



...enjoy Wednesday evening's Capital One Cup semi-final effort again with a picture special as more than 30,000 braved the conditions to see United worry Spurs



Reflecting on Wednesday evening, it is difficult to put your finger on the overriding emotion. Strangely, conflicting words such as disappointment, pain, pride and encouragement could all be used to describe another incredible evening at Bramall Lane.

The players and staff could not hide their disappointment at the final whistle because we pushed Tottenham so, so close. For about ten minutes we had them on the back foot, they were reeling and not only did it look like we were taking them to extra-time, we were pouring forward and Louis Reed had a great opportunity to test the goalkeeper. That's why it felt so painful, we came within inches. But we shouldn't look back at the game

negatively, there was plenty to proud of, plenty to be encouraged about as we plot more magical nights here — a full house is something to behold.

More than 30,000 supporters inside this special stadium is another reason to be proud. The crowd and players gave everything and we came within a whisker of causing a major upset. We told the players to walk out, hold their heads high and that they can all be immensely proud of themselves and what they have achieved in this cup run – hopefully, the fans feel the same way too.

We were patient, we had to be, and we recovered from conceding a special goal, which we couldn't do anything about. We stayed in the game, remained composed and said at half-time that one goal for us would change the whole game.

The substitutions we made in the second half were all positive, Michael Doyle had been booked and couldn't make a couple of challenges tracking back, whilst Michael Higdon and Che Adams gave Spurs a different set of problems to assess.

Of course, it was a great night personally for Che, what a story? From Ilkeston FC in the Northern Premier League to scoring two goals in the semi-finals of the League Cup in the space of three months!

We have said all along that Che could be

a real top quality player, he has bags of potential and just needs to learn the little things which will come with experience. We fought off a few other clubs for his signature and hopefully it will prove to be a shrewd bit of business.

Post-match, we congratulated Mauricio Pochettino and his staff and he reciprocated, he is obviously a very, very good manager, but also, as we have discovered over the two games, he is a very nice man too, and he has shown us a tremendous amount of respect after both games.

It is something of a consolation that if you do lose, you lose to someone as classy as Mauricio and when he came in to share a drink with us afterwards, we wished Tottenham all the best for the final.

When you lose a semi-final at the end of January it would be easy to think that's it, season over, but for us it is just starting. With new additions in this transfer window, the aim is to step up to the challenge of staying firmly in the promotion hunt starting today - and, it cannot be forgotten, we've also got a (and potentially more) mouthwatering tie in the FA Cup.

The attention now, though, is a very tough league fixture against Swindon Town, who also have promotion aspirations, and we hope loyal Unitedites will get behind us, like in midweek, to make this a forceful place yet again.

We offer a warm welcome to Mark Cooper and the Swindon contingent, and wish them a safe trip back to Wiltshire this evening.

On Wednesday evening, Nigel Clough's side put the frighteners on Premiership Tottenham Hotspur with a late revival.





folklore and fables SEASON IV

Blades Historian **John Garrett's** inimitable account of following the Blades and retelling stories of yesteryear certainly gets fans talking. Where will his mind take us this week...



The long and snowy road

Ever dreamed of a white Christmas? No, me neither. Hate the stuff to be honest. Any snow that landed on the estate that I grew up on got bagged and sold to Eskimos.

It's OK when you are a kid, I mean what could be better? The minute a flake falls in Sheffield every school is immediately shut, the roads grind to a halt and the scene resembles Siberia. There are plenty of games to play to pass the time on – spot the gritter is a popular one at the moment. We used to have a competition

to draw what we thought a snow plough looked like as well. 46 years and I still don't know if I have it right yet!

I had and still have the oldest sledge going. Made by my dad for my brother back in the 1950s, like my brother it looks its age, but when I was a kid it could fly down Bishop's Park. There would always be some smart alec who would leave you for dead on some plastic fantastic, I remember one laughing at me as he slipped past at an alarming rate on his Ferrari red creation. He

wasn't laughing at the bottom when he missed the compact ice bend and slammed into the wall at the bottom. He still wasn't laughing when the ambulance arrived!

I also hate snow because of the issues it causes with footy. Times have changed so much, you see film and pictures from years ago when straw was laid, braziers lit at the side of the pitch to thaw the frozen surfaces out and snow piled high all around the inside of the ground. They were hardy souls both on and off the pitch back

in those days, don't forget that league fixtures took place on Christmas day until 1958.

