



BOOK CLUB

Three new books on Rochdale AFC have hit the physical and digital bookshelves in recent months.

Historian and author **Steven Phillipps** has written his fourth book about the club's players.

'Rochdale AFC Who's Who 1999-2016' catalogues the players who first turned out for Dale from the beginning of the 1999/2000 campaign to the conclusion of last season.

So, if you want a reminder about the likes of Glenville Le Fondre, Duncan Evans and Bamberdele Adebola (and those are their real Christian names), this is the book for you!

The book follows on from Steven's three previous works which covered 1907-1999, meaning there is a biography for every Rochdale player since the club's formation up to the end of last term.

A must for all students of Dale history, the book is available on Amazon (£12) and also from Tony Brown, 4 Adrian Close, Toton, Nottingham NG9 6FL (Cheques for £14 payable to Tony Brown).

Also available on Amazon is a Kindle book written by journalist and Dale fan Chris Fitzgerald.

In 'The Rochdale Connection: The Players' Stories', Chris catches up with six former Dale players to find out just how the club helped them and what, in their opinion, it takes to become an elite footballer.

There are stories from Alan Reeves, Rochdale's own sons Craig Dawson and Matt Gilks, the prolific striker Rickie Lambert, as well as Will Buckley and Glenn Murray.

There are also reflections on the impact the club had on the careers of Paul Butler, Grant Holt, Adam Le Fondre and Paddy McCourt.

Chris's Kindle book is available on Amazon for £3.50.


Finally, the life and career of former Dale player and manager Tony Collins is celebrated in the book 'Tony Collins: Football Master Spy'.


The book tells the fascinating and enlightening story of Tony's upbringing and his time in the Army during World War 2, particularly when he served in Italy.

Dale made it through the first round of the FA Cup with a hardfought win over fellow Fourth Division outfit, Crewe Alexandra.

When the two sides met at Spotland on the opening day of the season, Dale were 1-0 winners thanks to a Peter Farrell penalty.

The scoreline was repeated in the cup tie and Farrell was again the scorer, this time following an almighty scramble in the Crewe penalty area.

Dale's reward for their victory was a trip to Fourth Division leaders York in round two.

2005

Dale came from 2-0 down to gain a deserved point in a thrilling 2-2 home draw with Chester.

The visitors took a 19th minute lead which was doubled at the same point of the second half to seemingly secure all three points.

But Blair Sturrock quickly pulled one back for Dale, before Rickie Lambert slammed home an 81st minute free-kick to earn the draw

28 YEARS AGO Saturday 19th November 1988

Huddersfield Town 1, Rochdale 1

Back in the days when they used to regionalise the early rounds of the FA Cup, you could usually be guaranteed an exciting tie not too far from home.

Dale were given one of the closest possible ties with a trip to Huddersfield in 1988/89 and although The Terriers were a division higher, Danny Bergara's men were going well and confident of causing an upset.

This didn't seem likely when Andy May gave Town an early lead, but Dale hit back and levelled just before the break through Neil Edmonds.

That was the end of the scoring, but it led to a famous and thrilling Spotland replay nine days later



SWINDON TOWN



The arrival of Tim Sherwood as Director of Football at Swindon Town has provided the welcome boost the club needed.

Prior to Sherwood's appointment nine days ago, The Robins were in the League One relegation zone having lost consecutive league fixtures to Walsall and Scunthorpe.

They followed that up with a hard-earned draw at Eastleigh in the FA Cup and a penalty shoot-out win at Exeter in the Checkatrade Trophy, before last Saturday's impressive 3-0 home defeat of Charlton in front of the Sky cameras.

Swindon are keen to stress that Sherwood isn't replacing Head Coach Luke Williams, who has confirmed he is happy with the new set-up at the County Ground.

"From a selfish point of view it means I can pick things up and learn from someone who has managed at the highest level," he said, referring to Sherwood's time in charge at Tottenham and Aston Villa.

Sherwood has called the challenge an "interesting project" and added, "I've had what many people believe are better options, but at the moment it's the best option for me and I'm pleased to be here."



ROBINS TRIVIA

Swindon are the lowest ranked team to win the League Cup. The Robins were in the Third Division when they defeated Arsenal 3-1 in the 1969 final (pictured).

