.

Adrian Whitbread

Spent just one year with the Robins before moving onto West. Ham United in 1994. Since his retirement, he has acted as assistant manager at Leicester, MK Dons and Brentford.

Made 119 appearances for Swindon in three years as a left back. He got his first cap for Wales while playing for the Robins and even managed at the County Ground for a brief spell in 2011.

John Moncur

Spent two years with Swindon, appearing 67 times for the club. His son, George, currently plays for West Ham United as a midfielder.

Luc Nijholt

Transferred to Swindon from Scottish side Motherwell for £175,000 in 1993. He would go onto play 96 times for the Robins and scored three times for the club.

Kevin Horlock

After failing to make a first team appearance for West Ham, Horlock moved to Swindon in 1992. In five years with the Robins. he played over 175 games for the club.


Martin Ling

Had two spells at Swindon, five years apart. Ling would later play and manage Leyton Orient and, more recently, was in charge of Torquay United

Former Norway international who played over 70 games for Swindon. The striker was successful in front of goal for the Robins, bagging over 25 goals in two years.

Andy Mutch

Moved to Swindon after a highly-successful time at Wolves. The striker spent three years with the Robins, playing over 50 games. but struggled in front of goal.

This was played over the border, taking on Third Lanark, or Third Lanarkshire Rifle Volunteers FC, to give them their full title, on 4th October 1888 at Cathkin Park, Glasgow.

North End had full back Bob Howarth out injured and Archie Goodall had disappeared off the scene, only to re-appear a few weeks later in Aston Villa's colours.

In front of a 5,000 crowd North End lost 2-4 in what was their third trip to Glasgow in just four weeks. Jimmy Ross scored both of Preston's goals.

PRESTON NORTH END V STOKE, **6TH OCTOBER 1888**

For Stoke's first ever visit to Deepdale, North End made three changes from their previous league game at Derby County. Dave Russell and Fred Dewhurst returned in place of William Graham and Archie Goodall, whilst North End reserve player Richard Whittle stood in at full back for the injured Bob Howarth.

Stoke arrived at Deepdale with just nine players, as two of their squad ad missed the train connection. Their places were taken by two North End peserves who volunteered to assist Stoke, who were expected to struggle against Preston, even with 11 men.





Only 3,000 fans were present when the game kicked off at 3.45pm, with local lads, William Smalley and Alf Dempsey playing up front for the

Right from the whistle Preston North End pressurised the opposition with Jimmy Ross going close in the opening seconds. Stoke's goalkeeper, Rowley, was soon in action, saving in fine style from Ross. The visitors' first chance came by way of Smalley who set up Slater, only for Trainer to clear the danger effectively.

After 19 minutes, a rush at goal by the home forwards inevitably ended in ROSS notching the games' first goal.

Each side in turn then created unsuccessful attacks but Rowley was the busier of the two custodians.

Just ten minutes after his opening goal, ROSS had the home fans cheering once again, scoring with an oblique shot.

John-Goodall was next to show his skills, having two good shots, but seeing Rowley save both attempts. Stoke's rear defence was proving to be stubborn, despite being two down, with Rowley, Clare and Underwood being prominent. All three players went on to become England internationals.

The game, as a contest, was over after 35 minutes, ROSS again applying the final touch, thus recording Preston North End's first ever league hat trick

North End did not let up and Dewhurst forced a corner. From this kick, Stoke raced upfield but Slater shot wide of the target.

A couple of minutes before the interval ROSS scored his and North End's fourth goal from a well-judged centre by Drummond.

On resuming, Preston began where they had left off, on the attack pounding Stoke's goal with attempts from-all angles. Goodall rattled the crossbar and Drummond twice hit the woodwork in quick succession.

Eventually Stoke gained a corner: conceded by Whittle, but the same fellow cleared the resulting cross.