It doesn't seem that long ago that, if the white stuff fell, you could simply put an appeal out to anyone who wanted to help for a free ticket to get a game on to turn up with a shovel and wellies and dig away. These days there is so much red tape, health and safety will always rule, as will liability insurance.

The last time I can recall us having a mass dig out where all mucked in and helped was when we had Villa in an FA Cup game - 28th January 1996 to be accurate and we needed the TV money and the game on, all rallied round and we lost to a goal from Dwight Yorke, who then got pelted with snowballs from the Kop at every available opportunity. These days it can be the roads and pavements around the ground that get the game called, nothing to do with the Club concerned, more the local authority. Our undersoil will always do its job.

Port Vale, though, will live long in the minds of those who attended on Boxing Day 2014.

A bit damp in the morning and more than a bit rainy in Burslem. On the pitch is was one of those days, managed by a former Blade and with another hero starting against us in the middle of the park, the Valiants didn't need any extra motivation.

As the second half progressed it was clear that the rain had now turned to snow, but there was no chance of it sticking, I mean, it had been raining and the ground was wet!

Even if it did, the weather had been forecast and therefore the services would be well prepared for anything that would come, wouldn't they?

The coaches were outside the away turnstiles so we were out and on. Outside, it became very obvious that the snow was covering and fast, still, Stoke to Sheffield isn't that far as the crow flies is it?

The way we were directed saw all the Blades traffic crawl uphill,

by the time we got to the top traffic was really struggling, over an hour had passed but most were in sight of the floodlights at Vale Park and heaters were in overdrive on our coach!

I have to hand it to the driver that we had, I wouldn't have fancied ferrying 50 people down the A50 and A38 in that weather. Two lanes were down to one and that was straight down the middle and covering fast, I swear someone told me they had seen a plough! If it was then it must have been pulled by horse because it wasn't making a great deal of difference to the road, I realised that the 10th time that we swerved towards the central reservation with the passengers screaming.

Mobile phone means that you can keep in touch with friends and colleagues even in the frozen wastelands of Staffordshire and it was very clear that all were having a Christmas nightmare. We had, for some reason, set off up the M6 before it was pointed out that we were now heading for Penrith and Sheffield wasn't near there, as it turned out we probably should have let him get on with it and cut across Manchester, but that is a different story. The team coach was struggling at some point near Junction 29 of M1 and life was no better if you were lucky enough to be in the vicinity of the motorway - the main arterial route of the country was also apparently impassable.

By the time that our coach got as far as the Parkway we had been on the move (and I use that term loosely) for five-and-a-half-hours. I'd personally more than had enough of being sat, I decided, along with my youngest, that we would do the remainder on foot, so off we set up the rood itself. Loads more stir-crazy Blades were also making a break for it as the

traffic was at a standstill. It was a real blizzard by now and my choice of some flat soled desert boots as match apparel proved disastrous, if it was four miles I walked eight as I did my best Michael Jackson impression between abandoned cars and vans.

It took two hours, probably a bit more, until we got outside the front door at Handsworth, when I rang the coach to see if they were OK they hadn't moved an inch and were still the other side of Catcliffe. I had phoned the Copthorne to organise some hotel rooms for those with cars that were stuck at the Lane and they finally checked in at 2.45am, just short of an eye watering 10 hours — you could fly to New York in less!

I don't think any of us have ever had a journey like it before, all I know is that I certainly don't ever want one again.

PERSONAL MEMORIES

Tony Moore... picked up from Burton Albion

NON-LEAGUE STARS

In the ongoing search for new talent the Blades have scoured many different markets both nationally and internationally.

Inspired by the recent debuts for Che Adams and Kieran Wallace, who were signed from Ilkeston FC this article focuses on United's signing of players from British nonleague clubs.

The first United squad I recall included long serving club legends Joe Shaw, Cec Coldwell and Alan Hodgkinson, who had played for Upton Colliery, Norton Woodseats and Worksop Town respectively before signing for the Blades.

