





Welcome back for this evening's match, as we go into our penultimate game of the season here at the Weston Homes Community Stadium.


It is going to be a tough match against a strong Swindon Town side but we are all determined to finish the season with two wins as we did last year.

A point wasn't what we wanted or needed and the lads were all devastated after the game.



Colchester United's hopes of escaping the bottom four were dealt another cruel blow, as Scunthorpe grabbed a late, late equaliser.

The Iron's second goal was a deflected effort. and summed up the U's fortunes at times this season as, after having fought back from one down to lead with two quickfire goals, the three points were ripped out of their hands late on

They remain in the bottom four with three games to go and know that three points at Fleetwood is a must to keep their hopes alive.

Theo Robinson kicked the day's attacking play off when he got in behind the Us defence and put the ball in the danger area, but as Bongani Khumalo scuffed his clearance Neal Bishop could only clip his shot straight at Walker.

The game had to wait some time before another chance to appear but when one finally did, Brindley had keeper Luke Daniels diving low at his near post to keep out a fierce low shot

Minutes later Murphy and Massey looked to be picking up where they left off from the last home game as the former swung in a cross for the latter, the header beat the on-rushing keeper but drifted wide.


Chances were flowing now and it was Scunthorpe who spurned a golden one, top scorer Paddy Madden broke down the right with Gary McSheffrey free for the square ball and over-hit his pass.

Thankfully for the Iron, Robinson was able to put them ahead just moments later, Daniels hit a long ball that found its way to the striker who curled an effort past Walker on the half

bouncing off of the crossbar before George Moncur blasted a shot well over Daniel's goal.



#### IN THE GOALS





Whilst tonight's match holds major significance for Colchester United and their quest for survival, tonight's visitors already know that their season will go beyond this weekend's final fixture.

Swindon Town have long been ensconced in the top six of the League One table, having been among the promotion front runners for much of the campaign.

The dreams of automatic promotion may be over, with the U's weekend visitors Preston North End and MK Dons battling to get that much coveted second spot, but Swindon have the cherry of the play-offs to look forward to in May.

The Robins knew going into last weekend's fixture against North End that they were guaranteed a fourth place spot and, as such, boss Mark Cooper has made plans to ensure that his key players are available for the two – and possibly three – additional games that the play-offs will entail.

He rested a number of players in the weekend loss to Preston and said after the game: "Today was entirely about us and how we wanted to prepare - it was entirely about our preparations for the play-offs and making sure that the team that plays in the first play-off leg is ready, free of injury and fresh mentally and physically.

"It might not work but we've put a plan in place that we think gives us a realistic possibility of doing well in the play-offs."

The U's Academy products have played over 100 first team games this season

and, with the future in mind, Cooper was delighted to blood his own stars of the future.

Speaking to Flicwiltshire.com, he added: "They are young boys that have come through our system and we think a lot of them - we are going to be using these boys in and around the first-team and that's the way it is.

"I thought they did really well.

"Of course you don't want that (a drubbing) to happen and destroy their confidence - we conceded an early goal - but after that I thought we played really well in the first-half - we dominated possession.

"But you look at their strike-force of (Joe) Garner, (Jermaine) Beckford, they bring on Kevin Davies - you know they are going to cause you problems but I thought the young boys equipped themselves really well today."

Following tonight's game, which could be a crucial one when it comes to the U's intentions of staying in the division, the Robins host Leyton Orient at home at the weekend and thus will have a big say in the next five days as to who retains their League One status.

The U's have picked up fourteen points in their last eight matches and will be hoping that they can extend that run this evening against the Robins.

#### WES FODERINGHAM

Position: Goalkeeper Signed From: Crystal Palace

The shot-stopper came through the ranks with Fulham's Academy before moving to Crystal Palace, Initially joined Swindon on loan in 2012 and enjoyed a prolific start to his Town career where he didn't concede a goal in his first five games.

A string of fine performances saw him earn a permanent contract in January 2012 and went on to help Town claim the League Two championship at the end of the season in addition to making an appearance at Wembley in the Johnstone's Paint Trophy final. He was virtually ever-present as Swindon made the League One play-offs in 2013. Penned a new contract that summer.



#### NATHAN THOMPSON

Position: Defender Signed From: Apprentice



The tough-tackling defender was a regular as Swindon made the League One Play-Offs.

A regular fixture in the starting XI and a firm fans' favourite ever since, the two-time Player of the Year winner ended last term with the captain's armband and has skippered Town this season.





KEVIN WATSON'S SCOUT REPORT

#### Two games to go for the U's - and two very tough fixtures to end the season with.

Swindon are chasing promotion and will want to finish their league campaign on a high.

Their club ethos is to play football from the back and that has remained true for as long as I can remember.

If you are going to play that way, even the goalkeeper has to be comfortable with the ball at his feet and Wes Foderingham certainly has that attribute.