The Robins gained promotion to the Premier League in 1993, although their only season in the top flight was a difficult experience. They finished bottom of the table, winning just five games all season and suffering heavy defeats to Liverpool (0-5), Southampton (1-5), Everton (2-6), Aston Villa (0-5), Newcastle (1-7) and Leeds (0-5).



SWINDON TOWN KEY MEN



Robins: 85 apps/24 goals

Jonathan is a striker who is in his third full season at the County Ground, having played on loan with The Robins in the 2010/11 campaign.

Originally a Tottenham trainee, Jonathan spent time away from Spurs on loan with the likes of Yeovil, Millwall, Peterborough. Charlton and Brighton, before joining Swindon on a permanent basis in September 2014.

James Brophy

Career: 45 apps/1 goal Robins: 45 apps/1 goals

James signed a contract extension with our visitors in the summer following a successful first season in league football.

Usually playing on the left side of defence, the 22-year-old moved to Swindon from non-league football where he was playing for Edgware Town.



15 **Tom Smith**

A highly-rated youngster at the County Ground, Tom penned his maiden professional deal in the summer after progressing through Town's Academy system

He made his debut in a 3-0 defeat in Preston in April 2015 and scored line first senior goal in Swindon's 3-1 will at Crewe five months later.

A goalkeeper who was on loan at Swindon from Liverpool last season, Lawrence signed a permanent deal with The Robins in the summer.

2 NATHAN THOMPSON

A product of the Academy at the County Ground, Nathan is our visitors' captain and has made around 170 appearances for the club.

3 BRANDON ORMONDE-OTTEWILL

Recruited from Arsenal in summer 2015, Brandon (20) is a left wingback who was one of two Swindon players sent-off when they were last at the Crown Oil Arena in April.

4 CONOR THOMAS

Formerly with Coventry, Conor is a midfielder who came through the ranks at the Ricoh Arena and played over 100 times for his hometown club before moving to Swindon in July.

5 ANTON RODGERS

The son of Celtic manager Brendan Rodgers, Anton is in his third season with today's opponents after joining them from Oldham.

The 23-year-old midfielder made a small number of appearances for Brighton and Exeter (loan) at the start of his career.

6 JAMIE SENDLES-WHITE

Initially a trainee at QPR, Jamie is a defender who moved to the County Ground from Hamilton in February.

7 MICHAEL DOUGHTY

On loan at Swindon from QPR, Michael is a midfielder who scoredfive goals in a previous loan spell at the County Ground in the second half of last season.

The 23-year-old has also played on

loan at Crawley, Aldershot, Stevenage and Gillingham in the FFI

8 YASER KASIM

Now in his fourth season with The Robins, Yaser is a midfielder who was signed from Brighton and who has represented Iraq at international level.

10 JOHN GODDARD

Recruited from Woking in the summer, John (23) is a former Reading youngster who netted 17 goals in the National League last season.

12 WILL HENRY

Second-choice goalkeeper at the County Ground, Will saved a penalty on his debut for The Robins at the Crown Oil Arena in April.

14 ELLIS IANDOLO

An attack-minded midfielder, Ellis put pen-to-paper on a contract with Swindon in August 2015 after a successful trial spell in Wiltshire.

16 JORDAN STEWART

Capped by Northern Ireland at Under-19 level, Jordan is a forward who joined Town from Glenavon early last season.

20 DARNELL FURLONG

The son of former QPR and Chelsea striker Paul Furlong, Darnell is on loan at Swindon from The Hoops until the end of the season.

The full-back spent time on loan at Cambridge and Northampton last term.

22 SEAN MURRAY

A midfielder who is in his first season with Swindon, Sean (23) arrived from Watford in August having made 84 appearances for



The Hornets, a small number of which were in their 2014/15 Premier League promotion campaign.

27 BRADLEY BARRY

The nephew of Everton midfielder Gareth Barry, Bradley signed for Town in August 2015 after a successful trial period at the club.

The 21-year-old started out with Brighton, but never made their first team.

28 LLOYD JONES

A Welsh international at Under-17 and Under-18 levels, Lloyd is on loan at the County Ground from Liverpool until the end of the season.

Aged 21, the central defender has also played on loan at Cheltenham, Accrington and Blackgool.

29 RAPHAEL ROSSI-BRANCO


Previously with Brighton's academy, Raphael (26) joined Swindon in the summer of 2013 and recently made his 100th appearance in their defence.