After 64 minutes DEWHURST scored the fifth goal and ten minutes later WHITTLE popped up to score on his debut with a long shot.

lust before the final whistle Slater

scored for Stoke, but was adjudged offside. From the free-kick North End, quite clinically finished off a one-sideo game by scoring a seventh goal from GOODALL

MEETTE INVINCIBLES

The latest profile of one of the 'Old Invincibles' from Club historian lan Rigby is one who bizarrely went missing on North End in the middle of the inaugural Football League campaign!

ARCHIE **GOODALL**

If ever two footballing brothers were likened to 'chalk and cheese' it was John and Archie Goodall.

John was the real gentleman of early football, with hardly a bad word said against him. On the other hand, younger brother Archie was a real controversial character, both on and off the field.

Archie was born in Ireland, John in England and both brought up in

Archie played football in his early days in and around the Merseyside area, turning out for St. Jude's, Liverpool Stanley and Everton. He also represented Liverpool and District versus Cheshire in January 1888.

Three years earlier he guested for Great Lever when his brother played there. At the end of May 1887 he played against Preston North End for Everton, but during the following August he joined the North End party that made a small tour in Scotland.

He made his North End debut on 13th August against Hibernians, scoring in a 1-2 defeat. He also scored in the following game when Preston beat Dundee Strathmore 16-2, a game when his brother John scored nine

After playing 13 games he disappeared only to re-appear the following September-Archie made his league debut on the 15th September 1888, playing against Wolverhampton Wanderers, scoring the third goal in a 4-0 away win.

After another away friendly, playing right half at Bootle, he played in what was his last game for Preston North End, the league game at Derby County, on the 29th September.

A skirmish developed late in the game between two players and Archie got himself involved by grabbing the Derby County player by the throat, but he calmed down without hitting him!

Archie knew deep down that if he stayed at Deepdale he would find it very difficult to displace any of the 'Old Invincibles', After just one month at Deepdale, Archie moved on to Aston

At the end of that inaugural first season he joined Derby County, with whom he was affiliated with for 14 seasons.

During his long career he was to prove he could play in most positions. He went on to become a household name in the 1890's, sometimes hitting the headlines for his football feats and sometimes for his off the field activities.

When capped for Ireland, Archie and John became the first set of brothers to play for different countries.

Regarded as a 'ceaseless worker', 'a tempestuous half-back' and the 'hero of many a fight' he must have been a real, handful to manage.

He was not averse to using his strength on his opponents, legally or illegally. He had hit the headlines prior to the 1898 FA Cup Final versus Nottingham Forest when caught trying to offload tickets to a ticket tout.

He had previously been fined by. the FA in March 1894, having been charged for assault, and suspended by the same body in October 1897 too.

This suspension ended a club record of 151 consecutive league appearances.

Even when he was the captain of Derby County he was suspended by the club, for "inattention to training and alleged insubordination".

He went on to play for Plymouth Argyle, Glossop North End, where he was player/manager, and finally, in 1905. Wolverhampton Wanderers, against whom he had made his league debut some 17 years previously.

Archie then had a spell coaching at St. Vincent's College, Castleknock Dublin in succession to former Preston team-mate, Bob Holmes.

Archie adventurously developed the urge to become a showman. He built his own wheel contraption and toured England, Europe and America showing off his unusual 'wheel show' as well as performing 'strong-man' acts and occasionally taking to the trapeze.

He was really a troubled soul as he suffered serious domestic problems for many a year. Though he died in London he was buried in Derby.























































































FOR THE FANS, BY THE FANS

fighter who never surrendered. I was happy when he scored in his last game with North End.



LEFT BACK WILLIE CUNNINGHAM

He played mostly right, but I still wanted to put him on the

left because I consider him a legend of the club. He played between 1949 and 1963 and starred in the season 1952/53 when the PNE competed with Arsenal for the title and lost in the FA Cup Final against West Brom in 1954. He is currently the player with the second highest number of appearances in the Club.



CENTRE BACK **BILL SHANKLY**

Another great legend of the Club. An important centre

back in the history of the PNE, the great protagonist of the 1937/38 season that ended with the conquest of the FA Cup. He played for PNE between 1933 and 1949.