He can clip the ball out to either full back and can get the ball moving from the back just as well as



#### MASSIMO LUONGO

Position: Midfielder Signed From: Tottenham Hotspur



Luongo joined Swindon from Tottenham on a season-long loan last summer before completing a permanent move just before transfer deadline day. The midfielder spent time on loan at the club at the end of the 2012/13 season.

The stylish midfielder has won many fans during his time in Wiltshire so far, including Australian national team coach, Ange Postecoglou.

Luongo was part of the Socceroos squad at the 2014 World Cup in Brazil, the third player in Swindon history to represent his country on the biggest stage.



#### BEN GLADWIN

Position: Midfielder Signed From: Marlow



Formerly with the Academy at Reading, Gladwin penned a professional contract with Swindon at the end of November.

Signed from Marlow FC, the central midfielder had plied his trade in the non-leagues before moving to Wiltshire after impressing on trial.

He made his Town bow in the JPT win over Stevenage at The County Ground and earned his first league appearance when he stepped off the bench in the Boxing Day defeat at Brentford.



#### ANDY WILLIAMS

Position: Forward Signed From: Yeovil Town



Formerly with Bristol Rovers and Hereford United, Williams joined Town on a twoyear deal in the summer of 2012 after an impressive campaign in front of goal with Yeovil Town in 2011/12.

In his first season in red, Williams notched 11 league goals. Last term, he spent time on loan at Yeovil before an injury cut his season short.

Has had an impressive season this time around and has been a key part of Town's success in 2014/15.

any of the defenders.

Michael Smith has been a real goal threat for Swindon this year and is scoring at a one in two ratio, the sign of a decent striker.

He did have a spell on loan at Colchester United but I'm sure we didn't see that kind of return from him. I'm not sure he will feel he has anything to prove here but players do always want to do well against clubs they have played for in the past.

Whilst Michael scores the goals for them, the supply line is dependent on Massimo Luongo in the centre of their midfield. They spent a lot of money getting him in a couple of years ago



and this season, he is proving that was money well spent.

He is an Australian international now and as well as creating goals, he can chip in with a few himself as well. The U's midfield will have to keep him quiet and not let him dictate proceedings.

I think the Us can win the game tonight but they will have to be right on their game throughout the ninety minutes, and into whatever injury time the referee adds on.

In the last home game, a late leveller preventing them getting the three points, I'm sure they won't want a repeat of that scenario.





How would you sum up the season and the team's progress?

AM: Overall this season has been hugely successful for us with such a young squad of players it has been fantastic to watch us play some wonderful football. What is more pleasing is that we have a squad who have progressed into players who can play at a much higher level.

AP: We've had alot of hassle with the club in the past and now we have got these young players in. Most people were expecting a relegation battle so, to be where we are, battling for promotion is incredible. It has been a great achievement for everyone involved with Swindon Town, including Power, Cooper and all of the players.

The play-offs now lie ahead. What will the team need to do to safely navigate these games and make it to the Championship?

AM: The Play-offs is a different prospect than the normal 46 game season, we now have three games to get where we want to be we have the attacking capabilities to beat anyone so if we can keep it tight at the back! I think we have every opportunity of promotion.

AP: Obviously with young players who aren't experienced it seems hard, but the bunch of lads want this as much as the fans do and we just need to get some momentum going into the play-offs and start playing the flowing football we played for most of the season.

Do that and we can beat anyone in the league.

Which players will be key to success when it comes to the play-off games?

AM: We have a number of players who can stand up and be counted but if Massimo Luongo who for me is the best midfielder in League One is on his game he is unplayable another for me is Jack Stephens a fantastic defensive player who has tremendous attacking ability.

AP: Everyone in all fairness! We need to keep everyone fit and make sure they know how to cope with the pressure, with the lack of experience.

All the fans are very happy with this season with the circumstances, so a Wembley trip and, dare I say promotion, would be fantastic for everyone involved.

How do you think Mark Cooper will approach the last two league matches?

AM: He will treat them with the upmost respect knowing yourselves and Orient have chance of survival, these two games certainly the Orient game he will play the team that he wants to start the first leg. He would like momentum so two wins from the last two would be ideal.

AP: He will want to keep everyone happy and healthy so he may start some players who may not have had the chance this season, like Randall and Hylton.

We need to see who will be helpful to the cause and it's a good chance to give players a run out and the starting 11 a rest.

Questions answered today by Andy McKinlay and Aidan Pritchard. Andy tells us: "I have supported Swindon for over 20+ years now and I have seen ups and downs but wouldn't have it any other way (more ups would be great) I now take my wife and sons to watch with me and they have now been bitten by the football bug." Aidan is also a long time Swindon Town fan.



# IN OPPOSITION: TOP BOYS

Football historian **Leigh Edwards** profiles ten winners of Swindon's Player of the Year award

#### **MIKE SUMMERBEE**

Brilliant winger Mike Summerbee was capped eight times by England after leaving Swindon Town. Initially with Cheltenham Town, he moved to the County Ground in March 1960 and was an important figure in Swindon's 1962/63 promotion success.