35 JORDAN YOUNG

WHEN WE PLAY SWINDON TOWN



LOUMACARI

It was big news when Swindon appointed Lou Macari as their manager in 1984.

Only seven years earlier he was involved in Manchester United's winning goal in the FA Cup Final against Liverpool and was one of those players you used to see regularly on 'Match of the Day'.

He also had an intriguing name; in fact, two intriguing names that made him sound Italian rather than Scottish!

Macari guided The Robins to the Fourth Division title in 1986 and they again won promotion 12 months later in the first-ever play-offs.

He remained at the County Ground until July 1989 when he left for West Harn.

MAGIC ROUNDABOUT

No, not that strange kids' television programme from the 1970s, but the very confusing part of Swindon's road network outside The Robins' ground.

Constructed in 1972, it consists of five mini-roundabouts arranged around a sixth central, anticlockwise roundabout.

The roundabout was built according to the design of Frank Blackmore of the British Transport and Road Research Laboratory.

Traffic flow around the larger, inner roundabout is anticlockwise and traffic flows in the usual clockwise manner around the five mini-roundabouts and the outer loop.


It allegedly provides a better throughput of traffic than other designs and has an excellent safety record since traffic moves too slowly to do serious damage in the event of a collision.

ERIC CANTONA

Younger readers might not believe this, but Swindon played in the Premier League in its second season, 1993/94.

The likes of Arsenal, Chelsea, Tottenham and Liverpool all descended on the County Ground, as did champions Manchester United one March afternoon,

The Red Devils had enigmatic Frenchman Eric Cantona in their team and ten months before he was aiming flying kicks at Crystal Palace fans, he did it to Swindon's John Moncur, who had the temerity to pull Cantona back after losing the ball.



Cantona was promptly sent-off for his challenge and just for good measure, he received another red card at Arsenal three days later!

FINANCIAL IRREGULARITIES

That phrase crops up a lot in football parlance, but in 1990 it cost The Robins a debut season in the old First Division.

Under Ossie Ardiles' management, Town were Second Division play-off winners, but the club later admitted 36 charges of breaching league rules, 35 due to illegal payments made to players.

They were subsequently relegated to the Third Division, giving Sunderland promotion to the top flight and Tranmere to the Second Division.

The scandal saw Chairman Brian Hillier given a six-month prison sentence and chief accountant Vince Farrar put on probation. A later appeal saw Swindon allowed to stay in Division Two.

MATT GILKS

The 2006/07 season hadn't started well for Dale.

They lost 1-0 to Walsall and Torquay in their first two games, with the next match a tricky trip to relegated Swindon.

Alan Goodall inexplicably headed into his own goal just before half-time, but Swindon were denied a more deserving margin of victory when Gilks saved TWO penalties in the second half.

He's old, he's grey, he has a lot to say...

SCRUTATOR

The recent England v Scotland game in the World Cup group stages presented the English and Scotlish Football Associations a unique problem.

The match was scheduled to be played on Remembrance weekend and the Football Associations thought it would be a nice touch if shirts could be made to show the iconic red poppy symbol, with which British people so readily resonate.

Before commissioning the shirts, the game's governing body, FIFA, were asked if they objected. Not surprisingly they did and ruled that all political symbols were banned from kits and that our poppy was indeed a political symbol!

Regular readers will know I have little time for FIFA and have long held the view that this institution holds England in contempt, often seeking one-upmanship against our FA.

Bribes aside, what other reason could there be for our bid to host the 2022 World Cup being astonishingly beaten by the football powerhouse of Qatar? This will remain FIFA's crowning glory of incompetence for as long as the institution shall live. Sadly, many Qatar workmen have already died in stadium building incidents. Last June the BBC reported the death toll at 1,200.

Nevertheless, in the event, both England and Scotland wore black armbands on which there was a poppy. This contravenes FIFA's rules and so a punishment of a points' deduction might be imposed. Or in Scotland's case, a fine, as they probably haven't got any points to deduct!

But, I digress. Quite how did the faceless bureaucrats of FIFA arrive at their decision that the poppy was political, in a game between England and Scotland? Without the sacrifices made by these two countries I doubt this match would even have been played, ironically.

Had England's opponents not been Scotland, but Germany instead, some sense albeit misplaced, could have been taken from FIFA's decision.