The 1960s also saw the Blades sign a number of promising young players from non-league clubs to be developed further through the junior and reserve teams. The most notable of these were forwards Mick Jones from Dinnington Miners Welfare, Alan Birchenall from Thorneywood Athletic, Mick Hill from Bethesda Athletic and Willie Smith from Cumnock Juniors. Jones and Birchenall were both later sold by United for fees of £100,000, whilst Jones and Hill won full international caps for England and Wales respectively.

Moving into the 1970s and United had less success in the non-league market although teenage midfielder Gary Hamson, who made his debut at Cardiff in October 1976, had played for Ilkeston Town previously. He was sold to Leeds United for £140,000 in July 1979. In the latter stages of the decade manager Harry Haslam did try to unearth another gem from non-league circles. His most notable signing was forward Imre Varadi from Letchworth. He also signed full-back Tony Moore from Burton Albion and forward Tommy Smith from Bromsgrove Rovers, who made first team appearances.

Ian Porterfield, who was appointed United's manager in the close season 1981, tended to sign more experienced players. However, he did introduce utility player Bob Atkins, signed from Enderby Town, to the first team in 1982.

Porterfield also used the Scottish nonleague for potential first team players, giving first team debuts to forwards Russell Black and Don Peattie, who had been signed from Gretna but neither had a significant impact. Also signed whilst Porterfield was boss was midfielder David Frain from Dronfield United, who made his first team debut in March 1986 shortly after Porterfield had been dismissed.

When the Blades appointed Dave Bassett as manager in January 1988 he transformed the Blades playing squad, seeking to play a more direct style of football. He actively sought out talent from the non-league and introduced a number of such players




to the first team with varying degrees of success. Arguably his most successful of such signings were midfielder Paul Rogers and striker Andy Scott, both from Sutton United, and forward John Francis, from Emley.

Rogers and Scott were both signed when the Blades were in the top flight and Rogers in particular seemed very comfortable playing at that level.


Other Bassett non-league signings to sample first team football with less success were utility player Rob Scott, defender Mark Blount and full-back Ross Davidson, who had been signed from Sutton United, Gresley Rovers and Walton and Hersham respectively.

Since the advent of the twenty-first century the number of players signed by the Club from non-league to make an impact with the first team has declined. Under Neil Warnock's management, forward Andy Smith, from Ballyclare Comrades, made his first team bow in 2000 and in April 2004 midfielder Ashley Sestanovich, from Hampton and Richmond Borough, made his debut as a substitute against Nottingham Forest.

It will be interesting to watch the development of Adams and Wallace to see if their signings will herald another era of successful Blades' transfer activity in the non-league market.

If last season was about building a platform for Swindon to push for a place in the Championship, this campaign is all about driving on to achieve that ambition.

Mark Cooper and his players have done the first part of the job after establishing themselves as one of the prime contenders for promotion from League One and now the task is attempting to make the most of the opportunity they have created for themselves.



Two to Watch michael smith + andy williams



Every side with promotion ambitions needs a constant source of goals from a couple of reliable strikers and Swindon have a potent duo leading their line in Andy Williams, pictured, and Michael Smith.

The strike pair have contributed 28 goals to the Swindon cause so far, with manager Mark Cooper happy to alternate between an array of forwards that also includes the dangerous Jonathan Obika and the recently signed Jermaine Hylton.

"All the strikers have been good and it's important we keep them all motivated and ready," says Cooper. "We have three or four good strikers at the club, and I don't like to use the word rotate, it's important we try to freshen things up. There are lots of matches to play and they can all contribute."

Williams is clearly revelling in his role leading the scoring charts for Swindon, as he spoke about the great bond that has developed between this Robins squad over the last 18 months.

"We're just a group of friends which is the best part about it," stated Williams in a BBC interview. "It's a great feeling at the moment. It's one of the best teams I've ever played in. "We all get on so well and I hope that drives us forward in the coming months."

Williams believes he is starting to hit his peak at the age of 28, as he says he has learned to hone aspects of his game from working with ex-Swindon boss Paulo Di Canio and the current Swindon coaching staff.

"I'm definitely more mature, I've put in more work, and it's down to some of the coaching I've had as well," said the former Bristol Rovers. Hereford and Yeovil forward.

"I learnt a lot under Mr Di Canio before he left and I'm starting to show some of that now. I've also done a lot under (coach) Luke Williams, which is starting to pay off."

The Robins' other primary goal getter, Smith, took his League One goal tally into double figures for this season on Boxing Day, yet he has only scored twice in his last 13 appearances and will be keen to get his scoring form back on track in this game.