He netted 39 goals in 218 League games prior to joining Manchester City for £35,000 in August 1965, amassing a vast collection of honours under the Joe Mercer and Malcolm Allison partnership at Maine Road. Later playing for Burnley, Blackpool and Stockport County, where player-manager, he has since been a successful businessman and his son Nicky also starred for Swindon Town.

#### **DON ROGERS**

England U23s winger Don Rogers scored twice in Swindon Town's 1969 League Cup final success. Signing professional at the County Ground in October 1962, he featured in Swindon's 1962/63 promotion campaign and was ever-present in four successive seasons.

He starred as the Robins won promotion again in 1968/69 and the Anglo-Italian Cup in 1970, reuniting with Bert Head at Crystal Palace in November 1972. Moving to QPR in September 1974, he rejoined Swindon in March 1976 and netted 148 goals in 412 League games overall before reuniting with Stan Harland at Yeovil Town in March 1977. He has since run his own sports shop in Swindon.

#### PETER DOWNSBOROUGH

Goalkeeper Peter Downsborough was ever-present 'Player of the Year' in Swindon Town's 1968/69 promotion and League Cup 'double' success. Signing professional for hometown Halifax in September 1960, he moved to the County Ground in exchange for Bill Atkins in August 1965.

He was ever-present as Swindon reached the FA Cup sixth round in 1969/70 and made 274 League appearances prior to joining Bradford City in November 1973. Twice ever-present,



he starred as they reached the FA Cup sixth round in 1975/76 and won promotion in 1976/77. He had a testimonial match in May 1980 and later worked at a power station, settling in Stainland.

#### **JOE BUTLER**

Versatile midfielder Joe Butler was Swindon Town's 'Player of the Year' in 1969/70 and 1972/73. He turned professional with hometown Newcastle United in September 1960, given his League debut against Manchester City in April 1964, but failed to secure a regular first-team slot and joined Swindon in August 1965. Starring in their 1968/69 promotion and League Cup'double' success, he was ever-present in two consecutive seasons and helped the Robins to win the Anglo-Italian Cup in 1970. He netted 18 goals in 342 League games prior to

joining Aldershot in March 1976, then played for Witney Town. Settling in Swindon, he has run a taxi firm.

#### JOHN TROLLOPE

Long-serving left-back John Trollope holds Swindon Town's appearance record. Signing professional at the County Ground in July 1960, he made his League debut in Swindon's 1-1 draw at home to Halifax Town a month later and was ever-present in seven consecutive seasons including the 1962/63 promotion success.


He featured in Swindon's 1968/69 promotion and League Cup 'double' campaign as well as their 1970 Anglo-Italian Cup final triumph. Scoring 21 goals in 770 League games for Swindon, he was their coach, then manager between November 1980 and March 1983. Later Swindon's youth team boss, he was awarded the MBE.

#### COLIN CALDERWOOD

Central defender Colin Calderwood was capped 36 times by Scotland after leaving Swindon Town. Signing professional for Mansfield Town in March 1982, he moved to the County Ground in July 1985 and was 'Player of the Year' as Swindon stormed to the Fourth Division title in 1985/86. He also starred as they won promotion in 1986/87, then featured in two further play-off finals including the 1993 Wembley triumph. Scoring 20 times in 330 League games, he moved to Tottenham Hotspur in July 1993, then Aston Villa and Nottingham Forest. He later managed Northampton Town, Forest and Hibernian, since assisting Chris Hughton at various clubs.

#### FRASER DIGBY

England U21s goalkeeper Fraser Digby was Swindon Town's 'Player of the Year' on three occasions. Initially with Manchester United, he reunited with Lou Macari at Swindon in September 1986, appearing in their 1986/87 promotion campaign. He was ever-present in 1988/89, starring as the Robins qualified

for the play-offs in consecutive seasons including their 1993 Wembley triumph and were League Cup semi-finalists in 1994/95. Also featuring in the 1995/96 Second Division title success, he had a testimonial match in July 1997 and played 417 League games, joining Crystal Palace in August 1998, then Barry Town, OPR and Kidderminster Harriers.

#### **ALAN McLOUGHLIN**

Republic of Ireland international midfielder Alan McLoughlin was 'Player of the Year' when Swindon Town reached the Second Division play-off final in 1989/90. Starting with Manchester United, he reunited with Lou Macari at Swindon in August 1986 and helped qualify for the play-offs in successive years. He scored 19 times in 106 League games before sold to Southampton for £1,000,000 in December 1990. Moving to Portsmouth in February 1992, he was ever-present as they reached the First Division play-offs in 1992/93. He joined Wigan Athletic in November 1999, then played for Rochdale and Forest Green Rovers, since holding coaching posts.

#### SHAUN TAYLOR

Influential central defender Shaun Taylor captained Swindon Town to the Second Division title and FA Cup fifth round in 1995/96. He impressed with Bideford before moving to Exeter City in December 1986 and skippered their 1989/90 Fourth Division title triumph. Joining Swindon in July 1991, he was ever-present as the Robins won promotion to the Premier League in 1992/93. He was their 'Player of the Year' three times and netted 30 goals in 212 League games while at the County Ground. Moving to Bristol City in September 1996, he captained them to promotion glory in 1997/98. He has since coached at Exeter City and Torquay United.