The poppy is our way of showing we have not forgotten and are still grateful to all those who fought and died in all conflicts. For FIFA to rule that as a political symbol is FIFA at its obtuse best.

So both teams gave a Churchillian V salute to FIFA and wore them anyway in the same sort of spirit shown by the men who fought in battle.

Closer to home, however, it went largely unreported that West Brom's James McClean refused to wear the commemorative Albion shirt showing the poppy.

When challenged on his stance he said, "I mourn their deaths like every other decent person and if the poppy was a symbol only for the lost souls of World War One and Two I would wear one; I want to make that 100 per cent clear. But the poppy is used to remember victims of other conflicts since 1945 and this is where the problem starts for me.

"For people from the North of Ireland, such as myself, and specifically those in Derry, scene of the 1972 Bloody Sunday massacre, the poppy has come to mean something very different."


So the West Brom winger has therefore managed to politicise the poppy by refusing to wear one, as opposed to the national team not doing so by wearing one. Of course, there was a suspicion during WWII that Ireland was a little more sympathetic to the Germans in much the same way as football fans adopt an "Anyone but United" stance. Ireland could be accused of an "Anyone but England" approach even when England were facing an awkward match playing Hitler away!

Supporters of Rochdale, however, were delighted to see the team run out at Valley Parade last week wearing a special one-off shirt, complete with a poppy stitched into the design. The club have promised to auction off these match-worn shirts soon, with all momes raised going directly to the British Legion.


What is your most memorable game in a Dale shirt?


Who is your best friend in football?





Some good news has been received by the rumoured cash-strapped club, however. Their FA Cup match at non-league opponents Lincoln City has been chosen as a live TV game, landing the club a £72,000 windfall for the inconvenience of moving the match to a Monday night.

PLAYING AWAY

On Saturday 22nd October, I have to confess we didn't follow Dale to Coventry (maybe as well given the result) but instead went a little further east to see Nottingham Forest against Cardiff City in the Championship.

This was partly to visit some friends who live near Nottingham and partly to help with my slow progress towards seeing a game at all 92 league clubs. Number 75 in fact, so 17 to go.

Our match experience was interesting in a number of ways. Firstly, our friend JD is quite badly incapacitated following a series of strokes; the Forest staff were just brilliant with us. Their Mobility Coordinator chose the easiest seats for us to reach, personally met us and escorted us to them via a lift and the stewards were wonderful in helping JD up and down the few remaining steps.

At a time when football gets so much bad press it was uplifting to be treated so well and we have emailed Forest to thank them.

As for the game, it made a fascinating contrast with our fortnightly stints at the Dale. Being in a much larger crowd (around 16,500) and at some distance above the pitch makes the game seem somewhat more remote. I tell friends that one of the pleasures of being at the Crown Oil Arena is that when you shout at players or officials they can often hear you – and on some occasions have been known to respond!

I always imagine that managers and

coaches sitting in dugouts must get the worst possible view of the pitch. I seem to remember in the early Hillcroft days how David Flitcroft would often spend the first half of games in the far corner of the away stand and correspond with KH by phone. This seemed to me a hugely sensible way of getting a fuller view of the game.

On the other hand I can see that being in the dugout makes communication with players possible and also that fans often like to see their manager animated on the touchline – as indeed Neil Warnock was (see later).

Watching Forest from relatively high up gave me less sense of real involvement in the match, but a fascinating tactical view. I was once taken to the Bernabeu to watch Real Madrid and we sat in the fifth tier of what is an extremely steeply banked stadium. The match seemed a million miles away, but, from our bird's eye view of the players' positions, you could sometimes see goals coming well before they were actually scored.

It's also entertaining to watch and listen to the crowd when you're not much involved in who wins. The man screaming for a free-kick or penalty when, as an impartial observer, you can see clearly there was no foul – well at Rochdale I know that would be us, just as incensed by an apparent miscarriage of justice – and sometimes just as wrong!

The standard of play didn't seem to me to be vastly different from League One. Both teams were near the foot of the Championship table at the time and Barnsley in particular have so far made a fairly successful upward transition.

But it was interesting to see how incredibly motivated Cardiff were, this being Neil Warnock's third game in charge. If you want a short-term boost he can clearly make a phenomenal difference (though he never stays anywhere long).


Forest, by contrast, seemed slow and almost resigned once the first Cardiff goal went in; the 2-1 defeat flattered them.