CENTRE BACK **SEAN GREGAN**

Very good defender, he played also in centre midfield

with the same success. He was player of the year in 1996/97 and 1999/2000 seasons.



RIGHT WING SIR TOM FINNEY

An absolute legend of Preston North End, a

football player and a man who dedicated his entire career to this Club. The best ever, a true champion on and off the field. Had it not been for the War he could have begun earlier, played more games and scored more goals. Immense.



CENTRAL MIDFIELD PAUL McKENNA

Complete midfielder; great fighter. He is the fifth player

with the highest number of appearances in the history of the Club, the player with most appearances among the players of the modern era.



CENTRAL MIDFIELD **GEORGE MUTCH**

There are many other players that I wanted to

include in my XI, but Mutch, besides being a great forward, was the player who, with his penalty kick, decided the 1938 FA Cup Final against Huddersfield - giving the PNE a historic victory; not his natural position, but I wanted him in the side!



LEFT WING ALEX JAMES

A great champion who played only three seasons

for PNE (with 53 goals) and became a true champion with Arsenal. Players like Cartwright, Spavin and Angus Morrison, probably deserve a space in my XI because they played for several seasons for PNE, but I consider James one of the greatest champions of his era and it is nice to know that he played for the PNE.



FORWARD **CHARLIE WAYMAN**

A real striker who helped with his many goals to bring

PNE close the championship in 1953 and the FA Cup in 1954. He was one of the best scorers in the history of the Club after Finney, Roberts, Bruce, Dawson and Thompson.



FORWARD JIMMY ROSS

I couldn't not include in my XI - one of the 'Old

Invincibles'. He formed an extraordinary partnership with Goodall in the season 1888/89 and was one of the best scorers of that era. He scored more than 100 goals for the Club, seven in the match won 26-0 against Hyde, but I think that he scored many others goal before the foundation of the Football League in 1888. A real 'goal machine', unfortunately limmy died very young, only 36-years-old.

STANDOUT PNE MOMENTS **BEST MOMENT**

"I could say without a doubt my best moment as a PNE fan was my first time at Deepdale when I was received with great kindness by the staff of PNE, I thank in particular Adrian and Gary, I could tell even when I awarded Will Hayhurst at Deepdale as best young of the team.


WORST MOMENT

THE **GREATEST**





JOE MARSTON

A legend on opposite sides of the world, Joe Marston is highly regarded in both Preston and Australia for what he did during his playing days.

In 1943, the defender played his first match for New South Wales State League side Leichhardt-Annandale and continued to appear for the Aussie outfit for a further six years supplementing his income by working as a painter and a life guard.

Then, in 1950, he transferred to Preston North End and would go on to create a stellar partnership in defence alongside both Tommy Docherty and Willie Forbes.

Initially deployed at right back, Marston took some time to settle into the English game, but once he switched positions to centre half, it didn't take long for the Lilywhites fans to recognise his incredible talent.

Having helped North End win the Second Division in 1951, the defender became an ever-present in the Preston first team and is now widely regarded as one of the most influential post-war players the Club has had,

He made history in 1954, when North End took on West Bromwich Albion in the FA Cup Final, as he became the first Australian to play in the World's most prestigious knock-out competition.

Upon leaving Deepdale, he returned to live in Australia, where he resettled with his family and, to this day, the Joe Marston Medal, awarded to the man of the match in the A-League and National Soccer League Grand Final, is named in his honour.



BALL BLITZES BLACKBURN

Preston North End's Women followed in the footsteps of their male counterparts by making it three wins on the spin as they thrashed Blackburn Rovers 6-1 thanks to four goals by Melissa Ball.

The Lilywhites made the short trip to face Rovers in what was anticipated to be a closely fought local derby, but the east Lancashire side proved to be no match for their Preston opponents.

PNE started the game brightly, getting on the front foot from kick-off and their early pressure paid off when they went ahead inside ten minutes, Ball supplying the final touch to give the women a perfect start.