"I did not want the two week break we have just had because I like to play games and I need to start scoring again," says Smith. "The boys just want to play football and get as many points as quickly as we can.

"I'm chuffed to bits that we are winning but I have gone four games without a goal now, it does start eating away at you. Of course there is pressure to score goals. I'm a striker and that's my job, so hopefully I can start scoring again soon."

The arrival of Hylton earlier this month confirmed that Swindon boss Cooper is keen to keep his forward players on their toes from this point forward and if it is to be Williams and Smith up front against the Blades today, they will know there is a couple of fine marksmen on the bench waiting to take their place if they let their standards drop.

A two-week break in the middle of a frantic League One season is a rarity and Swindon chief Mark Cooper hopes his side's fortnight of inactivity will have refreshed his troops ahead of this trip to Bramall Lane.

Swindon's most recent victory against Chesterfield must feel like a distant memory for Cooper and his troops, but he has looked to use the last 14 days wisely in the build-up to a push for a top two finish in the final third of this League One season.

"It has been good to have a free week without matches and it has given us a chance to do some things on the training ground and put in a few new ideas," says Cooper.

"We have had an opportunity to refocus, get some freshness

back into the group and get ourselves ready for what will be a busy run of games from this point forward. There are a lot of games in League One and you have to make the most of the days off you have to work with the players and make sure they are ready for the next challenge."

At the age of 46, Cooper is emerging as one of the rising stars among a healthy crop of youthful English managers working in League One and the Championship, with this former midfielder, who played over 450 league games for a host of clubs, impressing all with his confidence both on the touchline and in his dealings with the media.

Cooper believes his team has taken huge strides forward since their eighth place finish last season, but he is keen for them to push on from here and strive to secure the promotion he craves.

"We had a 20 minute spell in our last match when we conceded too much possession and a year ago we may have conceded a goal during that period," he continues. "That didn't happen this time, we were solid defensively and that is a sign of the progress we have made.

"Of course, we are desperate to play like we have done in patches this season all the time, but we accept that is not possible and it is all about carrying on working."

Cooper has urged his players to embrace the challenge of being League One leaders, as he looks forward to another test of his side's promotion credentials against the Blades.

"It's better to be top of the

league than at the bottom and while there is a pressure that goes with it, I'm sure they can handle it," he adds. "When you are at the top of the league, you are there to be shot at, but we have to try and embrace that. The players are enjoying themselves at the moment and rightly so. If you can't enjoy it now, you never will."

"We're not looking at anything other than the next game, as boring as it sounds. No-one really thought we'd be where we are in the league at this stage, but we are really enjoying the ride. We just try to focus on what we do. We just keep working really hard. They are a really good group of players at this club, level headed, desperate to work hard and learn more. Hopefully that attitude will take them a long way."

MIKE SUMMERBEE

Brilliant winger Mike Summerbee was capped eight times by England after leaving Swindon

Initially with Cheltenham Town, he moved to the County Ground in March 1960 and was an important figure in Swindon's 1962-63 promotion success. He netted 39 goals in 218 League games prior to joining Manchester City for £35,000 in August 1965, amassing a vast collection of honours under the Joe Mercer and Malcolm Allison partnership at Maine Road.

Later playing for Burnley, Blackpool and Stockport County, where he was player-manager, he has since been a successful businessman and his son Nicky also starred for Swindon Town.

DON ROGERS

England LI23s winger Don Rogers scored twice in Swindon Town's 1969 League Cup final success.

Signing professional at the County Ground in October 1962, he featured in Swindon's 1962-63 promotion campaign and was ever-present in four successive seasons. He starred as the Robins won promotion again in 1968-69 and the Anglo-Italian Cup in 1970, reuniting with Bert Head at

Crystal Palace in November 1972.

Moving to OPR in September 1974, he rejoined Swindon in March 1976 and netted 148 goals in 412 League games overall before reuniting with Stan Harland at Yeovil Town in March 1977.

PETER DOWNSBOROUGH

Goalkeeper Peter Downsborough was ever-present 'Player of the Year' in Swindon Town's 1968-69 promotion and League Cup 'double' success.