Finally, it was good to renew acquaintance (so-to-speak) with two players. Rickie Lambert, still for me one of the two or three most skilful players I've ever seen play for Dale, strolled around the Forest half for 20 minutes or so, before disappointingly being hurt challenging the goalkeeper and was carried off on a stretcher. Good to see he's already back playing.

Cardiff had Anthony Pilkington up front, still a really speedy and dangerous proposition, although he missed one of the sitters of the season.

Lots of Dale fans will remember him from our game at Huddersfield during our first League One stint when he suffered what at the time felt, looked and sounded like the most horrible injury I've ever seen in a completely fair challenge with Joe Widdowson.

I thought Pilkington's foot had come off at first and it was 20 minutes before he was carried off and another year, I think, before he played again. Widdowson was distraught and it's good to know Pilkington's career has not just revived, but actually taken him briefly to the Premier League with Norwich.

Rochdale's youngest-ever signing, Joshua McCormack, was in the squad for the Checkatrade Trophy match at Hartlepool United last week.



The five-year-old, who is suffering from a terminal brain tumour, was named by Keith Hill as one of Dale's seven substitutes for the match at Victoria Park. He was given squad number 55.

Sadly, Joshua was too poorly to attend the game, but his shirt hung proudly in the dressing room before the match and took pride of place on the substitutes' bench. His name also appeared on the teamsheet.

Hill commented: "It was a real honour to name Joshua McCormack as a substitute for tonight's game.

"He has touched the hearts of everyone at Rochdale Football Club since we met him for the first time back in February.

"No child should have to go through what Joshua is going through and we, as a club and a group of players, will continue to do whatever we can to support him and his family.

"We hope this one small gesture can bring some light to his family during this difficult time."

Joshua is currently being cared for at Derian House Children's Hospice and Hill, his backroom staff and the players, visited the young Dale fan there the day after the 2-1 win at Hartlepool.

They presented Joshua and his family with his matchday shirt and an official teamsheet, as well as his very own junior Dale shirt which was signed by all of the players.

During the visit, Joshua joined the players on a tour of the Hospice so they could learn first-hand about the wonderful facilities they have there.

Situated in Chorley, Derian House provides palliative, specialist respite and



end of life care for children and young adults throughout the North West region. The care and support they provide costs in excess of £3.75 million a year, with less than 9% of the funding coming from central government.

Joshua, who is from Rochdale, was diagnosed with a brain tumour last year and his family were given the devastating news at the end of September that his illness is now terminal.

Since diagnosis, Rochdale Football Club has supported the family where possible. In February, the players presented Joshua and his Mum with a cheque to help towards a fundraising campaign for treatment, whilst the youngster was mascot for the day when Dale faced MK Dons in August.

It was a real honour and very a humbling experience to visit Joshua at the hospice and it was fantastic to be able to raise his spirits during the visit. We continue to send our love and well wishes to Joshua and his family.

Mark Stuart did well to work his way to the byline, Macclesfield failed to clear properly and John Deary hammered the loose ball into the net.


Just after the half-hour mark, Dale doubled their lead to effectively end the contest.






Catching up with...

TONYCOLLINS

Tom Webster caught up with former Dale player-manager Tony Collins ...



Getting the bus to games, no agents negotiating lucrative contracts and having to show a player's card to gain entry to the stadium!

This is a far cry from football today where many players have everything done for them, even in the lower leagues. But when Tony Collins was paving his way into the professional game, things were completely different.

Collins really is a man who has done it all. Being told he needed to enlist for the army during the Second World War was understandably a scary time for his family. Tony's dad used to say, "Why doesn't Churchill send his own son?"

Tony ended up being stationed in Italy where he played football for the army team. There were scouts watching them play and even though Tony was courted by Italian club Padova, it was Sheffield Wednesday for whom he signed when he left the army.

He had spells with Wednesday and Crystal Palace, as well as time with Watford. Whilst playing for The Hornets he was watched by the then England manager, Walter Winterbottom, although he never received a call-up.

The game that Winterbottom decided to attend was played on a pitch like a mud bath and players were ankle deep in mud, conditions in which no footballer could show their true talents.

As it was, there were no further visits from the England manager and subsequently there was no call-up.