No sooner had Blackburn restarted the match than they found themselves two down, as Becky Grocott doubled the

Ball and Jackson faced off again soon after and once more it was the Lilywhites player who came out on top when lackson brought her down, leaving the referee with no choice but to award PNE the penalty. Up stepped captain Laura Walker and she made no mistake from the spot.

Ball got the hat-trick her play had so richly deserved in the 71st minute, when a low strike rebounded of keeper Jackson before the ball fell kindly to Ball who poked it home.

If the winger thought she had had a good day up until that point, it was to get even better still when substitute Rebecca Foster whipped a delightful in swinging ball into the box from the right and Ball timed her run perfectly before steering her diving header into the net giving her a fourth of the afternoon.

Another excellent spell saw the goals flowing and the points keep on coming as the U18 Academy earned back-to-back thumping home wins over Wigan Athletic and Fleetwood Town at Victory Park last week.

First up on Saturday 14th September a blistering performance from North End's U18's saw them cruise to a 5-3 win over Wigan Athletic.

Goals from Lyle Magolis, Brad Roscoe, Sean Holmes and Jack Ryan ensured a comfortable three points.

Preston controlled the game for the entire 90 minutes, but the Latics always looked dangerous on the counter attack and forward Sam Cosgrove nearly gave his side the lead against the run of play. Cosgrove ran clear of the Preston defenders, but shot stopper Ross Dalton did well to stand up and deflect the Wigan man's shot away from goal with his right boot.

Not long after, Preston were deservedly ahead, and with a bit of luck their play deserved. Skipper Josh Brownhill's corner was curled into a crowd of bodies and was inadvertently headed in by Wigan defender Sean Harrison, who was under immense pressure from Ryan and centre back Josh Sampson.

North End continued to surge forward and should have went into the break ahead by more than just the one goal with Anderton and Ryan both going close.

Soon after the interval, the young Lilywhites raced into an astonishing 4-0 lead with three goals in the space of eight minutes. Substitute Lyle Magolis, who had only been on the pitch a matter of minutes, scored his side's second to spark a flurry of goals.

Magolis, who replaced Tyler Forbes just moments before, collected Brownhill's pass on the edge of the area and nonchalantly struck the ball past a motionless Mulby into the bottom corner.

Centre back Bradley Roscoe was next on the score sheet. Another

Brownhill corner caused all sorts of problem for the Latics defenders and Roscoe duly tapped home for North End's third.

Clearly rustled by Preston's swift start to the second half, Wigan gifted the hosts their fourth. A loose ball was pounced on by Joe Whittington who couldn't quite squeeze the ball past Mulby, but the rebound fell kindly to the onrushing Sean Holmes to give North End an unbelievable start to the second half.

Wigan refused to lie down, however, and Cosgrove reduced the margin with a fine strike which gave Dalton

But Preston never looked troubled by Wigan's mini revival and continued to play superb flowing football. And 20 minutes from time they put the game beyond reasonable doubt.

Anderton, who was magnificent throughout, was the architect for his side's fifth. His low cross into the area was turned in by Ryan, wrong footing Mulby, to cap an impressive personal performance.

There was still time for one more goal in the game and it was Wigan who got it. Cosgrave sprung free from Josh Sampson and Roscoe and slotted the ball home for nothing more than a

The visitors started well and their first goal came in the 16th minute. It was a stunning strike by Kurt Willoughby - he shot from long distance, right into the top right hand corner.

Their second goal came shortly after, when a scramble in the area, and a defensive mix-up, saw the ball go in off Connor Smith to make it 2-0.

However, North End gave themselves hope at the end of the first half when lack Ryan, with some wonderful skill, swivelled past the Fleetwood defence and slotted the ball into the bottom corner of the net to make it 2-1.

The Lilywhites were well equipped to making a second half comeback and that proved the case, and early pressure paid off when, on 53 minutes, they levelled the match at 2-2.