Signing professional for hometown Halifax in September 1960, he moved to the County Ground in exchange for Bill Atkins in August 1965. He was ever-present as Swindon reached the FA Cup sixth round in 1969-70 and made 274 League appearances prior to joining Bradford City in November 1973.

Twice ever-present, he starred as they reached the FA Cup sixth round in 1975-76 and won promotion in 1976-77. He had a testimonial match in May 1980.


JOE BUTLER

Versatile midfielder Joe Butler was Swindon Town's 'Player of the Year' in 1969-70 and 1972-73.

He turned professional with hometown Newcastle United in September 1960, given his League debut against

> 1964, but failed to secure a regular first-team slot and joined Swindon in August 1965.

Starring in their 1968-69 promotion and League Cup 'double' success, he was ever-present in two consecutive seasons and helped the Robins to win the Anglo-Italian


FRASER DIGBY

Initially with Manchester United, he reunited with Lou Macari at Swindon in September 1986, appearing in their 1986-87 promotion campaign. He was ever-present in 1988-89, starring as the Robins qualified for the play-offs in consecutive seasons, including their 1993 Wembley triumph and were

Also featuring in the 1995-96 Second Division title success, he had a testimonial match in July 1997 and played 417 League games, joining Crystal Palace in August 1998, then Barry Town, QPR and Kidderminster Harriers.

ALAN McLOUGHLIN

Republic of Ireland international midfielder Alan McLoughlin was 'Player of the Year' when Swindon Town reached the Second Division play-off final in 1989-90.

Starting with Manchester United, he reunited with Lou Macari at Swindon in August 1986 and helped qualify for the play-offs in successive years. He scored 19 times in 106 League games before sold to Southampton for £1,000,000 in December 1990.

Moving to Portsmouth in February 1992, he was everpresent as they reached the First Division play-offs in 199293. He joined Wigan Athletic in November 1999, then played for Rochdale and Forest Green Rovers, since holding coaching posts.

LEE PEACOCK

Former Scotland U21s striker Lee Peacock was 'Player of the Year' when Swindon won promotion in 2006-07.

Initially with Carlisle United, he helped them to win the Auto Windscreens Shield and promotion in 1996-97. He joined Mansfield Town in October 1997 and moved via Manchester City to Bristol City in August 2000. Starring as they won the LDV Vans Trophy and reached the Second Division play-offs in 2002-03, he joined Sheffield Wednesday in July 2004.

He moved to Swindon in January 2006 and netted 20 goals in 125 League games before joining Grimsby Town in January 2010, then Havant & Waterlooville and Eastleigh.



Along with Danny Wilson, the other United manager with Swindon connections is John Harris who began his career there but made no league appearances before moving to Swansea Town.

* Today sees the 30th league meeting between the clubs and there have been just three victories on the opponent's grounds. United won 2-0 at Swindon in December 1989 (Peter Duffield broke his leg as the first goal was scored) and 3-1 in December1994. Swindon have won just once at the Lane, winning 2-1 on 9 February 1970, their first league visit here. Len Badger scored one of his seven

league goals in that game. There have been two 0-0 draws in the previous 29 games, both at the County Ground.

- * Three Swindon Town 'Players of the Year' have been Blades at some time namely: Chris Kamara (1980), Frank Talia (2000) and Tommy Mooney (2004) just one United 'Players of the Year' has played for Swindon, namely Glenn Cockerill (1985).
- * The Blades and the Robins are among the 15 of the present 92 Football/Premier League to have had at least one player who made 600 or more league appearances for them. United's top appearance maker is Joe Shaw with 632, none as a sub. Swindon's record holder, John Trollope, is also the record holder for any club. Between 1960 and 1980 he made 770 league appearances - although his total did include three as a substitute!

In safe hands Meet United's medical team

As part of any successful management team comes a hardworking and dedicated medical team who aim to provide the best possible care for the players.

That is no different here at United and although it is a relatively new department, that is led by Head of Medical, Matt Brown, the team which includes Ed Owen (Physiotherapist), Lee McMahon (Strengthen and Conditioning Coach) and Luke Smith (Masseur) have been in place throughout this season and the quartet are very much a vital part of Nigel Clough's backroom staff.

In this exclusive interview with UTB, Matt says he wanted to give the fans a taste of the work that goes on behind the scenes to ensure the players are in the best possible condition to perform to their maximum come matchday.