Collins signed for Dale in 1959 and moved his family to Edenfield Road. "It was time to settle in somewhere because of the age of the children," he said and settle in he did.

Manager Jack Marshall left for Blackburn Rovers and all the players kept on at Collins to apply for the position.

After a chat with Marshall, Tony applied for the job and was given the opportunity of being player-manager. This actually made him the first-ever black manager in the Football League.

"It was good for me knowing that the players were all behind me, but it was also good for them as they knew what they were getting with me and that also gave them security," he recalled.

Collins described the Rochdale pitch as "not bad, but there was a slope" and that the changing rooms were "difficult for the opposition".

There was also a real struggle with the floodlights on a windy night as they swayed in the wind!

Finances were extremely tight, but this wouldn't stop Collins. "There was an occasion when we had no balls for training, so I actually went down to the sports warehouse and bought a ball with my own money," he told us.

In fact, Tony said that a local school where he coached children had more footballs than the club!

Collins also recalls the team's kit, saying: "Our kit was black and white stripes, which looked dull where the two colours had run, white shorts and red socks. We had red socks because they were cheaper than black!

"We did eventually get a new kit and I felt that that this was important as we more looked professional."

Things that were similar about the club back then compared to now were that they had to find a player for cheap and work with what they had.

Tony did this successfully with players such as David Cross and, most notably, the great Reg Jenkins, who cost £2,300. This was the highest transfer that Collins ever paid for a player as manager of Rochdale.

The one that got away, however, was George Graham. He became available for £6,000 and Tony went to the board to ask for the funds.

"Freddie Radcliffe, who was a good chairman, was always great and said 'Yes, let's do it'. However, he couldn't get the other board members to agree to the transfer."

Without doubt the greatest achievement for Tony whilst he was manager at Rochdale was getting to the League Cup Final in 1962 when we were runners-up to Norwich City. Collins to this day is still the only Rochdale manager to take us to a major final, which he says made him "very proud" and rightly so!

After leaving Dale, Tony had a very successful career working in assistant manager and scouting roles for and with characters such as Don Revie, Brian Clough (in his infamous 44 days at Leeds United) and also Sir Alex Ferguson.

Whilst working at Bristol City he drove the length of the United Kingdom scouting players whilst still living in Rochdale.

When asked if the travelling was difficult, Collins simply said "It's not difficult if you love the game," which is a statement any real football fan can relate to!

DESERT DALE FAN

Dale Supporter DYLAN PEACOCK brings us his views from the Middle East...

The fireworks were set off weeks ago. The bonfire has long since been put out. The nights are drawing shorter. It's time to for the yearly search for the football scarf. The neighbours might even have their Christmas tree up. The clocks have gone back. Winter is more or less upon us, even if it is still November.

For me in Kuwait, this means that all of the English football matches are now suddenly kicking off later into the evening and the short winter nights! Kuwait does not observe daylight saving and so the change in the English time means that everything shifts an hour later in Kuwait because England's clocks have moved back an hour and the time is earlier. Got that? Good.

As someone living in the Middle East who follows both local football as well as the game back in England, I have gained more knowledge and a feeling for the internationalism of football.

I don't mean the idea of international teams, but the idea of players, supporters and anyone involved in the sport travelling abroad and around the world to ply their trade or follow their team. I'd say that I am an 'internationalist' football fan - I'm following football in multiple countries at the same time!

Today, I'm going to talk about internationalism and the idea of football players. As an English fan following football in the Middle East, it is natural to look out for English players plying their trade over here; alas, none spring to mind.

Of course, the same happens in reverse too, I look out for Middle Eastern players who play for English (or British) clubs. And there have been some pretty good, well-known ones.

Mohamed Salah, formerly of Chelsea, is an Egyptian international, whilst a bit closer to home, Omani international Ali Al-Habsi played in goal for (my oncelocal team) Wigan Athletic.

What I'm saying is that whilst there have been, and still of course are, footballers from Middle Eastern nations playing in England, most seem to have worn the colours of a 'top' team, rather than one of the quality which Dale might face on a week-to-week basis.


You might be wondering as to why I'm going off on a tangent and discussing footballers from faraway lands and their impact upon the English game.


Maybe our visitors from Wiltshire have gathered why I have chosen a match against their team to write this article. Or maybe not. Either way, I will explain.

This week Travellers Tales will be a little different. We will not start from Rochdale, but from South Wales.
Yes, you've got it. This is The Exiles report.