#### LEE PEACOCK

Former Scotland U21s striker Lee Peacock was 'Player of the Year' when Swindon Town won promotion in 2006/07. Initially with Carlisle United, he helped them to win the Auto Windscreens Shield and promotion in 1996/97. He joined Mansfield Town in October 1997 and moved via Manchester City to Bristol City in August 2000.

Starring as they won the LDV Vans Trophy and reached the Second Division play-offs in 2002/03, he joined Sheffield Wednesday in July 2004. He moved to Swindon in January 2006 and netted 20 goals in 125 League games before joining Grimsby Town in January 2010, then Havant & Waterlooville and Eastleigh.





#### THE BIG INTERVIEW

For the past few seasons, the number of substitutes a team is allowed to name on the bench has risen from five to seven. What hasn't changed is the number that are allowed to come on in a game, that allowable number remains at three.


Almost always, it is an outfield player as managers look to get back into a game with an attacking change, or consolidate with a defensive change. A third situation is when a player picks up an injury and has to be replaced.

While the third of those options also relates to the goalkeeper in the team, injuries that put a keeper out of the game are few and far between. Should an injury occur, more often than not the keeper plays on in pain and then the damage is assessed after the final whistle. Loss of form can also mean a change in goal but that never comes during a game.

So, any keeper on the bench at any club must be patient and just wait for his chance to play, especially if the current incumbent is performing well enough to keep his place in the team week in, week out.

That has certainly been the case here at Colchester United, with Sam Walker playing every one of the first forty league games of the season. The fortieth came at Coventry City, where he picked up a knee injury that forced him to miss the following fixture, a trip to Chesterfield three days later.





That meant a U's league debut for Chris Lewington, nine months after signing for the U's from Dagenham & Redbridge last summer. He did appear in the Capital One Cup back in August but has waited patiently in the wings for his League One bow for his new club.

He accepts that Sam has been in good form this season but explains that it has still been tough to sit on the bench. He also praises his teammate for the consistent performances that have preventing him from playing more often, something he was doing at Daggers.


"It was a bit of a risk coming here but I think you do have to take risks sometimes. I was playing every week and was probably in a bit of a comfort zone maybe. I came here to challenge Sam for the number one spot, I certainly didn't come here with any intention of sitting on the



"Sam has been great in goal for us though and it has been pretty impossible for me to force my way in because his performances haven't dipped. I cannot fault him at all this season and it happens at every level – look at Valdes at Manchester United. He is one of the best keepers in the world and has won everything you can but he can't get in because De Gea is playing so well."

Whilst he hasn't been playing first team football as much as he would obviously have liked, he feels that he is a better keeper for the move. And he heaped the praise on Goalkeeping Coach Ademola'George' Bankole for that progression.

"I work hard every day in training with George, Sam and the other keepers and I really do feel that I have progressed as a keeper in the past year. Aspects of my game are better now than they were twelve months

ago and that is down to the work that George has done with me. That work in training and in the U21s games I have been involved in mean that I have always been ready if required and I was certainly ready for the Chesterfield game when Sam picked up his injury at Coventry."

For any supporter looking at the results from that Tuesday night's fixtures, the goalkeeper for the U's wouldn't have come out with too much credit. Chesterfield ran away with things and took the points in a 6-0 victory. It could have been a lot worse though, but for the intervention of Lewington on a number of occasions.

The twenty-six-year-old admitted that it was a night to forget but was adamant that he and the lads would recover



quickly from the setback. He told We Are United: "It is human nature to be disappointed after such a defeat and I'm sure that no-one will be surprised to learn that we were all devastated in the changing room after the game. We will all bounce back though and we have a resilient squad of players, who have confidence in their own ability, despite the big defeat"

On his own performance at Chesterfield, he told us: "I did make a few decent saves but that's my job and that's what I am paid to do. I was also very disappointed with myself on one of the goals, the one that slipped through my hands in the second half."

Disappointment can't last long for a keeper though, with self-confidence needed in abundance in what is probably the most difficult position to play in. The former Daggers keeper doesn't mask his own confidence in his ability and is sure that he can do a job whenever he is called upon.

"As a footballer, and as a keeper especially, you have to have confidence and belief in yourself. If you don't believe in your ability, why should anyone else believe in you. I was ready to play again in the next game and I was ready to be on the bench again if Sam recovered and was fit to play. You have to be ready all the time, that's what we're here for and that will be the case in the final two matches, whatever situation we're in."



We've not had anything else of note to report on from the past couple of games so the manager should have all the usual players to pick from.

I say all the usual players, because we still have a few out with long term injuries. They will all be absent for the remaining two matches but hopefully, they'll all be firing on all cylinders when the squad return to pre-season training.