Matt takes up the story: "We just wanted to give an insight into what happens in and around the treatment room.

"It is a structured day for the injured players, they have to report for 9am and don't leave before 3pm in the afternoon.

"We were lucky in the early part of the season that we had the chance to take Terry Kennedy under our remit and the same with Flo Cuvelier, who we took at nine months post operation from the Academy's medical staff and our job was to reintroduce them into the firstteam squad.

"James Wallace has been a work in progress all season, but we knew that would be the case when we signed him, hopefully we can get to the bottom of his problems and he will be physically stronger moving forward.

"Ben Davies suffered quite a serious foot injury in October and again we knew it would take an awful lot of hard work to get him on the road to recovery, thankfully he is getting there with each passing day.

"Between the four of us, we all work together to give the players the best possible care as medical staff. All of our paths cross, Luke Smith is our masseur, but he can still do strappings and apply tapes and plasters etc. Macca (Lee McMahon) has previously never had this rehabilitation environment and structure that we have now to work within, basically in the past he got the players fit and kept them fit by warming them up properly.



"He now has a rehab remit which helps us. Firstly it takes bodies out of the treatment room and secondly it offers the lads a chance to be reintroduced into the footballing environment.

"It is fantastic for us because we know Lee has a real pride in his work and now he is part of a team within a team and he contributes heavily to successfully getting players back available to the manager as soon as possible."

It isn't just Matt, Ed, Lee and Luke that are instrumental to the mechanics of United's off field care for the players, there are many individuals that also play a part at different junctures, Matt continues to explain:

"Our medical team has contact and working relationships with well respected practitioners within our sector across the region.

"It isn't just us that you see on the pitch working with the players or even the ones out on the training ground, I have personally worked with our Chiropractor for 13 or 14 years.

"Our dentist is a fan of the Club and he is at every game, he is a visible presence and we know he will be there if we need him. If we are away at Colchester on a Tuesday night we know he will be with us. Russ (Taylor) also helps massively with when we sign new players and they need to register with a dentist in the local area when they first arrive.

"The Doctor, Jim Moxon, is also a crucial member of our extended team too and very good at his job, as you would expect. Again he is at matches both home and away and that allows each one of us to concentrate on our own roles.

"Having worked and been based in the East Midlands for the last 20 years or so I got to know all the relevant people I would need to call upon in that area, we now have that in place here too.


"A normal day on a normal week without a midweek game is roughly a 9-5 day. Myself, Ed, Luke and Macca, along with Lee Rickards (who works alongside Lee) have a meeting at 8.30am when we report to the training ground to plan the day.

"We know who is coming in and who is doing what. The injured lads report at 9am and everyone knows who they are working with when and what they are doing at specific times.

"We all report back to each

other on the previous day's events, it is an open and frank discussion and believe it not it can get heated at times. We are honest and open, it is football and we need to be to make sure we get better each day, it is then my job to report to the Gaffer.

"When I talk to Nigel I know who is training, who isn't, who needs to see the Doc and anybody who is off sick. The whole day is planned before 9.30am.

The lads that are scheduled to train or have played in the previous game arrive at around 9.30am and we just reassess them before training starts at 10.30am.

"Once it is just us and the injured players we get to work, they have a weight session daily, either upper or lower body depending on the individual and their injury.

"We are very practical and hands on, they also have a cardio session, if they can walk

they walk, if they are able to jog then we let them jog and if they are able to run then we push them as much as we can.

"It is important to get the lads around the main group rather than making them feel withdrawn from the first-team, which injuries do. The Gaffer is very big on keeping everyone together and involved and the players respond positively to that approach."

Weekends are a busy, but often rewarding part of the week for Matt and his staff, he adds: "Ed and Luke usually have the injured lads on a Saturday morning if we are at home, logistically it works out better for everyone and then I cover the Sundays.

"Normally the lads are in for treatment between 9-12 and then we are report to Bramall Lane for 12.30pm. We then have 30 minutes or so working together to get ready for the players who are involved to arrive from 1pm. "We have a lot to prepare, from strappings, to rubs, to deep heat treatment and tablets. Each player has his own preferences in terms of preparation and in the hour before the teams are announced it is just about getting everyone right."

Matt concludes by thanking his team for their unquestionable commitment and backing, saying:

"Since I started at United, officially in July, all the medical staff have been fantastic, not one has ever moaned or dragged their feet.