The influential Joe Whittington was quick to react and got the last touch to put the ball in the back of the net, following a period of intense pressure from the Lilywhites.

Sam Livesey, who completed 90 minutes on his return from suspension. was threatening and he set up Lyle Magolis' goal to take the lead 3-2 on 77 minutes, with a well weighted ball.

And the Lilywhites completed their fantastic comeback late on when Whittington's superb shot from outside the area left the keeper no chance to make it 4-2.



Sixteen players have entered the doors of the County Ground over the summer with 15 saying their goodbyes to the Swindon faithful. Amongst those brought in Nile Ranger, as well as Dany N'Guessan from Millwall and ex-Manchester United and Bury striker Nicky Ajose.

But how will the Robins cope with the atmosphere of an excited Deepdale crowd? Can PNE extend their unbeaten run?

In what is sure to be a thrilling encounter goals look a distinct possibility in this clash with five of the last six PNE games ending with over 2.5 goals so that could be worth a punt.

Swindon's Ryan Mason has started the season in electric form already notching up four goals in the opening seven games, but he looks likely to miss out with injury, so look elsewhere for a good price.

North End have yet to lose in League One with their only defeat of the season coming at the hands of Burnley at Turf Moor in the Capital One Cup, You could do much worse than to back PNE or draw for the match result.

Both fixtures between the two sides last season produced exciting affairs and goals to match, with PNE winning 4-1 at home and sharing the points with a 1-1 draw at the County Ground.

Lilywhites fans will be hoping Kevin Davies or Iain Hume will be able to add enough firepower upfront to outscore the Robins whereas Mark Cooper will be hoping Nile Ranger and Alex Pritchard can pressurise the PNE back line.



In our last edition of The Last Word for September, we get the thoughts from the commentary box, as Jonathan Breeze swaps microphone for pen to write this week's column.

League One is proving to be the most competitive division in the country judging from the opening months of the season.

If Preston are to earn promotion this year it would be Simon Grayson's greatest achievement as manager to date - despite having already guided three other teams out of the division.

Simon Grayon's approach to management is a sound one. He's kept a consistent team selection, given all his players in the squad a chance and produced results.

An unbeaten start from the opening eight games is a good platform to build on and provides a great opportunity to launch a promotion push.

Getting the transfer business done early in the summer was a great boost. Recruiting the experience of Kevin Davies and Tom Clarke is paying dividends. Chris Humphrey is a livewire and a constant threat to the opposition. While Declan Rudd and lain Hume's return just adds to the strength and depth of talent available.

There have been some mixed performances and not everything has gone the Lilywhites' way. Claiming victory over Oldham despite one of the poorest displays of the season turned out to be a real confidence

Don Goodman was part of the Sky Sports commentary team that night and said after the game that it was a hard-earned three points that could be prove valuable at the end of the season. The performance could only get better and it did against Stevenage and was followed up with another excellent win at Sheffield United!

With all the positivity around the club at the moment the PNE Player commentary box has been a happy place to be. Preston legends Sean Gregan and Ion Macken have been impressed with the start to the season. One thing the pair have in common as well as being adored by North End fans - is selection of the man of the match award

Bailey Wright has claimed the honour in the last three matches earning high praise in the process. The young Aussie is a firm fixture in the North End side and has put in some fine performances of late. It cannot be long before the Australian national side comes knocking for his services, which will be fantastic recognition for his start to the

WWE Superstar Wade Barrett is another person who has popped into the commentary box this season and follows North End from afar. It was great to meet him at Walsall, but it was even better to hear him talk passionately about the Club and his support for the team. His genuine delight at being invited into the changing room before and after kick-off to meet the players will remain one of the stand out memories of the season.

League One is the most competitive it has been for many seasons and Preston are looking good to compete for honours. Still unbeaten and riding high in the division is an almost perfect start. Tough tests are still to come and there will be difficult challenges ahead. So many teams have realistic ambitions of promotion this year, which will probably mean the race goes down to the final day.