The Travellers:

Mike and Chris (Mike's son), plus teenagers Megan, Isobel and Oliver Departure Time: 6.00pm (from South Wales)

Mode of Transport: Car

Each year we look forward to the fixture list when it is published in the middle of June and whilst most Dale fans will drool over the first home game, us Exiles from South Wales seek out the Bristol, Swindon and Oxford dates to pencil in our diaries for an 'away day' not too far from home.

One of the disadvantages of living down here is the scarcity of league football. Whereas Rochdale has around 10 Football League teams within a half-hour drive, where we live there is only Newport, Cardiff and Bristol — and two of those are at the bottom of their respective divisions!

However, when The Dale were League Two it was easy to snatch a trip (incognito of course) on the Newport Supporters Club coach and get a ride to Spotland and back almost from the doorstep. Cheltenham was also an easily accessible venue.

The following season Dale were promoted to League One and we had Bristol City and Yeovil on our list, but by the end of that season they both exited League One in opposite directions,

although Bristol Rovers' promotion replaced the absence of Bristol City.

So an away day at Swindon is one of the key dates for us, providing the thrill of navigating the 'Magic Roundabouts' which appear to have characterised the Swindon roads network over the last couple of decades.

NOT GLAD ALL OVER

On our first visit, Dale were victorious with a last minute strike making it 3-2, but last season we lost 2-1, primarily due to John O'Sullivan being sent-off and thus playing with ten for most of the game.

One thing that really galls me about Swindon is the 'Glad All Over' tune that the PA system belches out each time Town score.

I would dearly like to take a megaphone and sing "Sad All Over" for the benefit of the Swindon fans when Dale score, but I don't think I would be allowed in with one of those and if I used it, I would probably have an early escort out of the ground!

BRIDGE BUILDING

Since this was a Tuesday evening match we planned an early 6pm start, with a three-generation party comprising Mike and Chris (Mike's son), as well as teenagers Megan, Isobel and Oliver.

With Dale being fourth from the top having won their last five games and Swindon sitting fifth from the bottom not having won any of their last five games, we were quite optimistic.

Not long after setting off, the teenagers in the back seat tucked into their packed evening meal, whilst Chris did the driving and Mike did the navigating. That arrangement worked well until we hit the Magic Roundabout!

Our route was very straightforward once over the beautiful Old Severn Bridge in the evening sunshine. This was constructed (as a celebration?) in the year of England's World Cup victory.

From there we joined the M4 across a very flat countryside for about 45

miles eastwards towards Swindon.

Traffic was moderately heavy, but nothing like the M62 would have been at that time of day.

When we reached the Wittshire border it was rather quiet. Our sat-nav had suggested exiting the M4 somewhat earlier than we did, since we preferred the advice offered on the Swindon website which proved to be very easy to follow.

"HAS ANYONE SEEN A PROGRAMME SELLER?"

On previous occasions we have parked on the cricket ground behind the stadium, but spotting its location in the dark whilst navigating the "Magic Roundabouts" presented a bit of a challenge

Fortunately, observant teenager Oliver remembered the way from our last visit and soon we were back on track, parking up just after 7 o'clock.

Swindon is a no-cash-at-the-turnstiles ground, so the preliminaries involved obtaining tickets from the visitors' ticket klosk which, sensibly, is conveniently situated close to the stand that accommodates visitors.

We didn't see any programme sellers, but were assured by the stewards that they would be hawking their wares in the stands. They didn't.

ROBIN'S NEST

We were the early arrivals and were located in the Arkells Stand, which is situated on one side of the pitch, covering the final third of the playing area towards the scoreboard end.

The County Ground is large compared with Spotland and so even with a 6,000 gate, the place still looked sparsely populated. After we took our seats we counted just 42 in the Don Rogers Stand opposite.

The pre-match
'entertainment' consisted
of music blaring out from
the PA system and we
were treated to a rendition
of 'Rockin' Robin', the
1958 hit song which I
hadn't heard for years.

Then an enormous hen with a grotesque beak

made an appearance walking round the pitch, which made me question what it was supposed to be.

Chris deduced that it was in fact a Robin – the club mascot. Then it clicked – the relationship between the music and the mascot; Swindon's nickname is The Robins!