"They have been open and made the job a lot easier with the constant information they feed me, they work hard every day they are in and we just pull together as a team to do the best job for the Club.

"I can't praise them highly enough for how they have supported me and the management team since we all arrived."







Plenty of reasons to be optimistic, says Jamie

amie Murphy is hoping the I majority of the 25,000 plus Blades fans that were inside Bramall Lane for Wednesday's Capital One Cup semi-final second leg with Tottenham Hotspur will be here today to give the players their full backing again.

Despite the midweek aggregate defeat at the hands of Mauricio Pochettino's Spurs, Jamie insists the Blades must bounce straight back from that disappointment, starting this afternoon against Mark Cooper's high-flying Swindon Town.

On the clash against the Robins, who start the day as Sky Bet League One leaders, the Scottish winger, who was keen to congratulate Che Adams on his first professional goals, remarked:

"We have to lift ourselves for Swindon, it is good that we are playing at Bramall Lane and hopefully a lot of the crowd from midweek will stick with us.

"They were tremendous against Spurs and we need more of the

same, because Swindon are flying at the moment and it will be a really tough game, but one we will be going all out to win.

"Che (Adams) did really well and deserved his goals. He has integrated well, he is constantly learning and he is learning off the best in the Gaffer.

"He keeps coming off the bench and showing his potential so I am sure he has a very bright future ahead of him."

Looking back on Wednesday's agonising aggregate loss, despite a spirited second-half fightback that appeared to be taking the last four clash into

extra-time, Jamie said that on reflection there is still plenty to be optimistic about.

In the end Danish international Christian Eriksen's quality ultimately proved to be the difference between the Premiership high-flyers and the Blades and with that in mind, the Scotsman believes it puts United's cup exploits for a second consecutive season into some kind of perspective.

Jamie concluded: "We showed tremendous character in the second-half having fallen behind to a terrific free-kick from Eriksen but in the end we

were disappointed not to at least force extra-time.

"But we can take an enormous amount of pride from what we have achieved over these two games and hopefully we can take the momentum into our forthcoming league fixtures.

"When Che (Adams) got his second, there was no doubt in my mind that we would go on and win the tie, Spurs were rocking and we fancied nicking it in normal time.

"But Spurs showed that bit of quality on the counter attack to nick a goal which ultimately proved to be decisive. That said, we have to take the positives from the tie - we have pushed a top Premiership team all the way over two-legs.

"The disappointment was hard to take, we wanted to get to the final and we felt we arguably deserved a place in the final, but we can exit the competition with our heads held high, we have done ourselves and the Club proud."







Night to remember for teenager Che

Che Adams announced himself on the big stage on Wednesday night with a brace against Tottenham Hotspur in the Capital One Cup semi-final and despite the agonising 3-2 aggregate defeat, it is a night the teenager will never forget.

The 18-year-old, who confessed post-match that he is an Arsenal supporter, says scoring twice in such a big game, goals that threatened to turn the tie on its head, before Christian Eriksen's decisive second with two minutes remaining, are the moments he has dreamed of since turning professional.

Prior to his move to Bramall Lane in November, Che was playing in the Northern Premier League for Ilkeston FC and admits his progress, which has seen him feature for United against both Southampton and Tottenham in the League Cup, still doesn't seem real at times.

Looking back on Wednesday events that saw him enter the field on 73.35 replacing Jamal Campbell-Ryce, score his first goal on 76.28 and net the second in front of the kop on 78.48, Che conceded it still hadn't sunk in properly. "I am still lost for words really, to play against Tottenham and come up against all those internationals is absolutely crazy for me personally, considering I was in non-league just a few months ago.

"As you could see from the celebrations when I did score I had no idea what was going on, my mind was a blank, I was in complete shock. On reflection I was just delighted to have come on and got us back in the tie.

"I bet the Tottenham fans had never heard of me, but I am sure they will know who I am now because those goals gave them a massive scare and if Louis Reed's shot had gone in then who knows what might have happened.

"At 2-1 we had all the momentum and I honestly believe if we hadn't had conceded when we did we would have either nicked it in normal time or won in it extratime, Spurs were rocking."