# ATLETICO'S WAR OF ATTRITION FAILS TO UNDO 'SUPER CLUB' RIVAL AS REAL POWER ON

It says much about Atletico Madrid's performance in the Champions League quarter final second leg defeat last Wednesday that the victors, their city rivals Real – with disagreeable types like Pepe and Sergio Ramos in their ranks – were deemed winners of the morale battle.

Even before Javier Hernandez' late goal put the reigning champions through to the last four, it had been a performance more of attrition that aesthetics. Carlo Ancelotti's side is littered with players who can mix it. Specifically, the type of layer who likes to take a proactive approach to the mixing.

Substitute Atletico for Barcelona and watch the roles reverse. No longer are Madrid painted as plucky underdogs – a fanciful claim you might think but remember, Real's recent head-to-record against their local rivals is fairly atrocious – but as agents of the dark arts. Barca consistently find themselves pitted against extreme cynicism.

With Los Blancos posing the attacking threat they do on the counter attack, it is a tactic that suits them well on the big occasion. To last Wednesday evening, when Diego Simeone's team lacked the ambition that has so defined his hugely successful tenure in charge.

That's not to misconstrue the meaning of ambition. The Argentinean's team are built on resilience first and foremost, underpinned by a united worth ethic matched by few. But Atletico's transformation from underachieving mid-table — Europa League if they're lucky — fodder into La Liga winners and Champions League finalists is nothing short of remarkable.

That they and not Real were many people's favourities to progress going into this two legged tie says much about their dominance, if not over Spanish football, over their more costly opponents. Sometimes, a team have the ingredients to beat another. Do it once, and a repeat can be made all the more likely.

But, after an engaging and eminently watchable first leg that swung mostly in Real's favour, the lack of a winning goal notwithstanding, last Wednesday's fare was sub-standard. In the original leg, there was interested to be gleaned from Atletico's own chances and some superb individual performances – notably from Slovenian goalkeeper Jan Oblak.


Admittedly, even the second half of that one had become scrappy. But the second leg took the biscuit. It took the entire ten. A central tenet to Diego Simeone's philosophy is that all players display the workrate asked of them. Arda Turan does this and so, should be commended for it. Many players in his position manage to escape such a task, purely by virtue of what they do offer when on the ball.

But when your playmakers are picking up early bookings for stupid challenges, it can so often tend to be a precursor to what will come soon after. On this occasion, it proved so. Turan was later red carded.

In the ensuring reaction in the days followed the game, I read a superb line. "It's incumbent on all the super clubs that they try to play super football." Real did, but you could hardly argue the same for Atleti

Then again, what's the definition of a super club?

### Football In Colchester During World War One The In-Depth Story

With this year marking 100 years since the commencement of World War 1, we'll be taking a detailed look at the connection between football in Colchester and the military.

Whilst Colchester United were formed in 1937, there has always been a strong football heritage in the town and *Kevin Drury* takes a look at that relationship.




The final article to feature Colchester's WWI footballing heroes is dedicated to John Ernest Victor Coote DCM and Augustin Leaning

Leaning was old school Colchester FC, a son of one of the most prominent families of late 19th Century Colchester, the clothing manufacturers H Leaning & Co, and one of four brothers to play for Colchester Town. Between them Bob, Gus, Major and Harry Leaning played over 200 times with Major, only the second Town player at the time to win county honours, contributing the majority share. Gus and Bob though would undoubtedly have run him close had their professions not caused them to spend much of their time away from Colchester. Both made their debuts in 1892-93 with Gus playing his last game in 1899-00 and Bob in 1902-03 by which time Gus had qualified as a Vet and Bob as a surgeon, and while Gus was not of the standing of Bob or Major on the football field the fact that most of his appearances were in Essex Senior and Pearson Charity Cup games, the club's prestige fixtures, demonstrates that his standing. Indeed his final game was in Town's first ever FA Cup tie.

Both Gus and Bob went to South Africa during the Boer War as civilian volunteers in their respective specialisms and while Bob in due course returned to civilian medical practice Gus took a commission in the Royal Army Veterinary Corps and made the Army his career for the next 30 years retiring as a Lt-Colonel.

The award of his DSO was published in January 1917 'Major A Leaning for gallantry in the field' but gives no further details while the local press reports just add he had already been mentioned in dispatches and had seen much active service.

Jack Coote was also one of several brothers but his father earned his living in a very different way to Henry Leaning being a billiard marker and for many years lessee of




the billiard room at the Red Lion. Apart from, as the description suggests, keeping score at major games and generally running his hall a billiard marker was also likely to be something of a back street bookmaker, and invariably the stakeholder for the side bets etc.

Jack Joined the Territorials, the 5th Bn Essex Regiment as an 18-y-o in December 1913 while a clerk for the Inland Revenue at Colchester. At the outbreak of war he was immediately given a stripe and had a second when the Battalion departed for Gallipoli in June 1915. During his six months in that maelstrom he was promoted Sergeant. From December 1915 until his discharge in Summer 1919 the Battalion were in Egypt and Palestine and Jack was either COMS or Acting Sergeant-Major. His DCM was awarded on 17 May 1917 at the First Battle of Gaza for repeatedly putting himself in danger by going into the vicinity of the enemy positions to bring out the wounded.