DEFINITELY NOT GLAD ALL OVER

Whilst the home stands filled up a bit later, there was still not much noise from that direction when the game started.

Contrast that with the very vocal 'Pearl Street Gang' who let everybody know which team we were supporting!

And so it continued during the early stages of the game when Dale seemed to be teasing their opponents and not much play entered our defensive half.


However, midway through the first half, our enthusiastic chanting was not quite as enthusiastic.

When you go in at half-time two down, miss a penalty and have a player sentoff in the second period, you get the impression that this was going to be rather like a bad day at the office.

And when 'Glad All Over' was belted out from the PA system for the third time, several Dale supporters made their way to the exit.

RT7 GETS A MENTION...

The route back to the M4 was very straightforward and it gave me time to think.



No, we really weren't!

One thing that always intrigues me when travelling by road is the imaginative personalised number plates that can be spotted.

Leaving the ground we travelled behind N 5TFC which, no doubt, belonged to a Swindon Town supporter. It's bit like R17ALE, which was still probably garaged in Rochdale on this occasion. Quaint, isn't it?

From the M4, we returned back again via the Severn Bridge. It costs nothing to leave England, but we have to fork out a £6.60 bridge toll to get back into Wales. Strange logic.

However, looking on the bright side, Dale still occupied a place in the play-off positions and we didn't have a four hour trek to get back home.


Before the Supporters Club coach would have reached Birmingham, we were all home enjoying our supper.

BY ROAD

Take the M62 eastbound and then the A1 southbound, continuing to where the A1 joins the M25.

Follow the M25 clockwise, passing over the Dartford Crossing, before leaving at junction 2 (s/p London, Canterbury A2, M2). Take the A2/M2 to junction 4, where you leave for the A278 towards Gillingham, going straight across two roundabouts.

At the third roundabout turn left onto the A2 towards Gillingham town centre. At the traffic light junction with the A231, turn right into Nelson Road and passing the small bus station, take a right turn into Gillingham Road. The ground is down on your right.

BY RAIL

Despite the distance involved, getting to Gillingham by train is actually quite straightforward.

The ground is about a ten minute walk from Gillingham Railway Station, which is served by trains from London Victoria (every 15 mins), Charing Cross (every 30 mins), St Pancras and Stratford International (both located on the same line, every 30 mins). It is worth noting that the quickest trains leave from St Pancras (journey time around 45 mins) and Stratford International (journey time 37 mins).

To get to the ground, turn left out of the station and follow the road until you come to a crossroads. Go straight on into Priestfield Road. The visitors' turnstiles are at the far end of this road.

BY COACH

The club have put on a coach to Priestfield Stadium. It will leave Littleborough Railway Station (7.15am), Rochdale Town Hall (7.30am) and the Crown Oil Arena (8.00am). The fare is £29.

WHERE TO PARK

There is a 'Residents Only parking scheme in operation around the ground, so if you want to street park it will mean driving a bit further away to do so. There is a cheap pay and display car park (£1.40 for four hours) on Railway Street near the railway station.

THE AWAY END

Dale fans will again be housed in the Brian Moore Stand which, in case anyone has forgotten, is of the temporary variety and very uncovered, so although Gillingham hand out free macs if it rains, still be prepared to get wet!




Such good league form makes their FA Cup exit at home to Macclesfield a fortnight ago unexplainable, but they hit back with a win at Leicester in the Checkatrade Trophy to earn a home tie with Oldham in round two.

IN CHARGE

JON WHITNEY

Jon was appointed Walsall manager on a permanent basis in June, having worked as interim boss for the final two months of last season.

A defender in his playing days, Jon made almost 200 league appearances for Huddersfield, Wigan (loan), Hull and Lincoln.



THEIR RECORD HERE

Walsall have visited the Crown Oil Arena on 30 previous occasions in league and cup football, winning ten times, drawing eight and losing 12.

Their best wins here were 2-0 successes in February 1923, February 1960 and December 1994, while The Saddlers' worst result at the Crown Oil Arena came in December 1921 when they went down to a 7-0 defeat.

THEIR LAST VISIT

Walsall were Dale's first midweek league visitors of last season and gave a competent performance that suggested they might be a surprise contender for the top six.

The Saddlers scored twice in quick succession in the second half to lead 2-0 and although Calvin Andrew pulled one back for Dale, the visitors held on for a deserved 2-1 win.