Che whose goals in midweek brought a tear to his Mum's eyes in the Lane crowd, now hopes to establish himself as a more regular starter in Nigel Clough's team, but acknowledges he still has plenty to learn and feels he is in the best place to do so.

The forward added: "I am here to play games and thankfully the Gaffer gave me a chance against Spurs, let's just hope that was the start of things to come. I am just desperate to play football and do well for the Club.

"I am happy with my progress, but there is still much more to come. I am getting used to things with each day that goes by, but it still takes time to sink in on occasions like Wednesday night.

"My next objective is to become a more regular starter, I started against Walsall, but I am eager for more minutes and I am happy to play wherever the Gaffer wants me to."



Stats all Folks!

Blades Statistician **Andrew Kirkham** delves into the archives to enlighten Unitedites with topical figures...

THE NAME'S THE SAME

In our last home league game, two of our three used subs were Kieran and James Wallace.

The United web site made it clear, of course, which Wallace came on as the first sub of the two but another well-known site did not

Having two players with the same surname can cause confusion for those of us who like to keep accurate records. Perhaps the most notable confusion as far as United players are concerned involved Graham and Joe Shaw. For many years several record books listed our record appearance maker Joe as having made 629 league appearances, not the correct total of 632 (at least one current long-running record book still has it wrong) and the fault was with the Football League. From 1888-89, the League's first season, until fairly recent times the League kept a record of players' appearances in wonderful leather bound ledgers.

Each club was allotted four pages and on two of these was a grid with a list of players down the side and a list of games along the top and, after every game, each club informed the league who had played. A clerk then put 11 ticks in that game's column against the relevant players. Sometimes there were errors.

For the occasional United game there were only 10 ticks, sometimes 12 and sometimes no goalkeeper. For one season, in the early 1950s, three of Joe Shaw's ticks were 'given' to Graham – hence the mistake in the record books. The only way to sort out these errors 40 or more years later is to carefully read the press reports – and there is no doubt that Joe played in those three games.

BROTHERS TOGETHER

A previous season's programme has mentioned brothers who have played together for United and they obviously had the same name. They were...

Alan and Stephen Quinn (2000s)
Andy and Rob Scott (1990s)
Paul and Brian Smith (1980s)
Tony and Barry Wagstaff (1960s)
Bernard and Graham Shaw (1960s)

Arthur and David Mercer (1920s)
Tommy and Bill Sampy (1920s)
Bernard and Billy Wilkinson (1900s)
Harry and Will Lilley (1890s)

NO RELATION

There are 14 examples of non-related players with the same surname playing together for United. The last time (before the Wallaces) was in October/November 1998 when Des and Ian Hamilton started four games and finished two of them together. Before that we have to go the early 1960s when Bernard and Joe Shaw played together but earlier Joe had played many games with Graham, Bernard's brother.

For the record other pairs of players in this category are...

Jack and Fred E Smith (1940s)

Charlie and Dennis Thompson (1940s)

Sydney and John Gibson (1930s)

Harry (snr) and Edward Johnson (1890s)

Harry (jnr) and Martin Johnson (1920s)

Bob and Walter Hill (1890s)

Two other players, likely to cause even more confusion for the statistician, were Fred A Smith and Fred E Smith who played together in the early 1950s. Because of their difference in height Fred A was known as 'Little Fred' and Fred E as 'Big Fred'.

THREE OF A KIND

For two games in March 1964 and two more in March 1965 Bernard, Graham and Joe Shaw all played together. One unusual feature of the 1964 games was left back Graham Shaw playing at centre forward. He didn't score.

TWO PAIRS

For one game in 1907-08 (a 0-0 draw at Birmingham) the Wilkinson brothers both played as did the two Johnsons, Harry and Charlie.

A double pairing also occurred for two games in 1965 – on 27th and 28th December. Both games were against Spurs and both were lost despite the help of Joe and Graham Shaw and the Wagstaff brothers.

ONE PAIR

Of all the players with the same surname, related or not, Joe and Graham Shaw have played together most times. Between 1951-52 and 1965-66 they started 389 league games together and, other than injuries, they finished them together, (they played before substitutes were allowed).

Putting their total of appearances alongside each other into perspective, only eight other players of the 1,000+ who have played league games for the Blades have made more than 389 appearances for the club. Whether any other pair, whatever their surnames, made more appearances together than Joe and Graham may be mentioned in a later programme!