After the war Jack, who had been a regular for

Towns 2nd XI in 1913-14, settled in London and joined the Metropolitan Police. His first post war game for Town was as one of the five deputies needed for an away game at Manor Park so he didn't have too far to travel. Politely described as "blessed with plenty of weight" in the match report it was noted he had played for Millwall Reserves that season.

Jack travelled up from London the following week for the Pearson Charity Cup semi final, this time being referred to as 'nefty', but it was hardly practical for him to come back to Colchester on a regular basis and he was not seen again until Easter from when he played five of the six games crammed into the final 21/2 weeks of April and bagged four of Town's nine goals. He would have another brief spell of five appearances in six games in the early part of 1921-22 and then played thrice more over a period of time including a friendly at Highbury in front of over 10,000 when he scored one of lown's goals against Arsenal Reserves before playing his last game in Town's colours at the end of February.





#### **U9s v Norwich City**

The U9s grew into the game against Norwich after a poor start. Players struggled in the first period with their decision making on who and when to press. This allowed Norwich to play around us and saw them have more of the ball. But, from the second period onwards, the players improved defensively, recognising overloads and picking better times to press. This gave us a stronger platform to build counter attacks and create chances. Both Billy Walsh and Robbie Scanlon worked hard looking for opportunities to play forward, creating many clear chances at goal.

#### U10s v Norwich City

We played a 3-3-1 formation which saw we get overloaded in central midfield and we didn't recognise quickly enough how to solve problems in the game. Our goals game from individual play by Thomas Kemp who finished well after some good individual skills beating the Norwich defence.

In goal, Josh Bruce recognised when distribute quickly and to start a counter attack, coming off his line well to collect ball, and supporting his defenders when needed.

Louis Freeman received the ball well and moved away from his opponents well to create opportunities to play forward and recognised who was the danger out of possession and closed down play early.

#### U11s v Norwich City

The players regained shape really well with good recovery runs and becoming compact quickly.

Individually, players got beat too easily in 1v1s, allowing Norwich to create overloads by running with the ball. This caused problems which at times Ben Brown (GK) and Kacy Parish in the defensive line did well to deal with the danger. Ben Haddock and Mathew Yates, both U10s playing up, had most success and showed a good understanding of when and how to press or delay.

On the counter attack, the players showed some good choices of when and where to get in behind the Norwich back line. This was achieved with some good early forward passes that broke through units along with good forward runs from the striker and supporting midfielders breaking quickly to join the attack.

#### U12s v Norwich City

We played two squads, which meant we were on continuously and each opponent squad was fresh which no doubt contributed to a poor overall performance.

Against the first and third period team: Two even squads with some decent football played.

1st period was frantic and played at a really high tempo lacking some quality at times. 3rd period was more controlled and had longer periods of possession, we managed to threaten the goal on a number of occasions. Defensive shape was better and forced more mistakes from Norwich which we tried to capitalise on.

Against the 2 & 4th period team. Nothing to say other than we were completely dominated by 3 players who physicality and size were no match for our players. That said the attitude of the players to compete throughout was excellent and were not fazed by facing boys that we physically more developed. Players kept their heads up and tried their very best.

#### U13s v Norwich City

The physical differences between the two sides were extremely evident throughout the game, as Norwich bullied their way through the game especially in attacking areas. When we managed to play in their half beyond their more physical players, we demonstrated good movement, clever play and gave Norwich problems which at times they struggled to

During the second period we failed to believe in our philosophy as Norwich kept us in our own half running past us and easily knocking us off the ball, forcing us to kick long early and at times having four players around the man on





the ball trying to reclaim possession, meaning we lost shape, organisation and a way to play out as options became limited.

During periods three and four we were much better as players were asked about the club's style of play and started to see success getting out from the back and being creative in forward areas.

Ross Crane was creative going forward, worked hard, put Norwich on the back foot on many occasions. Sam Cornish demonstrated an excellent range of passing, tried to play forward as much as possible with a purpose. Liam Bennett was Strong defensively, looked to support, tried to play out from the back. Stood up to the challenge against big powerful opposition.

Andre Hassanlly showed excellent technical ability, not afraid to tackle when needed, showed good vision into forward areas

#### U14s v Norwich City

Game of two halves, as cliché as it sounds. First half we started very well our shape was good and Norwich found it very hard to break us down as we were compact and spaces for them to play through were very limited, forced them side to side and on this managed to regain the ball and counter to very good effect scoring 2 goals and putting ourselves in a very comfortable position.

We conceded a goal before the break where

we just got caught square at the back and didn't track a midfield runner.

We were better in possession this week but still feel as a group we can be braver and look into forward areas quicker when playing out from the back.

We found it difficult to deal with Norwich's physicality in the second half and all the hard work we had put in with team shape which we needed was out of the window and we conceded sloppy goals by being countered on this was due to our shape being all over the place. We still managed to create 2 or 3 good goal scoring opportunities which we failed to take.

#### U16s v Ipswich

Despite only fielding three U16s players (2 of whom were called across to be U18s substitutes) against a strong lpswich side boasting many players who have represented their U18s, we recorded our first clean sheet of the season. Overall, lpswich had the larger amount of possession, but we maintained concentration, defended better collectively & avoided individual mistakes, things we haven't done consistently all season, yet we still carried plenty a threat going forwards with Callum Jones applying the finishing touch to a short corner routine and Dean Ager lobbing the lpswich goalkeeper to ensure a 2-0 victory.

honours those clubs that are leading the way in continuing to push the standard even higher to providing the very best experience for families across The Football League.



The players then help the club's media staff construct a reply to their letters and a reply is sent out, usually within ten days of the receipt of the letter.


### **MATCHDAY ACTIVITIES**

Former Colchester United boss Joe Dunne is among the names being linked with the vacant BRAINTREE TOWN manager's job.

Iron chairman Lee Harding has been impressed by the calibre of applicants who have put themselves forward for the position.

Harding has been inundated by applications since news broke that Alan Devonshire had declined a contract offer to stay as boss for a fifth season.

But while he was sorry to see Devonshire depart, he has been heartened by the level of interest that the post of Braintree manager appears to demand in football nowadays.

The likes of Dunne, Bishop's Stortford manager Rod Stringer and ex-Braintree favourite Brad Quinton have all been linked with the vacant post

"We've had lots of applications and they are still coming in," said Harding.


There are one or two very interesting ones. We've had two from managers currently in charge of international sides, one from a very well-qualified female manager and applications from the USA and Spain as well as some South American interest from Uruguay, Brazil and Golombia

"It's clear that the draw and reach of Braintree Town is far and wide.

"There are some very strong ones in there and some from people who have done well on Championship Manager but I'm pleased with the callbre and number that we have had."

Harding said that the contract that had been offered to Devonshire would have given him the same personal terms and playing budget as he had been working with this year as they were unable to afford a greater spend without putting the club's finances under strain.

He said: "We wanted Alan to stay, but he obviously wanted more than what we could offer. We have our feet on the ground and I suppose you can have a gamble and spend more, but that's not our way here at Braintree Town.



"We look at the (playing) budget each year and it's not always easy.

"We did increase it last year after the sale of Dean Wells and that deal was worth a good amount to us.

"We've looked to maintain that same budget for next year and that's without the windfall of a player sale so we've had to source that money from elsewhere.

"So you could say that the money in the budget has gone up.

"We'd all like a pay increase but it's just not realistic for us at this time.

"Each time we have been promoted we have set targets to survive, consolidate, grow, challenge and compete and with that in mind, Alan has played a big role in helping us consolidate at this level. "The next big thing for us is the stadium and we'll always need to have those facilities to generate the income streams to really compete at this level and move on into the Football League.

"We have made progress recently with the stadium and I'm hoping that there'll be good news in the summer in regards to that."

WITHAM TOWN are now preparing for life in Division One North, after their relegation from the Ryman Premier was confirmed.

Their 2-0 home defeat against Metropolitan Police confirmed Town's fate.

Boss Garry Kimble said: "This year has been about fine margins – if you don't take your chances you get punished and that's what has happened."

John Fleck went closest for the visitors, whilst Luke Freeman was unable to convert his chance for the Robins. However a point was all Steve Cotterill's side needed to claim the championship.

MK Dons winger Rob Hall scored an emphatic hat-trick in a standout performance during his side's 6-1 thrashing of Leyton Orient last weekend.

The 21-year-old is currently on loan with the Dons from Championship side Bolton Wanderers, with his treble the first goals he has netted for the promotion-chasing club.

Preston striker Joe Garner has won the League One Player of the Year award, with MK Dons midfielder Dele Alli named the Football League's Young Player of the Year.

Garner was awarded the coveted prize after scoring 22 goals in 34 matches so far – an impressive record following a near threemonth absence with a tendon injury over the Christmas period.

The 27-year-old also picked up the accolade for goal of the year as his sensational strike against Rotherham United in last season's playoff semi-final received the most votes from the general public.

Alli has been the stand-out youngster across all three divisions this term, scoring 16 goals for Karl Robinson's men. The 19-year-old signed for Premier League side Tottenham in the January transfer window, but was loaned straight back to the Dons for the remainder of the season.

Lilywhites forward Garner beat off competition from Alli and Bristol City midfielder Luke Freeman to take home the main award.



The U's U21s have not only been an environment for our own players to develop, but for young loanees from other clubs to spread their wings in a different setting.

Through the season, a number of the young lads brought in to play for the first team have also had the chance to turn out for the U21s in their Development League games.

Jack Marriott joined the Us from Ipswich earlier in the season and has been a regular in both the first team and U21s squads.

Jack was born at Beverley in Yorkshire, but the family moved to the Northamptonshire village of Brixworth when Jack was just three.

He recalls: "My first experience of football was with my local village team, Brixworth Juniors. It was a good start because we were not a bad side and got to two finals at Northampton Town's Sixfields Stadium a couple of years on the trot, in the age groups of 7 to 9.

"I started off in midfield and I always enjoyed scoring goals, which came quite naturally. As I grew up and started playing on full size pitches I moved further up the pitch and found myself playing up front."

Jack has always been a natural goalscorer, at such a rate that it was inevitable that he would get noticed by bigger clubs as he developed.

"I was playing in a tournament at Corby, for Brixworth, against a side called Corby Warriors. Their manager was also the manager of a semi-professional Under 13s/14s team, Rothwell Town. I went on trial for them for a few days, after which they signed me.

"I stayed there from the end of my U13s season, throughout my U14s season."

By that stage Jack had attracted attention within the professional game, with both Ipswich Town and Derby County keen to get his signature and giving him trials.

"I favoured Ipswich, and signed when I was 15, for Sammy Morgan as Academy Manager and Gerard Nash as the U16s manager."

Jack has particular thanks for one-time U's player Trevor Whymark, who was coaching at Ipswich: "I learned a lot from Trevor Whymark, who had been a tremendous attacking player.

"Finding the back of the net always felt quite natural to me, and I made my first team debut for Ipswich at the age of 18, away at Bumley in the last game of the season two years ago. Last season I went out on loan to Woking Town and had a good spell there.

"It was followed by a loan at Gillingham, where I found first team opportunities hard to come by as they had so many strikers. I opted to go back to Woking, where I would be playing games and continuing to learn."

Throughout his young career, Jack has had total

support of his parents, and his gratitude to them is clear: "They have always been there for me," he says.

"I was recalled by Ipswich at the end of last season, and made another appearance for them in the Championship."

Jack was recruited on loan by the Us earlier this season, but has had less time on the pitch than he would have hoped: "I had some difficult loans earlier in the season, starting at Carlisle and playing the first three games, when the manager was dismissed. That was difficult for me. I spent some time back at Woking before coming to Colchester.

"I have has a handful of substitute appearances here, but my total time on the pitch is not great. Despite that I have enjoyed it and the lads are good. It's just a pity that we are in the League position that we are.

"I try to keep myself busy, trying to improve and be on top of my game, so that I am knocking at the door, hoping for a chance to play. It is difficult to bring me into the team in the position the team finds itself.

"We will see what happens next season. Ipswich have an option on me but I am just focused on what happens here between now and the end of the season. I will worry about next season at the end of this one and in the summer."





### PREVIOUS MEETINGS:

This is the seventy-sixth meeting between the clubs, and the seventysecond in the Football League since our first meeting back in United's first season in 1950. Indeed, Arthur Turner scored the club's first ever Football League goal in that match at The County Ground. It came after twenty-four minutes of their second game of the season when Arthur Turner fired past Sam Burton after being put through by Bob Curry.

This is Swindon's sixth visit to the Weston Homes Community Stadium and they'll be looking to make it a fourth successive victory here. Last season they recorded a 2-1 win with Nicky Ajose and Dany N'Guessan on the score sheet with Magnus Okuonghae pulling one back a dozen minutes from time.

That followed two single goal victories, the first of which was under the managerial reigns of the enigmatic Italian Paulo Di Canio in the FA Cup.

### THE HISTORY GAME:

United's first ever home Football League goal was also scored against Swindon Town – it was not unusual for teams to play each other within days back then in the 1950s. After the club's first home match had ended in a goalless draw with Bristol Rovers, the U's took The Robins apart and were four goals to the good by halftime thanks to three in an eight minute spell. Town won the second half 1-0 thanks to a goal from 15-stone forward Garth Hudson!

Arthur Wood reported: "Curry increased the United lead after 37 minutes with a beautifully placed shot, after Burton had run out of his goal to near the corner of the 18-yard line. Just previously the goalkeeper had only managed to deflect a good shot by McKim. After 40 minutes Turner headed home a cross from Bearryman after another astonishing exhibition by the Swindon keeper, who again left his goal without having an idea of how to get the ball. Just on the interval, Turner put Church through to net another goal – the third in eight minutes."

However, second half goals from Russell, Sidibe and Higginbotham end the club's improbable dream of a place in the Premier Division. Chris Barker is also sent off for the visitors.



### TON UP FOR CHRIS

Chris Porter's goal against Scunthorpe United brought up a century of goals in League football.

Twenty-three of those were scored in Scottish football during his time with Motherwell.

### TOM'S LEAGUE APPEARANCES

Assuming he played at Fleetwood on Saturday afternoon, Tom Eastman made his 150th Football League appearance – ten of those were with Ipswich, and six with Crawley, the rest with the Us.

The Us are finishing the season in perhaps their best form of the campaign.


The weekend win over Fleetwood made it 14 points from their last eight games, with four wins and a draw in that time.


